

Add Eight Rooms.

It is proposed to add eight of the Borden residence on Har- class rooms, fire proof stairways rison Highway. It will begin at 1:30 and last all afternoon. It will begin at and new toilet facilities for the entire building. The addition entire building. The addition would be built in two wings of two stories each, one wing on the

east and one on the west of the present building. The roof of the building would be flattened to eliminate the attic and auditorium which is inaccessible and is a dangerous fire trap.


Much corridor space in the present building will be used to a better advantage. Partitions will be changed in the basement to provide an assembly room, a cafeteria and an indoor play room in addition to the enlarged boiler rooms. Plans call for a remodeled heating plant that will be adequate for the entire building. The contemplated improvements will give the building a total of 16 regular class rooms besides the special rooms. Fourteen of the rooms would be used at once if the fifth and sixth grades should be moved out of the high school building. The rooms made vacant at the high school building would relieve the congestion in that department and make it possible to use the rooms designed for commercial work for that pur-

pose. To Repair High School.

It is also planned to make minor repairs on the high school building to save maintenance costs, If funds are sufficient, dressing rooms will be provided for phy-sical education classes. Girls have no dressing room except those provided by a small toilet and

shower room combination. The boys have used a class room and were forced to pass the length of the toilet room to reach it. with the result that the floors



OF TEXAS:

That Section 3 Section 1. Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that pereafter it shall read as follows: "Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and poll tax of habitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free chools: and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed Thirty-five Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valua-tion, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of the State for a period of not-less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside, under such regulations and in such manner as may be provided by law, a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children within the scholastic age attending any school in this State; pro vided, however. that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from General Funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school dis tricts by General Laws; and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more countles, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whe-ther such districts are composed of territory wholly within a coun ty or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the murther maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not t exceed in any one year One (\$1.00) Dollar on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of the (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by General or Special Law." 





BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitu-tion of the State of Texas, Article 16 be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as "Section 61," which shall read as follows

"Sec. 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a popu-lation of 20,000 or more, according lation of 20,000 or more, according to the then last preceding Fuderal Census, shall from the first day of January and thereafter, and subsequent to the first Regular or Special Session of the Legislature after the adoption of this Resolu-tion, be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners' Court shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis; and in counties having a population of less than 20,000, according to the then last-preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners' Court shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners' Court may direct.
