

## Moore turns cold shoulder to Senator's query

# WDIC rejects repository incentive plan

Deaf Smith County Commissioner Troy Don Moore Wednesday turned a cold shoulder to a legislative plan that would reward any state with up to \$100 million annually for providing a site for the nation's first nuclear waste repository.

Testifying before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources committee, Moore refused to say "yes" to a hypothetical question by Sen. Dan Evans of Washington, who posed the question that if the technical aspects and safety were assured, would the local government be willing to accept the incentive plan?

"I can't commit to that. I don't think we are ready to assume that the repository is acceptable or palatable," Moore said he responded to the question. (Moore and County Judge Tom Simons were interviewed by The Brand in a telephone call this morning.)

"We believe Sen. Bennett Johnston, chairman of the Senate committee and sponsor of the incentive plan (S-839), has made the presumption that the project is technically correct. He says it is a people problem," said Simons.

Simons added that the Hereford group felt that Sen. Johnston tried to "intimidate" the local governmental representatives at the hearing. "He said, in so many words, that we'd better accept this because it could be a one-shot opportunity," said Simons.

Moore, chairman of the county's Waste Deposit Impact Committee, said not only was he not ready to give a "yes" to the hypothetical question, but that he was concerned about the incentive plan. "It offers no legal recourse if something goes wrong—you sign away your rights if you take the money."

Moore said Sen. Evans told the

group that he was disappointed that Texas and its representatives were not willing to accept the responsibility for a national problem. He said Nye County officials from Nevada and Hanford representatives from Washington gave a qualified "yes" to the incentive plan.

Moore testified that the WDIC group was "neutral" on the continuing study of the Texas site as home for the nuclear waste repository. "The WDIC intends to influence the project direction in the county and secure the needed protections and mitigations for the citizenry."

He added that the committee's decision should not be misinterpreted as "open-arm acceptance." The WDIC testimony warned that technical and scientific considerations must be foremost in the site selection process, and that DOE must do more to involve local governments in the process.

Johnston and other congressional and administration leaders have suggested that Nevada's Yucca Mountain is the most desirable location for the nuclear dump, scheduled for construction early in the next century.

No state wants the project, estimated to cost \$25 billion or more, but Johnston is attempting to generate new interest by offering the \$100 million annual bonus.

To that, Democratic Gov. Richard Bryan declared "perhaps some other state is ready to bite at the monetary bait that is offered, but I can assure you that Nevada is not."

Washington Gov. Booth Gardner, in a statement delivered to the committee, echoed Bryan's sentiments.

Gov. Bill Clements did not testify at the hearing, but was represented by Steve Frishman of the governor's Waste Programs Office. Frishman said the governor wants a 24-month halt to all site specific study at the three sites.

Johnston's legislation also would offer a \$50 million annual incentive to a state willing to house a related facility for cooling, packaging and intermediate storage of spent nuclear fuels and other radioactive wastes.

The Energy Department wants to build the so-called MRS — for monitored retrievable storage — at

Clinch River, Tenn., at a total cost of at least \$1.6 billion, and have it operating by 1998, at least five years ahead of the permanent dump. But Tennessee officials aren't eager, either.

Moore noted his county ranks first in Texas in agricultural production, saying it "is not the barren wasteland of the early cowboy

movies, but a premier example of the best of agriculture today — the finest technology being used on farms, measured in square miles instead of acres, that are still predominantly family owned and operated."

The Hereford delegation — which includes WDIC members Moore, Tom LaGate, Frank Zinser, Dennis

Brown and executive director Phil Niedzielski-Eichner, along with Simons and farmer Wayne Richardson — visiting with Congressmen Larry Combest and Beau Boulter Wednesday, as well as representatives from the other two sites. They will visit other congressional leaders today before returning to Hereford.

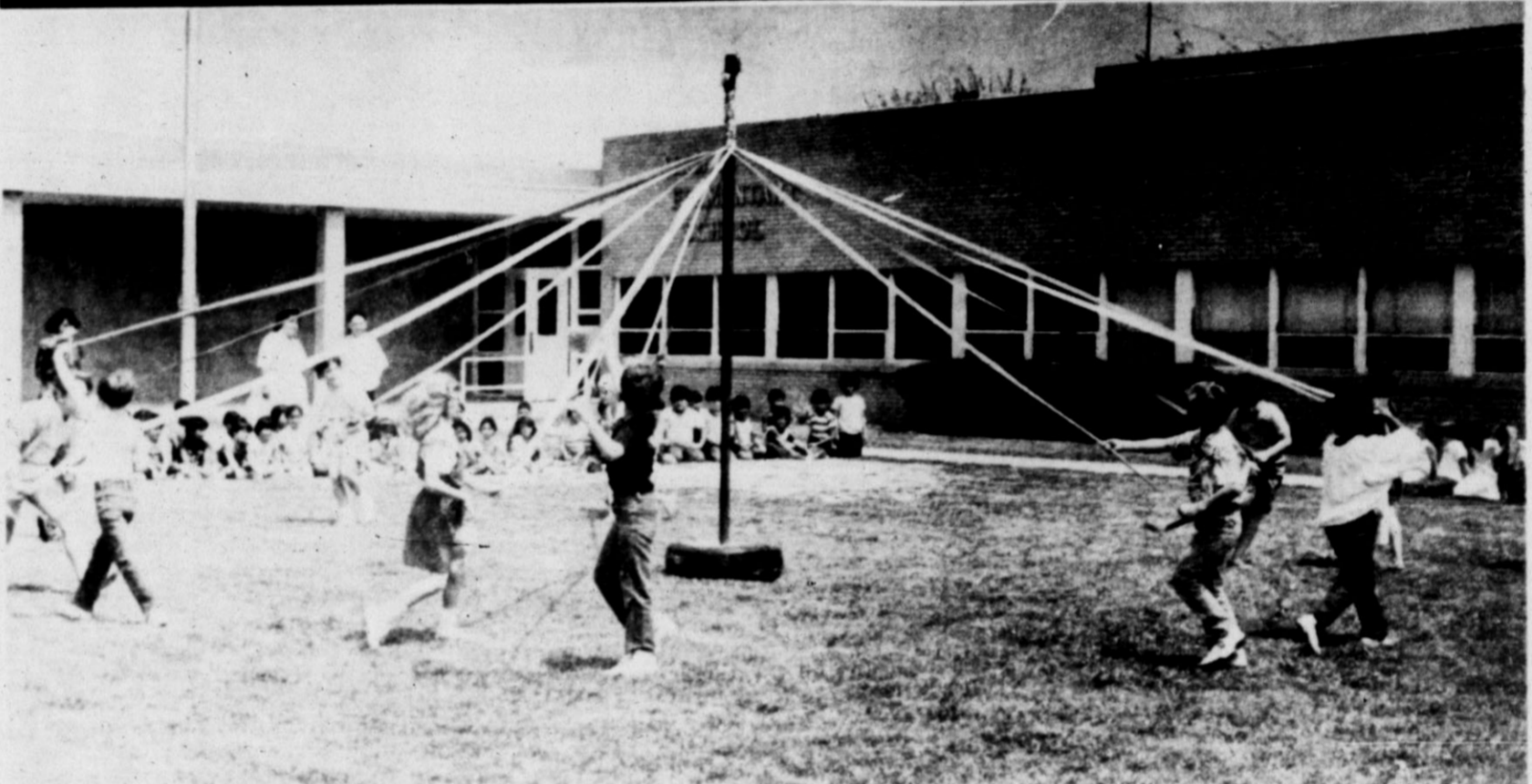
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## May Day Dance

## Combest calls for amendments to nuclear waste act

WASHINGTON — Calling for an immediate halt in the nuclear waste repository selection process until a "fair and technically-oriented" procedure is adopted, Congressman Larry Combest (R-Texas) Tuesday cosponsored the Nuclear Waste Policy Amendments of 1987.

The legislation, which was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives on April 28, would temporarily halt the site selection process until several criteria are met. The amendments would require a nationwide search for the first geological repository and all host rock formations would be considered. The bill would also establish an independent agency within the administration to oversee the project in an effort to remove politics from the selection process.

Other major provisions of the bill include: a temporary site halt of about four years until new project guidelines are established; a new study of the need for a second repository and new site characterization recommendations.

"The lack of credibility in the nuclear waste program demands that a complete overhaul be made," said Congressman Combest. "This project has been plagued with too much political rhetoric and not enough scientific data in the Department of Energy's attempt to locate the first high-level radioactive waste site."

Major provisions of the Nuclear Waste Policy Amendments of 1987 include:

-Nationwide Search—A nationwide search would be required for the first geologic repository. All potential host rocks would be considered.

-Agency—A Federal Radioactive Waste Agency would be established. The director of the agency would be appointed by the President with the consent of the Senate for a six year term and may only be removed by the President. The goal is to make it more difficult for politics to enter the selection process.

-Temporary Halt—The bill would temporarily halt the site selection process. The delay would be approximately four years: two years for issuance of new guidelines and 1½ to 2 years for recommendations of sites for characterization.

-Guidelines—Current guidelines would be scrapped and new guidelines established within two years of enactment of the Nuclear Waste Policy Amendments of 1987. Guidelines would mandate the decision making methodology. This is an effort to remove politics from the process and to wipe the slate clean.

-Recommendations for Characterization — The legislation would require that recommendations be made according to the ranking derived through the newly established methodology.

-Timetable — Target deadlines rather than arbitrary deadline requirements as under current law would be implemented. The goal is to provide guidance to the Agency but also allow flexibility should additional time be required.

-Second Repository — A study would be required to determine the need for a second repository with recommendations on action made to Congress through the Agency. Members of the study panel would be appointed by the Agency director.

## Channell guilty plea opens door to unraveling Contra aid network

WASHINGTON (AP) — The guilty plea of conservative fund-raiser Carl R. "Spitz" Channell, who sometimes introduced contributors to President Reagan, opens the door for investigators to unravel how White House aide Oliver L. North operated his private Contra aid network.

Channell, who pleaded guilty on Wednesday to conspiracy to defraud the U.S. government of taxes on \$2 million in contributions for military aid to the Nicaraguan rebels, also agreed to cooperate with independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh in his investigation of the Iran-Contra affair.

In a brief hearing following Walsh's filing of a criminal information against Channell, U.S. District Judge Stanley S. Harris asked Chan-

nell to name the persons with whom he conspired.

Channell replied, "Colonel North, an official of the National Security Council."

Walsh aide Michael Bromwich said prosecutors are not "at this time" bringing charges against North, who was fired from the NSC last November.

Channell has not implicated the president in his Contra aid effort. But he and others have confirmed that he took contributors to the White House on several occasions and that Reagan met with some of them.

Channell, who has been an activist conservative fund-raiser since the 1970s when he raised money for advertising campaigns against liberal congressmen, has said he had

14 meetings with North at the White House.

Channell's spokesman has said Reagan dropped in on sessions with Contra contributors to thank them for being patriotic Americans, but North wrote a memo on May 16, 1986, to his then-boss, National Security Adviser John Poindexter, saying, "The president obviously knows why he has been meeting with several select people to thank them for their 'support for democracy' in CentAm."

The memo was contained in the Feb. 26 report of the presidentially appointed Tower commission that investigated the clandestine U.S. arms sales to Iran and the diversion of payments to the Nicaraguan Contras.

Asked about that memo at a news conference several weeks ago, Reagan said he had thanked the contributors who supported a pro-Contra TV campaign, which also was organized by Channell.

Jane McLaughlin, who formerly worked as a fund-raiser for Channell, said Wednesday on ABC-TV's "Nightline" that for contributors to meet with Reagan they would have to give at least \$200,000.

"None of my contributors gave in excess of \$200,000. However, I do know that other contributors did meet privately with the president. It wasn't kept a secret," she said.

Meanwhile, Sen. Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, chairman of the Senate committee investigating the Iran-Contra affair, asserted again that Reagan "was very much knowledgeable about the events occurring around him, that in raising funds from private sources for the Contras, he was not just a peripheral player and he was involved very deeply."

Inouye, in an interview Wednesday with CBS News, elaborated on comments he made to The Washington Post last week, based on his review of excerpts of Reagan's diaries.

## Slim vote clouds bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Opponents of a measure calling for trade retaliation against Japan and other major U.S. economic allies say its scant four-vote acceptance by the House makes final congressional approval doubtful.

The proposal by Rep. Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., faces numerous legislative hurdles, including an uncertain fate in the Senate.

And supporters conceded that even if the proposal survives, the House vote suggests a threatened presidential veto would be sustained easily. Two-thirds majorities are required in both chambers to override a veto.

## State

### Student killed at middle school

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) — A juvenile remained in custody today in connection with the death of a 15-year-old student fatally stabbed on school grounds, officials said.

"We do have one fatality, we do have one in custody," Galveston Police Lt. Rick Boyle said Wednesday night.

The victim was identified as Derrick Brown, an eighth-grade student at Central Middle School, Galveston Independent School District Superintendent Jim Pickett said.

Brown, a football player at the school, was stabbed "once or twice" Wednesday shortly after classes ended on school grounds, Pickett said.

"It is my understanding that he was stabbed by a non-student who confronted him outside the school," Pickett said. "I understand (the stabbing) was the culmination of some incident that occurred (Tuesday) night outside school grounds."

Pickett said the boy was transferred to John Sealy Hospital in Galveston where he died about 5 p.m.

### House approves death penalty bill

AUSTIN (AP) — The House has given preliminary approval to a bill that would make it illegal to threaten to tamper with consumer products.

The measure by Rep. John Smithee, R-Amarillo, was approved Wednesday in a non-record vote, but faces a final House vote that could send it to the Senate.

According to a House analysis, a national food retailers group reported 1,892 cases of tampering threats in 1986, compared with only 200 cases of actual tampering. Threats of tampering have caused problems in Texas, including a Waco incident in which \$400,000 was necessary to remove and destroy products that a caller said had been tainted.

The Smithee bill would allow 10 years in prison and a \$5,000 fine for threatening to tamper with products.

Also Wednesday, the House gave its final approval, with no debate, to a bill by Rep. Larry Evans, D-Houston, that would make it more difficult for jurors to return death penalties against accomplices in capital murder cases.

The bill would require jurors to decide whether an accomplice was "a cause" of the death. Under current law, an accomplice, even if not the triggerman, can be sentenced to death.

Evans' bill now goes to the Senate.

### Speaker defends \$4,500 fireplace

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Even during crises, Washington leaders have advocated improvements in the capital's public buildings, so there's no reason the House Speaker's office can't have a new fireplace, Jim Wright says.

"During the Civil War, Abraham Lincoln insisted on building the dome on the Capitol," said Wright, defending a \$4,500 expenditure for the fireplace.

"During the Korean War, Harry Truman built the south balcony on the White House. During Mr. (Sam) Rayburn's time as speaker, he insisted on the whole east front extension (of the Capitol)," Wright told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

The fireplace addition and its cost was noted in a recent syndicated column by Jack Anderson.

The black marble fixture is part of a renovation program for the speaker's office. The project will cost another \$1,100 to renovate a kitchen, and drapes and carpeting will be added at a still undetermined price tag.

## National

### Oil import fee bills introduced

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oil state congressmen introduced a pair of bills aimed at reviving the U.S. oil industry by placing tariffs on imported oil.

The Energy Independence Act of Rep. Joe Barton, D-Ennis, calls for an import fee to maintain a minimum \$25 per barrel oil price, government purchases of oil from smaller producers (or stripper wells) and increased flow into the strategic oil reserve.

"We think that this bill, if passed, will go a long way to minimizing the country's energy dependence and maximizing our energy independence," Barton said.

Rep. Michael Andrews of Houston and nine other Democrats also introduced an oil import bill Wednesday identical to one submitted in the Senate by Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, and Bennett Johnston, D-La., on April 9.

The Andrews-Bentsen bill calls for a \$24 fee price, instead of \$25. All revenues would be applied to reducing the U.S. budget deficit. It also seeks elimination of the windfall profits tax.

Barton said the import fee would add 21 cents a gallon to U.S. gasoline prices, and would generate \$12 billion in revenues, \$9 billion of which could go to servicing the national debt and \$3 billion to buying oil from stripper well producers at \$25 a barrel.

### PTL financial records 'a mess'

FORT MILL, S.C. (AP) — PTL's financial records are "a mess," its new chief operations officer said as auditors began searching for assets that can be sold to cover the ministry's \$50 million debt.

A home that the Rev. Jim Bakker and his wife lived in and a residence of the ousted PTL president, the Rev. Richard Dortch, probably will be sold with other properties as part of an effort to streamline operations and settle the debt, Harry Hargrave said Wednesday.

"Our goals are to right the ship from a fiscal standpoint, to create a balanced budget, and to go in and provide services to the PTL partners and general public that in turn will glorify God," Hargrave told an impromptu news conference.

PTL's new board hired Hargrave on Tuesday at \$175,000 a year to bring the scandal-rocked ministry back to financial stability. It also exiled Bakker from the ministry and stopped all payments to him, his wife Tammy, and Jessica Hahn, the woman whose 1980 tryst with Bakker led to his resignation last month.

Dortch resigned under pressure at Tuesday's board meeting.

## International

### First city elective body approved

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The Mexican Senate gave final approval to creation of a city assembly to represent the Federal District.

Although the assembly will have little decision-making power, it will be the first official body in the capital to be elected by its citizens. It was approved by unanimous vote on Tuesday.

Mexico City residents elect their congressional representatives and vote on federal officials, but the mayor and other city officials are appointed.

President Miguel de la Madrid proposed the assembly in response to calls for residents to be given a voice in running the city, such as direct vote on officials or an assembly with law-making power.

During debate on the constitutional reform, opposition senators and deputies continued to argue for conversion of the Federal District into a separate state.

Roberto Casillas Hernandez, a senator of the ruling Institutional Revolutionary Party from Aguascalientes state, said the possibility of creating the country's 32nd state should not be discarded.

## Nakasone trying to smooth rift in U.S. trade matters

WASHINGTON (AP) — Japanese Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone, opening two days of talks with President Reagan and congressional leaders, is trying to cool American passion for tough economic action against his country.

He carried fresh assurances that Japan will open its borders to foreign imports and brought additional details of a plan to increase Japanese responsibility for the world economy, Japanese foreign ministry spokesman Takeshi Ohara said Wednesday.

Among those details were "very specific figures" on a \$20 billion to \$30 billion Japanese loan program for impoverished nations, and word that the money need not be spent on Japanese products, Ohara said.

Ohara, briefing reporters on the visit, said Nakasone also brought details of how Japan plans to stimulate demand for consumer goods, a step that would presumably increase foreign sales in his country. The prime minister also is prepared to assure administration officials that Japan will honor a pledge to buy expensive, U.S.-built supercomputers.

Nakasone was greeted on arrival Wednesday with more evidence of U.S. government determination to reduce Japan's \$58.6 billion billion trade surplus with America.

The House passed, 218-214, an amendment requiring countries to cut "excess and unwarranted" trade surpluses with the United States by 10 percent annually or face presidentially decreed sanctions.

At the White House, moreover, officials said they were in no great hurry to lift sanctions imposed earlier this month on \$300 million worth of Japanese electronics products.

The punitive tariffs, which took effect April 17, were in retaliation for Japan's alleged violation of a 1986 agreement to refrain from cut-rate foreign sales of computer chips.

Ohara denied that Japan violated the agreement, said that the sanctions were unwarranted and that the prime minister would ask the president to lift the penalties. He said Nakasone would not suggest a date for cancellation.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said it would be "difficult" but not impossible to have enough information to lift the sanctions before the seven-nation economic summit in Venice on June 8-10.

While Reagan has indicated a desire to cancel the measures as soon as possible, "I don't think that we're rushing to lift the sanctions," a senior administration official told reporters at a briefing on Nakasone's visit.

"Once we are able to determine that there is something happening, that there is a change taking place as far as the ability to compete in the Japanese domestic market and the dumping cases in other areas of the world... we will consider lifting those sanctions," the official said. "But

## Fasting men to be released from jail

PANHANDLE, Texas (AP) — Three men who decided to fast after they were jailed for blocking the entrance to the Pantex nuclear weapons assembly plant will be released this week, officials say.

Carson County Jail officials have tried for the last three weeks to feed the three Houston men, who were sentenced to 40 days in jail.

Greg LeRoy, 29, Charles Perez, 36, and Jimmy Clark, 19, have taken only liquids while in jail. They said they fasted to protest their imprisonment and to publicize the nuclear arms issue.

The three men are part of a group dubbed "The Pantex Seven" who were arrested Aug. 10 outside the Pantex plant about 17 miles northeast of Amarillo on U.S. Highway 60. Four other men pleaded guilty last week to misdemeanor charges of blocking the entrance to the plant and paid \$600 fines.

The three are scheduled to be released at 8 a.m. Friday. Their sentences called for them to be jailed until mid-May, but Clark said the three had worked off part of the sentence by doing chores at the jail.

"At the very least, we hope this fast can provoke some kind of discussion of the issue," Perez said in an interview from his cell.

"We're trying to bring attention to the continuing problem of nuclear weapons expansion and decreased attention given to education and human welfare in this country. The

strength of this country is in its human resources."

The three men decided to serve out the sentences instead of pay off a \$600 fine assessed by County Judge Jay Roselius.

The men estimated they have each lost about 10 to 15 pounds.

"I honestly feel sorry for them, but some of them ought to have their tails kicked," said Carson County Sheriff-Connie Reed. "I think they've been misinformed, either by Communists or someone in their personal lives."

Part of the trio's fast is in protest of Carson County Attorney Ed Hinshaw, who opposed bringing up nuclear arms issues in the trial.

"I objected to their making a soap box out of the Texas legal system," Hinshaw told the Amarillo Globe-News Wednesday.

"Texas has a law that says you don't block roadways. If there is any law that makes building nuclear weapons illegal, they need to take their case to the federal courts and give it their best shot."

amendment 218-214 on Wednesday and was expected to give final approval to the full bill today.

The House will debate a provision of the legislation, also opposed by the administration, requiring foreign companies and individuals who wish to make major investments in U.S. enterprises to first obtain clearance from the Commerce Department.

Also to be considered is a "Buy America" provision that would bar the federal government from purchasing office equipment or other merchandise manufactured in countries with trade barriers against U.S. goods.

Although the 900-page bill contains numerous provisions designed to enhance U.S. "competitiveness" and ease the trade deficit, the Gephardt measure has received the most attention.

His measure, denounced as protectionist by the Reagan administration, would require nations that maintain large trade surpluses with the United States through unfair trading practices to reduce them by 10 percent annually, or face retaliatory tariffs or quotas.

Japan, West Germany, South Korea, Taiwan and Italy would be

likely targets of the sanctions.

President Reagan seized on Wednesday's narrow margin of approval to say he was "pleased by the size and strength of the vote against protectionism."

Reagan planned to meet today with Japanese Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone, who is in Washington for two days of talks with U.S. officials in an effort to ease intensifying trade frictions.

The United States last year imported \$59 billion more in goods from Japan than it exported to that country, making Japan the major single contributor to this nation's record \$166.3 billion 1986 trade deficit.

Gephardt, who has made the measure a central part of his cam-

paign 50th anniversary nomination, conceded that Wednesday's vote showed "a lot of difference of opinion on how to open markets."

Still, Gephardt said his victory showed "the House said clearly that it wants a change in trade policy, not a torrent of words, but change."

The Gephardt amendment would give the president six months to negotiate an end to trade barriers in countries having the large surpluses. Large is defined as an excess of imports over exports of at least 75 percent.

After the six-month period, the president would be forced to use quotas or tariffs to reduce the trade surpluses by 10 percent annually.

## Former resident honored for service

Glenn Kendrick, 65-year-old brother of Hereford resident Bobby Kendrick, recently received several medals and patches earned for his service in the U.S. Army more than 40 years ago.

A former resident of Hereford, Kendrick now resides in Springfield, Mo. Among the medals he acquired were the Bronze Star, which is the second-highest medal earned for combat duty, and the Rangers insignia. He is currently being considered for a Congressional Medal of Honor.

Kendrick was drafted into the Army when he was a 21-year-old sheepherder in northern New Mexico. He joined the 33rd Infantry Division and became a Ranger, thereby receiving training in guerrilla warfare.

Called Merrill's Marauders, Kendrick's 3,000-member unit reached Bombay, India, on Aug. 28, 1943. They spent one year, nine months, and eight days in India and Burma. It was their mission to help reopen the 717 mile-long Burma Road, which served as the only overland supply route to China. Kendrick served as a mortarman during this fight against the Japanese to reopen the Burma Road.

Only 606 men in Kendrick's unit

returned home following the completion of tour duty. Many had been hospitalized in India for treatment of malaria, typhus, and other diseases.

Kendrick returned to New Mexico on July 5, 1945. Discharge papers stated that he was entitled to medals for his military duty. Forty plus years later, the honors came to him.

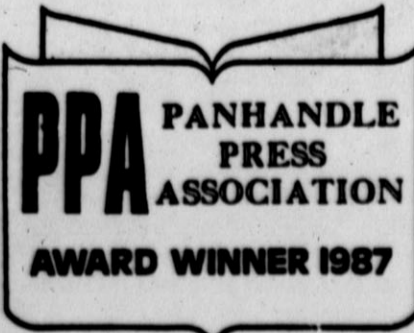

**DEAR L.I.:** No 16-year-old youth should be injecting himself with anything.

People who abuse steroids risk kidney problems, liver trouble, high blood pressure and acne. If Johnny refuses to listen to you, speak to his coach. If you don't get satisfactory answers, go to the school principal or the counselor. Meanwhile throw out the needles and whatever else you find that looks suspicious.

**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** You have helped me recover after two major losses in my life. This letter is to say "thank you" and to request your help in trying to jump yet another major hurdle.

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### Ag business seminars focus on women landowners

**WANTED** — Women landowners who are interested in learning about writing leases and saving taxes.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service of The Texas A&M University System will hold a series of four workshops over the state during May which are especially designed to meet the needs of women landowners.

The workshop schedule is as follows: May 5-7, Holiday InnNorth (6911 North I-35), Austin; May 12-14, Holiday Inn—Emerald Beach (1102 Shoreline), Corpus Christi; May 19-21, Holiday Inn Civic Center (801 Ave. Q), Lubbock; and May 26-28, Holiday Inn (4440 W. Airport Freeway), Dallas.

"Many Texas women find themselves thrust into land-owning situations for which they have very little training or background," says Dr. Wayne A. Hayenga, economist and attorney with the Extension Service. "Frequently a woman is 'in charge' of property upon the death of her husband or after inheriting land. The entire three-day workshop will be an opportunity for women to explore income-generating and tax-saving opportunities for their farms and ranches."

First day of the seminar will be concerned with the outlook for agricultural land investments and how they compare to other investments, Hayenga points out.

Also, since most women who inherit land don't want to operate it themselves, a special session will deal with farm and ranch leases. Items to include in a lease, both of an economic and legal nature, will be addressed. Many folks are concerned about the "fairness" of a lease. A method to develop a "fair" and "stress-free" lease will be explored as well as suggested guidelines and standards for women landowners to use to evaluate tenants.

The second day will include such topics as types of business organizations, such as corporations and partnerships, and the income tax and estate planning considerations of each. Many farms can have income taxed at 15-18 percent if the owners want the farm to expand, says Hayenga.

Estate planning is a special need for single people who own farm or ranch land, since one person can give

away or pass on an estate of \$500,000 in 1986 without gift or estate taxes. This amount goes to \$600,000 in 1987, so most women won't have a serious tax problem unless they own a farm or ranch or other investments. Estate tax rates on the amount over the exemption are from 34 to 60 percent, so many women need to look at special tools to change farm valuation in an estate, the economist points out.

The last day will include a discussion of planning ideas to save on estate taxes and to make estate administration easier.

"For instance, planning to sell part of the property on an installment is a consideration for many," notes Hayenga. "It can be good, or bad, depending on the individual situation. Oil and gas interests can be managed for large income tax savings, and this is usually done in conjunction with estate planning."

## Rangers have become hottest team in majors

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — The Texas Rangers, coming off their finest homestand in their 15-year history, are the hottest team in the major leagues.

The New York Yankees will testify that the current Rangers' team isn't the same one that started the season with a 1-10 record.

The Yankees blew a 7-2 lead and lost to Texas 8-7 on Wednesday night as Gino Petrali delivered a two-out pinch bloop single in the bottom of the ninth inning. It gave the Rangers a two-game sweep of the Yankees who are only a victory away from their best April in history.

The victory, the Rangers' sixth in a row, gave Texas a 7-1 homestand, best in the club's history, and moved them to within three games of leading Minnesota in the American League West.

"We were the team to beat in spring training then we stumbled coming out of the gate and went into shock," said Mitch Williams, who earned his second victory against one loss. "We finally woke up. Now, we're playing like the team we had last year."

Texas Manager Bobby Valentine played a "hunch" in the bottom of the ninth inning.

"I decided to go with my hunch and it turned out to be a good one," Valentine said. "I decided to sit Bobby Brower down and bring on Gino Petrali."

Petrali delivered a two-out game-winning bloop single to rightfield for the game winner off reliever Cecilio

Guante, 1-1.

"I didn't hit it very hard but it found the right place to fall," Petrali said. "I like clutch pinchhitting situations like that."

"It was poetic justice. We hit so many balls hard that were caught. Then we beat the Yankees with a blooper," Valentine said.

The Yankees' Rickey Henderson said, "It was a game we should have won. You think you have the game in hand and the next thing you know you don't."

Petrali's hit scored Don Slaught from third base. Slaught hit a two-out double and moved to third on Steve Buechele's infield single.

"Ever since I've been playing down here, Texas has found a way to beat us," Henderson said. "We did all right offensively but just not enough to win."

Texas tied the game with three runs in the bottom of the eighth inning off Yankees' ace reliever Dave Righetti, who loaded the bases with a hit batsman and two walks.

Pete O'Brien's sacrifice fly tied the game at 7-all.

"That was a wonderful win," Valentine said. "That was a real gut-getter. The guys reached down and battled back against a tough guy like Righetti."

"When you have a five-run deficit against the New York Yankees and you can come back and win you've done a great job."

The Yankees continue their road trip in Minnesota on Friday night while the Rangers travel to Toronto for a three-game series after an off-day.

## Astros lose to Mets, 2-1

NEW YORK (AP) — This time, the New York Mets didn't need to check the baseballs Mike Scott was throwing. The umpires had apparently already been told to examine him for scuffballs.

"(Home plate umpire Randy) Marsh told me he had orders from (National League President A. Bartlett) Giamatti to check the balls," Houston Manager Hal Lanier complained Wednesday night after a 2-1 loss to the Mets.

Scott was checked four times in six innings, twice by Marsh and twice by first base umpire Bob Engel, and nothing came of the looks.

"It was something they were doing on their own," said Mets Manager Davey Johnson, whose batters did not request the checks.

Giamatti and NL supervisor of umpires Ed Vargo both attended the game and visited with the umpires after it ended. Neither Giamatti, Vargo nor the umpires had any comment on the matter.

"I'm calling Giamatti tomorrow (Thursday) and asking why did he wait until Scott's sixth game of the season. Not one umpire found one (a scuffed ball)," said Lanier, who discussed the situation with Marsh for three minutes in the third inning. "I don't blame the umps. They were following orders."

Scott, whose quick-darting split-fingered fastball moves so much that opponents claim he doctors the ball, was the center of controversy during last year's NL playoffs.

Scott was the Most Valuable Player in the series, beating New York twice and allowing only one run in 18 innings, and the Mets complained long and loud that Scott was throwing illegal pitches, presenting almost two dozen balls as evidence.

This time, Scott realized the umpires were the curious ones.

"They got orders to check the ball," Scott said. "It doesn't bother me."

"Checking all the time is annoying, but it doesn't affect my pitching," he said. "It's been going on for three years since I went to the split-fingered fastball. If it goes on all year, it goes on all year."

Scott, the 1986 NL Cy Young winner, got his first loss in four decisions

this year as long-time nemesis Keith Hernandez hit a home run and an RBI single.

Sid Fernandez, 4-1, the first four-game winner in the league, pitched seven shutout innings. Jesse Orosco got the final two outs for his sixth save as New York ended its three-game losing streak.

Fernandez gave up singles to Bill Doran and Billy Hatcher to start the game but, after a rain delay of 1 hour, 42 minutes in the bottom of the first inning, never again allowed two runners in an inning.

Fernandez yielded five hits, struck out eight and walked two before Doug Sisk relieved to start the eighth. Orosco came on after Kevin Bass' leadoff double in the ninth and gave up a two-out, RBI single to pinch-hitter Mark Bailey before striking out Jose Cruz to end the game.

Scott continued to have trouble against Hernandez and the Mets, the team that traded him to Houston after the 1982 season for Danny Heep.

Hernandez, batting .393 in his career against Scott, put New York ahead in the fourth inning with an opposite-field home run to left. It was Hernandez's sixth career homer off Scott, and no other major-league batter has hit more than three against the right-hander.

"But that's my first one since he's been throwing the split-fingered fastball, and it wasn't off that pitch," Hernandez said.

In the fifth, Fernandez singled for the second time in the game and Lenny Dykstra followed with a one-hop, infield hit off Scott's left ankle. With two outs, Hernandez hit his RBI single.

Scott left for a pinch-hitter in the

seventh. He gave up seven hits and walked none, while striking out eight to raise his major league-leading total to 49.

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# Accent on Health

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) estimates that fewer than one in every four cases of rape are ever reported to the police. In the 1986, Texas' rape crisis centers helped some 10,639 victims, many of whom (2,846) were children.

Child rape must be reported to the police, whereas adult victims must volunteer to press criminal charges.

Perhaps 50,000 adult rape victims each year suffer physical and psychological trauma without seeking assistance. At the same time, sex offenders remain at large to repeat and intensify their crimes, according to Ann Robison of TDH's Sexual Assault Prevention and Crises Services program.

Robison of TDH's "The general public lacks a thorough understanding of the dynamics of sex crimes—who the offenders are, who the likely victims are, even what constitutes rape.

A rape victim is often so traumatized by the initial assault that she can't bear being further torn by public controversy, police and

courtroom reenactments, and counter-accusations. Victims often fear the aftermath of the crime almost as much as the rape itself," Robison said.

Robison said that TDH and the Texas Association Against Sexual Assault (TAASA) annually co-sponsor Sexual Assault Awareness Week to help inform the public of the realities of sex crimes in Texas. This year's observance, April 26-May 2, stresses the theme, "Marriage: A License to Rape?" and confronts the little-discussed problem of sexual abuse between husbands and wives.

"Marital rape is a volatile topic," Robison said. "Society and the law may be shocked and disgusted by the way a rapist brutalizes a woman he does not know, but often looks the other way when the victim is the rapist's own wife."

During Sexual Assault Awareness Week, local groups and the media throughout the state are urged to join with local rape crisis centers in efforts to raise the public consciousness about the problem of sex

crimes in Texas.

TDH and TAASA assist rape crisis centers in developing their funding and programs. In addition to counseling rape victims, the centers assist them with the police and courts, and train volunteers. In 1986, they offered rape prevention counseling to 187,505 women.

### Rockets defeat

#### Portland 117-108

HOUSTON (AP) — Portland Coach Mike Schuler admits he's the eternal optimist.

"I think it's wholesome the way our players have reacted," Schuler said. "I think it's significant that our players are confident that they can win."

Houston held off a second half Portland rally Tuesday night for a 117-108 victory that put the Trail Blazers behind 2-1 and facing elimination in their NBA first round playoff series.

But Schuler has instilled his resiliency in his team.

"In a game like this, you tell your players that when the game is over, you want them to walk off the court knowing that they played the best they could play."

Clyde Drexler gets the message.

"We've got to come out of the box more aggressive," Drexler said. "We were aggressive in the second half Tuesday but we dug a hole too deep to get out of."

Kiki Vandeweghe scored only 6 first half points against the Rockets but finished with 20, also aiding the Blazers' rally.

"We've got to come out better or it's over," Vandeweghe said. "We just stood around (Tuesday). We have to turn the fast break and move their big guys around."

Houston's Cedric Maxwell is trying to convince his teammates that the series isn't over.

"When you get them down by 25 or 30 points you tend to think they'll roll over and die but they are professionals and the keep coming at you," Maxwell said.

The Rockets dominated the Blazers 125-115 in the series opener but Portland's trapping defense resulted in a 111-98 victory in the second game.

"We're going to have to play a lot smarter," Rockets Coach Bill Fitch said. "We've got to work our tails off to play as well in the fourth quarter as we did in the first quarter."

Fitch didn't try to hide his disgust in the Rockets' second half defensive performance.

"When we have a 25-point lead, nobody should shoot layups on us," Fitch said. "The Towers (Ralph Sampson and Akeem Olajuwon) are more important on defense than on offense."

Portland's resiliency in the second half will help them in Thursday's game, Blazer Coach Mike Schuler said.

"It would have been so easy to pack it in, but they didn't do that," Schuler said. "That was very important to our players."

The Blazers were called for three illegal defenses in Tuesday's game. The Rockets complained the Blazers were using an illegal zone in Sunday's loss.

"I knew that would happen," Schuler said. "Houston talked so much about it, I knew the refs would be watching it closely."

Fitch said the Rockets counted 15 illegal defenses in Sunday's game but there were only two others that weren't called in Tuesday's game.

"They'll never be able to do again what they did Sunday," Fitch said. "They'll try something."

The fifth game of the series, if necessary, would be played in Portland Saturday.

The Houston-Portland winner will play the winner of the Dallas-Seattle series. Seattle leads that series 2-1.

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# Health of Donaldson, Aguirre is key for Mavs

SEATTLE (AP) — The health of All-Star forward Mark Aguirre and starting center James Donaldson could determine whether the Dallas Mavericks' season is soon to end.

With Aguirre and Donaldson ailing, the Mavericks are on the verge of playoff extinction. A Seattle SuperSonics' victory tonight would give them a 3-1 win over the Mavericks in the teams' best-of-five game NBA first-round playoff series.

If a fifth game is necessary, it will be played in Dallas Saturday.

The winner of the Dallas-Seattle series will meet the winner of the Houston-Portland series. Houston leads that opening round series 2-1.

"I still say Dallas is a better basketball team," said Coach Bernie Bickerstaff of the Sonics.

"There's going to be a tomorrow, but there may not be a tomorrow for us," said Dallas Coach Dick Motta.

After losing the series opener 151-129 in Dallas, the Sonics rebounded to nip the Mavericks 112-110 in Texas. And they beat Dallas again 117-110 in Seattle Tuesday night.

Aguirre was sidelined in game two at University of Washington's 59-year-old Hec Edmundson Pavilion because of strep throat, and the 7-foot-2 Donaldson didn't even play in the second half because of a sore right leg. Donaldson failed to score a point.

Former Mavericks reserve Dale Ellis, the Sonics playoff hero, has motivated his Sonics teammates. "I've told them we're just as good as team as Dallas," he said.

Ellis, voted the league's most-improved player this season, scored a career-high 43 points Tuesday night. Last Saturday night, he put in a pair of game-winning free throws with two seconds.

Donaldson underwent X-rays for a possible stress fracture of his leg after game two. The X-rays were negative, but his ailment was diagnosed as a stress reaction, a condition that sometimes precedes a stress fracture.

"We're frustrated," said the 7-foot-2 Donaldson.

Aguirre said he wasn't at full strength because of his strep throat.

Ellis is taking out his past frustrations on Motta, who kept him sitting on the bench behind Aguirre and Rolando Blackman for three seasons in Dallas.

"I don't think Motta really knew what he had in me," said Ellis, who led the Sonics in scoring this season.

"Ellis didn't get the minutes he wanted with us and he got discouraged," said Motta.

Motta felt he had to trade Ellis after Ellis openly defied him by refusing to go onto the floor late in a game. So he swapped him to Seattle after last season for journeyman guard Al Wood, a player who didn't fit into the Sonics' future.

Still, the Sonics weren't supposed to come close to the Mavericks. Dallas was 5-0 against Seattle during the regular season and the average margin of victory was 18.6 points. The Mavericks set a club record with 55 regular season victories and Seattle wasn't even a .500 team.

But things have changed since the series opener, which Dallas won in a breeze, 151-129.

"Our timing is off," said Motta. "Now, our backs are against the wall, and that's no cliché."

"We have to find a way to stop Dale," said Blackman.

"It seems like everything we're doing is working," said Xavier McDaniel of the Sonics.

## DR. GOTT Two ailments are very different

DEAR DR. GOTT — Are chlamydia and Candida albicans the same thing?

DEAR READER — No, they are different.

Chlamydia are considered to be a type of specialized bacteria. They can affect the eye, causing conjunctivitis or trachoma. They also can be spread sexually, causing a venereal disease called lymphogranuloma venereum, which is characterized by swollen lymph nodes in the groin, genital ulcers, headache and fever. A rare type of chlamydia that infects birds can be transmitted to people in the form of psittacosis (a variety of pneumonia). Chlamydia has been reported to be spread, during birth, from the mother to the infant, causing pneumonia. A recent study showed that chlamydia can cause pharyngitis and laryngitis in otherwise healthy university students; the infection was spread non-sexually.

Candida albicans is a fungus normally found in the mouths, digestive tracts and birth canals of healthy people. In patients with ineffective immunity, Candida can cause disease. For example, it produces diaper rash, dermatitis and thrush in newborn infants. Diabetics have a tendency to develop serious Candida infections, as do patients whose immunity has been suppressed by anti-cancer drugs. Women on antibiotics commonly develop Candida vaginitis, because the drugs kill off bacteria that are natural yeast antagonists. Candida infec-

tion of fingernails and toenails can be resistant to treatment.

Lately, there has been much public interest generated by self-styled experts who have written books claiming that chronic Candida infection is a common scourge. These authors believe that Candida can cause an enormous array of human ills. To date, these claims have not been scientifically validated. Candida appears to be an opportunistic yeast; that is, it sets up infection if the environment is suitable.

DEAR DR. GOTT — When counting calories, should one take into consideration all of the calories consumed, or just the "fat" ones?

DEAR READER — You have to consider all of the calories. If you were performing a mileage check on your car during a trip and used a tank of regular followed by a tank of high-test, you would have to make your calculation based on both tanks of gas, not just the high-test. Calories are a measure of energy; in determining your daily intake, you have to consider calories from protein, vegetables, grain products and fat.

DEAR DR. GOTT — I've been having trouble with an itchy rash on my back, anus and vulva. One doctor says it's herpes, but I wonder if it might be caused by the medicines I take: Apresoline, Lasix, Aldactone, Lanoxin Hydroxyzine and Halcyon. What do you think?

DEAR READER — I think that one or more of your medicines may be the cause of your rash. Ask for a dermatologist's opinion.
