Pantex opens doors for in-depth media tour

Layers of secrecy, built up by necessity during the years of the Cold

War, are being peeled off Pantex, a facility everyone knew had something to do with nuclear weapons but didn't know much more than that.

In the last year, the plant operator in conjunction with the Department of Energy, has opened the doors to the media as well as other visitors --

under very controlled circumstances, of course -- to let fresh air through. In the third media day program last Thursday, the invitation list extended

for the first time to international news people. And they came -- from London, Japan (five separate groups), Korea and Finland, as well as closer to home.

And, while Pantex was the star of the show, the fun was in being a part of a news event with such far-reaching interest.

The federal government's Department of Energy is the agency in charge of Pantex. Day-to-day operations are conducted by a contractor of long-standing, Mason & Hanger-Silas Mason Company, Inc.

These two entities cooperated Thursday in explaining the work of the past and the future to the media.

A few pertinent facts may be useful in understanding the past and present of the plant:

-- Originally a munitions plant built in the early 1940s, Pantex was shut down after World War II and was vacant until 1949.

-- In 1949, the 16,000-acre site was purchased by Texas Tech for \$1 and was used for cattle feeding operations.

-- Because of a recapture clause in the deal with Tech, the Atomic Energy Commission (predecessor of DOE) asked the U.S. Army to reclaim the main plant and 10,000 surrounding acres for use as a nuclear weapons production facility.

-- Mason & Hanger-Silas Mason was engaged to refurbish and expand the plant at a cost of \$25 million and Proctor & Gamble was awarded the first five-year management contract in 1951.

-- After Proctor & Gamble declined to renew the contract in 1956, Mason & Hanger-Silas Mason assumed management and operation, and has remained in that capacity to this day.

-- Approximately 6,000 acres of land were leased from Texas Tech in 1984 and 1989, bringing the site back to the original 16,000 acres.

In their presentations to media Thursday, representatives of both DOE and Mason & Hanger emphasized the future work of Pantex.

"Our basic mission is dismantlement of nuclear warheads," declared Gerry Johnson, DOE manager at Pantex.

"The U.S. has a stockpile of 20,000 nuclear warheads," he explained. "We want to reduce that number to under 10,000."

Johnson said the goal is disassembly of 2,000 per year, "but we have not reached that goal in a year, yet."

"Our focus is to do it safely," Johnson said.

Asked by a newsman why the procedure can't be hurried along, the Mason & Hanger manager, Jim Angelo, replied, "No one gains by

rushing." Johnson explained that procedures are reviewed every six months by DOE, "weighted toward doing a job that is environmentally sound."

During tours of the plant, media representatives saw work areas that once were open only to certain personnel -- bays and cells where nuclear warheads once were assembled and now are dismantled.

Each "bomb" is taken apart and every part, regardless of size, systematically accounted for. Parts are deliberately damaged to such an extent that they are no longer identifiable.

"Shape of the components is classified, not the materials," reminded Johnson.

The "pit" -- the real business of the bomb with its plutonium and explosive materials -- obviously cannot be discarded lightly.

The stainless steel case with its core of radioactive material is placed in a holding fixture inside a steel container, packed with insulating and cushioning materials and sealed.

While these pits in their containers now are being stored in "magazines" on site, at issue is what the final disposition will be.

Answering a question Thursday about this problem, Gerry Johnson admitted that "we must get to a national policy -- right now, we're in interim storage."

Safety of the storage would seem to be a prime concern for both the contractor and DOE.

The magazines are secured against almost any eventuality and, certainly, are tornado-proof.

Built of reinforced concrete, topped with a massive amount of earth, each magazine, or igloo, has a single entrance -- sealed with a double steel door fronted by concrete blocks that weigh 25,000 pounds each.

Currently, there are 7,000 pits stored at Pantex, officials said. Maximum number that may be stored is 12,000.

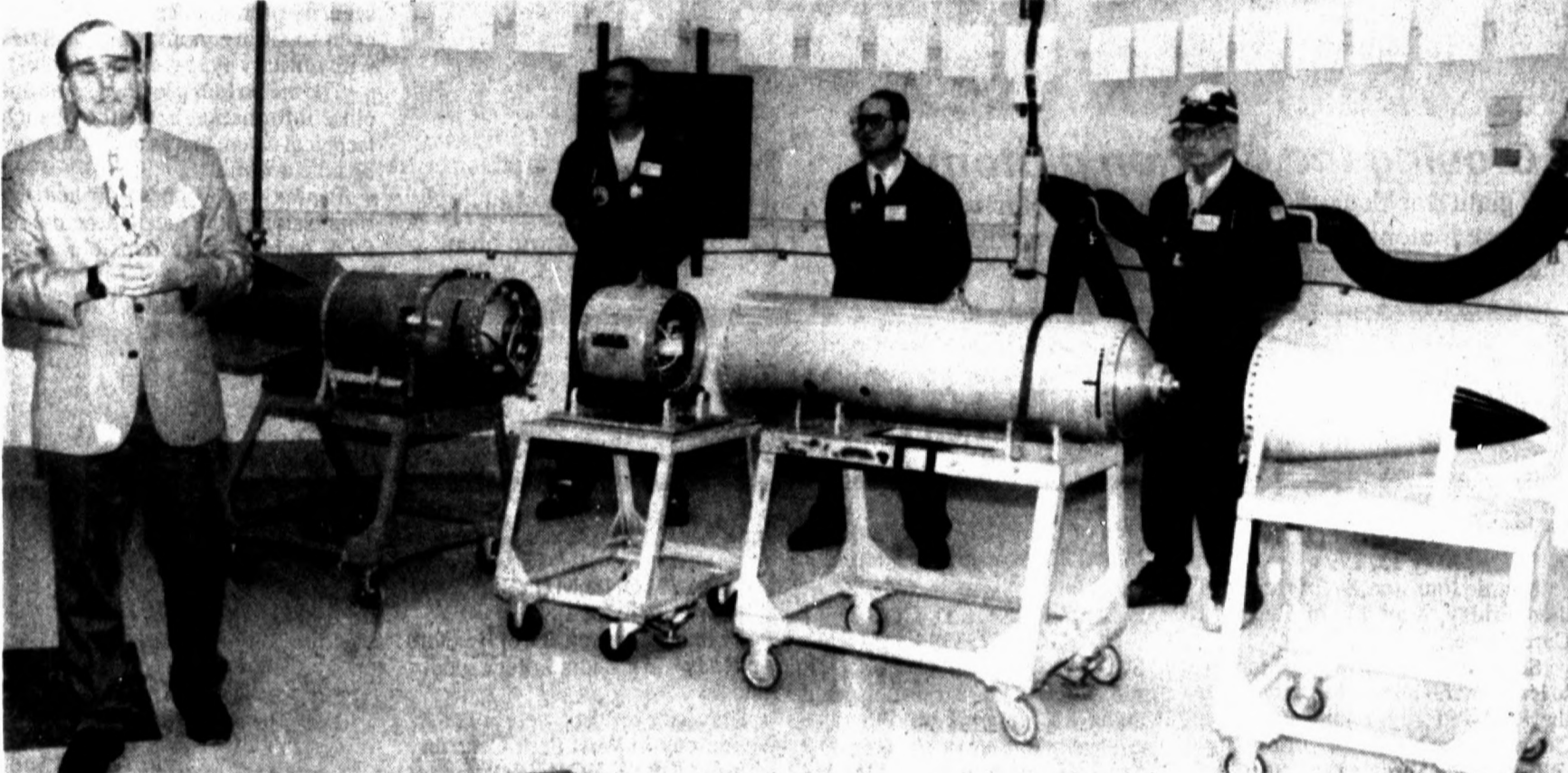
A continuing concern at Pantex is environmental. The primary reason for leasing 6,000 acres from Texas Tech in the 1980s was to provide a buffer between the plant and its neighbors.

An Environmental Impact Statement is being prepared to cover all current and proposed facilities and activities at Pantex.

Involvement of the public is being solicited for the process. Public comment will be accepted until June 30.

Since the U.S. is no longer building nuclear weapons, the mission of Pantex has turned 180 degrees. The future belongs to disassembly of weapons now in the nation's arsenal.

Training of workers in assembly and disassembly is intensive and (See PANTEX, Page 2A)

Pesky pigeons pestering plenty of put-out people

Residents taking steps to rid businesses, churches of birds

Does anybody know where to find a 200-pound owl?

That might solve Hereford's pigeon problem which seems to be the "worst it's ever been," said Joe Artho, manager of Hereford Grain.

"Pigeons are no better than rats," said Artho, now in his 29th year with the grain company.

"We have thousands of them out here. They're real pesky with their droppings and they're destructive."

"We constantly have to replace our windows in the granary. The pigeons can't seem to distinguish between air and glass and fly right through the panes.

"Generally it kills the pigeon but it makes a hole for another one to come right through it."

Artho said he tried to keep the pigeons away with stuffed owls -- a technique Avenue Baptist Church is

trying to use to get rid of its pigeon problem -- but it didn't seem to work.

"Maybe we need a 200-pound owl," he joked.

Artho has the same problem other people in Hereford face when they try to control pigeons on their property: the law is on the side of the birds.

"It's against the law to put out anything to get rid of them," said Artho. "And you can't fire a gun inside the city limits."

"Maybe somebody with a pellet gun could do it, but it would be a fulltime job."

Over at Avenue Baptist Church, 130 N. 25 Mile Ave., the Rev. Larry Cothrin was trying to decide what to do to get rid of the church's pigeon problem.

"They make a mess of everything," said Rev. Cothrin, now in his fifth year as pastor of the 300-member church. "They're really destructive." Church volunteers try to control

the pigeons by cleaning out the nest area. But the pigeons keep coming back.

"This seems to be the worst year ever," declared the minister. "About 50 of them have made a home on the roof of our church."

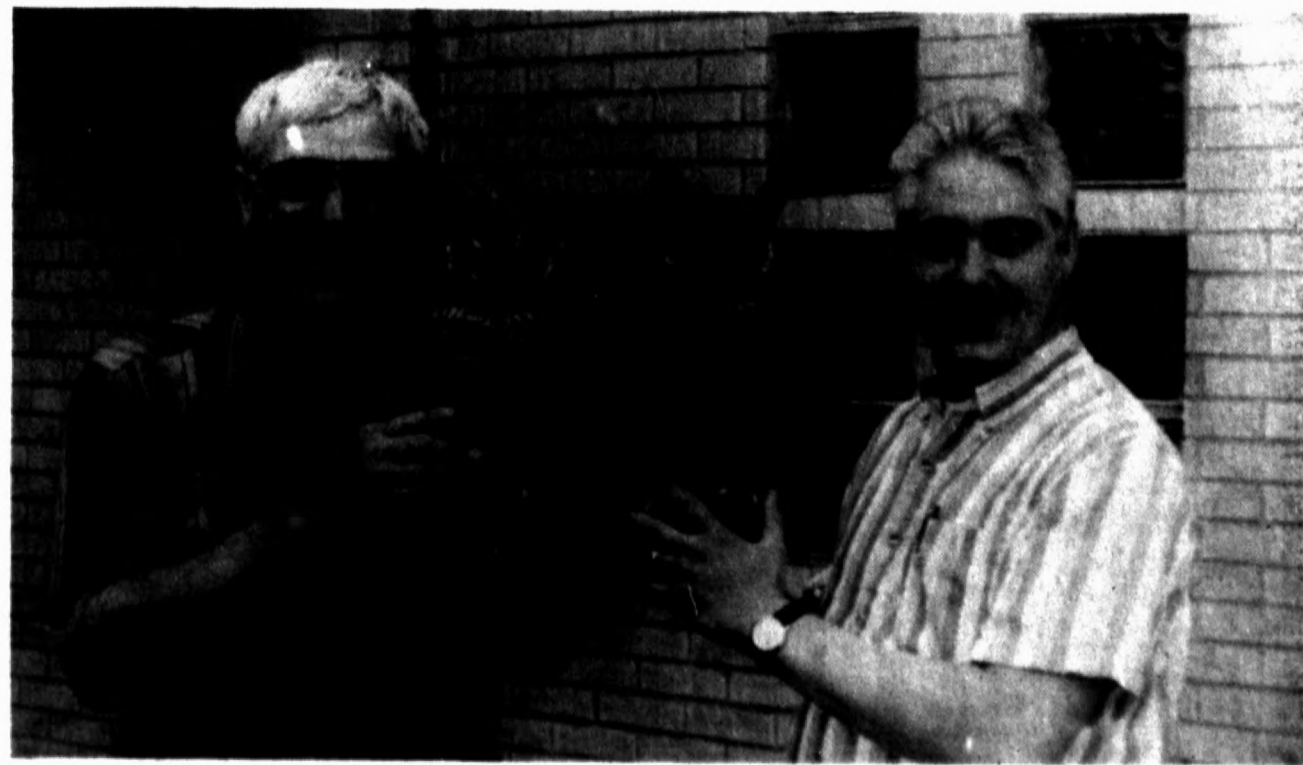
On Thursday, Rev. Cothrin and a church deacon decided to take an extreme counter-measure.

Wanting to get rid of the pigeons, but in a humane way, they placed two plastic owls on the roof where the pigeons roost.

"I've talked to other people who say this works," said Rev. Cothrin. "I sure hope it does because they're really destructive."

Ann Lueb is principal of St. Anthony's School, 120 W. Park, which happens to be a couple of blocks from the Avenue Baptist Church.

"We've got a problem with pigeons," she admitted. "But we just try to ignore them."

extensive. At least 1,000 hours are put into every person involved in either activity.

Safety of employees and visitors is a consideration of DOE and the contractor -- media representatives were issued safety glasses and "toe

caps" which they had to wear while in the bays and cells.

Now, about toe caps -- they are hard plastic devices that fit over the end of a shoe with an elastic band over the heel to hold them in place. Noisy, but necessary, said officials, in case something fell on a foot.

Although a visit to Pantex removed much of the mystique associated with such a facility, the operation still is mind-boggling.

"Gravel Gerties," cells in which components of nuclear weapons are "mated," are circular rooms covered with a layer of gravel several feet

thick. In the event of an accident, the gravel falls into the room to prevent spread of radioactivity.

Likewise, the bays where the final weapons assembly once took place are constructed for maximum safety.

When nuclear devices are sent to Pantex for staging or disassembly, they are placed in bunkers like those containing pit storage.

But, said an official, "Never are weapons and pits placed in the same magazines."

Economic impact of Pantex on the Panhandle and, particularly, the Amarillo area, is not slight -- there are 3,300 employees of DOE, the contractor and other support organizations.

Payroll for this size operation amounts to \$133 million per year. Purchases of certain supplies puts another \$19 into the economy.

Besides the plant itself, an ancillary service is transportation for nuclear devices into or out of Pantex. The courier service operates semi-trailer trucks that are equipped with the latest anti-terrorist technology.

Pantex is not a plant where visitors may waltz in and out, at will, and probably never will be. Armed security personnel are at every turn, even to sitting in armored vehicles with military-type weapons at hand.

The media tour provided some up-close information but some of such technical nature that assimilating may be take a while.

Pantex has a job to do and the impression is that the contractor and DOE want to be responsible to the community.

Texas National Guard investigation positive

AUSTIN - A U.S. Army official says an investigation that cleared Texas Army National Guard officers of most of 180 allegations is "very positive." Eleven of the charges were substantiated by the report.

One allegation was neither refuted nor substantiated, and four were found to be outside the purview of the Army inspector general's office and are being investigated by another federal agency.

The allegations were made to various state and federal agencies, some for alleged improprieties that occurred as long as 20 years ago, according to a statement distributed by the Texas National Guard.

"This is a very positive report,"

said Col. Rodney McNelley, chief of staff for Maj. Gen. Sam C. Turk, the adjutant general of Texas.

Gov. Ann Richards, who appointed Turk to head the Guard, said Friday she was "gratified" by the news that the Army "has concluded that 164 of 180 allegations were not true."

Substantiated allegations included wrongful possession of military pyrotechnic devices, which McNelley said stemmed from someone about 16 years ago inadvertently carrying home a smoke grenade in a rucksack; failure to suspend properly a security clearance; failure to deny access to classified areas; failure to follow security regulations; and failure to take a physical fitness test.

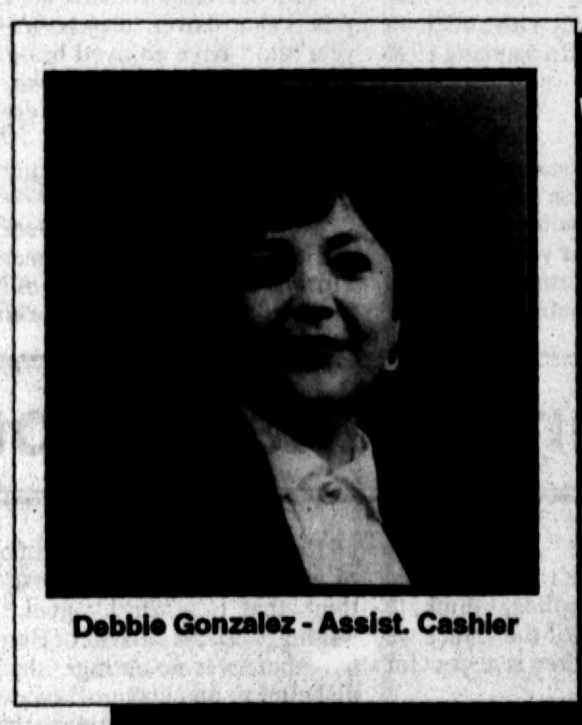

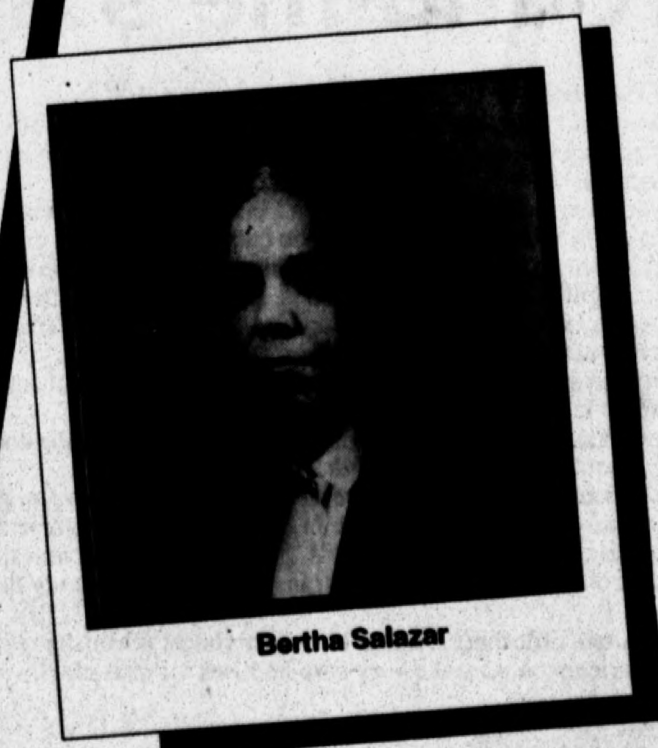

That feller on Tierra Blanca Creek says you work hard and think you're finally on Easy Street...and then you discover there's no parking.

"It is more from carelessness about truth than from intentional lying that there is so much falsehood in the world."--Samuel Johnson

Many people would be happy if they had less weight to throw around.

There has been much talk and many critics of public education recently. We ran across a column on the subject of "crisis in education" that we think needs to be circulated. It was reprinted in a couple of area newspapers with permission of the Dallas Morning News. We don't know the author, Steve Blow, or his background, but we think readers will be interested in his remarks:

A teachers' group foolishly asked me to make a few remarks the other evening. And as I was pondering what I might say, the phrase "crisis in education" kept coming to mind.

It's a given these days that our schools are in a mess.

But as I thought about it, it suddenly dawned on me that we don't really have a "crisis in education".

What we have is a "crisis in parenting."

And that's what I told the group that night--that we're focusing on the wrong crisis. And the amazing thing is, the more I think about it, the more I think I was actually right.

If we as parents were able to send happy, healthy, well-disciplined, well-supervised children to school, there would be no "crisis in education."

I'm not saying schools are perfect. But maybe it's time we quit dumping everything on education and got real honest with each other about the job we're doing as parents.

Responsible parenthood
Maybe we ought to be holding each other to a little higher standard of responsible parenthood.

To that end, I'll start by offering a few things I'd like to see parents doing--some big, some small. And mind you, I'm not holding myself out as an expert. I've got two kids ready to prove otherwise at any moment.

But I am willing to crawl up on the soapbox first to exhort us on. You be thinking about the things you want to say.

*No R-rated movies: It's pitiful, but Hollywood is more morally responsible than we are. They put "R" ratings on movies to plainly say they're not fit for kids, and then we go and take our kids to the movies or

let them rent videos or watch on cable. Let's agree. No R-rated movies for kids. They rot young minds.

*Midnight curfew: The city council shouldn't have to tell us when our kids need to be home. We should be doing it. There's an old saying: "Nothing good happens after midnight." If we stick together, we

But most of all, be blunt. The schools can't cover for us much longer. can make this work--teenagers home by midnight.

*Go to church: Yeah, I know, it can be boring and a lot of hypocrites are there and it's hard to get up on Sunday morning and it's tough to find a good church. Do it anyway. Your kids need it. You need it. You might even like it.

*Turn off the TV: Get up from your chair, go outside with your child. Find something to do. Throw a ball. Pull weeds. Make paper airplanes. Race to the corner. Talk. It's not easy.

*Discipline well: Don't yell. Don't scream. Don't slap. Don't punch. Set rules. Set punishments. Stick to them. Stay calm. It's not easy. It's hard.

Bosnian debate yielded foreign policy complaints

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate attempt to force President Clinton's hand on Bosnia ended up as a forum for wider complaints about his foreign policy, although the bipartisan sponsors insisted that was not their intent.

The words thrown around by Republicans - "shambles," "abject," "faithless," "cynical" - were only slightly more extreme than warnings from some Democrats who called Clinton's policy toward Bosnia "anemic" and said he needed to show more leadership than he has thus far.

Foreign policy was almost a taboo topic during a presidential campaign fixated on the home front, but no more. The spotty Clinton track record is giving Republicans an effective line of attack - and a chance to lay out alternatives even some Democrats find appealing.

The Senate vote Thursday directing Clinton to defy a U.N. embargo and ship arms to the besieged Bosnian Muslims came as a Senate committee was dissecting another troubling episode, the October firefight in downtown Mogadishu, Somalia, that left 18 Americans dead.

Meanwhile, there is growing restiveness over Clinton's policies toward Haiti and China - tensions the GOP is highlighting in interviews, briefings and TV shows as well as in Congress.

The deft-the-U.N. amendment was sponsored by Senate Republican leader Bob Dole of Kansas, a potential presidential rival, and Sen. Joseph Lieberman of Connecticut, a Clinton associate from the centrist Democratic Leadership Council.

Lieberman maintained the measure would "strengthen Clinton's hand." But other Democrats and Republicans said it was only necessary because Clinton has not moved to muster allied backing for arming the Bosnian Muslims.

Clinton has said he doesn't want to arm the Bosnian Muslims unless

the European allies agree.

"He makes these statements, you know, about every other week about some foreign policy area and then backs off," Dole said last weekend on CNN. "It's sort of a yo-yo policy."

Dole diverges from Clinton on the Bosnia arms embargo and also on Haiti, where he supports eased rather than tighter economic sanctions. He believes Clinton should stop arguing with China over human rights, renew the country's favorable trade status and demand its cooperation in preventing a nuclear North Korea.

The minority leader's assertiveness reflects a growing Republican focus on foreign policy and credibility, a creative linkage of Clinton's twin Achilles' heels.

The theme gathered steam with Richard Nixon's death and the inevitable review of his substantial achievements abroad. Clinton's record was already suffering by comparison when Nixon himself, in a book published just after he died, lectured the current administration that "America must lead."

Just after his funeral, Clinton's foreign policy was examined on "Rising Tide," the weekly cable TV show produced by the Republican Party.

"Bill Clinton has not once explained to the American people what America stands for and what role it should play" in the post-Cold War world, Richard Burt, a former assistant secretary of state, charged on the April 28 program.

Several days later, during a foreign-policy forum on CNN, Clinton tried to lay out "a road map that charts where we're trying to go." But he seemed at a loss at times.

Last Monday, in his weekly briefing, national Republican chairman Haley Barbour contended that "it is nearly impossible to find anyone who supports Clinton's foreign policy."

One point made recently by a number of Republicans, among them Henry Kissinger at Nixon's funeral, is that presidents must disregard

popular opinion when formulating foreign policy. That's a tall order for a first-term president with a difficult domestic agenda and a daunting 1996 re-election fight.

But polls show the most clear-cut sentiment about Clinton's foreign policy now is that people believe he doesn't have one - and that could be more damaging in the end than a controversial but forceful approach.

May 6

El Paso Herald-Post on Kevorkian acquittal:

The recent acquittal of Dr. Jack Kevorkian on charges of violating Michigan's assisted suicide ban was hardly a shining moment for the jury system.

Kevorkian had deliberately broken a law that was specifically passed for the purpose of blocking his public campaign for legal euthanasia.

Yet, despite this fact, the jury of nine women and three men found him "not guilty," for various reasons, some of them confused. ...

There is no doubt that this messy verdict reflects real ambivalence in society about suicide in instances of terrible suffering. ...

Yet even such tragic cases ... do not justify the dangers of authorizing doctors to kill.

Kevorkian himself, with his badly utilitarian view of the doomed or dying, should be warning enough.

At various times in his career, he advocated making death-row prisoners permanently unconscious for use in medical experiments; and setting up suicide clinics, equipped with his "self-execution machines," where doctors could harvest organs for transplant from the newly deceased.

... In matters little that "Dr. Death" won his latest skirmish in Michigan, but Americans must make very sure he loses his crusade.

Austin American-Statesman on public hearings for pollution permits:

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock has posed an interesting challenge to the Senate Natural Resources Committee: To propose legislation that would eliminate unnecessary costs and delays in issuing state pollution permits while strengthening citizen involvement in the process.

That might be doable, but who decides what is, and is not, "unnecessary" expense and delay? Industry may see it one way, protesters another.

Industry representatives complain that they are "ambushed" by professional protesters in proceedings before the committee. And they say that the process takes too long because of bureaucratic turf battles and forced delays by the protesters.

But those who oppose pollution permits say the industry has the money, and the upper hand. Even when the industry loses, it can come back for another try, exhausting the limited resources of residents and others opposed to the pollution permits.

If a balance of participation by both sides is possible, that would be ideal. But in the real world, money all too frequently gets government's ear.

... Given the many ways in which a government bureaucracy, influenced by highly paid lobbyists, can impinge on the public's involvement in decision-making, the Senate Natural Resources Committee will have to tread carefully to avoid being accused of subverting public participation in the name of efficiency and economy.

Democracy is frequently necessary not the most efficient and economical form of government. But it is the best. When the choice is between efficiency and public participation in the governmental process, the decision should always favor public participation.

Eight steps to take for perfect reunion

As anyone who has tried planning a family reunion can tell you, they can be the best of times...or they can be a planning nightmare.

More often than not, one person, saddled with virtually all of the planning, preparation and hosting, winds up ready for a reunion with the Sandman. As America continues to age in record numbers, reunion occasions—including 50th wedding anniversaries and 75th birthdays—will abound. Take heart—with a little advance planning and organization, your family reunion can be the event of a lifetime.

Here are a few tips to keep in mind:

The next meeting will be held Sept. 2.

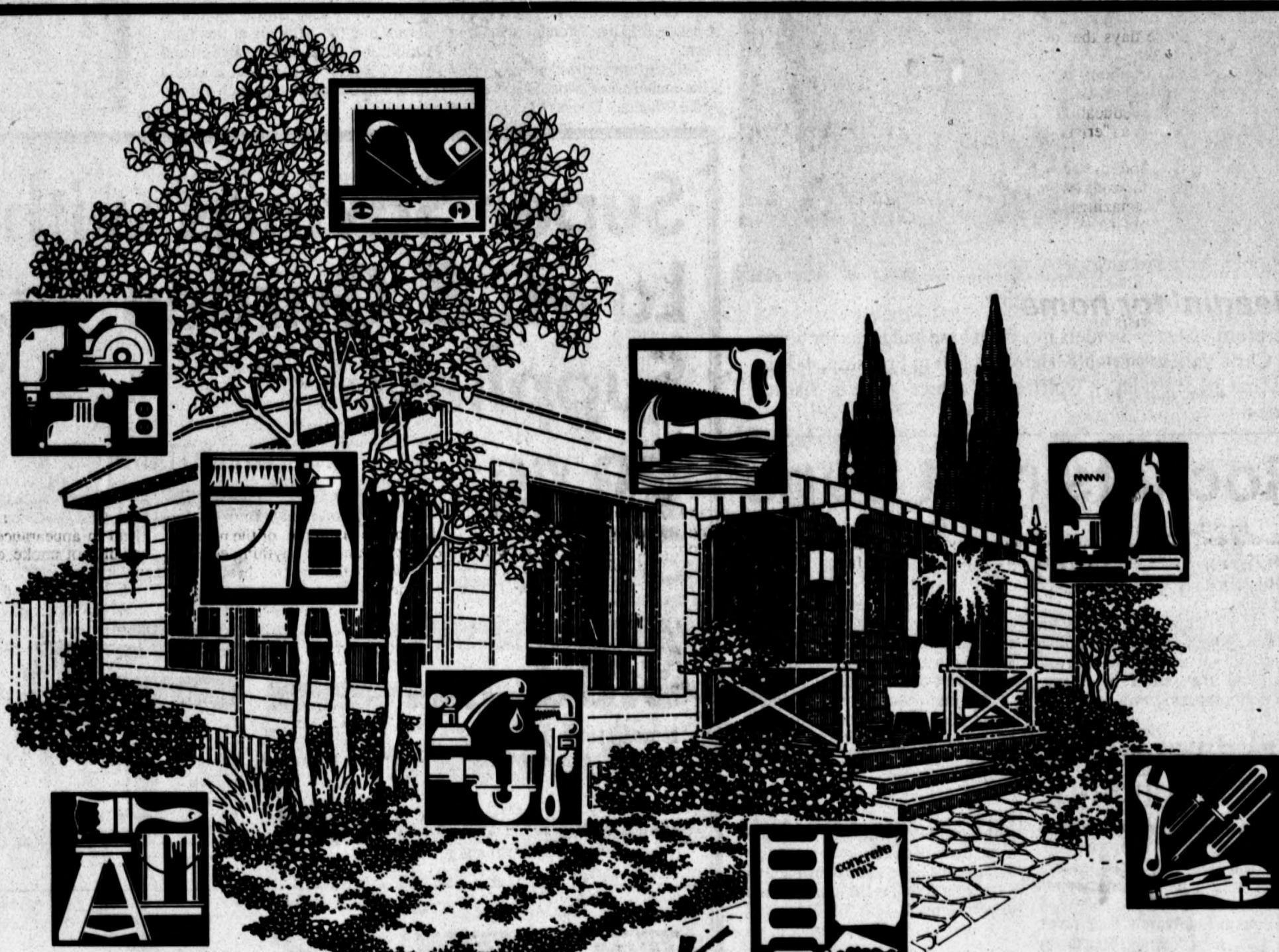

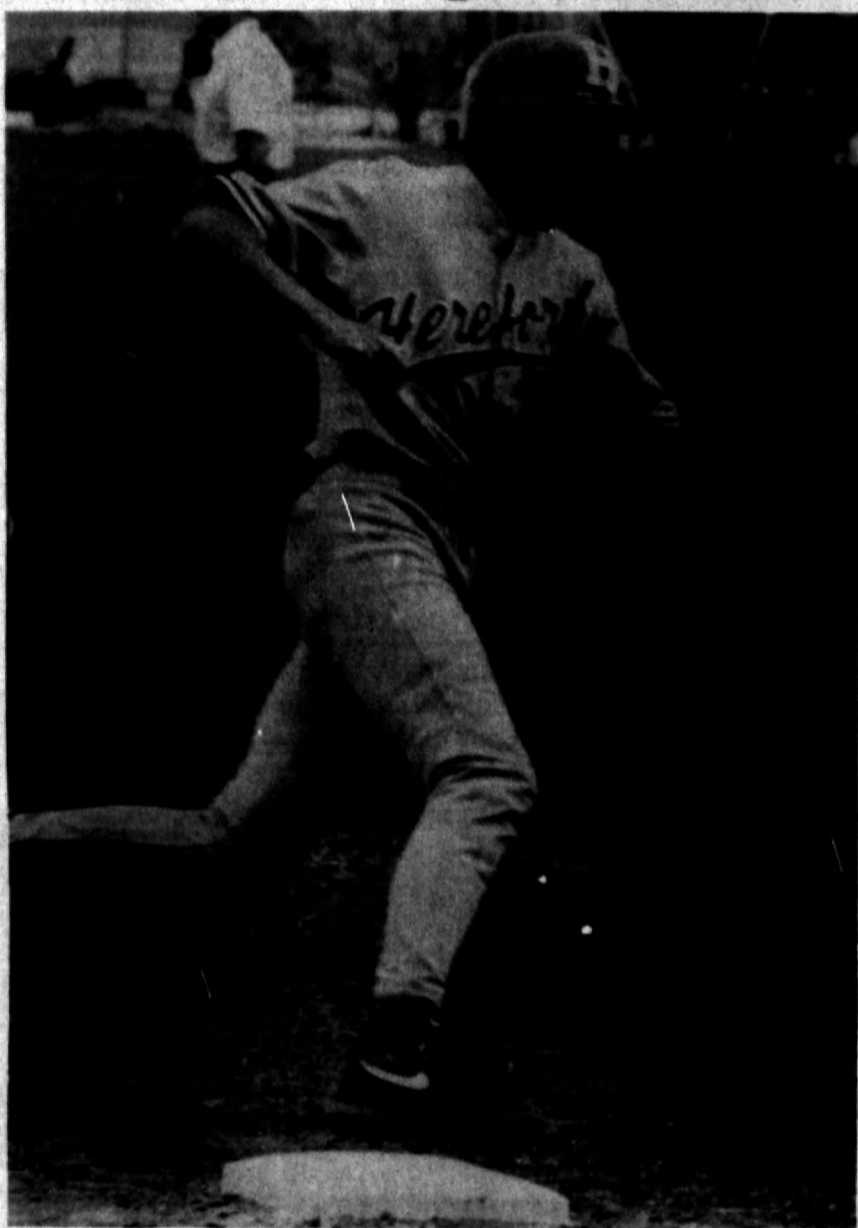

The Hereford baseball team proved it could play in the playoffs Friday in Wolforth. After Friday, the question was: Can the Herd play in the second round of the playoffs?

Frenship, a team that went all the way to the state finals last year, broke a tie with two runs in the bottom of the sixth inning, and a Herd rally fell short in the seventh as Frenship took a 4-3 win in the first game of a three-game bi-district series.

The second game--and third game if necessary--was to be played Saturday at Whiteface Field in Hereford.

The Herd, in its first playoffs in five years, played near-flawless ball alongside the more-seasoned Tigers. Herd coach J.J. Villarreal wasn't

looking for a moral victory, though. "I knew all along we could play with them," he said. "You don't feel good when you don't win. I don't care if it was 4-3."

Neither pitcher gave the other side much to hit and let their defenses do most of the work in complete game performances. Hereford's Ray Hastings allowed seven hits and three walks, while Frenship's James Gomez gave up six hits and two walks. Each struck out only one batter.

Hastings retired one over the minimum through three innings with the help of a double play and catcher Scott Ahola' throwing out a base-stealer, but Frenship got to him in the fourth to start the scoring.

Shane Stewart led off the bottom of the fourth with a single, and

Donnie Hart followed with a double into the left field gap, plating Stewart. After an out, Buddy Drake put a double in the same place, scoring Hart. Frenship led 2-0.

"I think when you don't get ahead in the count, hitters can sit back (and wait for a good pitch)," Villarreal said. "For the most part, Ray did a fantastic job."

In the bottom of the fifth, Chad Fox singled and stole second, but Hastings struck out the Frenship leadoff hitter, and when the next batter grounded to short, first baseman Andrew Tijerina came off the bag to save a bad throw and tag the runner for the third out.

Hereford got on the scoreboard in the sixth, tying the game. With one out, Stacey Sanders singled--the second hit of the game for the Herd's No. 9 hitter--and stole second. Chris Vallejo followed with a double down the left field line, scoring Sanders. Gomez got his strikeout for the second out, but then walked Tijerina and threw two wild pitches, the second of which allowed Vallejo to score the tying run.

"You have to compliment a guy like Stacey Sanders," Villarreal said. "He gave us the spark that tied the game. Against their No. 1 pitcher, with a 1.66 ERA, he (Sanders) pulls

Small towns take risks in recruiting physicians

FLOYDADA, Texas (AP) - Dandelions dot the shaggy lawn that frames Caprock Hospital and its deserted parking lots these days. Three years ago, Floydada's under-used and debt-laden facility became a statistic: one of 53 rural Texas hospitals to close from 1984 to October 1992. The Caprock Hospital District, however, refused to give up. The district - which covers three-fourths of Floyd County, about 40 miles northeast of Lubbock - continued levying taxes. Hospital board members hired an administrator and spent roughly \$1 million on new lab equipment and other renovations. Then, finally, after two doctors changed their minds about moving to

a town billed as "Pumpkin Capital, U.S.A.," Caprock officials last October signed a Houston obstetrician-gynecologist as chief of staff. But the hospital never reopened. And now not one doctor practices in Floydada. Caprock board members fired Dr. Tommy Swate one month into his job. Swate responded with a lawsuit alleging, among other things, that officials opposed him because he used to perform abortions.

"I walked into a hornet's nest," Swate told the Plainview Daily Herald this year. "If I would have known it would be like this, I would never have come." Floydada residents feel frustrated and disappointed by what has become

an extreme example of physician recruitment gone sour. "It's like anything else: You just have to accept that some of the time you fail, and that's not the end of the world," said Mayor Hulon Carthel. "We've just got to keep plugging, keep trying." Of course, medical matchmaking many times ends happily for both the doctor and the hospital.

But communities can lose morale and money when they go to great lengths recruiting a doctor who doesn't stick around long, experts say. "It's about a 50-50 proposition," said Diane Gillit, director of the South Plains Community Action Association of Levelland. "Often it doesn't work out because the community doesn't do an honest and objective needs assessment beforehand."

A doctor's departure causes small-town pharmacists to lose business, and others - like 17 employees at the Floydada hospital - to lose their jobs. "Economically, it's disastrous," said Jim Blum, administrator of Eldorado's Schleicher County Medical Center. "Besides that, where do the people go for health care? When you do finally recruit a new doctor, you have to regain their confidence."

Blum helps small hospitals around San Angelo recruit doctors. The average search takes more than a year, he said.

The Center for Rural Health Initiatives counts 22 Texas counties without a licensed primary care physician. In 57 other counties, there's no more than one doctor per 3,200 residents.

Experts say hospital officials and their prospective doctors sometimes aren't realistic about the job or honest about what they want.

"As in all things, sometimes the more desperate you are, the less wise choices you make," said Sara Breuer, information specialist for the Austin-based initiatives center.

"It's not so often that the blame lies with one person or another. It's just that they're not matched up as well as they could be," Ms. Breuer said.

Doctors can quickly become unhappy in a small town for a variety of reasons. Experts describe factors including burnout, social isolation and lack of contact with medical peers.

Hospital board members in Floydada

say they became unhappy with Swate when he confronted an official from Lubbock's St. Mary's Hospital, which is affiliated with Caprock.

A letter from the board accuses Swate of "loud and profane language and physical contact" in the Dec. 1 dispute. He was fired Dec. 7 for violating terms of his two-year, \$180,000 annual contract.

Swate, 49, declined to be interviewed by The Associated Press.

"Defendants willfully and intentionally caused this situation without justifiable excuse or privilege, engaged in deliberate misrepresentations and violated every standard of fair play," according to his lawsuit, which alleges Swate was fired illegally.

The lawsuit requests unspecified damages and an order forcing the district to allow him back into the hospital clinic.

Swate, who is on probation with the Texas Board of Medical Examiners, last August signed a contract with Panola General Hospital in Carthage, about 40 miles southeast of Longview.

His privileges at Panola were suspended in October, the same month he signed his Floydada contract.

"It just didn't appear that it was going to work out for either one of us," said Panola administrator Gary Hudson,

who declined to elaborate.

Meanwhile, taxpayers in the Caprock Hospital district continue paying 42 cents per \$100 property valuation to support a facility that remains closed.

"They would rather throw away \$1 million than have me work at the hospital," Swate told the Plainview paper.

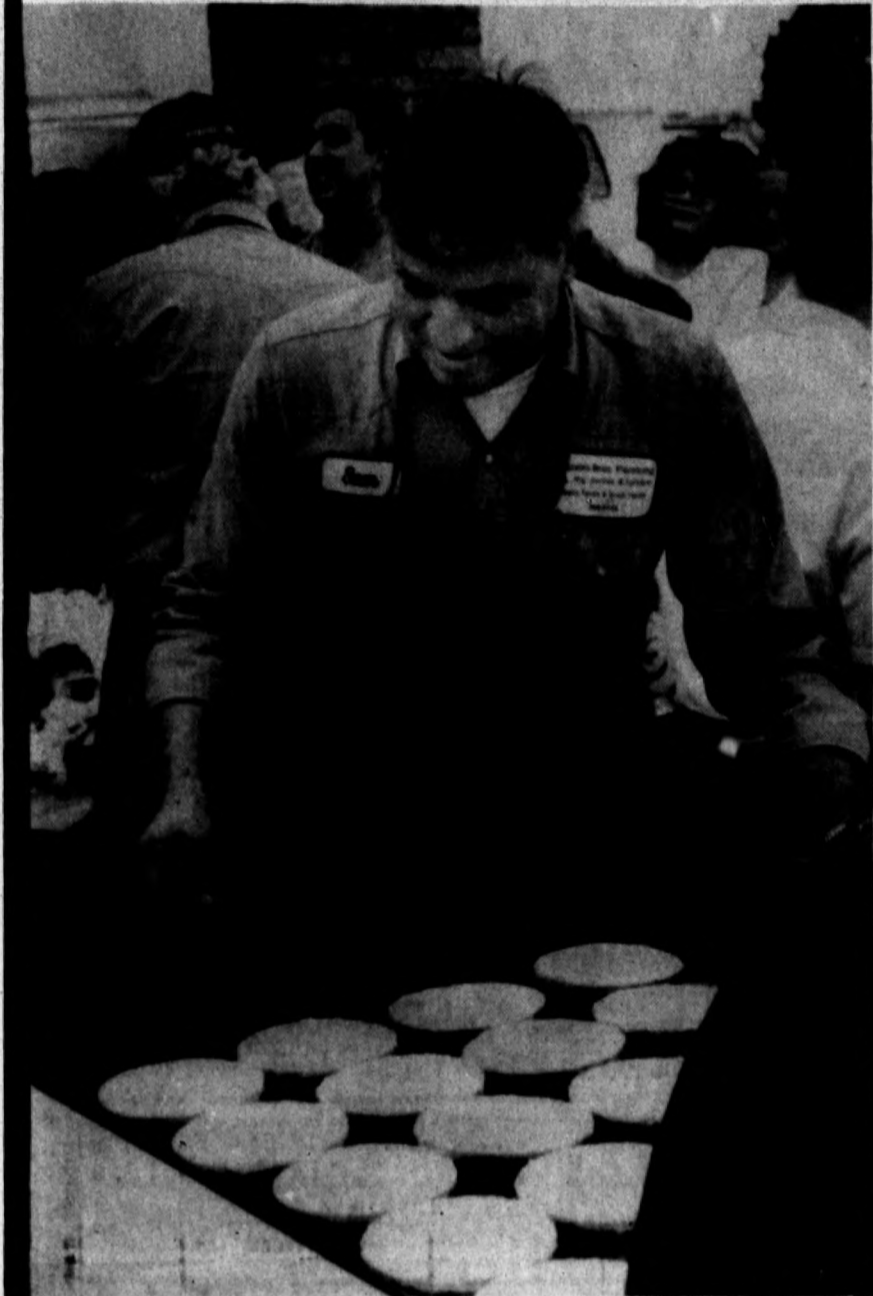
And in Dimmitt, about 20 miles south of Hereford, hospital officials reached a \$45,000 settlement after Dr. Joe Morrow resigned less than a month

into his two-year contract.

Plains Memorial Hospital administrator Steve Goode acknowledged the community's sense that Morrow possibly wasn't checked out before he was hired in December.

"They don't know how thoroughly he was checked out," Goode insists. "Sometimes you can check someone out thoroughly, and their problems just don't come to the surface."

"The only lesson I can think of is sometimes things just don't work out."

Teflon discoverer dies

WILMINGTON, Del. (AP) - Roy J. Plunkett, a DuPont Co. chemist credited with discovering Teflon, has died at the age of 83, the company said Friday.

Plunkett died Thursday at his home in Corpus Christi, Texas after a short illness, the company said Friday.

Teflon, the trade name for the polytetrafluoroethylene resin, is most commonly known as a non-stick coating for frying pans and other cooking surfaces, but also has a wide variety of industrial applications.

Plunkett, a native of New Carlisle, Ohio, was working as a research chemist at DuPont's Jackson

Laboratory in Deepwater, N.J., in 1938 when he discovered the material.

He was investigating a failed experiment involving refrigeration gases when he discovered a white, waxy substance that proved to be inert to virtually all chemicals and the most slippery material known, DuPont said.

"Roy's contribution to science, industry and society is virtually impossible to calculate or attach a value to," said James M. Keegan, an executive in DuPont's fluoropolymers division.

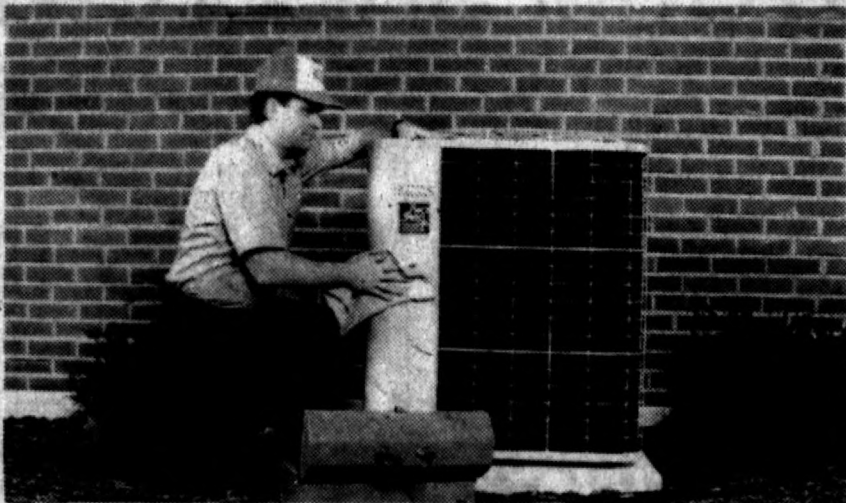

Prosecutors said the director had fired Shakur six months earlier because of his violent temper.

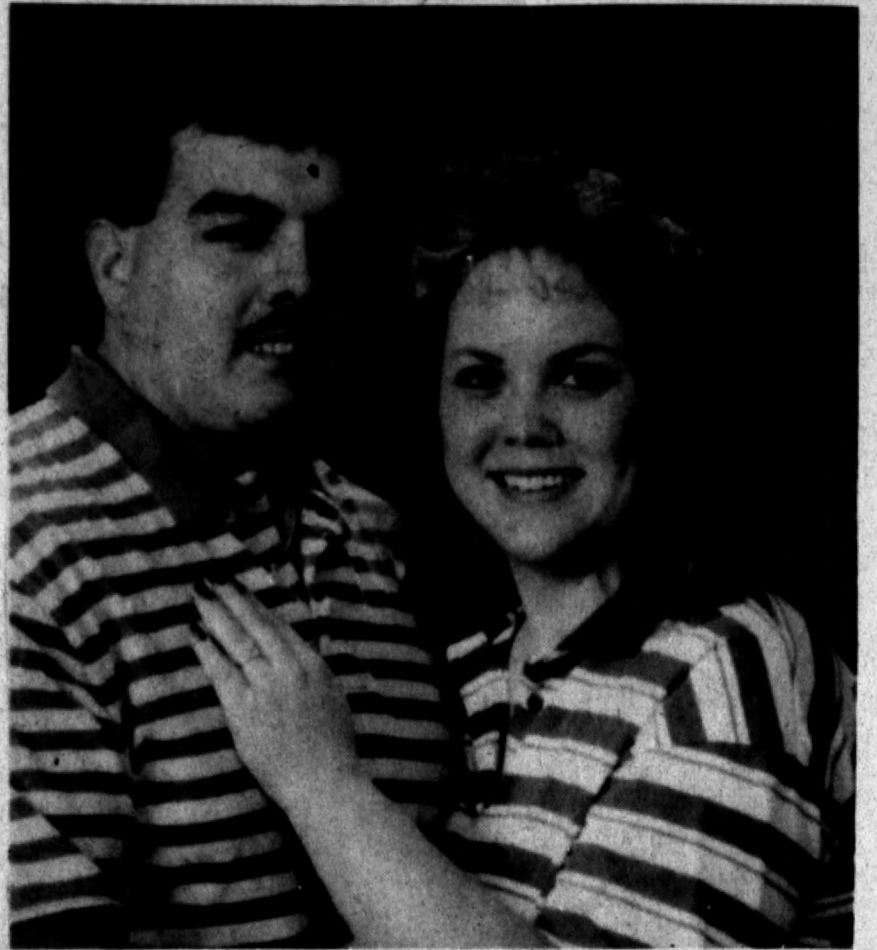
Couple to marry

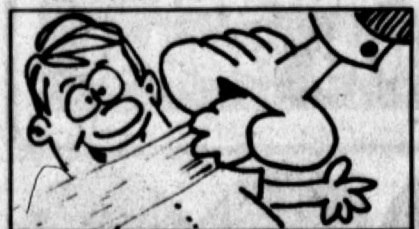

SIGHT VS. VISION

Sight refers to visual acuity, the ability to see objects and letters clearly. Most commonly, this is tested with an eye chart and is graded 20/20, 20/40 or other appropriate number.

What 20/20 means is that the person tested can see and distinguish letters at 20 feet that most normal average eyes see at that distance. The person with 20/40 eyesight can only distinguish at 20 feet the letters that most normal average eyes can see at 40 feet. Conversely, someone with 20/15 can see at 20 feet what the average eye can see only at 15 feet. Thus, 20/40 is poorer-than-average acuity; 20/15 is better-than-average.

Vision, however, is the recognition, comprehension or perception of what the individual sees. For example, when looking at a strange object for the first time, we do not comprehend or "visualize" what it is. The second time we see it, we will recognize it. For some people, perception problems may translate into reading problems.

IT'S EASIER TO SUCCEED

I received a new book in the mail recently. Since I love books, particularly those that offer a promise of help, I couldn't wait to read this one. Its title proclaimed, "It's Easier to Succeed than to Fail."

What kind of book would make that promise in the title? Can it be easier to succeed than fail? I wanted to read the rest of this story, so I devoured the entire book the same day I picked it up at the post office.

"It's Easier to Succeed than to Fail" was written by Truett Cathy, founder of the Chick-fil-A Company. Cathy is known in the fast food industry as a man of faith and principle. The stores in his nearly 400 unit chain are open every day of the week, except Sunday. That is part of the story.

This book is an easy read. If you enjoy reading about ordinary folks who become successful in business, and if you really want to succeed, pick up a copy and invest a couple of hours of your time. If you're not so easily convinced, I'll share some of the highlights here. **How To Succeed**

Cathy includes the following exchange in the introduction of the book: A highly successful person was asked, "How did you become successful?" He replied, "By making the right decisions." "How did you know which decisions to make?" was the next question. "By the experiences I've had." "How did you gain experience?" "By making bad decisions," he responded.

Over the years, I've observed the lives of many very successful people. They are not lucky, they are not perfect, and most will readily admit to making many mistakes. The difference I've found in the successes is that they always learn from their mistakes.

The winners learn from failure, grow because of disappointments and most of all stay focused on success. They eventually win because they put into action what they learn.

Cathy boils his more than 40 years of business success into three key ingredients:

- 1) You have to *want* to succeed and you must be willing to make sacrifices along the way.
- 2) You have to develop *know-how*. Cathy supports formal education as an important part of this process.
- 3) Finally, he says, you have to *do it*. When you have learned your

lessons, you have to put what you've learned into action.

Other Success Thoughts

Here are some other success tips from Cathy's book:

- To succeed try this suggestion for success: Save 10 percent, give 10 percent, work 10 percent harder.
 - Associate yourselves only with those people you can be proud of whether they work for you or you work for them.
 - Learn to love your work, and you'll never have to *work* again.
 - Winners concentrate on winning. Losers concentrate on getting by.
 - Ideas come from God. They are pleasant and exciting, but they won't keep. They have to be acted on.
 - We make a living by what we get...But we make a life by what we give.
 - It's always easier to dismiss a person than to train him. No great leader ever built a reputation on firing people.
 - We never realize our greatest potential until we perform at our very best.
- Perhaps the most important theme you'll find woven throughout the book is this one: We glorify God in our successes rather than our failures. My hope for each of you who read this column is that this will be a glorious year of success for you and your business.

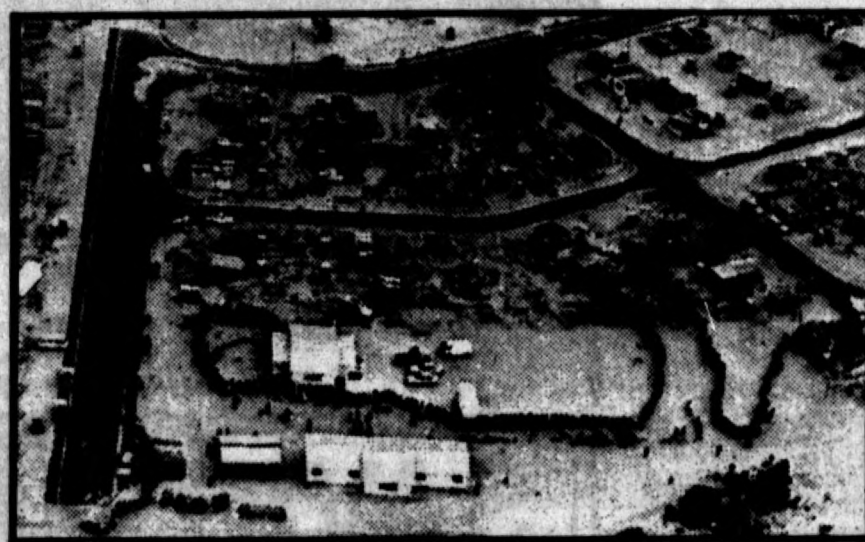

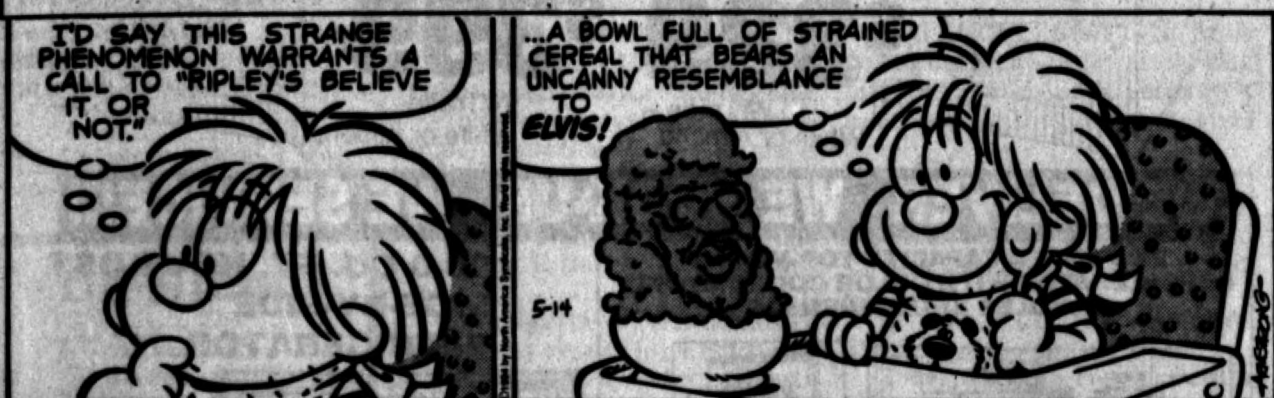

It is the middle of May, parents are you ready for the end of school? I know those of you with graduating seniors are filled with mixed emotions, and if things would slow down just a little you could work through those feelings a little better. For parents with children 4 years old and up you may be looking for activities to keep your children from becoming so bored during the summer months. Some new titles that you may want to choose from this week are: Uncommon Knowledge by Judy

Lewis, Mother's Day by Patricia MacDonald, Jack's Life: A Biography of Jack Nicholson by Patrick McGilligan and The New Dare To Discipline by Dr. James Dobson. Uncommon Knowledge by Judy Lewis is the story of "Hollywood's best-kept secret," the daughter of Clark Gable and Loretta Young. While because Gable was married, Young's Catholic beliefs and Hollywood's strict moral code their relationship could not be. Loretta, on the brink of megastardom, was terrified that their romance would ruin both their careers so she elected to keep the birth of Judy Lewis secret. Later Loretta "adopted" Judy from the orphanage where she had been placed as an infant. While growing up Judy met Mr. Gable, but was never told that he was her father. It wasn't until Judy married she learned of the rumors that had been whispered in Hollywood for years, confronted her mother and gained the admission that has left a "tattered relationship" between mother and daughter.

Mother's Day by Patricia MacDonald is placed in the "safe, quiet town" of Bayland, Massachusetts. Karen and Greg Newhall were high school sweethearts and have had an open and trusting marriage for years. Having lived in Bayland all their lives Karen and Greg feel it is the perfect place to raise their adopted daughter Jenny. The year that Jenny turns twelve everything seems to change, the remains of a young girl are found in the nature preserve filling the community with fear. When Jenny fails to show up for the traditional Newhall Mother's Day lunch Karen

and Greg are frantic until Jenny arrives home safe and sound. Jenny's lack of concern angers her parents. Later that same day the Newhall's are shocked by the arrival of Linda Emery, Jenny's birth mother. Jenny receives the stranger with open arms and the tension between Jenny and her adoptive parents grows. When Linda is found viciously murdered only days later, Greg becomes the prime suspect not only in this murder, but in a series of murders. Could he have committed such a brutal act?

Jack's Life: A Biography of Jack Nicholson by Patrick McGilligan gives a unique look at Jack Nicholson in a life story where nicknames, professional names, adoptive names and fake names keep the family tree a mystery. "Mud", Jack's nickname for Ethel May Rhoades Nicholson, is short for "Mudder, or Mother." In reality Ethel May was Jack's grandmother, the family matriarch and keeper of all family secrets. Ethel May was a dressmaker who also created fancy pillows and ornate lampshades and demonstrated a flair for oil painting. Ethel May was also the first in her community to buy a "new-fangled hair dressing machine," a hot permanent wave machine, and listed herself in the city directory as a beautician. Jack, surrounded by female relatives who doted on him, learned to entertain by being glib and charming. As a boy Jack "had a temper that rocked the house like an earthquake" says his sister Lorraine. "Jack could get so mad he could hardly talk," so the scenes in "Five Easy Pieces" and "Carnal Knowledge" were like flashbacks to me. Jack's Life is informative and entertaining.

In The New Dare to Discipline Dr. James Dodson offers far more than mere advice about raising boy and girls. He has prepared a game plan that will help parents understand their kids and know how to handle everyday challenges as they arise.

intellectual attainment.

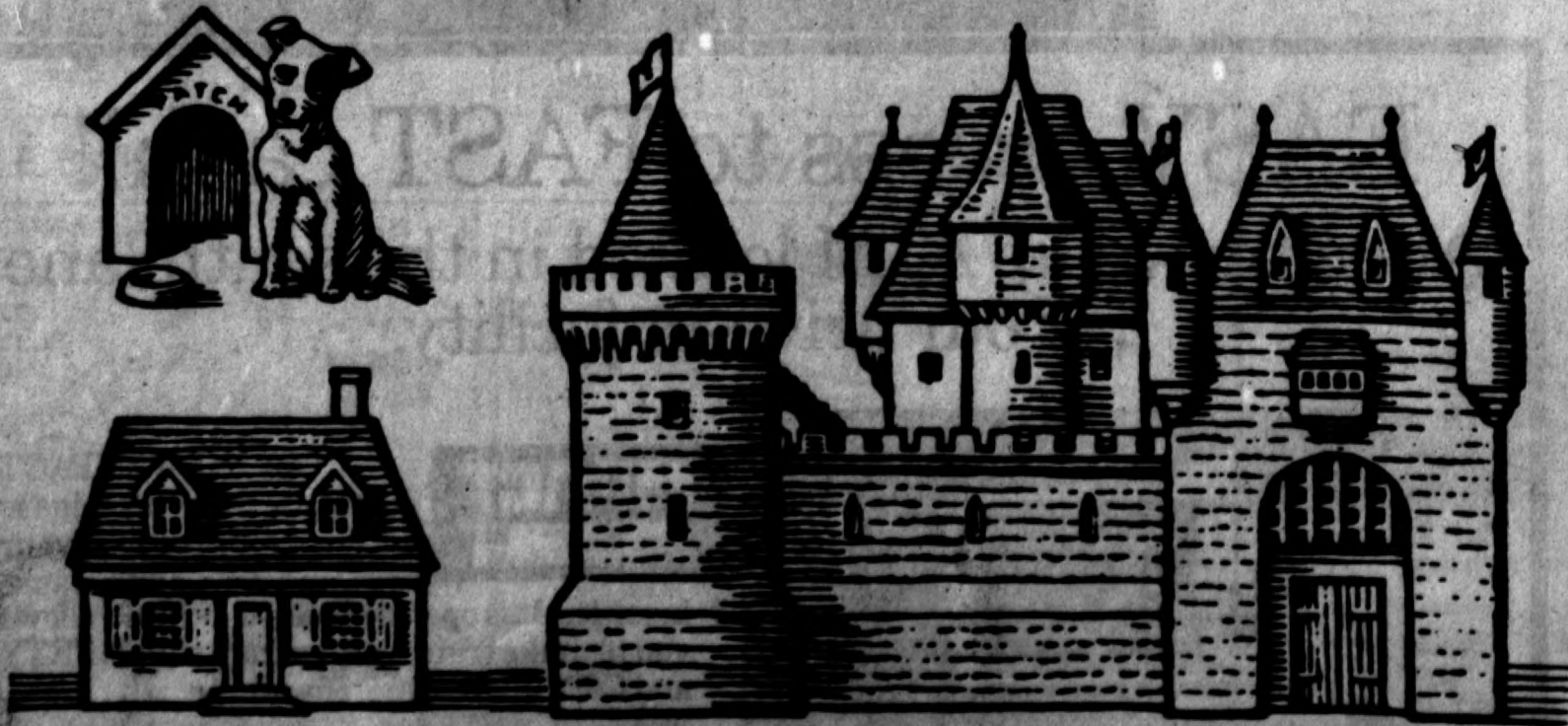

MEDICATIONS IN OLDER
ADULTS PART II

Wellness may mean managing medication for the older adults. Doctors often do not know what is NORMAL for the older person. Overmedication as well as inaccurate diagnosis may be keeping some older people in a frail and forgetful state.

The doctor's reaction to an older person not feeling well is most often to prescribe drugs. But older people may already be taking some drugs, which make them more likely to develop an adverse reaction. This causes a domino effect of further complications which are often misdiagnosed and complicated with further drug prescriptions. For instance, drugs given for one purpose can lead to depression which, in an older person, may be diagnosed as a dementia, such as Alzheimer's disease, and the same misunderstanding can mistake delirium, or confusion for dementia.

The perception of aging as an inevitable decline from age 30 to 90 is unfounded. In healthy older people, the heart and kidney functions are not significantly different from those in younger people; their immune system just has reduced capacity to react to the challenge of disease, which causes some of the signs and symptoms of disease to be expressed differently in the older adult. Thus, it is essential that enough test, and the right test are done to diagnose health problems of the older adult.

How does the body "HANDLE" the distributed drugs? For many drugs, the liver acts as a "way station" in which medications are processed and changed before making their way through the bloodstream to the rest of the body. With aging, liver metabolism changes for the following reasons:

- *Liver blood flow decreases with age; less blood flow to the liver means less drug is carried to the liver for processing.

- *Liver size decreases; decreased size means a decrease in the ability to process drugs.

- *One additional fact--the liver changes drugs by using the series of reactions that involve natural substances called enzymes, which are found in the liver. As individuals age, the speed of these reactions slows.

How does the body EXCRETE/ELIMINATE some of the drugs in the body? The kidneys excrete or eliminate from the body most of the drugs that we take by mouth. So, changes in the kidneys that occur with aging affect elimination or excretion of drugs in the following way:

- *Blood flow to the kidneys decreases with age. Like the liver, decreased blood flow to the kidneys reduces the ability of the kidneys to excrete drugs. Thus, in older person, drugs sometimes accumulate in the body which can result in an adverse drug reaction.

- *Educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to all citizens without regard to race, color, sex, disability, religion, age or national origin.

Symposium to consider impact of playa basins

LUBBOCK - A three-day symposium on playa basins will begin Wednesday at the University Center, at Texas Tech University in Lubbock. Keynote speaker for the event will be State Senator Teel Bivins of Amarillo, at the opening session.

State Senator John Montfort of Lubbock will address a noon luncheon Wednesday and State Rep. David Counts of Knox City will be the luncheon speaker Thursday.

Among topics for discussion will be estimates of recharge to the Ogallala Aquifer through playa basins.

Recent artificial recharge experiments as well as the Bureau of Economic Geology's study of playa basins near the Pantex plant will be reviewed.

Researchers will talk about effects of confined animal waste storage in playa basins, as well as potential agricultural chemical runoff, which can be collected in basins.

Concluding the symposium will be a bus tour Friday to look at playas being used for wildlife, urban runoff storage, confined animal waste storage, agricultural crop production and holding reservoir for rainfall runoff to be used for irrigation.

Sponsors of the symposium are Texas Cattle Feeders Association,

Texas Department of Agriculture, Texas Senate natural resources committee/ag subcommittee, USDA Soil Conservation Service, Brazos River Authority, High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, Bureau of Economic Geology/UT, Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University.

1994 corn acreage to be higher

WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S. corn producers intend to plant 78.6 million acres of corn for all purposes, up 7 percent from last year but 1 percent below 1992, according to the Agriculture Department.

The National Agricultural Statistics Service also estimated that soybean plantings will cover 61.1 million acres this year, up 3 percent from 1993.

Cotton plantings for 1994 are expected to total 13.8 million acres, 3 percent above 1993 and 5 percent greater than 1992.

"All regions, except the Delta, intend to increase plantings from the previous year," said the recently released report on prospective plantings.

Sorghum plantings are expected to total 10 million acres, down 4 percent from last year to the lowest acreage since 1930.

Winter wheat seedings for 1994

are 50.8 million acres, up slightly from the previously published estimate but down 2 percent from 1993.

Durum wheat planting intentions for 1994 total 2.59 million acres, up 18 percent from last year. Other spring wheat plantings are estimated at 18.1 million acres, down 1 percent from 1993.

Farmers in nine Midwest states affected by flooding and excess moisture last year were asked if any acreage would be kept out of crop production in 1994 because of the heavy rains and floods.

"Farmers in those states reported that they expect less than 1 percent of their 1994 cropland acreage (about 1.5 million acres) will be kept out of crop production," the report said.

The nine states are Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota and Wisconsin.

In another report, the statistics service said corn stocks on March 1 totaled 3.99 billion bushels, 30 percent below a year earlier. Wheat stocks as of that date totaled 1.02 billion bushels, down 3 percent from last year.

Stored soybeans totaled 1.01 billion bushels, 17 percent below holdings a year earlier. Stored barley totaled 226 million bushels, 7 percent below the stocks of March 1, 1993. Oats totaled 148 million bushels, 16 percent below the stocks a year ago. Grain sorghum stored totaled 276 million bushels, 36 percent less than last March.

Rough rice stocks totaled 79.6 million hundredweight (100 pounds), 13 percent lower than the total last March.

Economic, property issues explored in Perry speeches

AUSTIN - In recent addresses to chambers of commerce in Dimmit County and in Jacksonville, State Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry has called for less government infringement on private property rights and for more attention to ag processing opportunities in the state.

Speaking at the Dimmit County chamber's annual banquet, Perry said, "Towns and cities have been doing everything but laying out a red carpet to attract prisons."

"But along with attracting prisons, I suggest to you the same type of efforts should be made to lure ag processing companies -- companies that turn Texas cotton into Levis and Wranglers; companies that use Texas-grown vegetables in their salsas; companies that create sausage and other meat products from Texas livestock, and companies that use vegetables grown right here in Dimmit County in their prepared salads."

Perry said high-value ag exports account for more than 70 percent of U.S. agricultural sales to Mexico.

"Mexico is already Texas' largest trading partner, but where will they go for steaks, frozen dinners and other high-value ag products if we continue our dismal ag processing rate?"

He listed three strengths of Texas agriculture:

-- A diverse climate that enables farmers to grow just about anything.
-- A prime location that provides a trade gateway to Mexico and the rest of Latin America.

-- A Texas mystique, which food companies throughout the nation using the name "Texas" to sell products.

Dimmit County is located in South Texas. The county seat is Carrizo Springs.

In his address to the quarterly luncheon of the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce, Perry observed, "One of the biggest problems agriculture faces is that the average person is far removed from the farm."

"Less than two percent of the U.S. population lives on farms, and the U.S. Census is not even going to count us anymore. Urbanization, while it has led to much positive change, has created widespread ignorance about a way of life and an industry essential to this country's high standard of living."

Plains man re-elected

The Texas Grain Sorghum Board recently elected officers with Jack Cobb of Plains re-elected chairman. Other officers of the board are Wilbert Vorwerk of Taylor, vice chairman, and Richard Kotz of Edinburg, secretary-treasurer.

Representing the Panhandle district on the board are Troy Sublett of Hereford, Dale Arlio of Wildorado and Robert Green of Hartley.

He said he believes that lack of knowledge has led to misunderstandings and unfounded claims that challenge not only farmers' stewardship, but their skill, which produces the most abundant affordable food supply.

"Out of this climate, unfortunately, sometimes comes bad government policy," he said. "The Endangered Species Act is up for reauthorization and is an example of how a law with a noble purpose, protecting God's

creatures from unnatural extinction, can be hijacked until it is now a threat to another noble end of government, private property rights."

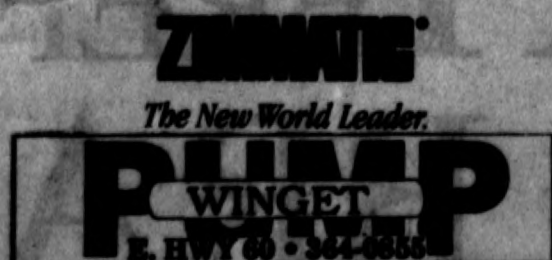
Rural landowners provide more than 95 percent of all wildlife habitat in Texas, he pointed out. "But today, under the endangered Species Act, private solutions to wildlife preservation too often are overlooked, or, even worse, actively discouraged, and agriculture must bear the devastating economic impact of this piece of legislation."

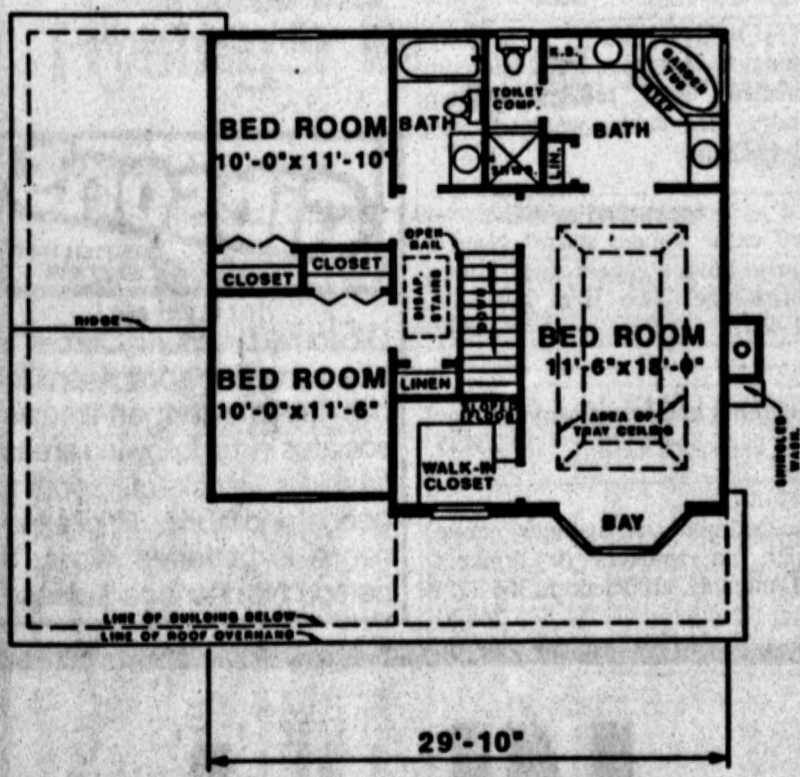

Signpost up ahead, two new 'Twilight' tales from Serling

Fans of the original "Twilight Zone" series who were less than thrilled with the syndicated versions of the show that sprang up in the late 1980s now have something to look forward to.

The master is back!

Or at least his work is.

"Twilight Zone: Rod Serling's Lost Classics" airs on CBS Thursday, May 19, and fans of the original series need look no further than the title to see where it's coming from.

"Lost Classics" is made up of two Serling-penned stories that clearly carry the dramatic stamp of the "Zone." Even the story of how the film came together has the faintest suggestion of eeriness to it.

"I discovered (the scripts) because I had moved," Rod Serling's widow, Carol Serling says. "And I live up in the hills, where the fires can come, and I decided that it would probably be a good idea to get this material out of my garage."

"And so I went through (it all) and in the process discovered this material. So, that's when it all came to light."

The program's executive producer, Lawrence Horowitz, had been working on an unrelated project with a representative for Carol Serling.

"We couldn't believe our good fortune," Horowitz states, "when (Serling's representative) said, 'By the way, we have an actual, original Rod Serling script that's never been produced. Would you be interested in seeing it?'"

"And you can imagine what our reaction was. And it was even more intense after we read it because we see a lot of scripts coming across our desks now, and there's just such an extraordinary difference to look at the words of, really, one of the great masters."

The first vignette, "The Theatre," is a Serling short story, transformed into a 30-minute screenplay by acclaimed writer Richard Matheson.

In the story, a young woman (played by Amy Irving) visits a theater where she begins seeing details of her life on the big screen. Soon her past and future are running across the screen, much to her horror, but she cannot stop watching.

To say any more would be giving the story away, but suffice to say, as good as "The Theatre" is, it's just an hors d'oeuvre for the ensuing main course.

The second vignette, "Where the Dead Are," completely scripted by Serling, is set in the late 1800s and stars Jack Palance (creep-mavens rejoice!) as the wheelchair-bound resident of a mysterious fog-covered island.

A young surgeon, Dr. Ben Ramsey (a wonderfully stoic Patrick Bergin), notices that one of his deceased patient's bodies bears signs of an old injury so severe that no one could have survived it.

He sets out to find where this man who should have been dead years ago received his previous medical care.

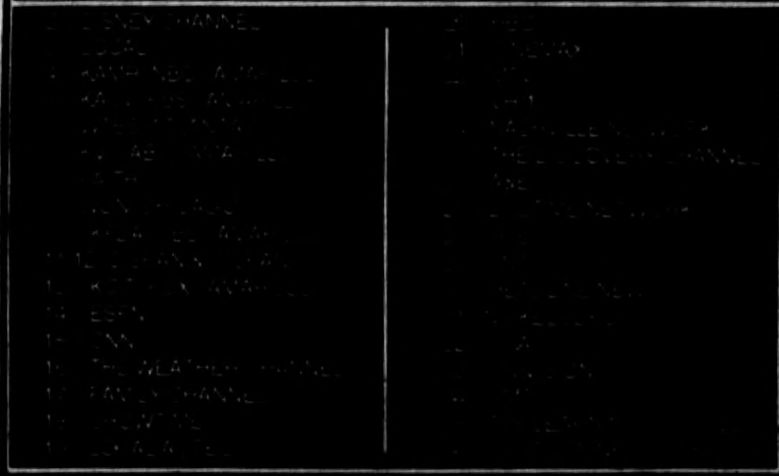
Dr. Ramsey happens upon a seaside village where the residents talk in hushed tones about the mysterious island and its inhabitants, which include Dr. Jeremy Wheaton (Palance) and his beautiful niece, Susan (Jenna Stern).

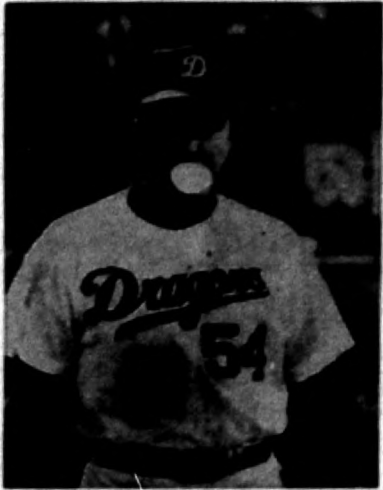
What follows is a twisted, macabre journey into the "Twilight Zone" as only the master, Rod Serling, could have imagined.
