## Accident scene

## GOP pushes health plan 'without big new bureaucracy'

WASHINGTON (AP) - A new Republican television ad campaign features the party's biggest congressional guns taking a swipe at President Clinton's health reforms and promising to make things better "without a big new bureaucracy."

The \$500,000 campaign promotes the idea that Republicans and Democrats, working together, can make health insurance more affordable and ensure that workers don't lose coverage when they change jobs.

"We can make health insurance affordable now without the Clinton government-run system," declare the spots read by Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole, House Minority Leader Bob Michel and nine other GOP lawmakers. "Let's do it now."

The ads gloss over the fact that Republicans, just like the Democrats, are divided on their approaches to health reform. The biggest split within the GOP is over whether all individuals should be forced to buy health insurance.

"We're not quite there yet," Dole admitted at a news conference. But he called the ads "very positive, responsible spots" that demonstrate "we're ready for prime time. We're ready to start dealing with this issue."

Haley Barbour, the Republican National Committee chairman, said they "make clear Republicans are for health care reform, but cannot support or accept the Clintons' proposal for a government-run health care system."

Jim Whitney, a spokesman for the Democratic National Committee, said, "The ads duck the fundamental question, which is where does the Republican party stand on guaranteeing private insurance to every American? Where do they stand on universal coverage?" He said the Republicans "continue to distort the president's plan."

Support for Clinton's plan has plummeted in recent months. Democrats are looking for ways to exempt small businesses from his

requirement that employers buy insurance for their workers and to make his insurance-purchasing alliances voluntary.

Barbour predicted, "By November, health care reform will be an issue that helps Republicans in the elections."

Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, who would steer clear of mandates but alter insurance laws to make coverage portable and renewable, said the Republicans agree on changes that could solve 85 percent of the problem.

## Japan, U.S. seek revival of trade talks

WASHINGTON (AP) - Efforts to revive stalled trade negotiations between the United States and Japan were extended into the weekend but neither side was giving hints about how close the two countries were.

New Japanese Prime Minister Tsutomu Hata dispatched a high-level delegation to Washington to find a way to resume trade talks that have been stalemated since Feb. 11.

The negotiations were designed to open Japan's markets in a number of sectors to American goods as a way of narrowing the record \$59 billion trade gap between the two nations.

The U.S. side has insisted that any agreements arrived at, whether in auto parts or medical products, contain specific numerical benchmarks that can be used in measuring progress, a proposal the Japanese have rejected as managed trade.

In recent days, the United States has toned down its rhetoric after earlier tough talk sent the dollar skidding to a near-record low against the Japanese yen. Financial markets worried about a full-scale trade war breaking out between the world's two largest economies.

Because of the market skittishness, negotiators were being exceptionally closed-mouthed Thursday and Friday, saying little beyond that both sides were diligently working toward an agreement.

## Home school: local parents explain how, why they do it

What do Abraham Lincoln, Sandra Day O'Connor, Thomas Edison, and Josh Howley, 15, of Hereford have in common?

All are products of home schools, the latest educational craze sweeping Texas and America.

Home schools, by definition, operate in the house. In Hereford, parents generally set aside a special room for classes.

There they teach their children reading, writing, and arithmetic, along with religion, social sciences, English, and whatever else they feel the child needs.

Linda and Joe Weaver of Hereford have two daughters, aged nine and 11. They believe in home schooling (see related article) so strongly that they refuse to send their children to public schools.

While educating your own child may not be the easiest chore in the world, it's one of the most satisfying, says Mrs. Weaver. Maggie Howley, a home teacher for her children, agrees.

Maggie and her husband, Jack,

operate a farm near Dawn. They have five children -- four sons and a daughter -- ranging in age from 10 months to 15 years.

According to Mrs. Howley, her older children are eager students and take on the further responsibilities of helping out on the farm.

She says that makes it easier on her as a teacher.

"Josh might be working on his English lesson, but then he might be needed to do something on the farm, like doing artificial insemination," she added.

"In a home school situation, you can move your child from a school lesson to something that is practical as well as educational."

Unlike the public school system, where classes are held at the same time and for the same duration each day, home school classes can vary widely in length and starting time.

Mrs. Howley holds class five days a week, while Mrs. Weaver chooses a four-day a week schedule.

"We get all our basic subjects covered in four days," said Mrs. Weaver. "Of course, the older a child gets, the more time it takes to teach

them."

Home schools occasionally result in unexpected benefits. The Howleys had a death in their family recently when her father passed away.

"We traveled back to Wisconsin and spent a week there," said Mrs. Howley. "My children brought their lessons and books and continued learning while we were there."

"They were able to learn, and the family could be together at a time of grieving."

The mothers said they appreciate the fact that they can teach their children at the child's pace -- not at the state's.

"If a child is having a problem with a lesson, I can take all the time I need to get the lesson across," said Mrs. Howley. "Once a child finishes a subject, he or she doesn't have to sit with hands folded while waiting for the other students to catch up. They can go outside or go on to other things."

Much of the material the families use is Christian-based. For example, they may hold a Bible class in the morning and follow up with family devotionals at noon.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Howley have

degrees in education. Her husband taught high school science and she was an economics teacher.

Joe Weaver has a degree in speech communications while Linda is a registered nurse. But Linda insisted a parent's educational background has little effect on how good or how poor a teacher the parent will be.

"Studies have shown that a parent's educational level doesn't have any real impact on how well a student will be educated, especially if it's elementary education," said Mrs. Weaver.

The couples get their instructional books and materials from a number of companies that publish materials for home teaching. Both Linda and

## Children learn at own pace, receive unexpected benefits

I remember the first time I began to hear about home school about 14 years ago. We didn't have any children at the time, and I thought, these people must be crazy. After all, you can't shelter your children forever.

Then our first child was born and we became busy in the business of raising her, thinking that school was a long way off. She always loved books and began reading just before her fifth birthday.

By fall, she was reading well and we decided she would be bored in kindergarten so we began to home school. We wanted to be sure that she was well grounded in phonics so her reading and spelling would continue to improve.

That was seven years ago, and we are still home schooling. We are finishing fourth and sixth grades this year, with our two daughters.

Fourteen years ago, that would have been unthinkable, but home school has been a blessing to us.

People home school for a variety of reasons, among which are religious, academic, medical, and social. Our reasons are based mostly on the first two. As Christians, we are alarmed at what is happening in our society. Drugs, violence, premarital sex, and gangs are the norm for the day.

We see a lack of moral values being upheld throughout our country and in our public schools. We want our children to be free to use the Bible in their school work, and for it to be upheld as a special book for our times. We also like to include God in history and science, and we enjoy reading literature that has high moral values. The curriculum we use is a Bible-based one and we really appreciate that.

There are many academic reasons for home schooling. The tutorial

method of education has been proven over and over again to be the best way of educating a child. A one on one approach is impossible in a classroom setting, but is ideal for the home. We can proceed at the rate of the individual child and thereby give extra work and information for one who is excelling, while slowing down for the one who is struggling.

There are many quality curriculum available to choose from so that teaching styles and learning styles can be adapted. It is especially nice to know exactly what your child is studying because you find so many teachable moments. For example, if you are studying fractions in school, you can go to the kitchen and make a half recipe or double a recipe. You can incorporate some fractions while grocery shopping to help the child see that fractions have a practical application.

# News Digest

## State

**CAYUGA** - It's not quite the Devil's Island some hard-core law-and-order backers might favor, but neither does Texas' newest prison facility resemble the tennis- and golf-equipped federal lockups known as Club Fed.

**DALLAS** - Fresh flowers have appeared in the old book warehouse with a sniper's view of downtown as well-wishers added Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis' name to their written messages at an exhibit on her husband's life. More than 1,000 people visited The Sixth Floor on Friday, the day after John F. Kennedy's widow died of cancer.

**DALLAS** - A former state employee who was awarded \$13.6 million in the largest verdict ever against the state in a whistle-blower case said he's still waiting for the money. George Green, a former architect for the Texas Department of Human Services, told The Dallas Morning News that he lives hand-to-mouth by selling tools in "one continuous garage sale."

**DALLAS** - Seven of the nation's 10 counties hardest hit by weather catastrophes during the past 20 years are located in Texas, an insurance industry official said. Dallas County tops the list, enduring more weather-related disaster than any place else in the country, said Gary Kerney, assistant vice president of the property claims division of the American Insurance Services Group.

**EL PASO** - Sixteen of the 32 members of the Legislature's Mexican American Caucus have signed a petition supporting a judge's probe into alleged state funding inequities affecting El Paso. The El Paso County investigation could lead to other courts of inquiry challenging state funding formulas in impoverished, largely Hispanic areas of the state, said Rep. Irma Rangel, caucus chairwoman.

**DALLAS** - Owners of 16 low-budget motels have defrauded the city out of hundreds of thousands of dollars in motel excise taxes, according to a published report. The Dallas Morning News reported the unpaid debts in its Saturday editions, citing court records filed by the city.

## World/Nation

**ARLINGTON, Va.** - Although she shunned the limelight in life, Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis will be buried in Arlington National Cemetery at the most-visited gravesite in the country - that of her first husband, President John F. Kennedy, and their two infant children.

**WASHINGTON** - International inspectors found that North Korea hasn't begun to divert fuel from a nuclear reactor that could be used to produce plutonium, a key ingredient in nuclear bombs. Defense Secretary William Perry says.

**WASHINGTON** - The Social Security Administration says it has found little evidence that parents are coaching their children to misbehave in school in order to qualify for federal disability benefits, despite charges to the contrary.

**PHILADELPHIA** - A judge ordered 3,500 Conrail workers back to work after a 13-hour strike that shut down freight service in 12 states. The union promised to keep pressing for safety measures they say are needed to save lives.

## Learning at home

Josh Howley, 15, is a product of a home school education, a trend that is growing in popularity in the Panhandle. Josh stands between his mother-teacher, Mrs. Maggie Howley and Mrs. Linda Weaver, who teaches her young daughters at home. The Hereford mothers are holding copies of two instructional magazines, "The Teaching Home," and "Home School Digest."

## HOME SCHOOL

Maggie, for example, are avid readers of "The Teaching Home," a Christian magazine for home educators. They also pore through each issue of "Home School Digest, which teaches home schooling from a Biblical perspective.

"We will spend less than \$200 per year for all the materials a child needs," said Mrs. Weaver.

"A while back, I got a math book that I didn't like. It didn't seem to be doing the job, so I shopped around and found a better book that really works."

The home schooling network across the United States is growing rapidly, according to the mothers. Home school teachers and their students get together often for sporting events and fellowship. Hereford parents this summer will get

together on a regular basis to swim at West Texas A&M University, where they will discuss training and other subjects.

Said Mrs. Weaver, "Hereford has about a dozen families in home schools. Amarillo has a much larger home school population."

How well, then, she was asked, do home school students do in comparison to students in public schools?

"We test our students on a regular basis to see how they are doing compared to the national average," said Mrs. Weaver. "Maggie, of course, is a teacher.

"She can administer the test herself. And so far, we've been very pleased with the results."

Home schools have a rich history.

Thomas Edison was a home school student, as was U.S. Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor. And few students haven't read the story of "Honest Abe" Lincoln, who received his early education at home.

The home school teachers even have their own legal defense association. For \$100 annually, the Virginia-based association will defend a teacher on any issue involved with home school training.

"We try to keep abreast of everything that is going on," said Mrs. Howley. "For example, a group tried to force a bill through the Texas legislature that would require all teachers to be licensed before they could become home school teachers.

"We banded together and beat them. They dropped the proposed legislation."

# Texas counties hardest hit by weather, insurance study shows

**DALLAS (AP)** - Seven of the nation's 10 counties hardest hit by weather catastrophes during the past 20 years are located in Texas, an

insurance industry official said. Dallas County tops the list, enduring more weather-related disaster than any place else in the country, said Gary Kerney, assistant vice president of the property claims division of the American Insurance Services Group.

The group represents 215 insurance companies nationwide.

The other counties, ranked, are Tarrant, third; Denton, fourth; Ellis, fifth; Harris, sixth; Collin, seventh; Parker, eighth; and Bowie, ninth.

The insurance industry defines a catastrophe as any incident resulting in at least 1,000 claims totaling at least \$5 million in insured losses. The industry figures do not adjust for inflation.

Texas led all states from 1949 to 1993 with 312 weather-related catastrophes, Kerney said.

"The weather in Texas is typically more severe than other parts of the

country," Kerney said. "Your hail is bigger, your tornadoes are bigger, and you get a lot more rain."

Texas also has more damaging winds than any place else in the country, said Hugh Crowther, a meteorologist at the National Severe Storms Forecast Center in Kansas City, Mo.

Federal and state officials said they could not confirm the insurance industry's ratings.

Ralph Swisher, a spokesman for the Federal Emergency Management Agency, said ranking risks in every county in the country might be impossible.

"There are so darn many counties out there and so many hazards," he said.

However, Texas Department of Insurance spokesman Lee Jones said weather is a big reason why average homeowner and automobile insurance premiums in Texas are among the nation's highest.

**MANILA, Philippines (AP)** - An 18-year-old model from New Delhi won the 43rd Miss Universe pageant Saturday, defeating 76 other contestants from around the world.

Miss USA, Lu Parker of North Charleston, S.C., was among the 10 semi-finalists.

Sushmita Sen received her crown from the outgoing Miss Universe, Dayanara Torres of Puerto Rico, at the end of the pageant.

Miss Sen was the first Miss India to win the competition. She will receive \$215,000 in cash and prizes.

The Philippines, where beauty queens are revered, last hosted the contest in 1974, two years after dictator Ferdinand Marcos imposed eight years of martial law.

This time, the government hopes the contest will draw attention to the Philippines as a tourism site. The country's image has suffered from two decades of political instability, including the 1986 ouster of Marcos and a series of Muslim, Communist and military revolts.

Earlier this month, the government's Commission on Human Rights began investigating allegations that police were rounding up scores of homeless children to hide them from Miss Universe visitors and contestants.

sharing good literature together. We are usually in the middle of some exciting story, like "The Little House" books, "The Chronicles Of Narnia," "Anne Of Green Gables," many of the "Oz" stories, "The Wheel On The School," and many other children's classics. As a child, I never had the opportunity to read these delightful stories. We were always, too busy with our graded readers and, other school work. Through these stories, my children have visited fantasy places, Prince Edward Island, the American Frontier, and Holland. What a wealth of information and experience it has given them.

Because of our interest in academics, we use an intensive phonics program to teach reading and spelling. We also want our children to do well in mathematics and have focused on memorizing addition and multiplication so they will have the tools they need to proceed with higher skills. In the home, we can observe carefully and see that the child has grasped the concept before proceeding to a new level. We also feel a careful study of history is needed to help them understand their world.

One question we frequently hear is, "What about the socialization of your children?" I think this is a very legitimate question, and maybe this is a problem for some home school children. If the child is constantly isolated from society, then I'm sure there might be some problems. But most home schooled children are learning social skills in a variety of settings. Our girls are very involved in church activities and in the local 4-H program. We also have a home school group that has some activities we enjoy. Our children are learning to relate socially with a broad spectrum of age groups instead of only their age mates.

Children today are pushed to grow up so fast. Home school has allowed our children to be children and to learn at their own pace in a place where they feel safe and loved. Many of the problems that adolescents and teens face today are caused by peer pressure. Home schooling can free a child from this constant pressure to be like everyone else. The child is free to become who he or she is and learn to relate to all age groups -- not just 20 or 30 children his own age.

There is nothing I want more for my children than that they be well educated and prepared to live productive lives. We feel our home school is achieving that goal. We are thrilled to see our children growing, maturing, and continuing to be excited about learning day after day, year after year.

## SPS to provide KidCare program during summer

Southwestern Public Service Company is reminding children that the employees driving SPS trucks can find help for them if they are lost or feel threatened or in danger while outside playing this summer.

## Las Cruces, N.M. seeks to take over electric system

EL PASO, Texas (AP) - The city of Las Cruces, N.M., next week will seek permission to condemn El Paso Electric Co.'s distribution system and to collect unpaid franchise fees.

The request, to be made in a federal bankruptcy court, is part of the southern New Mexico city's attempt to break away from the financially troubled El Paso utility and create a municipal utility.

Las Cruces officials say they believe they can reduce electric rates by 30 percent if the city can take over the distribution system and contract with Amarillo's Southwestern Public Service Co. to operate a municipal utility.

Voters will decide in August if the plan will go ahead.

Dallas-based Central and South West Corp., which is in the process of taking over El Paso Electric, will oppose the city's request, said Central

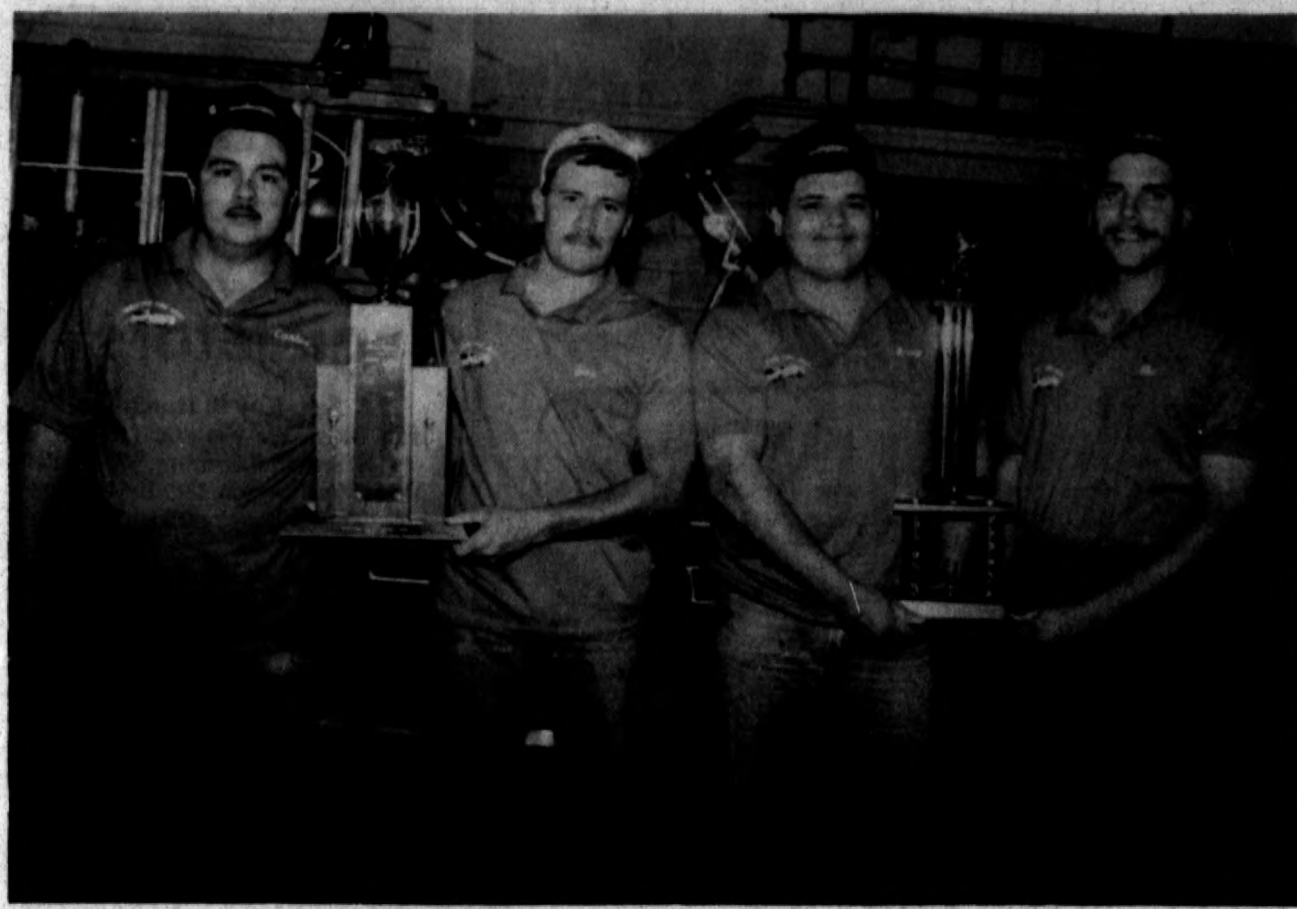
spokesman James Elam.

Las Cruces also wants to collect the monthly franchise fee, which El Paso Electric stopped paying after the franchise agreement expired in March.

The company paid about \$75,000 each month in exchange for being allowed to have its poles, wires and other equipment on city property.

El Paso Electric is currently trying to emerge from Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection.

## Items from 1950s and 1960s becoming collectors items

AMARILLO, Texas - Whatever happened to that red Formica and chrome table with the vinyl-covered chairs that sat in the corner of your mom's kitchen?

Or that amoeba-shaped coffee table on the hairpin legs and the floor lamp with the two-tiered parchment shade your parents tossed a few years ago when they redid the den?

Such items are fetching top dollar as the trend for items from the late 1950s and early 1960s accelerates.

Collectible items from the era can be found throughout the Panhandle, but aficionados warn that many of the dealers from the East and West coasts are coming to West Texas because prices are cheaper. They then take the items back with them to sell at higher prices.

Robert Rea has collected items from the '50s and '60s for more than 10 years and seeks out pieces featuring unusual shapes and designs.

"I like the whole look, the lines, the curvature of forms," he said. It's getting harder to find stuff. You've got to have a secret source because a lot of people know it's hot."

Pieces from this period once thought of as tacky and dated have become a fad in collectibles. Collectors seek everything from the kitschy - pink flamingos and cat-eye glasses - to original pieces of

furniture designed by Charles Eames, Harry Bertoia and Eero Saarinen.

Fifties furniture and accessories embraced a variety of styles including colonial, rustic and western, but the style experiencing the greatest revival is the "modern" look, which, with its asymmetrical, free-form shapes and bold, bright colors, evoked images of futurism, fantasy and whimsy.

Rea, who with his pork-chop sideburns and white T-shirt looks like he just stepped off the screen of "Rebel Without a Cause," started dealing in pieces from this period while living in the Los Angeles area.

"Ever since I can remember, I've been addicted to it," he said. "The '50s are in my blood. I just can't get away from it. I think I enjoy it so much because back then, people put their heart into their product."

His favorite pieces from the period were old hair dryer chairs from a beauty salon that he used as his living room chairs in his home in California. All of the hair dryers still worked.

"I appreciate the craftsmanship. Everything I have, I use. I don't collect anything that doesn't work," Rea said. "It has to be absolutely original or I won't touch it."

Since moving to Amarillo, he has sold pieces from the period in several shops along Sixth Avenue, although he currently does not have an outlet. Fashion from the late 1950s began

its revival several years ago, preceding the demand for furniture and accessories.

"The younger generation is more into vintage than they have ever been," said Floy Freeman, who, along with her daughter, Judy Birdsong, owns Garb vintage clothing on Sixth Avenue. "They appreciate the fabrics you can't find now."

A lot of new clothing also features style and detailing reminiscent of the fashion from the era.

Women's clothing from the era currently in demand includes sleeveless dresses, tight sweaters, pedal pushers and Capri pants, Freeman said. Also sought are matching straight skirts and suit jackets, some with a pillbox hat, similar to those popularized by Jackie Kennedy.

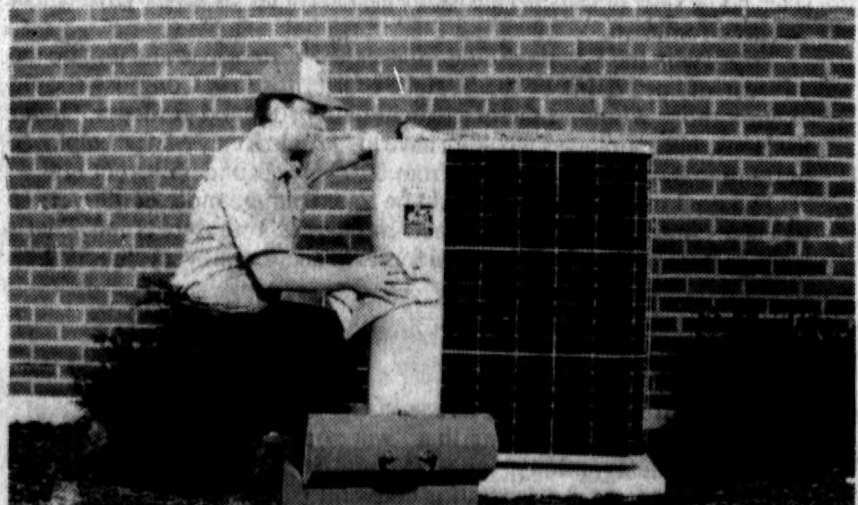
Birdsong quoted a fashion article that appeared in Seventeen magazine as saying, "Everything had to fit within a gnat's wing of perfection."

"That's not much room to breathe," she added. "Everything was pretty constricting."

Popular men's clothing from the late '50s and early '60s includes patterned sportcoats with narrow lapels and side vents, narrow ties and pegged pants, the two women said.

## An AP news analysis Broad consulting leads to zigzags

WASHINGTON (AP) - Nobody can fault a president for taking his time or changing his mind about a lifetime appointment to the Supreme Court. It is, after all, a choice that outlasts presidencies.

President Clinton's problem is that he has let the zigzags of choosing become a semi-public process. He said his deliberations and detours on the way to nominating Stephen G. Breyer had leaked out because he consulted so broadly on the selection.

"The more advice you seek, the more leaks you have here," Clinton said as he presented Breyer at a Rose Garden introduction ceremony Monday, a weekend after naming him so abruptly that there wasn't time for the federal appeals judge to get here from Boston.

Besides, Clinton said, more than half the leaks were wrong. Perhaps, but enough were right to add to the impression of wavering and indecision at the White House. That could prove troublesome on other fronts, notably foreign policy, where critics are pushing Clinton and each other for their preferred answers to problems abroad.

None of that will make any difference on the Breyer nomination; there is no significant opposition. Barring the unforeseen, his Senate confirmation is forgone, with as little dissent as Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg a year ago, and perhaps less. She was confirmed, 96-3.

But as smooth as confirmation was for her, and surely will be for him, they both emerged from difficult, even awkward deliberations at the White House. Clinton took three months on his first choice, and switched at the last to pick Ginsburg over Breyer. This time it was Breyer instead of Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt, twice a finalist, or Richard S. Arnold, a federal appeals judge in Little Rock, Ark.

Health was a problem in Arnold's case; Clinton said that with successful cancer treatment, the Arkansas judge would be at the top of the list for a future Supreme Court vacancy should there be one.

He'd said the same about Breyer and Babbitt after the Ginsburg nomination. Babbitt had twice been the almost-nominee. White House lobbyists got courtesy calls saying he was the choice in 1993, to succeed Byron R. White, but the president switched.

This time, Babbitt said at the start that he'd rather stay in the Cabinet, then changed that to say he was ready and willing to serve the president, as the White House turned to him after Justice Harry A. Blackmun retired. First it was all set, then it wasn't.

Clinton had said he wanted a nominee with political credentials for this vacancy; eight of the nine justices are judges who got promoted. Appointing Breyer, Clinton called him a man of political savvy and skill.

When he takes the Blackmun seat, Breyer will succeed a justice who had jokingly called himself Old No. 3 after he joined the court, since Richard Nixon's first two nominees were blocked in the Senate.

That wry numerical label may be apt again.

Clinton said he had no doubt that any of his top candidates would have been confirmed handily. But there would have been a companion confirmation on a successor to Babbitt at the Interior Department, and the process would have revived controversy over issues like logging, Western water rights and grazing fees.

Clinton said he did not yield to the Republicans in choosing Breyer. "That just isn't right," he said. "I believe in this guy." But it didn't help that his interim counsel, Lloyd Cutler, said after Breyer was named that he was the one who had the fewest problems.

Clinton was effusive about Babbitt. "He would bring to the court the responsibility and discipline of service in public life," the president said, "a feel for law at the state level ... for life at the grassroots." So saying, he chose Breyer. He said he couldn't bear to lose Babbitt from the Cabinet.

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Folks, I was really stumped for what to write about this weekend that would not stir up trouble in the community, cause bad feelings or get me in trouble.

If you recall, the state informed Hereford school officials last year that some TAAS test scores at the junior high were not up to minimum standards and something needed to be done.

Well, Mrs. Leasure and her staff went to work, trying to implement programs and curricula that would improve scores.

When it was time to take the tests, she videotaped community groups sending best wishes on the TAAS to play for students each day -- just to let them know there are people out in the community who care.

But the ultimate challenge was made to the entire student body.

Mrs. Leasure told the entire seventh and eighth grade population

that, if at least 90 percent of the school passed the math and reading portions of this year's TAAS test, she would get up on stage during this year's Town and Country Jubilee and have her head shaved.

That's right -- Mrs. Leasure will go bald if 90 percent of her students score passing grades on those two sections.

Now I don't know about you, but it seems to me like that this shows a commitment far beyond what other principals have done to encourage school performance.

George Ochs at West Central dressed as a woman because his kids read more than 2,600 books for the semester.

Darla Baggett at Bluebonnet dressed like a clown for the same reason.

But to offer to shave your head -- that is a true sacrifice.

Now notice Mrs. Leasure worked in the classroom to prepare her students for the testing before issuing such a challenge.

But I believe that students will do better when they are working for something more than just a number on a piece of paper.

In this case, Mrs. Leasure has put her hair on the line to encourage drastic improvements in test scores at her school.

I, for one, would love to see it.

Speaking of schools, this year concludes my first full school year of covering events in the Hereford Independent School District. I arrived in January 1993 and saw activities for that semester and now have gone through a full year.

I must say that I am impressed with the work that is going on here to teach children.

While I'm sure there are things that could be done differently and some subjects that don't need to be taught, I think overall the schools are doing a very good job.

I have met teachers who think up innovative new programs to impart wisdom, principals who have an enthusiasm for their jobs that rubs off on the entire staff and administrators who do their best to pull it all together.

Sometimes it seems like teachers get dumped on for all the problems in society and we forget that they play such an important role in the lives of

our children.

I'm just glad we live in a community where values, Christian principles, manners and such things are taught -- even if they aren't mandated by the state.

Briefly, and on a slightly different subject, here's another for the "How Stupid Can You Be" files.

Seems a burglar broke into the Calvary Methodist Church in Weatherford last week and stole a radio and tape recorder and tipped over some furniture.

Then, this genius saw the copy machine.

Einstein turned on the machine and made a few photocopies of his own face, then wandered off, leaving behind proof positive who had committed the crime.

And people wonder why I advocate police being allowed to file charges for "general stupidity"!

May 11

Fort Worth Star-Telegram on Barton's moonlighting:

As a general rule, we leave political parties to arrange their internal affairs as they see fit, but U.S. Rep. Joe Barton's candidacy for state Republican Party chairman raises legitimate public concerns that transcend mere partisan politics.

Citizens of the 6th Congressional District, which includes much of Tarrant County, have a right to expect Barton to devote his full, undivided attention to the representation of their interests.

Congress has been mired in too much serious political gridlock during the last several years. Increasing numbers of its members have engaged in contentious maneuvering, fund raising and rear-guard obstructionism - by partisans on both sides of the aisle - and these diversions have contributed to a growing national skepticism that Congress is seriously intent on faithfully conducting the country's business.

Barton has performed ably in his six terms and has matured in the job. As a member of the minority party with relatively low seniority and few legislative triumphs, he has nevertheless demonstrated an earnest attention to his constituents.

Being a member of Congress has become more than a full-time job, if it is to be performed adequately. If Barton were to divide his attention between his responsibilities in Washington and the constant interlocking conflicts that have come to characterize statewide party organizations, his primary responsibility to the voters of the 6th District would inevitably suffer.

The Texas Republican Party's intramural affairs are of no concern to us. Barton's sworn duty to represent all who elected him is of immense concern to us. Barton should decide now which job he wants and withdraw from the race for the other.

May 15

Midland Reporter-Telegram on lobby reform:

Finally the U.S. Senate had the gumption to do what should have been done years ago: It voted overwhelmingly to prohibit lawmakers from accepting gifts, meals and recreational travel from lobbyists or anyone else except family members or genuine friends.

That will not, of course, end influence-peddling on Capitol Hill. Special interest groups will still attempt - and in some instances, succeed - to sway members of Congress to their side of an issue. Powerful individuals will still create ways to get particular members of Congress "in their pocket."

Overall, however, the bill enacted by the Senate - and still to be hammered out by a House-Senate conference committee - has effectively started the ball rolling toward meaningful reform of the congressional gift law. The reform is sorely needed to restore accountability to Congress.

While it has always been possible for individual lawmakers to remain above the greed and corruption infecting the legislative system due to the influence of lobbyists and special interest groups, the influence-peddling has gotten out of hand in recent years. Tighter controls are obviously needed.

May 16

San Antonio Express-News on drug war:

In case you forgot, America still has a serious drug problem that saps

law enforcement, leads to related crimes to support habits, increases insurance and health-care costs, wrecks families and causes untold loss of job productivity.

Now, say two new studies, one by the government, the other by the University of Michigan, drug use is rising ...

(Drug legalization) won't happen here - not for now, at least - but the Clinton administration has shifted the drug-war strategy from attempting to seal the borders against trafficking to educating schoolchildren and treating hard-core abusers ...

Ultimately, the people, not politicians or police alone, will either win or lose the war - by taking back or failing to take back their streets and by educating or failing to educate themselves and their children about drugs.

Lest they forget, we cite two recent reminders: Rock singer Kurt Cobain, a heroin user, killed himself; and ballplayer Daryl Strawberry, also an addict, killed his career.

May 16

El Paso Times on "nanny tax" code:

When Zoe Baird was denied the chance to be attorney general because of what became known as "Nannygate," countless people shuddered. ... Thousands of household employers knew they too were guilty of not paying Social Security taxes for their employees.

But those who spend less than \$1,000 a year on the occasional baby sitter, house sitter or gardener are hardly the kind of tax cheats the government ought to focus on.

That's why the Senate should follow the House's lead and update the 44-year-old provision of the Social Security tax law. Congress should exempt those who hire the occasional baby sitter and gardener. Under the House bill, employers wouldn't have to file unless they paid an employee more than \$1,250 annually, up from \$200 a year under current law.

The goal of the revision should be to encourage more employers to pay taxes and thus contribute to their employees' retirement fund. That's an important goal given that only a fourth of such employers comply with the law ...

May 17

The Monitor, on lawsuit abuse in the Rio Grande Valley:

Did you know we're living in a "war zone?" That's the designation given to 11 counties ... by Texas doctors at the annual Texas Medical Association convention last week in Austin. The "honor" list was made up of the 11 counties in which the most medical liability lawsuits are filed. ...

TMA President Dr. Robert Tenery Jr. of Dallas said the association had conducted a survey that showed doctors in Hidalgo County are more likely to be sued than doctors in any other county. So, does this mean doctors in Hidalgo County are somehow less skilled and make more medical mistakes than those in other areas? Not according to Tenery, who was quoted in the Austin American-Statesman as saying, "Many of these claims are frivolous ..."

While many factors probably are involved in Hidalgo County being the state's top "war zone," a couple stand out. Per capita income is the lowest of any metropolitan area in the nation, and some of those who sue undoubtedly do so for the same reason many low-income people play the lottery. ...



## Episcopal parish becomes Catholic

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - In the first conversion in Texas to involve an entire parish, an Episcopal priest and his followers will switch to Catholicism next month.

The Rev. Allan Hawkins and his 100 parishioners at St. Mary the Virgin Episcopal Church say they would rather become Catholic than fight recent developments in the Episcopal Church.

The married, English-born priest and the parish members will move to Catholicism following Vatican approval. Hawkins said Pope John Paul II approved the switch.

Hawkins said disagreements over changes in the Episcopal Church and his parish's desire to be unified with the church in Rome prompted the move.

"The ordination of women or the ordination of homosexuals are not the issues that have caused this," Hawkins told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. "They are only underlying symptoms of a deeper problem with authority."

Traditionalists, including Hawkins, contend that the Episcopal Church is straying from its roots, making decisions based on societal trends rather than biblical authority and tradition.

The conservative Episcopal Synod of America, headed by Bishop Clarence Pope, was sympathetic with Hawkins' plans and wished his congregation well in its move. Pope leads the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth.

"We are sorry to see them go, but it is a friendly parting," said Bishop Co-Adjutor Jack Iker, a diocese spokesman.

The Arlington parish has waited three years to make the move. It will create the sixth "Anglican Use" Roman Catholic parish in the United

States, church officials said.

Under the Anglican Use provision approved by the Vatican in 1980, Episcopal churches can become Catholic but continue to use parts of the Episcopal prayer book.

Bishop Joseph P. Delaney of the Catholic Diocese of Fort Worth is scheduled to formally accept St. Mary the Virgin members into the Roman Catholic Church on June 12.

## Attorney claims state trying to stop probe

EL PASO, Texas (AP) - Texas officials are resorting to scare tactics in their attempts to stop a judge's investigation into alleged inequities in state funding practices, a prosecutor said Friday.

Three state agencies under investigation and their attorneys are grossly misrepresenting the costs of producing records subpoenaed by Judge Edward Marquez as a way of stalling the inquiry and frightening the public, said El Paso County Attorney Jose Rodriguez.

"In truth, these agencies are on a scare mission," said Rodriguez, the lead counsel in Marquez's court of inquiry. "They want to frighten the people from determining how the agencies are run and how tax monies are distributed."

Rodriguez made his comments during a news conference to respond to allegations by the agencies that Marquez's requests for records were unduly burdensome, costly to taxpayers and consuming too much of the agencies' time.

State officials have said transmitting some of the requested data into computers in El Paso could alone run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The agencies also allege there is insufficient evidence of criminal wrongdoing to proceed with the inquiry, which has been likened to a one-man grand jury and could potentially result in criminal charges against state officials.

The state departments of Transportation, Aging, and Mental Health-Mental Retardation made the charges in their motions asking an appellate court to halt the inquiry, which Marquez convened to look into allegations that state agencies have historically underfunded social services and highway projects in El Paso County.

William Kilgartin, a private attorney hired to represent the agencies, was not in his office Friday afternoon and could not immediately be reached for comment by The Associated Press.

The 8th Court of Appeals in El Paso will hear oral arguments May 27 on the agencies' claims.

Until then, the court has suspended the investigation into the funding practices of the departments of Transportation and Aging.

Will it be the rugged New York Knicks, returning Sunday to their Madison Square Garden for Game 7 of the Eastern Conference semifinals? They've won three games there by a total of 10 points, but struggled each time.

Or will it be the resurgent Chicago Bulls, three-time defending champions, who have bounced back three times already from series deficits of 2-0, 2-1 and 3-2?

"This sets up a very interesting scenario. We've had three home games, they've had three home games. Now Game 7 we're going into a neutral zone as far as we are concerned," Bulls coach Phil Jackson said after Friday night's 93-79 Chicago victory evened the series 3-3.

"Having played there three times and feeling comfortable there, we have a great chance to do something that we've looked forward to since the beginning of this three weeks ago."

The Knicks' three wins at home have featured comebacks.

"There's no pressure now. These guys are pros," Knicks coach Pat Riley said. "This place was rocking and rolling tonight and the Garden

will be rocking and rolling Sunday." The Bulls jumped to a 30-17 lead Friday after one quarter behind 12-for-15 free-throw shooting, and kept the lead the entire game in what may have been their final game at Chicago Stadium. They hope not.

A victory Sunday would land them the first two games of the conference finals, but first they must find a way to win in New York.

"This series will come down to loose balls, second shots, scrub shots. Tonight it was us who had that," said veteran center Bill Cartwright, who gave the Bulls seven rebounds and nine points, while banging Knicks center Patrick Ewing.

B.J. Armstrong had 20 points, Horace Grant had 16 points and 12

rebounds and Scottie Pippen 13 points and 11 rebounds.

Chicago had a considerable 52-35 edge in rebounding and was 25 of 31 from the line to only 17 of 22 for the Knicks. New York's physical style of defense was limited by the closely officiated game. The Knicks, who'd won Game 5 on a controversial foul call against Pippen in the final seconds, were called for 30 fouls, the Bulls 17.

"That's officiating, part of basketball," said New York guard John Starks, who fouled out after scoring 18 points. "You've got to deal with it. You can't bitch or cry about it. You've got to play through all that."

Patrick Ewing led New York with 26 points and 14 rebounds.

## Duper duped by sting operation

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) - Former Miami Dolphins star receiver Mark Duper bought cocaine and conspired to sell it because he needed to make \$300,000 quickly, a federal agent said in a sworn affidavit.

Federal officials say Duper and his brother-in-law, Brian Briggs, were going to convert the cocaine into crack and sell it in Shreveport, La., where Duper was to resurrect his career next week with the Canadian

League's expansion Shreveport Pirates.

Duper, 35, and Briggs, 25, were nabbed Friday after they tried to buy \$8,000 worth of drugs from undercover officers working on a monthlong sting operation, said spokesman Jim Shedd of the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency.

The kilo of cocaine they tried to buy can fetch up to \$60,000 on the street when converted into crack, Shedd said.

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# Pro golfers show variety of strange habits

IRVING, Texas - Last week, Craig Stadler had a room with a view of the 18th hole at the Four Seasons Tournament Players Course at Las Colinas.

It is the same space Stadler had inhabited during every GTE Byron Nelson Classic since he won the event while checked into that corner of the world in 1984.

Nick Price arrived with a roll of nickels, a bag of brown tees and several boxes of golf balls marked with the number "00."

He was greeted by locker-room supervisor Martin Oribharbor, whose roots - like Price's - trace back to Africa.

Oribharbor had promised to perform the jumbo dance, a Swahili welcome good-luck gyration that the two have shared each year since the final round of the 1991 Nelson.

That day, after Oribharbor's first jumbo session, Price came from two strokes off the pace to win his first Professional Golfers' Association Tour event in eight years.

Many on the PGA Tour have similar rituals they perform, hoping to enhance their chances of winning golf tournaments.

Touring pros, for the most part, bristle at the notion that these habits could be considered superstitions. But few of the practices are based upon logic that would impress the Harvard debate team.

It probably is coincidence that nine of Price's 10 PGA Tour triumphs have occurred since Oribharbor's initial good-luck boogie. But Price came to Irving looking forward to another round of his friend's fancy footwork. Just in case.

"As long as he's not putting the witch doctor's curse on me, I think it's great. Whenever I see him, he does his dance. The other guys get a big hoot out of it," Price said.

Bob Tway won't use a red tee. It reminds the Oklahoma State product too much of rival Oklahoma. Likewise, University of Houston

graduate Blaine McCallister culls all orange tees from his bag because the color conjures up images of the hated Texas Longhorns.

Some players re-tie their shoes after taking a bogey or worse on a hole. Others, after missing a cut, discard various pieces of equipment used that week. John Daly, after 11 consecutive over-par rounds this season, shaved his head for good luck and responded with a seventh-place finish the next week at the Houston Open.

Many pros, like Price and Andrew Magee, prefer low-numbered golf balls because they want to take low scores on every hole. The practice is so common, said Bob Lohr, that he requests balls numbered 5-8 from his manufacturer because there is little chance of confusing them with those of a competitor.

In the estimation of Calvin Peete, Lohr is taking a risk in playing the high-numbered balls.

"It takes more ink to mark them and they don't go as far," Peete said, explaining his aversion to balls marked with any number higher than 4.

Not all low numbers are good numbers, however. Seve Ballesteros won't use a ball with the number "3" for fear of inducing a three-putt. He also prefers a blue shirt for final-round competition. Why?

"Gray is a sad color. Red is too aggressive. You need to be in between for this game. Blue is right," said Ballesteros, who added that blue also is his favorite color.

Red is ideal, however, for McCallister, Billy Ray Brown, Steve Elkington and other Houston products who seek to charge on Sundays. Not so for Senior PGA Tour standout Chi Chi Rodriguez, who favors green garb during the final round because green "is the color of money."

Then there is Magee, who is not as concerned about the color of his clothing as he is about the frequency with which it is worn.

"I never wear the same outfit twice in the same year," Magee said.

The practice, he added, can be difficult to continue during slumps.

"If a pair of pants plays a bad round, they're out of the lineup," Magee said. "They're forced into the closet and don't come back until they redeem themselves with a good practice round."

In a sport as fickle as golf, where even the top performers are not immune to hot and cold streaks, a sense of continuity is essential for every player, said Fort Worth's Mark Brooks. That is why most golfers have set practice and preshot routines. The key, said Brooks, is remembering which habits truly impact bottom-line numbers on the scorecard and the paycheck.

"Everyone's superstitious to a point," Brooks said. "Why do you always put the cereal in the same cabinet or the milk on the same shelf? Why does a guy always put his glove in the same pocket or carry a certain number of tees? It's what you get comfortable with. It becomes a routine."

"But if anyone out here thinks breaking a routine is going to cause him to hit a bad drive, he needs to see a psychiatrist."

Some of the game's best players are routine-oriented, however. Paul Azinger only marks his ball with a penny, making sure Lincoln's head faces the hole. Jim Thorpe never takes the putter from his caddy until he reaches the green.

Jack Nicklaus always carries three dimes and three tees in his pocket during a round. Rodriguez also carries three coins: a nickel for marking birdie putts, a quarter for marking par putts and a silver dollar for good luck.

In his never-ending quest to corner the good-fortune market, Rodriguez's other charms include a rock blessed by the Pope and a lucky walnut.

After a good round, Rodriguez makes sure to follow the same path to the course the next day - even if it included a wrong turn. Ben Crenshaw, when on a roll at a tournament, will wait in line to use the same bathroom stall in the men's locker room rather than visit a different venue.

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Even Brooks conceded that, all things being equal, he prefers to mark his ball with a coin that "has a good year on it." A good year, in Brooks' vernacular, means "anything low," such as '64 or '65.

To John Cook, who also subscribes to the "good year" theory for ball marking, that means carrying a coin from 1975 (year of his marriage), 1979 (rookie year on PGA Tour) or 1992 (best earnings year).

However, Cook carries only two coins - one dime, one nickel - during each round. Price fills his bag with nickels, the only coin he will use for ball marking, and brown tees, the only color he will use. Jay Haas and Hale Irwin favor foreign coins on the green: Haas' from England, Irwin's from Japan.

For players without superstitious tendencies, there tend to be others close to them who overcompensate. Houston's Jeff Maggert said caddie Brian Sullivan wore the same "lucky shirt" every Sunday that he was in contention last year until Maggert

persuaded him to stop.

"I finally had a bad (Sunday) round and he threw the stupid shirt away," said Maggert, who finished 11th on last year's money list with \$793,023.

Christy Kite carried a killer-whale key chain during each round of the 1992 U.S. Open at Pebble Beach as a reminder that her husband, Tom, set a course-record 63 on the same layout a decade earlier.

The key chain was significant because friends had given a stuffed killer whale to the Kites' daughter, Stephanie, the day Kite shot his 63. The family, Christy Kite said, "always joked that the whale shot that 63."

After the key chain completed 72 holes in Christy's purse, Tom Kite hoisted the trophy from his first major championship.

For timeliness and career-turning irony, however, nothing can touch the jumbo session between Price, a Zimbabwe native, and Oribharbor, a Nigerian, at the 1991 Nelson. Price entered that tournament with less than

\$2 million in career earnings to show for eight-plus seasons of PGA Tour life. The past three years, he has won \$3.6 million and established himself among the top five players in the world rankings.

"Before he went to play that day, I told him I was going to give him a good-luck dance," Oribharbor said.

"You shake your shoulders, move your legs, get your hands low and move around a little bit. We both danced it together in the locker room. If you watched Nick's last win (Honda Classic, March 10-13), he was doing it a little bit on one of the greens after he hit a good shot."

Price disagreed. "Martin's the dancer. I've got the rhythm of a mule with two broken legs," Price said. "I don't know what happened that week (in 1991), but I owe a lot to that tournament. It got me going a little bit and turned things around. I'll always look back on the '91 Nelson as a very special week."

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# Muleshoe, Twitty, Wayside are not Rome

**AMARILLO** - In the pioneer days, men and women on the flat lands of Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico dreamed of a new civilization. And in every other village, railroad switch and low-water crossing they saw a new Rome, Athens or Constantinople.  
 But when they painted names such as Muleshoe or Twitty on the welcome sign at the city limits, some pioneers of the Texas Panhandle pretty much chased away any hopes of becoming the next Paris or Vienna.  
 It was God, Grass and Grit (as they say in Sherman County) that really mattered anyway, and the place names on the area map pretty well reflect the simple lifestyle enjoyed both above and below the Caprock.  
 For instance, you can bet things are pretty calm down by Wayside in Armstrong County.  
 Apparently settlers of the Halfway community in Hale County didn't intend that their little corner of the world be a destination point for travelers.  
 You might want to know a bit

about the history of these oddly named communities before you head in their direction.  
 If you're not the charitable type, you might want to avoid the Needmore community in Bailey County.  
 But don't let names fool you. Muleshoe and Twitty and towns such as Cactus in Moore County probably aren't as backwoods or lawless as their names might sound.  
 Some names not only sound funny, they look and spell funny, too. But once you've passed through Lazbuddie in Parmer County or Darrouzett in Lipscomb County, you'll probably remember the names even if you can't spell them or pronounce them.  
 If you examine place names in the region, you'll see that many spots on the map were named for things the settlers held dear to their hearts. Some early settlers loved their cattle so much they gave their hometowns names such as Bovina, in Parmer County, and Hereford, in Deaf Smith County.

Randall County. Settlers of Alanreed - also called "Gouge-Eye" by some folks in past times - in Gray County and Samnorwood in Collingsworth County decided just one name wasn't good enough for their communities. Another masculine towns is Claude, the county seat of Armstrong.  
 Adrian in Oldham County was named for a boy too, but he probably caught heck about his name.  
 Settlers also were fond of the wildlife that roamed the countryside and filled their pioneer stomachs. On the area map you'll find Turkey in Hall County, Quail in Collingsworth County and White Deer in Carson County.  
 Civilization was still on the minds of some area settlers. And, possibly to remind themselves of the gentler places they left behind, they came up with place names such as Memphis in Hall County, Miami - that's Mi-am-uh - in Roberts County, Shamrock in Wheeler County, Oslo in Hansford County, Wellington in Collingsworth County and Stratford in Sherman County.  
 Some settlers in Lamb County had a more multicultural view of life, so they named their hometown Earth.  
 Folks not in the know should be reminded that Sudan also is in Lamb County, not just in Africa. Canadian is nowhere near Alaska; and Jesus didn't grow up in Nazareth, although generations of Albrachts, Husemans and Schultes did.  
 Some place names are compromises. A classic example of Panhandle diplomacy is the naming of Dalhart, which lies at the border between Dallam and Hartley counties.  
 Texline, as its name implies, straddles the Texas-New Mexico line in Dallam County. Other straddlers are Texhoma, on the Texas-Oklahoma line in Sherman County; Texola, on the Texas-Oklahoma line in Beckham County, Okla.; and Texico, on the Texas-New Mexico line in Curry County, N.M.  
 Some places in the region sound happy or at least pleasant. If you're

blue you can head over to Sunnyside, Summerfield or Hart in Castro County; Happy in Swisher County; Sunray in Moore County; Amistad, which is Spanish for "friendship," in Union County, N.M.; Goodwell in Texas County, Okla.; Springlake in Lamb County; and Goodnight in Armstrong County.  
 Some settlers named towns for what they saw from the parlor window. Things didn't look so fancy in Hale County, so they got Plainview for the county seat. But don't be misled by "view" names either. Lakeview in Hall County isn't necessarily a weekend getaway for fishermen.  
 The Indians and the Spanish were the first to leave their marks on the local map. They were then followed by mostly Anglos whose tongues couldn't quite handle the names their predecessors left behind.  
 No one really knows where folks got the name for the Briscoe County town of Quitaque, even though some have surmised it means manure in some ancient Indian dialect. Only one pronunciation is really acceptable, and that's "Kitty-quay."  
 Many people say "Amarilluh" for Amarillo, the Spanish word for "yellow."  
 Oldham County's Wildorado, a Spanish-sounding name that railroad workers came up with, becomes "Wit-duh-raydo" on the Panhandle tongue.  
 Then there's Mobeetie (Old and New) in Wheeler County. It's supposed to be an Indian word for sweetwater, but like folks in Quitaque, Mobeetie residents are getting used to a revisionist history that suggests manure might be a more accurate translation.  
 Folks in the area also have their own way to pronounce a lot of other place names as well. Some pronounce Lefors in Gray County as "Lee-fors," but you stand to irritate town historian Norma Lantz if she hears you say it that way.  
 Panhandle, the Carson County seat and regions of Texas and Oklahoma, more often becomes "Pan-hannuhl." Down in Donley County, there's Howardwick, which sometimes sounds like "Hard-wick," and two other towns we already visited, Lelia Lake (Lee-ya Lake) and Clarendon (some say Clurn-don, others say Claring-don).  
 Morse in Hansford County sounds

a lot like "Morris" on a Panhandle tongue, and Plaska in Hall County sometimes comes out Pu-laska, sort of like Alaska with a P.  
 If you're from Swisher County, you know not to pronounce Vigo Park like Vee-go Park.

As it turns out, the pioneers settled a civilization of grass and sky, and they left us all a few things to chuckle over when we drive through it.

## Comedian charged in 'Tonight Show' fire

**BURBANK, Calif. (AP)** - Comedian Bobcat Goldthwait was charged Friday with two misdemeanors that could result in jail terms for setting a chair ablaze on "The Tonight Show."  
 During a May 6 show, Goldthwait stood up in the middle of his interview with Jay Leno and set his chair on fire. It was doused with cups of water.  
 "During that televised appearance Mr. Goldthwait lit a chair on fire using a lighter and lighter fluid. His actions created a significant danger of harm to himself and others," the city attorney's office said.  
 Goldthwait was charged with unlawfully causing a fire and possession of a flammable substance or device with the intent to burn property. Each count carries a

maximum \$1,000 fine and six months in jail.  
 Arraignment was scheduled for June 23.  
 "Bobcat never meant to hurt anyone," said Goldthwait's manager, Tim Ancill.  
 "It was a stupid thing to do," Leno said. "I don't think he meant any malice by it. I spoke to him afterward and he was very sorry. He did not understand the magnitude of what he'd done."  
 On April 29, Goldthwait trashed the set of "The Arsenio Hall Show" and spray-painted graffiti on the backdrop to protest the show's cancellation.

## Extension News

Consumers previously confused by milligrams, International Units and other measurements of food nutrients on food product labels will be able to breathe a sign of relief as they examine most new food products. As of May 1994, most packaged food items sold to consumers will have bearing a new and easier to understand label.

"Nutrition Facts" will be featured on most packages and will be in a simplified version over the older "Nutrition Information" label. There is a wealth of nutrition information at the consumer's access; however, deciphering the info became increasingly difficult with active and busy lifestyles and the inundation of so many new facts. Consumers requested information that would provide easily read and understood nutrition information.

Studies show that diet and health are more closely related to disease prevention. Prevention practices in choosing food products for overall health can be not only a healthy boon to a person but can actually assist in saving finances with fewer trips to medical facilities.

Thus a new label was designed to be "user-friendly." The next few week's columns will take a look at the individual parts of the new food label and how consumer's can use the label to their fullest advantage.

The most advantageous features of

the new label will be that a quick comparison of serving sizes will find like food products compared in identical amounts. No more comparison of ice creams where one brand states that a serving size is one cup while another list one-half cup. Fat grams, calories and other nutrition will be easily compared with standard serving sizes listed.

Consumers will also find that serving sizes will be more realistic in their amounts. This means that a

cookie with a serving size of one has been adjusted to a more realistic amount consumed by most consumers and will now be listed as two. Consumers will need to be very aware of their own dietary needs and keep in mind the number of servings recommended by the USDA on the Food Guide Pyramid.

Future columns will explain the Daily Values, Descriptors and health claims that will be a part of the Nutrition Facts and labeling.

### KEEP YOUR GLASSES LOOKING GOOD

Now that you've made an investment in a good-looking pair of prescription glasses or quality sunglasses, it makes good sense to protect them and keep them looking good. Here are a few tips:

- Use a case for your glasses whenever you're not wearing them.
- Clean off dust or lint from the glasses with a soft cloth, and use a lens cleaner to remove smudges and oils. Don't use fingernails to pick off a spot on a lens.
- Remove glasses gently with two hands. Pulling them off with one hand will strain a hinge and may cause the temple to break off.
- Similarly, don't wear glasses on top of your head; the temples will stretch out of shape.
- Never place glasses face down on a table or other surface. And never put them in a bag or pocket without a case.
- If your glasses have plastic frames, be careful not to leave them on the dashboard of your car on a sunny day.

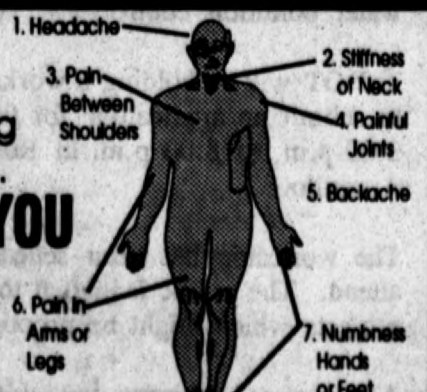

Tahini (tah-HEE-nee) is a thick paste made of ground sesame seed. Look for it in the foreign foods section of your grocery store or in Asian markets.  
**Chicken Salad with Tahini Sauce**  
12 ounces boneless, skinless chicken breast halves  
6 to 10 green onions  
2 small carrots  
1/4 cup tahini (sesame paste)  
3 tablespoons soy sauce  
3 tablespoons red-wine vinegar  
2 tablespoons salad oil  
2 teaspoons sugar  
1/2 to 1 teaspoon chili oil or 1/2 to 1 teaspoon crushed red pepper  
1 clove garlic, minced  
1 to 2 tablespoons brewed tea, cooled, or water (optional)  
4 to 6 cups shredded bok choy, romaine or Chinese cabbage  
2 to 3 tablespoons peanuts  
Place the chicken on the unheated rack of a broiler pan. Broil 4 to 5 inches from the heat for 12 to 15 minutes or until tender and no longer pink, turning once.  
Cut chicken into thin, bite-size strips. Cut green onions and carrots into julienne strips. In a large mixing bowl combine the cooked chicken, green onions and carrots. Cover and chill until serving time.  
For dressing, stir together tahini, soy sauce, vinegar, salad oil, sugar, chili oil or red pepper, and garlic. If necessary, thin to drizzling consistency with brewed tea or water.  
To serve, divide greens among four plates or place on a serving platter. Place chicken mixture atop greens. Top with dressing; sprinkle with peanuts. Makes 4 main-dish servings.

## Breast implant suit settlement proposed

If you or someone in your family has ever had a breast implant, a federal court in Alabama has important news for you.

You may be part of a class action suit for which several breast implant manufacturers have agreed to pay up to \$4,225,070,000. The money is to go toward payment to women with certain diseases or medical conditions. It may also be used for medical evaluations, expenses for removing the implant, implant ruptures and other injuries and emotional distress. You may be affected by the settlement if you have or had an implant containing silicone, silicone gel or saline, if your mother had one before you were born or if your spouse, other relative or "significant other" had one.

If you come within the class definition, you will automatically be considered a class member unless you exclude yourself by signing an "Exclusion Form" postmarked no later than June 17, 1994, and available from the Federal Court in Birmingham, Ala. If you decide to opt out, you will not receive any benefits under the settlements but

## No home is safe from termites

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# MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

## TERRIFIC WITH FOUR T'S

Over the years, I've met many pretty terrific people. Contrary to the headlines and the six-o'clock news, there are a lot of wonderful folks left in the world. You know the ones I mean. They are the folks whose name's come up from time-to-time and someone always exclaims, "Oh, what a terrific person."

Have you ever wondered what makes terrific people so terrific? Why are they so esteemed among their peers? Why are they so often sought out for advice? Why is their assistance crucial to the success of so any worthwhile projects?

I believe, if you study the lives of these terrific folks you'll find four traits that are always evident. I'd like to share them with you.

**Terrific Traits**

• **The Thorough Trait.** According to my dictionary, thorough means

to "carry through to the end" or to "be considerate of the details." Because so few of us ever carry out fully all the projects we start, thorough persons appear terrific by contrast.

I'll admit this is a characteristic I need to work on. Sometimes my follow through is weak. I need to work on carrying out the details.

Let me point out quickly that I'm not advocating that you should become a "detail nut" or a "perfectionist." I have seen folks who accomplish little because they focus on small, unimportant details. What I'm encouraging here is that we tackle a job and see it through to the end. If you become a stay-with-it person folks will think you're terrific.

• **The Tactful Trait.** Another characteristic of terrific folks is their tactful nature. They have a way of expressing thoughts - even negative thoughts - in a manner that offends no one.

I used to think that some folks were born with tact, and others totally without it. Now, I believe that the terrific person becomes tactful with studied practice. They carefully consider the feelings of others before blurring out the obvious. They are no less truthful than others, they just find ways to deliver the truth in non-offensive ways.

• **The Truthful Trait.** Ralph Waldo Emerson said, "Truth is the property of no individual but is the treasure of all men." Terrific people share this treasure. They make it a daily part of their lives. As politically incorrect as it may be today, truthfulness is a terrific trait.

Telling the truth is often more difficult than changing facts to suit the situation. Truth is refreshing where lies are discouraging. Truth is freedom. Lies make you a slave to more lies.

Truth is tactful. The poet, Robert Browning, said, "So absolutely good is truth, truth never hurts." There are times when

terrific people don't tell the truth. They don't lie either. When the truth would cause someone needless pain they say nothing. They are no less honest for keeping some thoughts to themselves. In fact, that is one more reason they're terrific folks - they're thoughtful.

• **The Thoughtful Trait.** Webster defines thoughtful as "considerate of others; kind." The terrific folks we know do care about the feelings of others. They are courteous and polite. Before taking any action that might hurt someone else, they think. Because they think, they avoid many troublesome situations. Thinking before acting and speaking is an admirable trait.

However, there is more to thoughtfulness than being considerate of others. Thoughtful can also mean to be careful and serious. The terrific person understands that you can only solve some problems by serious thought. You must carefully examine truth and facts. The person who can help you solve your problems through the wisdom of careful and objective consideration of facts is a valuable friend. In fact, they are terrific friends.

# Nixon knew a lot about war, peace, world politics

Richard Nixon, 37th president of the United States, may have accomplished more for the American people in death than he ever could while he was alive.

*Beyond Peace* was Nixon's 10th book. He died of the effects of a stroke while the final proofs were being edited and the publisher, Random House, rushed it into print.

Nixon knew a lot about peace, war, prosperity, and politics.

The man who was attacked -- some would say relentlessly -- by the liberal press and forced to resign from office because of a minor burglary, had few peers when it came to understanding world politics and the American public.

I may have gotten the first copy of *Beyond Peace* in Hereford, thanks to the efforts of Diller-A-Dollar Bookstop, 149 N. 25 Mile Ave. You can reserve your copy (\$23), by calling Margaret Diller at 364-8564.

Now about the book. Nixon is not a humorous man. If it's funny stories you want, except for a couple of exceptions, forget it. Buy something by Lewis Grizzard.

But if you want insight into the

inner workings of the Kremlin and Red China, this book is for you.

Nixon is still a conservative -- he points out that while free-market capitalism has triumphed around the world, most liberals seem to have "learned nothing from the experience."

He is especially critical of the media, saying it "bears a large share of the responsibility for the loss of faith in American political institutions...and is far more hostile to conservatives than to liberals."

He blasts the media for "giving credence to the ludicrous notion that Lyndon Johnson and other officials engaged in a vast conspiracy in the assassination of President Kennedy."

Nixon writes, "They gave serious treatment and positive reviews to the movie 'JFK', which blended historical fact with blatantly malicious fiction." And he attacks the character assassinations of Clement Haynsworth, Robert Bork, and Clarence Thomas as "disgraceful."

I liked this paragraph by the late president. "Journalists have always been an arrogant breed. Bert Andrews of the New York Herald-Tribune, who worked with me on the Alger Hiss case, once told me the problem

with some of his colleagues who covered the State Department was that instead of writing about the Secretary of State, they write as if they were the Secretary of State."

He also notes, "A productive evening spent peering through a politician's bedroom window can be the key to a prestigious editorship and someday a shot at the Chair in the Media and Public Responsibility at any number of universities."

Nixon will strike a chord across the nation with his notes on crime and race in America.

Fear of violence is everywhere, he writes. Besides a breakdown of values and a lack of discipline, many teenagers simply don't have any sense of right and wrong -- and he specifically mentions blacks.

Most politicians don't want to appear racist, Nixon declares. To avoid offending minorities, these political leaders refuse to address the question of race when it affects the crime epidemic.

"This cultural gag order must be lifted if the United States is to overcome the centrifugal forces of fear and envy that threaten to tear it apart," he writes.

"What is truly racist is to avoid

addressing the problems of black America for the sake of avoiding offending people's sensibilities."

The breakdown of the family is worst in the urban underclass, says Nixon. He blames it for "plagues of violent crime and drug abuse" that fill the streets of most major cities.

"In 1992, half of all murder victims in the United States were black," Nixon charges. "Ninety per cent were killed by other blacks."

"There can be no more dramatic evidence of a culture's deficiencies of values, discipline, and hope than when it turns against itself."

He isn't through. "Arsonists, looters, muggers, and rioters burn, rob, and brutalize not

because they are poor but because they are rotten," writes Nixon. "Today's vicious young predators...kill not for food, but for a pair of fancy sneakers."

He finishes his indictment of the underclass with a blunt appraisal.

"The harsh but uncomfortable reality is that many of these young Americans are virtually beyond hope," writes Nixon.

"A collapsed bridge can be replaced and an unsafe building torn down. But human infrastructure is not subject to quick fixes, despite the routine wheedlings of professional poveritarians who seize on any outbreak of violence as a pretext to plead for more public funds for themselves."

Nixon devotes more than half of the book to foreign policy. He urges the administration to drop the economic embargo on Cuba just like America welcomed China to the world market. And he warns that Russia, while weakened because of the breakup of the Soviet Union, is still the only nation with the capability of destroying America.

As I read the final page of the book, I couldn't help but compare Nixon's brilliance and understanding with the current Clinton Administration and its bunch of rank amateurs running amok in Washington D.C.

And like many other Americans, I have to ask for the 1000th time: why did Watergate ever happen?


## First human case of enterocolitis caused by canine hookworm reported

ATLANTA, GA -- The first case of human enterocolitis, or intestinal inflammation, caused by canine hookworm has been reported in the U.S., according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The enterocolitis, involving a 7-year-old girl in Louisiana, was caused by a secondary hookworm infection, possibly contracted from the family dog. Treatment based on that diagnosis cured her symptoms and eliminated the


infection. Enterocolitis Linked to Hookworm While this is the first case of enterocolitis caused by canine hookworm reported in the U.S., "our primary concern is that this really isn't such an isolated case," says Dr. Peter Schantz, a veterinarian and epidemiologist with the CDC in Atlanta, Ga. "There may be cases of enterocolitis that are not properly traced to their actual cause."

Dr. Schantz notes that in northeastern Australia, the incidence of enterocolitis is exceptionally high, and canine hookworm has been found to be the cause in many cases. "In the U.S., we tend to think of hookworm infections as causing only skin problems," he says. "But this new case in the United States shows us that although human infections are rare, they can have serious consequences. If in fact canine hookworms are more common than we think in humans, we need to be aware of that and encourage pet owners to take steps to minimize the risk to themselves and their families." How Humans can be Infected


Hookworms can be a particular problem in areas with warm, moist, sandy soil. Hookworm infections in people usually occur through direct skin contact with hookworm larvae in contaminated soils. They can also occur when children ingest dirt contaminated by dog feces.

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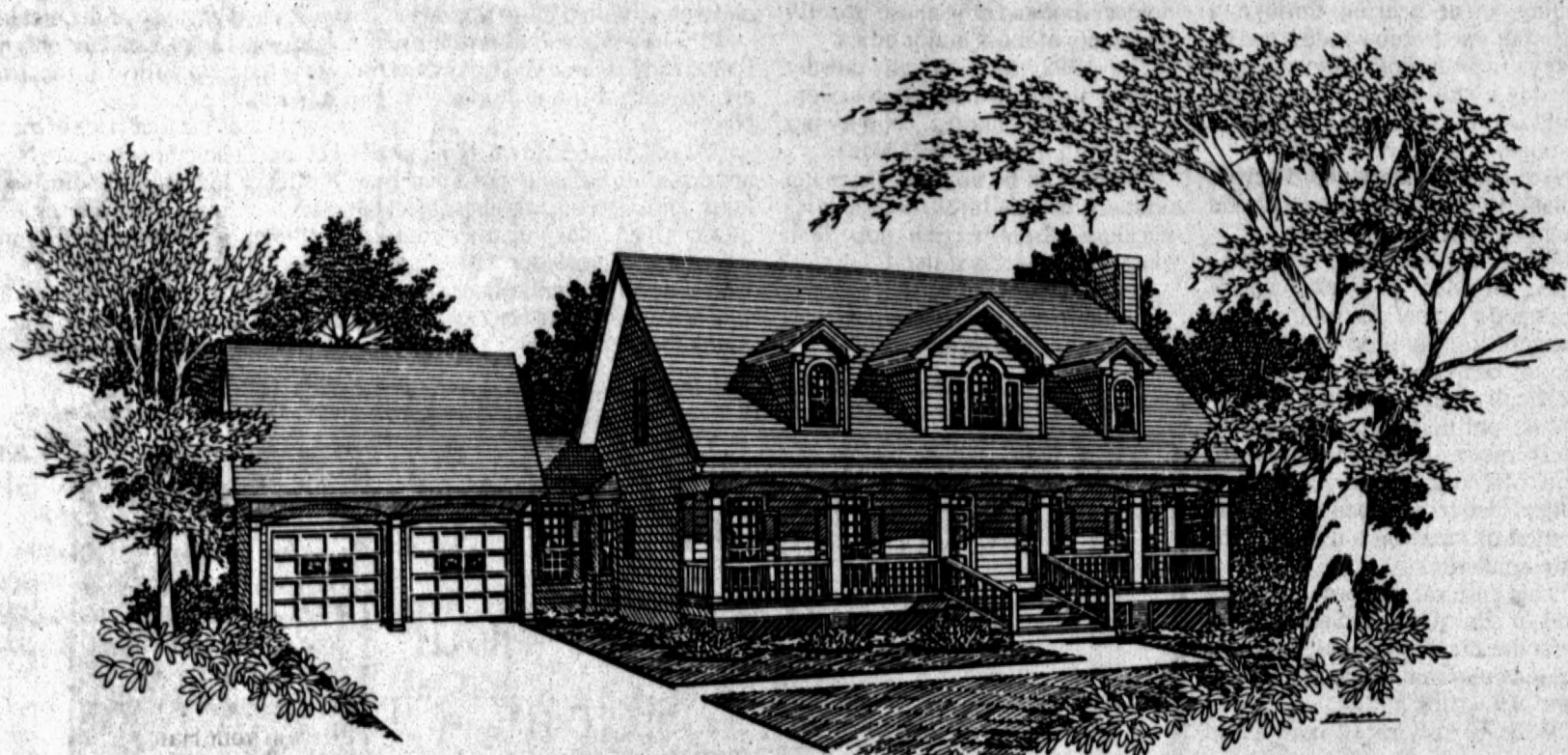

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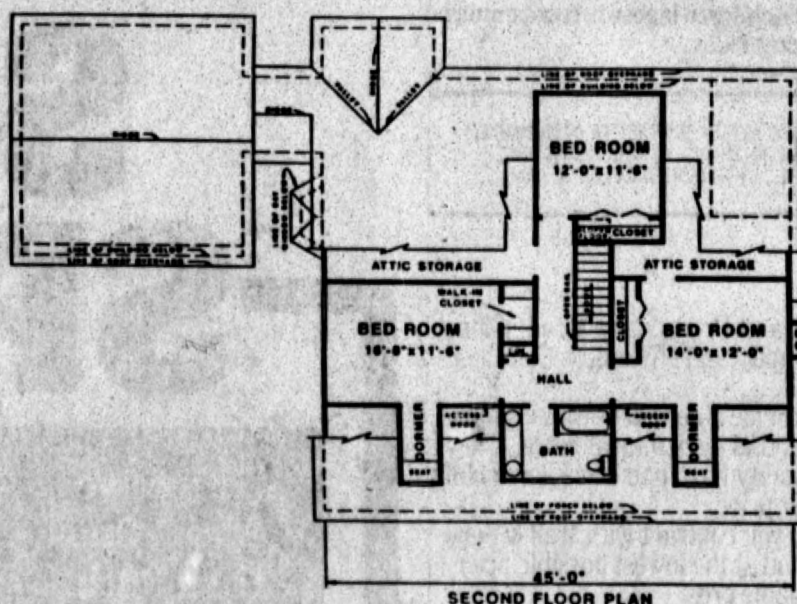
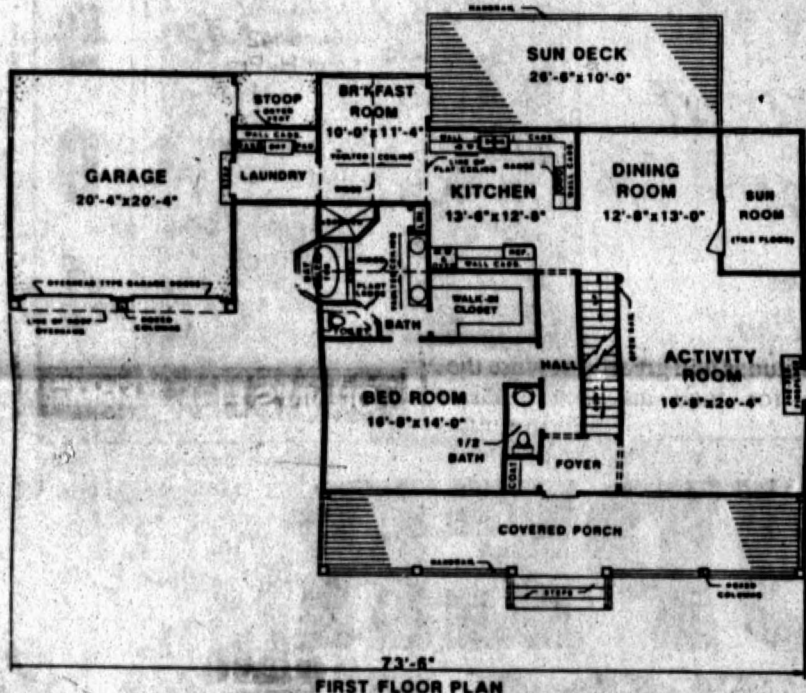

## Question/Answer

**Q:** I read recently that an estimated 74 percent of suburban homes as well as city apartments built before 1980 contain paint with dangerous levels of lead. Is there a way I can determine if my home was painted with these high-lead paints?

**A:** You should be aware that not only are paint flakes a potential health hazard, but so is paint dust, which can develop during renovation or as a result of the rubbing action of window sashes.

To learn whether or not you have lead-based paint in your house, you can test for lead using Lead Check Swabs. Each swab is a self-contained cartridge containing a chemical that is highly specific for lead. According to the manufacturer, it will not produce a false positive result.

In addition to checking for lead in paint, the swabs can be used to test for lead in ceramic glazes, dinnerware, food cans, solder, toys, and

dust. Lead Check can be purchased at hardware stores and home centers. A four-pack sells for about \$8.

**Q:** I have a question that concerns fireplaces with glass doors. Both have the same basic problem - how to supply cold outside air for combustion so they won't draw warm air from the house and send it up the chimney. One fireplace is built in a room at grade level, and the other is in a basement room below grade level.

**A:** Both of these fireplaces will benefit from an appliance venting kit designed to supply fresh air for stoves and fireplaces. It feeds air in through 4-inch diameter ducts and may be used for distances as long as 25 feet.

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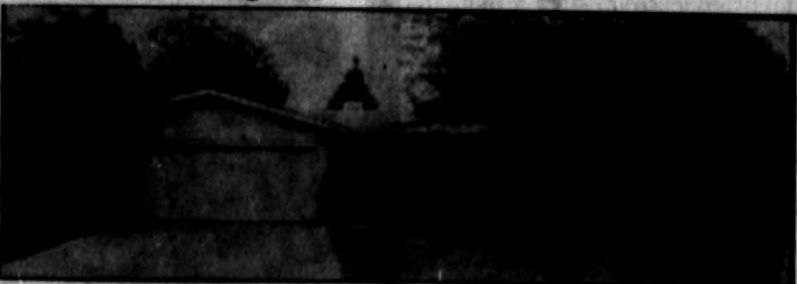
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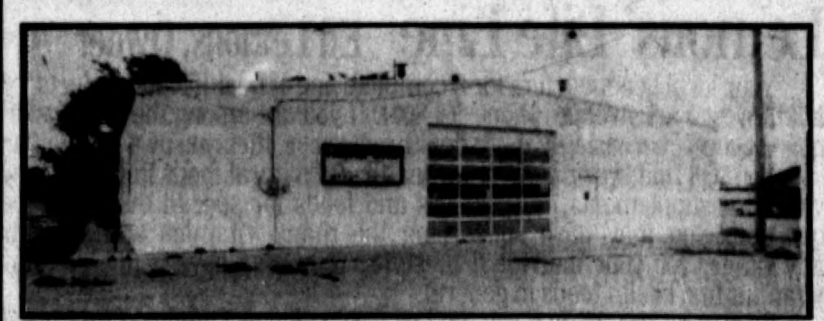

## Wheat Field Day to assess weather damage to crops

Area producers will gather Thursday at the Bushland center for an annual Wheat Field day. Among topics will be an assessment of the damage to crops from late-spring cold weather.

Registration will begin at 11:30 a.m. at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and USDA-Agricultural Research Service-Conservation and Production Research Laboratory, west of Bushland.

Scientists report that the impact of the late cold weather still is being assessed although producers are concerned that the 1994 crop yield will be reduced by the weather.

The program will begin at noon with a dutch-treat barbecue lunch. Opening the program, Dr. Steve Amosson, extension agricultural economist, will present an economic

Prospects of new "value-added" market opportunities will be reviewed by Myron McCartor of the Perryton Economic Development Corporation. Richard Winter of the Texas Department of Agriculture will talk about seed certification.

After a talk by Dr. Ed Runge, head of soil and crop sciences at Texas A&M University, the keynote address will be delivered by D.G. "Bill" Nelson, executive vice president of Texas Wheat Producers Board and Producer Association.

Hourly bus tours will be conducted to separate field research areas.

Dr. David Worrall, wheat breeder with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Vernon, will discuss irrigated varieties at one stop.

At another stop, Dr. Clay Salisbury, experiment station scientist at Amarillo, will discuss drought

tolerance studies. Dr. Mark Lazar, TAES wheat geneticist, will highlight research results achieved in dryland nurseries.

Other reports will be given by Reggie Jones and Arland Schneider, USDA researchers; Dr. Judy Tolok, plant physiologist; Tom Marek, TAES, and Don Dusek, USDA, agricultural engineers; Dr. Jerry Michels, entomologist; Charles Rush and Cathy Vaughn, plant pathologists.

Field tours will end at 4 p.m.

Dr. Mark Lazar, TAES wheat geneticist, and Dr. Brent Bean, extension agronomist and experiment station weed scientist, are co-chairing this year's event, in cooperation with the USDA laboratory director, Dr. R. Nolan Clark.

## State agency offers urban forest grants

COLLEGE STATION - Communities throughout Texas are being invited to apply for grants for funds that will be used as "seed money" for projects aimed at starting or improving local urban forestry programs.

Offered by the Texas Forest Service through the Urban and Community Forestry Development program, the grants must be used for purposes outlined by TFS.

Among funding opportunities are education projects that promote better understanding of urban forests, funding for staff positions to direct local urban forestry activities and demonstration projects that illustrate proper urban forestry techniques, such as pruning and planting.

Total grant money available is \$300,000. The maximum grant will be for \$10,000, except for first-time applications for staff positions which have a ceiling of \$15,000.

Grants must be matched by at least 50 percent of the total project cost, and matching funds must not be from federal sources. Local contributions may be "in-kind" to include such elements as labor, or donated products or services from third parties. Eligible groups are cities, counties, schools or other non-profit organizations.

Deadline for applications to be received by TFS is June 10. Application packets may be obtained at local forest service offices or by calling TFS Forest Resource Development Department in College Station, 409-845-2641.

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## Population could outstrip food production capability

WASHINGTON (AP) - A record explosion in the world's population will outstrip food production in coming years without adequate research on new farming technologies and food policies, says a food research group.

"Over the next 20-30 years, farmers and policy-makers in developing countries will be challenged to provide food at affordable prices for almost 100 million more people every year - the largest annual population increase in history," said Per Pinstrup-Andersen, director general of the International Food Policy Research Institute.

"Moreover, they will have to increase food production from more productive use of the land and without further degradation of natural resources - (farm) area expansion is no longer a feasible option in most of the world," he said.

Pinstrup-Andersen is author of a recent report entitled "World Food Trends and Future Food Security." His organization was established in 1975 to identify and analyze policies

for meeting food needs of the developing world.

It conducts research on ways to achieve sustainable food production, improve nutrition and income levels of the poor, enhance the links between agriculture and other sectors of the economy and improve trade and economic conditions.

Pinstrup-Andersen said agricultural research, by producing new varieties of important food crops that yield more food per acre and are more resistant to pests and diseases, saved millions of people from starvation in the 1960s and 1970s.

"Given the long lag time between investment in agricultural research and the resulting production increases, failure to invest today will show up in production shortfalls 10 to 20 years from now," Pinstrup-Andersen said. "The problems associated with environmental degradation will present themselves sooner. We must not wait until a global food crisis is upon us or until the last tree has fallen to make these investments."

About 97 percent of the record population increases will occur in

developing countries, the report said, with Africa bearing 34 percent of the growth.

Yields of the world's three most important food crops - corn, rice and wheat - doubled between 1961 and 1991 in developing countries, the report said. But grain production per person seems to have stagnated since the mid-1980s, it said.

Two-thirds of all developing countries recorded stagnant or reduced per capita food production during 1991-92, the last years for which figures were available.

The institute estimated that by 2000, the current grain shortage of 14 million tons could increase to about 50 million tons in Africa alone.

"Population growth rates of these magnitudes will greatly increase the need for food and other basic necessities, severely constraining efforts to improve per capita income and well-being in developing countries," Pinstrup-Andersen said.

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# Years of togetherness ends at graduation

The three young people pounced on the decade-old color photograph, ooh-ing and aah-ing at the memories it resurrected.

They commented on hair styles, clothing and the various individuals pictured in four somewhat even rows.

Sometimes, she added, the teacher would throw the treats to her students.

The three laughed about their junior high years.

Lyles said they were able to take "real classes" there, while Miss Campbell allowed that "We thought we were hot."

Miss Campbell -- who, with Miss Liscano, is graduating with honors, holding a grade average above 100 -- said she "just went (to school). I had fun."

After graduation, the three long-time friends will go their separate ways, as will the entire Class of 1994.

"I'll feel more comfortable" at WTAMU, Miss Liscano said, knowing she has some Hereford friends on campus with her.

But after the first few minutes, she began making new friends and stepping out into new groups of companions.

Lyles faces a different challenge, going to Texas A&M University in College Station, where he will be with very few HHS graduates.

# Herd athletes hoping for college careers

## Scholarships await some, while others may walk on



### Hard at work

Hereford High football standout Mark Kuper (85) has a leg on a Palo Duro runner during a game last fall. This coming fall he hopes to be doing much the same at the University of Texas, where he will be attending on a football scholarship. Football coach Danny Haney said other Herd football players plan to walk on at other colleges in hopes of continuing their football careers for a few more years.

For most senior athletes, that walk across the stage means the games are finished. It's time to enter reality, and except for intramurals and YMCA leagues, organized sports are usually not a part of reality.

For a select few members of the Hereford High School Class of '94, the games will go on. Kara Sandoval, Katie Young and Michelle Brock will play volleyball at Vernon Regional Junior College, while football player Mark Kuper will wear the burnt orange of the Texas Longhorns on fall Saturdays.

Kuper was a unanimous all-district selection for two years at defensive end and this year at tight end. He doesn't know which position he'll end up in at UT.

In two years with the Herd, he made 141 tackles--22 for losses and 15 quarterback sacks on defense and caught 15 passes for 231 yards and five touchdowns on offense.

The trio of volleyball players follow two other former Herd spikers to Vernon: Kyanne Lindley ('92) and Erin Bullard ('93).

"Kyanne and Erin have been really good representatives," Herd coach

Brenda Reeh said. "(The Vernon coach has) been pleased with their fundamentals and work ethic. Those things impressed her with those kids, and she wanted more."

Most of the other Herd athletes have chosen to get on with their lives, though football coach Danny Haney said a few of his former pupils may try to walk on the squads somewhere.

Most HHS coaches said their best players looked at a few small colleges, then just decided to call it a career. Misty Dudley, a three-letter winner in girls' basketball, even got a partial scholarship offer to play at Clarendon Junior College, but she passed it up to attend—but not play at—West Texas A&M University, Herd coach Eddie Fortenberry said.

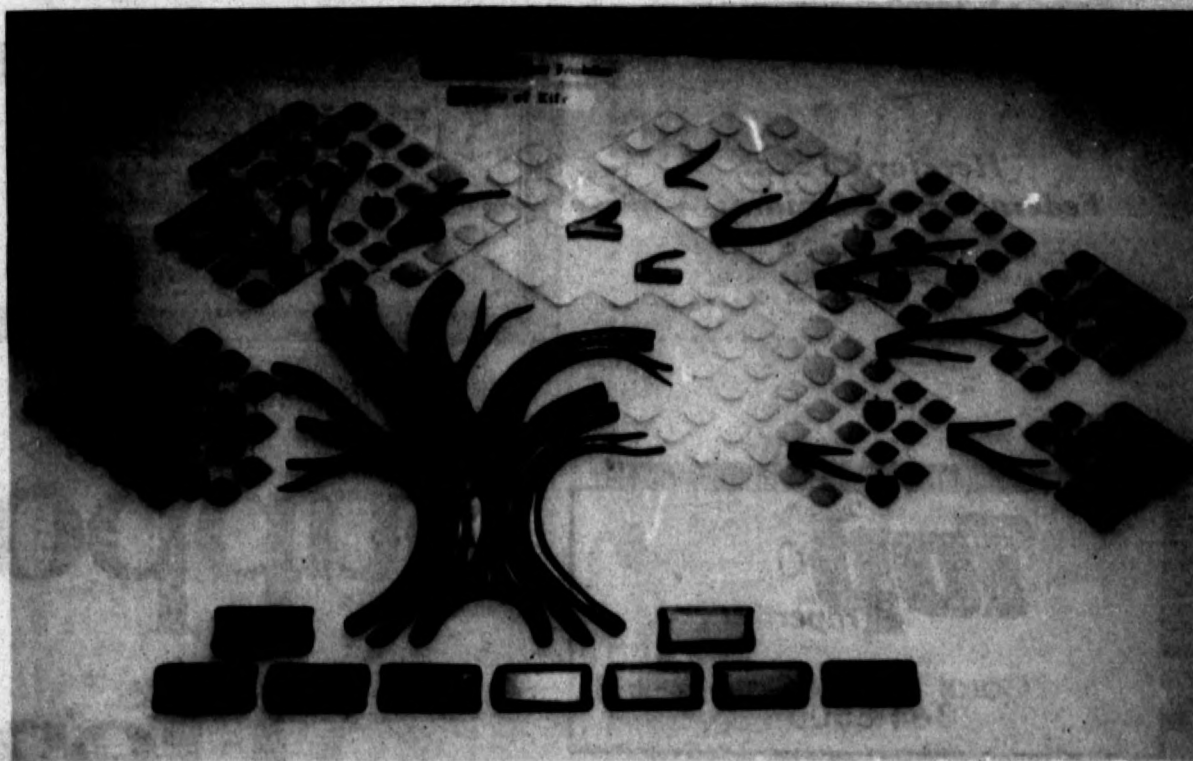

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# Contributions can be other than cash

Many charitable gifts are made in the form of property other than cash, ranging from simple gifts in the form of clothes given to a local church to more complex transfers of ownership interests in an ongoing business, even life insurance policies on the life of the grantor.

Generally, anything of value can be given away and a deduction from taxable income can be taken for the gift's fair market value. Not surprisingly however, if not done correctly there are some traps for

unsuspecting taxpayers.

If the deduction taken for a gift is less than \$500, the only thing a taxpayer needs is a receipt from the charitable organization which acknowledges the gift, and provides the organization's name, date and value of the gift, and a reasonable description of the items given to the organization.

Things become a little more complex when the amount of the gift gets over \$500. If the deduction claimed is more than \$500, but not over \$5,000, not only is a receipt from the charitable organization required, the taxpayer also must have

in his or her records information that shows how the property was obtained (i.e. purchase, bequest, gift), the approximate date of acquisition and the tax basis of the property. In addition, Form 8283 must be completed and attached to the grantor's tax return.

Once the tax deduction becomes \$5,000 or greater for a gift of one kind of property or a group of similar kinds of property, not only does the taxpayer have to include the above information, he or she also has to obtain and attach to the tax return an appraisal (reported on Form 8283) which will justify the amount of the

deduction.

The appraisal must be obtained prior to the due date of the return on which the deduction is claimed, and in addition, must:

\*Be prepared not earlier than 60 days before the date of the gift.

\*Be prepared, signed and dated by a qualified appraiser.

\*Include a description of the property; its physical condition; the date of the contribution; any terms of an agreement by the donor concerning the property's use or sale; the

name, address, qualifications, background and taxpayer identification number of the appraiser.

\*Include a statement that the appraisal was prepared for income tax purposes.

\*Show the date of the valuation and the properties fair market value on the valuation date, as well as the method used to value the property.

In addition, the fee paid for the appraisal cannot be based upon the value. In other words, it cannot be contingent.

As with all tax rules, the above requirements usually apply; however, there are exceptions. For example, these rules are not required in the case of gifts of securities in publicly traded companies where the values are listed on a national or regional market.

"Star Trek: The Next Generation" is going off the air this week. The highly rated syndicated series, a spin-off of NBC's original "Star Trek" (often referred to as "Trek Classic"), ends with a special two-hour episode appropriately titled "All Good Things ..." (check local listings for time, day and channel).

In the final episode, powerful trickster Q (John de Lancie) sends Capt. Picard (Patrick Stewart) back and forth through time. Picard finds himself on a dangerous journey that could end with him destroying all of humanity.

The episode also will feature Denise Crosby, who played Tasha Yar and the Romulan character Sela.

The story will lead into the first of what is hoped to be many "Next Generation" films, scheduled for release this winter. Tentatively titled "Star Trek: Generations," the film will also feature Capt. Kirk (William Shatner), Scotty (James Doohan) and Chekov (Walter Koenig) from "Trek Classic."

In addition to the final episode, Trekkers, Trekkies, Trekheads and everyone else who watches the show can also enjoy a one-hour retrospective and a collection of five favorite episodes selected by viewers through a 900-telephone number.

Cast members, however, didn't need to make the call to select favorites.

"(My favorite episode is) 'The Offspring,'" says Stewart, naming the episode in which Data (Brent Spiner) creates an android daughter, "because it represents all of the things that we have always tried to do on 'Star Trek.'"

"Also, it has another brilliant perfor-

mance from Brent Spiner, matched by an equally fine performance by Hallie Todd (the daughter), and because it marked the first opportunity given by the studio for one of us to direct an episode, which Jonathan Frakes did outstandingly."

Frakes plays Cmdr. William Riker, called Number One by his captain. He lists "The Offspring" as one of his favorites.

"And I also liked '11001001' because I got to play music in New Orleans," Frakes adds, naming an early episode with aliens who communicate through binary code (1's and 0's, hence the title) and attempt to hijack the Enterprise. The scene Frakes describes features him playing trombone in a re-creation of a New Orleans jazz club.

Marina Sirtis, whose beauty has captured many Trek-based hearts, plays Counselor Deanna Troi. For a while her half-human, half-alien (Betazoid) character seemed doomed to being sensitive window dressing. But the producers gave her character some guts in action-oriented episodes.

"My favorite episode is 'Face of the Enemy' because it was not a 'girlie' episode," Sirtis says, referring to an episode where Deanna awakens surgically altered and on a surprise undercover mission. "Any of the crew could have been transformed into a Romulan. Troi was chosen because she was an empath, not because she was a female. The fans seem to agree. It was the highest-rated episode last season."

But after 178 episodes, the Enterprise and her noble crew leave the television universe for a silver screen galaxy of full-length films and box office returns. As the ship leaves space dock, cries of "Bon voyage!" join hopes that TV's loss will be a movie-goer's gain.

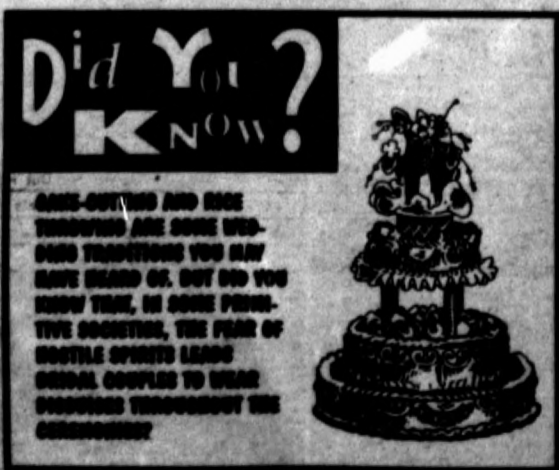

The tournament pairs competitors from the NFL with some of the top senior players in the world. ESPN presents final-round coverage from the Upper Montclair Country Club in Clifton, N.J., on Sunday, May 22.

A field of 56 players from each of the NFL's 28 teams competes in a three-day, 54-hole event. The field is cut to 26 for the final round, when each football player will be matched up with three senior golfers.

Players who expressed early commitment to the tournament include San Francisco 49ers quarterback Steve Young, Buffalo Bills quarterback Jim Kelly, Tampa Bay Buccaneers rookie quarterback Trent Dilfer and last year's NFL Players' champ, Houston Oilers kicker Al Del Greco.

"To have this caliber of players this early in the commitment process is exciting," Hal Stewart, the tournament's executive director says. "It shows the popularity of our event throughout the National Football League."

All of the NFL players' prizes, totaling a purse of \$125,000, are donated to a charity of the players' choice.

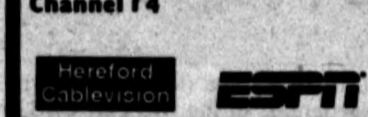

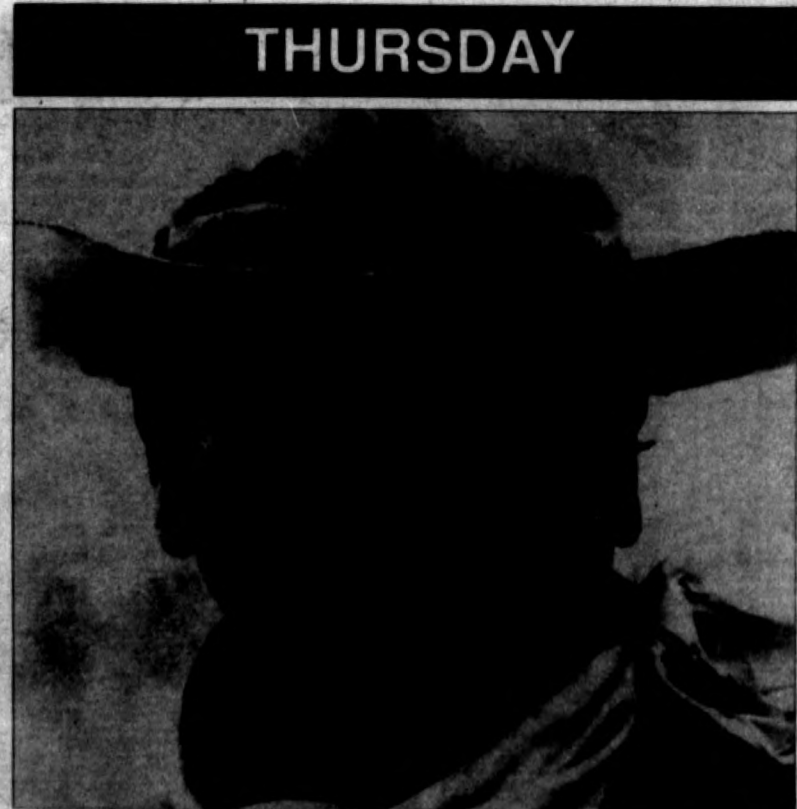

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## 'Masters of Illusion' shows secrets behind movie magic

Hosts Roy Scheider and Jonathan Brandis of "seaQuest DSV" guide viewers behind the scenes for a look at special effects magic in "Masters of Illusion: The Wizards of Special Effects." The hour-long special airs Sunday, May 22, on NBC.

Never-before-seen footage includes in-depth examination of how some of the biggest blockbusters in Hollywood history - including the "Star Wars" trilogy - achieved some of their striking visual effects. Included are scenes of Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio in a

two-foot model submarine for "The Abyss." Sigourney Weaver's climactic confrontation with the 17-foot-tall Alien Queen in "Aliens" and Patrick Swayze's ascension to heaven at the end of "Ghost."

The special also examines the groundbreaking effects of George Lucas' Industrial Light and Magic, the company that revolutionized the movie industry by creating a mercurial liquid "morphing" technique for the supervillain in "Terminator 2."

Guest stars Charlton Heston, Bob Hoskins ("Who Framed Roger Rabbit?"), Robert Englund ("Nightmare on Elm Street"), Michael Dorn ("Star Trek: The Next Generation"), Leslie Nielsen (the "Naked Gun" movies), Robert Patrick ("Terminator 2") and director-producer Lucas pay tribute to some of their favorite special effects segments.

Famous scenes, such as Luke Skywalker's attack on the Death Star in the original "Star Wars," are broken

down step-by-step to allow viewers to learn how these moments were created. Additionally, Scheider and Brandis pay a visit to Alterian Studios, one of the world's leading makeup and animatronic studios, to demonstrate the art of creating animatronics, matte paintings and life casts.

There have been other behind-the-scenes documentaries on special effects wizardry. But NBC's special manages to cram an almost inconceivable amount of material into the space of one hour - and it is related by actors and technicians who have a real enthusiasm for their work. This one's a gem.
