The announcement of the rate followed an agreement between the Texas-New Mexico Utilities Company and the REA authorities. Working on a sliding scale with several regulations, the wholesale rate will run around one cent, he

To Set Retail Rate

Although the Corporation was not at liberty to announce retail, rate, Mr. Hennen did add that two factors would be added to the wholesale rate, including a sinking fund to retire the government loan for building of lines, and operating-maintenance cost of the lines.

Estimating upon the basis proposed for usage, a fair guess as to actual rate would be approximately one and one-balf cents per KW for pump use, and from eight down to two cents per KW for domestic use; domestic rates will likely carry a minimum rate and will vary with the amount of elec-
