

Examine his credentials. "Investigate him and the pub-

lication he represents. "Insist on knowing what he

represente "The street address of the beadquarters of his publication or or-

canization. Who its officers are.

"How often the magazine or paper is published.

"Just what becomes of the money you might pay him for ad-

Check up on him through your local organization.

"We ask you to take this precaution in the interest of law enforcement," the warning continued, "and also to save yourself from being 'bilked' by fakers who are now, and have in the past, reaped an illicit harvest from Texas business men with no return to you for the investment made. Keep in touch with your Chamber of Commerce, Better Business Bureau, Retail Merchants Association, and other local organizations.

"Investigate before you invest -read before you sign-and then keep a copy."


Women Enjoy **Making Clothes**







McDonald Will Disperse Breeding Herd: Move Few Head To Herefrod

All breeding stock on the D. L. McDonald farm, west of Amarillo, will be sold at a dispersion auction October 1, Mr. McDonald announced recently. The sale will be held at the ranch.

Twelve bulls, including the berd •bulls Prince Domino Axtell, Super-Superior, Jr., Superior Blanchard 3rd and Prince Brummel and 138 head of bred females will be offered to the highest bidders.

F In announcing the dispersion of his breeding stock, Mr. McDonald said he will retain 40 head of open heifers and a number of young bulls.

He will move the heifers and three of four young bulls which "are good herd bull prospects" to his farm near Hereford, where they will be run on irrigated native grass.

Other young bulls will be sold in the annual McDonald auction sale. the last week of next January, in Amarillo.

The McDonald berd was started in 1921 with five cows, the offspring of "Cudgell and Simpson stock brought to the Panhandle by Jowell & Jowell when the firm bought a portion of the famous herd.

"We have stayed close to the Cudgell and Simpson blood and have kept pedigrees straight down through the years," Mr. McDonald said. "We have consistently stepped the cattle up in quality."

Youth Drowns **Bringing Tragic End To Reunion**

COUSIN OF LOCAL RESI-DENTS IS BURIED AT MEMPHIS

A reunion of the Moreman family in Palo Duro Canyon took on a tragic ending in the death of Donald Hart Moreman, 17-year-old son of Mr. nad Mrs. Herlie Moreman of Bryce. The youth was also a cousin of Mrs. Ruby Sowell and of Fred Moreman, both of Hereford.

Fred Moreman and family at tended the reunion but Mrs. Sowell was unable to attend this year. She had attended three previous annual reunions, however.

Young Moreman suffered a broken neck and a pinched spinal cord when he dived into a sand bank in shallow water close to the last crossing in the park.

The accident happened at about 9:30 o'clock Sunday morning.

Rushed to an Amarillo hospital in the Palo Duro OCC camp ambulance, the youth was put on an operating table at 11:45 o'clock. Following the accident, he suf-

fered complete paralysis. Physicians operated in an at-

empt to relieve pressure on the pinal cord. Clinging tenaciously to the last

tope for life, young Moreman made a valiant struggle to live. He died at 5:30 o'clock.

Approximately 80 members of the Moreman family-coming from New Mexico, the Panhandle and parts of Texas-bad gathered in Palo Duro Park Sunday morning for the reunion.

A group of the men and boys, the youth's father among them, were swimming together when Donald was fatally injured. After he had dived into the
