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### Grads forced indoors; Hernandez is honored

If things had gone according to plan, the maroon-robed young people would have processed in two neat rows across La Plata Street to Whiteface Stadium Friday night.

They would have entered through the north gate, then walked to seats along the west side of the field.

From there, the graduation of the Hereford High School Class of 1995 would have gone on to its successful conclusion.

What happened instead was that the maroon-robed young people processed in two neat rows across the court of Whiteface Gymnasium, driven indoors by thunderstorms that

swept across Hereford until just before the 7 p.m. commencement ceremony began.

For the first time since 1988, graduation was limited to those with tickets and who could fit inside the gymnasium -- primarily immediate family members, along with some other relatives and close friends.

Still, the last-minute change in plans did little to stifle the exuberant mood of the 253 graduates as they celebrated the end of 12 years of compulsory education.

Once commencement began at 7:10 p.m. with the strains of "Pomp and Circumstance" welcoming the graduates, things proceeded smoothly and with at least some dignity.

The only real surprise of the evening came when HHS principal Terry Russell announced the Highest Honor Graduate.

In introducing the honoree, Russell noted that the young woman was a three-year member of National Honor Society, earned a gold medal at Academic Decathlon competition and participated in state UIL competition.

When Russell noted the winner also was a qualifier to perform at the national convention of the National Forensic League, spontaneous cheers and applause broke out and an obviously stunned Heather Hernandez walked to the podium to a standing ovation from graduates and school board members.

Miss Hernandez -- who was selected Highest Honor Graduate by the faculty of HHS -- wept openly as she was congratulated by Russell.

She was chosen, he said, based on academic achievement, character and dedication.

When the cheering and clapping quieted, Russell noted wryly that, "as you can see, she's a popular choice."

Valedictorian Karen Manchee and Salutatorian Bree Perrin had their moments in the spotlight Friday night as well, delivering their speeches of encouragement and challenge to their classmates.

Miss Perrin went first, telling her audience that, although we may not be able to control our circumstances, we can control how we react to them.

She said in example that, during graduation rehearsal, she was assigned a seat by teachers, which was out of her control. Looking around from that seat, she said, she saw her cousin on one side, but a young man on her other side she had never met.

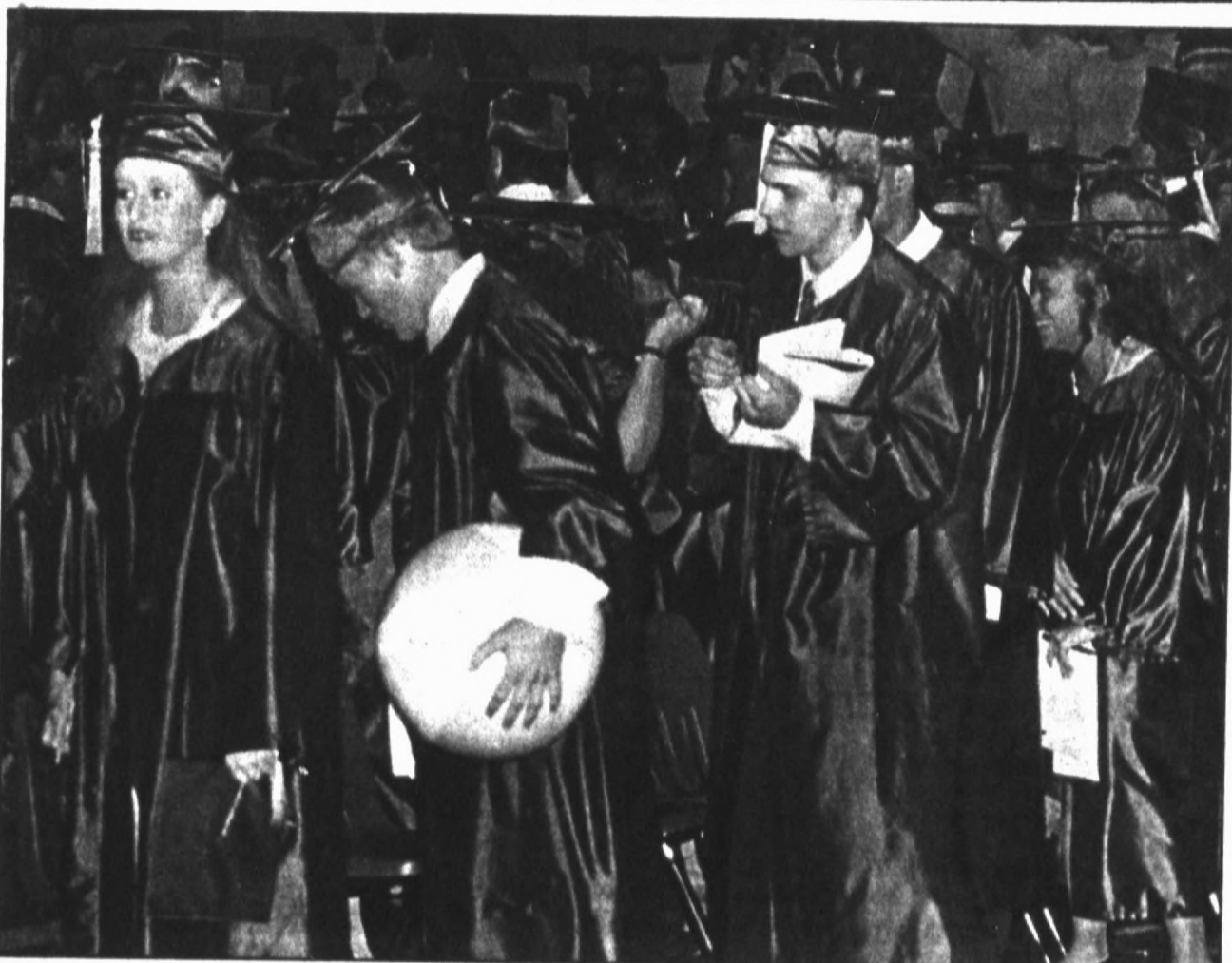
By controlling her reactions to the circumstance of forced seating, Miss Perrin said, she was able to get acquainted with someone new and make a new friend.

"I am very proud of my classmates," Miss Perrin said. "Being in this class was out of our control," but the students were able to use that circumstance to their advantage and graduate from high school.

In her valedictory address, Miss Manchee told the graduates that, up until now, their lives have been directed by others.

Now, however, they are having to take control of their own lives, with some deciding to go to college, some to enter the military, and others yet to enter the job force.

While telling her peers to have

### Senate cheers freer reins to improve Texas schools

AUSTIN (AP) - The hope that giving teachers and parents freer rein will improve Texas education clashed with the fear that loosening state controls will leave some children unprotected as the Senate overwhelmingly passed an education overhaul Friday.

"I predict that magnet schools are going to be erected. ... The vocational schools will all be minorities, and the academic schools will be Anglo," said Sen. Gregory Luna, D-San Antonio.

He was the lone Senate vote against the bill, which still requires a final House OK before being forwarded to Bush, who plans to sign it.

Luna also said children whose parents are unable or unwilling to become involved in their schooling won't be able to take advantage of its

potential for improvement.

But Bush, who campaigned on shifting education control to the local level, disagreed with Luna's assessment.

"There is no intent in this law to re-segregate in any shape, form or fashion. ... It's just not going to happen in the state of Texas," said Bush, who watched the Senate action.

He noted that the other minority senators backed the bill in the 30-1 vote. The bill is a compromise between earlier House and Senate versions of education reform.

"I think this bill ... will encourage debate, encourage people at the local level to get involved, and I think this is going to be an exciting time for education in Texas," Bush said.

"This is a good bill for Texas." Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, bill sponsor, said he'd seek to change the measure "if there's ever any evidence that this bill should

lead to any kind of re-segregation."

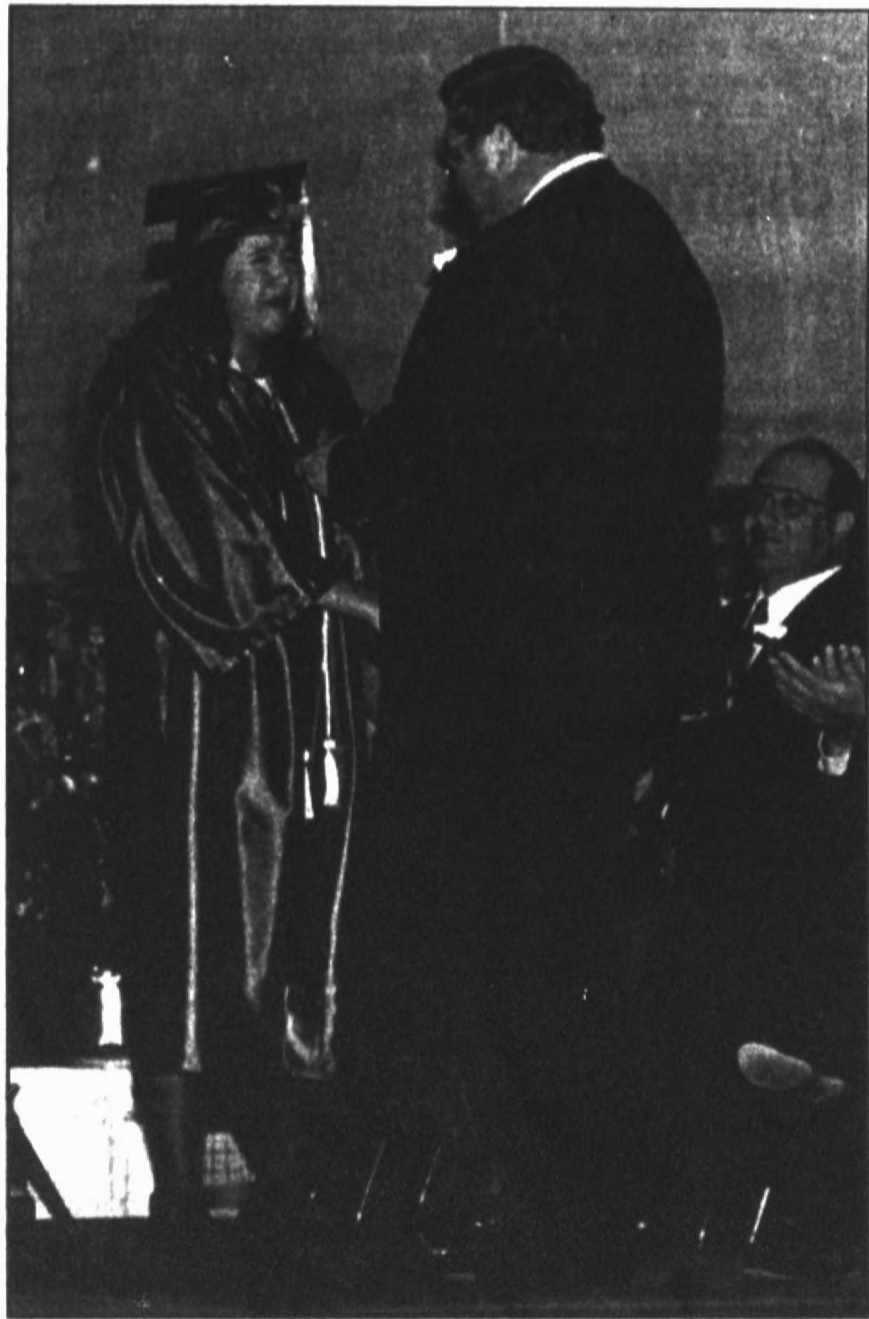
A cornerstone of the bill is creation of home-rule school districts, an idea that Texas apparently would be the first to try. Such districts would be free from many state regulations with local voters' approval of home-rule charters.

The bill also would allow parents and teachers to obtain charters to create their own programs, such as magnet schools for math or science, again with freedom from many state rules.

The State Board of Education, in addition, could grant up to 20 charters for open-enrollment schools that would be exempt from many state rules and could draw students from all over.

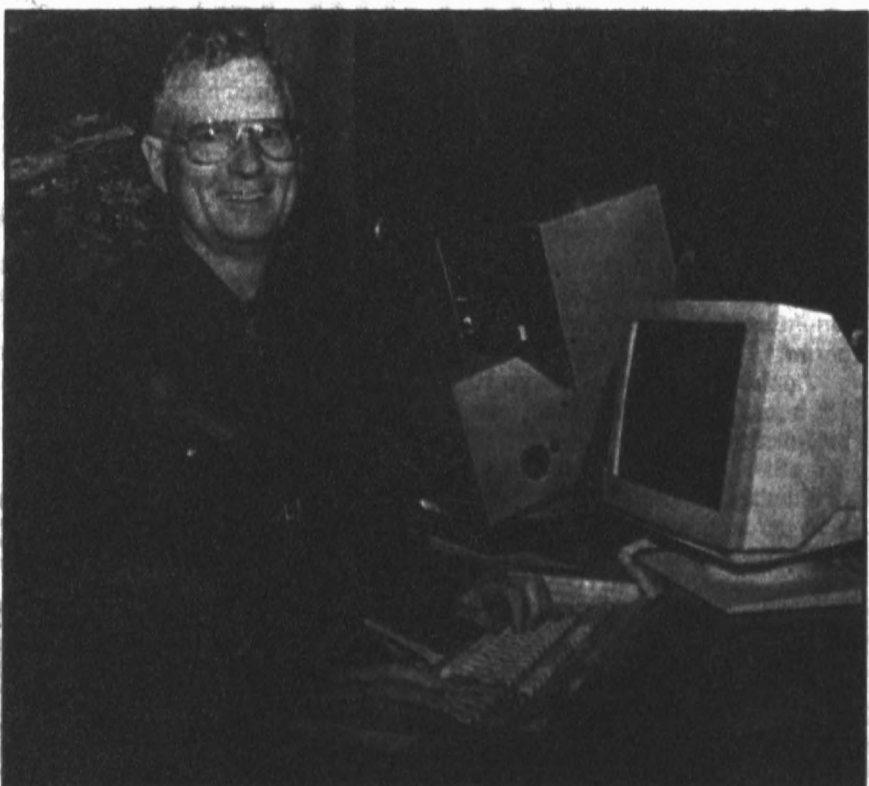
Some rules would continue to apply, including the requirement for students' progress to be assessed on

### Veteran trooper retiring

### 28 years of driving tests ends

For veteran DPS officer Jim Ward

Trooper Jim Ward, a quiet-spoken man who nevertheless may sometimes have been an awesome figure to beginning drivers, will trade his uniform for civilian clothes May 31.

Ward is the man who, for 28 years, has administered driver's license tests to beginning drivers or newcomers to the state. His territory has, at various times, included Canyon, Dimmitt, Vega, Friona and Farwell, as well as Hereford.

The Department of Public Safety driver's license division examiner is retiring after 28 years and four months with the DPS. He has been assigned to Hereford for all but the four months when he was in DPS training.

Deaf Smith County officials and DPS troopers and employees combined forces last week to honor Ward as he approaches retirement. The reception was held in the courthouse.

Since joining the DPS, Ward has conducted driving tests for thousands of beginning drivers, or motorists

whose license expired or who moved from another state.

He estimates he's given "maybe 5,000" driving tests through the years.

There have been some hair-raising experiences with drivers, he admits, and tells about one young woman who appeared sometime in the '70s for a test.

"She had parked on the north side of the courthouse, across from the library," he explained. "I asked her to start the engine while I conducted a check of lights, signals, brakes, etc.

"She kept the motor racing while I was looking at the car and I thought she'd let up. But, she didn't, so I told her to take her foot off the accelerator."

The applicant followed his instructions and after he got into the car, he fastened his seatbelt and "tried to console her."

Ward noted that she was "very nervous and I tried to calm her."

Finally, he told her to put the car in reverse and back into the street.

"She put her foot on the accelerator and had the motor racing when she

slipped it into gear, without her foot on the brake.

"The car just shot across the street into a car parked in the library parking lot," Ward remembered.

The DPS trooper was shaken by the experience but tried to soothe the young woman.

"I told her to get out of the car and I'd park it," he said. "I told her she'd have to come another time to take the test, that she was disqualified at this time."

"I don't think she ever came back." Most of Ward's work with the DPS has been less exciting than that particular event.

Since he began his career with the DPS, Ward has seen many changes in the system. Most recently, his workload has been reduced some by the change in licensing teenaged drivers.

If 16-year-olds pass the DPS written test and the instructor's road test, they aren't required to take the DPS road test, he pointed out. All licenses issued to 16-year-old drivers are temporary. They may obtain

permanent operator's licenses at 18.

Although most of Ward's time has been spent conducting driver's license examinations, he has pulled duty in patrols over holidays and special occasions.

Ward and his wife, Joyce, have lived here for 28 years. They have four children, Diane Nunley of Lafayette, Colo., Tammy Marshall of Edmond, Okla., Gregory Ward of Keystone, Colo., and Marsha Ward of Seattle, Wash., and two grandchildren.

Although they have lived here for so many years, the Wards are looking at the possibility of pulling up stakes and moving to a larger city after he retires.

"We want to get into the micro-wave popcorn business in motels but we'll have to be in a city for that," he pointed out. They haven't decided, yet, where they would like to live.

Ward's replacement in the DPS driver's license position here has not been announced but he said he expects that little or no interruption in service will be experienced in Hereford and Deaf Smith County.

But audience members still paid attention to the procession of graduates, letting out a collective "Ah" as Russell stepped forward to hand his daughter, Jeanine, her diploma with a fatherly hug.

a state test. School districts would be subject to losing their home-rule charters if their students did badly.

But among other exemptions, home-rule districts would be free of class-size caps in the elementary grades, except for low-performing campuses. Charter schools also would be free of class-size limits, a key part of education reforms approved in 1984.

In another high-profile change, the bill would ease the no-pass, no-play rule, another 1984 reform that currently bars failing students from extracurricular activities for at least six weeks.

The overhaul would change the minimum extracurricular suspension to three weeks and allow students to practice while suspended. That change would apply to all schools.

The bill also includes a \$292 million increase in the minimum teacher salary scale and \$170 million to help schools build classrooms -- an amount that Luna and others said wasn't enough to address the need for new facilities.

Several provisions address concerns about school violence, including a requirement for schools to have alternative education programs for students with disciplinary problems.

## Sentence given in district court

A 24-year-old defendant in 222nd District Court Friday was given a state jail sentence for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

Robert L. Ansley entered a plea of guilty to the offense, a state jail felony carrying a two-year sentence with mandatory probation.

Judge David Wesley Gulley imposed a five-year probationary period and fined the defendant \$1,500.

## Disguised Serbs capture U.N. post, peacekeepers

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP)--French soldiers fought Bosnian Serbs for control of a U.N. observation post Saturday, hours after Serb fighters disguised as peacekeepers captured the post near the center of Sarajevo.

Two French soldiers and a Serb

fighter were killed Saturday, highlighting the cost of the new, tougher U.N. policy of confronting the Serbs. More than 200 U.N. soldiers have been taken hostage by the Serbs in response to NATO airstrikes over the past two days.

Bosnian Serb soldiers dressed up

as French peacekeepers, complete with U.N. blue helmets and flak jackets, infiltrated the French observation post and captured it overnight, said U.N. spokeswoman Maj. Myriam Sochacki. The U.N. gear likely came from detained peacekeepers.

They captured 10 peacekeepers and took them to the suburb of Lukavica, where they also captured peacekeepers on Friday, U.N. officials said.

But the French came back hours later and recaptured half of the observation post near Sarajevo's Jewish Cemetery, capturing three Serbs. One French soldier was killed and five were wounded in fighting for the observation post. One Serb was killed.

Bosnian Serbs were holding two French soldiers in the part of the observation post they control, U.N. officials initially said one French captive was freed, but later contradicted that.

Another French soldier was killed by a sniper bullet to the head at a nearby post, U.N. officials said.

French President Jacques Chirac has warned that he would pull his soldiers out of Bosnia unless they are better protected. France's 3,750 soldiers are the single largest peacekeeping contingent in Bosnia, and withdrawal could push other countries to do likewise.

France today called an urgent meeting of NATO ambassadors. Chirac, Premier Alain Juppe and other top officials were meeting in Paris.

"To avoid the worst, France calls on its partners to redefine the mission of the U.N. forces and to grant them the means that will allow the U.N. troops to make themselves respected as they accomplish their tasks at the service of peace," Chirac said in a statement today.

## Eighth juror dismissed from O.J. Simpson trial

LOS ANGELES (AP)--The eighth juror dismissed from the O.J. Simpson trial said Friday a bloody glove and socks were "pretty compelling" evidence against Simpson, but she isn't convinced he murdered his ex-wife and her friend.

"I definitely need something to tie Mr. Simpson in with the blood drops," ex-juror Francine Florio Buntun said in her first interview since being ousted. "I don't know if having your own blood drops in your home is against the law. ... They would have to have more."

Buntun, a 38-year-old white telephone company worker, was replaced by a 71-year-old black woman who said she had never heard of Simpson before she was called for the case.

"Who's O.J. Simpson?" she told neighbors when they asked her about the murders.

The remaining sequestered jurors presumably were unaware of Buntun's comments or that the judge had ruled that Simpson can't put his claim of innocence before them without risking hostile cross-examination.

Judge Lance Ito said the legal door had not been opened to allow Simpson's police statement to be admitted at this time.

Despite a dwindling supply of alternates, Buntun said she believes

the remaining jurors are "really dedicated and they will see this through if they're allowed to."

Buntun said she was the victim of false reports that she was writing a book. She said Ito called her into his chambers Thursday afternoon after questioning other jurors, and read from a letter accusing her of writing a book.

"This is so far from the truth," she said. "I mean, I don't know who would be writing these letters to the judge."

She said she was "enthralled" with testimony about the science of DNA analysis, which she saw as an unraveling puzzle, and she said she believes her fellow jurors understood the complex evidence.

Buntun said she was "stunned" by defense allegations of racism against Detective Mark Fuhrman and adamantly denied another juror's claims that Buntun herself fomented racism on the jury.

"I'm not a racist," she said in the live interview on KABC radio.

Buntun said she found out after her dismissal that another ex-juror, Jeannette Harris, had accused her of kicking Harris and another black juror.

Buntun denied the kicking incident, although she said she did inadvertently step on one juror's toes

## Nobody certified to teach class for gun permit, warn officials

DALLAS (AP)--With the ink on the concealed handgun law barely dry, authorities are warning Texans that nobody is certified to teach the course required to obtain a permit.

Several gun stores or target ranges already had waiting lists and some were even collecting deposits before the Friday ceremony at which Gov. George W. Bush signed the bill into law.

Of more concern to officials were facilities where classes were promoted as certified or automatically approved.

Sen. Jerry Patterson, one of the measure's sponsors, said there is nothing illegal about signing people up, so long as buyers beware.

"I would think that there's nothing wrong with going to a place that's a reputable gun training facility and putting yourself on a waiting list," Patterson, R-Pasadena, said Thursday. "But I would be real conscientious about giving anybody money."

In San Antonio, a range advertised the National Rifle Association personal protection course, 12 hours for \$120. The range owner said Friday that the certificate would

"cover the state law signed today." Not so, according to the DPS.

The gun stores and DPS do agree, however, on the strong demand for the training classes.

The Texas law authorizes citizens who are 21 or older and meet certain requirements to obtain concealed-gun permits.

Applicants have to undergo 10 to 15 hours of training and pass a proficiency exam. A four-year permit costs \$140, except for individuals 60 or older and the indigent, who receive a 50 percent discount.

By the time the law takes effect Sept. 1, the DPS is to come up with a training program. Certain handgun instructors already certified by law enforcement groups, the NRA or

other recognized national groups may be exempt from taking certain portions of the instructor training class, Patterson said.

However, they will require training in other elements of the certification, including laws relating to weapons and the use of deadly force; handgun use, proficiency and safety; nonviolent dispute resolution; and proper storage practices for handguns, according to the bill.

## 2000 a coming nightmare for many computer users

NEW YORK (AP) - As 2000 gets closer by the day, many computer users are facing the prospect of a back-to-the-future nightmare.

Many computer programs calculate years from the last two digits, such as 95 for 1995. But when 2000 arrives, many of those programs will produce wrong answers or just won't work.

For example, a computer might think a person born in 1970 is 70 years old. If a pension fund's computer did that, a 30-year-old could start getting retirement benefits. Likewise, a January 2000 monthly mortgage check written on Dec. 31, 1999, might get bounced because a bank computer thinks the check is 99 years old and therefore no good.

Some product executives have been warning about the date trouble for years. But lately, big computer companies have also warned of a possible crisis.

"As gratifying as it is to see some more people doing it, it's not enough," says Michael Lips, president of TransCentury Data Systems, a San Francisco company that helps businesses with date design software. "We are still going to have major problems despite the best of efforts."

The trouble is that just fixing a computer program isn't enough. All

the data that work with the program, which sometimes means millions of records or transactions, must be changed to match the program.

In addition, if a company shares data with someone else, such as an oil driller reporting production to a state agency, the two parties must ensure any changes are compatible with each other's computers.

"In the grand scheme of things that need work, I think this is on the large side," says Ron Rudman, an engineer at Electronic Data Services Corp., the nation's largest computer services company. "The main point is to not become part of the frenzy, stay calm and work on it early."

The Gartner Group, a technology research firm in Stamford, Conn., estimates large businesses will spend \$100 billion in the next five years to correct their programs. Government

agencies may need to spend a similar amount, though Gartner hasn't done a study for them.

"One financial company said it will spend \$250 million to solve the problem," Gartner analyst Kevin Schick says, though he won't identify it.

The two-digit year became standard with the first computers decades ago as a way to preserve data-storage space and maximize processing power, which initially was a fraction of what's available in a \$10 calculator today.

USAA, one of the largest insurance and financial services companies, says much of its USAA data has already been modified to survive the millennium change unscathed. The company says it is also nearly finished converting life insurance and banking software.

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## Romania trying to court tourists seeking Dracula

BRAN, Romania (AP) - Romania for decades shrugged off its reputation as the land of vampires, and foreigners drawn by tales of Count Dracula and his cohorts found only a dank, medieval castle and homemade Dracula sweaters.

Now, a lifeless state tourist industry is trying to infuse new blood into the Dracula trade, and on Thursday, opened the world's first Dracula congress.

"If tourists want hands rising out of coffins ... we'll give it to them," said tourism minister Dan Matei.

Under communism, Romania tried to distance itself from one of the world's most enduring myths, and dictator Nicolae Ceausescu, who saw his country as a modern industrial powerhouse, went so far as to ban the Bram Stoker book that created the Dracula legend.

The efforts never quite succeeded in putting an end to people's curiosity, and Romania is taking a fresh stab at promoting the vampire legend.

Its Dracula congress opened in

Bucharest, the capital, with about 25 academics and scores of foreign journalists debating subjects ranging from the arcane ("Dracula's role in Gothic literature") to the bizarre ("Psychic Vampire: America's First Vampire Holiday").

Then, it's off to Transylvania for a mock witch trial and a masked ball at Bistrita Castle, an eerie structure 200 miles northwest of Bucharest where Stoker set his novels.

"I think it's a great idea to get the myth, the man and Stoker all together," said Chelsea Quinn Yarbro, a novelist from Berkeley, Calif., who has written nine books about a character based on an 18th century French count. But efforts to revive the Dracula legend for tourists are new, and visitors to Transylvania today still may find their vampire fantasies disappointed.

"We came to see Dracula, reputed for his love of blood, who slept during the day and roamed at night," said James Mitchell, a retired Scottish policeman who visited Bran castle, falsely reputed to be Dracula's castle.

## Slagle to step down as Demo party head

AUSTIN (AP) - Bob Slagle, chairman of the Texas Democratic Party for nearly 15 years, announced Friday that he won't seek re-election to the post next year.

Citing family reasons, Slagle said he would stand aside and let someone else take over the job he's held since first being elected on Sept. 27, 1980.

Slagle's decision was announced in a letter to party leaders.

In it, he also flailed the GOP and called on Democrats to fight back against what he called "Newt Republicans" who are "absolutely committed to dismantling and discrediting 60 years of economic and social progress."

Chris Wilson, executive director of the Texas GOP, called Slagle "as responsible as anyone for creating a two-party state in Texas. Frankly, we'll be sorry to see him go."

Slagle, 60, is a Sherman native, lawyer and longtime party activist.

He was president of the Young Democrats of Texas in 1965-67 and executive secretary of Young

Democrats of America in 1967-68. He rose through a series of state party posts until his election as chairman.

Slagle said concerns over his wife's health and his desire to spend more time with his children were reasons he decided not to seek re-election when his current term ends in June 1996.

But he said his attitude toward the other party hasn't changed.

"My zest for fighting Republicans to achieve the real American dream of equal opportunity for all Americans is unabated," Slagle said, calling on Democrats to battle growing GOP numbers.

"Because of a frustrated electorate and mean but effective Republican propaganda, we are faced with a fundamental challenge to our leadership in Texas and the nation," he wrote.

"The response from some of our Democrats has astonished and amazed me. Some seem determined to be pacifists even the guns are aimed directly at them. Some seem to be cowed, even afraid. Others believe that it is rude to talk..."

All this is by way of telling a story, of sorts, about my grandson and his niece.

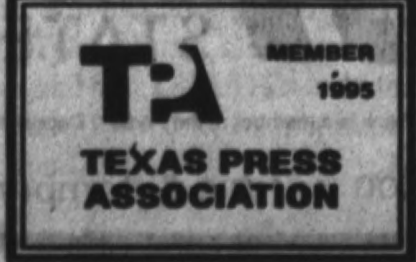

Seems Phil Dawson, placekicker for the University of Texas football team, was selected to the 1995 Playboy All-America team.

The 20-year-old Dawson refused this honor.

Why? Dawson is a Christian who often speaks to children about avoiding drugs, irresponsible drinking and premarital sex.

# Counseling for clergy in OKC a need often overlooked

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - The Rev. Joseph Meinhart, a Roman Catholic priest who worked 14 days at the makeshift morgue for bombing victims, caught a glimpse of hell as rescue workers lifted the body parts of a child from the rubble.

The Rev. Joe Williams, a Southern Baptist who spent 19 straight days at the bomb site, would look at his granddaughter and try not to picture her blown apart.

They are among the hundreds of clergy who were strong in a time of crisis, voluntarily putting in long

hours to comfort the injured and dying and offer solace to rescue workers.

Their work continues more than a month after the April 19 bombing with the victims' relatives and friends and a community buffeted by an act of senseless terror. As the strain of coping with the extraordinary tragedy is added to their normal working conditions of long hours at relatively low pay, some psychologists and church officials have turned their attention to a question often overlooked: Who cares for the caregivers?

The answer is no one, even when churches set up counseling programs. In some denominations, such as the Roman Catholic archdiocese, where the vicar for ministries also has a full-time job running a parish, no formal program for clergy is in place, and officials hope clergy will seek help on their own initiative.

In the United Methodist Church, education and therapy programs for caregivers will be offered for at least two years. When a counseling session for clergy was held recently, only 20 of the 50 chaplains who worked at the bomb site showed up, and that was with the bishop encouraging attendance.

Southern Baptists, the largest religious group in the area, held one meeting for ministers and also offered other counseling.

Williams, head of chaplaincy for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, said another conference for clergy is planned next month with an expert in coping with traumatic situations. But he also is struggling with the problem of how to get clergy to attend.

Dealing with the clergy is like dealing with law enforcement officers, many of whom put on a tough veneer and deny they can be affected by tragedy, said Williams, who also serves as an FBI chaplain.

"You kind of desensitize yourself, because you've got to be strong at the time," he said.

In their personal makeup and theology, ministers also tend to sacrifice themselves for others, and sometimes do not know how to stop giving and accept help, church leaders said.

At the Oklahoma Conference of Churches, Carol Michelson, the head of the new Interfaith Disaster Recovery for Greater Oklahoma City, worked for weeks without taking a day off until she began feeling chest pains one day last week and "finally gave out."

"One thing they told me when I took this on is you've got to take care of yourself," she said. "I thought, 'Nah.'"

If most clergy are used to helping people cope with the loss of loved ones, none were prepared for the destruction wrought April 19.

"It's a different thing altogether when you walk into a place and there are bodies, parts of bodies, and the whole thing is caked under dust and blood," Meinhart said.

How Meinhart coped is to talk about his experiences with other priests and to go out in the country

and visit his parents every couple of days. There, Meinhart said, he could get needed sleep. In the neighborhood, he could play and laugh with children, providing a healthy counterbalance to the scene downtown.

Williams, who could not get the images of broken death and bodies out of his mind when he looked at a child, said he underwent therapy when he went to Washington earlier this month for National Police Memorial Week.

"I came back home 100 percent better than when I went," he said.

What Williams and others seeking to help clergy say is that unless ministers deal with their own feelings and experiences about the tragedy, "It's kind of like, pay me now or pay me later."

Irritability, shortness with family, friends and congregations, burnout and even depression could be the form the unresolved feelings take in the future, they say.

By being so "strong" they are

immune to their own doubts and anger and other emotions about the bombing, clergy also may lose their ability to be sensitive to the people they are serving, some ministers said.

When clergy try so hard to be holy that they deny their own humanity, it's hard to touch the humanity in others, said the Rev. Leodis Strong, pastor of Avery Chapel African Methodist Episcopal Church.

"Does it help you to suppress your own doubts, your own questions? Who does it help? Does it help that family?" he asks.

Adds the Rev. John Rusco, Oklahoma City University chaplain: "I don't know how you minister to those who are in the midst of pain and suffering when you don't know how to be ministered to."

## Pilot plans attempt to retrace Earhart flight

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - When the old Lockheed Electra 10-E arrived at her hangar, Linda Finch admits feeling a little strange standing beside the same type aircraft Amelia Earhart flew.

"I got a real funny, eerie feeling," Ms. Finch said. "It was almost like it was her plane or something."

In many ways it will become Earhart's plane.

An accomplished pilot, Ms. Finch is restoring the rare twin-engine aircraft for an around-the-globe journey in March 1997 tracing the famous female aviator's final ill-fated flight. Earhart vanished in the Pacific Ocean during that 1937 journey, never to be found.

"It doesn't scare me. I'm very sure and confident. We have a lot of advantages she didn't have," said Ms. Finch, who will take along modern-day navigation equipment.

Ms. Finch wants her "World Flight 1997" to emphasize Earhart's aviation accomplishments, not her disappearance.

Earhart set a women's flying altitude record of 14,000 feet in 1922, was the first woman to complete a transcontinental flight in 1928, was the first woman and only the second person to successfully fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean in 1932 and was the first person to fly solo across the Pacific Ocean, from Honolulu to Oakland, Calif., in 1935.

Earhart also was known for encouraging college students to pursue their career dreams.

When Earhart set out on her last flight, she was attempting to become the first pilot to fly around the world at the equator. After two-thirds of their journey, Earhart and navigator Fred Noonan disappeared between Lae, New Guinea, and Howland Island.

Ms. Finch, who will fly over Howland Island, said she believes Earhart was close to her intended path, but a slightly inaccurate island chart and the sunrise effect on the plane's navigation tools led her off course and to her ocean death.

"I always wanted to fly an airplane, just always," she said.

Aviation remains a predominantly male field, and Ms. Finch laughs when she explains that when she pilots a plane into some airports, some maintenance workers begin talking with a man riding with her as though he is the pilot.

To prepare for "World Flight 1997," Ms. Finch researched Earhart's life and flights at the National Smithsonian Air and Space Museum.

"The more I got to know her," Ms. Finch said, "the more excited I got about the project."

The Lockheed Electra will be restored in the next 18 months to the condition of Earhart's plane, complete with a replica of its navigation table and with extra fuel tanks.

"We really will need to do everything she did so it will go those distances," said Ms. Finch, who is not the first woman to reenact Earhart's trip but is believed to be the first in same type aircraft.

Beginning in Oakland, Ms. Finch will fly to the west through New Guinea, Singapore, Pakistan, Ethiopia and other countries on five continents.

At one point, she will land on a 3,000-foot grass runway. Sometimes she will have no radio communication. But the most challenging aspects of the journey, she said, will be taking off with a heavy load and landing in overcast weather at airports where little English is spoken.

During the 75-day trip she plans to conduct educational sessions about Earhart. The entire project is estimated to cost about \$2.5 million, with the plane, restoration and trip expenses costing \$1.2 million and educational materials and promotional items accounting for the rest.

Ms. Finch, who owns nursing homes, is seeking corporate sponsors, though she says she will acquire the necessary funding herself if enough sponsors don't participate.

The most important part of the flight, Ms. Finch said, will be spreading Amelia Earhart's message: "There's no limit on what they can accomplish and do if they set their minds to it and believe they can."

The 1997 reenactment will coincide with the 60th anniversary of Earhart's flight and the 100th anniversary of her birth year. American Airlines pilot Gianfranco "Denny" Ghiringhelli will be the navigator.

Ms. Finch, 44, who lives in Denton and the San Antonio area, is an aviation pioneer of sorts herself with more than 20 years of experience acquiring, restoring and flying historic aircraft.

Among the aircraft she flies is the Confederate Air Force's vintage P-47 Thunderbolt. She also races in airshows in an AT-6 Texan World War II trainer, a rarity for a woman.

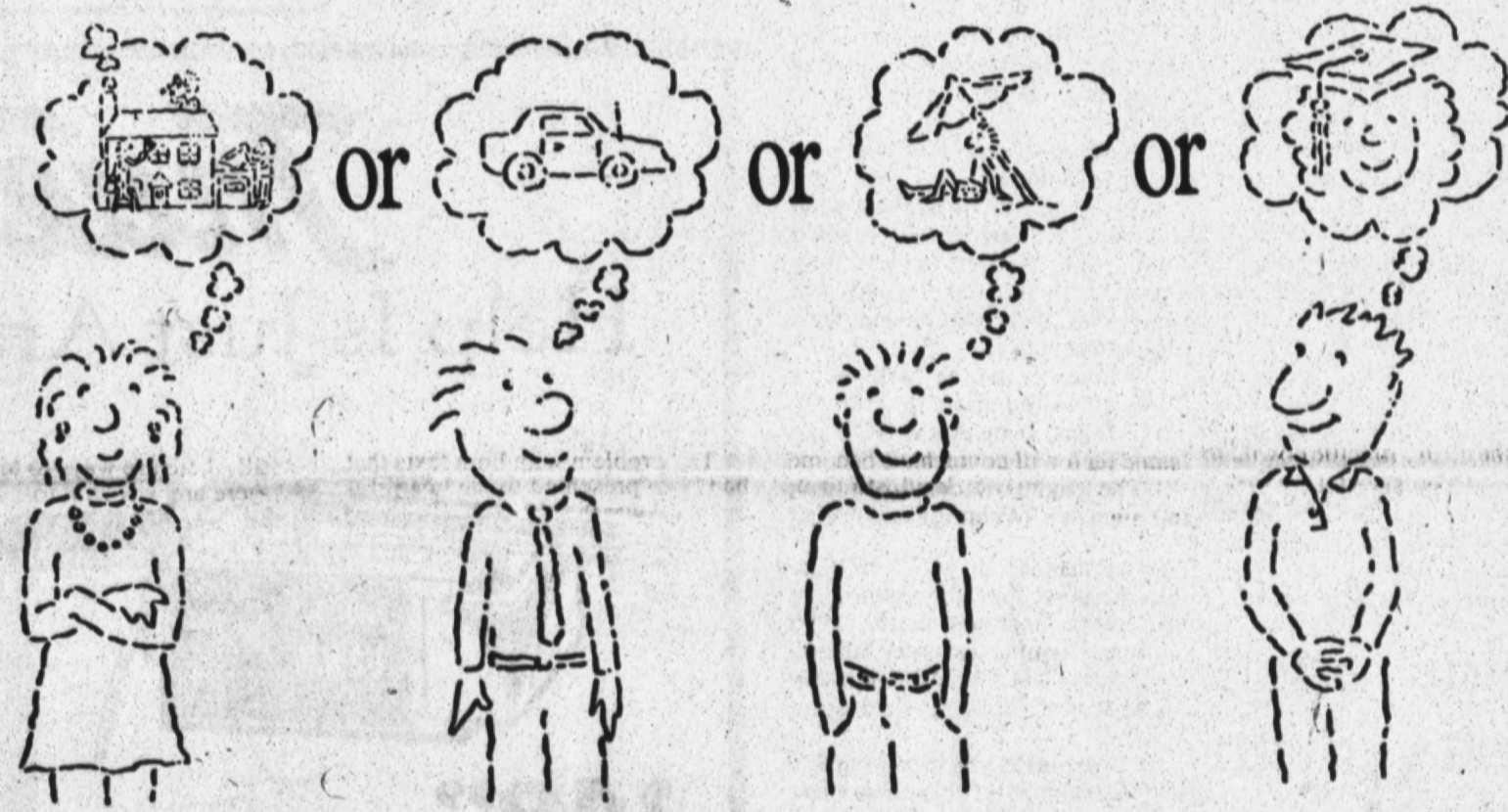

## Spurs gouge Rockets, 107-102

HOUSTON (AP)--In this Texas tango, the homecourt advantage is a myth. Homecourt disadvantage is more like it.

The San Antonio Spurs, the team that worked all season to guarantee the homecourt edge throughout the playoffs then lost two in a row at home to Houston to open the Western Conference finals, turned the tables on the Rockets Friday night with a 107-102 victory.

The 16,000 or so Rocket fans who gathered at The Summit to celebrate another victory en route to a Lone Star sweep and a return trip to the NBA Finals instead witnessed the rebirth of the Spurs.

This wasn't the stumbling, tentative San Antonio team that had dropped two at the Alamodome. Instead, David Robinson made the big plays down the stretch and, with

considerable contributions from Avery Johnson, Vinny Del Negro, Sean Elliott and Chuck Person, the Spurs cut Houston's lead in the best-of-7 series to 2-1.

"We won the Denver series on the road, the Lakers series on the road and we won our first game of this series on the road," San Antonio coach Bob Hill said. "We've got everything backwards."

For the first time in this series, the Spurs looked like the balanced, aggressive team that won 62 regular-season games.

"We had a sense of urgency that we haven't had," Elliott said. "That's the best we've played in the playoffs. If we win Sunday, we have the homecourt advantage again. Maybe we don't want it."

He was joking, of course, and it

was the first time the Spurs felt like joking in a week.

San Antonio still has no answer for Hakeem Olajuwon, who had 43 points, 11 rebounds and five blocked shots two nights after his 41-point, 16-rebound performance in San Antonio. But the rest of the Rockets couldn't come through when they were needed.

Johnson, who had 20 points and 13 assists, made five of six free throws in the final 45 seconds to clinch the victory and assure a Game 5 next Tuesday night in San Antonio. The Spurs' point guard, playing despite a sore right ankle, had no turnovers.

His backcourt partner Del Negro, a virtual no-show in the first two games, tied his playoff career high with 19 points.

## Indy drivers adjust to speed quickly

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—How fast is fast?

Leroy Burrell, the fastest human, has run 100 meters in 9.85 seconds. That translates to about 22.7 mph. Nolan Ryan's famed fastball was clocked at a shade over 100 mph, and batters often found it impossible to hit.

At Indianapolis, where speed is everything, pole-winner Scott Brayton and teammate Arie Luyendyk have driven their rear-engine, single-seat race cars around the 2 1/2-mile oval in about 38 seconds, or just under 235 mph.

Amazingly, the drivers say that, despite hitting top speeds of more than 240 mph on the straightaways at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, the cars do not provide the same thrill as an amusement park rollercoaster.

"Really, after you're out there for a few laps, everything seems to slow down," Luyendyk said. "It gets to feeling like you're just driving on a freeway, except that when you are around other cars there is a lot of turbulent air and it's a lot easier to get into trouble."

Roberto Guerrero, who owns the official one- and four-lap qualifying records at Indy, both over 232 mph, agreed. "You get used to the speeds and, to me and I'm sure most of the drivers, everything still happens in slow motion out there even though you're doing over 230 miles an hour."

"You get used to the speed very quickly. It's something the body does automatically. In fact, that's one of the problems of this racetrack, especially when you're a rookie. Obviously with the years you learn, and you still could make the mistake."

"When you do a full-loaded (fuel) tank, running out there for 25 or 30 laps, all at about 210 miles an hour all of a sudden you have to come into the pits and you slow down to 100 miles an hour, and you think you're stopped."

"One hundred miles an hour is really not stopped, but you feel you're stopped. You go to stop in your pit and you can't stop. That's something you really have to make yourself adjust to."

Mario Andretti, who retired at the

end of last season after a racing career of nearly four decades, saw speeds at Indianapolis climb by nearly 80 mph.

"No matter how fast you go, you adjust to it pretty easily," he said. "It is amazing when you realize how much concentration racing at these speeds takes, how much detail you see up in the stands or in the pits as you go by."

"It always seemed like I'd spot some guy up in the stands eating a hot dog and think how good that must taste. Then, the next time by, I'd try to see if he was done with the hot dog or eating another one."

Another retired driver, Johnny Rutherford, likens running at speed on the Indy oval to "driving down an alley and turning right into a dark closet."

"Speed is relative," he said. "It can feel just as fast and dangerous on a public highway in traffic at 55 because you don't know the people around you, and you have no idea what they're going to do or when they're going to do it."

"At least on a race track, most of the guys who are out there, you know pretty well. You have some idea of what to expect, and you feel some sense of control."

Time is relative in another way at Indy, where tenths of a second in a 10-mile qualifying run can make the difference between being on the front row or far back in the field.

Brayton completed his qualification effort in 2 minutes, 35.438 seconds. The slowest qualifier, Eliseo Salazar, finished his run in 2:39.984—225.023 mph—and was considered slow.

Brayton's pole-winning time was .385 of a second faster than Luyendyk.

That difference cost Luyendyk the nearly \$200,000 in cash awards and prizes that go to Indy's fastest qualifier, as well as the prestige. So 231.031 mph wasn't fast enough.

"It makes you wish that you could just lean forward and go a little faster, or something," Luyendyk said. "But, when your (accelerator) foot is flat on the floor all the way around, whatever your speed is, that's all you're going to get."

## Attendance, TV ratings are down; baseball strike left vast after-effects

NEW YORK (AP)—Attendance is down 25 percent and national television ratings have gone down even more. One year after the work stoppage that was supposed to make baseball more profitable, the teams probably will lose at least \$300 million.

Maybe both sides in baseball's worst labor dispute underestimated how much fans would turn against them.

"We've got a long way to come back," acting commissioner Bud Selig says. "But it's too early to make any snap judgments."

One month into the season, the 232-day strike appears to have caused vast after-effects, far more than baseball's seven previous work stoppages.

Through Tuesday, the average attendance was 23,454, down 25.8 percent from last year's average of 31,611. When compared to a similar point last season, the average was down 20.3 percent. Team executives say group sales, which usually take place during the off-season, were hurt most by the strike.

ESPN's first 14 games had a 1.5 cable rating, down 32 percent from the 2.2 rating for the first 14 games last year. This year's games were viewed by an average of 981,000 homes, down 29 percent from the average of 1,379,000 through 14 broadcasts last year.

Polling done for owners by Penn & Schoen Associates showed that among fans who attended at least one game in 1994, 39 percent were not very likely or not at all likely to attend a game this year.

Owners say revenue may drop to about \$1.4 billion this year, down from \$1.88 billion in 1993.

Because team payrolls declined by less than 5 percent following the strike, expenses won't change that much. Teams spent \$1.83 billion in 1993, and that figure probably will decline only by about \$100 million because of missed salary during the first month of the season.

The average salary, which has declined only once since 1967, figures to drop slightly this year, from \$1,168,263 to about \$1,115,000.

The Fox Network says it won't even consider bidding for TV rights until there's a new collective bargaining agreement.

"There're a lot of things we have to do," Selig says. "There's going to have to be a lot of marketing, local and national, a lot of reaching out. It's going to have to become a permanent part of our existence."

Owners, led by Selig, tried hard not to criticize players during the labor negotiations. But by claiming baseball had financial problems the union refused to address, the teams wound up convincing many fans that players were to blame.

Attendance is down for 25 of the 28 teams. Polling and focus groups conducted by Penn & Schoen on May 8 show the anger level of fans remains high.

"(It) is accentuated by the fact that fans understand that the strike was never truly settled," Douglas Schoen wrote to owners in a May 9 memorandum that was obtained by The Associated Press. "Fans carry with them a strong sense that the strike was pointless and ... nothing was accomplished."

The men behind the owners' new advertising campaign, "Welcome to The Show," addressed fan anger by starting the campaign with commercials that avoided the use of players.

In addressing the clubs during a teleconference in late April, Jon Steel of Goodby Silverstein and Partners said his agency wanted to "avoid red herrings only likely to fuel fans' anger."

"That anger is being fueled by the media," Steel said during the meeting, a videotape of which was obtained by The AP. "A lot of them are waiting for you to screw up. They're looking new reasons to be mad, more excuses to write negative articles."

Steel, the agency's director of planning, said broadcasting ads of stars such as Ken Griffey Jr. and Matt Williams would only remind fans of the record chases that didn't happen last year. Later this season, the agency is planning to use ads including 1995's stars.

Initial spots focused on an organist, a person mowing the

outfield grass and Bill Lee talking about pitching.

Selig and union head Donald Fehr probably will meet sometime within two weeks to figure out the next step in negotiations, which broke off March 30. Owners still don't know if they want to go back to a salary cap proposal, which would cause players to start preparing for another work stoppage, probably next year.

"I'm sure Bud and I will be talking," Fehr says.

Owners have been without a commissioner since September 1992, without a licensing head since January 1994, without a head of the Player Relations Committee since last October, and without a chief labor lawyer since early April. They didn't make any decisions when they met May 10 in Itasca, Ill., but do hope to make some when they meet June 6-8 in Minneapolis.

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# Ike's relationship to Summersby tragic sidebar of war

**EDITOR'S NOTE** - Deleted from a picture of Dwight D. Eisenhower, dismissed with a mere mention in the general's war diary, Kay Summersby was one of the tragic figures of World War II. Eisenhower's chauffeur and companion and perhaps more, she died unhappy and alone, a footnote from 50 years ago.

The end of World War II in Europe signaled the end of the road for chauffeur Kay Summersby's three-year relationship with her boss, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Her face was censored from the official photo taken by Technical Sgt. Al Meserlin, Ike's personal photographer, on that May morning in 1945 when the Germans surrendered at the red-brick schoolhouse in Reims, France.

In a print of the original picture, which Meserlin has kept in his scrapbook for 50 years, Summersby is in the background as Eisenhower holds aloft in a V-for-victory gesture the two pens used by the high-ranking German officers to sign the surrender.

Meserlin, now living in Sea Girt, N.J., has no idea why the photo was altered after he shipped off his film to the Army Pictorial Service laboratory in Paris. "All our stuff went through the wartime censors," he says. "Usually they just cropped out identifying terrain details so as not to reveal Eisenhower's whereabouts, like when he went to Bastogne."

When Eisenhower left Europe for a Pentagon assignment some months later, Summersby's name was dropped from the travel orders of SHAEF (Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force) staffers joining him. She was the only member of what he fondly called his "immediate wartime family" to be left behind.

She was devastated, as she recorded in a bittersweet autobiography, "Past Forgetting: My Love Affair With Dwight D. Eisenhower," written after Eisenhower's death and during her final illness. It depicted a passionate but unconsummated love affair that consisted mostly of "stolen kisses" along a woodland path or aboard "a darkened plane to Cairo."

She wrote of holding hands, sitting before the fire in his quarters listening to favorite records while sharing cocktails for two, "almost telepathic" bridge partners, golfing together, horseback riding in the countryside or the desert, romping with "Telek," the coal-black Scotch terrier he bought for her.

Eisenhower mentions her only once in his diary, "Crusade in Europe," just a name on a list of aides.

Kathleen McCarthy Summersby, a perky, coquettish Irish divorcee and former fashion model for the House of Worth in Paris, was 33 when as a civilian volunteer with the British Motor Transport Corps she was assigned to drive Eisenhower around London. He was 20 years older.

One of her earlier assignments was driving an ambulance in the heavily blitzed East End dock area, picking up bodies and delivering them to the morgue. Twice she had to drive around all night searching for a morgue that had room for more corpses.

As a staff driver Kay preferred "the breezy easy-going Yanks to the stiff-upper-lip, swagger stick-carrying British officers," she usually saluted and opened the door for. For his part, Eisenhower liked her sparkling smile and ready wit, even when the buzz bombs began falling, and was amused that she kept her compact and lipstick in her gas mask. He called her "Skib," because she was from Skibbereen in County Cork and "stubborn as an Army mule."

Summersby writes of falling in love with the face in the rearview mirror: "I succumbed immediately to that grin which was to become famous."

SHAEF staffers noticed that her bubbly presence relaxed Eisenhower as the pressures of planning the D-Day invasion mounted. Harry Butcher, the general's naval aide, rated her "better than any man at driving that big Packard in a total blackout and through London's pea soups with those pinpoint headlights."

Soon she was more than a chauffeur: sitting in on top-secret meetings, going to 10 Downing Street with the general for lunch with Prime Minister Winston Churchill, dining with President Franklin Roosevelt, Secretary of State Cordell Hull and key advisers such as Averell Harriman, Harry Hopkins, and Bernard Baruch.

She accompanied Eisenhower to

combat areas and shared GI rations and "liberated champagne" with Gens. Omar Bradley and George S. Patton. Often she presided as hostess at his formal dinners. "We have no secrets from Kay," Eisenhower told Churchill, who was charmed to sit on her right at table and later awarded her the British Empire Medal.

Eisenhower recommended her for the Legion of Merit, but Chief of Staff George Marshall turned that down. However Eisenhower was successful in wrangling her a lieutenant's commission in the WACs and promoted her to secretary in charge of his "unofficial mail."

When another driver took over, Kay still went everywhere with the supreme commander, often joining him in the back seat. On the eve of D-Day, she was at his side at an airfield in Newbury in Berkshire, England. From the roof of a hangar they watched U.S. paratroopers with blackened faces filing aboard transport planes for the night drop behind enemy lines. She saw his eyes brim with tears as the C-47s lifted off under a full moon.

Patton often saw them together and found Eisenhower "very nasty and showoffish in her presence." Bradley, Eisenhower's West Point classmate and favorite field commander, called her "Ike's shadow." Bradley thought she made him "decidedly pro-British." He and others faulted Eisenhower for summarily busting U.S. officers who criticized British colleagues but patiently suffered the snubs and insults of Field Marshal Bernard Montgomery.

It was Summersby who got Eisenhower hooked on the English habit of 4 o'clock tea. The joke at the American officers mess was that "Eisenhower is the best general the British have."

Bradley was shocked to see Summersby turn up in Algeria after the landings in North Africa, but was less surprised when she twice accompanied Eisenhower on brief holidays at a villa on the Riviera.

Rumors, innuendoes and bawdy barracks jokes were rife in the ranks about their friendship. Eisenhower once complained to Patton that he was speechless with rage when "the other day Kay and I were out riding and a soldier yoo-hooed at us." Passing convoys in combat zones, Summersby was amused and flattered, as she later wrote, when "truck drivers saluted me with whistles, wolf calls and all kinds of interesting proposals" that made "Ike absolutely livid."

"I took her picture a number of times," said photographer Meserlin, holding up a snapshot of her playing with the dog Telek in the snow at Ike's quarters in Reims, a chateau belonging to a champagne baron. "But we don't know what went on at night."

Technical Sgt. Barkev Sagatelian, the senior map-maker in Eisenhower's headquarters, saw Summersby "quite often, but she never came into the war room." Sagatelian, retired as an architect in Ormond Beach, Fla. still asks himself: "Was she his girlfriend?"

Who knows for sure? High-ranking officers had their own lives. Probably they had love affairs, but we didn't know about those things."

Eisenhower's son, John, who briefly served as his aide after graduating from West Point on D-Day, later described her as "the Mary Tyler Moore of headquarters. She was perky and she was cute. Whether she had any designs on the Old Man and the extent to which he succumbed, I just don't know."

On a number of occasions Eisenhower demonstrated his affection for his winsome lieutenant. Although he confessed to being a member of "the awkward squad" for marching out of step at West Point, they sometimes went dancing together after a movie or the theater. He gave her a Beretta automatic and taught her how to shoot at tin cans.

Eisenhower had his tailor measure her for two uniforms after the troopship she boarded to join him in Algeria was torpedoed and she

escaped without any luggage into a lifeboat. His aides had to search high and low for the phonograph record of "I'll See You Again," her favorite song from Noel Coward's "Bittersweet."

In her autobiography, published more than a year after she died in 1974, Summersby tells of one attempt at intimacy that failed when "we both came to our senses... there were eyes and ears everywhere" and another because Eisenhower was too exhausted after a long airplane journey.

Pictures of them together in newspapers, magazines and newsreels made Eisenhower's wife, Mamie, increasingly suspicious. She was furious when her husband, on a brief home leave at the Greenbrier Resort in West Virginia, kept calling her Kay.

In "Plain Talking," an oral biography of President Truman, Merle Miller recounted that "right after the war was over" Eisenhower

informed Marshall he wanted to return to the States, divorce Mamie and marry Kay. The biographer quotes Truman: "Marshall wrote him back a letter the like of which I never have seen. He said if Eisenhower ever came close to doing such a thing he'd not only bust him out of the Army but see to it that never for the rest of his life would he be able to draw a peaceful breath."

Miller wrote that Truman then revealed: "One of the last things I did as president I got those letters from Ike's file in the Pentagon and I destroyed them."

Historian Stephen Ambrose, an editor of the Eisenhower papers, labels the story "completely untrue," maintaining that Truman spoke with Miller long after "he had broken with Eisenhower and was approaching senility."

Kay Summersby became a U.S. citizen and settled in the United States after the war, but never found happiness. She was mugged in a San

Rafael, Calif., parking lot, broke off an engagement to a San Francisco man who thought she had money, went through a divorce with a New York stock broker and had trouble finding a job. She once called on President Eisenhower at the White House, was graciously received but afterward told by an aide not to call again.

"I heard today that my valued secretary is in dire straits," Eisenhower wrote one day in his diary. "I trust she pulls herself together. ... She is Irish and tragic."

Looking back now on those benighted wartime years, unilluminated by the scandal-probing spotlights of supermarket tabloids and TV shows like "Hard Copy," Chicago Tribune war correspondent Jack Thompson may have come the closest to shedding some light on the romantic aspects of driving with Mrs. Summersby:

"You didn't often see a general kissing his chauffeur."

## Holly Sugar Inc. uses new satellite imagery technology

If you thought that there was not much else that the agriculture industry could do to improve efficiency, you're wrong.

A new remote sensing technique called Global Precision System, or GPS, has been implemented right here in Hereford, on a trial basis.

Holly Sugar Inc. used this technique this fall when it took soil samples for its sugarbeet producers. According to Dennis Printz, manager of Holly Sugar, the GPS originated in the cold war days and was first a U.S. and Russia Satellite science project. The two countries used the satellite imagery to monitor plant production. The GPS that is used today is just a spin-off of that.

The technique was perfected four years ago in the Gulf War.

The new technical application is used mainly for field mapping and grid sampling and is great for gathering historical data.

The system uses satellite signals to determine both longitude and latitude of any field. A computer mounted into a tractor, combine or chemical applicator, can instantly tell

the operator of the vehicle where he is in that particular field. Night application, harvest and sampling is possible with this new technology.

During the soil sampling phase of sugarbeet production, Holly Sugar field men took soil samples, evenly spaced, in two different fields. The locations were then flagged and during the year petiole (leaf stalk), and root samples were taken and compared with the soil data and satellite images of the fields.

After the information is interpolated, the computer print-out can indicate five different areas, such as - average soil, petiole and brei nitrate measurements, as well as plant population and tons per acre -- by the different colors that are projected on the print-out.

This information is gathered on the agriculturalist field record data sheet that the Holly plant keeps for each producer, and is entered into the computer program and interpreted onto the satellite image of the field.

"We are mainly using the technique at this point for historical purposes," Printz said.

In this area, according to Printz, land leasing is very prevalent and switching of land is often accompanied by a producer not knowing the history of crops grown on the particular field leased.

"Disease can be a real problem for sugarbeets if the rotation is not followed," he said. "We need to know if and when sugarbeets were last raised in that field."

Another aspect of the technique is application of chemicals on a certain field. Some large chemical corporations are using the system.

The system can be used to apply the specific amount of fertilizer or chemical in a particular spot in the field indicated by the satellite signal.

The sprayer can adjust application according to the area of the field the sprayer is in at the time.

"EPA (Environmental Protection agency), loves it," Printz said. "We

can apply the exact amount (chemical) that is needed. The producer will not be guilty of over-spraying."

"With regulations being so tight, this is a good tool to use for ASCS purposes," he said.

The amount of a chemical needed is usually determined by soil samples taken. "We have always used an average taken on soil sample data for each field," he said.

With the GPS, the average can be done away with and a producer can be assured that he is not over-fertilizing an area at the same time that he may be under-fertilizing another area in the same field.

Seeding rate adjustments can also be monitored in the same way. The planter will automatically plant the correct amount of seed for the particular area of the field, based on the soil type, water available, etc.

Harvest and water availability can also be monitored and interpreted with the other factors.

New technology looks as if it will

find its way into the agriculture industry, according to Printz.

"We have to find ways in which we can compete," he said. "We are not getting it in the market place, so we need to be the lowest cost producer that we can be."

The Hereford Holly Sugar plant used the technique on four or five fields this year, and plans on doing more with the new system in the upcoming year.

"The system may take several years to catch on," said Printz. "But the industry is definitely going to use it for a number of reasons."

It has been in use about six or seven years and may take another eight to ten years to perfect it and catch on," he said.

"It may be the answer to over-regulation by the government. It might also eliminate the environmental problem."

"It is a great way to increase the stewardship of our land."

## Midwest ranchers want federal investigation into continuing decrease in cattle prices

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) - Falling cattle prices have meant good beef at the supermarket but the decline is taking its toll on Midwest ranchers. They want a federal investigation.

Prices paid to cattle feeders have dropped more than \$140 a head since early March, prompting cattle groups across the Midwest to call on officials to look into various aspects of the cattle market, including concentration of power, futures trading and advance contracts.

Sen. Bob Kerrey, D-Neb., who set up a meeting with a top Justice Department official earlier this month for ranchers and meatpackers, said changes must be made but more study is needed before action can be taken.

"I think we are not seeing the kind of competition we ought to have when it comes to buying cattle," he

said. But, Kerrey said, which rules need to be changed and how they should be revamped haven't been determined. He said a report on the cattle market ordered by Congress in 1992 and due in October should help clarify the issues.

The two-hour, closed-door session Saturday included the head of the Justice Department's antitrust division, Anne Bingaman, and about 25 cattle and meatpacking representatives from Oklahoma, Nebraska, Texas and other cattle-producing states.

"This was simply a fact-gathering mission," Bingaman said of the Justice Department's involvement. She said the discussions were "very civil but very frank and in keeping with Western tradition of straight shooting and saying what you think."

Ranchers have been hit by the sharp price decline "between the eyes

with both barrels," said Bob Drake, president of the National Cattlemen's Association. "Certainly there will be some people that will perhaps be selling out."

Drake's group says wholesale beef prices failed to show an anticipated seasonal increase during the winter months and instead dropped. Average wholesale beef prices were \$103.21 per hundredweight during April, off 10.3 percent from April 1994 and down nearly 19 percent from April 1993.

"At our place it's kind of a hold situation; you're making do until the market can get better and you can get into a profitable situation," Nebraska feedlot operator and rancher Eddie Nichols said after the meeting.

The Iowa Cattlemen's Association marketing committee has approved a resolution calling for the national cattlemen's group to look into concentration of power in the meatpacking industry. The Kansas Farm Bureau has called for a federal investigation into cattle pricing.

Three of the largest meatpacking companies - IBP, Excel and Monfort - buy a large percentage of the nation's cattle. Other concerns include futures trading and manipulation of the market and "captive cattle," which are cattle secured by meatpackers in advance contracts with feeders or from their own herds.

But there also is increased competition among the beef, pork and

## Agriculture Briefs

The U.S. House of Representative recently passed H.R. 961, a bill to reform and reauthorize the Clean Water Act. The House bill will amend the Clean Water Act to:

- (1) maintain voluntary, incentive-based nonpoint source programs at the state level,
  - (2) protect private property rights,
  - (3) provide a definition of and classification system for wetlands in order to prioritize protection,
  - (4) allow coastal states to choose between a nonpoint source or Coastal Zone Management Act program,
  - (5) reform the point source permit process for feedyards and,
  - (6) give USDA sole jurisdiction over agricultural wetlands.
- The bill has been referred to the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee for consideration.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department is allowing more farmers and food processors to qualify for two export subsidy programs.

USDA has issued a final rule to amend the Export Enhancement Program and the Dairy Export Incentive Program, which help U.S. agricultural producers and processors and exporters gain access to foreign markets.

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## Progress report on state, federal projects for farmers/ranchers will be presented

A progress report on state and federal projects designed to help farmers and ranchers safeguard the nation's water quality will be presented May 30-June 1 in Abilene at the Kiva Inn.

Representatives of 11 federal and state agencies will report and participants will get a close look at the Seymour Aquifer Hydrologic Unit Area Project in Knox and Haskell counties during an all-day tour the second day of the conference (May 31).

Federal agencies involved in the projects and review are the Environmental Protection Agency, U.S. Geological Survey, Natural Resources Conservation Service, consolidated Farm Service Agency and Cooperative State Research, Education and Extension Service.

State agencies taking part are the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Farm Bureau, Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission and Texas Water Development Board.

The Seymour Aquifer project is one of four major national water quality efforts being conducted in Texas since 1990, that shallow aquifer underlies 274,500 acres and furnished drinking and domestic water for rural families and more than 2,000 irrigation wells and livestock in the two counties. Scientists are seeking solutions to a century-old problem of high nitrate levels in the aquifer, explained Dr. B.L. Harris, Extension Service soil specialist and project administrator.

The other three national studies in Texas, which will be reported on during the conference, are:

- Seco Creek Water quality Demonstration Project, on the Edwards Aquifer west of San Antonio, the only U.S. study of rangeland water quality;

- Upper North Bosque River Hydrologic Unit, in North Central Texas, which focuses on management of dairy wastes, and

- Lake Fork Creek Hydrologic Unit, in the Sabine Basin, which has focus on potential nonpoint source surface and ground water contamination.

Also to be covered during the reports are research by the Experiment Station on effects of juniper control on water conservation, Extension Service incorporation of water quality activities into county educational programs, Extension's "Tex-A-Syst" wellhead protection program, water quality cost-sharing programs of the CFSA, and results of a statewide water quality survey by the Texas Farm Bureau.

Other reports will look at water quality programs of the state Water Development Board; nonpoint source

programs of the state soil and water conservation board, TNRCC, EPA and Extension; new TNRCC regulations; and national perspectives on water quality programs.

College Station, telephone (409)845-2425, so that tour transportation can be arranged. Registration fees, which may be paid at the conference, are \$10 for one day, \$15 for two days excluding the tour, or \$25 for all three days including the tour.

## Beef is being grilled according to poll Scout training to be conducted by

WASHINGTON (AP) - Where's the beef?

It's on the grill, according to a poll conducted by the National Cattlemen's Association, which found, not surprisingly, that beef is the nation's favorite cookout food.

The poll, conducted by the McLean, Va.-based Wirthlin Group, found that two out of three Americans plan to fire up their grills during the upcoming Memorial Day weekend, and that 73 percent of them will be cooking beef.

Chicken was second, at 27 percent, followed by pork, 6 percent; turkey, 3 percent; and fish 2 percent.

Hamburgers are the most preferred grilled-beef dish, at 44 percent, but

steaks are a close second, 39 percent.

More beef is eaten on Memorial Day than on any other day of the year. The cattlemen's group estimates that the total on this year's holiday will be a hefty 61.1 million pounds - 25 percent more than the average daily consumption.

And this year, the main course of the Memorial Day cookout may cost less than it did last year, the association said.

Prices of beef, as well as other meats, have been declining because increased production has kept ample supplies on the market. These conditions are expected to continue in the months and probably years ahead.

Beef production rose 2 percent during the first three months of this year, compared with a 6 percent increase last year from 1993, the association said. It's expected that production during the first half of this year will be the largest since 1977.

Poultry output is expected to be 5 percent higher this year than last year, when it was 6 percent higher than 1993.

Pork production is projected to be 2 percent higher this year.

With ample supplies on the market, competition for consumers' meat dollars is expected to continue.

Though beef enjoys the spotlight on Memorial Day - the traditional start of summer and the cookout season - backyard chefs pick beef as the entree less often at other times, but it is still the clear favorite.

The poll shows that during the summer months - when 70 percent of Americans grill at least two or three times a month - 62 percent choose beef, 25 select chicken, 4 percent want pork, 1 percent go for turkey and 1 percent choose fish.

The survey of 1,000 adults was conducted April 17-20. Its margin of error is plus or minus 3.1 percentage points.

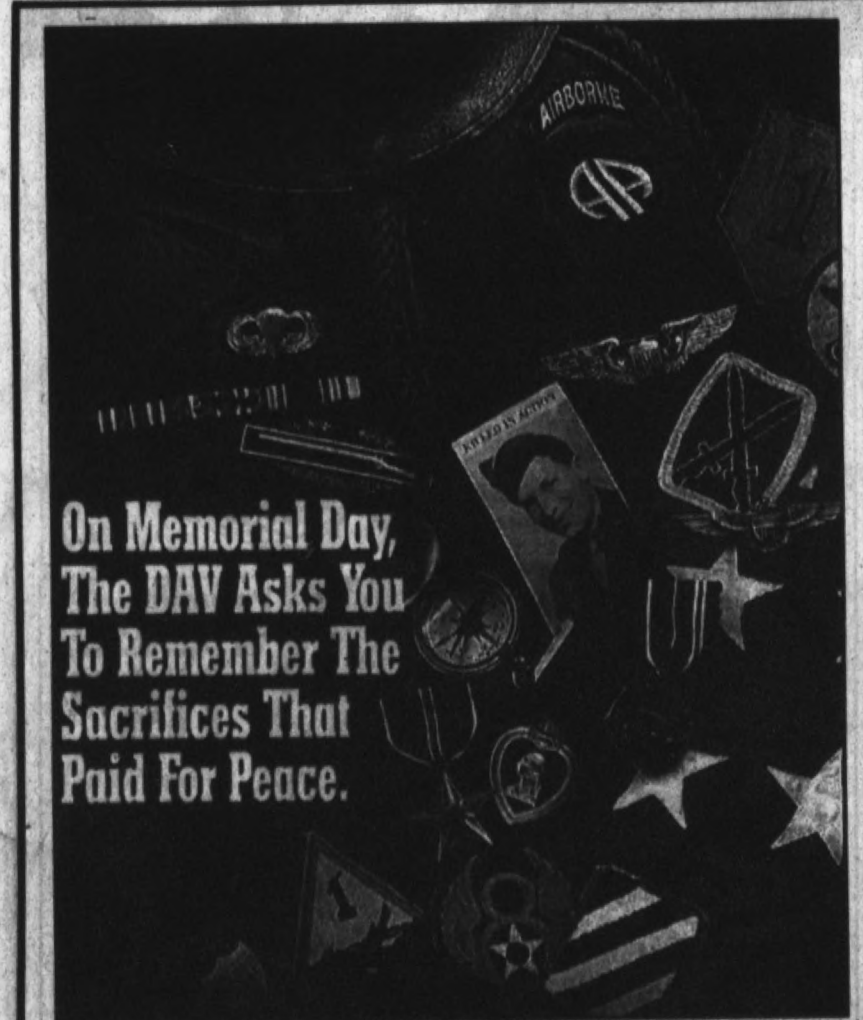

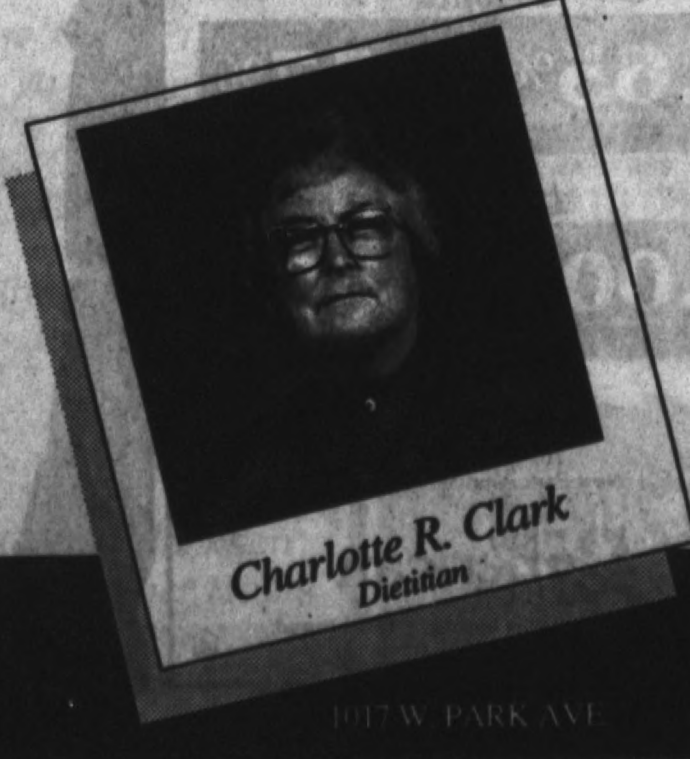

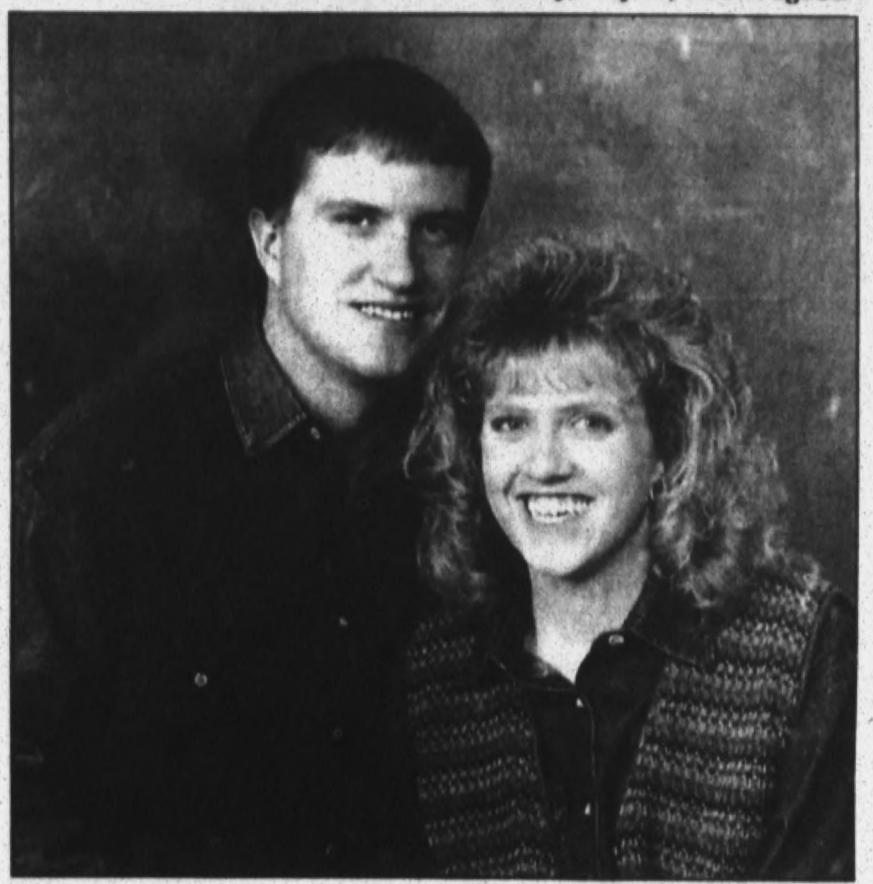

LOS ANGELES (AP) - "Entertainment Tonight" thinks John Tesh should be doing more reporting and less entertaining.

Paramount Television, which produces the syndicated show, went to court Monday to block Tesh's request for an unpaid three-month leave this summer so he can concentrate on writing songs and touring. A judge set a June 6 hearing on whether to grant a preliminary injunction.

My mother was one of those people who believed that every meal should be followed by dessert.

If she didn't already have something prepared, she had a simple cake recipe that she would "throw together" (her expression) just before we sat down to eat. Then we could smell the aroma of the cake baking while we ate.

The cake would come out of the oven just as we finished our meal, and everyone was served a very warm piece topped with homemade chocolate sauce, whipped cream or ice cream.

Here is her recipe.  
(Note: Next week -- a chocolate sauce recipe.)

### WACKY CAKE

1 1/2 c. flour  
1 c. sugar  
3 T. cocoa  
1 t. soda  
1 t. vanilla  
1 T. vinegar  
6 T. cooking oil  
1 c. water

Grease a 9" square pan. Sift flour, sugar, cocoa and soda together directly into pan. Make three depressions in mixture; in one put vanilla, in one put vinegar, in other put oil. Pour water over all, mix well with fork. Bake thirty minutes at 350 degrees.

Spring cleaning time is here. Well, for me it's just getting here. Some may have already gotten their spring cleaning done.

There is one chore that I dread -- cleaning windows. There are always spots and stains that are all but impossible to remove. I have tried

sprays, commercial cleaners and various homemade solutions, all to no avail. However, someone made a suggestion last year that I found very helpful.

Clean a small portion of the window pane at a time, using silver polish. It is very effective and will not damage the glass. Just don't try to clean the entire window at once. The polish is too hard to remove after it dries.

Do you want paper or plastic? This is generally the question I am asked when I check out at the grocery store. And I generally reply, "Paper."

What can you do with used plastic bags? About the only thing I have come up with is lining the small waste baskets.

But paper bags are a different story. You can:

-- Use them like plain brown paper to wrap packages to mail by cutting them open and turning them wrong side out.

-- Make liners for cake pans by greasing and flouring.

-- Use smaller size bags for packing lunches.

-- Make paper patterns for craft projects.

-- Cut them open and spread on the floor to save the carpet or tile when it's muddy outside.

-- Breathe into one to stop hiccups.

-- Give kids paper bags, crayons, and scissors (be sure they are blunt tipped) and let them be creative when they have to be inside because it's cold or rainy.

I am sure plastic is wonderful and it has its place. But I think I will continue to say "Paper, please" when given a choice.

## Extension News

Regardless of all the recent bad press given to Mexican restaurants, several items would be better choices and could allow you a heart-healthy meal Mexican style. When ordering always ask if beans and rice are prepared without fat. Order items without cheese or sour cream.

Fajitas -- a south Texan favorite - or tacos al carbon made with either grilled beef, pork or chicken breast wrapped in flour tortilla like one and 1/2 servings of bread. Order a lettuce and tomato salad but less guacamole salad as 1/8 avocado counts as a serving of fat. Hey the salsa is free choice. The bad news is that the tortilla chips -- unless baked -- are very high in fat. If vegetables are ordered, ask if they are steamed.

A New Mozzarella Cheese to

Lower Fat in Pizza. Americans consume nearly 100 acres of pizza daily. This figure translates to an average of 7.7 pounds of that delicious, stringy mozzarella cheese topping per person per year. Scientists with the Agricultural Research Service have developed a type of mozzarella with only 10 percent fat by weight and textural properties similar to those of commercial full fat mozzarella compared to the regular mozzarella with about 22 to 24 percent fat by

weight and part-skim with about 17 percent fat.

Regular pizza consumed by school-age children has about 20 percent fat cheese. So you can count that 40 percent of the calories in a serving of pizza are contributed by fat.

This new cheese will help provide lower fat pizzas that still have similar properties in taste and palatability to those of the full fat mozzarella. Start checking menus for a lower fat pizza.

**WHO'S COLOR BLIND?**

Almost no one. Most of us are able to see some color, but not necessarily accurately. The problem is actually color deficiency, being unable to differentiate reliably between certain colors. Most common is the red/green problem; color-deficient people usually see similar shades of grey.

What makes this serious is that our traffic lights are red and green. Folks who can't really see the color have to learn how to interpret what they do see in order to cross the street or drive a car safely.

Ask your optometrist about the "color blindness" test. What's used most often is a chart in which ordinary numbers made up of various shades of green dots are integrated into a background of various shades of red dots. For most of us, it's not difficult at all to make out the numbers and read the chart. Those who have difficulty with the test are color-deficient to some extent. For reasons unknown, men are more likely to be color-blind than women.

## To Your Good Health

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** My husband, age 61, had a strange experience a few weeks ago. While driving to work, he sneezed and passed out. Fortunately, he wasn't going fast and just came to rest at a curb. He came out of it in a few seconds and went directly to the doctor's office. They did tests, including a 24-hour heart monitor. Everything was fine. Now, he is concerned it might happen again. Can you comment? — Mrs. N.

**ANSWER:** There are more ways to faint than I can count. Your husband had what is called a "tussive syncope," a fainting that comes on with coughing or a vigorous sneeze.

Middle-aged men who are overweight and who have chronic bronchitis are typical victims of the frightening experience. Many do not complete the faint, but experience a brief dizzy spell short of passing out.

The tussive faint arises from a sudden change in air pressure within the chest cavity. That change disrupts normal blood flow, including that to the brain vessels.

Your husband did what I would have done: sought attention. It could happen again, so be forewarned.

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** My son, at age 24, has been diagnosed with gout, which he inherited from his father. I have read that it is rare for someone to have gout so young. He is on medication, but still has flare-ups. He has it in his foot. My husband started in his elbow. Could my son possibly have something else? — Mrs. G.K.

**ANSWER:** Gout can run in families. Most gout patients have their initial attacks in their 50s or 60s.

In order of frequency of pain location, the base of the big toe would rank first, but your husband's elbow location was not unusual. Gout can be an equal-opportunity joint disrupter, emerging in the insteps, the knees, the wrists and other areas.

The onset is pretty diagnostic. The gout pain might emerge after a slight injury or, what is more common, right out of the blue. If there is doubt, a check of joint fluid can show the characteristic uric-acid crystals. Those largely insoluble acids are what settle out as painful shards inside joints.

Your son can settle any doubts about his condition with a second opinion. Certainly, the medicines

used to treat gout would not help were his joint pain evidence of something else.

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** My sister had a low-grade tumor removed from her bladder. How often does she have to have this rechecked? She has had several opinions. What is yours? We both read your column daily and would like to hear what you might have to say about this. — N.N.

**ANSWER:** An answer to such a question from such a distance has to be general.

The kind of cancer your sister had would dictate the exact schedule of the bladder exams. How deeply the cancer had penetrated the bladder wall would be an important consideration.

Follow-up tests usually are done every three to six months. A cystoscope is inserted into the bladder for the examination.

# MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

## IF I WERE IN CHARGE

During the last few years I've stayed in enough hotels and motels, driven enough rental cars and traversed enough airports to qualify as an experienced judge. Perhaps, with a few more frequent flyer miles I might even qualify as an expert.

One of the most interesting differences I've observed is in the area of hotel/motel accommodations. There are significant differences in price, with precious little difference in the actual value of the product. I've slept soundly in Super 8's at under \$40 per night. I've been kept awake by the snoring of a "next-room neighbor" at the Ritz-Carlton at more than \$200 per night.

I can find little correlation between price and the quality

of an overnight stay. Remember, that value is the perceived balance of price compared to quality. Therefore, it is pretty hard to equate a \$200 sleepless night to real value.

All the rooms I've stayed in have had beds, tables, chairs, desks, lamps, a television and a bathroom. Nearly all mattresses are mediocre. Usually, the bathrooms are adequate. The furniture varies from poor to fair. There is certainly room for improvement. Let's make changes

If I were in charge, I'd make some changes in the way motels do business. First, I'd make the rooms quiet. I don't want to hear my neighbor snore, and I doubt they want to hear me practice my keynote speech.

Next, I'd put an iron and ironing board in the closet of every room for travelers with wrinkled clothes. I'd even throw in a can of spray starch to help remove wrinkles from a starched shirt.

I'd spend a little more money on quality mattresses. I'd wash the covers occasionally, too.

In the bathroom, I'd add one of those clever little mount-on-the-wall hair dryers and install good lighting. One 40-watt bulb in a thrice-painted-over fixture doesn't get it. Of course, if you light up the bathroom, you have to clean it, too. That's not a bad idea either.

I'd also provide a real desk with a good reading light. The desk should have a comfortable chair and extra sheets of writing paper.

I'd put a diagram on the door with directions to the fire exits and ice machines. I'd make the ice buckets large enough to hold more than nine ice cubes.

I'd take the ash trays out of the non-smoking rooms and make certain pillows didn't smell like smoke. I'd remove all of those 39 cent plug-in deodorizers.

### Let's cut costs

I'd reduce the cost of mandatory valet parking to no more than \$5 per day. I'd put a ceiling on phone charges of 50 cents per call a the motel end.

We could eliminate the chocolates on the pillow, and no one needs the bed turned down for them. We can apply the savings toward lowering the room rates. Speaking of room rates, I'd be honest about the "lowest" rates I quote.

Recently, while on business, I stayed at one of the premium hotels in Atlanta. When I checked in I questioned the \$185 room rate. "That is our special convention rate," the check-in person assured me. I signed in, grateful that someone else was paying the bill. Then, I overheard the clerk at the next counter say to her customer, "This our special weekend rate of \$119 and please remember our free breakfast buffet."

I made a mental note to cross another chain off my list of places to stay when I'm making the decision. I don't believe in charging high prices just because you can. Why, the next thing you know, we'd have more hotel operators in Congress than attorneys.

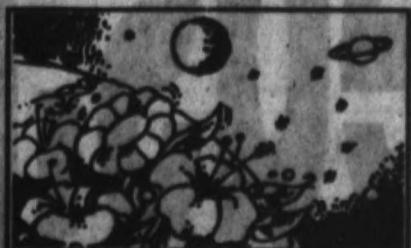

# Experts believe eggs not such bad food after all

## Eating an egg raises cholesterol only slightly for most people

The egg taboo is beginning to crack.

Perhaps no idea has grown more fixed in the culinary consciousness over the past generation than the evils of eggs. Two over easy, once the foundation of a good breakfast, are a forbidden indulgence for many, enjoyed guiltily if at all.

The reasoning is simple. Cholesterol is bad for the heart. Since eggs have lots of cholesterol, they must be bad, too.

Clearly plenty of Americans have bought this line of thought. Annual consumption has fallen from 320 eggs per person in 1960 to 235 now.

Many experts believe that eggs have been unfairly demonized. A consensus is growing that eggs are not such bad food after all.

A three-egg omelet is unlikely to slide into the good-for-you category of five-grain bread and celery sticks. The blanket damnation of eggs is quietly being de-emphasized by the dietary gurus who set national nutritional policies and ultimately influence what all of us eat.

These experts recommend that people who already have high blood cholesterol levels should continue to steer away from eggs. So should those with a strong family history of coronary artery disease.

Some of them are also starting to suggest that many healthy folks with blood cholesterol levels under 200 milligrams per deciliter can probably eat an egg or two a day without

worry, especially if they know their HDL levels - the so-called good cholesterol - are reasonably high.

Even those who want to keep the public from switching back to eggs agree that saturated fat are far bigger villains than dietary cholesterol.

"For the majority of people, taking eggs out of the diet does nothing," said Dr. Robert Nicolosi of the University of Massachusetts in Lowell, who chaired a recent American Heart Association conference on the links between diet and cholesterol.

The cholesterol that people eat has little impact on the cholesterol in their bloodstreams. Eating an egg typically raises cholesterol only slightly for most people.

Dr. Henry Ginsberg of Columbia University experimented on healthy young medical students who were on low-fat diets. For each egg eaten, the men's cholesterol rose an average three milligrams, and the women's went up four.

The body can make all the cholesterol it needs in the liver. Only about 25 percent of the cholesterol in the bloodstream comes directly from food. When cholesterol consumption goes up, the liver makes less, and the body takes in less of it through the digestive tract, as well.

A stunning example of this built-in control was the case of an 88-year-old man written up in a medical journal a few years ago. He ate 25 eggs a day for 15 years, yet his blood cholesterol level was below 200.

Some folks are sensitive to dietary

cholesterol. They are responders. Eating an egg makes their cholesterol go up enough to worry about.

"What has caused confusion is that the response varies so much from one person to another," said Dr. Henry McGill of the University of Texas at San Antonio. "Close to half of the population have a biologically insignificant rise in cholesterol" when they eat cholesterol-laden food. "But there is always a group who respond with a dramatic rise."

In Ginsberg's experiment, a few of the volunteers' cholesterol actually fell when they ate eggs. Some stayed the same, while several went up more than twice the average. Perhaps one-third of the population are thought to be moderate to severe responders to dietary cholesterol.

Complicating all this even more, there is no easy way to tell who is a responder and who is not. Responders can become non-responders over time, and vice versa. When Ginsberg repeated his experiment on the same people two years later, he found that only one-third responded the same way.

Even if most people suffer no ill effects when they eat eggs, policy makers are loathe to tinker with official pronouncements. Those simple dietary rules have worked well over the years. Since the early 1960s, Americans' blood cholesterol levels have fallen from an average of 220 to the current 205.

The regimen many people try to follow is the heart association's Step 1 diet. It recommends that everyone over age 2 consume less than 30 percent

of their calories from fat and less than 10 percent from saturated fat. It suggests a dietary cholesterol intake of less than 300 milligrams a day and no more than four egg yolks a week.

One large egg contains 215 milligrams of cholesterol, which is concentrated in the yolk. An egg is more than cholesterol. It is an excellent source of protein, low-fat and a good choice for dieters.

Eggs are cheap, available

everywhere, fixable in all sorts of interesting ways and easy to chew and digest.

All of this leads to one of the basic dilemmas of setting across-the-board nutritional rules. No one is truly average, especially in the way their bodies handle cholesterol. The heart association's 300-milligram-a-day limit may be needlessly strict for half to two-thirds of the population and not rigid enough for the rest.

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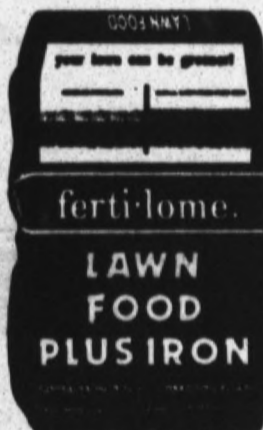

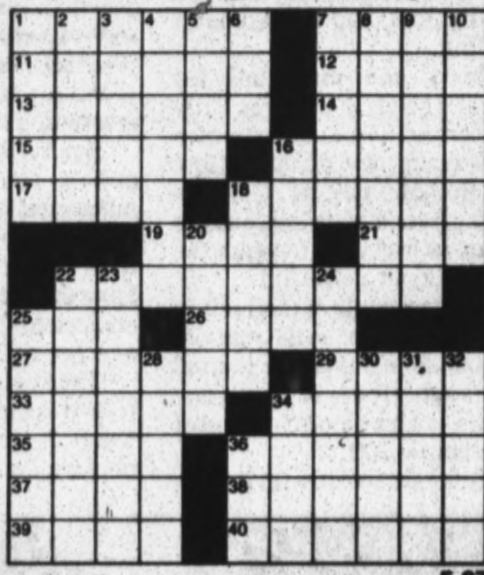

## Butterfly Room lets families stay with dying infants

**GALVESTON, Texas (AP)** - As Rayna Jane Robin's life was ending, the newborn's parents rocked her, caressed her and never left her side.  
Tina and Craig Robin were fortunate: they had found a place where their daughter could spend her only days in peace - a place away from a noisy hospital intensive care unit filled with other sick children and limited in visiting hours and space.

Rayna and her parents were the first to use the Butterfly Room at the University of Texas Medical Branch Children's Hospital, one of few inpatient pediatric hospices in the country.

The suite - once two semiprivate hospital rooms with four beds - was large enough to accommodate the Vidor couple and another relative and could have held the Robins' other two children if they wished.

They had pullout beds, a kitchenette, a private shower and a window seat with a serene view of a courtyard.

There was no reason to leave Rayna, whose kidneys never developed.

The idea is for doctors and nurses to turn the focus from hope for finding a cure for a terminally ill child to hope for getting the child out of pain and discomfort.

Mrs. Robin, 26, says using the Butterfly Room made Rayna's death on Jan. 10 easier to handle, although she remains overcome by sadness at the loss of her 8-day-old daughter.

"It really was nice just to be able to be in the same room with her and to be able to hold her," she said. "It really helped to be able to be with her as long as we could."

Five other terminally ill children and their families have followed the Robins in the Butterfly Room - named to represent transition - since it opened in January. Most of the patients have been under 3 years old, their diagnoses ranging from heart failure to AIDS. One used the room for two days; another for 19.

"We can assure them of certain things that most people fear about

dying," said Dr. Marcia Levettown, medical director of UTMB's Pediatric Hospice Program.

"They fear being in pain. They fear being abandoned. They fear not seeing their family. And we can assure them through our program that none of those fears will be realized."

About a year and a half ago, Levettown began researching ways to help parents deal with losing a child.

"I didn't like the way we did deaths in pediatric critical care," she said.

"When I would call families months later to find out how they were doing after the loss of their child, they would be completely dysfunctional and hysterical. The ripple effect of not doing what you're supposed to do to take care of families is phenomenal."

She learned about a hospice within St. Mary's Hospital for Children in Bayside, N.Y. That program, the first inpatient pediatric hospice in the nation, dedicates 10 beds to palliative - lessening, but not curing - care.

Parents can cook meals and stay overnight in the unit, which has been operating for 10 years, said Dr. Neil Lombardi, vice president of medical services.

Lombardi, who helped set up a palliative care program at Baylor Pediatric Center for Restorative Care in Dallas in February, said inpatient hospices for children are rare.

"We've gotten to the point where people are facing the fact that children do die. They do suffer from illnesses that are lethal. We can't cure everything," Lombardi said.

Terminally ill children shouldn't spend their final days in an intensive care unit, he said.

"If the child is going to die anyway, it's better for the family and the child to be in a more comfortable setting," Lombardi said.

Children in the Baylor program stay in semiprivate rooms and their families can stay for about a week during their last days, said Angela Bennett, a coordinator of the program.

The 26-bed facility, which serves children with various chronic illnesses, does not dedicate a specific number of beds to palliative care, she said.

After reading about the St. Mary's hospice and Edmarc Hospice for Children in Portsmouth, Va. - an agency that has provided home-based hospice care for 16 years - Levettown outlined a plan for the Butterfly Room.

At first UTMB officials were reluctant, she said, because knocking down the wall between two semiprivate rooms to construct the hospice would eliminate four beds.

"That was a concern," said Andrew DeYoung, administrator of the children's hospital. "So far it hasn't proved to be a problem. We've been able to find beds for patients when they need the beds."

The hospital also had to decide whether to spend \$33,000 on renovation.

"Looking at the cost of an ICU versus the hospice room, it was a fairly clear choice," DeYoung said.

The hospital paid for the architectural changes, but many of the room's contents - such as the coffee pot and microwave - were donated.

One family, who spent nearly three weeks in the Butterfly Room, asked that any gifts given to their child be donated to the hospice fund.

"They identified certain problems with the room, like there's no clock in here and there's no cushion for the rocker. They said, 'we're coming back to give you those things. Don't buy them on your own. We want to provide them. We want that to be our gift to the hospice room,'" Levettown said.

Despite such favorable responses from families, Levettown's peers' reactions have been mixed. "Some have felt like we've always needed this," she said. "There are others who feel that being a doctor means trying to cure."

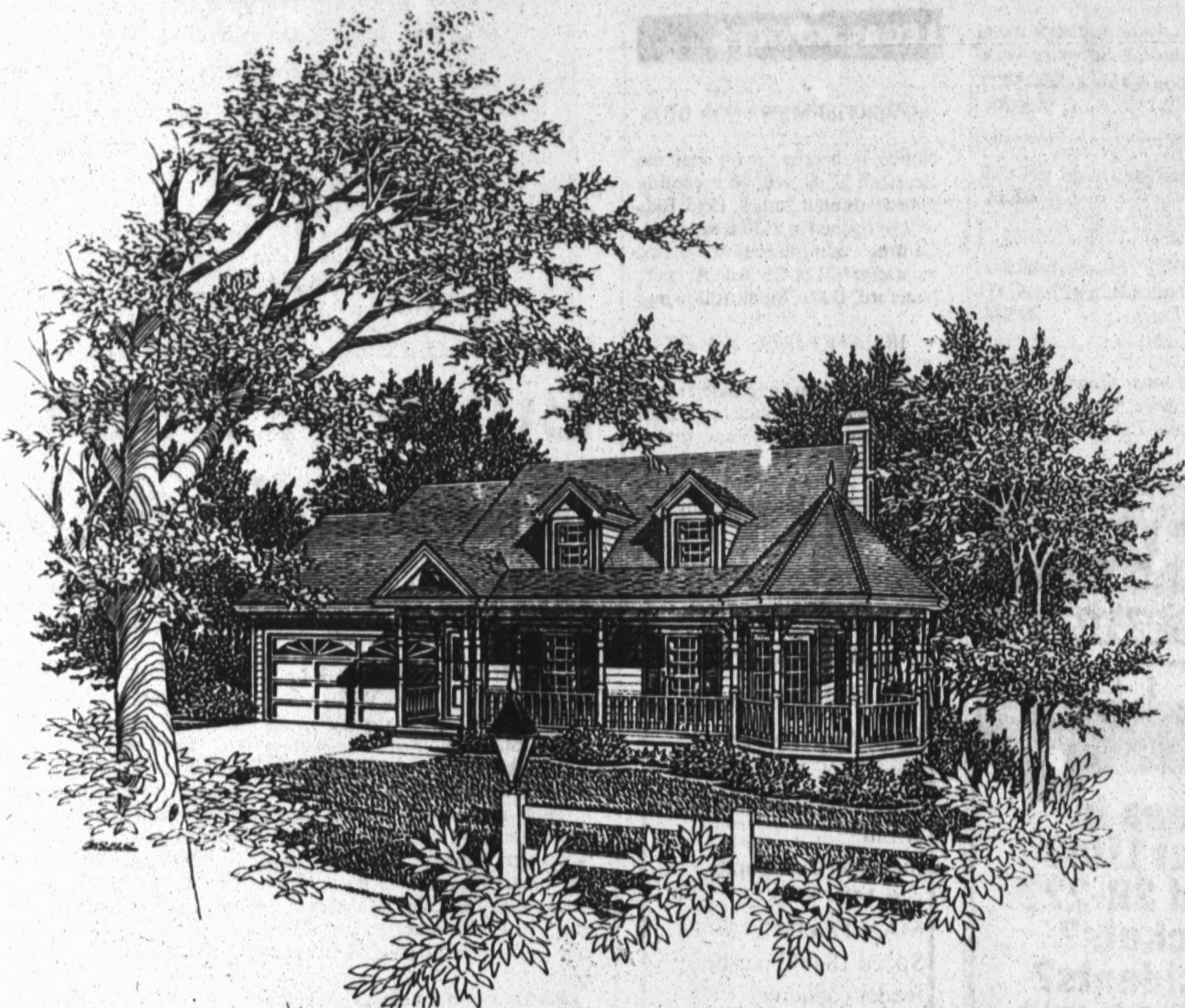

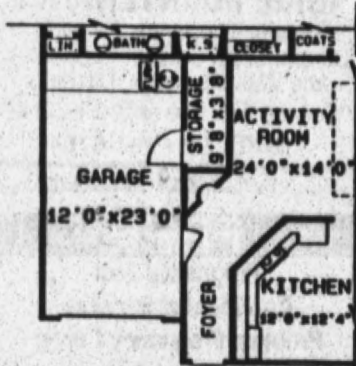

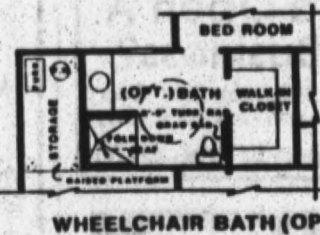

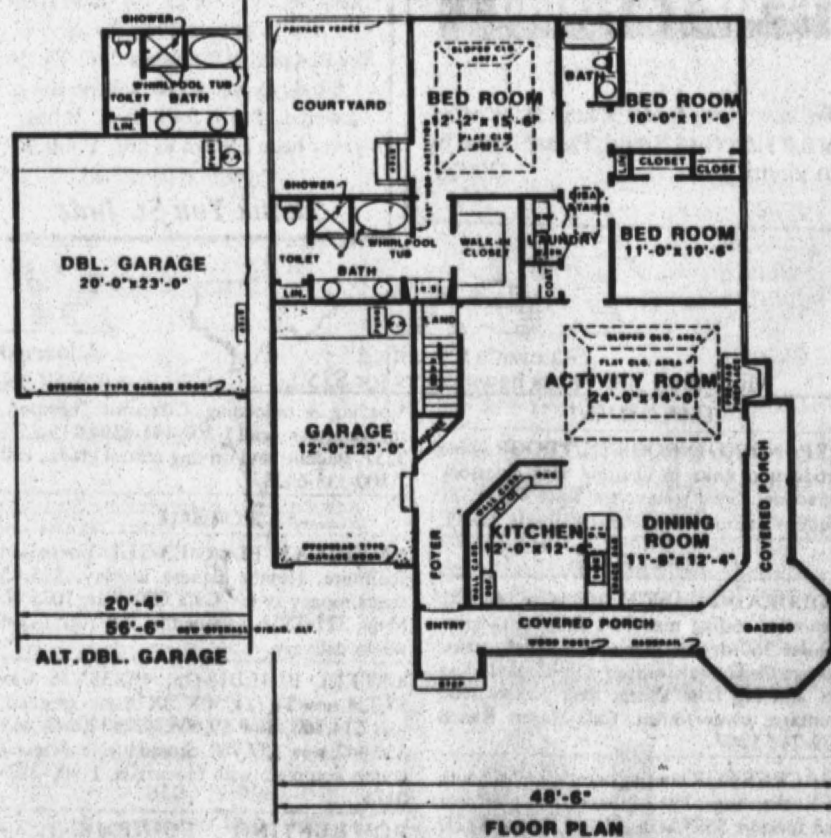

## Edging gives crisp look by separating lawn, beds

A well manicured yard is a pleasure to look at, but it takes a lot of work. So, most of us opt for a simple landscape that we can keep in shape without daily care.

One easy-keep way to give a crisp look to lawn and planting beds is to make a clear separation between them with edging. Edging helps keep creeping plants in place and defines planting areas even when plants are dormant.

Sunk so its top surface is nearly flush with the ground, it serves as a lawnmower base. You can wheel your mower over it and eliminate hand-trimming.

There are many different types of edging made of wood or masonry. Although it cannot be used as a lawnmower base, strip-edging of metal or plastic combined with a bed of tree bark or stone aggregate also looks neat and requires minimal maintenance.

Wood-edging is a very easy material to install. Redwood is the most readily available wood that is

naturally decay resistant. When wood is in contact with the ground, use all-heart redwood (solid colored with no light streaks of sapwood in it). All-heart cedar is also naturally decay resistant, although it may be a little more difficult to find in lumberyards.

Sink large wood timbers directly into the ground or on a 2-inch bed of sand. To determine your needs, multiply length by width by depth in feet or fractions of a foot to work out the number of cubic feet of sand.

Softwood timbers that have been pressure-treated with preservative make excellent edging. Be sure to get stock designated for ground-contact use, as not all treated wood serves this purpose.

Log rounds, cut 2 or more inches thick and 4 inches in diameter, make a rustic edging that can be used as a mower base when embedded in the ground, and larger rounds can serve as a raised border.

Masonry edging such as brick, tile, stone or concrete does not rot like wood and can be installed in the same way or cast in place.

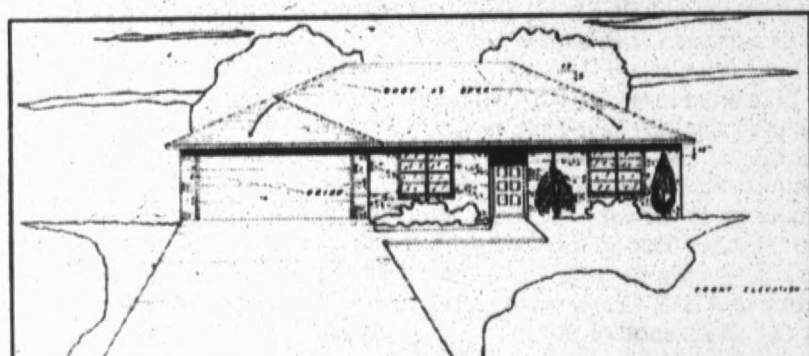

## Observational studies reveal old love is really the best love

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) - University research reveals something our grandparents may already have known: Old love really is the best love.

The observational studies conducted by psychologists at the University of California, Berkeley, found that couples in long-term marriages become happier as they age, learning to express more affection.

"What we actually thought we would see is a kind of a fatigue quality in these relationships. But that's not what we see. They're vibrant, they're alive, they're emotional, they're fun, they're sexy, they're not burned out," said University of California, Berkeley, psychology Professor Robert W. Levenson.

The findings wouldn't be any surprise to Robert Browning, who long ago invited his love to "Grow old along with me! The best is yet to be."

They do fly in the face of the mythology of modern romance, which is crammed with songs, novels and movies extolling the joys of young, even puppy, love.

"The general theme in most research on aging is that of a lessening and diminution," said Levenson, who, along with two colleagues, published a paper on the research in a recent issue of the journal *Psychology and Aging*.

"Going into it, I think our best bet would have been marriages would have become less emotional and less affectionate and maybe less lively and vibrant and that's not what we found."

The research has been carried out since 1989 with 156 couples who live in the east San Francisco Bay area. One group of couples consists of people in their 60s who have been married for at least 15 years and the other of people in their 40s who had been married for at least 15 years.

Researchers interviewed the couples in their homes and also brought them into a laboratory setting, where they were hooked up to equipment measuring their reactions.

For the lab sessions, couples were asked to bring up an area of conflict and talk about it. Researchers found that older couples didn't have duller emotions than their younger counterparts, but they were less negative and more affectionate.

A couple talking about a communication problem while researchers listened might have an exchange in which the wife complained that her husband stared into space while she talked and the husband retorted that everytime he tried to say something he was cut off.

At that point, the middle-aged couples were likely to escalate the fight, with the wife saying, "Well, you don't listen either!" Levenson said.

In the older couples the wife might defuse the conflict by saying something like, "You might look off into space, but I know your heart's in the right place."

Younger couples resorted to

humor, too, but it tended to be of a cutting nature that hurt, not healed. Their other coping mechanism was to stop talking altogether, a method used more often by men than women.

University of California, Berkeley, psychology Professor Phil Cowan said the findings made sense to him, "given that I'm 57 and I've been married for 35 years."

"If you last that long then I think you're looking at a group of people who have found a way to live together," he said.

Levenson theorizes that the happier older marriages are probably due to a combination of getting smarter and mellowed.

"One of the things these couples tell us over and over again is they've had hard times both in their marriages and their lives and somehow that struggle has brought them closer together."

That's good news for couples trying to cope with the stresses of married life, Levenson said.

"If you can navigate those in a thoughtful and constructive way, at the end relationships just seem to get better and better and that is a pretty optimistic statement."

## Public trust in Social Security is very low according to research

We live in a cynical age. The fact was again brought home to me as I read through some recent research data on public trust in the Social Security program.

According to one survey, nearly one-third of respondents thought that

less than half of their Social Security tax dollars went to pay benefits. Another third of those surveyed said that perhaps one-half to three-quarters of their Social Security tax dollars went to pay benefits.

In reality, approximately 99 percent of Social Security taxes go to pay current or future benefits, with

only one percent used for administrative expenses.

A report of the National Academy of Social Insurance commented on public cynicism, noting "The very vastness of the government discourages feelings of closeness and understanding that accompanies trust. This vastness fosters concern about mismanaging finances and poor administration of the (Social Security) program."

I know that the U.S. federal government can at times of billion and trillion dollar amounts, it is hard to connect those numbers with everyday reality.

But Social Security is as close to you as our nearest office -- and a number everyone can and should remember is that 99 cents of every Social Security tax dollar is returned in benefit payments.

Did you know?

95 percent of elderly are eligible for Social Security.

About 95 percent of the people aged 65 or older at the beginning of 1995 were receiving Social Security retirement benefits or will be eligible for benefits when they or their spouses retire.

98 percent of children can count on survivors benefits.

Approximately 98 percent of the children under 18 can count on monthly Social Security benefits if a working parent dies.

Four out of five eligible for disability benefits.

Four out of five men and women aged 21-64 can count on monthly Social Security disability benefits in the event they suffer a severe and prolonged disability.

## SOCIAL SECURITY Byron Sansom

### SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

**Q:** I recently received a benefit estimate statement from Social Security in the mail unsolicited. Do I need to contact Social Security or take some other action?

**A:** After you read the statement, you don't need to do anything unless you want to apply for Social Security benefits, or you believe the information on your earnings is not correct. If you find what seems to be an error, contact Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 or our local office at 376-2241. When you call, try to have handy a record of your correct earnings, e.g., W-2 form, tax return, pay stub, etc. Also, be sure to contact us if your name or Social Security number is not correct.

**Q:** My wife is 62 years of age and receives monthly Social Security payments. Why didn't she receive one of the benefit estimate statements?

**A:** The Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statements were sent to people age 60 and older who have posted earnings with Social Security and who are not currently receiving Social Security payments.

**Q:** I am a single man, and I receive Social Security payments based on my own work record. When I pass away, will Social Security help pay my funeral expenses?

**A:** Social Security makes a small death payment of \$255 in certain situations. The deceased person must have been receiving Social Security on their own work record or have worked long enough to do so. However, the payment can be made only to a surviving spouse living in the same household or to a spouse or child, who are eligible for payments on the deceased person's record the month of death. Technically, this payment is not a payment toward funeral expenses.

**Q:** I am not quite 63 years of age and have been receiving Social Security retirement benefits since I was 62. I was recently injured severely in an accident and can no longer work. Can I file for disability Social Security?

**A:** Yes. If you become disabled before 65 years of age, you should contact Social Security to see about filing for disability payments. You may be eligible for a larger check based upon disability.

**Q:** I have both Part A and Part B of Medicare. Many of my friends have a supplemental private insurance, and I am interested in obtaining such a policy to supplement Medicare. Can the people at Social Security give me a list of preferred insurance companies?

**A:** No. Social Security employees may not recommend an insurance company; this would violate federal law. However, we can supply you with a pamphlet that gives important information for persons considering the purchase of private insurance to supplement Medicare. You can obtain this pamphlet by phoning Social Security's toll-free number of 1-800-772-1213 or our local office at 376-2241. The name of the pamphlet is "1995 Guide to Health Insurance for People with Medicare."

## Women who take extra estrogen at higher risk for ovarian cancer

ATLANTA (AP) - Older women who take estrogen supplements for several years may face a higher risk of dying from ovarian cancer, a new study from the American Cancer Society found.

The risk of fatal ovarian cancer increased with the number of years the women took the hormone supplement, according to the study. Estrogen supplements, also called estrogen replacement therapy, are often taken to ease symptoms of menopause and to prevent the bone disease osteoporosis.

The Atlanta-based cancer group said the report's conclusions should be taken cautiously. The study began in 1982, when women took higher doses of estrogen and did not take it with progesterone, as it is now generally prescribed. The hormones are combined to combat the increased risk of endometrial cancer from estrogen alone.

Dr. Mary Daly, an epidemiologist and cancer specialist at Fox Chase Cancer Center in Philadelphia, also

urged caution about the study's findings, saying it contradicts current research suggesting that hormones play a role in the disease and that estrogen might actually protect against it.

"The value of it is saying that there's something to hormones and ovarian cancer," Daley said. "We really need to study this further."

Of the 240,073 healthy, postmenopausal women in the study, 68,906, or 29 percent, used estrogen replacement therapy. By the time the seven-year study ended, 436 women, or 0.2 percent, had died of ovarian cancer. Of the women who died, 142, or about 32 percent, had used estrogen.

After other risk factors, such as age and use of oral contraceptives, were taken into account, women who had taken estrogen at least six years faced a 40 percent higher risk than those who had never taken the drug. The risk jumped by 70 percent for those who had taken the supplement at least 11 years.

The study did not examine whether the supplements increase a woman's

1 percent risk of simply developing ovarian cancer. But because the disease is so deadly, estrogen supplements may raise that danger as well, the authors suggested, adding that they are now looking at that possibility.

Ovarian cancer will strike some 26,600 women this year, according to the American Cancer Society. Because most of them will already be in the late stages of the disease by the time they're diagnosed, only about 40 percent will survive more than five years. About 14,500 women will die of ovarian cancer this year.

The study's lead author, Dr. Carmen Rodriguez, said women should carefully consider the risks and benefits of estrogen replacement therapy before discontinuing or starting treatment.

Estrogen apparently offers some protection from osteoporosis and heart disease, and it may also protect against colon cancer. But it increases the risk of endometrial cancer and may raise the risk of breast cancer after long-term use.



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# Perennials, annuals both good garden choices

Perennial and annual are two terms that can be defined simply, but cause bewilderment for many. When you consider that the same plant can be both an annual and perennial depending upon its environment, the confusion multiplies.

In South Texas, during mild winters, begonias are perennial but in colder regions such as Dallas and Amarillo begonias are annuals.

Simply stated, a perennial is a plant which persists from year to year. Herbaceous perennials survive each winter underground as roots, bulbs, rhizomes or tubers. Foliage and flowers die back during the winter.

Trees and shrubs, both deciduous and evergreen, are woody perennials. These perennials have woody stem tissue that persist above ground each year.

Most perennials are easily propagated by division, seed or cuttings. Division is particularly successful since it not only provides new plants but is necessary for the plants' continued vigor.

Numerous perennials will tolerate relatively poor growing conditions but all respond favorably to well-prepared planting areas containing high percentages of organic materials and moderately high fertility rates. TEXAS GROWN perennials also assure the buyer of quality and adaptability.

Annuals are plants which live their entire life in one year. They germinate, grow, leaf-out, flower, produce seed and then die. Many

readily reseed themselves, leading you to believe the plant grew from its original roots. Not so. An entirely new plant grew from seed.

Both TEXAS GROWN perennials and annuals have a variety of landscape uses and offer an infinite number of exciting combinations. Container gardens, color gardens, borders and cut flower gardens all can be created with the use of perennials and annuals. Keep in mind perennials grow year after year and often require less maintenance than annuals.

Perennials were once a prominent part of nearly every Texas landscape, but are often overlooked by today's gardeners. Many medicinal and culinary herbs are perennials and can offer another dimension to the home landscape.

**Cutting gardens.** Cutting gardens provide the flower lover with abundant material from which to fashion their arrangements. By providing a special cut flower area, the gardener can anticipate and plan for these needs without disturbing or diminishing landscape plantings.

Another advantage of this garden type is that annuals and perennials may be conveniently and efficiently grown in rows where they are easily gathered and maintained. Cutting gardens need not be unattractive, but it is sensible to locate them so they are not the focal point of your landscape.

**Container gardens.** Effectively selecting and placing container plants is a practical way to replace lost ground space in our urban environ-

ments. Container culture of perennials, roses and annuals allows one to control soil quality, watering and plant placement. Most containers are relatively portable and may be grouped or moved to take advantage of seasonal displays. Hanging containers add another dimension to the landscape. When used with restraint and scaled to the surroundings, cascading annuals and perennials can be significant additions to courtyards, entrance areas and terraces.

**Pockets of color.** Perennials and annuals provide seasonal color change. By enlarging planting areas in front of evergreen shrubs it is possible to prepare modes sized spaces for clumps of seasonal color. Make sure to plant sufficient quantities of the flower to create a real impact and not just a "spot" in the overall picture. Use color pockets around outdoor living areas, swimming pools and entrance courts, where they may be enjoyed most.

**Borders.** Perennial borders, inherited from England, evolved during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. These borders extended the growing season form a few months in spring and summer to year-round through the use of bulbs, ornamental grasses, annuals, perennials and herbs. English borders were limited in space by walls or edges, giving continuity to the discord created by the use of a wide variety of plants, each displaying different colors, forms and textures. These herbaceous borders require considerable

space, with dimension of at least 5-6 feet wide and 20-30 feet long. Wider and longer borders offer more opportunity for manipulation and gradation of color, form and texture.

# Nutrition Notes

## REDUCING THE FAT IN BAKED GOODS

Whether it's after dinner or as an indulgent treat, most people find cookies, cakes, and muffins hard to resist. But how much is too much? The Food Guide Pyramid can help you determine the types of foods and number of servings from each food group to eat daily. For a balanced diet, it is recommended that the majority of foods come from the base of the Pyramid, which includes grains, fruits, and vegetables. High-fat and high sugar food found at the tip of the Pyramid should be eaten sparingly. While we all know that we should try to cut back the amount of fat in our diets, no one wants to give up treats they love. Thanks to recent baking innovations you can have your cake (in moderation) and eat it too!

What role does fat play in baking?

In baking, fat adds moisture, flavor, and tender texture to cookies, cakes, quick breads, and muffins. Fruit purees, such as prune or banana, and nonfat dairy products like yogurt or sour cream, provide some of the fat-like characteristics in home-made

baked goods without the addition of fat. In fact, by revising your recipes to include fruit instead of fat, you'll be adding a slight boost of vitamins, minerals, and fiber.

How can I cut fat without sacrificing taste?

While you can cut most of the fat in baked goods by substituting fruit purees or nonfat dairy milk products for butter, margarine or oil, taste is the ultimate test. Baked goods made with natural fat substitutes instead of fat have comparable flavor to their full-fat counterparts, with a lot less fat. For example, a traditional brownie may contain seven grams of fat per serving. By using a fruit puree in place of margarine or butter, the fat is reduced to less than two grams of fat per serving. Much less fat, and lots of flavor!

Do all fruit purees produce the same result?

Not all fruit purees are equal. Flavors vary depending on which fruit puree you choose. For example, prune puree provides a rich flavor and moist, tender texture. Naturally occurring elements in prunes work to enhance other flavors in the recipe such as chocolate, cinnamon, and

orange, leaving your baked goods flavorful, moist and ... lower in fat.

What are the secrets of low-fat baking success?

Even though reducing fat is important, flavor doesn't have to be lost in the process. Depending on the recipe, it may not be possible or even desirable to replace all the fat with a non-fat substitute. When you modify a recipe using fruit puree, substitute 1/2 as much of the chosen substitute for fat. For example, use 1/2 cup puree fruit in place of 1 c butter. You may add a Tbl. or two of fat back into the recipe to achieve the best results. In addition to using fruit purees or non-fat dairy products to cut the fat, other ways to trim the fat include using egg white or egg substitute instead of whole eggs, and graham crackers or chocolate cookie crumb crust in recipes that call for higher fat pastry dough crust.

## LOW FAT FUDGY BROWNIES

4 ozs. unsweetend chocolate  
1/2 c puree prunes  
3 large egg whites  
1 c sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1/2 c flour

1/2 c chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 350\*

Coat an 8 in. square baking pan with vegetable cooking spray.

Cut chocolate into 1 in. pieces and place in heatproof bowl.

Melt chocolate in double boiler or microwave oven. Stir occasionally until chocolate is melted. Remove from heat; set aside.

In mixer bowl, combine all ingredients except flour and walnuts; beat to blend thoroughly. Mix in flour. Spread batter in prepared pan; sprinkle with walnuts. Bake about 30

minutes until springy to the touch and about 2 ins. around the edges.

Cool on rack. Cut into 1 1/2-inch squares.

Makes 3 dozen brownies.

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## To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Do you have any information on pulmonary aspergillus? I would like to know how it develops, its treatment and the outlook when you get it. — E.R.

ANSWER: Aspergillus is one of the most common of all fungi. No matter where you are, you don't have to look far for one.

Luckily, it seldom causes grief; but there are three special circumstances when it might create lung problems.

One is allergic aspergillus, which is largely a problem among people who handle moldy hay. The fungi-loaded hay mold saturates the air, which unwary victims inhale in great quantities. An allergic cough develops into respiratory distress, fever, chills and all the rest.

Allergic aspergillus usually develops within eight hours of exposure. In severe cases, cortisone drugs are used.

Aspergillus fungi might invade lungs in the form of a large, growing ball. That can erode a lung vessel and cause bleeding. Antifungal medicines and surgical removal of the fungus ball are options.

The third form of lung involvement comes as direct invasion of the

lung tissue by the fungi. That is a serious infection. Often antifungal medicines are delivered by way of an intravenous drip.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I have Hashimoto's thyroiditis. My doctor is vague about how it progresses. Could you fill me in? — T.L.

ANSWER: Except for its name, there is nothing especially Asian about Hashimoto's thyroiditis. It is a thyroid problem researched by Dr. Hakura Hashimoto among his Japanese patients. The illness knows no geographical or national boundaries.

Hashimoto's thyroiditis, in fact, is pretty common. It has been suggested that most adult cases of thyroid gland underfunction are due to it. For reasons only guessed at, the person's immune system begins attacking the gland tissue.

In time — and you can't always tell just how long that might be — the gland stops producing its hormone. Then it gets bigger. That enlargement we call a goiter, a sometimes large growth at the neck, over the gland area. Hashimoto's thyroiditis is not the only cause of a goiter, but it is common enough.

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# Social Security

When Older Americans Month was established in 1963, only 17 million living Americans had reached their 65th birthday. There was no Medicare. No Older Americans Act. No Administration on Aging (AoA). More than 35 percent of older Americans lived in poverty.

Today, the situation is vastly different. There are now almost 33 million older Americans -- representing one in eight Americans -- and a wide array of programs to serve their needs. And Social Security's role becomes increasingly important in working closely with other agencies to meet the continuing needs of older Americans.

In 1940, an American could expect to spend seven percent of his or her adult life in retirement. Today that figure is 26 percent, and a long retirement. Today that figure is 26 percent, and a long retirement has become commonplace. The highest growing segment of the population are people 85 and above.

Nearly 60 percent of the elderly depend on Social Security for over half of their income, and almost one-third rely on it for their sole income.

Older Americans Month this year will be celebrating the 30th anniversary of the Older Americans Act, Medicare, Medicaid, and the Foster

Grandparent Program as well as the 60th Anniversary of Social Security. The theme of the month is Aging: Generations of Experience.

The Older Americans Act established the U.S. Administration on Aging, which presides over a host of programs nationwide ranging from research projects to job training for low income older people. AoA relies on a network of 57 State Units on Aging, 670 Area Agencies on Aging, 228 Native American and Native Hawaiian tribal organizations, 5,000 senior centers and more than 25,000 local groups, to provide a huge array of services.

The services include in-home services to help older people stay in their homes as long as possible, senior center programs, nutrition programs, legal assistance, and advocacy.

However, despite the improved conditions, many of today's elderly remain at economic risk throughout their retirement. The greatest risk continue to affect women and arise most often from the death of a spouse and from uncovered medical long-term care expenses.

While the proportion of elderly working full time has declined over the years, many elderly (49 percent of men over age 65) continue to work part time. Long-term care is a problem -- 5 percent of people over

65 live in nursing homes, and as the number of older people skyrockets, that rate of institutionalization will become completely unaffordable.

About 85 percent of older people have diet-related health conditions and form 2 1/2 to almost 5 million older people may suffer from hunger and food insecurity. Crime and violence find the elderly among the most vulnerable and as many as 1 1/2 million older Americans may be affected.

Even with the vastly improved health of the elderly as a group, the number of older people with disabilities is growing as their number increase. All of these developments are the focus of initiatives developed by the Administration on Aging as they attempt to meet the needs of the elderly.

# Special garden leads to changes at nursing home

MARLIN, Texas - Ninety-four year old Edna Walters dons her pink garden hat and goes outside to make sure everything is watered each day.

Luella Holze, 90, wheels out to the garden in her wheelchair. She uses the sturdy planter box where her plants are growing to pull herself up and steady herself as she walks along.

Vernita Schmalz, 98, isn't impressed. She believes the soil needs to be heavier with organic matter, just as her gladiolus farm along the Brazos River bottoms used to be.

These senior citizens used to keep pretty much to themselves, seldom venturing out of their rooms at Elmwood Nursing Home except to go to lunch.

Now, a special garden is changing things.

In the month since the nursing home installed the table-high wooden troughs that serve as garden plots and residents started planting, "it's gotten folks out of their rooms who haven't been out," said Elmwood social worker Tam Cummings.

It's also encouraged residents to socialize with those who live in other parts of the building, away from their own hallways, said administrator Martha Saling.

Residents may think they are just gardening, but they're actually participating in horticulture therapy, a psychological prescription that is raising interest among mental health professionals as well as the nursing home patients.

The act of producing something, such as a vegetable for the table, gives older people a feeling they are still useful, said gerontologist Dennis R. Meyers of Baylor University and a consultant to the Elmwood project.

"A lot of folks are rural people who are close to the land," he said. "The whole notion of seeing plants growing fulfills their psychological need of productivity."

"This reminds them of the times they spent gardening with their families when they were younger,"

Cummings said. "Ninety-nine percent of our residents grew up on farms and are from agricultural backgrounds."

When they moved from the farm and into the city and the nursing home, she said, many of the residents were depressed about losing their independence. Having a garden gives them something to look forward to - and helps alleviate some of their depression.

Meyers said the garden also fulfills a need to socialize. It's easy to talk about the garden.

"These little ladies come out and check it every day," Cummings said. "They are waiting for the day when they can have cucumber salad."

One resident, a retired tomato farmer, has had a stroke and cannot speak. But he has led his relatives out to the garden and pointed out the buds on the tomato plants, she said.

Such reactions are typical. Cummings said when she walks down the hall, she has residents talk to her about the garden.

"I love it," said Holze. "I went walking this morning by there and I saw all the plants. Some are little bitty coming up."

"I do what I can if I can walk," said Minnie Fedro, 97. "I planted some flower seeds and they all came up."

Schmalz planted carrots, daisies and tomatoes.

"I love to garden," she said. "I certainly do."

"I like to watch stuff grow," said Walters, who planted beans and radishes. "It's been my hobby all the time. I like to work in the yard."

Sitting in her room next to a pot of blooming geraniums, Walters is already making plans for a fall garden.

Even the residents who didn't participate in planting seeds come out to watch the progress of the plants that grow.

Homer California, 73, is a newcomer to Elmwood. He arrived too late to plant the seeds.

"He discovered the garden the

second day he was here," Cummings said. "He's been out there every day since then."

"I used to deal with gardens," California said. "I used to work with retarded children and we planted gardens every year."

The former proprietor of Marlin's Colonial Gardens, Schmalz raised gladioluses "by the hundreds - no, thousands," in the 1940s and '50s, she said. "I shipped 'em to all parts of the United States."

"She'd have to get up early in the morning to cut the gladioluses before they were open," said her daughter, Harriet Davidson, who was visiting from The Woodlands. "She'd box 'em and take them to the bus station."

Schmalz and Walters already have some plants in their rooms, but they will soon have more, thanks to the garden.

Cummings said plans are to let residents cut the blooming flowers this summer and take them into their rooms.

Cummings said Schmalz has been expertly advising her about the garden - not bad for someone who rarely ventured out of her room. "It's amazing at what all she knows," Cummings said of the 98-year-old.

Meyers said it's good that the residents are excited about the garden -

"The expectation is really important in a nursing home because there is not

and are busy watching the plants grow. He said having a sense of expectation - in this case, anticipating the harvesting of the vegetables and the blooming of the flowers - is healthy for patients.

a lot to look forward to," he said.

Also, the fact that a garden is green and growing - instead of withering and dying - is a good symbol for a nursing home, Meyers said. "It represents what a nursing home should be to a community - growing and productive," he added.

## Baked Catfish

Arrange fish on warmed serving platter and sprinkle with chopped parsley. Garnish with lemon wedges. Serves 6

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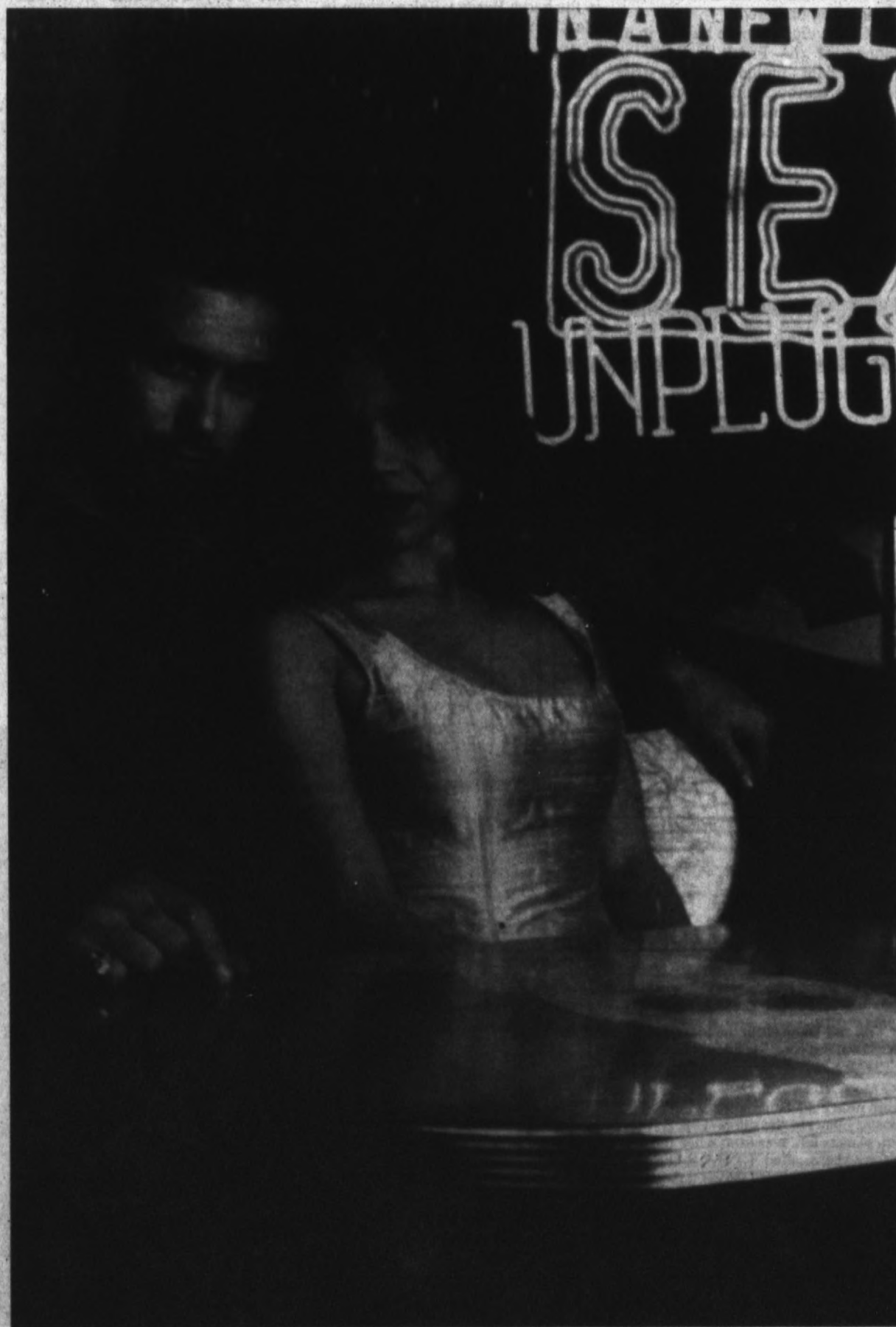

## Plain talk about teen sex dominates *In a New Light*

Teen-agers and young adults get a dose of straight talk about sex from their peers in *In a New Light: Sex Unplugged*, airing Thursday, June 1, on ABC.

Stephen Baldwin (*Threesome*) and Oscar nominee Rosie Perez (*Fearless*) are hosts of the hour-long special, the fourth in a series of AIDS-awareness presentations on the network.

Other teen icons participating in the special include Jared Leto (*My So-Called Life*), Bon Jovi drummer Tiko Torres, Ed Lover (*Yo! MTV Raps*), rocker Melissa Etheridge and *General Hospital* stars Michael Sutton and Kimberly McCullough.

"There are a lot of things that are different (this year)," says Joseph F. Lovett, who has served as executive producer on all four *New Light* entries. "ABC felt that the information that comes across is so important that it should be as much during the school year as possible. On June 1, a lot of schools will still be in session.

"When you talk too much about AIDS, people tend to turn off. ... The issue isn't really AIDS, (it's) sexuality. People who work in 'safer sex' education are realizing that the information about AIDS does not make people protect themselves. There are so many other issues in play, the main one being that people just don't talk about sex."

This year's special emphasizes open communication between young people and their peers on a variety of topics in their lives, Lovett adds.

Issues covered include teen-agers having sex before they really want to and, most critically, failing to protect themselves against sexually transmitted diseases.

"This year it's all real-life stories. We do not have 'entertainment,'" he says. "It's a show where young people talk about what's going on with their lives. And it's something we can all learn from."

The Center for Disease Control (CDC) in Atlanta reports that about three-fourths of American teen-agers are sexually active by the 12th grade, and one-fifth of all Americans need to be treated for a sexually transmitted disease by age 21.

The most shocking revelation Lovett found while researching this year's show was the fact many young girls are having sex unwillingly, he says.

"We found out in our research that (of) girls who have sex at 15 or younger, about 70 percent have sex involuntarily," he explains. "Not necessarily rape, but they feel pushed or pressured to have sex."

"A lot of kids, if they felt supported in their feelings, might be willing to put it off longer, if they felt it was OK to do that. We live in such a sexual culture, with our advertising and our media, that we need to start giving kids some perspective. The only perspective we're giving them is, 'Do it, do it, do it!'"

A sense of hopelessness is feeding a rise in unsafe sex among young gay men, the producer adds:

"What's happening among young gay men ... is when older gay men say to them, 'Listen, you can NOT go through what we've gone through — you must do this and that,' (the younger men) say, 'What's the point? After all, half my friends are going to be dead by the time I'm 40 or 50. Is this what I want to look forward to? A life of caring for them, and then being left alone?'"

"That's a pretty scary thing. It's horrible. It's really horrible."

# Blair makes Anne Frank documentary

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Before Steven Spielberg turned Hollywood's megawatt glare on Oscar Schindler, the unlikely Holocaust hero was the focus of documentary filmmaker Jon Blair's award-winning "Schindler."

So it made sense that Blair should be approached to detail the life of another Holocaust figure, one already made legendary through her teen-ager's diary: Anne Frank.

It made sense, perhaps, except to Blair himself. He balked at the idea.

"I really wasn't interested," Blair said, recalling his reaction when contacted by the Anne Frank Charity in England. "I said, 'Look, I dealt with the Holocaust 11 or 12 years ago, thanks very much. Once was enough."

"And in any event, everything that's ever been said about Anne Frank has probably been said."

No, he was told: A definitive documentary had yet to be done.

The girl's poignant diary, published after her death at age 15 in a German concentration camp, captivated readers worldwide and put

a face on the nearly incomprehensible murder of 6 million Jews.

It was the basis for a Pulitzer Prize-winning play, "The Diary of Anne Frank," as well as a 1959 movie based on the play. A new edition of "The Diary of a Young Girl" is currently on best-seller lists.

But, Blair agreed, after some research, there was room for a nonfiction film detailing her life, her death and the brave, failed effort of Dutch friends who hid Anne and her family from the Nazis from 1942 to 1944.

The filmmaker capitulated. The result is "Anne Frank Remembered," debuting Thursday, June 8, on the Disney Channel.

Using photos, rare footage and interviews with family, friends and fellow concentration camp inmates, the documentary offers an unsparing, detail-laden look at a vibrant young woman impaled by barbarism.

British actor-director Kenneth Branagh contributes a restrained, effective narration. Glenn Close reads Anne's words from the diary she addressed as "Dear Kitty," the

actress' voice a match for the writer's precocious maturity.

The film includes a brief snippet of a home movie showing Anne (pronounced Anna), the first time the footage has been seen, Blair said.

Once he decided to take on the project, the filmmaker says he saw he had the burden of rescuing history from the brink.

"I realized that the kind of actuarial imperative meant it would probably never be possible to do it again," he said by telephone from his London office. "The fact is, the people (involved) are dying."

At the outset, Blair was faced with the frustration that the key figure was gone: Otto Frank, Anne's father, died in 1980. Brief clips of past interviews given by Frank are included in "Anne Frank Remembered."

Of the eight people hidden in an annex of the Frank business in Amsterdam - including Anne, sister Margot, mother Edith and four other Jews - Otto Frank alone survived the Nazi camps after their location was betrayed.

Blair discovered important research gaps that could yet be filled

in. Miep Gies, who as a young Dutch girl risked her life to bring supplies to the hidden Jews and who rescued Anne's diary, was interviewed at age 86.

Gies has written and spoken publicly before, but Blair presents her in a fresh light. In one scene, she is shown in a first-time meeting with the son of one of the attic-dwellers.

Also interviewed are Anne's childhood playmates, who recall a playful, impertinent girl confident of eventual fame as a writer and yearning for the glamorous life of America's film stars.

Others, who themselves barely survived internment, recount the dark-eyed girl's descent into despair and illness during her last days of life in the harsh Bergen-Belsen camp in March 1945.

Her own diary passages tell of her brush with love with young Peter van Daan, whose family also sought refuge in the annex; her clashes with her family and insights into a world gone mad.

There is a wider view, as well. Otto Frank's barracks mates in Auschwitz, where he was imprisoned, tell of their

struggle for survival amid casual evil.

One man, forced to stand nude in the winter chill, recalled the taunts of a fur coat-clad German soldier.

"Cold, eh?" the soldier said. "You know you will not survive this. You know that. But in case you will survive ... nobody, but nobody, will believe you, what we did to you people."

Blair gained permission to briefly restore the now-empty hiding place - a major visitor attraction in Amsterdam - to its wartime appearance. He and his crew filmed at night to avoid interfering with public access.

He brushed closest to his subjects in the annex, Blair said.

"As I sat there at 5 o'clock in the morning in this place where Anne and Peter had sat, mooning away the hours some 50 years before ... I was surrounded by this high-tech camera equipment."

"It was a curious feeling, that one was in amongst ghosts. Yet there was something peculiarly appropriate about the memory of these people being commemorated with the most modern motion picture equipment, given Anne's expressed desire to be famous and go to Hollywood."

## Memorial Day Concert offers another side of Cullum

John Cullum will be doing something during the 1995 *National Memorial Day Concert* his fans may not expect. Cullum, who has played woodsman-restaurateur Holling Vincoeur for six seasons on CBS' *Northern Exposure*, will sing musical comedy. The concert airs Sunday, May 28, on PBS (check local listings).

"A lot of people just think of me as Holling the bartender," the Broadway veteran says. "That's totally out of character for me, in a way."

Cullum is a military veteran, too, but he thinks it's his singing that gives him the right to be onstage with host Ossie Davis and actors Charles Durning and Rod Steiger.

"It's just a little intimidating, because they're all old enough to have been in the second World War, and I wasn't," Cullum says.

"I was, in the Korean conflict, but I got there in April of 1953, right at the end of hostilities. But these guys are true veterans and war heroes. So that intimidates me, but then I think, they didn't ask me here to give my memori-

al comments, I'm there to entertain."

Cullum will participate in a medley of songs from *South Pacific*. Other scheduled performers include John Denver and Marilyn McCoo. Steiger and Durning will give dramatic tributes to the heroes and victims of the conflict.

Cullum says his main memories of Memorial Days past "are parades and veterans marching in the parades, and high-school bands. It was a parade down the main street of Knoxville, Tenn."

"I remember the older veterans. My brother was in the war, and I don't remember him marching. I remember him being an observer, like me."

Now, he says, "I think Memorial Day is becoming a more important national celebration because we need that thing to keep us unified."

As for the massed thousands gathered on the Capitol lawn in Washington, D.C., for the concert, Cullum says, "That'll be the largest house I've ever played to. Three hundred thousand, did you say? Gee whiz, now I'm getting cold feet."

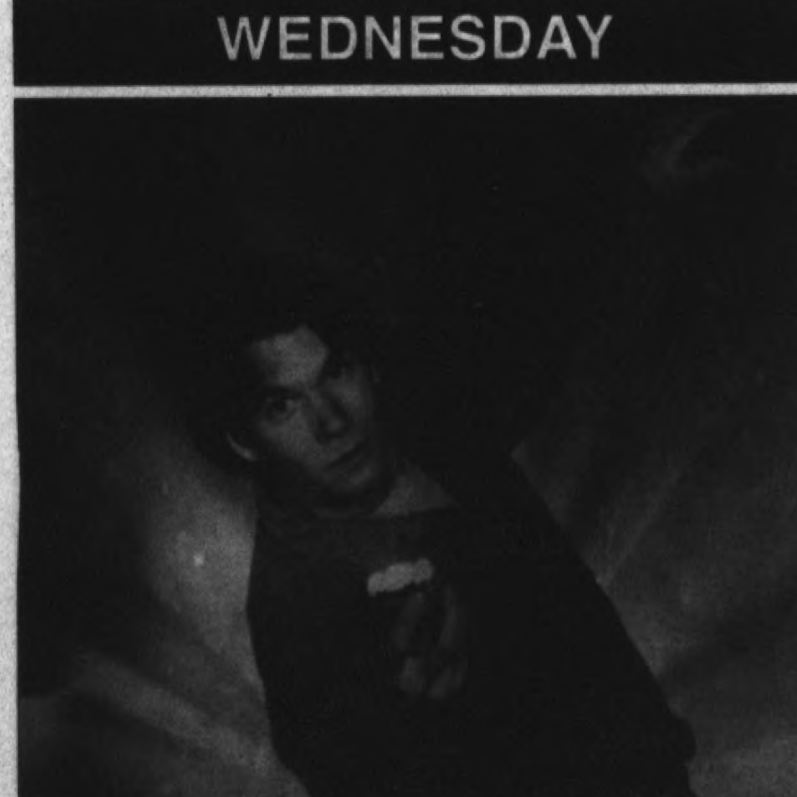

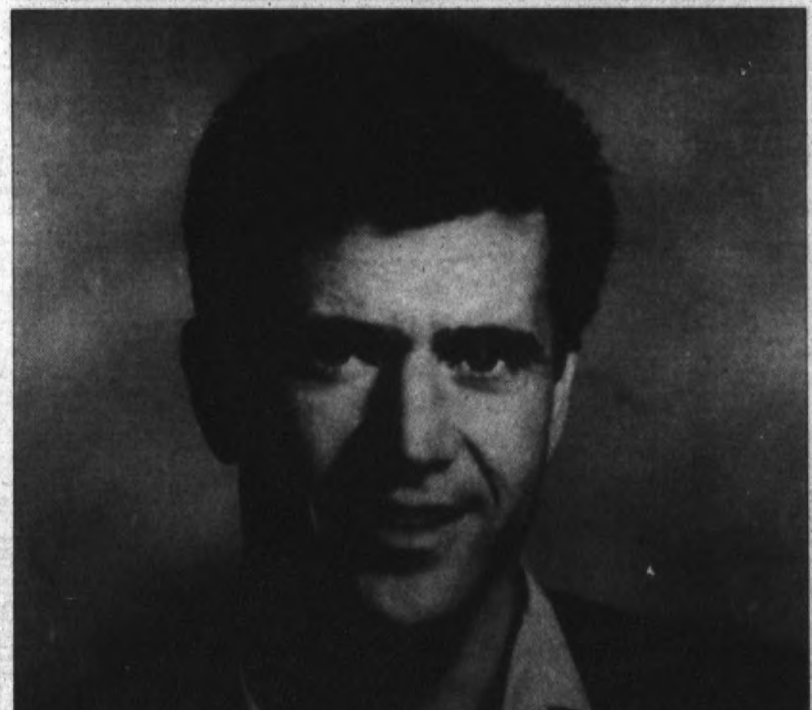

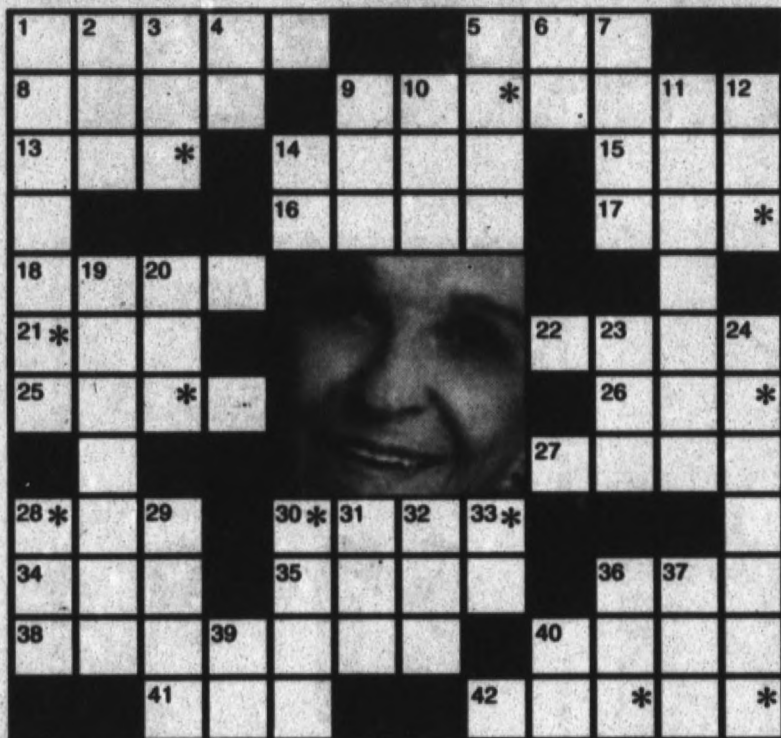

Whatever opinion viewers may hold, this has certainly been one of the more controversial stories of all time.

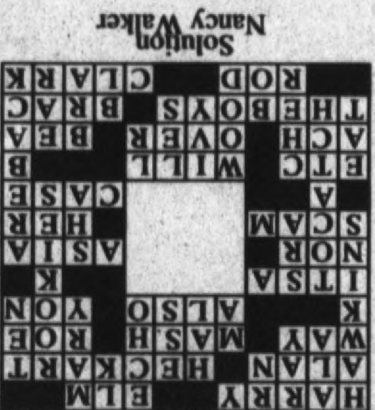
