# Nation May Again Export Wheat

An Associated Press release from Chicago this week indicated a good price for wheat in 1937. The article stated that the scramble for the world's dwindling wheat supplies, which has lifted prices to eight-year peaks, gave the American farmer a golden opportunity to resume the role of exporter this year. The press release continued:

"Board of trade specialists predicted that if domestic wheat production in 1937 is as large as expected, vessels once again will be leaving the United States wharves bound for Europe with large quantities of grain. The United States has not been a wheat exporter for many months, because the cumulative effect of several seasons of short crops has reduced stocks in this country to the lowest point since 1919.

"In direct contrast to conditions a few years ago when the bins of virtually every big exporting nation in the world were bulging with grain for which there was no market, rearming European nations now find themselves scouring the Southern hemisphere for wheat to feed populations and store reserves for possible war."

#### INCREASED DIABETES PRESENTS PROBLEMS

The increasing incidence of diabetes presents a serious problem to the physician and the average citizen, according to Dr. John W. Brown, state health officer.

"Ordinary diabetes, that is dia-

betes mellitus, which is often referred to by many persons as a disease of the kidneys, is not a kidney disease, but a disease of the paucreus in which there is deficient production of insulin," Dr. Brown said, "and this mistaken idea that diabetes is a kidney disease probably results from the fact that the insulin deficiency causes large amounts of carbohydrates (sugar and starch) to pile up in the body. The result is that the patient drinks lage amounts of water, and because of this, Why not make your plans to large amounts of urine contain-

"The pancreas is a vital organ, located in the upper abdomen behind the stomach. It has a double function: it supplies the most powerful digestive juice in the body, known as the pancreatic juice, which it pours into the intestine through special ducts developed for that purpose; and it makes another substance called insulin, which goes directly into the blood and is essential for the use of sugar in the body.

"Obesity and heredity overshadow all other factors in the causation of diabetes. Most dia-

causation of diabetes. Most dia-betcs are fat. Not every fat person, of course, gets diabetes. Heredity seems to be the most important link in the chain of diabetes from generation to genera tion. In the adult, however, obesity brings out the predisposition





Let many people do not take the cold seriously enough. Suspect every cold. Go to bed immediately if you have a fever with a cold, call your physician, and do exactly what he says. By intelligently following your physician's advice at the beginning of the attack, you may ward off the after effects which so often follow neglected colds—pneumonia among them.
