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Demo leader agrees to Whitewater hearings

WASHINGTON (AP) - Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell agreed to hold congressional hearings into the Whitewater affair, conceding to Republican pressure for a high-profile look into President and Mrs. Clinton's investment in an Arkansas real estate venture.

But the Maine Democrat said Saturday that hearings would be held only when it was clear they would not undermine the criminal investigation by independent counsel Robert Fiske.

The Whitewater affair is casting such a shadow on the Clinton administration that some Democrats worry it could eclipse health care reform and other campaign issues.

In Cleveland, many participants at the spring meeting of the Democratic National Committee suggested that Hillary Rodham Clinton could help limit the political fallout by explaining her role in the Whitewater venture.

Mrs. Clinton was a partner at the Rose Law Firm in Little Rock, Ark. The firm represented Madison Guaranty Savings & Loan, which was operated by the Clintons' partner in the unsuccessful land deal, James McDougal.

"It is time for (Mrs. Clinton) to find the right venue in which to talk to the American people about a lot of this stuff," said Democratic Party activist Lynn Cutler.

"Her integrity and effectiveness are at stake," Cutler said. "They are peeling away her ability to be what she is, which is our leader on the health care reform issue."

Texas Democratic Chairman Bob Slagle and others also called for the first lady to address her involvement publicly so that campaign issues aren't sidetracked. "If you spend too much time prattling about your innocence, people start asking why an innocent person would be so worked up," Slagle said.

In other Whitewater developments Friday:

The Treasury Department turned over about 3,700 pages of documents

to Fiske. A Treasury official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said most of the documents were routine, including drafts of news releases and testimony before Congress.

-ABC "World News Tonight" showed photographs that appear to support the conclusion of police and medical authorities that White House deputy counsel Vincent Foster's

death last summer was a suicide. Fiske agreed to take another look at Foster's death after questions were raised about the suicide ruling.

-Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., called on Clinton to suspend Deputy Treasury Secretary Roger Altman and Associate Attorney General Webster Hubbell because "they're up to their ears in misstatements and deception."

75th anniversary event scheduled Tuesday

Local post to host birthday party for American Legion

A hit parade, if there had been one, might include "Mademoiselle from Armentières" or "Oh! How I Hate to Get Up in the Morning." The year was 1919 and the "war to end all wars" had ended.

A few officers -- some historical records say a total of 20 -- of the American Expeditionary Forces in Europe gathered early in 1919 with a charge to seek ways of improving morale among the soldiers, sailors and Marines in Europe.

The result of that meeting has endured to this day, 75 years later, as the American Legion.

To celebrate that event, Post 192 members and auxiliary will host a birthday party at the American Legion Hall Tuesday, beginning with a dinner at 7 p.m.

A special speaker for the evening will be U.S. Air Force Master Sergeant Luther C. Hampton Jr., stationed at Cannon Air Force Base, Clovis, N.M., announced Post Commander Robert Lohr.

In 1919, while the men of the AEF sang "Gee, But I want to Go Home,"

plans were being made to organize the American Legion.

A name familiar to Americans everywhere, Lt. Col. Theodore Roosevelt Jr., was a guiding force in the group that held the first organizational meeting in Paris, France, in March 1919.

During that meeting, called the Paris Caucus, the name was selected and an executive committee was formed.

A reported 1,000 officers and enlisted men attended the Paris Caucus.

About two months later, the Legion held another meeting, this one back on home grounds, in St. Louis, Mo.

Then, later in the same year, September, the U.S. Congress granted a charter to the American Legion, and, as the saying goes, the rest is history.

But, while that's history, the story goes on . . . and on.

Initially an organization for World War I veterans, the Legion adjusted as the years passed to accommodate men and women who served.

have been a major part of the Legion's work through the years. Boys State is an exercise in government sponsored by the American Legion and a youth baseball program has operated for many years.

The speaker at the Post 192 birthday celebration has served in the U.S. Air Force since February 1975 when he enlisted off the campus of Wiley College in Marshall.

Sergeant Hampton's achievements since that time are numerous. He earned a bachelor's degree from Southern Illinois University in industrial technology, then a master's degree in aeronautical science from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University.

He served as an armament system specialist in the 19th Bombardment Wing and represented his wing in competition. He was declared a Distinguished Graduate in his Non-Commissioned Officer Leadership School class.

Sergeant Hampton served two tours of duty in Korea, was assigned to posts in the United Kingdom and

Talk about war stories... Hereford's Weddel has a lulu

Talk about war stories, Guy Weddel, a World War II veteran who lives in Hereford, has one you won't soon forget.

How's this for openers: You're flying through the sky over Germany after bombing an oil refinery. The air is filled with orange and black flak bursts all around you, your B-17 bomber is full of holes and losing altitude rapidly, and you're a long way from home.

Weddel, a retired farmer, relaxed on his sofa. On the wall behind him

in a glass frame were his medals -- an Oak Leaf Cluster, Air Medal, and numerous medals from his campaigns during the war.

Next to the medals was a map of Europe, also behind a glass pane. Weddel pointed to the map and said thoughtfully, "That's Meresburg, where we hit the oil refinery."

Where do you begin?

Start with Guy and Thelma Weddel. They've been married over 40 years. Before his retirement, Weddel farmed a section of land, raising wheat and milo. Today he is a silver-haired grandfather, a soft-

spoken man who isn't one to boast. He has never really talked about those World War II days. But today he wants to talk about when he was a turret gunner with the 8th Air Force, 92nd Bomb Group, 327th Squadron.

"That 50 caliber machine gun was a pretty good weapon," said Weddel. "It had a lot of punch, I can tell you that."

Weddel was a Staff Sergeant when the Air Force assigned him to the nine-man squadron. He kept a diary of his war experiences, even though he wasn't supposed to. The Air Force understandably didn't want the diary

falling into the wrong hands.

Weddel kept his because he wanted to remember what happened, the good and the bad, to show show to his children and grandchildren.

"I was drafted into the Army," said Weddel, a native of Oklahoma. "The Army sent me to Fort Sill and gave us all a test to see what our aptitudes were."

"Somehow I ended up in the Air Force."

After going through his basic training and spending some time in the states, Weddel was shipped overseas to become part of a crew on a B-17. Their targets: German oil refineries, ball bearing plants, airfields, bridges, and railroad yards.

"We went on 35 missions," recalled Weddel. "And everyone of them had a story."

"Our worst run, the worst target, we hit four times. That was the big oil refinery plant at Meresburg, Germany. I'll never forget it."

Hitler needed the oil refinery to keep his war machine going, so he put every plane and big gun he could spare around the plant to protect it.

Back to Weddel:

"We flew to the refinery and the Germans attacked us with fighters before we got to the target. They were flying ME-109s with 20 mm cannons on each wing. They came up behind us at six o'clock.

"They really started pounding us. Right away a .20 mm shell hit our number two engine and it caught on fire.

"That ball of fire was big and yellow, really blazing. I called the pilot and told him the engine was on fire. The co-pilot turned the fuel off to the engine and the fire went out."

Weddel looked out on the wing and saw a hole big enough for a man to climb through.

"As he was staring at the wing, a ME-109 came up on his side.

"It was about from here to my mailbox," he recalled. "I opened up

on the plane with my .50 caliber gun. The ball turret gunner down below told me later he could see pieces of the plane flying apart."

The enemy fighter planes finally left, but they had done their damage. The B-17 was in bad shape.

"Our number two engine wouldn't feather and was windmilling," he declared. "Two other engines were about 50 per cent effective. We had only one good engine, but it kept us in the air."

To make matters worse, the navigator's instruments were all shot out. Fortunately, the pilot's instruments were still working. They headed for home.

Down below, said Weddel, they could see a large city: Frankfurt.

"We had lost a lot of altitude and were below 10,000 feet," he stated. "The Germans waited until we got where they wanted us -- then they

opened up with everything they had.

"Our plane took hit after hit. And every shot lifted us up in the air. The co-pilot told us to prepare to bail out."

One of the crew members, an 18-year-old turret gunner, didn't have his parachute harness. While Weddel went to help him, the others waited to jump out -- and miraculously the plane stayed in the air.

Said Weddel, "We got out of range of the German guns and decided to ride our broken ship a little further. Suddenly a fighter plane came into view. We thought it was German, but it was a P-47 -- one of the sweetest sights I have ever seen!"

The P-47 pilot lead them to the nearest landing strip. Somehow the crippled B-17, with one front tire shot out, made a near perfect landing.

"We were sure the plane would burn

District court assesses 61 years in prison sentences

Prison terms totaling 61 years were assessed defendants Friday in 222nd District Court, on pleas of guilty or revocation of probated sentences.

Santos "Buddy" Galvan, 40, was sentenced to 20 years in Texas Department of Criminal Justice institutional division after pleading guilty to forgery.

On a plea of guilty to indecency with a child, Seferino Gomez, 53, also known as Jeff Gomez, was given a 10-year term in TDCJ.

Rhonda R. Larance, originally sentenced to seven years' probation, was ordered to TDCJ-ID for five years on revocation of probation.

Another motion to revoke probation resulted in an amendment to the terms for Adolfo Perales Rocha, originally sentenced to five years for felony driving while intoxicated. He was ordered to enter a substance abuse facility.

On the state's motion to revoke probation of Luis Balderaz, the defendant was ordered to the TDCJ Special Alternate Incarceration Program. His prison term was set at five years.

Hospital board to meet Tuesday

Immunization schedule noted

The Texas Department of Health has announced its March immunization clinic schedule for Hereford. The Texas Department of Health charges to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. Charges are based on family income and size and the ability to pay. Regular clinics will be held from 7 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. to 5:45 p.m. The clinics will be held on Thursday, March 17, then March 24 in the Health Department offices, 205 W. Fourth St., Suite B.

Texas shores brace for flood of partiers

South Padre Island and Galveston were bracing for a tidal wave of students bound for their beaches this weekend as the annual Spring Break pilgrimage and party begins.

Most inns were booked to capacity, but that didn't stop the steady flow of revelers. South Padre expects up to 60,000 students over the next 10 days.

"You ought to see what it's like in here (Saturday)," said Mary Jane Walsh, manager of the Sunsite III Condominiums, which she expected to be booked solid this week.

Meanwhile, island police went into their "Spring Break mode" early after the number of students exceeded earlier estimates.

"We started working our 12- to 14-hour shifts a week early this year," police Capt. Tommy Atkinson told a reporter from the San Antonio Express-News Friday.

He estimated officers arrested 200 students since the Spring Break period began late last month. Most were arrested for disorderly conduct and public intoxication, he said.

There was one report last week of a sexual assault at a park at the south tip of the island, he said.

In another incident last week, a 20-year-old intoxicated student was

arrested outside an island nightclub after officers found the man hugging a palm tree.

"The kid said he thought he was embracing his girlfriend," Atkinson said.

In Galveston, two people were injured Friday afternoon when gunfire erupted on a beach where about 200 high-schoolers had gathered, police said.

Galveston police Sgt. M. Stanich said he believes the shooting was gang-related. Stanich said he does not consider the shooting related to Spring Break, which officially kicked off Saturday in Galveston.

No suspects have been arrested in connection with the 1:45 p.m. shooting on East Beach, Stanich said. There also were reports that members of several different gangs were present, he said.

To curb the sale of alcohol to minors, Atkinson said, the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission sent a dozen agents to work undercover as convenience store clerks in Corpus Christi.

The Cameron County Sheriff's Office was to assign three deputies to work on the island to bolster law enforcement, he added.

Bophuthatswana ruler to take part in election

MMABATHO, South Africa (AP) - After five days of rioting that killed at least 22 people, the leader of the black homeland Bophuthatswana has agreed to take part in South Africa's first all-race elections next month.

Looting and burning continued Saturday in Mmabatho, the homeland's capital. But the white extremists whose arrival Friday turned the unrest into a deadly confrontation had apparently left.

Bophuthatswana ruler Lucas

Mangope's acceptance Friday of the election was a major victory for his bitter rival, the African National Congress. The ANC, which is expected to win the April vote, has tried to involve all South African factions in the election and to end Mangope's iron-fisted rule of the U.S.

Mangope met a midnight deadline for taking part in the election, submitting a candidates' list for his Northwest Christian Democratic Party.

ANC President Nelson Mandela, who wants to reincorporate the nominally independent homeland into post-apartheid South Africa, said Mangope's loss of control showed he should be ousted from office. Mangope fled the capital on Thursday.

President F.W. De Klerk, however, said he was satisfied with Mangope's decision to register and said he would send South African troops to help control unrest in Mmabatho. At least 20 South African troop carriers filled with soldiers rolled into the capital late Friday.

At a shopping mall in Mmabatho, Andrew Scholdz watched in disgust today as hundreds of looters carried out the little remaining booty from burned and damaged shops.

Scholdz, a mixed-race man who operates a scrap metal business, blamed Mangope for waiting until unrest threatened to topple the homeland government before agreeing to take part in the April vote.

"He could have said he was joining the election last week and avoided all this," Scholdz said.

Mangope's capitulation was a devastating blow to groups trying to block the election and left Zulu leader Mangosuthu Buthelezi as the only black homeland leader still resisting the election.

The chaos in Mmabatho was a chilling reminder of how easily South Africa's transition to democracy could turn into a bloodbath.

when we hit the ground," Weddel said. "All of us were out of that aircraft before it stopped rolling."

The plane didn't explode. His crew members counted between 250 and 400 shrapnel and bullet holes in the bomber.

After the crew had rested, Weddel decided he had to get back to his unit in England. He and three other Air Force men, a pilot, co-pilot, and navigator, decided to fly back in an AT-17.

"This was a two-place training plane," he said, "and four of us got into it. The maximum load was supposed to be 400 pounds. We far exceeded that."

There was another problem: the plane was low on fuel and there was no more to be had at the base. Weddel and the others decided to fly to Paris to refuel.

There was no fuel in Paris either.

True to the Air Force tradition that necessity is the mother of invention, the Air Force men located an old wrecked truck and siphoned 20 gallons of fuel out of it. Then they headed across the English channel.

Halfway across, one of the plane's two engines ran out of gas. The co-pilot quickly turned on a switch and began using a primer pump to switch the fuel from the good engine to the one that had quit.

"Just before we hit the water, the engine caught," said Weddel with a grin. "Man, those white cliffs of Dover looked good."

They landed on the first smooth

The Netherlands.

In 1942, the Legion charter was amended to include World War II veterans. In later years, men and women of the Korean War era, Vietnam and Persian Gulf wars as well as actions in Grenada, Lebanon and Panama.

Cities wrestle over who gets convention

CHICAGO (AP) - San Antonio accuses Chicago of trying to buy the 1996 Democratic National Convention.

Kansas City points to riots in the Windy City during the 1968 gathering, and Chicago's mayor delivers a stinging retort.

All this just to be host to a weeklong lovefest of long-winded politicians? You bet.

At stake is a multi-million dollar infusion into the winner's economy - enough to make, or break, some political futures.

"It's a very competitive process," said Illinois Democratic Party Chairman Gary LaPaille. "Getting the convention would be a big boost, not only to Democrats within that city and state, but it's a boost to the economy and travel and tourism bureaus.

"Cities looking for a convention are going to posture a bit. They're going to come out hitting hard with so much at stake," he said Friday.

But Ed Koch, who brought the 1980 convention to New York City when he was mayor, said it's unusual for cities to take potshots at each other.

"What I remember is cities preparing their best presentation and seeking to win because they wowed somebody," Koch said. "This is new. It must be a sign of the times."

The testiest exchange so far flashed between Kansas City Mayor Emanuel Cleaver and Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley.

Cleaver said holding the convention in Chicago would hurt the party because TV viewers would be treated to ugly replays of the 1968 convention.

School kids belly up to chuck wagon for lunch

Tierra Blanca Primary School looked like a scene from "Bonanza" Friday as students in cowboy gear were summoned by a cowbell to gather around a chuckwagon for chow.

The school's 350 students have been taking part in its second annual Thematic Study of Texas, said

principal Tommy Rosson. The idea behind the study is to let children from kindergarten through third grade know more about their state.

Rosson and assistant principal Sharon Hodges have broken down the two-week study program in the following way: kindergarten students learn the symbols of Texas, ranging from the state flower to the state bird; first graders are learning about the

life of a cowboy; second graders are studying the six flags over Texas; and third graders are working on the cultures of Texas.

Hodges described the program as fun for the students and educational for both the children and the faculty.

"Some women from the local Senior Citizens showed our children how to make quilts," said Hodges. "We've also made Indian necklaces

and one teacher dressed up like a story teller to relate tales about Texas."

On Tuesday, two Canyon men visited the school dressed up as members of the 4th Texas Cavalry, which they re-enacted.

The Cavalry, which no longer exists, made Texas history when its' members under the command of a general named MacKenzie crossed the border into Mexico on an unauthorized raid to bring back cattle

and stock that had been stolen by a gang of Mexican outlaws in the 1860s.

And on Monday, Cowboy Lank, a professional entertainer from Tucson, sang cowboy songs and showed the students old-time musical instruments.


Rosson said the students think the program is great.



"It may be in the best interests of the people if you don't print this."

We have heard this statement several times from elected officials during our newspaper career, but we just don't see it that way. Most likely it's in the best interests of the politician's career if it isn't printed.

This attitude has been around for quite some time, we assume, not just locally but all across the country where reporters "stick their noses" into local, county, or state business.

Events that happen in public meetings and problems discussed there should be considered the business of the public. It's a dangerous situation when elected officials feel they should either withhold information from the public, or that they do not have to answer to the people who elected them.

On one occasion, many years ago, we were told by an official, "If the public wants an explanation for what we do or actions we take, then they should ask us--not the newspaper."

On several occasions here in recent years, we've been told by representatives of local governmental bodies: "Why don't you write something positive? There's no sense in stirring up trouble by reporting negative issues."

What these folks don't seem to realize is that the whole principle of a free press would be at stake. The good Lord never promised a rose garden for any of us, nor did He promise one for elected officials or folks paid by tax dollars.

It's just a plain fact of life that all actions of an elected body are not going to meet with wholehearted approval from the public. The idea of printing only the good news from



local boards and commissions is absurd.

The attitude of reluctance and hesitation to reveal important news information to the press by elected officials is a problem that will not be solved by the news media alone. It will require the help of concerned voters. Citizens should sit in on a few public meetings, and they should remember that records of these meetings are open for review by the public.

Claims that the news media only stirs up trouble in such matters is just hogwash. Newspapers don't create controversies...they only report them.

Feb. 28

The Galveston County Daily News on open records in Texas: A recent opinion by the Texas attorney general is another step forward in making information available to the public.

The ruling states that no governmental body has the authority to withhold information about a court settlement even though there was an agreement to keep the terms confidential.

The opinion was issued in response to a situation in the Grand Prairie school district. The district contended it was not obligated to reveal details and amounts of a lawsuit against the superintendent and three trustees and cited three exceptions to the state open Records Act allowing confidentiality for personnel reasons. The attorney general rejected all three arguments.

Indeed, any time public money is involved, the public has an inalienable right to know how tax dollars are being spent.

Too often, governmental bodies hide their foibles and missteps behind the cloak of sealed lawsuit settlements. Such confidentiality is often explained away as preventive action...

Secretiveness about such matters serves only to raise suspicions and reinforce the public's distrust of elected officeholders.

We hail the attorney general's ruling as a major triumph for the public's right to know.

Austin American-Statesman on charter schools:

For too many years, public education in Texas was summed up best by Mark Twain's observation on weather: everybody's talked about it but nobody did anything about it.

Now, under the strain of a variety of pressures, elected officials, parents, taxpayer advocates and members of what is known - and not fondly - as the education establishment have come to the realization that something has to change.

...One idea gathering steam in Texas and the rest of the country is charter schools.

Basically, a charter school would contract with a granting agency - a school district or the state - and offer a specialized curriculum. Schools would be expected to meet certain standards, but otherwise be free from paperwork and regulations required by a central authority.

Funding would be local, state and federal and continued funding would depend on whether schools met agreed-upon standards. Magnet schools are considered forerunners of the charter school concept.

The charter school idea is an intriguing one, and will undoubtedly be dissected and debated during the campaign and the 1995 session of the Legislature.


It is much too early to say what the likelihood of success is, because charter schools are still an evolving concept. Given the usual caveat about changing for sake of change and ensuring that there is equity in access and availability, however, the idea is certainly one worth pursuing. ...

Remember that schools still rely heavily on the property tax as a source of money. It would take a miracle to make the property tax: a) fair b) consistent and c) a reliable source of revenue for schools. Miracles are in short supply these days.

President put up 'firewall' too late

WASHINGTON (AP) - At the White House, the password is firewall.

It is shorthand for the barrier President Clinton says now is in place, separating White House officials, himself included, from any contact with regulators and investigators handling Whitewater and its offshoots.

This firewall went up too late to keep Clinton and company from being burned by a controversy that predates his presidency. It was the failure to separate personal and presidential business in the counsel's office that put Whitewater into the White House in the first place.

The line that's now been drawn was dramatized not only by the selection of a new, elder Democrat to become interim White House counsel, but by the scene as Clinton announced the selection of Lloyd N. Cutler. The customary lineup of watching Clinton aides was down to one, Press Secretary Dee Dee Myers. Others, summoned as grand jury witnesses because of meetings with investigators, were not in view.

Even in staff meetings on other matters, anything linked to Whitewater is off-limits when anyone summoned to testify on the subject is a participant.

Clinton said there is no bunker mentality in his White House.

Instead, there is a barrier mentality, to avoid any repetition of the contacts that made it all worse.

Now the prosecutor, special counsel Robert Fiske, is trying to erect a firewall of his own in Congress, to avoid hearings there until he has completed his own investigation. Fiske said public hearings on the case would interfere with his inquiry.

Fiske was assured he'd get to question witnesses before they were called to any congressional inquiry, although it's hard to see how that would work, since Republicans on the House Banking Committee have said they want to call 40 Whitewater witnesses to a savings and loan hearing on March 24.

Republicans are clamoring, and won't be silenced. Clinton has said they are being blatantly political, as of course, they are - just as when the roles were reversed and a Republican was in the White House. The failed savings and loan linked to the failed

Whitewater land deal is their hook, and they aren't about to let it go.

Bob Dole, the Senate Republican leader, said Congress has a clear right to question the people involved, and should get on with it. He said anyone who doesn't want to answer can invoke the Fifth Amendment privilege against self-incrimination.

Politically, Republicans would like nothing better.

When Republicans were president, the Democrats didn't stand aside for independent investigators, Dole said, but held more than 20 hearings to investigate alleged administration wrongs.

Since they control Congress, the Democrats can decide what and when to investigate. Republicans can't. But they do have a House right to call some witnesses.

Cutler said that if there are to be Whitewater hearings, he would recommend that the White House cooperate. Clinton said that would be his inclination, should Congress go ahead despite Fiske's objections.

It could be that the public forum would work to White House advantage dealing with the political fallout of a complex case that Republican tacticians would like to simplify into a coverup.

It's a case without a clear accusation of wrongdoing by the president or his wife Hillary. He has said repeatedly that there was and is none. Proving it is his problem.

It became so because of the firewall that wasn't built when he came to the White House. Vincent Foster, the Clintons' friend who became deputy White House counsel, brought Whitewater documents with him.

After Foster's apparent suicide July 20, then-counsel Bernard Nussbaum took those papers from his office and sent them to Clinton's personal attorney. When that was disclosed a dormant controversy revived. The papers involved have since been yielded to investigators.

As he took over the counsel's office Cutler said the job is to be chief lawyer not only for the president but also for the office of the presidency.

"When it comes to a president's private affairs, particularly private affairs that occurred before he took office, those should be handled by his own personal, private counsel, and in my view, not by the White House counsel," Cutler said.

Sound advice. Too late.

Dear Editor:

Many would interpret the fact that all but two of the Hispanics who ran in this past week's election were unsuccessful as further evidence that the present political situation bars Hispanics from public leadership.

While we do need to reflect on this assertion, ultimately I believe it is too shallow to offer deep insight. The candidates who ran for office are good citizens and caring family people. They are not lacking in talent or desire to serve.

I would submit that what is lacking is a wide public experience of their service. This is ultimately what kept them from being elected, not prejudice. The candidates have all been involved in various projects of community service, and this is a great foundation. But a greater commitment and outreach is needed that would connect the candidates more closely with the people they aspire to serve, both Hispanic and Anglo.

By example, in the Roman Catholic Church, nobody is given an important position of service just by submitting his or her name. There is a process of formation that must be undergone for several years, a time of learning and honing skills by practicing among and with the people that one aspires to serve. Ideally then, it is the community, not the servant himself, who recommends and presents the person for service in the community.

Aggies squeak by Raiders; UT wins

DALLAS (AP) - David Edwards helped Texas A&M take control of a tight Southwest Conference semifinal by scoring eight straight points midway through the second half of an 89-85 victory over Texas Tech Friday night.

The Aggies (19-9) advanced to Saturday's championship game against Texas, a 101-89 winner over Rice.

Edwards, a 5-foot-9 senior point guard, began his roll with a three-point play that put A&M ahead 62-59 with 12:08 remaining. He added a short running jumper and a 3-pointer to give the Aggies a 67-63 lead with 8:13 to play.

Jason Sasser hit two free throws to put Tech (17-11) within 67-65, but the Red Raiders couldn't get closer mostly because they couldn't hit their free throws.

Sasser, who missed five straight foul shots as A&M began pulling away, gave Tech one last hope with a 3-pointer with 3.1 seconds left to get the Red Raiders within 88-85.

Edwards was quickly fouled after taking the inbounds pass. He missed his first free throw, then secured the victory when his second free throw bounded around the rim and fell in.

He played all 40 minutes and just missed his second straight triple-double, getting 26 points, nine assists and eight rebounds. Joe

Wilbert had 20 points and 15 rebounds.

Tech, the defending tournament champion, ended a seven-game winning streak. The Red Raiders were led by 25 points from Mark Davis and Koy Smith. Sasser had 15 and Lance Hughes 11.

The Aggies had a chance to put away Tech in the first half when they held the Red Raiders without a field goal for 7:19 but had to settle for a 43-39 halftime lead.

A Davis free throw during the dry spell tied the game at 23-23, then A&M rolled ahead by as much as 38-23.

Both teams were 10-4 in conference play and they split their head-to-head regular season games. The Aggies got the No. 2 seed in a tiebreaker.

In the earlier semifinal, the No. 25-ranked Longhorns gave coach Tom Penders his 400th collegiate victory, overwhelming the Rice Owls 101-89 behind Albert Burditt and Terrence Rencher.

After the game they gave him a cake with No. 400 on it.

"I can remember when I went 4-22 at Columbia," Penders said. "I wondered if I would ever coach in 400 games let alone win 400. Maybe some day after I retire this will be real important to me. Right now, every win we get helps our NCAA seeding."

Wilson added "Texas has Top 10 talent and should go a long way in the NCAA tournament."

Texas stunned Rice early as freshman guard Reggie Freeman of Brooklyn, N.Y., hit three 3-pointers to get the Longhorns off and running.

Freeman's third 3-pointer made it 19-6 then it got worse for the Owls, 15-14.

Texas stretched the lead to 41-22 on a bucket by Burditt, and the Owls' frustration started to show.

Lady Raiders blow out SMU

The Texas Tech Lady Raiders (26-3) advanced to their fifth straight Southwest Conference final with a convincing 99-78 victory Friday over Southern Methodist. Texas earned an opportunity to avenge consecutive title game losses to Tech by beating Texas A&M 80-75.

For the Lady Longhorns (20-8), the game, which was to be played Saturday, was a chance for coach Jody Conradt's freshmen-led squad to begin rebuilding the program's once-proud tradition with their first Southwest Conference tournament title since 1990.

"We have a void in our trophy case that needs to be filled," Conradt said.

For the No. 6 Red Raiders, the game was one more chance to prove they deserve a No. 1 seed in the NCAA tournament. It's also a chance show they can defend their national title without Sheryl Swoopes and Krista Kirkland.

"Last year, we had two big people on the team," said guard Noel Johnson, one of nine players back from last year's team. "This year, we have 15 big people."

Johnson was only being modest. The team does have its hierarchy and

she's part of it, along with 6-foot-1 inside powers Connie Robinson and Michi Atkins.

That trio scored 65 points against the Lady Mustangs, including 20 of Tech's first 22 points. With Robinson and Atkins clogging the lane, Johnson roamed the perimeter and helped break open the game with three 3-pointers.

Robinson scored a game-high 26 points in only 22 minutes. Johnson had 23, Atkins had 16 and Tabitha Truesdale added 13. Atkins and Nikki Heath each had seven rebounds.

Mary Gleason led Southern Methodist with 24 points.

"I think Texas Tech is playing as good right now as they have all year," Southern Methodist coach Rhonda Rompolo said. "They're very patient. They know how to make the right decisions."

Texas Tech coach Marsha Sharp warned that although her team has won nine straight, it still lacks the postseason experience of last year's team.

"This team is unproven in the postseason," she said. "It will be important for players to step up and make big plays."

Texas freshman Danielle Viglione

stepped up in the second half Friday, scoring 10 of her 15 points as the Lady Longhorns turned a 29-20 deficit into a 52-41 lead.

The comeback kept alive Conradt's streak of a 20-win season in each of her 18 years at Texas.

Texas A&M was led by 5-4 guard Lisa Branch, who scored a career-high 34 points and had eight assists and six rebounds. Martha McClelland scored 16.



throws as the 'Horns built the lead to 46-24 with 5:40 left in the first half.

Rice got within eight points at 81-73 with 6:15 to play on a basket by McGee but Texas turned up the defensive pressure to end any comeback dreams.

Texas, which had defeated Rice 85-70 and 78-70 in the regular season, led 54-31 at halftime.

"We wanted to do something special for coach Penders so we got the cake," Burditt said. "That's a special night, getting 400 wins. Not many coaches do that."

Troup dumps Shallowater

Greg Austin scored 32 points, leading a punishing inside-outside attack for Troup as it moved closer to earning its third consecutive Class 2A championship with a record-breaking 97-51 victory over Shallowater.

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Life on road holds little glamour for NBA players

DALLAS (AP) - The life. The glamour. The electricity. The possibilities. For a young, adventurous guy like Mavericks rookie Popeye Jones, the hardest part about NBA road life must be deciding what to do next.

Dream on.

For Jones, like most NBA players, the reality of the 82-game schedule smothered most preconceptions about fun, oh, about three weeks into the season. That's when Sega Genesis video games became as crucial a part of Jones' must-pack list as socks and underwear.

On a recent Mavericks' trip, there was Jones, doing what he usually can be found doing, his 6-8 body sprawled across his hotel bed, his eyes focused on the Genesis golf game he was playing. Several Mavericks play videos on the road, but Jones is the self-proclaimed team champ.

"I've been playing a long time, put it that way," Jones said. "I love video games. I'm terrible at pool."

All right, so killing time during the day of a game is understandable. But

certainly the Mavericks take advantage of that road night life, right?

"Last night, I watched the pay-per-view and ran up the phone bill," Jones said. "I called all over the place. It's a good time to keep in touch with people you went to school with."

Hoo boy. Scintillating stuff. But it is an NBA reality that may surprise a lot of fans. Although Mavericks players sometimes go out on the road, especially when they happen to be in a city in which they have friends, they say 75 to 80 percent of their time is spent at the hotel.

"Phone calls," veteran forward Terry Davis agreed, "are the best way to kill the boredom."

If there is one positive for Davis in the fact elbow surgery has shelved him for the season, it is that he will save money in road phone bills. He said he has run up as much as \$100 in calls during a two-day hotel stay.

"I mean, sometimes I stay on the phone an hour, two hours, three hours," Davis said.

No wonder rookie Jamal Mashburn recently asked veteran Fat Lever why

NBA road life hasn't been much like the life depicted in Magic Johnson's biography, which Mashburn had just finished reading. Where are the parties, the women throwing themselves at the players' feet, the adoring throngs of fans?

Said Lever: "I told him, 'This isn't L.A. And we're the Mavericks.'"

As the Mavericks can attest, the word "lovable" doesn't necessarily precede "losers" in NBA vernacular. Invariable, autograph hounds in each NBA city find out the hotels in which their favorite teams stay, when the team bus arrives, and when it departs for the game.

Occasionally, a handful of autograph seekers stake out the Mavericks, but most of the time the players come and go from their hotels without fanfare. Anonymity does have advantages. At airport terminals and on the airplanes, the Mavericks are free to nap, read or listen to their portable CDs without interruption.

The players sometimes grump about Mavericks train travel coordinator Doug Atkinson's penchant for getting them to the airport early.

In his 22 years with professional sports teams, Atkinson has never had a team miss a plane. The players know why. For a recent 9:30 a.m. shuttle flight from Boston to Philadelphia, the players received 7 a.m. wake up calls, bused 10 minutes to the airport, and arrived at 8:05 a.m.

"You know it's bad," guard Tim Legler noted sleepily at about 8:35, "when after you get here and two other flights to Philadelphia leave before yours."

What the players don't understand about Atkinson's job is he is responsible for making sure all the luggage and equipment gets loaded onto the bus, then the plane. Hence, the early wake up calls and airport waiting time. Eventually, when the Mavericks begin flying their own plane, they will save an hour to an hour-and-a-half of waiting time on each flying segment.

"It's no wonder nerves fray during travel tedium. By the time this 171-day regular season ends, the Mavericks will have spent all or parts of 88 days in cities other than Dallas."

For better or worse, travel results in the players and coaches spending

an inordinate amount of time together. Not surprisingly, habits and personalities surface. To a man, the Mavericks say the oddest personality belonged to center Darren Morningstar, who was waived in January.

Under the NBA collective bargaining agreement, players receive \$60 per diem. The Mavericks often wondered what Morningstar did with his. Morningstar may go down in history as the only NBA player to ask a sportswriter for \$20.

"You never wanted to open food around that guy," Legler said. "He'd always want some."

The players still talk about the trip when Morningstar borrowed one of Greg Dreiling's dress shirts and wore it several days in a row. When Morningstar tried to return the shirt after the trip, it had some nasty stains on it. Said Dreiling: "I just took it back to him and said 'Star, you've got to get this thing cleaned up.'"

Cliques and friendships develop. For instance, before Sean Rooks re-injured his left foot, Rooks and Legler would try to go out for dinner and a movie in every city. If it was too cold outside, they punched up Spectravision in the hotel.

Still, game days in particular mean hours of dead time. Room service becomes a highlight simply because it helps kill the monotony. Within the confines of the room, the TV becomes the center of the players' universe.

"They talk about the four walls of that room closing in on you, but it didn't really bother me until about my third

year," said Dreiling, an eighth-year veteran. "At first, I was eager for things to do and would eat out a lot more, try to see some of the cities."

"Now, it's too cold to go out when you go up North. Some of the cities, you step out and you worry about getting mugged."

A few players at least have the video game outlet, but if Jones ever gets put on the injured list because of a strained thumb, there will be reason to be suspicious.


Although he enjoys playing Madden football and Capri tennis, his favorite is golf. Often, he tries to correspond the courses he plays with the city in which the Mavericks are staying.

One of the first things rookies have to cure themselves of is staying up late on the road, mindlessly flipping through TV channels.

"I think you have to mature, as far as when to go to bed, not to be up playing all night," Jones said. "In college, we did all kinds of silly stuff - water fights, pillow fights, stay up all night. There, you had a curfew. Here you don't have a curfew, so you've got to know when it's time to go to bed."

Problem is, waking up means another day to kill. Sometimes, during those first waking moments, that hotel room looks so much like other hotel rooms, players can't remember what city they are in.

"Yeah, that happens a lot," Jones said. "I think it probably happens to a lot of people."



SWC Classic leaves fond memories

There have been some classic games and classic surprises from the tournament which began in 1976 when Texas Tech held on to knock off the Aggies 74-72 at Moody Coliseum on the Southern Methodist campus.

The tournament was moved to The Summit in Houston where some zany games were played. Texas was a hard-luck victim twice in The Summit.

"I don't know how much of a distraction it was for him (Carter)," said Midland coach Jack Stephenson said. "It was just tough to see him hurt that way."

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




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Q: We recently bought an old house and, as you can imagine, it offers a "lifetime" of fix-up projects. One such project that we'd like your advice on concerns the right way to treat a loose balustrade.

A: When the whole balustrade, including the handrail and newel post, feels loose, it indicates a breakdown of the joints between the steps and the outer stringer. You should attend to it immediately, before the whole structure becomes dangerous and liable to collapse if someone were to fall against it.

Refasten to the steps a loose stringer and newel by first removing the wedges from the tread and riser mortises and then, working along the face of the stringer with a hammer and wood block, knocking it back into place to reset the joints. If the stringer tends to spring away, hold it in place with lengths of timber braced between it and the opposite wall. Make new wedges, apply glue to the joints and drive the wedges in to make tight joints.

Reinforce the joint between the bottom step and the newel post with glued blocks rubbed into the angle on the underside of the stair. Alternatively, screw metal angle plates into the corners.

Q: I would like to grow climbing

ivy on the brick walls of my house, but I've heard that the plant could damage the wall. Is this true?

A: There is a widely held misconception that a climbing ivy will damage any masonry wall. If stucco or the mortar between bricks or stonework is in poor condition, then an exuberant ivy plant will undoubtedly weaken the structure as its aerial roots attempt to extract moisture from the masonry. The roots invade broken joints or cracks and on finding a source of nourishment for the main plant, they expand and burst the weak material, which accelerates deterioration by encouraging moisture penetration.

If the ivy is allowed to grow unchecked, the weight of the plant can eventually topple a weakened wall. However, with modern hard bricks and mortar, ivy can do no more than climb by the aid of training wires and its own suckerlike roots. So long as the structure is sound and moisture-proof, there is some benefit from ivy clothing a wall in that its close-growing mat of leaves, mostly with their drip tips pointing downwards, acts as insulation and a watershed against the elements.

Where ivy is permitted to flourish as a climber, it must be hard-pruned to prevent it from penetrating between roofing joints and vents and clogging gutters and downspouts.

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Abilene has special basketball player

ABILENE, Texas (AP) - Looking Andrae Patterson after a Cooper basketball game isn't difficult.

At 6 feet, 8 inches tall, he's the tallest person on the floor.

And he's also the only one signing autographs.

At 18 years of age he is unquestionably the biggest star in Abilene. Kids of all ages want his autograph. It hasn't been an uncommon sight for Cougar opponents to want his signature after games.

Adults, perhaps pretending to be getting the signature for their kids, stand in line for him to sign their programs, T-shirts, caps ... whatever. They want to shake his hand.

They want to take his picture.

They want him to remember them.

He's 18 years old and he's already got the patience of Job.

He's 18 years old and Andrae Patterson never imagined his life would be like this.

When Andrae arrived on the Cooper campus in the fall of 1990, he was a tall, skinny freshman with a world of potential. He also had just learned to love the game of basketball after giving up on his first love.

"I was a football player when I was younger," Andrae said. "I loved it. But I grew about four or five inches the summer before my seventh grade year, then that season I broke my arm playing. My mom told me then to decide which sport it would be."

And there went the career of "Too Tall" Patterson.

He settled for basketball, but everyone else in Abilene knew what was about to explode onto the scene.

"You could tell early on what was going to happen with him," Abilene High head basketball coach Gerald Coppedge said. "He had so much potential."

But at that point in Andrae's life, all he was doing was trying to make the varsity as a freshman.

"My brother (Rodney) was playing, and I was just hoping to follow in his footsteps," Andrae said. "My goal as a freshman was to just make the varsity, and get some playing time. After that year, my goal was to break Mitch (Royals') school scoring record."

Patterson broke that record. He averaged 28 points and 14 rebounds a game this season.

But along with scoring records comes the sobering realization that Andrae is not like other kids. He didn't grow up in a situation that allowed him to go out and act crazy like other kids his age.

"Sometimes I resent that," he said. "Everybody wants to be a kid, but I never really got the chance to do the things some of the others did."

But those kids never got some of the same opportunities Andrae did. Opportunities like meeting college coaches from all over the nation, going to all-star camps, dunking in the seventh grade ... dunking in the seventh grade?

"I tried it then, but I'd make some and miss some," Andrae said. "I did it in a game in the seventh grade, but they didn't count it. Then I did it in the eighth grade and it counted. They were ready for it then."

And apparently college coaches were ready for Andrae then, too. He started getting letters from coaches during his eighth-grade year, the first from Texas Tech coach Gerald Myers, who had seen Andrae play in a BCI game in Lubbock.

But that pressure was nothing compared to what would come his way beginning with his sophomore year of high school. A new coach - Jack Aldridge - had been hired to replace R.M. Curran, who resigned after an 8-25 record in the 1990-91 season.

Cooper came out of nowhere to win the District 4-5A title for only the second time in school history. Andrae was named the district's most valuable player and the Cougars reached the playoffs for the first time since 1977. However, a disappointing

loss to Lubbock Monterey in the bi-district playoffs brought an abrupt end to the season.

But that game also brought an end to some of the pressure that had begun to build on the 16-year-old.

It would, however, only intensify.

Nov. 12, 1993 brought an end to the calls, the letters, the visitations from coaches from around the nation. Andrae had made his decision. He was going to Indiana University. That ended a pitched recruiting battle that saw Michigan, North Carolina, Kentucky and Duke all vying for his services.

"It's a great academic school," Andrae said of IU. "I'm interested to see how much I've learned at Cooper. I'm also interested in seeing how much Coach (Bobby) Knight can push me to my limit." Andrae got a taste of what that might be like during his final two seasons at Cooper. Night in and night out he was the focus of opposing defenses. He has been elbowed, chopped, and hammered unmercifully on the inside.

He's taken the wrath of some fans who watch him and say he isn't doing enough.

"There are many times I wish I could get away from everything," Andrae said. "The worst is just the day in and day out of having to live up to the expectations people have for me. They fail to realize that I'm only 18 years old. I haven't made it to the pros ... yet."

And it's that confidence - not cockiness - that separates him from every other player in the district.

"You have to have a lot of confidence, otherwise the pressure can tear you down," he said. "My mother keeps me humble. She tells me to pray and thank God. That keeps everything in perspective."

What's also in perspective is what he's done for basketball in the city of Abilene. Before Andrae, basketball in District 4-5A was just something to tolerate between football season and spring drills. You can bet that after Andrae there will still be excitement when it comes to hoops.

And you can thank Andrae for that.

"This has been a great experience for me," Aldridge said. "I've had heavily recruited kids before, but none like him. It's been good publicity for the school and the city. Everybody in the community should be proud that he has come through here."

Not only have coaches like Knight, Rick Pitino and Mike Krzyzewski been to town, ESPN basketball analyst Dick Vitale has made repeated references about Andrae on national telecasts.

"It's fun to talk to people you see on television," Andrae said. "It's been fun. It's something that only happens once in a lifetime. As far as Vitale, it's a great honor to hear him talk about me, because he doesn't give out that much recognition."

And perhaps the national visibility Andrae has already gained is the reason behind the autograph sessions at the end of games.

"I've never had a kid sign autographs before," Aldridge said. "But that's just a sign of the times; everybody wants an autograph. It's worse on the road now. When everybody is dressed and he's still standing out there on the floor, I just have to tell them we have to go."

But the most interesting aspect of the whole thing is the adult autograph-seekers.

"That really surprises me," Andrae said, "but I guess if I saw a kid with some talent I'd probably do the same thing. I guess if you get it now and the guy goes onto the pros it'll be worth something. The kids I can understand, but the adults get to me."

And despite all the attention on Andrae, Aldridge said he hasn't noticed any jealousy on this year's team.

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"I think it's been there in the past," Aldridge said. "But not openly. I'm sure it has to bother some people."

But Andrae says he does what he can to be one of the guys.

"I try not to let it all go to my head and be a regular part of the team," he said. "If I do that, they won't look at it as being better. We're all good friends, and they know I haven't changed."


"I'm glad everything that has happened, happened," Andrae said.

"Coach Aldridge did a good job of bringing the program around. Coach (Greg) Gober (CHS assistant) helped me as far as preparing me mentally for each game."

"I still have a lot of good feelings for Coach Currin, because he was there for me when I wasn't ready for the competition," he said. "I think I got my mental toughness from him."

"I've known Coach Coppedge since I was in the eighth grade," Andrae said. "I used to go over to his gym and shoot when he opened the doors. I just want to thank them for what they've done."

No, Andrae, thank you.

WHAT MEDICARE COVERS

While Medicare is not designed to cover such vision needs as eye-glasses and general testing for visual acuity, it does cover eye health issues for those over 65.

The rule of thumb is that any eye health care services provided by a licensed optometrist is covered if it is necessitated by

a health-related condition, symptom or complaint. For instance, an eye examination for a patient with a history of diabetes or headaches would be covered. If a patient reports blurry side vision, which might be a symptom of glaucoma, then the test for that, and the rest of the eye exam, would be covered. Testing for cataracts qualifies as a Medicare expense; so do the glasses and contact lenses required for after-the-surgery care.

In most states, optometrists are permitted to treat eye conditions as well as diagnose them. Where permitted, this is covered, too.

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

ANOTHER SAGA IN
THE CUTTING BOARD
DEBATE

Which is the best-plastic or wooden cutting boards? The debate is still on, but the USDA Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) has reaffirmed its recommendation for plastic cutting boards.

Last year, the controversial report of the Food Research Institute at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, which concluded that antimicrobial properties of wooden cutting boards make them safer than plastic ones, touched off a fury of consumer and industry questions. In response, FSIS called on the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) of USDA to conduct more research on the question of the safety of cutting boards.

Scientists from the Eastern Regional Research Center of the ARS report that findings from their recent study support the use of plastic cutting boards for food preparation. These scientists found that bacteria consistently survived better on wooden boards than plastic. They also were not able to find evidence of antimicrobial activity in various types of wood, except for white ash which is popularly used for baseball bats, not for cutting boards.

Despite these findings, as expressed in an abstract submitted to the Institute of Food Technologists, Dr. Arthur Miller, the principal investigator of the new study, cautions that the debate is far from clear-cut. He makes the point that there are many variables to be considered in judging between the two types of boards. These include the age of the cutting board, the type of food product being cut, and type of knife used.

Miller's study, "Comparison of Wooden and Plastic Cutting Boards for Bacterial Attachment and Removal

Potential," measured bacterial counts on wooden and plastic cutting boards after 90 minute exposures to temperature-abused samples of beef chuck. The previous research, conducted by Dr. Dean Cliver of the University of Wisconsin, looked at the survival of organisms transmitted to boards via inoculated juices or liquids.

Furthermore, the research done by Cliver was modeled more after what may occur in the home kitchen, while Miller's was modeled on an in-plant scenario.

Miller's study also studied the effectiveness of cleaning products used on the boards. Plastic cutting boards appeared to be more consistently cleanable than wood, he said.

So, it seems that the jury may still be out on this topic. Until more conclusive research findings are released, the safest recommendation for safety of cutting boards is two-fold. First, use separate cutting boards for raw foods of animal origin and for foods that will be eaten fresh or not cooked further. Second, wash boards with hot soapy water, followed by hot water rinse and sanitize with a chlorine solution after each use. Allow to air dry. Finally, it's best to replace any boards that become cut, heavily grooved or split.

Frying food may not be the best answer

Why fry?

Before you answer, think about a fact of frying: Like a sponge, food absorbs more fat when it is fried in a lot of oil, shortening or lard. That can add total fat, saturated fatty acids and cholesterol in your diet. That could contribute to obesity and high blood cholesterol, risk factors for heart disease. And that's not good. Cardiovascular disease, America's No. 1 killer, claims more than 923,000 lives a year.

The American Heart Association recommends you limit total fat intake to less than 30 percent of the calories you eat each day. Your saturated fat intake should be less than 10 percent of total calories. Cholesterol intake should be no more than 300 milligrams per day.

It may be easier to stay under these limits if you cook other ways. For example, you can bake, braise, broil, grill, roast, steam and microwave. These methods are healthier because they help retain vitamins and minerals and keep fat and calories to a minimum.

Still want to fry? If you do, then

at least eat fried foods less often and in smaller portions. And keep these tips in mind:

- Fry smaller amounts of food at a time at higher temperatures. Your food will cook quicker and not soak up as much fat.

- Stir-fry or pan-fry. The high heat and less oil means less fat is absorbed. Oven-frying is another good method.

- Use a wok or nonstick skillet.

- Spray your pan or skillet with vegetable oil spray. Be sure you follow directions on the can and don't use spray near an open flame.


- Use oils such as canola, corn, sunflower, sunflower seed, sesame seed, soybean and olive. They have less saturated fatty acids.

- Use vegetable margarine instead of lard or butter, selecting those that have less than two grams of saturated fat per tablespoon.

- Use low-fat breading.

- Drain your food on a paper towel. That soaks up extra fat.

- Remove skin and visible fat before cooking poultry and meats.

Upcoming events were also discussed. The Sweet Bee and the Cultural Arts Contest will be held March 24.





DEAR ANN LANDERS: Tell the women who write to you that when a man says, "I'm not ready for a commitment," they should head for the nearest exit.


I've been dating such a man for two years. His wife left him after a long marriage. We'd been through a lot together, and our relationship survived.

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
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
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Bochco, Busfield migrate to island paradise in 'Byrds'

Steven Bochco, the creative genius who made "Doogie Howser" a household name and put bare backsides on network prime time, strikes again with a new TV series. Only this time the setting may be a little gentler to the eye than the stark, grizzled backdrop of "NYPD Blue."

"The Byrds of Paradise," which premiered on ABC March 3 and airs regularly on Thursdays, stars Timothy Busfield. The program is shot on location in Hawaii.

While the prospect of living and working in a tropical locale may be enough to coax some actors into a job, it wasn't exactly a major selling point for the fair-skinned Busfield.

"When I got the script," Busfield says, "I thought, 'Melanoma is in store for me, I'm positive. I have to wear sunblock to bed.' So the idea of doing a series in Hawaii was more enticing because of Bochco and Chic and Chan (series co-creators Charles H. Eglee and Channing Gibson) than actually coming here to work."

Viewers should not get the impression that this is another "escape to paradise," volcano-and-hula-dance, travel-guide-type program. "The Byrds of Paradise" is a family drama first and foremost.

"Several years ago we were working on a show that didn't sell," Eglee says. "We thought we had a pretty interesting dynamic going on within the family, but in terms of a series, it didn't really belong anywhere. It was just sort of a family that could have been in Kansas City or Philadelphia or wherever."

"So we took our notion of doing a family show," he continues, "and realized also that, for the first time in a very long time in the history of television, there wasn't a blue-water Hawaii

show, which has always been a staple of the American TV diet. So we merged the two concepts and then a certain synergy took place."

After his wife is murdered in a robbery, Yale professor Sam Byrd (Busfield) decides to pick up the pieces of his life and relocate his family to Hawaii, where they can begin anew.

Sam takes a position as headmaster of the small, ethnically diverse Palmer School (on an unnamed island).

Sam's three children, 16-year-old Harry (Seth Green), 15-year-old Franny (Jennifer Love Hewitt) and 11-year-old Zeke (Ryan O'Donohue), are not completely enraptured with the idea. Furthermore, once they get settled, they find they may not agree with the notion of Hawaii as paradise.

Harry and Zeke are, at first, shunned, taunted and alienated at school.

Franny, still reeling from the shock of her mother's murder, takes out most of her anger and resentment, as well as her basic lack of enthusiasm for her new tropical surroundings, on her father.

The family's feelings of loss affect each character differently.

"Harry represses it," says Green, "because it's his job to be the most mature one. It's kind of on him to take care of his dad and the others."

And as with previous Bochco creations such as "thirtysomething" and "NYPD Blue," realism refuses to take a backseat in "Byrds."

"I think that our goal is to tell stories that by and large aren't melodramatic," Gibson states, "that treat people as they really are, engaged in situations as they really are. To show the struggle that goes on in families and to not access too easily the concept that love conquers all, all the time."

Cable industry looking to get tough on programming's violent content

Like radio, newspapers, magazines, books and movies, television is an option of American life. Yet, of all the media, television has become the most feared because it is the most uniformly and widely distributed and the easiest to absorb.

In February, the National Cable Television Association declared its members' intention to assume more responsibility for the presentation of violent program content. A number of cable networks were exempted by the NCTA because "the creative portrayal of violence is not featured in their programming." These include CNN, Court TV, C-SPAN, ESPN, Nickelodeon, The Travel Channel and The Weather Channel.

The following are selections from the other cable networks' position papers on standards and practices and parental advisories.

A&E: "Conflict and strife are the essence of drama ... however, all depictions of violence should be relevant and necessary."

The Family Channel: "We have not and do not intend to air any programs that contain violent content that would be inappropriate for children."

Lifetime: "Killing in a Small Town" was originally telecast by CBS, and it concluded with a lengthy, violent depiction of the crime which was the basis of the program. Prior to Lifetime's telecast, that concluding scene was substantially short-

ened and rendered far less disturbing while ... providing a suitable conclusion to the program."

MTV: "Liquid TV" advisory: "No animals were harmed in the making of this film except Beavis" (of the channel's "Beavis and Butt-head" show).

TBS, TNT and The Cartoon Network: "We have tightened our standards for movies scheduled to run at 8 p.m. EST." Daytime programming is more heavily edited for "excessive blood, gratuitous depictions of physical abuse" and "screamtine" triggered by actual or threatened violence.

"Most animated programming is edited to remove excessive violence and racial slurs that were considered acceptable at the time the cartoon initially was released."


