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## IRRIGATION EDITION

**Gets Nation-Wide Attention As Residents Continue Mailing Out Copies**

While local residents are still mailing out copies of the special Irrigation - Rural Electrification Edition of The Brand of August 28, national recognition was accorded the paper this week when the following article appeared in Publisher's Auxiliary, a publication which circulates in practically every town in every state of the United States. 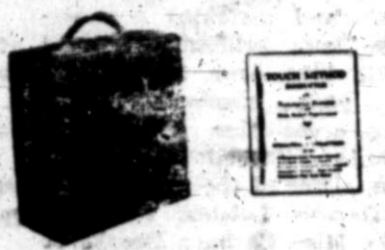

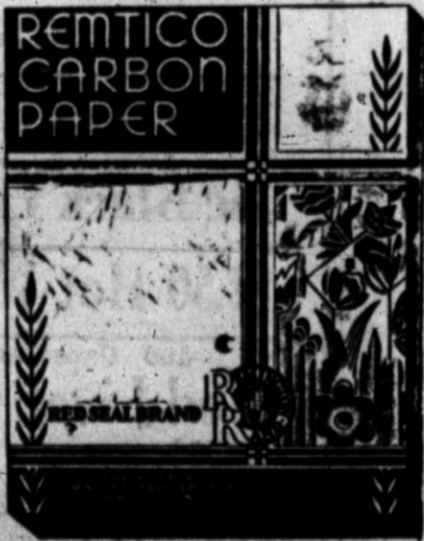

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## More Freak Peach Yields Are Seen Here

### TWO PEACH VARIETIES GROW ON SAME TREE LIMB

A freak peach yield displayed last week by L. H. Alkman attracted much attention, and from Mrs. J. M. Lewis, who lives four miles north and one mile west, comes another freak yield on peaches.

From one tree, she displays a yield even more astounding than that of Mr. Alkman. Like the Alkman yield, different size peaches were grown on the limb, running from extremely large to miniature sizes and all matured — but the peaches shown by Mrs. Lewis are of two varieties. The large ones are Freestone, and the small ones are Clings; they grow side by side.

From another tree Mrs. Lewis displayed a limb with large and small peaches side by side; large peaches on this tree of the regular Freestone variety, but the small ones have a firm, slick skin and taste more like plums than peaches.

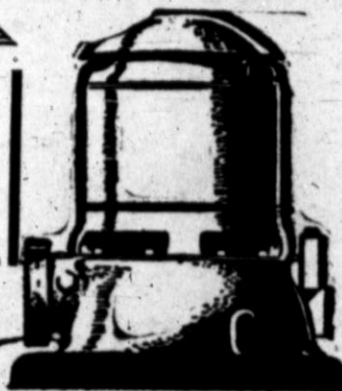

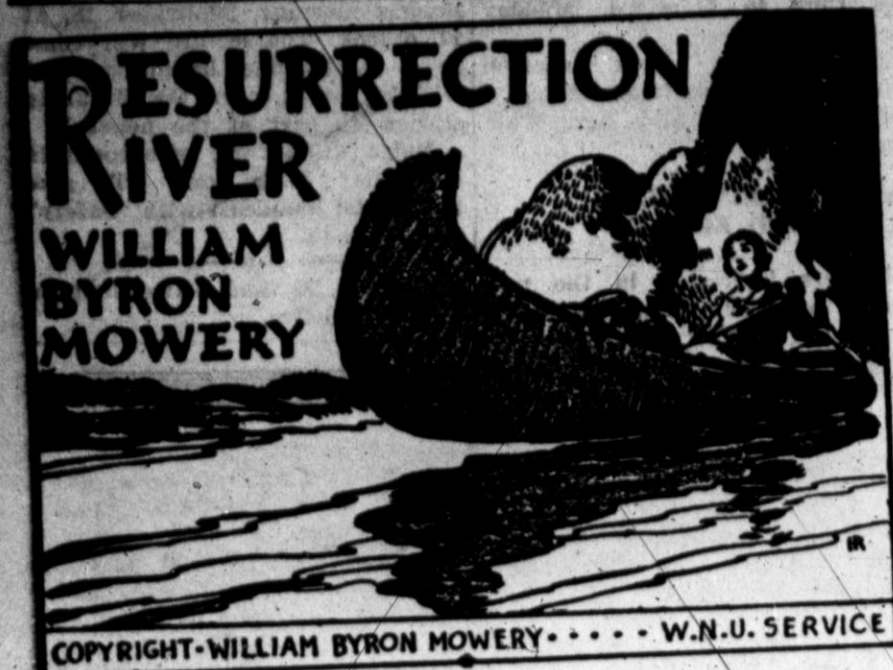

### Hoppers Seen As Wheat Menace Here By Agent

Grasshoppers are so numerous in the northwest part of the county that it may become necessary for wheat farmers to scotch the poison, it was announced today by Alex R. Bateman, county agent.

Several farmers have reported that grasshoppers have begun to eat their young wheat," he said, "and in my opinion every farmer should observe very closely to determine whether or not the grasshoppers are eating their wheat. We have a good supply of bran and a means of lead that our farmers may have by calling at the office. A good way to determine whether or not grasshoppers are doing damage is by walking through the area where they are eating and if approximately one hundred flies at one time there is grave danger.

"I would also call attention to our farmers that if there is any evidence that they have a breeding ground on their farm to be

sure to advise us. We want to start early in the spring on these areas to kill them as they hatch."
