# Rare Bibles In Library

Five Bibles more than 325 years old are in the library of the Brite College of the Bible at Texas Christfan University.

The oldest of the volumes was printed a year before Columbus discovered America-1491. It belonged originally to His Honor, Councillor to the Court of Gesner of Gottingen. It was printed in Basal, Germany, and is bound in calf skin.

The text is in Latin and lacks the familiar verse and chapter divisions. Each paragraph begins with a beautifully illuminated let-

ter in blue or red. The next oldest volume is a 1550 New Testament, bound in pigskin over boards. It was printed by Robert Estienne, one of the most famous craftsmen of France. Estienne was under the special patronage of Francis I, and the type of the 1550 Testament was cut especially for him. The text is in Greek.

The oldest English Bible in the T. C. U. collection dates back to 1559, and was brought out in London by Christopher Barker, official publishers to His Majesty, the King."

The two other Bibles are a Latin edition of 1607 and an English version dated 1613.
