Whether such condition as this is either no is a question that sociologists and political-economists may well study. The same is true of many other products. The rail roads and their allied interests are largely responsible for the enormous growth of the cities and the consequent dependence of the people on their service. How far this is to go cannot be foreseed. However, there is no doubt that it is not conducive to the country's welfare in general.

If you want to get rich quick go into the poultry business on paper. It beats' a gold mine. But i fyou want to make a good comfortable living where the income is regular and sure settle on ope of these sections near here and go in for cows and poultry with a few hogs. Build two silos and a good granary. In good year fill them all and hold half it over for bad years.

When you are sold breakfast bacon at 35cents per you are cited to the fact that hogs are selfing for to cents in Kansas City. That is true but it is also well to remember that the hogs that this 35 cent bacon was made from were bought last November and Becember at around six cents from the farmers and yet the poor packers are making nothing.

That Texas has a county library law probably an unknown fact to the majority of the people of the state, Such

The last legislature passed a bill in-troduced by Representative Dayton of Cooke County, authorizing the Com-missioners Court to establish county ilbraries upon a petition of 25 percent of the voters calling for a library election. The issue must carry by a two-thirds vote. The court is surther authorized to levy and collect a tax not exceeding six mills on the hundred dollars. The bill was ame ded almost beyond reczognition and even at its best it was inadequate.

the same author is, with the assistance of the Texas Library Association, framing another bill which will if passed furnish an adequate library system for the state.

Miss Sne Goree, of the University of Texas Library Association in a paper. read at Rosenberg in May, gives much information in regard to the County

library. We quote the following:
"The county library is a comparatively new development in library progress. Library service has been costly because a large tax was levied on a small area, and as a rule, only the people of the towns and cities enjoyed the advantages. The county is a large enough unit to give adequate support from a smaller tax. A county library is supported by a tax on all county property and is free to every man, woman and child in the to every man, woman and child in the county. The main library is established at the county seat. From this center books and magazines are distributed to every citizen through branch libraries placed in the other towns of the county, in postoffices, in stores, rural schools, even in private homes when necessary. People who have not easy access to any of these sources may be reached by means of a book wagon

which drives up to the door with a balanced collection of a hundred books or so, and the family may come out, and return the ones borrowed from the

The advantages may be seen readily instead of each town and school in the county struggling to get together a few hundred volumes and to add to them each year; you can post your a cumulation and draw from them a laurn wider usefur ess. You can begue with a collection of several thousand voimnes which will grow yearly. By meens of this interchauge system when you have read the three or four hundred volumes allotted to your town, they will be sent to another town and you will have a fresh collection. Of course reference books are not exchanged. Each branch library should be provided with as complete a collection of reference books as the money will buy, and the should be stationary.

The county library is cheaper and more far-reaching than any other system yet tried out, and it is the only one that gives really equal service to the people of the country as well as to those of the town."




