Mrs. L. Gough Is Buried Here On December 28

Funeral services for Mrs. Mattie Gough, 72, were held from the First Christian Church in Amarillo, at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, with Rev. R. C. Snodgrass, pastor, officiating. Mrs. Gough died Monday morning in an Amarillo hospital. She suffered a broken hip in a fall at the Gough home in Amarillo, Monday, Dec. 20, and failed to recover. A pioneer resident of the Panhandle, Mrs. Gough had many friends over Texas who mourn her death — and foremost in the group were hundreds in this section. The fact that Mrs. Gough was buried at Hereford carried out her love for this locality and the people whom she knew and loved here.

She was born at Summerset, Kentucky, on Feb. 21, 1865; there were five girls and three boys in the family. The Fore family moved to Texas when she was only two years of age and in the years that followed resided in Parker County, Young County, Wichita Falls, Memphis and Hereford. Mrs. Hill is now employed as secretary to the dean of the law school at the university, while he pursues his studies.



Headlines Of 1937 Reflect Progress For This Section

Political Calendar — for 1938

AUSTIN, Dec. 30—The year 1938 is studded with many important political dates. The subjoined calendar, compiled by Vann M. Kennedy, Secretary of the State Democratic Executive Committee, lists the most important dates and events. The time for holding the next state democratic convention is uncertain because of conflicting election laws, Kennedy explained. The Calendar: JAN. 31st — Last day for obtaining poll tax receipts. JUNE 6th — Last day upon which state office candidates and district office candidates (in districts containing more than one county) may file applications to have their names listed on the Democratic Primary ballot. JUNE 13th — State Democratic Executive Committee meets to make up ballot for Primary Election. Committee also designates where State Democratic convention will meet in September. JUNE 18th — Last day upon which county and precinct office candidates and district office candidates (in districts composed of only one county) may file applications to have their names listed on the primary election ballot. JUNE 20th — County Democratic executive committees meet to determine, by lot, the order of names listed on the ballot; to estimate expenses of the Primary Election; to assess costs against candidates. JULY 23rd — First Primary Election Day. In counties of 150,000 and more population, polls open from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m. In counties of less population, polls open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. Precinct conventions meet and elect delegates to county conventions. JULY 30th — Democratic county executive committees meet to canvass results of First Primary Election. Democratic county conventions meet to select delegates to district and state conventions. AUGUST 6th — State Democratic Executive Committee meets at Austin to canvass results of First Primary Election in all state and district office races. Committee lists names to go on official ballot for Second Primary Election. Certification of Democratic candidates nominated in First Primary made for General Election ballot. AUGUST 27 — Second Primary Election Day. SEPT. 6th (Sept. 13th) — Meeting of State Democratic Convention to adopt a platform of principles, to declare nominations for state offices, to elect State Chairman and new State Democratic Executive Committee of 31 men and 31 women. NOTE — Because of an error in a bill enacted by the 45th Legislature, the convention date was fixed for one week in advance of the time when the State Democratic Executive Committee can meet to canvass election returns. Unless this date is changed, the convention, presumably, will be unable to announce official nominations for state offices. Properly, the State Convention should meet on September 13th. SEPT. 12th — State Democratic Executive Committee holds session in the city selected for the meeting of the State Democratic Convention, canvasses returns of the Second Primary Election; prescribes the order of business for the Convention, and prepares list of convention delegates. NOV. 8th — General Election Day.

Citizens Back Editorials In Signed Petition

RESOLUTION PRESENTED TO BRAND BY LOCAL RESIDENTS

Rallying in defense of the dignity, rights and progress of Deaf Smith County, Hereford and the territory which the town serves, a group of citizens this week presented The Brand with a signed petition offering their support of two editorials which have appeared in The Brand.

The first editorial appeared in The Brand on its issue of Dec. 16, and was entitled, "TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN." The second editorial, appearing Dec. 23, was entitled, "THE HEREFORD BRAND HAS NOTHING TO TAKE BACK."

Dated at Hereford, Texas, Dec. 23, 1937, the petition reads: "TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: "We, as bona-fide citizens of Hereford, Texas, and its trade territory, acting upon our initiative and without solicitation, do hereby go on record as being highly appreciative of the stand which has been taken by the Hereford Brand in its editorial of December 16. "FURTHERMORE, we believe that the editorial expresses the sentiment of at least 90 per cent of the people in Hereford and its territory, and certainly the sentiment of most every man and woman who attended the banquet in Hereford, Thursday evening, December 9."

"WE FURTHERMORE pledge the Hereford Brand our unrestricted support and wholehearted co-operation when they say: 'The Brand HAS NOTHING TO TAKE BACK'; because we know the sentiment of the area to be with the Brand in this matter, we join the publication in refuting such statements to the contrary which might be made by some individual of the minority."

The petition was signed by 118 persons, including generally business men, farmers, housewives and ranchers. Copies are to be sent to President Roosevelt, Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace, Congressman Marvin Jones, and the Panhandle Water Conservation Association.

Several Rooms In Courthouse Are Modernized

Work was today complete on improvements in several rooms in the courthouse. The work included varnishing of floors, a new coat of paint on the walls and addition of cloth window shades. Offices which have recently been renovated are those of county judge, commissioners court, and county treasurer. Similar improvements were recently made in offices of county clerk and county treasurer, giving the second floor of the building a modern appearance. Labor on the improvements was done through WPA and the cost of materials was paid by the county.

Brooks Funeral Held Thursday

Funeral services for George Henry Brooks, 85, were held at 10 o'clock Thursday morning, Dec. 30, from the Black Funeral Home, conducted by Rev. M. M. Beavers. Mr. Brooks died Wednesday morning at his home in Oastro County, following an illness of several months. He was born August 17, 1852, in Tennessee, and came to Texas in 1877. In 1917, he moved to Castro County from Hale County, and has made his home there since. He had many friends in this section who mourn his death. Mr. Brooks, who had lived in and near Hereford for the past 20 years, was born in Tennessee. He moved to Texas in 1877, settling at Paris. There he married Miss Catherine Gardner. From Paris he moved to Wichita Falls, and from there to Gainesville. He lived in Plainview for a time before moving to Hereford. (Continued on Page 8)

Prospects Bright For Beet Test In Hereford Section

Declaring that a general meeting for the purpose of growing sugar beet tests in this territory will be called in January, 1938, H. V. Hennen, Chamber of Commerce secretary, today reported that conditions at the present time are more favorable toward securing a local sugar beet market than at any time during the past year.

Special ENVELOPES

Beginning with Jan. 1, 1938, business men and a large number of farmers and ranchers in the Hereford territory will launch an extensive advertising campaign centered around irrigation and rural electricity in this section. The first step in the campaign was marked by introduction of special envelopes, imprinted on the back with advertising information. The back of the envelopes are done in blue and Hereford red and in addition to statistics carry pictures of a Hereford bull and of a modern irrigation well. The front of the envelopes are imprinted with ordinary business return address for the particular firm or individual who buys them.

Samples of the special envelopes are now on display at The Brand office, and the present intention is to send out 50,000 during the next 12 months. Reports today showed that 28,000 of the envelopes had already been ordered by business men and by farmers. "Believing that letters from Hereford are sent, during the year, to practically every state in the Union and to many foreign points, we feel that 50,000 pieces of literature will do much toward putting our resources before the people of the nation," sponsors said, "and that they will help fulfill our slogan 'More People—More Farms.'" Special advertising folders are also being discussed by the Hereford Chamber of Commerce, and will possibly be printed early in 1938.

Dog Licenses For 1938 Available

City officials this week warned dog owners to secure license tags for their dogs if they expected to let them run loose in 1938. More than 60 dog licenses were issued last year, and 100 new tags for 1938 have already arrived. They said rigid enforcement will be necessary due to numerous complaints over the city.

Special Police Radio Planned In This Sector

J. E. Clark of the Clovis police and R. V. Miller of the Clovis Fire department were in Hereford Tuesday in regard to an Inter-Zone Police broadcast station for this section. Present plans are to include 16 counties, Deaf Smith, Lamb, Hockley, Bailey, Cochran, Castro, Gaines, Swisher, Hale and Farmer in Texas; Curry, Quay, DeBacco, Roosevelt, Chavis and Lea in New Mexico, in an effort to offer special police broadcasts for the counties involved. The station will also maintain contact with large cities over the nation, and from Clovis will broadcast calls at 15-minute intervals, giving 24-hour service each day. They reported seven counties had already joined the movement and that with 14 counties they would begin construction of the station.

State Allocates \$6,200 To Maintain Highway 51 Across This County

The State Highway Department will take over 31 miles of Highway 51 across Deaf Smith County for maintenance on Jan. 1, 1938. It was announced today by County Judge Earl W. Wilson. Beginning at the Castro County line on the south, the road runs north to the Oldham County line, and the highway department will maintain all of the road with the exception of that portion which passes through the city limits of Hereford. An allocation of \$6,200 has been set aside by the department for maintenance purposes, Judge Wilson said; the allocation includes \$200 a mile. The State Department voted to accept the road for state maintenance on Nov. 15, provided it met with specifications. Specifications included a 100-foot right-of-way and cement curbs; however, several of the bridges on the Deaf Smith County strip were accepted as temporary structures. This county is among the first to turn over a portion of Highway 51 to the state, and when other counties meet specifications, a drive will be launched to get the road paved as a federal highway from Mexico to Canada.

January
A telephone call from Austin confirmed the State Highway Department's intention of paying Highway 60 through Deaf Smith County. A total of 215 persons in this county had applied for Old Age Security. Postal receipts in Hereford showed a gain of 9 per cent over the final quarter in 1935. The Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion body was preparing to combat wind erosion on 17 sections. January 5 went on record as the coldest of the season with a reading of 5 degrees above zero. Hereford banks showed a combined increase of \$118,850 in loans and deposits. Deaf Smith County's birth records showed 7 boys for each 5 girls born in 1936, and a total of 1,636 children born during the year. To encourage safety, the Hereford Chamber of Commerce petitioned the Santa Fe railway to station a flagman at Hereford. Deaf Smith County was reported in excellent shape with an outstanding indebtedness of only \$54,683.91. Rev. R. N. Shepherd resigned as pastor of the First Baptist Church. A Hereford school bus, carrying 20 students, overturned on a detour west of town; no fatalities resulted. Frances Borden was announced as winner of the HHS essay contest. Citizens of Deaf Smith County rallied to aid flood-stricken residents of the Ohio Valley; contributions passed the \$400 mark as compared with an original quota of \$40.
February
Drilling on the Garcia test attracted wide attention as the hole went down to 3,000 feet. Boy Scouts of this section joined in the national celebration. Wilson Gyles and Jess Stanford represented Hereford in a special Goodwill train tour into Colorado. Westway girls and Messenger boys captured the Deaf Smith County Interscholastic League title. The Hereford American Legion post and Auxiliary were hosts to the Eighteenth district. Farm benefit payments for this area were estimated at \$500,000. Masons and O. E. S. honored the occasion of Washington's birthday in a joint program.
March

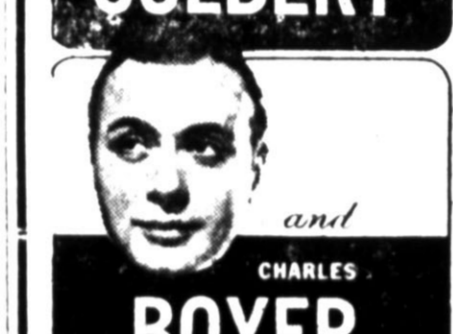
