## Festival of Trees to begin Thursday at Senior Center

The holiday season begins at Hereford Senior Citizen Center Thursday when a four-day program of activities and entertainment gets underway for the annual "Festival of Trees."

A full day of festival activities are scheduled Thursday through Saturday, from 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m., climaxed with special events each night, while a holiday turkey buffet and a Music Festival are on Sunday's schedule.

The main feature of the event is the display of 26 beautifully decorated trees for residents to enjoy.

Children's programs are scheduled during the four days. A Festival Gala is on the program Thursday, beginning at 7 p.m., and the auction of trees is planned from 8 to 10:30 p.m.

The tree display is a major community involvement with trees sponsored by the Senior Citizens and 20 other individuals, organizations or businesses. The tree auction is a major fundraiser for the center. Last year, approximately 5,000 people attended the display and took part in the festival activities.

Children's programs are scheduled from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Thursday and Friday, and a Christmas Tea with Santa is planned for children from 2 to 3 p.m. Saturday. Admission is \$2.

A Fashion Show and Dinner highlights the Friday night special event from 7 to 9 p.m. Tickets are \$7.50 each. A dinner theater is scheduled Saturday night from 7 to 9:30. Ticket cost is \$15.

Continuous festival activities include: Herd Restaurant, Bake Shop, tree display, children's shopping, children's crafts, gift tree, Holiday Bazaar, Lionel Train display, children's programs, and voting on the best tree.

Advance tickets only will be sold for the special events each night, with space limited to 200 persons. The Sunday buffet is \$7.50 for adults and \$3.50 for children 12 and under. There will be no admission charge for the tree auction, continuous festival activities, or the music festival.

## Showers forecast for Hereford, rest of state

A chance of showers or thunderstorms was forecast across the state Saturday night and was expected to linger in some areas through Sunday.

Early Saturday, skies were generally cloudy except in some parts of North Texas where they were clear. But clouds with the potential for showers or thunderstorms were expected Saturday night and Sunday.

For Hereford, the National Weather Service is predicting a 50 percent chance of showers and thunderstorms Saturday night, with a low of 40-45 degrees and southwest winds at 10-20 mph and gusty. Sunday, look for partly cloudy skies and a high around 60 degrees with west winds at 10-20 mph and gusty.

In West Texas, mostly cloudy to cloudy skies were forecast

regionwide with a chance for showers and thunderstorms across most areas through Sunday. Cloudiness and rain chances were to decrease from the west Sunday, when highs are expected from near 60 in the northwest Panhandle to the upper 70s in the Big Bend lowlands. Lows should be in the 40s and 50s.

Cloudy skies were also forecast in North Texas Saturday night with a chance of showers and thunderstorms in the west and central portions of the region.

On Sunday, the same wet conditions are likely across most the region except in the east where there is only a chance of thunderstorms. Sunday night, showers should end in the west while elsewhere it will be mostly cloudy with a chance of showers and thunderstorms.

The case also contains a display of a gray business suit and a dining room scene complete with authentic apron and coffee set.

Elegant formal wear shows that style and grace have always been a part of Hereford living. Mayor Bob Josserand's double-breasted white evening jacket complements fabulous dresses owned and donated to the museum by Ruby Kendrick Sears.

Delicate navy lace over beige silk makes up a cocktail dress designed by French clothier Marcel Rochas. The design was named "Le Baiser de la Fe" and was purchased by Mrs. Sears at a showing of fashions by the designer.

Another of her dresses is a black floor length peau de soie creation featuring a bodice of shaped pink pleating attached to narrow black straps. It is shown with a Ranch Mink capelet worn by Mrs. E.A. Edwards.

The salute to the '50s was put together by Paula Edwards and the Historical Society board to help celebrate our history.

## **Christopher assures leaders that US policy won't change**

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) - Departing from a prepared text, Secretary of State Warren Christopher took pains to reassure foreign leaders that the Democrats' election debacle doesn't mean a change in U.S. foreign policy.

The text of Christopher's speech to Pacific rim leaders referred only briefly and obliquely to Tuesday's Senate and House elections. In the actual speech Thursday, Christopher gave an impromptu and "very personal" assessment of its impact, State Department spokesman Michael McCurry said.

Christopher spoke of "the likelihood of continuity in our foreign policy in the wake of the recent election results," McCurry told reporters today, and many foreign ministers "came up afterward and thanked him for his comments, said

they were very useful, very timely."

Asked whether Christopher felt a need to calm foreign governments that fear the Republican takeover means a foreign policy shift, McCurry said: "I think he detected great interest. At dinner last night a number of his dinner partners asked about the elections."

Christopher is attending a meeting of the Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation forum. He addressed foreign ministers of the 18-member group behind closed doors and no text of his impromptu remarks was available.

U.S. Trade Representative Mickey Kantor also offered reassurances, saying: "The elections in the United States are not going to affect our trade policy. Our trade policy has been bipartisan from day one."

He said that while flying to Jakarta

he spoke by phone with Sen. Robert Dole, the new Senate majority leader.

"We look forward to working with Sen. Dole," Kantor told reporters. "We've worked very closely together and he's been a great supporter of our trade policy and we would expect that to continue."

In his prepared speech, Christopher offered a sweeping initiative to build electronic bridges across the Pacific and host a transportation ministers' summit on the infrastructure problems created by Asia's rapid economic growth.

"We live in a time when a company in Jakarta can start with capital from Hong Kong and New York, make a product designed in Osaka or Seattle with parts from Pusan and Detroit, market and advertise that product with firms based in Singapore and Los Angeles, and sell it all over the world," he said.

Apart from the transportation summit and a proposal to set up a forum to advise small businessmen, Christopher suggested "an APEC-wide, multimedia telecommunications network" linked by telephones, computers and video.

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
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## **Christmas mailing dates set**

People mailing Christmas cards and packages to addresses overseas are reminded by the U.S. Postal Service that suggested deadlines are coming up for those mailings.

Deadlines to send parcels by surface mail to military and international mail destinations have passed.

In order to get there on time, air parcel post service to the Middle East must be mailed by Nov. 15. Air parcels to Africa, Europe, the Far East, Greenland, Southeast Asia and Central and South America must be mailed by Dec. 1, while gifts going to Australia and the Caribbean may be mailed by Dec. 5.

Air letters and cards must be mailed to those destinations by Dec. 1, except Australia, the Caribbean and Central and South America, which has a deadline of Dec. 5.

For military mail, deadlines range from mid-November to early December for APO/FPO addresses and U.S. domestic ZIP codes.

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

## School district gets funds through ads

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) - A cash-strapped school district has sold out, selling ad space on everything from gyms to school buses.

El Paso County's School District 11 is the nation's first to come up with such a plan, using the ad revenue to buy books, lab equipment and other supplies the city can't provide.

"Go for your dreams! Stay in school - Reilly Buick-GMC Truck" reads an ad inside Palmer High School's gym. Dozens of other signs are plastered on school hallways, including ads from Pepsi and Shoney's Restaurant.

Students at Fremont Elementary School travel in bright yellow buses painted with the round red spots that sell 7-Up. Burger King ads, designed with the help of students, are painted on other district buses.

Another ad, bought by the Public Service Co. of Colorado, features PSC's Louie the Lightning Bug, a cartoon character who advises children to stay away from electrical lines.

Jay Engeln, Palmer's principal, and a handful of school administrators came up with the idea while plotting ways to raise badly needed funds. The district's 1994-95 fiscal budget of \$133 million isn't enough.

The ads first went up in January in all the district's 53 schools. About 50 businesses have bought space.

"We found that one of the things we do have is exposure," Engeln said. "We thought, 'We can start marketing our schools.'"

Teacher salaries have been frozen for three years, and voters have not approved a bond issue or tax increase for the district since 1972. The city was strapped by tight budgets and offered little financial help.

The campaign permits ad space on walls, newsletters, district reports, maps, stadium walls and buses. Businesses can also buy space on warm-up jackets for sports teams but not on their uniforms. So far, no space has been sold for the jackets.

Tracy Cooper, district public relations officer, said the advertising has raised about \$100,000 and the district's share is \$59,000. The ad agency handling the school's account,

O'Donnell and Riley, gets the rest. The campaign is expected to raise an additional \$200,000 next year, which would meet the district's goal of \$300,000, said Pat Riley, a partner in the agency.

Engeln said only 10 percent of wall space in schools will be used for ads.

"Are we selling out our schools? I don't think so. The hallways are not solid ads from one end to the other," he said.

So far, the district has not received any complaints from students or parents, he said.

"I like them," said Josh Smith, an 18-year-old Palmer senior. "It shows that big corporations are interested in helping schools."

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## Barney getting own theme park

NEW YORK (AP) - Barney is getting his own Jurassic Park.

Universal Studios Florida is planning to open "A Day in the Park with Barney" next summer, a 60,000 square foot attraction devoted to the chortling purple dinosaur.

The Barney park will include a 350-seat enclosed theater and an interactive game area, Tom Williams, president and chief operating officer of Universal Studios Florida, told a New York news conference Thursday. He did not disclose the cost of building the park.

Barney and his sidekicks Baby Bop and BJ will make appearances several times daily. Admission to the Barney-area will be included in the regular theme park ticket price.

The project is the latest venture for Barney creator Sheryl Leach and her father-in-law publisher Richard Leach. The pair already is worth \$84 million in combined 1993-94 gross income, according to Forbes Magazine.

Despite outside concerns that overexposure could send Barney the way of his ancestors, both Universal and The Lyons Group, which produces the dino-celebrity, say there's more than enough interest to sustain the attraction.

"I think it's jumping the gun to say he's up," said Gail Jim Hampton, a Universal spokesman. "The merchandising is going well and we think it's a good investment."

Sales of Barney merchandise soared in 1993, but have leveled off in 1994, said Lyons Group spokeswoman Kelly Lane.

"Barney & Friends," debuted on public television in 1992 and quickly became the network's top children's show. The show also is aired in Britain, New Zealand, Australia, Hong Kong, Singapore and South Africa.

## Herd closes season by sawing off 'Horns

The Hereford Whitefaces ended the season with a 27-14 trimming of Caprock Friday night in Amarillo's Dick Bivins Stadium.

While Caprock finished at 1-9 overall and 0-6 in District 1-4A, Hereford pulled its record up to 5-5 overall and 3-3 in district, finishing fourth.

In a hard-luck season, Hereford lost two non-district games by one point each. Then, the Herd lost three district games by a total of 25 points; a key play in each game might have turned the outcome around. Early losses to Randall and Borger, the

district's eventual playoff teams, eliminated the Herd from playoff contention fairly early.

"We played the last two games for absolutely no reason but for the fact that we're the Herd, and we're supposed to win and supposed to play hard--and we did that," coach Danny Haney said.

"We ended up the season with a lot of class," senior quarterback Michael Brown said. "We put a win in like we needed to get to .500. This team deserves better, though. But I really enjoy playing with these guys; they're the best."

Brown threw a touchdown pass to Wade Backus and ran for touchdowns of 50 and 32 yards. Tailback Marquise Brown added a five-yard TD run as part of his 134-yard total, complementing Michael Brown's 106 rushing yards.

That gave the Herd defense all it needed, as it allowed only 15 yards in the first quarter. The rest of Caprock's 243 total yards came with Hereford holding a two-touchdown lead.

Hereford gave up two pass plays of 40-plus yards, each of which set up a Caprock TD, but an interception

in the end zone by Hereford's Michael Marquez just before halftime kept Caprock from ever threatening the Hereford lead.

"I think we let down a few times," senior defensive tackle Shawn Malone said, "but other than a few mistakes we made, we played real good."

"The defense played great in the first quarter," Haney said. "Then all of a sudden, they (Caprock) got us reeling a little bit with misdirection, and we had a hard time stopping them. But we rose up and stopped

them (before) the half with the interception, and it gave us a chance to get a three-touchdown lead with us getting the second half kickoff."

While the Herd defense didn't allow Caprock a first down in its first chance to score when Caprock's Marcel Dagle intercepted Michael Brown's pass at the Caprock

5-yard line.

Caprock went nowhere, though, and Hereford capitalized. Fullback Josh Urbanczyk sparked a 42-yard drive with a 21-yard run, then Michael Brown hit Backus for a 19-yard touchdown pass. The Longhorn covering Backus fell down at the end of the route, and Backus beat two other defenders to the corner of the end zone.

"I just caught the ball," Backus said. "I turned around and saw him lying on the ground, and I ran around him."

Terance High sent the extra point kick barely wide left, so Hereford led 6-0.

Hereford stopped Caprock again, this time with an interception by Martin Martinez. He was 10-15 yards deep by himself in the middle of the field, and Caprock QB Justin Ruiz probably didn't see him. Martinez saw Ruiz all the way.

"I read him, but I thought he was never going to throw it," Martinez said. "I just reached out and caught it."

Two plays later, at the start of the second quarter, Michael Brown ran 32 yards for a touchdown, bowling over one defender at the 3-yard line and beating another to the goal. Brown dove and stretched the ball to the goalline. High's kick gave the Herd a 13-0 lead.

The Longhorns responded with a beautifully set-up screen pass to Dagle that went 41 yards to the Herd

11. After one play, Dagle ran the final two yards for the score.

Hereford put the lead back to 13 when Michael Brown ran 50 yards for another score, this time virtually untouched. High's kick made it 20-7.

"They were just a couple of open backcuts," Brown said, referring to both touchdowns. "Everything developed up, and they (the blockers) kept it open for me. Both tight ends (Scott Parker and Raymond Gonzales) did a good job tonight of blocking the ends."

Caprock launched into a 13-play drive that went all the way to the Hereford three-yard line, where an offsides penalty gave Caprock a first down with less than a minute to go before halftime.

After Dagle was stopped for no gain on first down, Caprock went to the air. The ball went to Hereford's Marquez, not a Longhorn. Marquez caught it two yards deep in the end zone, ending the Caprock threat and ending the half.

"I saw the tight end go out so I just followed him," Marquez said. "I looked back at the quarterback, and he was sprinting out. I just saw the ball right there."

Hereford got the ball to start the half and put together a long, time-consuming touchdown drive. It went 75 yards in 13 plays, taking up the first five minutes of the third quarter. Marquise Brown got a key five yards on fourth-down-and-two to the Caprock 33, then he got the touchdown, running the final five yards.

Caprock wouldn't fold, though. After an exchange of punts, Caprock took over at its own 47-yard line and wasted no time scoring. Jimmy Lopez got loose on a pass from Ruiz and rambled 49 yards to the Hereford one-yard line. Dagle ran for the score on the next play, and Hernandez' kick made it 27-14 with 2:27 left in the third quarter.

Hereford ruined Caprock's comeback with another long drive and a defensive stand. The Herd ate up clock with a 16-play possession, driving to the Caprock 28, but the offense couldn't overcome a holding penalty. Brian Betzen's punt went into the end zone for a touchback.

Caprock moved the ball down to the Hereford 39 with runs of 11, 12 and 13 yards, but that was it. A fumbled handoff, recovered by a Longhorn, netted a loss of two yards, then consecutive sacks involving Malone, a senior defensive tackle, moved Caprock back 15 yards. On the first, Malone was assisted by several teammates. The second was a solo job which pushed Caprock back nine yards onto its own side of the field, forcing the 'Horns to punt with 2:51 left.

"I guess the guard didn't do his job," Malone said of how he broke through the line cleanly. "They had leakage, and leakage kills an offense like that."

The game and season ended with senior captain Josh Gamboa moving from offensive linemen to running back. The 275-pounder gained about five yards before the final horn sounded.

"I appreciate all the work the juniors put in, making this season the best they could," Gamboa said. "I appreciate the fans. Even though we knew we weren't getting into the playoffs, they never let down."

"There's no place I'd rather play than Hereford."

## Carroll upsets Waxahachie

Southlake Carroll's postseason success continues, even in a down year in a higher class against a much-better opponent.

The Dragons pulled off a huge first-round upset Friday night, defeating Waxahachie 26-23. The second-ranked Indians had reached the Class 4A quarterfinals the last four seasons.

Carroll, the two-time defending 3A champion that struggled into the playoffs at 5-4, advances to play Dallas Spruce in the area round.

"This is the best victory in eight years," Carroll coach Bob Ledbetter said. "We've struggled through so much adversity this year that no one believed in us. This is a testament to the kids' dedication to never give up on themselves."

The first full night of playoff action included several upsets that sent home teams that were ranked in the year's final poll by The Associated Press.

A few undefeated teams got their first loss, meaning the end of their season, and Class 3A's unbeaten Sweeny didn't lose, but had its season end because of a 7-7 tie with Columbus.

Still, of all the results Friday, none compares to the exit made by the

Indians, who finish 9-1 in their first season under coach Thomas Brooks.

Waxahachie had reached the semifinals last year, was the 4A state champ in 1992 and played in the quarterfinals in 1991 and 1990.

Yet it was Carroll that showed the postseason poise Friday night as quarterback Kris Brown threw a 20-yard touchdown pass to freshman Tyson Olivo with 2:53 left for the winning score.

The Indians had one last chance, but Marcus Swift fumbled a third-down pass at the Indians' 30 and Carroll's Derek Sargent recovered to seal the victory.

"We're still the Carroll Dragons," Olivo said. "No matter what level of competition we go at, we will play you."

The Dragons weren't supposed to win this one.

They were even lucky to be in the postseason after ending their state-best, 72-game regular-season winning streak and then being shut out. They suffered another setback when several players were suspended for being at a party where alcohol was served.

But they went 3-2 in district play and earned the right to face Waxahachie. Now they're 1-0 in 4A postseason play.

Elsewhere Friday night:

- Another big 4A game was No. 3 La Marque downing No. 7 Bay City 33-14 in a rare first-round matchup of unbeaten. La Marque avenged playoff losses to Bay City in 1990 and 1991 behind two blocked punts by J.B. Flowers and a season-high 163 yards rushing from Aaron Yarbrough.

Other interesting results found Lampasas upsetting No. 10 Austin LBJ 20-14 and No. 8 Gregory-Portland pounding Pleasonton 70-22.

- In Class 5A Division I, Deer Park bounced back from its first loss of the season to knock previously undefeated Clear Lake out of the postseason 24-7.

Also, always-powerful Odessa Permian slammed Lubbock Coronado 24-0 and defending 5A Division II champion Lewisville beat FW Richland 42-13.

- In 5A Division II, fourth-ranked Humble was upset 13-12 by Galena Park North Shore in the most surprising result of the night.

Two former 4A powers making their mark in 5A brought along their postseason experience and had easy first-round victories as No. 1 Austin Westlake beat San Antonio

## Herd basketball teams hope experience pays off this year

Underclassmen scored more than half the points last year for the Hereford boys' and girls' basketball teams.

That's good news for the 1994-95 basketball season, which officially gets underway Tuesday with both teams meeting Brownfield teams at South Plains College in Levelland. The girls play at 6 p.m., the boys at 7:30.

The Hereford boys' team actually had 74 percent of its points from underclassmen, mostly juniors who are now seniors. Three of those averaged in double figures: Benton Buckley (11.1), Michael Brown (10.6), and Cody Marion (10.2). A freshman-now-sophomore, Isaac Walker, was just short of double-figures at 9.6 points per game.

Buckley, a second-team all-district selection, is the only full-time starter returning. The Herd also returns a part-time starter, Ashley Noland, who led the team in charges taken (13) and in assists (2 per game).

The Lady Whitefaces lost leading-scorer Stephanie Wilcox to graduation, but the next four on the scoring list were starters as sophomores who return for their junior years.

Mindi Davis, a second-team all-district pick, averaged 9.3 points and 7.7 rebounds, and she's already in practice. The other three returning starters are still in volleyball: Tarabeth Holmes (6.3 ppg), Heather Hodges (5.9) and Britney Binder (5.8).

The girls' team will include no seniors and probably three sophomores and three freshmen. The core of the team will be the juniors, who helped the team to double-figures in wins last season (11-17).

"I'm as excited about this one as I was my first year of coaching," said girls coach Eddie Fortenberry, who is starting his second year in Hereford. "This kind of group--the talent we have--that's something you've got to be excited about. They're young and exciting that's all there is to it. They're fun to watch."

"I realize we're still young but we've got a lot of experience because of how much they've played," Fortenberry said. "We've got one year under our belt now, which helps a bunch, and we played a tough schedule (last year) which may help us in the long run."

Boys' coach Randy Dean, also starting his second year in Hereford,

has reason to be excited about his team. The chances for improving on last year's 8-22 mark are good, he said.

"I know we're going to have a better team this year because we've got a lot of experience coming back," Dean said. "I believe these guys are hungry to win, and that's going to show up in the intensity and the effort during games. We should be pretty strong with our guard play, and we have some inside players who are capable."

Buckley is capable of many things, Dean said.

"Benton has the talent to match up and play with anybody from this area," he said. "He's really improved his strength from last year, and it's really added a new dimension to his game. His biggest asset, though, is he can handle the ball and shoot off the dribble."

Just looking at the boys' team, it's difficult to tell who plays where. Buckley, with those dribbling and shooting skills, is 6-foot-3, and Marion, at 6-2, was the team's best three-point shooter last year (51-of-142, 36 percent). When Marion gets on a hot streak, Dean said, "people last year never found a way to cool him off."

Walker, at 5-11, was probably the team's best inside player and led last year in rebounds (5.0 per game).

Noland, who Dean calls a "hard-nosed" defender has the right height for a guard at 5-11, as does Brown, who brings quickness and defensive pressure as well as offensive skills, Dean said.

Walker will play more outside this year, Dean said.

"We'll let him face the basket more, and hopefully he won't have to battle the biggest player from the other team," Dean said.

roster before getting a good look at the other players coming out of football this week.

Fortenberry has named his opening

varsity roster, but with nine out of the 12 still involved in volleyball, it may fluctuate early. The volleyball team was to play Dumas Saturday for a trip to the state tournament.

The girls' varsity roster includes Davis, Holmes, Hodges, Binder and two sophomores who played enough as freshmen to earn letters: Danielle Cornelius and Kari Barrett. Others set for varsity are juniors Julie Cole and Shay Henderson; sophomore Cassie Abney; and freshmen Catic Betzen, Julie Rampley and Misti Davis (Mindi's sister).

Of those 12, only the two Davis girls and Henderson are not involved in volleyball. Besides Mindi Davis, all the returning letter-winners have been held out of full-time basketball practice. This makes Fortenberry's job a little tougher, but he sees a bright side.

"Our kids know how to win because of volleyball," he said, listing that winning attitude as one of the team's strengths. Other strengths include depth and quickness.

"One of the obvious spots is depth," he said. "We've got a lot more depth than last year. It's young depth but its depth. And we're quicker than last year. Those girls went through a tough off-season in volleyball and in basketball, and it's helped us a bunch."

Mindi Davis, the second-team all-district post, will have to carry more of a load until the volleyball players get into basketball full-time.

"Mindi is a quiet leader," Fortenberry said. "She's not the loud type; she leads by example. She goes 100 percent every time she hits the



## Water use practices need re-evaluating

Re-evaluation of water use practices may be in order, in light of below-average precipitation in the last three years.

A. Wayne Wyatt, general manager of High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, said drought conditions have resulted in heavier-than-normal pumping by both agricultural and urban users in Deaf Smith County.

Usage and light rainfall have contributed to decreases in well yields during pumping season in some parts of the county, Wyatt said.

"It is during times of drought that people stop and wonder if more can be done to achieve maximum water use efficiency," he continued.

The volume of ground water in storage within the Ogallala Aquifer in Deaf Smith County was calculated at 12.20 million acre-feet in 1990.

Net depletion from 1990 to 2000 was expected to be about 1.65 million acre-feet, or 165,000 acre-feet per year, based on previous trends.

However, the drought may cause net depletion greater than previously expected because of extra pumping and lack of precipitation for aquifer recharge.

The district's Deaf Smith County committee recently concluded that changes in water use practices must be made if residents are to have enough water to continue to maintain a profitable economy.

Recommendations by the committee to the agricultural community include:

-- Efforts are needed to ensure maximum use of every drop of precipitation that falls within the county.

-- Irrigation practices should be re-

evaluated to determine if water losses can be reduced further or eliminated, such as conversion of sprinklers to low energy precision application.

-- Water losses from irrigation tailwater escaping from fields should be eliminated.

-- Producers should consider lower water-use crops.

-- The most profitable crop yield per inch of water pumped, rather than irrigation for maximum yield, should be considered.

-- Recent research in precipitation enhancement should be evaluated.

Urban water use by homeowners, business owners and industries also was addressed by the committee, asking that those entities share in water conservation efforts. Recommendations are:

-- Re-use of waste water by industry

is suggested whenever possible.

-- Low-flow showerheads and lavatory faucets, flow restrictors, low-flush toilets and other conservation fixtures should be installed in homes and schools, as well as apartments.

-- City irrigation systems should be designed for maximum efficiency.

-- Landscaping with drought tolerant, native vegetation is recommended whenever possible.

Representatives of the 15 county committees in the water district will meet in January to seek a plan of action to maximize water use efficiency.

Wyatt pointed out that a survey in 1993 showed 452 center pivot irrigation systems in operation, estimated at 35.1 percent of the county. He said that Deaf Smith County still may look for new opportunities to conserve water, in both urban and agricultural settings.

## Clinic set for pig showmen

Youth planning to enter swine in shows this winter are encouraged to attend a showmanship clinic Tuesday, beginning at 6 p.m., at the Little Bull Barn.

Participants need not bring their own animals to the clinic, said Vance Christie, Deaf Smith County agent.

"We will have pigs available for the youth to work with," said Christie.

Topics to be covered during the clinic include selection, feeding, grooming and showing techniques.





Prose interpretation is the dramatic reading of a story in which the reader interprets the characters.





### KEEPING YOUR SHARE

**R**ecently, I received a telephone call from an anxious business owner. Two megastore competitors had come to this town a year ago. Now his sales are down nearly 10 percent. "I know I can't put them out of business," he said, "but I do want to keep my share."

When the mega competitors come town on any independent business owners begin to worry about losing market share. And well they should. Most segments of retail and service industries are becoming crowded. We are approaching a condition of being "over stored" and "over serviced."

For independent businesses the game begins with holding on

to your market share. Later, you'll need to grow your business, and to do that you must stay aggressive in taking business away from others. However, before you worry too much about becoming aggressive, you better check your defense.

Are you well protected from attack? Or, do you have weaknesses that make you an easy target? If a power retailer or category killer moved into your trade area, could you keep your market share? Or, would your sales take a dip and your business be at risk?

#### Saving your slice

We often refer to an entire business market as a pie. Every business in your market has a slice of the pie. If the pie isn't growing, someone - megastore, category killer or aggressive independent - is trying to take some of your slice. Here are some tips on saving your slice.

- **Never relax.** You must expect aggressive competition. Even if you're having your best year ever, don't ease up. The papers chronicle business failures every day. Don't relax and become one of them.

Just as athletes train to stay in shape, business owners must work to maintain a sharp cutting edge. Monitor all critical business activities. Maintain your level of quality. Watch your costs, even small ones.

- **Never take your customers for granted.** Help all employees understand the importance of customers to your business success. You don't own any customer. You must earn their loyalty. Every day, with every transaction, you must prove your value. The quality or service award you won last year won't keep any customers this year if you rest on your laurels.

You keep customers by the value you provide to them. Whether you sell quality products at fair prices, or ideas, information and knowl-

edge, you must earn the privilege of doing business with your customers everyday.

- **Remember, everyone lives by selling something.** Regardless of the product or service you provide, sell yourself first. We've said it before, but we'll say it again: All business is personal. People prefer to do business with people, not companies.

Don't set out to improve one area by 100 percent. Rather, look for 100 items you can improve by 1 percent. It isn't only the major factors that help you keep market share, it's also the small ones.




Q: Can you tell me how to care for my sump pump? Every winter, I have to call a repair man after the first rain to get it started. What is the standard procedure to keep these things in good running condition?

A: Normally, a sump pump does not require any maintenance. Certainly not yearly maintenance. In all probability, the pump's intake port is sucking in dirt from the sump pit, and this is clogging the pump. The pit should have a liner which prevents the earthen walls of the pit from

eroding and depositing silt and tiny pebbles at the base. The pump should also be positioned so that the intake port is not at the base of the pit. Some sump pump manufacturers also make screens or filter boxes that can be installed in front of the pump's intake. Check with the manufacturer of your pump. You can also make one yourself by using an insect screen. However, you should periodically check the screen to make sure it is not clogged.

## Whalley-Kilmer successfully portrays grown-up Scarlett

It's been more than 50 years and it's about time Scarlett O'Hara grew up.

That's what executive producer Robert Halmi Sr. must have been thinking when he decided to revive the famous Southern belle in *Scarlett*, premiering Sunday, Nov. 13, on CBS.

This four-part miniseries (Parts 2 through 4 air Tuesday, Nov. 15, through Thursday, Nov. 17) is based on Alexandra Ripley's novel of the same name. It picks up where *Gone With the Wind* left off in the soap opera life of Scarlett.

Joanne Whalley-Kilmer effectively portrays the strong-willed and feisty O'Hara woman that Vivien Leigh first portrayed in the 1939 classic.

"Well, I think it definitely is daunting," Whalley-Kilmer says. "And, you know, we had a lot of baggage that came with this one, and some big shoes to fill, as it were."

The story is not a remake of Margaret Mitchell's *Gone With the Wind*, but rather a continuation of it, with Timothy Dalton as Rhett Butler.

When Scarlett finds herself with no Rhett, no home and no friends, she slowly rebuilds her life, at the same time growing stronger and more understanding of others.

Leigh brought the young Scarlett to life, bringing out her forcefulness, her stubbornness and her selfishness.

But, unlike *Gone With the Wind*, the sequel depicts a more mature Scarlett who has had many obstacles to overcome. According to Halmi, Leigh was a perfect young Scarlett, but he had a different type of actress in mind for the sequel.

"What I wanted to do is find my vision of Scarlett, and find a lady and an actor who is the Scarlett as written, which has nothing to do with the *Gone*

*With the Wind* Scarlett," Halmi comments.

"This is a different lady, with different character," he continues, "And I needed a grown-up Scarlett, not a little girl who does this and that stuff."

When Whalley-Kilmer dove into this role, it was with the intention that she would not re-create the character that Leigh had created. She would evolve the character from that performance, just as Scarlett evolved from her disasters and mistakes.

"It was - you know, we're taking the story somewhere else and developing the characters," she says. "We're not doing a copy of anything."

Whalley-Kilmer successfully brings a new side to this famous belle as Scarlett slowly picks up the pieces and attempts to begin a new life.

"She grows up," Whalley-Kilmer comments. "She doesn't lose her drive and her power and the admirable side of her nature. But she does become kinder and more compassionate, which is only a good thing and it makes her a better person."

As she grows, Scarlett meets new people and creates a new world for herself.

Even though she becomes more compassionate and takes others into consideration, she continues to have the will power and stubborn drive needed to achieve her goals.

"One thing I love about her is that she's not shy of the truth," Whalley-Kilmer says. "So all the horrors that we, you know, recognize in her nature, she can face them, too."

"And she does that. And she accepts them and learns about them. So I think that most of her qualities are not exactly admirable, but they're things that we often wish we could get away with."
