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## City to host representatives of pork plant

Hereford's bid to land a giant pork processing facility will shift into high gear Monday and Tuesday as the Hereford Economic Development Corporation hosts two officials from Premium Standard Farms, a Missouri-based company.

The HEDC board has made plans for the men to look at possible sites for a \$65 million plant, tour the city and other areas of interest, and meet with industry and business leaders, directors of local boards, elected officials, and the tax abatement board.

Mike Hatley, interim executive director of HEDC, said the itinerary had been planned in accordance with wishes of the company. "I think they want to see if Hospitable, Hustling Hereford lives up to its name."

Shirley Garrison, chairman of the development board, said members have a "good feeling" about their contacts with PSF, and that directors have been "highly encouraged" by the support and response of residents all around the community.

The HEDC has been actively pursuing the industrial plum since August. PSF had announced plans to build the plant to process hogs from its sow operations in the Dalhart area. Named as prospects were Dalhart, Dumas, Amarillo, Hereford and Clayton, N.M. Site selection is

anticipated before Christmas.

The new plant would be able to process about 7,000 hogs a day when in full operation. It is estimated that 500 to 800 persons would be employed at the facility, as well as providing approximately 100 jobs for truck drivers.

Hatley said the HEDC board feels that Hereford ranks high in all the factors involved in the site selection. These include location, water availability, utility rates, and community acceptance.

Any type of industry being invited to a community would apparently draw opposition from some folks, said Hatley, "but we want to show them that support for their move here has overwhelming acceptance."

The itinerary for the company representative's visit Monday includes lunch with the HEDC board, a meeting with the tax abatement board, and a reception and dinner with business and industry leaders. Tuesday's schedule includes a small hunting duck and goose-hunting trip, lunch with some community leaders, tours, and a reception and dinner with elected officials, directors of local board and organizations, and other guests.

A tentative Wednesday schedule calls for KPAN Radio to host one or both of the PSF officials on its morning talk show, and a meeting with retail business leaders.

## Post office to open on two Saturdays

Special Saturday hours will provide customers with postal service at the Hereford post office on Dec. 10 and Dec. 17.

Charles Britten, postmaster, said the post office, usually closed on Saturday, will be open from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. both Saturdays to accommodate residents.

Regular weekday hours at the post office will be unchanged -- 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Britten said that the Saturday hours may be lengthened if a need is demonstrated.

## Hereford woman reflects on nearly 100 years of life

Born during the second administration of Grover Cleveland, Blanche Moseley has seen it all and is singularly unimpressed with much of what she's seen.

Through 18 presidencies since Cleveland, including Bill Clinton, Mrs. Moseley has gone about her business, bringing up a family, working in her church and tending to her tatting.

Mrs. Moseley will observe her 98th birthday Sunday. Friends are invited to join her and her family in marking the occasion at an open house from 2:30 p.m. to 4 p.m. at the home of Jerry Jackson, 208 Centre.

Politics is not her cup of tea and while technology brings the world into the living room, Mrs. Moseley is not very interested in the television.

"I like to watch shows about animals and I love Vanna White," she admitted.

Mrs. Moseley seems to take the world and the events of the last 90, or more years, in stride.

She was born Holly Blanche Carl on Dec. 4, 1896, in Denton County. She came with her parents, Holly and Rosa Carl, from Wise County to Deaf Smith County, arriving on March 29, 1900.

The family farmed in the Wyche community for six years, then moved into Hereford, recalls Mrs. Moseley. "My mother opened a boarding house and she and my father ran it," she explained. It later was called the Savoy Hotel.

She met Edgar B. Moseley in 1906, after he came to Hereford from Oklahoma. They married on Aug. 26, 1917, and settled into farming. The couple had two children, Virginia Wheeler, who died last January, and Edgar Carl Moseley, who died nine years ago.

Mrs. Moseley remembers that one year they saw their milo crop ruined and her husband announced he was

through with farming.

"He started to Hereford to look for a job and before he got there, he had been hired by a county commissioner," she continued. He worked for Deaf Smith County for many years.

Mrs. Moseley has been a widow since 1959. Both of her children, Edgar Carl Moseley and Virginia Wheeler, also have died.

Her early life in Deaf Smith County was punctuated with activities common to early settlements, but one in particular stands out in her

memory. "I was baptized in 1909 in the creek by Brother O.W. Dean, preacher at First Baptist Church," she said.

The site on Tierra Blanca Creek was east of the bridge on S. Main, she continued. "I wasn't the only one that day. There must have been about 15 of us."

Mrs. Moseley is clear of mind and sight but is slowed by arthritic knees that force her to use a wheelchair or (See MOSELEY, Page 2A)

## Quality of area beets highest in 15 years

Excellent weather conditions enabled area sugar beet producers to finish harvesting by Thanksgiving, and a Holly Sugar official reports the quality was the highest in 15 years.

Dennis Printz, ag manager for Holly Sugar, says the sugar content averaged 15 percent regionwide, or 1.5 percent above normal. The harvest came from about 26,000 acres.

He said the high quality enabled the factory to process beets more smoothly, and the slicing is expected to be finished by Dec. 21. Yield averages slipped below 21 tons per acre, but the high quality and good harvest conditions partially countered the lower yields, according to Printz.

Bill Cleavenger, Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association president, said the harvest numbers might have been higher if not for more than a week of 100-degree temperatures in the summer and continued drought in the fall.

"We had excellent weather for the harvest, and that allowed us to get all the beets to the factory and piling stations by Thanksgiving," Cleavenger said beet growers had a happier Thanksgiving "knowing that the beets were harvested before the turkey was served."

Cleavenger praised beet growers for "doing a great job of producing the best possible crop, considering the growing conditions. The high sugar quality is another strong indication of sound beet management demonstrated across the area."

Printz said the higher quality can also be attributed to new and approved varieties which are now being grown in the area. "Some of the new varieties appear to be really strong. Sugar content and yields looked very good."

Printz said Holly is planning to contract approximately 1,500 acres of beets in the southeastern New Mexico region next season. This would enable the Hereford plant to possibly begin harvest earlier without putting added pressure on Panhandle-area growers.

Cleavenger said the annual TSBGA meeting and banquet has been set for Jan. 13-14. The business session will be at Hereford Community Center. Roger Hill, president and CEO of Holly Sugar, will talk about the future of beet production, and Craig Anderson, a grower from Colorado, will address the challenges facing the industry.

The Jan. 14 banquet will be at the Bull Barn with author, actor and motivational speaker Joe Griffith of Dallas as keynote speaker. The Man of the Year in Agriculture will be presented a plaque by The Hereford Brand.

## Clinton bans use of federal monies to create embryos

BETHESDA, Md. (AP) - President Clinton on Friday ordered that no federal funds be spent on human embryos created for research purposes only.

But Clinton did not specifically forbid federal financial support for research on human embryos that originate from in vitro fertilization - the so-called test-tube baby technique.

"I do not believe that federal funds should be used to support the creation of human embryos for research purposes," Clinton said.

"I have directed that the National Institutes of Health not allocate any resources" for studies of human embryos that were created for research purposes.

"I still have five of those dolls," remarked Mrs. Moseley.

A member of First Baptist Church since her conversion in Tierra Blanca Creek 85 years ago, Mrs. Moseley may be the oldest living member of the congregation.

She spends most of her time crocheting items for friends and family. She watches some programs on television. But the electronic age is not overriding in her life.

"Sometimes I just turn on the television to find out what day it is," Blanche Moseley grinned slyly.

## Digest briefs

### WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON (AP) - Skirting differences over tax cuts, welfare and health insurance, President Clinton and leaders of the incoming Republican Congress agreed in an Oval Office summit Friday to work together on a batch of less-divisive issues.

Emerging from their first talks with Clinton since the GOP election landslide, incoming Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole said, "I think the president understands there is a lot of support out there in the country, among Democrats, independents and Republicans, to try to change the way we do business here."

"And certainly it's in our interest, where possible, to be together," Dole said.

Rep. Newt Gingrich, the incoming House speaker, said, "We agree as a principle that there would be areas in which we would disagree but I don't think we actually spent much time on them."

WASHINGTON (AP) - People with criminal records are finding jobs in some child-care centers, according to federal investigators. Some of the records include convictions for child abuse and assault.

For their study, obtained by The Associated Press, investigators with the Department of Health and Human Services asked the FBI's National Crime Information Center to conduct background checks on a random sample of 500 child-care providers in Nevada, Wisconsin, Missouri and South Carolina.

Using the workers' names and Social Security numbers, the center found that 39 had a total of 440 arrests, which resulted in 181 convictions for crimes that included endangering the life of a child, indecency with a child, lewdness, prostitution, theft, illegal possession of drugs or alcohol, assault and battery, robbery and arson.

In all, 61 people were identified as having arrests or convictions. Other crimes included shoplifting, writing bad checks and welfare fraud.

WASHINGTON (AP) - From personal recollections to telephone records, prosecutors are interested in

questioning former Associate Attorney General Webster Hubbell about possible political interference in the Whitewater affair, two lawyers familiar with the investigation said Friday.

Obtaining Hubbell's cooperation "on this and other matters has been the plan from the start," said one lawyer familiar with Whitewater independent counsel Kenneth Starr's investigation.

Another lawyer said Starr is almost certain to delve into any conversations Hubbell, as the No. 3 Justice Department official, might have had about two criminal cases handled by federal prosecutors in Little Rock, Ark.

That source suggested prosecutors might use telephone records and calendars during Hubbell's Justice Department tenure as a road map to studying the Clinton administration's actions. Hubbell resigned in March.

### DOMESTIC

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Heidi Fleiss, who once boasted that her prostitution ring catered to the "top 1 percent" of Hollywood's elite, was convicted Friday of providing high-price call girls to undercover police officers.

After four days of deliberations, a jury found the 28-year-old pediatrian's daughter guilty on three of five pandering charges.

The seven-man, five-woman jury deadlocked on the two other counts and acquitted her of supplying cocaine to an undercover police officer.

Fleiss slammed her hands on the defense table and laid down her head as the guilty verdicts were read. Her father, seated behind her in the front row of the courtroom, hung his head.

## Water, sun blamed for massive pileup

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Police blame a combination of slick roads, glaring sun and a lack of caution among drivers for a chain collision involving dozens of cars that left at least 21 people injured.

"On Friday, it doesn't matter if it's raining or not everybody's in a hurry to get home," Officer Myron Oberheu said. "Once it gets started, it's hard to stop."

At least 75 cars and three semitrailers were involved in Friday's chain-reaction wreck.

"I've been a police officer for 12 years and I've never seen anything like this," said Officer Wayne Ramey.

There were no fatalities, but three people were severely injured, said Capt. George Suther of San Antonio Emergency Medical Services.

One person was airlifted to Brooke Army Medical Center, while two others were taken by ambulance, District Fire Chief Rodney Hitzfelder said.

Lt. Tom Baker, Brooke spokesman, said Friday night four patients were in undetermined condition and under observation. Others were treated at the scene or taken to other hospitals.

Included in the pileup on interstate 35 were two soft-drink trucks, a milk truck, three other 18-wheelers and a cement truck.

"That cement truck caused a big mess," Oberheu said. "It started spinning out of control, slamming into other cars."

The accidents during the 4 p.m. rush hour closed a 5-mile stretch of southbound Interstate 35 for five hours between Interstate 410 and Loop 1604 in northeast San Antonio.

"Everybody started spinning out,"

the unidentified driver of an 18-wheeler told the San Antonio Express-News. "I saw a guy in front of me lose it and then about four or five more."

"Suddenly, we came to a full stop," said driver Jairo Bermudez, 29, who was traveling on the interstate with his sister and 4-year-old daughter.

"Then we felt about six cars hit us from behind at full speed," Bermudez said. "It was just bam! bam! bam! All in a row."

It had been drizzling throughout the day and dense fog had settled over some parts of the city, Suther said. However, witnesses told police the weather had lifted and the sun was glaring off the rain-slicked road shortly before the accident.

"The sun was so bright and it was right in your eyes," said Theresa Berry, whose car was damaged.

"With the rain still on the road, it created a type of mist. And with the brightness on the road, you just couldn't see."

Ms. Berry said police told her with an accident of this type, motorists may have to depend on their own auto insurance to repair their cars.

"There's no way to tell if it was the other guy's fault," Berry said.

Tow-truck drivers frantically rushed to pick up stranded cars and the southbound access road was cleared hours after the interstate was cleared by police.

The accident was one of three chain collisions to occur in different parts of the city between 3:30 p.m. and 4 p.m., Suther said.

Suther said 67 people were injured, 10 seriously, during accidents between 3 p.m. and 6 p.m.



"I was very lucky, because my father didn't get to play baseball on fields with good coaches or go to schools with the best teachers--he didn't have those things," Trevino said. "But he was always there to provide the opportunities he didn't have, and he gave us the opportunities and we decided what we wanted to do."

But just as importantly, Rick Trevino's got something to share: His heart.

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

### Wichita Falls Times Record News on school prayer:

Setting public policy for nothing more than its symbolic value is a risky business.

Just ask Bill Clinton.

Right out of the chute two years ago, the new president decided to move the issue of gays in the military to the top of his agenda. It could be charitably characterized as a symbolic act, something to reassure the liberals in his camp that he meant business.

And look what happened.

The whole thing backfired, leaving the president standing there like the coyote of cartoon fame, frazzled and fuming.

Unwilling to learn from this kind of lesson, now that the Republicans have gained the upper hand in Washington, they, too, seem to be trying to turn a controversial issue into a symbolic act.

The issue this time is a constitutional amendment to allow organized prayer in public schools, a nonissue if there ever was one.

This old nag of a notion has over the years truly become a horse of a different color, mainly because few involved in the debate have ever taken an opportunity to see what the Supreme Court said about organized prayer all those many years ago.

The court did not say kids couldn't pray in school. After all, how do you regulate thoughts?

The court did say that the state, represented by school boards or by school administrators or legislators, could not make kids pray a certain prayer. ...

In truth, if the state requires kids to pray, that is clearly a violation of the First Amendment to the constitution.

And that amendment should not be changed for sake of symbolism or anything else.

### The Houston Post on inmates filing frivolous lawsuits:

One Texas prison inmate burned his finger playing with matches and sued the state for \$15,000. Another sought \$45,000 in damages after his pornographic magazine collection was confiscated.

Those are examples of frivolous lawsuits filed by convicts that Attorney General Dan Morales is trying to discourage. They are part of a long list he has compiled that includes a suit complaining that prison peanut butter was chunky instead of smooth.

Another of these nuisance suits contested the seizure of an inmate's fireworks and still another complained that a convict was not allowed to buy lottery tickets.

One inmate filed 123 suits and won none, but has cost taxpayers almost \$59,000 in attorney and staff time alone, Morales says. ...


This is a ballooning problem in a rapidly expanding prison population.

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## Out of the Blue

The other night, I was lying in bed "channel surfing," looking for something to watch until the 10 p.m. "Star Trek" rerun came on.

I flipped past rock videos, cowboy movies and other uninteresting stuff, then pulled up on the religious broadcasting station.

There I saw a group of men and women -- many of them in their upper years -- sitting around a piano singing Christmas songs.

While this may not seem too unlikely an event in December, I especially enjoyed the program.

These were some of the nation's top Country Gospel singers who were joining together in what appeared to be an old fashioned "singin'".

One at a time, or in groups, these singers would share one of their favorites with the others, many of whom would sing along silently. At the piano was Bill Gaither, who has been singing Country Gospel music for as long as I can remember.

Toward the end, a woman stood up and addressed her peers.

I don't remember her name, but I know she was not a professional singer like most of the others.

But she made an impression on me

-- and the audience she talked to on TV -- because she has been deaf all her life.

This woman told about how her mother dreamed that she, as the only girl in a family of boys, would grow up to be a famous singer or musician.

Unfortunately, that dream died when the girl lost her hearing.

But, the woman said, she still received the gift of music from her mother, as she lay on her mother's lap and listened to the vibrations as her mother sang to her.

Her favorite song was "Silent Night," which she said has stayed with her all those years since learning the words and "hearing" the vibration of the notes as her mother sang the beloved tune.

This woman then sang "Silent Night." Although the tune, tone and timing were not "professional," many in her audience of singers had tears in their eyes as they listened.

It kind of reminded me that too often we hear with our ears, but not with our hearts.

After all, Christmas carols can be heard virtually everywhere we go from mid-November through Dec. 25.

And after hearing hundreds and

hundreds of verses of "Silent Night," "O Come All Ye Faithful," and "Joy To The World," blaring over speakers in stores, twinkling through animated Christmas decorations, or dubbed in the background of commercials, we become desensitized to the music.

Then I think we forget what the songs are really about and the message they convey.

Christmas songs were written to celebrate something other than discount toys, moving Santas and the message of "buy, buy, buy."

After all, without the birth of Jesus Christ, there would be no Christmas and no reason to celebrate the holiday.

The songs of Christmas were written to remind us of that birth and to help us vocalize our joy at the God who sent His Son to this earth in the first place.

So, next time you're shopping and

hear "We Three Kings" come over the loudspeaker, why don't you try singing along with the music?

Not only will you help remember the songs -- and the message behind them -- you might just start a trend.

Who knows, with everyone singing along with the Muzak as they shop, everyone might just relax some and enjoy the holiday just a little bit more.

Another way to enjoy the music of Christmas -- as well as fellowship with others -- why not get some friends together and go caroling door to door one night, or stop by a nursing home and carol door to door there?

Even if you don't want to go out caroling, there's nothing better than sitting around the house with friends, sipping cocoa and singing Christmas songs together.

The songs of Christmas really do help bring the meaning of Christmas to life.

Cigarette smoking is a habit -- it is addictive, as any honest smoker will attest -- and if all smokers knew when they first lit up that it would be a major undertaking to quit, they'd probably never have started. For certain, I never would have lit that first cigarette.

But, while going to college, smoking was chic -- a pseudosophistication, if you will -- and I started almost before my parents had driven off after depositing me at the dorm that first time.

That Lucky Strike was unfiltered, pure nicotine and tar coursing its way through my nose and airways into my lungs. Later, Pall Mall became the cigarette of choice, mostly because there was more of it.

Through the years, I managed to disguise my smoking to my family (until my little sister told on me) and sailed along under the impression that no one knew.

Then, one day, my grandmother mentioned that she knew a friend of mine smoked, "because I can smell it," she said. I didn't take the hint.

Women smoking and women wearing shorts were among the no-nos at the top of my grandfather's list. He was of the old school -- women wore dresses with hose and they didn't smoke cigarettes.

My habit went unabated, though, through my stint on a city newspaper, marriage and two pregnancies. The doctor admitted it probably would be futile to advise me to quit, but he suggested I cut down. My husband insisted I switch to a filter. I did, but I think I smoked twice as much.

A minister friend stayed on my case about smoking. I said, "You know when I was young, smoking was a moral issue. Now, it's a health issue." Said he, in reply, "Now we know why it was a moral issue, don't we?"

Periodically, I tried to stop. A friend and I spent lots of money and time going to seminars, some of which were offered by the American Cancer Society without charge, and some of which cost more than \$100 for two years.

"This concept of a youthful White House is not reassuring to anybody, at home or abroad," said Sheila Tate, former aide to Nancy Reagan and to George Bush and now a public relations executive. "I think that has finally sunk in."

The Great American Smoke-out, celebrated a couple weeks ago, was an annual event as friends tried every

possible incentive to get me to give up the habit.

I put big rubber bands on my wrist and everytime I wanted a cigarette, I'd snap the band. All that accomplished was a very red wrist. Even as I snapped, I was lighting a weed.

Friends hid smoking materials from me. I knew where to look, though. One friend got the dirtiest ashtray in our office and piled it high with cigarette butts, thinking that I would be deterred by the hideous-looking display.

My car smelled like stale cigarette all the time, my friends said. I'd spray it with air freshener, buy those little deodorizer things to hang on the mirror and drive with all the windows down. Admittedly, I hardly smelled it at all. My smoker had long since gone into hibernation from the years of assault by cigarette smoke.

One day, my friend, the fellow smoker, called and suggested we go to a hypnotist's seminar in a nearby town. I backed off, saying, "I think you have to want to quit for something like that to work. And, I don't think I want to."

However, I changed my mind and the next evening we made the 50-mile trip. It cost us and about 400 others \$35 each.

We all crowded into a good-sized room and listened as this guy harangued about the evils of smoking. I was getting pretty ticked off. I'd heard all that before. Only good thing about it was we could smoke while it was going on.

After two hours of discourse by the smooth-tongued hypnotist, he told us to go out, smoke our last cigarette and put smoking materials on tables set up for that purpose.

Then, for about 25 minutes, with lights dimmed, the hypnotist went into his snake oil routine. As I sat with eyes closed, following all his instructions, I was thinking, "what a rip-off this is."

When he finished, we filed out of the room and went home. So help me God, I don't know what he did or said, but I QUIT smoking. My friend didn't and she almost didn't speak to me for three months.

That was almost five years ago. I haven't lit a cigarette since but that doesn't mean I haven't wanted to.

## Old-time Demos find new stature

WASHINGTON (AP) - As the old Democratic gang that long has ruled Congress takes its final bows this week, another group of veteran Democrats is finding new stature in the changing political order: President Clinton's team of old-timers.

Clinton's chief of staff, Leon Panetta, once a Republican himself in the Nixon administration, has become the point man in the White House's efforts to reach out to Republicans who will be in charge of Congress come January.

And the job of Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen and Secretary of State Warren Christopher have never looked so secure.

Panetta, Bentsen and Christopher all have a history of working congenitally with some of the Republicans who will be in command when the GOP takes control of both chambers.

And in Christopher's case the White House also might not be too keen on trying to get a new nominee through the Senate Foreign Relations Committee once it passes into the hands of arch-antagonist Jesse Helms, the Republican senator from North Carolina.

Panetta has been front and center all week, representing the White House's views, sounding conciliatory and centrist, as the 103rd Congress meets for the final time in a lame-duck session.

Panetta, a Democrat since he switched parties in the early 1970s and former chairman of the House Budget Committee, is signaling a present intention to continue to search for common ground and to avoid divisive clashes.

# 'Star Wars' creator plans new Jedi saga

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The "Star Wars" will be returning to movie screens, but you may have to wait until the end of the century to see the new editions.

When George Lucas electrified the movie world with "Star Wars" in 1977, he outlined an ambitious plan: to film a triple trilogy about intergalactic intrigue and warfare.

With "The Empire Strikes Back" in 1980 and "Return of the Jedi" in 1983, he completed the first of the trilogies. He also created three of the Top 10 film grossers of all time.

Lucas then became enmeshed in other grand projects, notably making the "Indiana Jones" trilogy with Steven Spielberg and perfecting the Lucas technology empire at Skywalker Ranch in Northern California.

Now he confirms that he will continue the "Star Wars" saga, taking the story back to the era before Luke Skywalker, Princess Leia and Han Solo. As with most Lucas projects, he reveals little, but he did disclose his modus operandi on the three films:

"I'll take a year to write them, a year to prepare them, and a year to shoot them. And I'll shoot them all at once."

Filming three major movies at once would be unprecedented. Spielberg and director Robert

Zemeckis continuously shot the second and third versions of "Back to the Future."

In 1973, Alexander and Michael Salkind managed to produce simultaneously "The Three Musketeers" and "The Four Musketeers." Charlton Heston and other actors demanded extra pay, claiming they believed they were making one film only.

Lucas hasn't directed a film since his early hits "American Graffiti" and "Star Wars." He hinted that he might return to directing for the new

"Star Wars."

"I'll decide after I get the films prepared," he said.

Lucas has ventured into other films as executive producer, often with little success. Among them: "Howard the Duck," "Labyrinth," "Willow," "Tucker: The Man and His Dream," "The Land Before Time."

His latest is "Radioland Murders," which opened to mixed reviews and disappointing business. Lucas, who wrote the original story, explained that it stemmed from his early fascination with radio.

"I grew up with radio," said Lucas, born in Modesto, Calif., 50 years ago. "We didn't get a television set until I was 10 years old. So for the first 10 years I was in front of the radio listening to radio dramas. It

played an important part of my life. "I listened to 'Inner Sanctum,' 'The Whistler,' 'The Lone Ranger' - those were the ones that interested me. I think they influenced me to put more emphasis on the sound track in my movies."

"Radioland Murders" is a slapstick comedy combined with a murder mystery that takes place in a radio station during an all-star broadcast launching a new network.

"This is very much in the mode of 'His Girl Friday' or the Cary Grant screwball comedies," Lucas said. "Also we've thrown in a lot of the Three Stooges. It's a kind of sophisticated comedy like 'The Thin Man' together with the off-the-wall comedy of the Marx Brothers. Plus some nostalgia about bigtime radio."

## Cornmeal excites Floydada resident

FLOYDADA, Texas - It was a lazy summer evening when Anne Carthel bounded out of her home with an armful of corn muffins yelling, "Eat this, eat this."

But folks here didn't find her behavior terribly odd.

By then, almost everyone in town knew that Carthel had been feverishly experimenting with Indian cornmeal recipes and mixes in an effort to promote Sagebrush Mills, an Indian corn milling company started by Carthel, her husband, Hulon, and family friend Mike Bishop.

"I know they thought I was just nuts," she said, laughing at the memory. "I ran around taking (muffins) to all my neighbors."

Her enthusiasm still is very evident. And after a great deal of milling, mixing and marketing, Carthel's products are popping up in gourmet food stores all over Texas.

The cornmeal mania began two years ago with a surplus of Indian corn. The Carthels grow decorative fall vegetables - tiny pumpkins, gourds and Indian corn cobs used to beautify homes, schools and craft stores.

Bishop, a family friend, asked the Carthels if he could try grinding their corn so that he could bake bread with Indian cornmeal. The result was delicious, and more importantly, distinctive, Carthel said. The three experimenters decided that they might have an idea worth pursuing.

They set up a mill in an old warehouse here, where Carthel could not only grind the corn, but come up with recipes and dry mixes using Indian cornmeal. For awhile, her family was on a steady diet of cornbread, she said.

"My daughter was like, 'Mom, cornbread AGAIN!'"

Next it was fish fry mix. Then a cookie mix. And now that she's found a niche in the gourmet market for her cornmeal and mixes, four private labeling companies are interested in her products, she said.

Starting her own company and marketing its products hasn't been easy, said the 42-year-old former teacher. But she thought it was a shame to grow something year after year without using it to create something else.

"You can grow anything and everything in the world here. And, oh my gosh, the opportunities for us are unbelievable."

Once she had taken a crash course

in creating dry mixes, Carthel had to learn how to market and package products in the wholesale business. Her success comes from not investing too much in her company before she tested the waters, she explained.

Carthel expects to see a profit within the next two years. Meanwhile, she's contentedly experimenting with new recipes and mixes at the mill. And she's still grateful that the pursuit of a moment of divine inspiration is paying off.

"We just kind of lucked into this idea and it took off from there."

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# Cowboys send Peete against reeling Eagles

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - A victory against the Dallas Cowboys on Sunday would do wonders for the Philadelphia Eagles, reeling from three straight losses. Still, the Eagles wonder if it would be enough to turn them around.

"Realistically, we still have a lot of work cut out for us, even with a win," Eagles defensive end William Fuller said.

Dallas (10-2) can clinch its third straight NFC East title by beating the Eagles (7-5). The Cowboys will be starting their third quarterback in as many weeks, but that's a trifle compared to the concerns the Eagles take into the game.

Coach Rich Kotite, whose .596 winning percentage (37-25) is the best in franchise history, is on the hot seat after his team lost - and looked bad doing so - to Cleveland, Arizona and Atlanta the past three weeks.

Three straight unsightly losses are bad enough, but they came right after Kotite, emboldened by a 7-2 start, attempted to pressure new owner Jeffrey Lurie into addressing the coach's future with the team.

When he bought the team for \$185 million in March, Lurie inherited front office and coaching staffs hired mainly by former owner Norman Braman. At the time, Lurie said he planned no major changes, but would spend the 1994 season evaluating who would stay and who would go.

After beating the Cardinals and Buddy Ryan, the man he replaced as Eagles coach, on Nov. 6, Kotite said maybe it was time for him to start doing some evaluating of his own.

The clash between Lurie, a former Hollywood movie producer who wants to be a hands-on owner, and Kotite, a blue-collar guy who would prefer to make the football decisions himself, seemed inevitable. They have agreed not to talk about Kotite's status until after the season, but the consensus in Philadelphia is that, barring a trip to the Super Bowl, Kotite won't be back next year.

There likely will be no Super Bowl trip unless the Eagles show they can beat the Cowboys, who have won the last five meetings. What makes them

think they can beat Dallas when they couldn't handle an average Atlanta team last week?

"I think now we realize we can be out of the valley," Randall Cunningham answered. "We bottomed out last week. I don't think you can go much lower than we've gone offensively."

The NFL's top-rated offense only a month ago, the Eagles have managed only 23 minutes of possession in each of their last two games. In the past four weeks, they have scored four touchdowns and three field goals. Cunningham's quarterback rating has plummeted to 10th in the NFC, 19th in the league.

They will go against a Cowboys defense ranked atop the NFL. In

addition to stopping opponents' offenses, the Dallas defense sets up its own offense: The Cowboys have forced 25 turnovers in their last nine games.

"It's like playing robots. They play their coverages very well," Eagles running back James Joseph said. "Defensively, they have the total package - and you know what the offense is like."

The offense probably will be without Troy Aikman (sprained left knee), but with third-string quarterback Jason Garrett last week the Cowboys still scored 42 points.

"That's a tribute to the talent we have here and the supporting cast," coach Barry Switzer said. "Dallas is a talented team when we're healthy."

Garrett returns to the bench this week in favor of Rodney Peete, the former Detroit Lion who has played sparingly in four games as Aikman's backup.

Peete has a sprained right thumb, but said he'd be ready.

"Throughout the season, I really haven't had a whole lot of practice time," he said. "Seeing that we have a full week this week, it will be good for me to get some practice time going into the game."

The Eagles are playing poorly and realize they can't afford many more losses and hope to make the playoffs. Switzer said that worries him.

"They are desperate," he said. "They've still got a chance, but they've got to make it happen. They're dangerous. That's brought to our attention."

## Cards' Ryan faces former pupil in Fisher

HOUSTON (AP) - Buddy Ryan won't get a rematch with Kevin Gilbride in the Astrodome so he'll settle for a friendlier rivalry against his protege, new Houston Oilers coach Jeff Fisher.

Ryan was defensive coordinator for the Oilers last season when he took a highly publicized punch at Gilbride - then the Oilers offensive coordinator - during a game in the Astrodome.

But the drama of facing his nemesis will be gone when Ryan's Arizona Cardinals (5-7) play the Oilers (1-11) on Sunday. Coach Jack

Pardee and Gilbride were fired Nov. 14.

Ryan won't even get a chance to take on the run-and-shoot offense that he dislikes so much. That's gone too under Fisher, who has installed a more conventional pro offense.

Ryan will not miss Gilbride but he would like to take a few more shots at the run-and-shoot.

"I never had any problem with it before," Ryan said. "I beat them when (former Oilers coach Jerry) Glanville did it and we beat Atlanta last year there in Houston. So it never gave me a problem. It's tougher to play with it than it is against it."

Fisher's new offensive alignment

will give the Cardinals more problems.

"It's a pro offense now," Ryan said. "You got tight ends, three wide outs, two backs. To me, it's a lot harder to get ready for than the chuck and duck because in the chuck and duck, you have only one formation basically."

Ryan's defensive influence remains with both teams. The Oilers have played winning defense most of the season, losing four straight games by three points but they've sagged to No. 10 in the NFL over the past two games.

The Cardinals are second in the NFL in total defense, allowing 275.7 yards per game, setting up a chess match between teacher and student.

"I suggested to Buddy that we just put the two defenses out there and keep the offenses off the field," Fisher said.

It's safe to predict that defense will rule the day. The Cardinals rank 27th in the NFL in offense, scoring 12.8 points per game, the lowest average in the NFL.

The Oilers are little better with a No. 23 ranking and scoring 13.9 points per game.

"I'm sure Buddy wants to show Jeff that he (Fisher) still has a lot to learn," Oilers linebacker Lamar Lathon said. "It's going to be a great chess match between those two."

Fisher revamped the Oilers offense in one week after becoming the coach. There are still some rough edges.

"We'd love to have a training camp to put the offense in, but time is something we don't have," offensive coordinator Dick Coury said. "We're trying to get the basics down. Each week we're putting in a new pattern."

Ryan wants to see a better running

attack from his offense than in last week's 19-16 loss to Chicago.

"Last week, we got away from the running game too early," he said. "We ran 17 times and they ran 40. If we'd run 15-20 more times, I think we could have won the ball game."

Ryan insists his return to the Astrodome has no special meaning.

"It'll be just another game," Ryan said. "We still have a chance to get there (playoffs) so it's an important game in that respect."

What reaction from Oiler fans does he expect?

"I don't know. Fans are kind of fickle. When you leave, they forget you in a hurry."

Fisher, who made his debut in a Monday night loss to the New York Giants, just wants to stop the Oilers' eight-game losing streak.

"If we win, I'll do flips for you but right now, we're just doing everything we can to get a win."

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## Bills need win to stay in AFC East title hunt

The Bills have been hotter than Buffalo wings at Joe Robbie Stadium, and they'll have to stay that way Sunday night if they are to remain in the AFC East title chase with the Miami Dolphins.

A fifth straight victory at Joe Robbie and their 15th win in the last 18 meetings between the teams would move the Bills (6-6) within one game of the first-place Dolphins (8-4). One of the wins at Joe Robbie was 29-10 in the AFC championship game in 1992.

The Bills, seeking a fifth straight Super Bowl appearance and their first victory, are struggling, with two losses in the last three games. They were beaten 35-21 by Detroit Thanksgiving Day.

Miami comes into the game off a comeback 28-24 victory over the New York Jets Sunday when Dan Marino threw four touchdown passes to wide receiver Mark Ingram.

The Bills held Marino in check when they beat the Dolphins 21-11 Oct. 9 at Rich Stadium. Buffalo's Thurman Thomas rushed for 125 yards and two touchdowns in that game.

Other Sunday NFL matchups have the Jets at New England, the New York Giants at Cleveland, Pittsburgh at Cincinnati, Dallas at Philadelphia, Atlanta at San Francisco, Denver at Kansas City, Green Bay at Detroit, New Orleans at the Los Angeles Rams, Arizona at Houston, Indianapolis at Seattle and Washington at Tampa Bay.

The Los Angeles Raiders play at San Diego Monday night.

Thursday night, the Minnesota Vikings beat Chicago 33-27 in overtime to improve to 8-5 and gain a first-place tie with the Bears in the NFC Central.

Jets at Patriots

Each team is 6-6 and tied with

Buffalo for second place in the AFC East. The Jets beat the Patriots 24-17 Oct. 16, but they are going into the rematch off that crushing loss to Miami, while the Patriots are on a three-game winning streak. New England's Drew Bledsoe has passed for an NFL-leading 3,526 yards.

Steelers at Bengals

Although Mike Tomczak was the quarterback for two straight wins while Neil O'Donnell was out with an ankle injury, O'Donnell is supposed to start for the Steelers (9-3). Pittsburgh will be trying to beat the Bengals (2-10) for the eighth straight time. A victory would clinch a third straight playoff spot for the Steelers under coach Bill Cowher.

Broncos at Chiefs

Steve Bono will replace injured Joe Montana at quarterback as the Chiefs (7-5) try to avoid a third loss in four games that would drop them into a second-place tie with the surging Broncos (6-6) in the AFC West.

Saints at Rams

Jim Everett, the Rams' all-time leader in completions (1,847) and yards (23,758), returns to Anaheim Stadium for the first time since the Rams (4-8) traded him to the Saints (4-8) after last season.

Colts at Seahawks

The Seahawks (5-7) will be without running backs Chris Warren and Lamar Smith and defensive tackle Michael Frier, injured Thursday night when a car driven by Warren crashed against a utility pole. Frier suffered a serious neck injury, and is largely paralyzed, a doctor said. He has no use of his legs or hands and only minimal muscle function in his upper arms.

Warren is second in the AFC in yards from scrimmage with 1,402. The leader is Marshall Faulk of the Colts (5-7) with 1,419 yards.

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# New Rangers manager enjoys simple life

COLONIAL HEIGHTS, Va. — Back on the mountain, Johnny Oates entertained his family by predicting who was coming up the road. He did it by sound.

Tires spitting gravel meant a wild young driver; the rumble of a muffler, a poorer relation. Little Johnny rarely missed.

The family offered two explanations for this trick of prophecy: his keen ear, and there weren't more than five cars on the whole mountain.

No one else negotiated roads enshrined in the Blue Ridge mountain forests outside Greenville, shunted to the poor western side of North Carolina, within a shout of the Tennessee, Georgia and South Carolina borders. But it was hardly a crossroads.

There was not much reason to be on the Oates' mountain, unless you lived there. There were no jobs, no stores, no road to something better.

Clint Oates finally decided it was no way to live. So one day he found a job in Fayetteville, N.C., halfway across the state, and moved his family off the mountain for good.

Johnny, 8 at the time, would not forget his first impression of city life.

"I'd never been around people before," he said, a little of the awe still aflame in his eyes 40 years later.

Most of that time has been spent in professional baseball, and he has been around a lot of people, good and bad, rich and poor. A member of at least one of those categories was Baltimore Orioles owner Peter Angelos, who made Oates' life as manager more difficult than it had ever been back on the mountain, where they hauled water by bucket.

Angelos publicly questioned Oates' ability this season before he finally, if not mercifully, fired him. The effect of the protracted scrutiny damaged Oates' burgeoning reputation as one of the best young managers in the game.

Until this season, Oates' rustic upbringing had been considered a solid foundation. Despite an income that reportedly will earn him close to a half-million dollars as manager of the Rangers, he lives in an unpretentious house he bought 17 years ago, not 10 minutes from where he went to high school near Richmond, Va. He drives a mini-van, he says, "not a Mercedes." His best friend in high school is still just that, and his high school sweetheart is his wife.

Oates is, by his description, almost stubbornly consistent. He gave up hunting in high school because Gloria wouldn't sit in a deer stand, and his devotion hasn't changed. He calls her every night on the road, and they talk until his room-service dinner arrives. They feed off each other. By himself, he said, he can't do a crossword puzzle.

"If I'm here, with her," he said, smiling, "I do it in 10, 15 minutes. Knock it right out."

Aside from crossword puzzles, he reads books by the Rev. Charles Stanley or the Bible, from which his Grandma Franks read aloud every

night, and from which he would learn to read.

Growing up on the mountain, he had next to nothing. Now, he could have almost anything he wants, but his values are the same. His family was all he had back then, and it is everything to him now, friends and family say.

They are qualities most would admire. But among the criticisms of Oates this past season — some of which he accepts — is that he withdrew from his coaches and players. He doesn't socialize much by nature, spending time with his family or in what is often a withering mental replay of the mistakes he made. Even his family can't save him from that.

"I like to be by myself," he said, shrugging.

He never got over that solitude he enjoyed as a boy, he said. He hasn't been back to the mountain in more than 30 years, but it probably isn't necessary.

In some ways, he never left it.

Life on the mountain the first four houses Johnny Oates lived in didn't have an address. They were "the Jenkins Place" or "Pete's Place" or "Aun Minnie's" or just the place out on the mountain. Clint Oates never paid more than \$10 a month rent for any place that housed his wife and four children. Little distinguished the houses.

The Jenkins Place didn't have electricity when they moved in. None had plumbing. The refrigerator in one was a box outside with a stream running over it. The last place had linoleum floors, a family first. It also had a second bedroom, meaning they no longer kept a bed in the living room. At the last place, they bought their first sofa.

The closest the school bus could come to Pete's Place was a mile. On nights after high school games, they walked that last mile in woods so black they couldn't see their hands in front of their faces. Jimmy and Shelba Oates, the two oldest, would walk in single file with their little brother, Johnny, between them, Jimmy up front "to scare off the boogers," Shelba said, laughing a little.

Family was everything. Johnny and Eddy, three years younger, were the closest. "One would breathe in, the other'd breathe out," Shelba said.

Shelba and her mother, Madie, shared their mountain memories recently in Madie's trailer. Madie has lived behind her daughter and son-in-law in Holden Beach, N.C., since 1984, when Clint died.

Clint Oates made money in any number of ways on the mountain, from raising cabbage to renting fishing boats. The youngest of 11 children whose parents died when he was a boy, his formal schooling ended with the fourth grade.

Family members say Clint Oates supported his children. A shoulder injury left him unable to lift his arm over his head. But he would play catch with Johnny for hours, throwing the ball underhanded back to his son.

Clint taught himself sheet metal work when he decided he and Madie could no longer support the family on the mountain. His first year at his new job in Fayetteville, he left his children on the mountain, where Madie's mother stayed with them.

Most remember Johnny predicting a career in baseball, though he seemed unsure of it when his father moved the family to Fayetteville in 1954. The summer league was almost over when he took Johnny down to the field, and Johnny didn't want to go.

"I had never seen so many kids," he said. "They had beautiful uniforms, gloves, everything. A man told my father it was too late to get me in the league, and he and my dad got in an argument."

Clint lost.

"I was tickled to death I didn't have to play," Johnny said.

He would soon regret any chance he couldn't play. The next spring, he started his first organized game in center field, until the catcher proved he was not up to the job. After the inning, Johnny's coach asked him if he could catch.

"Noooooo, sir," he said.

From behind him, Johnny heard his father say, "Oh yes he can."

The next inning, Johnny put on the mask. He never played another position.

He grew to like his new position. And life was easier for the Oates in Fayetteville, especially after Sheila and Jimmy left the family's 8-by-42 foot trailer, Sheila bound for marriage and Jimmy the Navy.

And then the Oates started moving again.

After three years in Fayetteville, Clint Oates followed jobs to Myrtle Beach, S.C., for a year, then Buckroe Beach, Va., for a year and Prince George, Va. He was ready to move the family again when Johnny, 14, a sophomore and already captain of the baseball team, asked if they could stay.

The next day, Clint Oates quit his job.

He eventually would find another job, but the significance of the gesture has remained with Johnny.

Though no one questions his commitment, Oates never has allowed the game to come between him and his family: Lori, 23, an elementary school teacher who has moved back in with her parents; Andy, 18, a baseball player at Virginia Tech, his father's alma mater; and Jenny, 15, a high school sophomore.

As for Oates, his Oriole roots run deeper than just the past four years as manager. He was drafted by the organization out of Virginia Tech in the first round of the 1967 secondary draft. He worked his way up through places like Bluefield and Miami and Dallas-Fort Worth and Rochester before he made the big leagues for good in 1972.

After 11 seasons with the Orioles, Braves, Phillies, Dodgers and Yankees, then two years managing in the Yankees' system and four as a coach with the Cubs, Oates returned to the Baltimore organization as a minor league manager.

He was a coach under Frank Robinson with the Orioles before taking over the team in 1991. In four seasons, he was 291-270. He was 237-199 in the past three years, and that was the seventh-best record in the major leagues.

People who had played with him

or managed him weren't surprised he did well.

"I told him one day he'd make a tremendous manager," said Dodgers manager Tom Lasorda, for whom Oates played from 1977 through 1979. "He was kinda quiet, but he got his message across. When he was behind the plate, he was a take-charge guy."

He had those qualities all along. In an American Legion game, Eddy Oates shook off his catcher one too many times. When he got to the mound, Johnny asked his brother, "Are you gonna call the game or am I?"

"I am," Eddy said.

Johnny turned and went back to his position. The next two batters did.

"I don't think I ever shook him off again," Eddy said. Even as a boy, Johnny commanded respect, particularly from his brother.

His players at Baltimore have said the same. But the strain of his relationship with Angelos wore thin this past season. Angelos, a lawyer, bought the Orioles for \$173 million last October, then spent more than \$42 million on free agents. From the outset, he made it clear much would be expected of his investment.

Oates quickly showed the pressure.

In a game at Yankee Stadium on May 22, he was ejected for arguing a call. On the way to the clubhouse, he got down on his knees and prayed.

It was not an unusual position. In 1983, after a chapel service, he prayed in a clubhouse for divine intervention in a life he described as "miserable."

His baseball career, such as it was, was over. He'd never been much of a hell-raiser, so it wasn't as if he needed to change his lifestyle. Wayne Collins, his best friend since high school, said Oates never drank or caroused. No, he'd never been a bad person, friends and family say. In 1983, Oates was just looking for peace.

He called it for again in May, in that Yankee Stadium tunnel. He asked his God to, as he put it, "come and sit in my lap."

"The game had really gotten to me," he said. He struggled to describe his feelings, afraid of how it might sound.

As he sat in his den, his hands folded around a coffee cup, he explained how he came to the point that he got down on his knees in a tunnel and told his God, "Lord, I give up. Help me, please."

He called the weeks before that prayer "a struggle ... a lot of doubt."

I asked myself, 'Is this what you're supposed to be doing?'

As he talked, his head moved side to side, his eyes squinting, as if he were trying to read something above the mantle of his fireplace. "Maybe a weakness ... lack of strength ... withdrawal ... a lack of self-confidence."

"I became so defensive. That was the key to the whole thing. It didn't even have to be negative. It could be a completely innocent remark, and I'd think somebody was trying to bury me."

Someone was, apparently. On May 23, the day after his experience in the tunnel, the Washington Post reported that, had the Orioles not won in extra innings after losing seven of their past eight, Oates might have been fired.

The strain showed, reporters, Oriole officials and family members said of Oates. He snapped at reporters and withdrew from his players and coaches. Upon the advice of Orioles general manager Roland Hemond, he sought the advice of a media consultant, Andrea Kirby. Johnny and Gloria began reading books on diversity.

In June, a Washington Post feature on Angelos included the following description of the new owner's manager: "This guy's a problem. He's obstinate. An insecure man. Not a very good manager. I don't think he's a good leader."

Angelos, finally mum on Oates, did not return telephone calls to The Dallas Morning News. He eventually apologized to Oates, beginning the letter, "Dear Johnnie ..."

Despite all that has been reported of his relationship with Angelos, Oates said people "don't know the half of it." He declined to give the

other half. But he insisted that he learned from it, and that he has been at peace ever since that game in May.

And he wanted to go back.

"I'm tickled to death to be in Texas," he said, "but I was disappointed I didn't get to finish the job in Baltimore. That's because of how stubborn and ornery I am."

Sitting in his den, Oates is a soft-spoken, gracious man with a worn, pleasant face, a man who considers his big-screen TV a luxury and who ends a telephone conversation with "okey dokey."

He is happiest here with Gloria, in a cozy room decorated with framed needlepoint prayers on the walls. Even when he was coaching the Cubs — and he moved the family to Chicago after Sheila made a request to finish high school in one place, the same request he once made of his father — he kept the house in Colonial Heights. The Rangers have requested that he move to the Dallas-Fort Worth area, and he said he is considering it, though he didn't sound convincing.

Either way, he will keep the house, a quaint two-story frame home in a nice neighborhood. People who see it for the first time invariably tell Oates they are surprised it is not grander, more luxurious.

He'll never know poverty again.

But "simple" is something he clings to in a world of angry owners and fat contracts and multi-million dollar expectations.

Simple is all he ever wanted.

"In a sense," he said, looking around him, smiling at the place he has lived longer than any other, "this place has been a security blanket."

## Weather modification project can pay off

Cloud seeding is one method to increase fresh water supply

Weather modification is one of the methods being explored to provide a new source of fresh water.

"It is certain that drought will occur and reoccur in West Texas. This gives us reason to consider again the amount of available fresh water that West Texans can tap, and with climate changes and the threat of

drier weather, we're going to need to explore new, different ways of using water we have as well as developing additional fresh water," said George W. Bomar.

Bomar is senior technical specialist, water planning and assessment division of the Texas Natural Resources Conservation

Commission and has assisted in regulation of weather modification activities in West Texas during the last 20 years.

Weather modification is the attempt to change or control natural development of precipitation cloud forms in the lower half of the earth's atmosphere.

The typical large cumulus clouds that form in the High Plains area have relatively few natural nuclei (such as salt particles, sand particles or specks of dust) around which moisture in the air can coalesce, or grow together, to become raindrops.

The result, said Bomar, is most of the cloud moisture is never converted to raindrops because not enough natural nuclei are present.

"Cloud seeding is designed to increase the number of nuclei. You want to cause five to 10 times as many tiny raindrops or water droplets to form, which will then interact with other droplets, collide and coalesce

to form larger and larger raindrops," said Bomar.

Silver iodide, or AgI, is the most popular cloud seeding agent used today, because it very closely approximates natural ice crystals.

"By introducing silver iodide through cloud seeding, you hope to transform enough of the cloud moisture into water droplets to generate enough large raindrops to survive the fall through the dry subcloud layer and reach the surface as meaningful rainfall."

He added that as the cloud water is transformed into water droplets, the additional heat generated causes the cloud to grow taller. As the cloud system grows taller, its updraft strengthens and imports more moist air from the surface.

"The cloud system then becomes more efficient. It will grow taller, last longer, pull in more moist air, and transform that air into more moisture droplets," he continued.

As the rainfall load increases, it

sinks in the cloud, overcomes the updraft and falls out of the cloud as a rain shield, bringing with it a very cold down draft.

This, in turn, causes additional updrafts, which help create extra cloud growth on the periphery of the system. The resulting feeder cells on each side of the thunderstorm can cause rain to fall over a greater area, may result in a longer life for the storm system, and may cause more rainfall to be produced.

Weather modification projects do no increase rain in one area at another person's expense. Bomar said cloud seeding is inefficient since they do not gather and release all the moisture that is available.

Clouds only contain an average of one percent of the total atmospheric moisture at any time. If cloud seeding doubled the efficiency of a cloud formation, it would likely only contain two percent of the available moisture, leaving 98 percent available for other uses.

The Colorado River Municipal Water District at Big Spring has operated a cloud seeding program since 1971. The project is conducted from April to October in order to augment rainfall runoff into the district's reservoirs and increase water supplies for irrigation purposes.

CRMWD officials report that cloud seeding has increased average annual rainfall by 30 percent to 40 percent (four inches) in its target area. At the time the program was started, Lake E.V. Spence at Robert Lee held 14,000 acre-feet of water and lake J.B. Thomas near Colorado City held 26,000 acre-feet. Now, 23 years later, Lake Spence contains 20,000 acre-feet and Lake Thomas, 30,000 acre-feet.

CRMWD, in conjunction with the Plains Cotton Growers Association, has been studying the effects of weather modification on dryland cotton yields in the target areas. Result show that dryland cotton yields from 1970 to 1988 increased by 46 percent in Borden, Scurry, Howard and Mitchell Counties since the cloud seeding program began.

The five units count toward the 15 units that must be obtained by Dec. 31, 1995.

A \$5 registration fee will be charged, payable on arrival at the viewing location.

Reservations to attend the course in Hereford must be made by noon Monday at the Farm Bureau office, 364-1070.

## Pre-plant moisture survey is underway

A pre-plant moisture survey is underway in the area covered by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

District personnel and representatives of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service are collecting data for the 1995 survey.

Ken Carver, assistant manager of HPUWCD, said the survey is conducted each year to determine general soil moisture availability and deficit trends, prior to planting.

"The pre-plant soil moisture survey results help local agricultural producers determine the amount of water they need to apply to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity without over-irrigating, or under-irrigating," said Carver.

**Bumper crops of vegetables may ease price**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Bumper crops for many vegetables should stabilize or lower prices in supermarkets next year, the Agriculture Department says.

Potatoes, onions, processing tomatoes and processing sweet corn all yielded record crops in 1994.

The USDA expects lower prices for those vegetables and for major canned and frozen vegetables, such as sweet corn, snap beans and green peas.

Production of the four major processing vegetables - tomatoes, sweet corn, snap beans and green peas - is forecast to rise 24 percent over the previous year, increasing to 16.5 million tons in 1994.

Each of those processing vegetables increased in harvested acres and per-acre yield. Production numbers were buoyed by the excellent weather, particularly for sweet corn and tomatoes.

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# History sees NM priest in different light

TAOS, N.M. (AP) — Antonio Jose Martinez, the legendary 19th-century priest vilified by novelist Willa Cather in "Death Comes for the Archivist," is finally finding his proper place in history.

In Cather's 1927 novel, Martinez is portrayed as a womanizing priest who had illegitimate children and presided over "the old order," resisting change to the point of armed rebellion. Archbishop Jean-Baptiste Lamy — called Latour in the book — is cast, contrastingly, as a great reformer.

While it's accepted today that Martinez did have children — descendants still live in his home just off Taos Plaza — modern historians believe Martinez was ahead of his time. He established Taos schools that produced a new generation of New Mexico clergy, which the current Roman Catholic archbishop, Michael Sheehan, acknowledges in praising Martinez.

The padre also owned one of New Mexico's first printing presses. He was a proponent of land reform and American democracy and was the first president of the upper house of New Mexico's first U.S. territorial legislature.

"He was very much an intellectual. He lived through Spain, he lived through Mexico and through the United States," says great-great-grandson Vicente Martinez, who is acting chief curator at the Millicent Rogers Museum in Taos. "The constitutional form of government was something he clearly understood."

"I think Willa Cather was tremendously unfair to him, and I think the church was unfair to him, but I think history has proven him to be truly a great leader and a man way beyond his time."

About Cather, he says, "She had to have a villain."

Vicente's son, the padre's namesake, Antonio Jose Martinez, 18, is proud of the heritage.

"I definitely think he was a hero," says young Martinez, a freshman at Amherst College in Massachusetts. "It's like being related to any great historical figure. Everyone I sign my name I think of him."

Asked what Martinez would stand for today, young Antonio Jose Martinez says: "I have an idea he'd be out there fighting the condo developers."

Archbishop Sheehan says: "I think Father Martinez was a very talented man and made many contributions to the life of New Mexico. His good points should be remembered."

Lamy, the first archbishop of New Mexico, was long believed to have excommunicated Martinez, but current church authorities say the prelate never formalized it.

This year, the Rev. Edmund Savilla, pastor of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church here, held a Mass commemorating the church's first 160 years and honoring Martinez.

Born in 1793 in Abiquiu, N.M., Martinez grew up in his father's Taos hacienda, now a museum. Visitors can see how family life arrayed itself in adobe-walled rooms around a central courtyard. They can also see the padre's vestments.

Padre Martinez had been married as a young man, but his wife died before he sought to join the priesthood. His only child of that union died at 12.

Martinez was ordained in Durango, Mexico, in 1823 and was a strong influence in northern New Mexico for more than 50 years afterward, despite his conflicts with Lamy, who came to Santa Fe in 1850.

Those disputes centered on the archbishop's tithing demands, which threatened in some cases to withhold sacraments from church members who did not pay 10 percent of income, as well as on Martinez's support for the Penitente Brotherhood, a sect that practiced self-scourging.

Martinez also ran afoul of some American political interests by opposing the Maxwell Land Grant, which he saw as a land grab by U.S. newcomers.

The youngest Martinez has never doubted he's a direct descendant of the priest.

The lineage is accepted by the Martinez family, the community and historians. Padre Martinez's will instructs Santiago Valdez to take the Martinez name because, the padre acknowledged cautiously, "he has not recognized any other father and mother but me."

Antonio Martinez is the great-great-grandson of Valdez.

The Rev. Juan Romero of Los Angeles, who this year completed a translation of Padre Martinez's autobiography, says too much has been made of the illegitimate children.

"Nobody claims him as a patron saint," Romero says. "The guy functioned effectively as a parish priest for a long time. He was astute and in no way wanted to be public. ... He did not flaunt, did not fly in the face of conventional public morality."

Romero has been in the vanguard of a modern movement to recognize Martinez's achievements.

"What I would like to see," he says, "is a promotion of a consciousness that Padre Martinez did a lot more not only for Catholics but all people of the Southwest, than his contribution was more long-lasting. He was a great person in terms of a priest, of culture, protector of the poor, a deeply religious man who did a lot in establishing a native clergy."

The 214-year-old Martinez Hacienda, tucked among cottonwoods along the Rio Pueblo, became the Martinez family's home in 1804.

As the family understands it, the hacienda was built by Taos Pueblo Indians starting in 1780, then purchased and enlarged by Severino Martinez, father of Padre Martinez.

"It is the last of the grand old traditional-style plazas haciendas remaining in northern New Mexico — the traditional fortress-style construction where basically there are no external windows, where the entire life of the structure focuses inward toward the courtyard instead of outside. It was built that way for defensive purposes," says R.C. Gordon-McCutchan, director of the Kit Carson Historic Museum, which restored it and opened it to the public.

When attacked by Comanche or Navajo Indians, neighbors rounded up their livestock and hid inside the hacienda.

Closer to town, in fact just around the corner from Taos Plaza, is the house Padre Martinez called home until his death in 1867. Built in 1803, it was purchased by Padre Martinez in 1825. Vicente and Antonio Martinez still live there — and they say the padre himself may still be present.

"We may be standing over his grave," Vicente Martinez said during a tour of the home. "He requested that he be buried under his oratorio, which might mean his study. This could be it."

The padre's gravestone is in Kit Carson Park, a few blocks away, but Vicente Martinez says he's not convinced those remains are the padre's.

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
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

Both Spencer and Valerie have learned the art of survival and together they struggle for their lives and the freedom of their country.

*What I Lived For* by Joyce Carol Oates introduces 42 year old Jerome "Corky" Corcoran. By all appearances Corky is a successful real estate developer and broker. He serves as a city council man and shows a promising future in local politics. A ladies man, dressed in very expensive suits Corky tips generously in an effort to keep his family history in the distant past. Corky came from the shabby

Irish Hill part of town and his history includes a murdered father and a raving mad mother. The only person Corky cares for is Thalia, his rebellious stepdaughter from his failed marriage. Thalia becomes the agent by which Corky's precious illusions shatter as corruption, blackmail and political scandal begin to surface Memorial Day weekend 1992.

In *Justice Denied* by Robert K. Tanerbaum, Butch Karp is the newly appointed Homicide Bureau Chief of the NY District Attorney's office. As the prosecutor with a prosecutor with a perfect record of guilty verdicts, Karp finds himself in a cause that involves international diplomats. 

Ask them to please make other arrangements for Nate. Doesn't he have parents or other siblings? They owe it to you to ensure your peace of mind.



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## MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

### THE 80-20 RULE

I was somewhere in the early part of my sales career that I first heard about the 80-20 sales rule. This rule theorizes that if you are a typical salesperson for an average company 80 percent of your sales will come from 20 percent of your customers.

I don't recall whether I heard about the rule in a sales seminar or read it in a book. I do remember going over my sales records to see if the rule was true for my company and customers. As I recall, my numbers were in the ball park and certainly close enough to validate the 80-20 rule in my mind.

Over the years, I've discovered that the 80-20 sales rule is accurate for many businesses. I've observed it in many different industries and various sizes of businesses I've worked with several clients who were amazed when it proved true for

their firm.

For me, the awareness of this rule changed the way I thought about and reacted to my best customers. I raised the level of care I gave the 20 percent who created the bulk of my business. I worked hard to see that they received our best efforts. Above all else I wanted to ensure that this small but powerful group of customers was satisfied completely. I still think it is good business practice today.

#### Other 80-20 thoughts

Recently one of my clients observed that 80 percent of his problems came from 20 percent of his customers. He complained that this small group of customers was hard to please. "They are whiners," he said. "They demand added service, additional care and constant attention. I often wonder if they're worth the trouble."

Consider your own situation. Could it be that the 80-20 rule also applies to other areas in your business as well? What about profits? If the 80-20 rule is accurate for your sales, is it also true of your profits? Check it out. You may find that the 20 percent of customers who generate most of your sales demand special price concessions and other considerations that actually lower your profits significantly.

Is it possible that 80 percent of the important work accomplished by your company is done by 20 percent of your work force? Wouldn't you like to know which 20 percent and why they are more productive?

Is conceivable that 20 percent of your advertising and promotion produces 80 percent of the results? If so, why is this

promotion so effective and how can we improve the other 80 percent.

Can you trace 80 percent of your costs to only 20 percent of your expense items? Do you have a method of tracking this to see if it is true? What would you do differently if it was?

Are 80 percent of your slow accounts receivable traceable to 20 percent of your credit accounts? How can you improve your collection efforts?

Finally, would 80 percent of our success be attributable to only 20 percent of our effort? How can we reduce or eliminate the non-productive effort?

#### Prove the theory

I don't know if the 80-20 rule applies to other areas of your business operation. I'll leave it to you to prove or disprove the theory.

However, I am certain of this: When you discover new ways to evaluate and analyze your business you often find methods to improve it. The reason we started writing this column nearly five years ago was to help business owners and managers improve their operations. Perhaps you will create some new opportunities if you start thinking about how the 80-20 rules might apply to your business.



## CBS' new Mike Hammer flashier, less violent gumshoe

CBS resurrects an old detective drama and gives it a face-lift in *Come Die With Me: A Mickey Spillane's Mike Hammer Mystery*, a movie debuting Tuesday, Dec. 6.

Rob Estes (*Silk Stalkings*) stars in the title role. He says he enjoyed re-creating the private eye.

"Everybody was just really into creating kind of a different Mike Hammer and let it take us wherever it took us," he says. "I think this one really steps out of the old vein of Mike Hammer."

Estes says he prepared for the part by watching the older series, which ran from 1984 to 1987 with Stacy Keach in the lead role, and reading some of Spillane's novels. He says the new Hammer is most like the role he plays on *Silk Stalkings*.

"There's a lot of him in me actually," Estes says, "the sense of humor and being a little drippy and sometimes not quite all there. I love seeing people on TV who are fallible."

While there are some significant changes in the new Hammer movie, two things do remain: action and beautiful women.

The previous series was criticized for excessive sex and violence. The new Hammer tries a campier, less brutal approach to the action.

Most of the violence in the movie is directed at Hammer. In the opening scene, the investigator is tossed out a third-story window and lands on a fruit juice cart below.

"That was fun," Estes says. "There were a couple of high falls, car crashes. And I think in the new one, we're going to push the action a little more."

While the previous series was set in New York City, the new Hammer is a private eye in Miami. The movie was filmed in San Diego, which, of course, facilitates the addition of bikini-clad women in almost every scene.

The role of Hammer's voluptuous blond assistant, Velda, is played by Pamela Anderson (*Baywatch*), who has been featured numerous times in *Playboy* magazine.

Where past Hammers portrayed Velda as merely a secretary, *Come Die With Me* gives her a more active role in the investigation. Ultimately, though, it appears her most important function is to squeeze into tight, seductive attire and distract two FBI agents staking out Hammer's office.

Those who prefer the alternative to buxom women are occasionally treated to a shirtless Estes. At one point in the movie, after Hammer strips to his boxer shorts to elude pursuers on a beach, he is awarded first prize in a "hardbodies" contest by Dr. Joyce Brothers (appearing as herself).

In another departure from the old series, the role of Pat Chambers, Hammer's friend on the police force, is played by a woman. Darlanne Fluegel (*Hunter*) portrays the macho, gum-chomping Chambers.

In *Come Die With Me*, Trinity Sinclair (Randi Ingberman) hires Hammer to find her father (Greg Gault), who supposedly deserted the family some 14 years earlier. Despite her getting sick all over his car and suit after they go out for drinks, he falls in love with her.

After tracking down the father, Hammer learns Trinity is not the innocent damsel in distress he thought she was.

Even more disturbing, by the end of the movie she bears a striking resemblance to Frasier's ex-wife, Lili.

All in all, *Come Die With Me* is a lighter, more Hollywood-ish version of the private eye drama.





**The Who's Tommy** funny, informative and definitely one for the time capsule

Keith Richards recently marveled that many fans watching his band on its current tour "have never known a world without the Rolling Stones."

And for many, it might be difficult to imagine a world without *Tommy*, the Who's epic rock opera about a boy who retreats from a world of pain and brutality into a silent, sightless place of his own making. First unveiled as a groundbreaking, impossible-to-ignore album that polarized audiences and critics alike, *Tommy* has seen many incarnations in the past 25 years.

The searing, complicated work fueled the band's memorable 1969 Woodstock performance and brought Rod Stewart and a host of other rockers in contact with the London Symphony Orchestra for an all-star presentation a few years later. Then came Ken Russell's dazzling 1975 film version, as audacious as the music itself (and saving for posterity Tina Turner's scalding performance as the Acid Queen.) The '80s saw another eye-
