## Show displays works painted by local man

Christmas came a little early this year for a Hereford man. Giles Boone saw paintings he did 50, or more, years ago, displayed in a gallery for the first time.

For years, Boone automatically moved his paintings along with household items when his work took him to a new assignment. But, he never gave much thought to doing anything with them.

Until earlier this fall, though, he brought his artwork out of storage and contacted the Amarillo Fine Arts Association. An exhibit was arranged for the month of December.

When he started college before World War II, Boone was a painting and interior design major. He soon discovered that he might need another profession to fall back on.

"I switched to a double major with elementary education," he recalled.

During his years at what then was North Texas State Teachers College, Boone indulged his love of painting. He bought oils and, to save money, picked up scraps of wallboard at lumberyards for his paintings.

He compares his paintings with "rap" music, describing them as "different, exaggerated, unexpected, out of proportion and impossible."

Boone denies that he ever subscribed to any particular "school" of art, saying, "I guess I was trying to invent my own. It was more or less doodling with paints."

When World War II intervened in his teaching career, Boone packed away his paintings in his parents' garage.

He was drafted into the Army, and served with the Air Corps in the Aleutian Islands during the war.

"I was a teacher so, in the way of the military, they made me an aircraft mechanic," he laughed.

Although Boone didn't know it at the time, he was introduced to Hereford while traveling on a troop train from the West Coast to St. Louis.

"We pulled onto a siding and everyone got off the train and did

calisthenics," he remembered. "There were people there serving refreshments to us."

At the time, he had no idea what town the train had stopped in. He knew they had traveled through Eastern New Mexico into West Texas.

"I remember thinking I had never been able to see so far," he said.

When he was discharged from service, he knew he had to find a better way to make a living than teaching school.

Boone came across an ad from the American Red Cross for personnel in the veterans' claim service. He was hired and began a career that spanned more than 34 years with ARC.

He worked as an assistant field director in South Carolina and Louisiana before being sent home to Texas.

After a stint as Red Cross representative in Central and West Texas, Boone was transferred to Dallas where he was director of disaster services for the Red Cross.

A major responsibility came in the early 1960s when he was in charge of emergency mass care for 17,000 persons evacuated from the path of Hurricane Carla. He also was a co-author of manuals used by the national Red Cross in teaching disaster training courses.

After the death of his wife, Evelyn, Boone continued working a couple years and then decided to move to Hereford. His only daughter, Susan, had married John Perrin and was living in Deaf Smith County. Two granddaughters, Sarah and Amy, made the move even more attractive.

He said he lived here three years before he drove to the south side of town and recognized the area from his brief stop on the troop train.

He spoke to a railroad employee, asking if he was correct in believing Hereford was the train stop and learned he was right.

Despite his interest in painting as a young man, Boone does not wish to take up art again. He was pleased that his paintings were accepted for

## American Christmas new experience for Moslem foreign exchange student

The United States has been compared to a tossed salad, seasoned with a variety of cultures and religions. Each individual adds to the diverse flavor that has come to symbolize this nation.

From the Pledge of Allegiance to the American dollar, the United States has adopted the values and morals taught under the Christian religion. Yet, the Bill of Rights guarantees the freedom to practice any religion.

For many Hereford residents, the Christmas season highlights God's blessings. But for others, it is a reminder of how different one religion can be from another.

Albert Haliulin, a Moslem by birth, is experiencing an American Christmas for the first time.

Haliulin, a 16-year-old foreign exchange student from Uzbekistan, Bukhara, has known Christians throughout his life. However, it was not until the collapse of the Soviet Union that he saw the religion openly practiced.

"If you practiced religion and they found out, you were put in jail," he said. "People would gather at their homes and did the services themselves so they wouldn't forget.

Everyone knew that someday it would be legal and okay to practice."

As the Soviet Union dissolved into separate states, religious groups claimed those states as their homes.

"We used to have a lot of Christians here, but since the union fell apart, they all went to the Ukraine or Russia," Haliulin said. "When the country divided, it went into religious groups."

"A lot of my friends were Christian, so I've lost a lot of friends."

Unlike the United States, Christians are looked down upon in Haliulin's country.

"Some people don't understand that Christians existed long before the Moslems," he said. "They don't accept Christians and they think they believe different things. If you're Christian, some will ignore you and not respect you as well."

"Really, our Koran is like the Christians' Bible and our prophet Mohammed is like your prophet Jesus. Our values are very similar."

The Islamic religion began in the 600s by the prophet Mohammed. He

was repelled by the idol-worshiping Moslems and after hours of religious contemplation, he was convinced there was only one God and that He had revealed himself in the Bible.

Mohammed said that God called him as his prophet to destroy idolatry and to bring the Arabs to worship one God. He preached the punishment of unbelievers and evil doers.

The Koran, a compilation of Mohammed's teachings given to him by the angel Gabriel, stresses that above all there is only one God, Allah. The Koran also tells of the holy missions of Christ and the Prophets.

The religion looks upon prayer as the ladder to heaven and requires prayer five times a day. In its teachings, the Koran stresses charity, brotherly love and that people should be humble, temperate, brave and just.

"You would think I should know more about the Moslem religion than Christianity, but I don't," Haliulin said. "I've read the Bible and watched the movies so I know about it, I just don't always understand it."

Despite the differences between

Christianity and the Moslem religion, Santa Claus plays a role in both cultures.

"He's got the red coat, beard and presents," he said. "All religions have Santa Claus."

While staying with Tom and Cindy Simons, Haliulin has even put up a Christmas tree.

"We kept trying and trying to get the thing to stand up, so finally I got made and made it stand up straight," he said. "I almost lost hope because no stand would fit the tree, but it stands now."

The Moslems do not have a holiday celebrated with gifts so Christmas day will be a new experience for the student.

"Cindy told me that everyone gets a Christmas present, she said I even get one," Haliulin said.

"I've never seen Christmas like this, all the lights on the houses are great. Most people live in apartments where I'm from so they don't do this. The new system has made people very poor."

## World/Nation

**WASHINGTON**--A \$4.5 million book advance for Speaker-designate Newt Gingrich is giving Democrats new ammunition to challenge his conduct and raising concerns about his selection of members of the new House ethics committee.

**SLEPTSOVSKOYE, Chechnya**--Ever defiant in the face of Russian bombardments that have devastated his capital, Chechnya's leader calls for an Islamic holy war against Russia. Moscow, meanwhile, keeps up its air attacks.

**SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina**--A few problems still need to be ironed out before the Bosnia government and enemy Bosnian Serbs sign a holiday cease-fire that is to go into effect at noon.

**ROME**--With Premier Silvio Berlusconi's resignation in hand and parliament in disarray, Italy's president moves to the center of the political firestorm to decide what lies ahead. President Oscar Luigi Scalfaro is to begin consultations on whether to call new elections.

**NEW YORK**--The running water was cold, scalding, or muddy, depending on the cabin, and everywhere on the QE2 it seemed there was construction debris. The luxury liner sailed from England before a \$45 million renovation was completed, and irate passengers arriving in New York City Thursday said it was a cruise from hell.

**AUSTIN**--The rodeo arena was Brent Thurman's theater -- he lived and died on its sprawling dirt stage. On Thursday, wreaths stood in place of livestock and rodeo clowns as thousands of relatives, friends and fans gathered to say goodbye to the champion bull rider who was critically injured by a bull during the final performance of the National Finals Rodeo.

**FORT WORTH**--Two sessions ago, the Legislature expanded the pool of people eligible for jury duty by going from registered voters to everyone with a driver's license. But judges and court officials in Tarrant County say the new system has been an administrative nightmare.

**AUSTIN**--Lawyers will not be forced to provide some free legal services for poor Texans under a decision by the Texas Supreme Court. In a 5-4 decision Thursday, the court said a lower court didn't have the legal authority to resolve the dispute.

**MEXICO CITY**--Until this week, Mexico was the darling among the emerging markets. But the peso's abrupt loss of a third of its value against the dollar took the luster off the love affair.

## Richards hopes for Texans feel 'kindly' even if she lost their vote

AUSTIN (AP) -- Saying she's done running for office, outgoing Gov. Ann Richards on Thursday voiced hope that Texans would remember her kindly even if they didn't award her a second term.

The Democrat said there probably was no way she could have defeated Republican George W. Bush this year and that she's excited about future plans she won't yet divulge.

"I feel wonderful," Richards said in her first extended interview since the Nov. 8 balloting.

"I may have lost the race, but I don't think I lost the good feelings that people have about me in this state. That's tremendously reassuring to me."

Richards, 61, leaves office Jan. 17. During a 90-minute session with news reporters at the Capitol, she said she won't discuss her plans until she's a private citizen again.

"It is enough to say that I hope to make a living," she said, although she answered "yes" when asked if she was considering lecturing, teaching or writing a book.

"That's the fun part. I'm listening to a lot of things that I've never done

before. It's wonderful."

Richards said she won't be leaving Austin or running for office again.

"I've told you before that I'm not interested in running for another office, and that holds. I've been doing this now for 18 years (since being elected a Travis County commissioner in 1976).

"I'm really excited about what I get to do next -- whatever it is. I've always told my children that life is like a layer cake. You just put one layer on top of the other, and whether you frost it or not is up to you. I'm looking forward now to a little frosting."

After two terms as state treasurer, Richards became Texas' first woman governor in half a century when she defeated millionaire oilman Clayton Williams in 1990.

Promising a "New Texas," she appointed record numbers of women and minorities to state posts, championed smaller and more efficient government and worked to boost the state's image.

She oversaw a doubling of the Texas prison system and a drop in the crime rate, while student achievement test scores rose and the dropout rate plunged.

"I enjoyed the years here tremendously," she said. "But like every other job, there are downsides -- long hours, not much time off."

Richards, a national Democratic Party star, was among many of her party's biggest names swept out in the GOP's November landslide.

"It has a lot to do with the times, and it has a lot to do with history," Richards said.

She noted that no Texas governor has been re-elected since the term was extended from two years to four in 1974. Besides that, she said, "Voters across the country expressed a desire for real change."

However, Richards said, "I really am not one to paw through the past. Right after the election we talked about a number of things we might have done differently, but I still would not have won the race."

A celebrity who appeared on late night talk shows as well as the Democratic National Convention podium, Richards said she feels news coverage of her was fair.

"I always thought we got along pretty well," she told reporters.

## Defense increase will attract GOP help

WASHINGTON (AP)--A key Clinton administration priority--adding \$2 billion to this year's defense budget--is winning crucial Republican support, according to Defense Secretary William Perry.

And the administration, in a concession to Republicans, is showing its most positive view to date on reviving the B-2 "stealth" bomber.

A closed-door meeting at Perry's office Thursday with Sen. Strom Thurmond and Rep. Floyd Spence, both of whom are from South Carolina and will head defense committees under the Republican majority, yielded a general agreement on the emergency funding request, Perry said.

"I specifically made the point to them how important these supplementals are and I believe, based on that discussion, they will support these appropriations," Perry told broadcast reporters in an interview later Thursday.

The \$2 billion request is one of the first key votes on national security to come before the Republican-dominated Congress next year. Perry is hoping for final approval of the funding by April.

Although Republicans have been calling for increased defense spending, the emergency funding request is controversial because deployments to Haiti and Rwanda generated the need for the funds. Republicans have been highly critical of those operations, saying they have little to do with national security.

But Spence said he supports the funding because it will help revive the military readiness of the armed forces. That readiness was eroded when the administration dipped into training accounts to pay for the foreign deployments.

"We have been calling for more funding to satisfy the readiness needs, and this is a step in the right direction," said Spence, the incoming chairman of the House Armed Services Committee. "We are looking forward to more in the future."

A Senate staffer familiar with the meeting said Thurmond "certainly is in favor of the purpose of the supplemental -- to reimburse the military services." But the senator wants to see the specific language of the request to Congress. In particular, Thurmond opposes anything that might imply congressional approval in advance for further U.S. military deployments.

Among Republican lawmakers, the aide said, "You're going to find that there are dichotomous feelings: people want to support getting money back to the services for operations and maintenance and readiness, but they don't want to support the idea that all these adventures are necessarily all right."

Thurmond was traveling Thursday and was not available for comment.

## Car strikes city visitor

A Littlefield woman suffered injuries Thursday night when she was struck by a car on a Hereford street. According to police reports, Edna Bernice Sexton, 52, parked her car facing north in the 200 block of Kingwood at 6:21 p.m.

As she crossed the street to the west, she was struck by a 1992 Oldsmobile 88 driven by Patsy Welty Green, 61, of Hereford.

Reports said Green was driving south on Kingwood when she dropped her purse. She reached for her purse and failed to see the pedestrian, who was not in a crosswalk.

No witnesses were located and no citations were issued.

Sexton was taken by ambulance to Hereford Regional Medical Center, where she was treated, then transported by ambulance to Lubbock's Methodist Hospital.

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# Buffalo Soldiers: Forgotten defenders on Texas frontier

The truth surrounding the settling of the Old West is often lost amidst the glitz and glamour of Hollywood's movies. The stereotypical American cowboy, riding high upon his horse, is portrayed chasing Indians across the West Texas plains with a six-shooter in his hand.

Despite this image, the American cowboy was not always white. Cowboys of the Old West came in many colors, including black and brown. The forgotten saga of Texas' black frontier soldiers is another story not found in many history books. Their accomplishments were extraordinary, but achieved during an era when cultural diversity was not embraced. These brave men were called Buffalo Soldiers. They made up the all-black 9th and 10th Cavalry regiments and the 24th and 25th Infantry of the United States Army after the Civil War.

Dressed in blue uniforms, the Buffalo Soldiers were the dividing line between hostility and peace on the Texas frontier. Thinly spread on the thousand-mile border from Brownsville to El Paso, they protected farmers, ranchers, and settlers from harm. With bravery, they fought Native American warriors, cattle rustlers, murderous gunmen, bootleggers, and Mexican revolutionaries who ventured into Texas. The Buffalo Soldiers escorted stagecoaches, cattle drives, and railroad crews through Indian territory, and built new roads and telegraph lines to maintain communication in the ever-growing community of the Old West.

They were dubbed "Buffalo Soldiers" by the Plains Indians. The men were very proud of this title, though no one is quite certain how it originated. Some believe it was because the soldiers wore thick coats made of buffalo hide during the winter months. Others believe it was in reference to the thick, woolly hair of a buffalo and its similarities to the black soldiers' hair. Either way, it was considered a term of respect because the buffalo was an important animal along the Western frontier. The buffalo symbol was prominently displayed on the company crests of both the 9th and 10th Cavalry.

When the Civil War ended, Congress passed an act that allowed African-Americans to serve in the peacetime army. African-American troops had fought since the days of George Washington, but until the Civil War, their role was limited. When blacks were finally allowed to join the Army, they were stationed in West Texas to

battle Indians. Fort Davis was the main post for the Buffalo Soldiers. Located deep in the Chihuahuan Desert of West Texas, it was a location most enlisted men wanted to avoid. It was built in 1854 to secure reliable water routes that were being attacked by Indians.

Many young African-Americans were still eager to enlist because the army gave them an opportunity to make money in a society that was closed to them. They earned \$13 a month, more than they could earn in nearly any other occupation.

The Buffalo Soldiers endured harsh conditions in the Army. Perhaps the greatest indignity was the pitiful quality of horses they were assigned. Traditionally, U.S. Cavalry mounts are the finest available, but the Buffalo Soldiers only received discarded Civil War cripples, or animals who were old and barely walking. Many times, these horses meant the difference between life and death in battle. Over time, however, the Buffalo Soldiers overcame sub-par treatment and proved to be valuable fighters.

Written records from this time in Texas history are scarce. There are no letters, diaries, or journals because most of the Buffalo Soldiers were illiterate. Therefore, the history of their accomplishments has been buried over time.

Today, much is being done to preserve the memory of the Buffalo Soldiers. Due to the peace that the Buffalo Soldiers maintained, Fort Davis was deactivated in 1891. Today it is a 460-acre national historic site. More than 25 original structures and the foundations of several others have been restored as part of the National Park Service. People can step into another way of life here, a time when the West was still wild and unknown.

At Fort Davis, a visitor center and museum show the challenge of life on the Texas frontier during the late 1800's. Park rangers and volunteers dress like Buffalo Soldiers, Army officers, their wives, and servants during living history programs. The park comes to life with the audio recreation of the fire of guns, the clip-clop of horses, and the call of bugles as the sounds from the Buffalo Soldiers' experience at Fort Davis unfold.

The Memorial Regiment, sponsored by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and the Soldiers in Blue are two organizations that regularly travel the state, speaking and portraying the life of the Buffalo Soldier. The two groups are made up of state park rangers and members of riding clubs, many of whom are descendants of original Buffalo Soldiers. The men put on approximately

30 programs a year in Texas schools and historical parks. The programs are lessons in multiculturalism. Their aim is to teach a generation of children of the important contributions made by African-Americans. They

teach inner-city children the accomplishments of black vaqueros, soldiers, and cowboys in order to show the children that people of different colors have a place in Texas history. Their participation in the re-telling of

history gives minority children a chance to see that their ancestors had a role in the settlement of the West.

"Your church certainly has an innovative pastor," Mrs. Jones, noted a first-time visitor.

"Yes, we sure do," said Mrs. Jones. "Last Christmas he decorated the doors of our church to represent a wrapped holiday gift. His sign read: Please Open Before Christmas."

In the newspaper business, it seems the busiest week of the year is the one prior to Christmas, followed by the dearest week, the one after Christmas.

The week before Christmas was even more hectic in Hereford this year with the big news that the county was picked as the site for the new pork processing plant. We had notes and calls of congratulations from several out-of-town friends and publishers. One said he saw the report in USA Today.

As several community leaders have noted: The news came as a great Christmas gift for the community.

The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs and comes short again and again; who knows the great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who, at best, knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who, at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those timid souls who know neither victory or defeat."

Hereford community leaders have been wanting "a shot in the arm" to get things moving for several years. So, how did they "bring home the bacon" in landing a hog processing plant from Premium Standard Farms?

Here's one man's opinion of how and why things fell into place: First, it took a group with some clout to be competitive in the hunt for industrial development project. It took some financial backing--which Hereford voters provided by approving a half-cent sales tax for economic development. And, it took some luck.

For many years, the chamber of commerce had been the lone organization working on economic development. But the chamber had no funds for the work and the chamber manager had limited time to spend in that area.

Even with a task force of chamber, city and county leaders, the pursuit of a prison and then a cheese plant failed to materialize.

While the new tax for economic development is no guarantee the community will continue to have successes, it provided Hereford with the impetus to get back in the hunt.

Armed with the pledge of sales tax funds--due to start in January--the newly-formed five-man board of the Hereford Economic Development Corporation hit the ground running.

With full support and cooperation of other city and county entities, the HEDC board got a quick start with Mike Hatley, then interim executive director, checking on a tip that a company was looking for a site for a big pork processing facility.

Several contacts and phone calls later, it was determined that Hereford could be a player in the PSF project. Hatley and the board started in August actively pursuing the big processing plant site.

After much more paper work and contacts, Hereford was named one of five potential sites being considered for the plant. Then, according to Hatley, came the important team work that helped make the hunt a success.

"A lot of folks can take a bow in this project," said Hatley. "The HEDC board could sense the support and interest across the community, and it helped them make some necessary decisions."

After being named as a potential site, Hereford got ready for a visit by PSF officials. That occurred about three weeks ago, and the community presented a warm welcome to the community.

"The community we select has to have the right mix and the right attitude," a PSF official told community leaders here. And, the community showed that hospitable, hustlin' Hereford was the place to be!

This column is not about who should get the credit. It's been my observation that when people start worrying about getting the credit on a project, it usually fails.

PSF officials said early in the game that community acceptance was a vital factor. So, you as an interested citizen can pat yourself on the back if you helped talk up the project.

But, if you want to pat someone on the back who was in the arena, then look to Hatley and the HEDC board of Shirley Garrison, Don Graham, Cliff Skiles, Rosendo Gonzalez and Jerry Stevens.

I visited with some of the HEDC directors, and they pointed to Hatley and Skiles as the key players. And, there's no doubt in my mind that Mayor Bob Josseland and County Judge Tom Simons were in the "arena" and made a difference. These two gentlemen reflected the "class" and strong leadership that a company looks for in a community.

We've still got miles to go and promises to keep. But, doesn't it feel good to win?

Then Thursday, Matthew Jacob Wilhelm, press supervisor Sherry Davis' new grandson, made a surprise entrance. He zipped into the world at 1:35 p.m. at 7 pounds 7 ounces and 20-1/4 inches long.

But of the babies that were born this week, one stands head and shoulders above the rest (no offense to relatives of the above kids).

That is Daniel Henry Gonzalez, born last Tuesday in Monterrey, Mexico.

Daniel shocked his mother, daddy and grandparents by dropping in well ahead of schedule (he was due Christmas but not expected till after New Year's) on the same day mamma came down with the flu.

The importance of Daniel Henry in my life is that he is my second great-nephew and the first child born to Tammie and Henry Gonzalez, who is my wife's niece.

Now how does all this tie in with

Christmas?

Very simply, that the birth of a child is probably the greatest gift God can give us, outside of the gift of salvation He gave us through the birth of His own Son, Jesus Christ.

The day I married my wife was one of the greatest days in my life and one I relive in my mind quite often.

But I don't know how it compares to two late mornings I spent in an operating room at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, watching as doctors operated on my wife to deliver my daughters.

The thrill of watching a child come into this world and knowing that this precious baby -- albeit a little hacked off at having been yanked into a cold world and slapped on the butt by a man in white -- is totally dependent on me is indescribable.

The Bible tells us little about the actual birth of Jesus.

I know we read about the call for the census by Caesar Augustus that pulled Mary and Joseph from their home in Nazareth to make the trip to Bethlehem.

We read about "no room in the inn" and them having to take shelter in a stable.

But about the actual birth we know nothing, except that "she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger."

I remember the anxiety I felt as doctors wheeled my wife into the operating room each time to prepare her for surgery.

I remember how I waited nervously for them to let me come in and join her to watch the actual births.

But I cannot imagine what poor Joseph went through that night in the stable, as he worked to help Mary deliver their child, wondering at the events that took them from family, friends and midwives to a strange town and a dirty old stable.

And at the same time, I can't imagine how God Himself felt, watching the events He foretold in prophecy and knew through omniscience would happen.

I'm sure Mary and Joseph both remembered what they had been told and found it hard to believe that one day this small, helpless baby lying in the bed of straw would, as the Scriptures foretold "save his people from their sins."

That image is still hard for me to see, even these centuries later as I read in the Bible about the birth of Christ and later about His crucifixion.

Here was a little baby, lying in a bed of straw, completely helpless and dependent on his parents for all his basic needs, yet this same child was God in the flesh and the one who would pave the way to heaven for us.

As I slip into my girls' bedroom at night and tuck their covers around them and kiss them on the cheeks, I marvel at the love God had that led

Him to send His own Son to be born on this earth, knowing He would die for the sins of mankind.

I cannot imagine what I would do if anything happened to my children. My mind cannot comprehend the love it would take to offer your own child up to pay the penalty for someone else's wrongdoing.

Yet God did and, because of that gift of love so long ago, we celebrate Christmas today.

It's great to give gifts and receive them and rip the paper open and pull out something you never expected.

It's great to watch your children's eyes light up as they open their gifts and see exactly what they wanted in the first place.

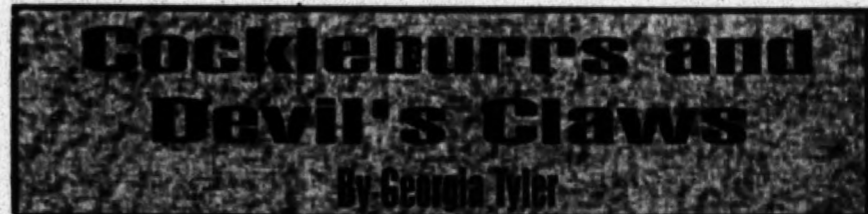
I'm glad I get to share that joy within my family and I'm grateful to God for giving me not only this family, but the gift of salvation that is why we celebrate this day.

Whatever emotions Christmas evokes, the most important sensation may be the smell that comes from a kitchen in full swing for the feast of the year.

Hardly a soul is brave enough to say his, or her, mother wasn't the best cook in the world. We all think Mom could do no wrong in the kitchen.

But sometimes, it wasn't her fault if things went awry.

An elderly aunt on my mother's side was a regular guest at Christmas. Her family was far away and she wouldn't travel. There were times when we would gladly have bought her a bus ticket.

Certain culinary disciplines were inviolable in my mother's kitchen. For one, turkey giblets were stewed for hours and the broth divided between the dressing and gravy.

One Christmas, I heard my mother tell my great-aunt more than once, "I'm going to use part of it for gravy and part for the dressing." Then, she made the mistake of turning her back.

Quick as a wink, my aunt had the pot by the handle and poured all the broth into the dressing.

To my mother's credit, she didn't kill Aunt Tomma. She didn't even sit down and cry or scream. But we did have pretty sloppy dressing that year which was just as well because there was very little gravy to put on it.

Only in Texas, I'm convinced, do people drink iced tea all year long. I think the tradition began with my family. Even with snow up to our eyeballs, we still have iced tea to drink.

This same aunt was given the job one year of making the tea. What she did, probably, was slosh one teabag quickly through a gallon of water. The water was hardly colored and she insisted it was just right.

Since I don't drink iced tea, I never knew how it tasted but others claimed that a glass of plain ice water would have been just as good.

Ever after, any weak and near-colorless liquid was labeled "Tomma tea."

Even though my family raised cattle and ate beef most of the time (fried chicken on Sunday was barely acceptable), we went to poultry for Christmas.

My grandfather used to bring home

the live birds for my mother and grandmother to dress. They heaved an enormous sigh of relief when live turkeys were not as available and they could buy the frozen variety.

One year, though, my mother decided we would have a special treat for Christmas -- roast goose. She must have been reading Dickens or some other English author at the time.

She located a nice plump bird at a market and took it home for the big day. Now, not many times in my life did I see the whole family refuse to eat something prepared by my mother, but that occasion is the exception that proves the rule.

That old goose must have had a layer of fat about two inches thick and as it cooked, the grease seeped into the meat and ran out in the pan. When the bird was done there appeared to be more grease than edible meat.

Excitement was high, though, as my mother sliced into that goose. Grease spurted out. At first, she couldn't find the meat and when she did, a taste caused her nose to turn skyward, from the taste and the smell.

Everyone gave it a try, but no one, that I remember, was able to eat more than a bite or two of goose.

Ever prepared for an emergency, there was another meat course for the day -- ham, maybe -- and the goose disaster was never mentioned again.

My sister and I had the best of both worlds at Christmastime when we were small. We spent Christmas Eve with one set of grandparents and Christmas Day with the others.

My father's family was large and when the brothers and sisters gathered, there were plenty of cousins to argue with. Boys outnumbered girls which gave them plenty of leverage over games we played.

Since there were so many of us, the rule was that the children sat at first table, with the grandparents. We all thought we were special, but I think, if the truth were known, the grown-ups just wanted a few more minutes with the egg nog.

After the deaths of those grandparents, there were no more gatherings with our cousins. And, the sad part of Christmas for me is I don't even know where some of them live, now.

# Clinton, out to reclaim issues, is cutting costs of government

WASHINGTON (AP) - "Reinventing government" is the slogan, but the task ahead for the White House is even more demanding - reinventing Bill Clinton if he's to renew the Democratic lease there in 1996.

To add to the challenge, unless it can be accomplished without being too obvious, the changes he is undertaking will be marked down as plain politics, shifts to the right to try to catch up with the voters.

That would only deepen his political woes heading into the era of Republican command in Congress, because trust and a sense of drift already are among his major problems.

So he's got a tightrope to walk, and Republicans already say he's slipped off it on their side, in a tardy effort to reclaim standing as a New Democrat, a centrist.

No, counter the Clinton people, he's doing what he promised the voters in the first place. The trouble is, that isn't what he did in the first place. He got detoured into social issues, appointments that backfired and the health care reform marathon, which Clinton's opponents transformed into a symbol of the big government the voters don't want.

"The president wants to reform the way this government does business," Leon Panetta, the White House chief of staff, said amid the effort to chart a course for 1995 and 1996, when Clinton intends to run for

a second term. "That's what he was elected to do.

"He recognizes that people were not satisfied with the level of reforms that were going on in this town," Panetta said in a TV interview.

Reinventing government to cut the payroll, save tax dollars and return decisions from Washington to state and local governments are proposals the Democratic ticket ran on in 1992, said Vice President Al Gore.

True enough, but politics takes timing, and the push that's on now looks more like a response to the Republican congressional landslide than action to meet a set of campaign pledges. They'd started the effort at reinvention in 1993, but not with the high profile it's getting now, on the eve of a GOP-run Congress.

As candidate, Clinton had promised a middle class tax cut. As president, he said the budget crunch was worse than he'd foreseen, and backed away from that pledge.

It's back, a relatively modest \$60 billion over five years. "A middle class bill of rights," Clinton said. But that also looks like a rebuttal instead of an initiative.

So, too, on other issues; for example, Clinton's 1992 pledge to "end welfare as we know it" with reforms that would limit the duration of benefits, put recipients to work or into job training. He proposed a bill, but didn't push the issue. Now Republicans have seized it, with proposals that would make welfare a federally aided state responsibility.

Clinton, out to reclaim the

initiative, said that he is streamlining and paring government to save \$76 billion in the next five years and that Gore's reinvention team will not look at every single government program seeking spots for further cuts.

"Country first, politics as usual dead last," the president said.

One Cabinet member told Clinton after the elections that if he'd given welfare reform the priority health care got, the Democrats wouldn't be in this fix.

Republicans are on the offensive, even before taking over Congress on Jan. 4. Their leaders, for example, told Clinton he should stop federal agencies from issuing regulations, effective immediately and lasting at least through the first 100 days of the new Congress, which is the time frame House GOP leaders have set for action on their ambitious keynote agenda.

Clinton said no, the White House calling the moratorium idea a blunderbuss approach that could bar vital government actions. George Bush tried a moratorium; all it did was delay rule-making that flooded out afterwards.

This time, Republicans were making a point, not a policy, telling Clinton that Americans voted for smaller, less intrusive government and that he should respond by taking their course. Instead, he told agencies to regulate only when necessary and in the most cost-effective way, which sounds like common sense by memo.

They've got 23 months for the remodeling before the voters choose a president.



# Old movie theatre to have more uses

ALBANY, Texas - The curtain is rising on a new Aztec Theatre.

The motion picture theater, which has been closed for years, has new life as a performing arts theater. And in its new role, the theater will be used for a wide variety of activities, said Clifton Caldwell, who headed up the renovation project.

"Every time I see people I know, I tell them what we've done with the theater, and they say, 'Oh yes, we'd like to do our show or have our meeting there,'" Caldwell said.

"We're going to have a little bit of everything at the Aztec," he said. "In small towns we try to make our own entertainment."

Support for the project has been tremendous, Caldwell said. People are excited about the work, he explained, and have responded financially.

"The Aztec never looked as great as it does now," said Ann Harwood of Fort Worth, who grew up in Albany and has fond memories of the theater.

"I remember the boys I used to sit next to," she said. "And how the mothers used to stand in the back (to check on movie-goers.)"

Harwood, who volunteered to help on the renovation project, used southwestern colors to complement the theater's California mission motif. The terra-cotta, burgundy and dark green trim brings out the colors in paintings behind window-like frames along each wall.

Architect for the project was Amy Wingrove of Bill Booziotis & Co. Architects of Dallas. Wingrove "has a touch for combining the new with the old," Caldwell said.

The biggest change to the theater was the addition of a meeting room and kitchen. Also, dressing and storage rooms were built, the lobby was enlarged and the stage was extended so that plays can be performed.

Cost has been about \$500,000, Caldwell said.

Fund raising started in 1991, and work began in 1992. Seats were

installed this week, and landscaping will be done later.

Caldwell said an open house will be held soon to show off the theater.

Already, though, the theater is in use. The Albany Nativity is Friday and Saturday. Last weekend, the Daughters of the American Revolution met there, and next year a three-day symposium on Camp Cooper is scheduled. Concerts, plays, dance recitals and perhaps even Shakespeare are likely to be performed on the Aztec stage. Plus, the theater is getting projection equipment so films can be shown.

"We'll have something for everybody at the theater some time during the year," Caldwell said.

The Aztec has been providing

entertainment since 1927. For years, it was the only movie theater in town. Like other small-town theaters, eventually the Aztec closed, probably sometime in the 1960s, Caldwell said. For most of the last 20 years, the theater sat idle.

Two nieces of legendary Shackelford County rancher Watt Matthews owned the theater, Caldwell said. They donated it to the Aztec of Albany Foundation, which was set up as a nonprofit organization to operate the theater.

Caldwell said Albany residents can be proud of the renovated theater. "This is typical of what the people of Albany can do," he said.

## Owners impose salary cap after talks end

WASHINGTON (AP) - By imposing a salary cap, baseball's owners may be paving the way for legal battles with the players association and possible congressional intervention.

Talks between the players and owners broke down Thursday night, and the owners imposed the salary cap - leaving details for union head Donald Fehr to pick up at the front desk of his hotel.

Barring an unforeseen and unexpected settlement, baseball

players will be seen over the next few months in courtrooms, not on sun-drenched fields. The camera crews that converge on Florida and Arizona each March likely will view replacement players along with any major leaguers who break ranks.

"This is a very frustrating and disappointing moment," said Boston Red Sox chief executive officer John Harrington, head of the owners' negotiating committee.

"This certainly is a sad day," Fehr said. "It's regrettable, but I am reasonably certain the owners will come to regret it - sooner than they think."

Colorado Rockies owner Jerry McMorris put up a brave front, saying that installing a salary cap "is just another step in what continues to be the collective bargaining process."

However, Fehr's plans are not for additional negotiations, but instead to file an unfair labor practice charge with the National Labor Relations Board. The move could come as early as today - the 19th anniversary of free agency - or perhaps Tuesday. The union will ask the NLRB to seek a preliminary injunction against the cap in federal court.

"If this is the road they want to take, if this is where they wanted to go, this is going to be an ugly situation," Detroit's Cecil Fielder said.

Fehr said owners notified the union of the exact terms being implemented by leaving an envelope for him at the hotel where the talks were being held. He got it following the closing news conferences.

"When I got to my room, the message light was on," he said early today. "They told me I had a package at the front desk."

Fehr called the imposition "preordained." Players struck Aug. 12 rather than accept a salary cap, wiping out the final 52 days and 669 games of the season. On Sept. 14, owners canceled the World Series for the first time since 1904.

The cap eliminates salary arbitration and immediately creates

a new group of 63 restricted free agents, including Jack McDowell, Jim Abbott and Marquis Grissom. It also forces 21 teams to cut a total of \$56.2 million from their 1994 payrolls, and rolls back many of the union's gains in collective bargaining during the past 23 years.

The next effort to restart the baseball talks could fall to former President Jimmy Carter, who expressed his willingness to get involved if needed. Fehr also raised the possibility of a long court fight, saying, "It may not even be halftime yet."

"They measure every proposal up against a salary cap and unless it measures as high as a salary cap, they don't want it," Fehr said.

The decision to impose the cap came after the owners rejected a new offer from the players that would have imposed a 25 percent payroll tax on teams that spent more than 160 percent of \$60 million on salaries.

Dave Montgomery, the co-general partner of the Philadelphia Phillies, said that figure is \$8 million more than any team paid in salaries in 1994 - meaning no teams would pay a tax in 1995. A separate, 10 percent tax would generate just \$600,000, he said.

And while the owners face a certain legal battle from the players, they may also have trouble on Capitol Hill.

As the talks wound down to their contentious end, influential lawmakers said they're interested in considering whether to repeal the sport's antitrust exemption.

Utah Republican Orrin Hatch, who will chair the Senate Judiciary Committee, said he would be concerned if the owners "hide behind the antitrust

exemption while imposing their own conditions on the players."

"I'd prefer not to have the Congress enter into it, but the antitrust exemption is an anomaly," Hatch said. "Some people think that if we just leave things alone, the owners will break the players union."

Incoming House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., told three players who live in his district that he was interested in reviewing the antitrust issue - even if a settlement was reached.

## Is Carter overqualified to be strike mediator?

When it was first proposed, sending Jimmy Carter to mediate the baseball strike sounded like sending George Foreman to school to deal with the bully that was bothering your kid.

Let's talk overqualified. Even before the former president ventured into Bosnia, he sweated out a hostage crisis in Iran, squeezed out a peace treaty between centuries-old enemies in Israel and Egypt, and smoothed out negotiations between the United States and belligerent dictators in North Korea and Haiti.

Some people would argue that even those experiences have not prepared Carter for the hostility he'll face if he finds himself wedged between the players and owners. But the more you think about it, the more this could turn out to be a win-win situation.

Having dealt with despots and troublemakers the world over, and having played for much higher stakes, Carter might just bring enough patience and prestige to crack baseball's hardheads wide open. And as a practical matter, he could save them a lot of cash and not a little pain in the bargain.

And Carter's reward? That's a little tougher. Considering his past peacemaking accomplishments, making peace between the players and owners is not likely to nab the Nobel Prize that has eluded him in the past. Then again, if the voters take into account how quarrelsome, greedy, spiteful and downright contemptible this set of players and owners is, you never know ...

In any case, the first hurdle Carter faces is getting himself assigned to the case. Several hours before the owners declared an

impasse and imposed their salary cap, he called both union leader Don Fehr and acting commissioner Bud Selig to offer his services.

Both men remained noncommittal early today. But as in most matters related to the strike, the players' side sounded more receptive than the owners' to exploring another new avenue.

"He is very gracious," Fehr said from the site of the broken-down talks in Washington.

"I think it is a compliment to him and something we're very appreciative of. Obviously we'll evaluate it and try to come to some conclusions."

Reached at his home in Milwaukee, Selig said, "I had a very constructive and very pleasant chat with President Carter." But, he added at the time, "We are in mediation right now."

Technically, that's no longer true.

Bill Usery, dispatched to the talks by President Clinton, was considered one of the best in the business. Carter acknowledged as much in a statement: "We realize that there is a superb mediator providing his services, and we have full confidence that maximum efforts are already being made."

But the statement went on to say the former president "would be willing to assist only if the present attempt to reach an agreement between the players and owners is likely to be abandoned."

We've arrived at that juncture. The preliminaries are over and the only people with the meters still running are the lawyers. Having abandoned negotiations, litigation and legislation are the only routes left open. Both will prove considerably more costly.

## Fisher ready for an Oilers victory

HOUSTON (AP) - Jeff Fisher has decided the Houston Oilers have had enough practice at overcoming losses. Now, he'd like to see their reaction - and his own - to a victory.

"I'm looking forward to directing the team to a win," Fisher said. "If we win, you might hear something very creative."

The Oilers (1-14) will get their last chance to break an 11-game losing

streak on Saturday against the New York Jets (6-9), who bring their own misery, a four-game losing streak, into the Astrodome.

Fisher is 0-5 since taking over as coach Nov. 13, when Jack Pardee and assistant head coach Kevin Gilbride were fired.

Fisher has remained conservative, hoping to avoid turnovers and control the clock.

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# Webber's return to Golden State a painful journey

Chris Webber made a painful return to Golden State.

Webber, playing his first game against his old team since his Nov. 17 trade to Washington, dislocated his left shoulder in Thursday night's 107-87 loss to the Warriors.

Last season's top rookie is expected to be sidelined six to eight weeks.

"I was definitely scared, but I'm blessed and I'm young and there's no reason for me to get down," Webber said.

Webber had 14 points and seven rebounds before he was injured with 9:25 left in the third quarter and Washington trailing 56-54.

While chasing a loose ball, Webber seemed to take an awkward step and crashed to the floor. As he lay in pain, some fans jeered him.

"They were just getting their feelings out," Webber said. "But some son is watching his father cheer someone getting hurt. What kind of a role model is that?"

Webber, who feuded with coach Don Nelson at Golden State, was sent to Washington for Tom Gugliotta and three first-round draft picks.

Gugliotta had 18 points and 13 rebounds as the Warriors snapped a 10-game losing streak and handed the Bullets their eighth consecutive loss.

"I think any player who gets traded away wants to play well

against the team they get traded from," Gugliotta said.

Webber had to be helped off the floor and into the locker room for treatment, but returned to the Washington bench in street clothes to watch the last few minutes of the game.

"I did it to show the team I'm with them," Webber said. "If things were going to be said, I wanted to be right there in the fire."

Nelson, recovering from viral pneumonia, wasn't at the game. His son, assistant Donnie Nelson, is coaching the team in his absence.

Elsewhere, it was Cleveland 93, New York 90; Charlotte 103, Philadelphia 91; Utah 103, Atlanta

94; Houston 114, Phoenix 106; Seattle 103, Dallas 101; and Sacramento 109, Minnesota 89.

**Rockets 114, Suns 106**

At Houston, Kenny Smith scored 25 points and Vernon Maxwell led a third-quarter burst by the Rockets in their first game against Phoenix since last year's playoffs.

The Rockets, who won the seven-game series in the Western Conference semifinals, hit 13 of their first 16 shots in the third period and went on to snap the Suns' seven-game winning streak.

Maxwell, who missed six of seven shots in the first half, was 4-for-7 in the third quarter. Hakeem Olajuwon had 24 points and 14 rebounds for the Rockets, while Danny Manning led the Suns with 23 points.

Cavalliers 93, Knicks 90  
At New York, John Williams hit a running bank shot in the lane with 20 seconds left as Cleveland won its seventh straight and the Knicks lost their fourth in a row.

Cavaliers guard Mark Price,

returning after missing three games with bruised ribs, hit five 3-pointers and finished with 19 points. Charles Oakley, who missed the previous four games with a painful toe, led New York with 19 points and 13 rebounds.

**Hornets 103, 76ers 91**  
At Charlotte, Alonzo Mourning scored 26 points as the Hornets continued their domination of Philadelphia.

It was Charlotte's 13th win over Philadelphia in their last 16 meetings. The Hornets have won five of their last six games, while Philadelphia has lost eight of nine.

Clarence Weatherspoon led Philadelphia with 25 points.  
**Jazz 103, Hawks 94**  
John Stockton had a season-high 17 assists as Utah won its seventh consecutive game and extended its franchise-record road winning streak to 10.

Jeff Hornacek scored 24 points for the Jazz, who improved to 10-1 against Eastern Conference teams and completed a sweep of a six-game road

trip. Atlanta coach Lenny Wilkens still needs two victories to tie Red Auerbach's NBA career mark of 938.

**SuperSonics 103, Mavericks 101**  
At Tacoma, Gary Payton scored 28 points and keyed a game-ending 9-0 run that helped Seattle win its fourth straight game.

Payton's steal and layup tied the game at 101 with 24 seconds left. Then Kendall Gill stole the ball from Jimmy Jackson and passed to Payton for the go-ahead basket with 7.7 seconds left. Jamal Mashburn led Dallas with 24 points.

**Kings 109, Timberwolves 89**  
At Sacramento, Olden Polynice and Walt Williams each scored 17 points in the Kings' most lopsided win of the season.

Lionel Simmons added 16 points for the Kings, who built a 28-point cushion midway through the third quarter and held an 84-61 lead entering the fourth period. Isaiah Rider scored 27 points for Minnesota, which never led and committed a season-high 25 turnovers.

## Moten beats Geary in meeting of offensive vs. defensive stars

The game was No. 6 Arizona at No. 14 Syracuse. The game within the game was defensive stopper Reggie Geary against offensive star Lawrence Moten.

Syracuse and Moten prevailed Thursday night when the Orangemen beat the Wildcats 94-84 as the senior guard had a season-high 25 points.

"It's an indication of how we can play when Lawrence is firing on all cylinders and moving the way he is capable," Syracuse coach Jim Boheim said. "I don't care who guards him. If he is moving the way he's capable of moving, he is going to score points. We did a good job of looking for him early. He got us off to a good start."

Geary, a junior, knew that all too well.

"He got his confidence going in his first couple shots and then they were looking for him the rest of the night," Geary said. "I don't think we anticipated how intense they were going to be."

The victory was the seventh in a row for Syracuse after a season-opening loss to George Washington. Arizona (7-2) lost for the first time since dropping a 72-70 decision to Minnesota to open the season.

"Syracuse showed how good of a team it can be if it plays hard and together," Arizona coach Lute Olson

said. "They are the best team we've played this year."

In other games involving ranked teams on Thursday it was No. 1 North Carolina 88, Hawaii 76; No. 2 UCLA 137, George Mason 100; No. 7 Kansas 71, Rice 57; No. 15 Arizona State 72, Oklahoma State 69; Stanford 64, No. 22 Virginia 60; Missouri 76, No. 23 Illinois 58; and No. 25 Iowa State 114, North Florida 80.

It wasn't all Moten for Syracuse. John Wallace finished with 19 points and 12 rebounds, Lucious Jackson scored 18 points and Michael Lloyd 15 for the Orangemen.

"If we can beat a team like Arizona... we are going to be around at the end," Lloyd said. "It got everybody's confidence up."

Damon Stoudamire led Arizona with 22 points and Geary had 19.

**No. 1 North Carolina 88, Hawaii 76**

Jerry Stackhouse had 21 points and 13 rebounds as the visiting Tar Heels (7-0) had trouble with the Rainbows (4-1), who trailed just 71-67 with 6:30 to play. Stackhouse scored seven of North Carolina's next nine points. All the North Carolina starters finished in double figures, including Rasheed Wallace, who had 15 points despite being saddled by four trouble throughout the game. Tes Whitlock led the Rainbows with 20 points.

**No. 2 UCLA 137, George Mason 100**

Tyus Edney had a career-high 28 points, a Pac-10 record 11 steals and nine assists as the Bruins' (5-0) spoiled the West Coast return of former Lakers coach Paul Westhead. UCLA led by 20 in the first half and broke the 100-point mark with 10:35 to play. The Patriots (4-2), who came in averaging 117.4 points, were led by G.C. Marcaccini's 19 points.

**No. 7 Kansas 71, Rice 57**

The Jayhawks (7-1) wore down the Owls (3-3), finally pulling away in the final 10 minutes. Freshman Raef LaFrentz had 18 points and nine rebounds for Kansas, which wasn't sharp, committing 15 turnovers and shooting 3-for-20 from 3-point range. Thomas McGhee had 15 points to lead the visiting Owls, who shot just 32 percent from the field.

**No. 15 Arizona St. 72, Oklahoma St. 69**

Mario Bennett of the Sun Devils (7-2) had 22 points and 14 rebounds as the matchup of centers came out about even. Bryant Reeves had 24 points and 13 rebounds as visiting Oklahoma State (8-3) had a seven-game winning streak snapped. Bryant blocked a layup by Bennett with 42 seconds left and started a fast break that brought the Cowboys to 71-69.

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# High school linemen bulk up for college

FORT WORTH, Texas - Shane Willems can fool most folks, for he is indeed a big guy in the average world, standing 6-foot-5 and weighing all of 270 pounds.

But he can't fool himself. While in Austin to watch the University of Texas-Colorado football game last Oct. 1, Willems came to terms with this sobering fact: He's not as big as he thought he was.

"I looked at all those guys and figured I'd better get on the ball as far as gaining weight," concerned for college football, said Willems, a Sam Houston offensive lineman considering Texas, Vanderbilt, Iowa and Colorado. "I knew I needed to work on my strength so that I wouldn't get through around too much."

Willems, like other select area linemen, doesn't need to add too much bulk. They are already bigger than their counterparts of 10 years ago.

In 1984, freshman offensive linemen at Texas A&M and at Texas averaged 255 pounds. In this, the year of the lineman in Fort Worth-Dallas, the area's top recruits average 270 pounds. Seventeen of the players on

the Star-Telegrams' Area Top 50 recruiting list are linemen. Thirty-six of the Top 100 on the state list are linemen.

Said Arkansas line coach Charley North: "Nutrition and a much better developed off-season workout program are two factors for kids coming out as big as they are. The strength programs are far exceeding what we used to have in the past. These kids really get after it."

And the colleges know it. That's why Willems and hundreds of other statewide athletes will gladly play their roles in the recruiting game, where starchy-eyed 17- and 18-year-olds take visits across the country shopping for their college of choice; where pushy athletic officials and concerned parents tussle over the importance of education and athletics; and, more importantly, where futures are born.

For area linemen, Feb. 8 (national letter-of-intent day) will mark the end of one strenuous and the beginning of another. Once they are chosen for their potential to play big-time college football, they must gain the added size and strength to realize that potential.

"I've always been bigger than everyone else," said Martin's Ryan Newberry, a 6-3, 260-pounder

thinking of attending Texas Tech, TCU or Oklahoma State. "But there's no doubt that I need to get more strength, and whomever I sign with will probably want me to be bigger."

**What the colleges want**  
Good offensive linemen are particularly hard to find, said Texas A&M coach R.C. Slocum.

Slocum places a priority on finding linemen with the potential to grow, move well on their feet, who have long arms for pass blocking and speed to pick up blitzing linebackers.

"When you see a receiver and know he can catch the football, then your selection process is a little easier," he said. "Offensive line is the most difficult position because you have to project what a player can become. He may weigh 235 pounds, but you have to determine if he can become 265 or 270 pounds and play at that weight."

But, many recruiters say, size is not everything.

"More and more of us are looking for the quicker athlete," said TCU linebackers coach Charlie Rizzo, who recruits Houston high schools. "The days of the big slug who can barely roll off the ball - those days are over. The bottom line is you never want to sacrifice size and strength."

But I don't care if you can bench press a Volkswagen, if you can't get there, you can't hit 'em."

Programs generally recruit offensive linemen who are suited for their style of offense, and those who aren't ready for the program could be redshirted. Linemen such as Grapevine's Jim Plunk (6-5, 275), Haltom's Kelvin Garmon (6-3, 290) and Richland's Paul Harmon (6-7, 290) are aware of that possibility.

"I'd like to be redshirted, because then I would be able to develop in that school's weight-training program," said Plunk, being recruited by TCU, Arkansas, Oklahoma State, Tennessee and Texas A&M. "I can lose some of the weight I have and then build back up into muscle, so I can have better foot speed and agility."

Size, however, still remains attractive to recruiters.

New NCAA rules allowing linemen to use their hands more make the position even more valuable.

"They want guys with long arms," Rizzo said, "because you can keep defenders off of you. Like boxing, the longer your reach, the better. A kid 6-1 can only get so big before diminishing returns on size."

Sometimes, if the player has all the speed and size in the world, it's still not enough. Major colleges are becoming as demanding of intelligence,

as new NCAA rules for participation require higher test scores and grades from incoming freshmen.

"Offenses are getting so complex, you've got to have some capacity to learn," Rizzo said. "That's one thing pros ask. Is he smart? What kind of work habits? There's no place to hide on the field academically."

**What players are doing**  
To make themselves more attractive to major colleges, high school players have done their homework on how to get bigger, faster and stronger.

They know just pumping weights won't cut it anymore. And the use of steroids, which some coaches say have been used by high school athletes in the past, is a taboo. It has more to do with the foods they eat and the exercises they do.

During the summer, Plunk went to a health-food store and loaded up on nutritious foods that would help him add muscle without adding fat.

Balanced with their exercise, recruits try to stay dedicated to their diets, which consist of such carbohydrates as rice, potatoes and red meat.

Willems says he tries to help himself every day to two or three plates of pasta with clam sauce and a salad.

"I've been accused of steroids, but anyone who knows me knows I don't do that stuff," Willems said. "I've tried some weight-gaining powders, and it didn't work. I make sure I get three meals a day and eat when I can. I've gained 10 pounds since the playoffs. I've eaten everything I can get my hands on."

Harmon, who has already given his

oral commitment to TCU, works out three to four times a week in the weight room and runs three days a week.

"Everybody's bigger and faster, so you need to keep up and come into the program as prepared as you can," Harmon said. "If you're going to add weight, you have to be smart about it."

In the last year, Harmon added 15 pounds, Garmon 10 and Plunk 30. But their 40-yard dash times have stayed the same. Harmon runs the 40 in 5.1 seconds, Plunk in 5.07 and Garmon in 4.9.

Perhaps nobody knows the positive effects of gaining weight more than Shalor Pryor of Stephenville.

Last year, Pryor was shunned by Miami recruiters when he inquired while they were asking about a teammate. They said he was too small at 240 pounds. But after gaining 35 pounds, the Hurricanes are reconsidering. Pryor, now 6-4, 275 pounds, is one of the state's most highly recruited linemen and is scheduled to visit Miami in the next few weeks as well as Iowa, UCLA, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

"I thought I would lose speed," Pryor said. "But I got faster because my legs were stronger. That's what you have to have when you go to college."

His only cost was a trip to the clothing store: His waist size went from 36 to 42.

Moore's slugging at least as good as he is as Michael Irvin, but he doesn't get Irvin's America's Team exposure.

**TE** - Howard Cross, Giants. He used to be able to block and not catch. Now he does both, and would have more catches if his team threw more.

**T** - The Brad Benson syndrome

worked this year when Mark Tuinei made the Pro Bowl. That is, the voters rewarded an average lineman who plays for a good team.

**Harris Barton** of the 49ers is a good lineman on a good team but missed half the season with an injury. There's a reason why the Niners have been averaging close to 40 points a game since he returned. Paul Gruber, Tampa Bay, a good lineman on a bad team.

**G** - Lance Smith, Giants, finally missed a game this year. When he came back, the team started winning. Jim Dombrowski, New Orleans, has the misfortune of playing next to William Roaf.

**C** - Courtney Hill, San Diego (see above).

**QB** - A gimme. Brett Favre, Green Bay, who's having a better year than Tony Stewart or Warren Moon. Honorable mention: Craig Erickson, Tampa Bay; Dave Krieg, Detroit; Steve Watson, Chicago.

**RB** - Jerome Bettis made the Pro Bowl. Come on, Terry Allen, Minnesota, if for nothing else than gaining 1,000 yards off knee surgery. Plus Errict Rhett, Tampa Bay, the poor man's Marshall Faulk. Honorable mention: Edgar Bennett, Green Bay.

**K** - Steve Christie, Buffalo, who

may become a soccer player and deserves some honors before he does.

**KR** - Dave Meggett, Giants. He's not unsung, but he didn't make the Pro Bowl (Mel Gray deservedly did), so put him here.

**DE** - Tony Tolbert, Dallas. The three guys next to him are so good, he's forgotten. Rob Burnett, Cleveland.

**DT** - Andy Harmon, Philadelphia. Everytime you see the Eagles, he's making big plays. Chris Zorich, Chicago. Ditto.

**OLB** - Michael Brooks, Giants. Mo Lewis, Jets. Not everyone who plays in a major market gets publicity.

**ILB** - Vincent Brown, New England; Pepper Johnson, Cleveland. Not every linebacker who plays for Bill Parcells gets publicity. Johnson, who once played for Parcells and was overpublicized, has been resurrected in the middle of a 4-3 in Cleveland.

**CB** - Stop with Eric Allen and Rod Woodson, please. Ray Buchanan, Indianapolis, for his late splash; Maurice Hurst, New England, for his.

**S** - Darren Perry, Pittsburgh, another guy who gets lost in the Woodson hoopla. James Washington, Dallas, NOT because he's having a great year, but because he should have been Super Bowl MVP last year. (Sorry, Emmitt).

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

THERE'S MORE THAN  
CAFFEINE AT COFFEE  
BARS

The wrapping is barely off the packages and already the purses are packed ready to head off to the "after Christmas sales."

Perhaps a stop will include one of the popular coffee bars making their debut in towns of the Panhandle.

But, before you stop and have one of those "coffees" you want to read this and evaluate your diet for the day.

Coffee bars are booming. Some 4,500 coffee outlets now brew java. That's up from just 200 in 1989 according to Specialty Coffee Association of America. And that number is expected to grow to 10,000 in the next five years.

One of the reasons for the coffee beverage boom is the desire for a satisfying snack or dessert without the calories and fat associated with cake or ice creams. But drinkers beware, some coffee beverages are made with enough milk and syrup to chalk up more fat and calories than traditional desserts.

One such example is given of a large Cafe mocha made with whole milk containing 409 calories and 31 grams of fat—more than twice the calories and fat in a half-cup of some super-premium ice creams. Add the familiar topping of whipped cream and you're approaching 500 calories and 40 grams of fat—closer to a hot fudge sundae than a scoop of ice cream.

Among gourmet coffee choices, mocha beverages tend to be highest in calories and fat, primarily because of the fat in the added chocolate syrup and milk or cream. Latte, which is basically espresso with steamed milk, also can be quite high in calories and fat. When made with whole milk and topped with a dollop of whipped cream and grated chocolate, a latte latte supplies some 350 calories and 20 grams of fat.

Cappuccino -- made with espresso, a little steamed milk and more frothed milk -- generally is lower in fat and calories, provided you don't add whipped cream. For example, a large cappuccino made with 2 percent milk provides only 156 calories and six grams of fat. Also for any of the gourmet coffees, you can reduce fat and calories significantly by asking that your drink be made with skim instead of whole or 2 percent milk.

What about caffeine? How much of molt are we getting from these specialty coffees? Interestingly, not as much as from your morning cup of coffee. That's because the arabic beans used both for regular and espresso coffee commonly sold at coffee bars actually contain less caffeine than do the robusta beans used to make most

supermarket coffees. And, if the coffee is dark roasted, which takes more time than the light roasting of beans in most supermarket varieties, more caffeine is burned off the bean. In one study, samples of coffee from coffee houses contained less than 100 milligrams of caffeine per six-to-eight ounce cup, compared to 110 to 150 milligrams in a six-ounce cup of most drip coffee.

Even a cup of espresso contains somewhat less caffeine than a cup of drip coffee, assuming you're drinking one to two ounces of espresso and five to eight ounces of coffee. Ounce for ounce, of course, espresso is highest in caffeine—36 to 60 milligrams per ounce, depending on how it's made.

So perhaps while resting your tired sales-shopping feet you may just choose a glass of water for your afternoon refresher beverage.

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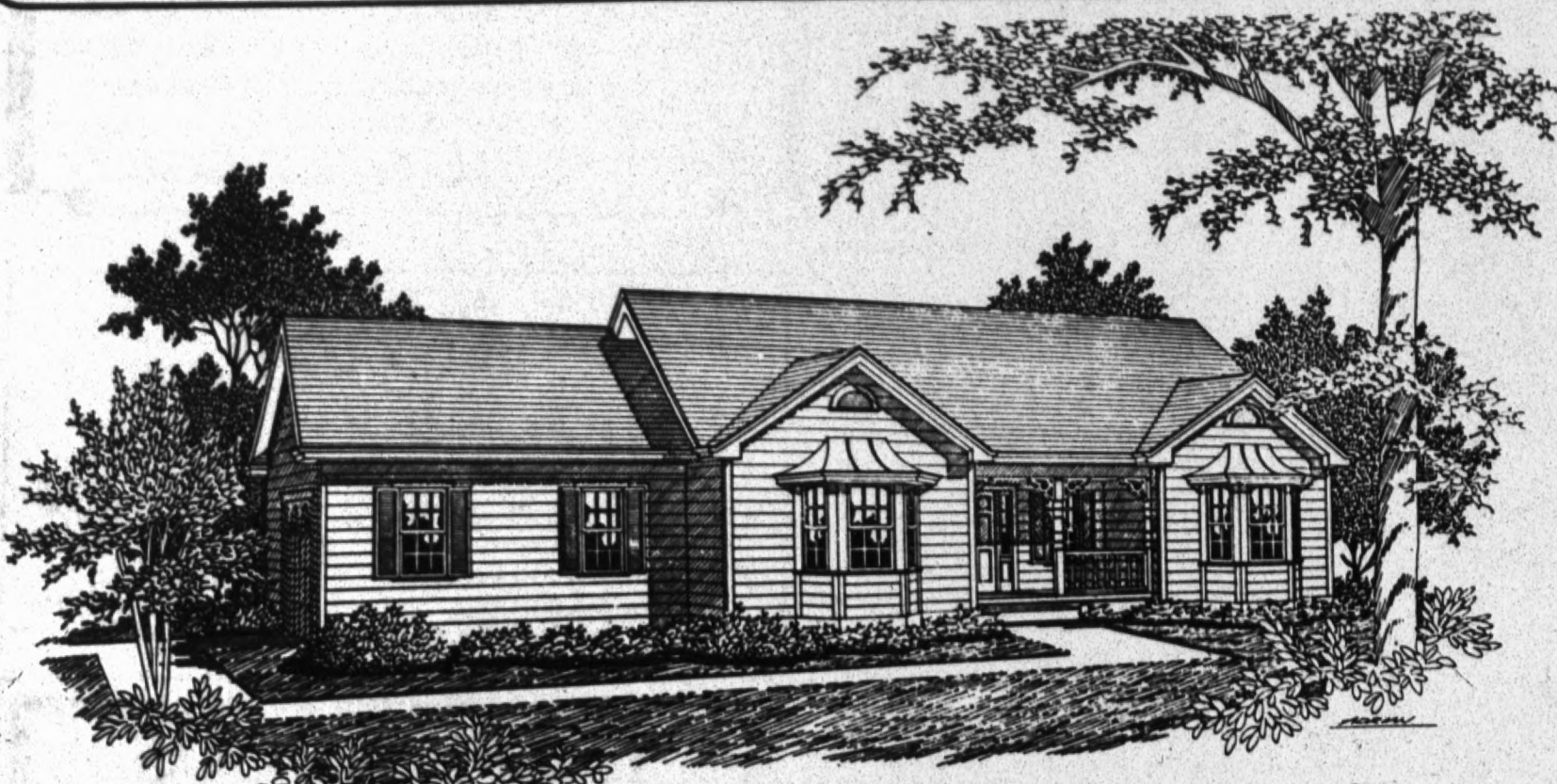
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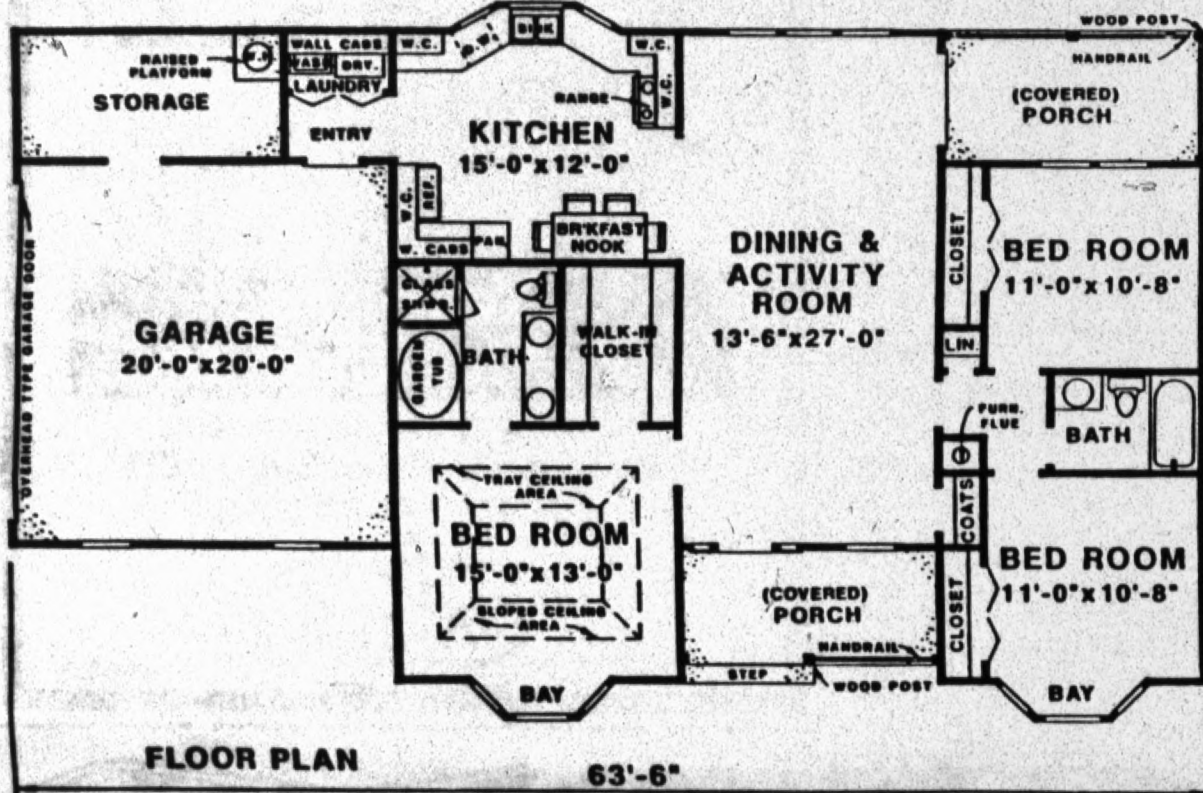

**Q:** I bought an old house with a small detached garage. Rain runoff flows down my driveway and through the garage and the sole plate has been repeatedly soaked. Both the sole plate and the bottoms of the wall studs have started to rot. The rest of the building is in good shape and I would like to save it for a workshop. What are your suggestions for remedying this situation?

**A:** Before repairing the garage, you should eliminate the water penetration. Install a drain across the driveway in front of the garage to catch and deflect the runoff. Cut a small channel, about 8 inches wide across the driveway. Fill it with gravel and cover it with a grate. Provide a free-flowing outlet using a 3- or 4-inch diameter pipe to direct the water downhill and away from the garage.

Before cutting away the rotted portions of the wall, you must erect supporting beams along the side edge of the wall with the wide face against the studs. Wedge a 2x4 under every ceiling beam, between the horizontal 2x4 and the floor. This will relieve the pressure on the wall and allow the rotted framing to be cut away.

Remove the rotted sill and cut off the bottom of the studs 1-1/8 inches above the floor. Set a row of 8-inch concrete blocks (they actually measure about 7-1/8 inches) in a half-inch bed of mortar so that they align with the outside of the garage wall.

Mortar anchor bolts into the block cavities so they protrude 1-1/2 inches above the top of the blocks. Use three anchor bolts per wall. Bolt a 2x6 to the blocks with holes counterbored for washers and anchor nuts. Then, nail a 2x4 along the length of the 2x6 to form a sole plate. Finally, toe-nail the studs to the 2x4 with galvanized 8d nails.

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# Energy audit could result in savings

## Homeowner should perform some regular checks

To conserve energy and reduce utility bills, every homeowner should have an energy audit conducted by his local utility. However, as situations in your home change and weatherization products deteriorate, audits become outdated.

A professional energy auditor cannot reveal every area of energy loss, particularly if those areas are not visible. For example, a spot check can only reveal the general amount of insulation in an exterior wall.

It's up to you as the homeowner to check the temperature of every

radiator and the caulking at every joint. Only you will be concerned about areas of minimal energy loss, and areas where the cost of correction might result in a very long payback period.

Sealing your home to prevent heat leaking out of the house and cold air entering through cracks and crevices is an easy and inexpensive, yet important, first step to conserve energy.

You should seal the cracks and crevices of your home before you consider installing additional insulation to it. Caulk and weatherstripping are the materials that correct

these infiltration problems.

Weatherstripping should be applied to movable joints. For example, weatherstrip around exterior doors, including attic and basement doors if unheated, and around attached garage doors. Also, weatherstrip the underside and sides of window sashes and around sliding glass doors.

Caulk is used to seal the many immovable joints in a house. For example, caulk cracks around window and door frames and other openings, such as where pipes, wires and ducts enter the house; anyplace where two building materials meet,

such as where brick meets stucco or trim meets siding; siding that is cracked or damaged; the joints made by the chimney sides and the frame of the house; and under metal or wood thresholds.

Glazing compound, such as putty, seals the joints made by a glass or plastic panel and its frame in a door or window. Sealing these joints also reduces air infiltration.

Windows are often improperly sealed. Storm windows can protect against drafts, but before investing in storm windows, inspect and make needed repairs on your primary windows.

Besides seeing that windows are properly sealed with putty, caulk and weatherstrip, replace broken panes of glass. Other problems that can result in heat leaks are: excess paint buildup that creates gaps in the sealing system and broken sash locks.

In some cases, you may have to remove the sashes of conventional double hung windows to make repairs. If they are badly damaged or deteriorated, you might consider replacing the sashes.

There are two broad categories of storm windows: Triple-track units are a combination of storm window and screen permanently installed on the exterior. Single-pane units of glass, rigid plastic or flexible storm windows are usually installed during cold weather only and are inoperable.

Flexible polyethylene plastic sheet can be installed in a frame or simply tacked to furring strips that are screwed in place. The latter storm window is inexpensive, but must be replaced more often than other types. However, the windows are all effective in reducing heat flow.

# Butcher block is popular item but may need special attention

One of the most popular features of today's contemporary kitchen is a solid-wood butcher block cutting surface - usually 1-1/2-inch thick hardwood strips laminated together to form countertop inserts or dedicated cutting tables.

If you use your butcher block surface for cutting, and not purely decorative use, you've noticed that the wood gets scarred, dirty and stained. You can give new life to this surface with a lot less work than you might imagine.

The first step involves scraping the surface using a hook scraper (also called a wood or paint and varnish scraper). This will remove dirt and any old finish remaining on the butcher block. This type of scraper works much faster than sandpaper which tends to clog until bare wood is exposed. For best results, use a scraper with a new, sharp blade.

Hold the scraper firmly with the blade perpendicular to the wood. Press down as you pull the scraper toward you in a long controlled

motion. Always scrape with the grain and lift the blade on the return stroke.

After you've scraped the entire surface, go back and work on any dark areas and deep knife cuts. To avoid excessive hollowing, scrape the area around the affected spot as well.

Sanding is the next step. An orbital palm sander, especially one with a dust collection bag, is your best sanding tool because it's lightweight and easy to control. You can also use sandpaper and a sanding block - it'll simply take longer and be more work.

Begin sanding with 80-grit paper, changing the paper often, especially if it clogs. To prevent marring the adjacent countertop surface and backsplash, use a sanding block near all edges. When most of the dark areas and cuts are gone, switch to a 120-grit paper, and finish the job. Always sand with the grain.

You'll find that some of the surface blemishes sand out easily, while others, such as deep knife marks that remain after scraping, take time to feather out. As you sand, vacuum the dirt and grit so you can see the true condition of the wood.

You can brighten the whole surface by using a 1-to-1 solution of household bleach and water. For any remaining stained areas, use the bleach full strength, working it into the wood with a toothbrush. Bear in

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
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

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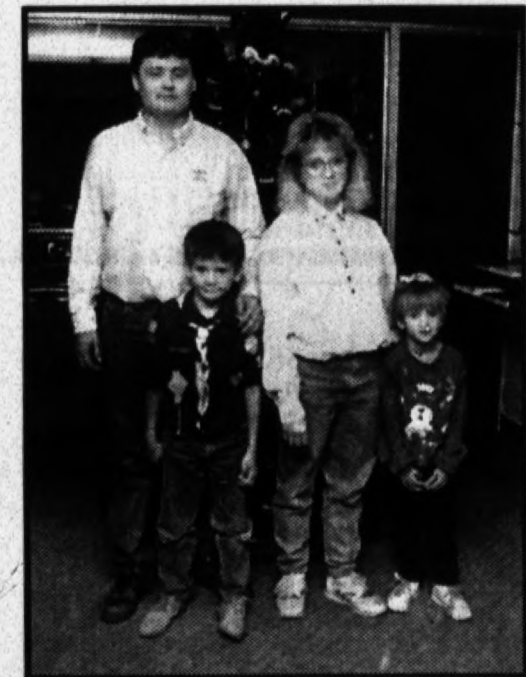

## Irrigation conference set in Amarillo

AMARILLO - Three area growers who have demonstrated an ability to succeed in irrigated farming will share their management techniques during the annual High Plains Irrigation Conference and Trade Show on Jan. 5, at the Amarillo Civic Center.

Harold Grall, a Moore County

grower, will discuss ridge till farming to conserve and manage irrigation water and rainfall.

A Hutchinson County producer, Rex McCloy, will talk about utilization of irrigation systems and current technology to cut crop production costs.

A third grower, Randy Hensley of

the O'Donnell area of the South Plains, will discuss drip irrigation designed to boost cotton yields with limited irrigation water.

A researcher, Freddie Lamm of Colby, Kan., will present data on irrigating corn with drip irrigation and his view of the economic feasibility.

Among topics to be discussed during the conference, also, will be a review of the influence of weather on the 1994 corn yields as well as the yield potential and economic comparison of short and full season corn and grain sorghum to match irrigation capacity.

Brad Lance, field agronomist with Pioneer Hi-Bred International at Lubbock, and Brent Bean, extension

agronomist at Amarillo, will cover the corn discussions.

Carl Patrick, extension entomologist in Amarillo, will speak on safe strategies for chemigation. Planning and managing irrigation systems for efficiency will be discussed by Leon New, extension agricultural engineer.

Manufacturers and dealers will offer information on the technology of the latest irrigation and chemigation during the trade show.

The day's activities will begin with the trade show and registration at 8:25 a.m. on Jan. 5. The conference program will open at 9:25 a.m. A \$5 registration fee will include lunch.

Participants may earn three continuing education units during the conference.

## SBA loans may be offered businesses in six counties

Deaf Smith County is one of six Panhandle and South Plains counties eligible for businesses to apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the Small Business Administration.

Businesses that depend on farmers and ranchers can apply for the loans, made available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met because of effects of a disaster.

Drought and severe weather

conditions which occurred from Oct. 1, 1993, through Aug. 1, 1994, caused farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes. The result was an adverse economic effect on businesses depending on the producers.

Farmers and ranchers may not apply for this loan program but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other federal agencies. Nurseries that suffered because of drought may apply, however.

## ICA wants stiffer law on cattle theft in state

AUSTIN - Texas laws on fence-cutting and cattle theft are targeted by the Independent Cattlemen's Association for strengthening in the next session of the Texas Legislature.

State Rep. Susan Combs of Austin has pre-filed a bill that would make fence-cutting a Class A misdemeanor.

The ICA also is pushing for stiffer penalties for cattle theft. The Penal Code that became effective Sept. 1 allows probation for first-time thieves of cattle worth up to \$20,000, if there is no evidence of violence or weapons.

Previously theft of livestock valued at \$1,500 was a third degree felony that carried sentences of up to 10 years in prison.

"The new law on cattle theft is outrageously weak," said ICA President Jim Selman, a Gonzales area rancher.

"Only a few cattle may be involved in one of these crimes but for a small producer, having even one head stolen is a costly blow. What's more, producers may have spent years breeding a genetic pool that is destroyed by a so-called small theft.

"Cattle theft and fence-cutting are serious issues with livestock producers. That's why we've put both at the top of our priorities for the legislative session," said Selman.

Records show that in 1993 Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers investigators recovered or accounted for 2,145 head of cattle and horses, 17 trailers and other ranch property worth a total of \$2.8 million.

The ICA also will work to bring a change in federal estate tax exemptions. The association wants the exemption increased from \$600,000 per person and \$750,000 per person.

The current rate, said Selman is hurting farm and ranch families. In some cases, families have been forced to sell off their land just to pay inheritance taxes.

"Keeping more of a family's hard-earned dollars at home and in Texas, instead of sending more of it to the federal bureaucracy in Washington, is a goal ICA plans to push for when the new Congress convenes in January," said Selman.

## Pork, poultry giving beef big competition

AMARILLO - Cattle feeders, rocked by low prices and high volatility in 1994, can look forward to slightly better fed cattle prices in 1995, the market director for Texas Cattle Feeders Association believes.

Jim Gill said his price outlook for fed cattle is tempered, though, by a mountain of meat that consumers will eat in '95, meaning any price gains in the fed beef sector will be small and hard-won.

"Competitive meats will continue to offer stiff competition to beef prices," he predicted. "Pork production for 1995 is expected to be near 17.9 billion pounds, one percent higher than 1994.

"Total poultry production in 1995 will be near 30.9 billion pounds on a ready-to-cook basis, five percent higher than 1994 and the 20th consecutive year of increased poultry production."

Gill said beef production is expected to be near 24.4 billion pounds in 1995, or one percent higher than the record 24.1 billion pounds this year.

"Next year will be the eighth consecutive year of record production and will put per capita consumption at 67.1 pounds on a retail weight basis," he added.

Factoring all this, Gill predicts that fed cattle prices will range from \$68 to \$72 per hundredweight in the first quarter of 1995; \$64 to \$68 in the second quarter; \$65 to \$69 in the third quarter, and \$68 to \$72 in the fourth quarter.

For cow-calf and stocker operators, increasing supplies mean lower prices, Gill said.

"The beef cow inventory on Jan.

1, 1995, will be slightly more than 35 million head, about one percent higher than a year ago. Growth to around 36 million head is anticipated by 1996-1997 and, along with the larger cow herd, calf crops are expected to trend slightly higher," Gill predicted.

"Because of losses suffered by cattle feeders this year, 650-lb feeders will likely average \$75 to \$77 per hundredweight in 1995, down slightly from the 1994 average of about \$80, and down sharply from the 1993 average of more than \$89."

While cattlemen will be struggling under the burden of heavy supplies, consumers will reap the benefit of lower retail prices.

"Retail beef prices dropped 10 cents in 1994, reflecting increased production this year," Gill said. "It is likely retail prices will remain mostly steady in 1995, even as fed cattle prices move above the mid to high \$60 level the industry has seen."

If cattle feeders have a bright spot, it's the grain outlook. Gill said corn production for 1994 will be more than 10 billion bushels, up sharply from the production of 6.5 billion bushels in 1993 and higher than the previous record of 9.5 billion bushels in 1992.

Meanwhile, sorghum production also increased from 567 million bushels to 620 million bushels in 1994.

"Corn prices should trend below last year's level with prices likely to be near \$4.70 to \$4.90 per hundredweight, FOB the elevator for feedyards," Gill said. "The same will likely be true for milo, with average prices from \$4.24 to \$4.50 in 1995, with normal seasonal movements."

PARTHENON, Ark. (AP) - An herbal tea tycoon turned a natural cave in the Arkansas hills into a home and fallout shelter before selling it in 1988 for more than \$2 million. Now he's bought it again.

Celestial Seasonings Inc. founder John Hay was the high bidder Saturday, offering \$270,000 for the cave house and surrounding 240 acres.

"First, I've got to figure out what to tell my wife," said Hay, of Boulder, Colo. "I thought it was a good deal.


It's got a lot of potential. Maybe I can bring that potential out."

The 5,000-square-foot cave house has five bedrooms, five bathrooms and a helicopter landing pad. It sits atop a 100-foot bluff and features breathtaking views of a valley and Beckham Creek.

Hay built the house in 1983, selling it for a reported \$2.6 million; current owners Jeff and Mary Crockett bought it out of bankruptcy for \$120,000.

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## Natural compound is key to tortillas' flavor

 WASHINGTON (AP) - It takes more than salt to make tortilla chips taste so good.

Agriculture Department researchers say the reason that tortillas and taco shells please the palate with that hearty, corn flour flavor can be summed up in one nearly unpronounceable word: 2-aminoacetophenone.

The natural compound has been shown to be the key ingredient in yellow corn tortilla flour's flavor and aroma, according to the department's Agricultural Research magazine.

Before this research, other studies of tortilla flavor had failed to even identify the compound within the food. In addition to discovering 2-aminoacetophenone, the scientists have pinpointed four other previously overlooked compounds that contribute to the flour's flavor.

According to the researchers, knowing what makes the chips taste good will help producers enhance the flavor of their products.

The study, done by the Agricultural Research Service in Albany, Calif., involved a range of corn tortilla products purchased at a local supermarket. Using a gas chromatograph and a mass spectrometer, scientists Ronald Buttery and Louisa Ling identified and measured 30 chemicals critical to the taste of the products.

They then isolated the compounds and turned the process over to 20 people, who followed their noses to determine which smelled most like the characteristic aroma of tortilla chips.


Combining the laboratory analyses and the panelists' assessments, Buttery and Ling ranked the chemicals. The winner was

2-aminoacetophenone. Improving the flavor of corn tortilla chips could boost an already skyrocketing market.

About \$2.5 billion worth of tortilla chips are marketed annually, according to the Snack Food Association, which said the average American spends about \$10 a year on tortilla chips.

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
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# Flute player Galway has roots in Gene Autry

**EDITOR'S NOTE** - James Galway, today's most-famous flute player, is admired by classical and pop music lovers alike. There is seldom an empty seat at his concerts. He says he must feel the music while he's playing. In February he will tour America, playing Bach.

**NEW YORK (AP)** - Growing up in Belfast in Northern Ireland, flutist James Galway studied Gene Autry in cowboy movies.

As youths, he and his pals cooked stolen potatoes over open fires in vacant lots and sang and played, as nearly as they could, like Gene Autry. Mothers weren't pleased by smoky-smelling clothes or complaints from grocers.

But Galway, now the world's most famous flute player, was laying a foundation for his latest recording. "Wind of Change" has him playing 16 popular songs on his platinum flute, backed by a pop ensemble. The man who can play Bach and abstract new classical compositions didn't just toss it off.

"You have to study the original people singing it," he says. "You have to play the way they sing."

"Pop music is not as easy as it seems. People on my side of the business deride pop guys, say they can't read music and they're inarticulate. Some of them are

amazing performers." Despite studying Gene Autry, Galway says, "Willie Nelson is hard. He is so simple, the way he sings, but to capture this is quite difficult. Elton John is not so difficult. He is very special but he is a more straightforward sort of singer. Whitney Houston is so well in tune; her diction is perfect. She knocks me down."

On a couple of songs, like John's "Little Jeannie," Galway decided two flutes would be nice. So his American wife of 10 years, Jeanne, plays second flute. They live in a village near Lucerne, Switzerland.

Galway has been called a senior leprechaun because of his Irish origin, age - 51 - and his twinkle. He's also a serious musician whose more than 50 recordings, exclusively for RCA, are three classical to one pop.

He began his career as an orchestra player, making solo appearances on the side. In 1975 he left the Berlin Philharmonic, where he was principal flutist, to pursue the solo career.

Not for a while after that did he start playing peppy traditional Irish tunes as encores. Playing pop music came still later.

His newest classical record is the music of composer Franz Danzi, who died in 1826. He is accompanied by clarinetist Sabine Meyer, who also has the Berlin Philharmonic in her background.

In February, Galway's American

tour will feature Bach. In April he'll play AIDS benefits in Ann Arbor, Mich., and in England and he'll record the two Mozart flute concertos in London.

"I record all over the place," says Galway. "I like churches best. I always think that maybe a bit of spirit would rub off on an Irish pagan like me."

"I recorded Mozart with the Tokyo String Quartet in the RCA studio here. I didn't like it at all. I thought, I'm not going to issue this. We recorded it again, at my expense, in a church. The atmosphere was so nice. The music could breathe. It was pure."

"Am I a pagan? When it comes to belief, most people believe what their parents did. I might have been Jewish or Buddhist. It's totally accidental. I would like to think I have the freedom of choice to believe in something I want to believe in. I think it's a good job the church does sometimes. I believe there's a good force around here somewhere. I don't want to believe in the establishments that are pushing it."

John Corigliano composed "Pied Piper Fantasy" for Galway and some regard him as that charismatic, enchanting figure leading masses of people to classical music.

Galway whose performances are always sold-out, says, "I don't think of myself in any way. I'm so busy doing it I don't think about it. I practice the flute and play concerts. You don't have time to think of yourself as a celebrity or anything else that people say you are. As for trying to pull more people in, there's nowhere for them to sit."

The 19th-century romantic composers, most of whom played piano or violin, wrote concertos for their own instruments. They wrote for flute but as part of the orchestra. So Galway goes back to Bach and Mozart and forward to Debussy, who died in 1918.

He says, "I think we should also do now and then a modern concerto. I don't commission from people who are bad, only from people I really like and respect. That means, when I play one of these pieces, audiences will enjoy it, too."

Three that were written for him that he especially likes are Corigliano's "Pied Piper Fantasy" and flute concertos by Lowell Liebermann and William Bolcom. "They're three Americans. If nothing else happened in my career, I'd be happy to have their concertos written." Bolcom's has an Irish lilt. Galway adds, "The slow movement is spiritual; he put his finger on the pulse there." Liebermann is

writing another piece, for flute and harp, for Galway to premiere next May.

In Zurich Galway recently played the premieres of two abstract flute concertos, one by an Englishman, George Nicholson, the other by Jindrich Feld, who is Czech. "It wasn't exactly your standard, cheery C major piece," Galways says. "I thought it might send the audience running out of there. They had me and the composer taking bows five or six times."

When he's playing, Galway says, he must put himself into the mood of the music. "You have to try and capture


the imagination of the public for that particular fleeting moment you're doing it. If it's a slow movement and rather profound, you have to bring something to it almost akin to the feel of someone deeply in prayer. In a happy movement, you have a good time with everybody and get them all feeling like dancing."

"Music is composed in a certain way so you get a second shot at most things. The first theme gets played again. You can get it even better the second time, a bit slower, softer or with a bit more magic in it. The audience hears it. Absolutely."



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# Christmas Eve too late to assemble presents

WACO, Texas - It's 11:30 p.m. Christmas Eve, the kids are asleep and now it's time for you to play Santa's helper. If you're like most parents, it's not a pretty sight.

Where to begin ...  
There's a bicycle, doll house and tricycle to assemble. They are all equally difficult. You're not sure which instructions go with each toy and your carpet is covered with more screws and stickers than you have seen in your life.

If you're like most parents, you have had a disaster or two while putting together toys the night before Christmas. For Mike and Mary Wentworth, disaster struck a few Christmases ago when they bought a basic red wagon.

Their best friend, who had already put together three different wagons, warned them to make sure they didn't put the wheels on backward because they are impossible to remove once they close around the axis.

However, this particular friend didn't follow his own advice. In the end, the only wheel that was placed on backward was the one he put on.

"It took three adults, a hammer, two screwdrivers and some adult tears to get it off," said Mrs. Wentworth.

Today, the Wentworths, who have two children ages 9 and 3, buy toys that are already assembled or pay to have them assembled at the toy store.

If you're not fortunate (or

unfortunate as the case may be) enough to have a friend to help you put together Christmas toys, you may benefit from a strategy.

Different people have different techniques for putting together toys. Some prefer to look at the picture on the box for guidance. This usually involves some trials and errors, but it can work, if you know your toys.

Others take a more professional approach - they organize the screws, nuts and bolts in an orderly fashion and put the instructions nearby and begin with step one. This may take a little longer, but these parents always get the satisfaction of knowing they can follow directions.

If you're like the Wentworth's, check with toy departments to find out if they assemble toys for customers. If they do, they will probably base their rates on the size and complexity of the toy or they might have a base rate they charge for all toys.

Julie Pickle, mother of two sons, said she learned her lesson early on and she never buys difficult-to-assemble toys at Christmas. Instead, she saves them for birthdays.

However, she offers these tips to parents: buy plenty of batteries to test what you have assembled and have lots of hiding places for boxes and paper just in case the kids wander into the room while you are working on your project.

And as impossible as it might

seem, try to get a head start on assembling toys. Check with a neighbor or relative who might help you with it and let you store the finished product at their house until Christmas.

No matter which strategy you choose, make sure you have all of the parts that are listed on the instruction sheet. It is better to find out that something is missing before you start your project rather than after you have assembled it.

But even after you have chosen a technique, it may not be enough.

Some toys can be deceiving, said Lisa Horn, mother of two children ages 3 and 6.

She and her husband usually wait until Christmas Eve after the kids have gone to bed to put together toys, which usually works out just fine. But one Christmas they got a big surprise from what looked like an easy-to-assemble doll house.

"I opened the box and it had hundreds of stickers to apply to different furniture pieces," she said. "When I bought it, I thought it would already have stickers on it."

Tom Wolfe, the father of two children ages 14 and 12, is another parent who got stumped by the sticker trap several years ago. Although his daughter's recreational vehicle had about 50 stickers, the night before Christmas it felt more like 1,000.

"Even today, we still have some leftover stickers in various places in the house," he said. "If I had put them all on the RV, it would have been one solid sticker."

But for some lucky people, no matter how difficult the instructions, putting together toys is second nature. John

Holder, father of a 4-year-old, said he and his wife mastered the fine art of toy assembly years ago.

She reads the instructions, hands him nuts and bolts and organizes each step. He does the actual handy work. During the process, they don't talk much or take breaks.

"Our goal is to get the job done," he said. "It pays off the next morning when she (his daughter) smiles and says, 'Daddy, look what Santa brought me.'"

## Texas' new first lady not political person

DALLAS (AP) - Laura Bush was not particularly political during her years on the Southern Methodist University campus. She voted as soon as she was eligible, but the protests, rallies and sit-ins were not on her agenda.

She was even a bit reluctant to attend a dinner party at the house of friends who had been trying to fix her up with George W. Bush, a former schoolmate and acquaintance.

"These friends had been saying for a couple of years they wanted to introduce me to George, and I thought, 'Oh, somebody really political,' so we didn't meet for a couple of years," Mrs. Bush recalled recently.

Once they did, they married three months later.

"We were 31," Mrs. Bush explained from her seat on a couch at the family's north Dallas home - an unpretentious, three-bedroom, one-story bathed in sunlight, dotted with antiques and complete with pool and guest house.

"I think we were just ready to get married, and we met each other and didn't want to wait around."

That was 1977, and the couple quickly took to the road, campaigning from Hereford to Midland as Bush unsuccessfully battled for a congressional seat.

Today, Mrs. Bush is Texas' First Lady-in-waiting, a title attained after the eldest son of former President George Bush defeated Gov. Ann Richards to become the state's second Republican governor since Reconstruction.

On the campaign trail, the former school teacher and librarian visited 30 counties, speaking initially to GOP women's clubs and later to a broader range of groups. Her standard speech consisted mostly of personal reflection about her husband and also contained humorous family anecdotes.

"I think that's what people really wanted to hear from me in Texas," Mrs. Bush said. "They didn't really care about hearing the issues, I don't think, that much from me, although I did talk about education."

Philosophically, Mrs. Bush agrees with her husband.

"I'm sure there are things we disagree on," she said, "but, in general, I'd say we agree on most issues."

She said she supports the governor-elect's position that minors ought to have parental consent before getting an abortion. Mrs. Bush, however, declined to say whether she felt women should have a right to an abortion.

"The Supreme Court's ruled that they do have that right, so whether or not I think that, I really don't want to say," she said.

Bush, while campaigning with his mother, defended his stance on the hot-button issue, although the popular former-First Lady has said in her memoir that she supports abortion rights. Barbara Bush also has said she is personally opposed to the procedure.

Laura Bush is described by friends as more reserved than her spouse but they also note she's not afraid to express her opinion.

"She doesn't like the limelight or seek it, but she's real comfortable doing what's expected of her," said Anne Johnson, whose husband, Clay, was Bush's roommate at Yale University. "She always rises to the occasion. She's pretty amazing."

Friends characterize Mrs. Bush as smart, funny and caring.

"She'll be a wonderful first lady for the state of Texas, and it will come very natural for her," said childhood friend Regan Gammon.

The daughter of a home builder and homemaker, Mrs. Bush grew up in Midland. She left SMU in 1968 with a degree in education and then obtained a master's degree in library science in 1973 from the University of Texas.

She taught school or served as a librarian in Dallas, Houston and Austin public schools before the trip home to Midland in 1977, where she and Bush were guests at the fateful dinner party.

Since then, Mrs. Bush has kept busy, either campaigning or serving on boards for such organizations as the Dallas Public Library, Child Protective Services Community Partners and Bryan's Friends, an auxiliary of Bryan's House, a home for children with AIDS.

She and her husband also have twin 13-year-olds, Jenna and Barbara, named for the girls' grandmothers. The Bushes were in the process of adopting, and had applied for twins, when Mrs. Bush became pregnant.

The family plans to move into the Governor's Mansion in January.

For now, life is settling down for Mrs. Bush, who says she's looking forward to her new life - one closely tied to politics but not one in which she plays an active role.

"It has been a lot of fun for George to do it, and I love being associated with it," she said. "But I would've never chosen that myself, although I hope my girls, if they're interested, I hope they will."

CAMARILLO, Calif. (AP) - The Great Communicator may have gotten an important message across in disclosing he has Alzheimer's disease.

Former President Reagan's acknowledgment may do some good by increasing public awareness of the disorder, says daughter Maureen.

"He's always had the ability to make people march out the door and do something, and he did it one more time," Maureen Reagan said Tuesday during a Camarillo Pleasant Valley Republican Federated Women luncheon.

She wouldn't discuss details of her 83-year-old father's condition, saying it was too painful.

"He's everybody else's president, but he's my daddy," she said.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Sylvester Stallone reportedly will get a minimum of \$20 million for an action movie to be filmed in 1996, even if it never gets made.

Savoy Pictures agreed to a deal with the star of the "Rocky" and "Rambo" movies that guarantees him a fifth of the receipts or \$20 million, whichever is higher, the Los Angeles Times said Wednesday, citing unidentified sources.

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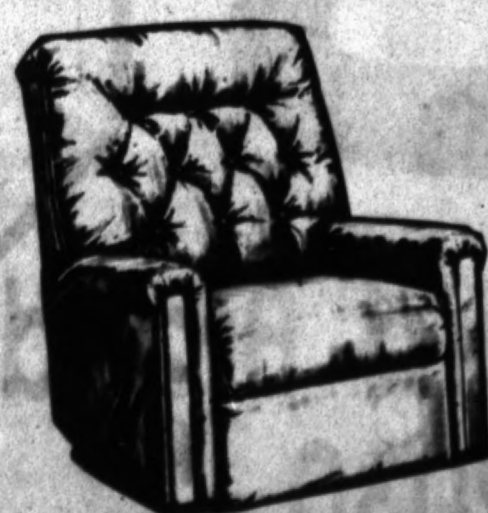

## A Donor Bill of Rights

Philanthropy is based on voluntary action for the common good. It is a tradition of giving and sharing that is primary to the quality of life. To assure that philanthropy merits the trust of the general public, and that donors and prospective donors can have full confidence in the not-for-profit organizations and causes they are asked to support, we declare that all donors have these rights:

1. To be informed of the organization's mission, of the way the organization intends to use donated resources, and of its capacity to use donations effectively for their intended purposes.
2. To be informed of the identity of those serving on the organization's governing board, and to expect the board to exercise prudent judgments in its stewardship responsibilities.
3. To have access to the organization's most recent financial statements.
4. To be assured their gifts will be used for the purposes to which they are given.
5. To receive appropriate acknowledgment and recognition.
6. To be assured that information about their donations is handled with respect and with confidentiality to the extent provided by law.
7. To expect that all relationships with individuals representing organizations of interest to the donor will be professional in nature.
8. To be informed whether those seeking donations are volunteers, employees of the organization or hired solicitors.
9. To have the opportunity for their names to be deleted from mailing lists that an organization may intend to share.
10. To feel free to ask questions when making a donation and to receive prompt, truthful and forthright answers.

## Healthcare Scholarship program announced by directors for 1995

Deaf Smith Health Care Foundation directors adopted guidelines for a scholarship program at their December board meeting, and announced that four scholarships of \$500 each will be awarded by the end of the school year in 1995.

The foundation's endowment fund has reached a total of \$148,000, it was announced by Sylvia Khuri, volunteer executive director.

Purpose of the foundation is to support the hospital and all healthcare activities and projects in the community. This includes providing scholarships for nursing students,

doctors and others in the healthcare field.

A contribution of \$5,000 in December from Dr. Nadir and Mrs. Khuri helped launch the scholarship program. Dr. Khuri specified that \$4,000 of the gift would go into the general fund, and that \$1,000 would be used for two scholarships.

The board decided that two more scholarships will also be awarded, with two going to graduating Hereford High School students who are going into the healthcare field.

Mrs. Khuri said the board "set up the mechanism" this past week for the

scholarship program, including guidelines for general fund scholarships as well as provisions for "named" scholarships. There will be minimum amounts for a "name" scholarship.

Options available to donors will include:

--The general scholarship, with all funds, both principal and interest, to be distributed according to the discretion of the board;

--A "named" scholarship where interest is retained and the principal is distributed at the rate of 25 percent a year;

--A "named" scholarship with all principal retained and the interest distributed annually;

--A "named" scholarship below the minimum donation where all principal and interest is distributed short-term per the wishes of the donor;

--Any sizable special scholarship donation.

Scholarship funds will not be limited to employees of the hospital, but will go only to persons in the healthcare field. The board will have guidance from the hospital and medical staff in prioritizing scholarship guidelines.

The donated scholarship funds will be separate and distinct from other Foundation monies, but the board reserves the right to fund a scholarship or contribute to the general scholarship fund at its discretion.

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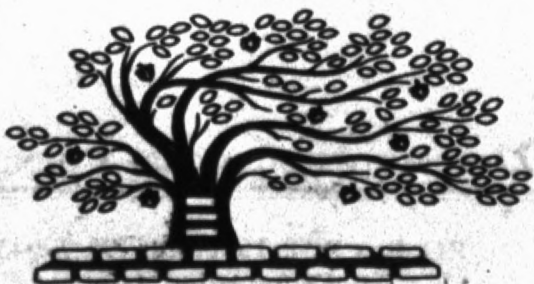

PBS spreads seasonal cheer with its hearty *Bah! Humbug!*

Beginning with a bellowed "Bah! Humbug!" and ending with a benedictory "God bless us, everyone!" PBS' *Bah! Humbug!* is the plum pudding of yuletide viewing.

The one-hour special airs in prime time Christmas Day, Sunday, Dec. 25, on PBS (check local listings).

A distinguished trio presents dramatic readings of excerpts from Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol*, just as the author used to do in theaters, halls and libraries around England. Also included are short video essays on Dickens' life and the origins of the world's best-loved Christmas fiction.

Dickens called his novella a "sledgehammer," expressly written to bring the plight of the poor to the attention of those in better circumstances. The moral has been taken to heart by generations of readers since.

"This story is always alive," host Robert MacNeil says. "A Christmas doesn't go by that somebody doesn't do either a new version of it on stage or rerun the old movie or there isn't a television version."

Those fortunate enough to be in New York City this holiday season can attend Patrick Stewart's acclaimed one-man show on Broadway. Thanks to producer Richard Somerset-Ward, though, the story's glow can be felt in any living room.

"(The special) was his idea actually a year ago," MacNeil says, "which was the 150th anniversary of the publication of *A Christmas Carol*. We got all geared up to do it then, and then we had trouble raising the money. So a year later, we raised the money and now we're doing it on the 151st anniversary of *A Christmas Carol*."

Standing at lecterns in New York's Pierpont Morgan Library, Martin Sheen and James Earl Jones perform

all the parts in Dickens' "ghostly little book," from narrator to the smallest Cratchit child. Novelist and news anchor MacNeil makes the introductions and presents the video segments.

As MacNeil explains in the show's introduction, the Morgan Library was chosen because its collection, started by banker J.P. Morgan, contains the original, handwritten copy of *A Christmas Carol*. The manuscript even reveals that Scrooge's famous epithet, one of the most recognized phrases in the English language, was an afterthought, squeezed in between lines.

There is a small audience in the hall, which is lined with Morgan's books, and the warm feeling of a fire, but that seems to be a product of Dickens' art. Viewers whose Christmas celebrations include wassail, chestnuts, mince pie or plum pudding should prepare to enjoy them now, though the special really needs no garnish.

"Marley was dead, to begin with," announces Sheen, and so it begins. After Dickens' introductory exposition, viewers will feel a tingle as Jones, who reads Scrooge, breaks into the narrative with a growling "Bah! Humbug!"

"Christmas a humbug, uncle?" Sheen rejoins. Together they take their audience from the dim scene at Scrooge and Marley's to Scrooge's equally dim rooms, and on - to Fezziwig's ball, the Cratchit home and the wintry graveyard of Scrooge's reformation.

As principal narrator, Sheen holds the book in front of him, while Jones works from memory and a Tele-Prompter. Sheen is undoubtedly better rehearsed than his partner, who occasionally muffs a line. Nevertheless Jones' snarls, grimaces and grins add sauce to Dickens' seasonal feast.

**Q:** I've noticed a remarkable resemblance between the guy who played Ernst in Disney's *Swiss Family Robinson* and Wil Wheaton, who played Wesley Crusher on *Star Trek: The Next Generation*. Any chance they are related? --Teri G., Portland, Ore.

**A:** By golly, you're right. I never had noticed it before, but Wheaton does bear a striking resemblance to ex-Disney star Tommy Kirk. They're not related, however.

**Q:** Could you please tell me where I can write to the Sci-Fi Channel? The address isn't in my TV guide.

**A:** Sure. The address is C/O USA Networks, 1230 Avenue of the Americas, New York, N.Y. 10020-1513.

**Q:** Many years ago my husband and I saw a TV movie called *The Last Convertible* starring Perry King and Deborah Raffin. I have tried everywhere at video stores, but no one seems to have heard of it. Is it on tape, or do you think they will ever show it on TV again? --Ethel in Brockville, Ont., Canada.

**A:** Sorry I couldn't make out your last name, Ethel. *Convertible* was a six-hour, three-part miniseries that originally aired on NBC in 1979. It's not available on video at present, and its age and length make it an unlikely candidate for release in the near future. I would assume it is available to interested station managers via syndication, so you might want to write to one of your local stations (Attention: Program Director) and state your case.

**Q:** I love *Models Inc.* What is its current standing in the ratings? What are Fox's plans for the show? --Linda M., Portland, Ore.

**A:** As of this writing, *Models* just came in a dismal 80th out of 89 shows. Next week it moves to Monday, trading time slots with *Party of Five*. For now, at least, Fox is sticking with it because it is produced by Aaron Spelling, who has handed the network two of its biggest hits in *Beverly Hills, 90210* and *Melrose Place*.

**Q:** Would you please tell me what the numbers are after all the programs? I don't know what the idea is for that. --K.D.N., Mingo Junction, Ohio.

**A:** Some readers may be puzzled by

your question, because those numbers don't appear in all TV listings sections. These are the code numbers for VCR Plus, a device designed to help people who can't, or don't want to, program their VCRs. By punching in the code shown by each program title, the VCR Plus device will automatically turn on the VCR at the appropriate time, to the appropriate channel, for the appropriate duration of the program.

Note: This works only for VCRs designed to use VCR Plus.

**Q:** Can you help me with an address to write to the cast of *Time Trax*? --Bill Trombley, Ellensburg Center, N.Y.

**A:** Maybe, but since this show has finished production there's a chance everyone has scattered to the four winds at this point. Try writing to them C/O Warner Bros. TV, 4000 Warner Blvd., Burbank, Calif. 91522. Put "please forward" on the envelope and keep your fingers crossed. That's the best I can suggest.

**Q:** Are any of the people that play in *The Waltons* still living? Is there a *Waltons Mountain* in Virginia now? --D.C., Liberty, Ky.

**A:** Except for Will Geer (Grandpa) who died during the run of the original series, the entire original cast is alive. There is no *Waltons Mountain* because the family is fictional, based on creator Earl Hamner Jr.'s own clan.

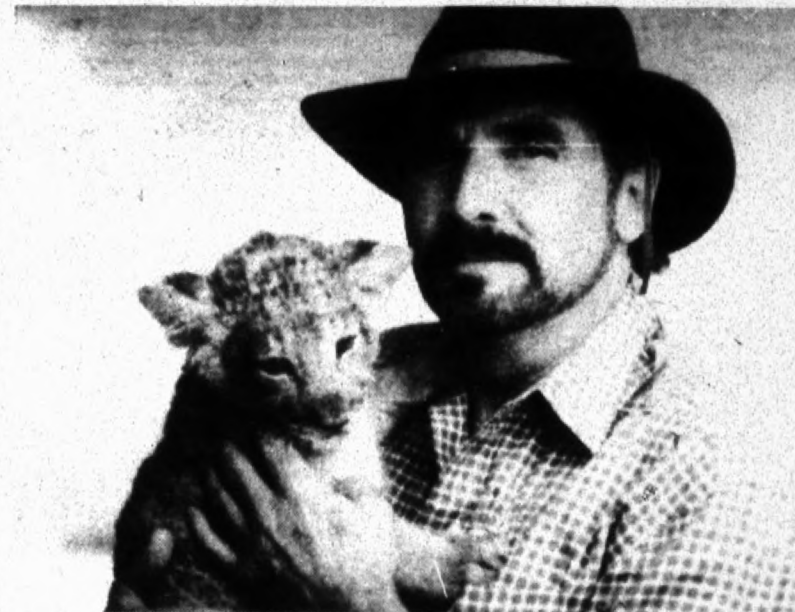

## World of Discovery returns for fifth season on ABC

Whether from philanthropy or a conviction that viewers' tastes improve dramatically in the final days of December, television programmers always seem to fill the airwaves with a few good shows after Christmas.

On Thursday, Dec. 29, ABC presents two family specials: *Lassie: A Dog's Life* and *Lion: Africa's King of the Beasts*, the latter being the first installment in a new season of its *World of Discovery* nature specials.

The *World of Discovery* anthology was launched in 1990 by veteran *National Geographic* producer Dennis Kane. His partner, Dutch-born Hugo van Lawick, helped produce *Jane Goodall and the Wild Chimpanzees* for *Geographic* and serves as a cameraman here.

James Brodin is host and narrator of *Lions*, which chronicles a year in the life of a pride roaming northern Tanzania's Ngorongoro Crater. Despite an occasional lapse into John Wayne-style delivery, Brodin fills the bill nicely, going so far as to bounce a playful cub on his knee between reels.

The photography for *Lions*, credited chiefly to Emmy winner Gil Domb (*Secrets of the Golden River*), is the highlight of the production, from time-lapse shots of cloud formations rolling over the edge of the ancient volcanic crater to swift, deadly encounters between the lions and their prey.

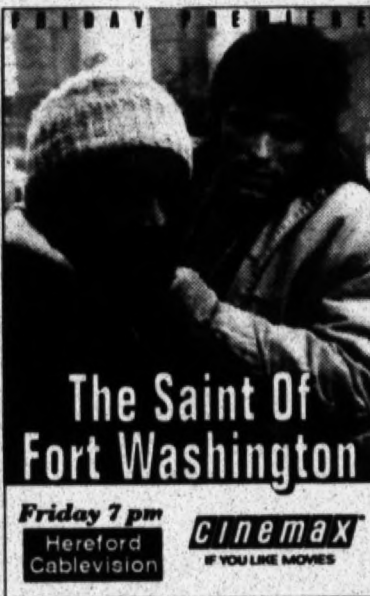
The crew camped high above the crater floor, where temperatures could be as much as 50 degrees warmer than at the rim.

Because lions, like smaller cats, snooze for up to 20 hours each day, the film crew occupied many long hours with reading or studying other wildlife from its vehicle, patiently waiting for the pride to rouse itself.

The script, by Barbara Jampel, takes a lighter approach than traditional nature films, so that the viewer feels informed but not overwhelmed. From time to time, Jampel's words suggest a human standard of behavior for the beasts (she calls their cub-rearing "sexist"), causing only momentary irritation.

If only television offered as much every week of the year.

**Kirk Douglas receives Kennedy Center honor**

"The problem with lifetime achievement awards is they act like your life is over," complains a vigorous sounding Kirk Douglas. After dozens of film roles, the 78-year-old has turned to writing in recent years and is the author of a

best-selling autobiography, *The Ragman's Son*, and three novels.

"Occasionally when something comes up that I find interests me, I find that underneath I'm an actor," he adds. He and his son Michael are looking for a screen project to do together.

But Douglas is receiving this year's Kennedy Center Honor for more than just his acting and writing. In a ceremony airing Wednesday, Dec. 28, on CBS, he will be remembered for breaking the Hollywood blacklist by giving screen credit to Dalton Trumbo for the script for *Spartacus*.

Douglas has been honored with the Medal of Freedom from President Jimmy Carter for his efforts to take the message of democracy abroad, received a French Legion of Honor Award and garnered a Life Achievement Award from the American Film Institute, among a dozen others.

"My next book is going to be a continuation of my life story," he says. "It's like Browning's poem, 'Grow old along with me! The best is yet to be.'"
