## Hundreds turn out at dinner to court PSF

Hereford rolled out the welcome mat for Premium Standard Farms at a reception and dinner attended by more than 200 interested residents Tuesday night in the banquet room at the HISD administration building.

Hereford Economic Development Corporation hosted the meeting of business and community leaders, elected officials, directors of local boards and spouses.

County Judge Tom Simons, who served as master of ceremonies; Mayor Bob Jossierand and Chamber President Wes Fisher issued welcome remarks and invited PSF to choose Deaf Smith County as the site for its new processing plant.

Mayor Jossierand said he felt the company would be an asset to the city and county. "PSF truly cares about its people and the environment. We invite you to become residents of Hereford."

Charlie Arnot, director of communications for PSF, responded to the welcome remarks, stating that Hereford had extended "a warm welcome to the company and we are very impressed with this community."

Arnot, appearing on the KPAN "talk show" Wednesday morning, said Hereford "is further along with the site evaluation than any other potential site."

But, "You shouldn't read anything special into that until all the i's are dotted and the t's crossed," said Arnot. "Our policy is to under-promise and over-deliver."

He narrated a video Tuesday night which depicted the company's operation from breeding to the finished product, and closed by answering questions from the audience. Arnot said the site selection is expected before Christmas.

Brian Paulsen, government liaison director, accompanied Arnot at the dinner. Two other PSF officials planned to fly in for the meeting but bad weather prevented their attendance Tuesday night.

Arnot said the proposed plant would employ about 400 initially and grow from there. "We anticipate filling the majority of the jobs from the local work force," he said. In response to a question, he said such a facility would have about 30 office jobs and the company would bring in about five percent or less for work in specialized areas.

He explained the company employs a lot of women, working

with about a 50/50 mix in their Missouri plant. "We are highly automated and no one has to lift more than 40 pounds at any work station."

The processing plant would use a maximum of 700 gallons of water a minute, said Arnot. They recycle the water for maximum usage, and affluent water is also used. In Missouri, it is used to irrigate hay fields.

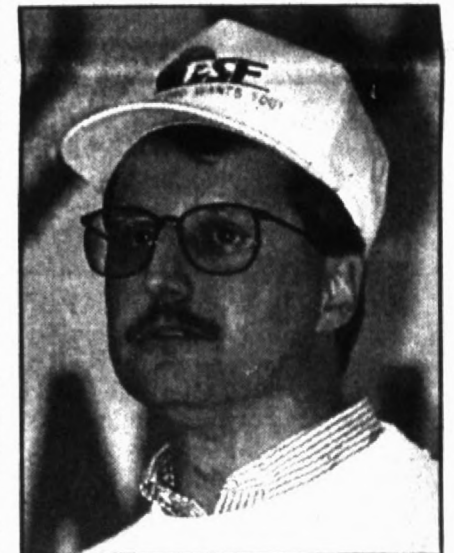
"While this facility is a packing plant, a slaughtering house, it is different than what some people perceive," pointed out Arnot. "We have been able to use the advanced technology in the industry to make major changes in such an operation."

Arnot also explained that PSF, as a privately-held company, operates on a "closed system." From the breeding barn to the finished product, the company has full control. "Our goal is more on quality than volume," he added.

Odor has never been an issue at the processing plant in Milan, MO., said Arnot. "If you don't believe us, wait until we come here," he said. The audience responded to the word here with a round of applause. However, Arnot smiled and said, "the word here is used in broad terms."

The company has a starting wage of \$6.50 an hour for untrained workers. All employees have a benefits package. The company, founded in 1988, currently has about 1,800 employees in Missouri and Dalhart. The sow operation around Dalhart will expand from 17,000 to 80,000 sows in the next year.

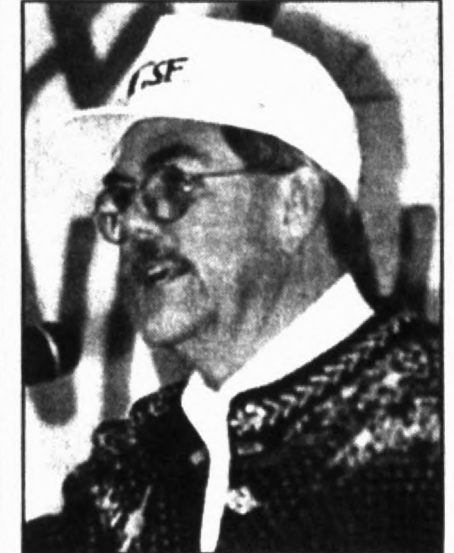

## GOP House caucus votes to cut size of Congress, sell building

WASHINGTON (AP) - Moving swiftly on a campaign pledge of smaller government, House Republicans want to sell one of five House office buildings and cut off \$5 million in federal subsidies for the Congressional Black Caucus and numerous other groups.

"The American people voted decisively this year to change things," Rep. Newt Gingrich of Georgia, the incoming House speaker, said Tuesday after a party caucus in which the 72 incoming freshmen played an aggressive role. "They voted overwhelmingly that this is the year to dramatically shrink the Congress."

In a closed-door caucus that lasted

much of the day, Republicans also approved a three-term limit on committee and subcommittee chairmen, rejecting a proposal to extend the time to a fourth term. But deferring to the wishes of lawmakers from sprawling, rural districts, they shelved a proposal from the first-termers to force a cut in personal staff.

Republicans will enforce a one-third cut in committee staffs and eliminate three committees, steps it is estimated will save about \$35 million a year.

With the 104th Congress set to convene in four weeks, House Republican lawmakers were continuing their caucus today by formally naming committee chairmen, including Texan Bill

Archer at the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee and Robert Livingston of Louisiana as acting head of the Appropriations Committee.

In some cases, Gingrich decided to ignore the seniority system and elevate junior members he hopes will be more aggressive in carrying out the campaign "Contract With America."

Republicans are also expected to

formally ratify a proposed set of rules changes that the full House will adopt in January.

Republicans said their plan to cut off funding from so-called legislative service organizations would save \$5 million annually. There are now 28 such groups, including the black caucus, the arts caucus, the populist caucus and the space caucus, that use federal funds to hire staff, use House office equipment.

### HHS student shot in head with BB gun

A Hereford High School student was undergoing treatment at Hereford Regional Medical Center late Wednesday morning after he was shot in the forehead with a BB gun earlier in the day.

The student, whose name and age were not revealed pending a continuing police investigation, was shot in the middle of the forehead, said Capt. Pat Michael.

The student fell to the ground unconscious and suffered a broken rib. Michael said he also had a possible concussion. Superintendent Charles W. Greenawalt said the incident occurred along Union Street at about 7:45 a.m., before classes began.

A 17- or 18-year-old suspect has been taken into custody and a BB gun confiscated.

Additional information was not available and Michael said the investigation is continuing.

### Out-of-state bank branches opposed

AUSTIN (AP) - A special House committee has complained that large banks are siphoning capital from the state, and it recommended Texas reject a new federal interstate branch banking law.

The Committee on Small Business Access to Capital said Tuesday that one way to bring capital back to Texas is to "opt out" of the federal law.

The committee report said the state's five largest banks in Texas have more than 50 percent of the dollar amount of loan assets but make only one-third of the small business loans and 8 percent of agricultural loans.

The report referred to Nationsbank, Bank One, Texas Commerce Bank, First Interstate Bank and Bank of America.

"The big boys seem to operate like sump pumps, taking boat and car and home improvement loans, but not taking a chance on small businesses that create jobs and valuable services to the community," said state Rep.

Kim Brimer, R-Kennedale, co-chairman of the committee.

State lawmakers have until June 1, 1997, to get out of the federal law. In 1986, Texas allowed out-of-state banks to acquire Texas banks. The new interstate branch banking law will allow Texas bank charters to be converted to a branch of an out-of-state bank.

Brimer, Rep. Rene Oliveira, D-Brownsville, and other committee members say the new law will remove local control of out-of-state banks. No longer would out-of-state banks have local boards of directors under the new setup, Oliveira said.

That means fewer loans would be made to local businesses, he said.

Brimer and Oliveira said Texas should take advantage of a provision allowing it to opt out of the federal law.

However, John Heasley, president of the Texas Bankers Association, which represents the five largest banks, said leaving the federal law would hurt the economy.

### Guilty pleas heard in court

A defendant in 222nd District Court Tuesday was given a 10-year sentence on each of four charges against him.

Judge David Wesley Gulley ordered Gabriel Martinez, 18, to Texas Department of Criminal Justice special alternative incarceration program.

Martinez entered guilty pleas to three charges of burglary of a building and a forgery by making charge.

Three other defendants entered guilty pleas to charges against them and another defendant was sentenced in a continuation of court action on Nov. 15.

Alfredo Palacios, 20, entered a guilty plea on Nov. 15 on two charges of delivery of a controlled substance,

cocaine. Judge Gulley assessed a 10-year sentence and SAIP on one charge and granted deferred adjudication probation on the other charge.

Charged with indecency with a child, Jesse Aldrete Zepeda, 45, entered a plea of guilty. He was given eight years' deferred adjudication probation.

Juanita Vela, also known as Juanita Enriquez, entered a guilty plea to tampering with government records. She was sentenced to 10 years' probation and ordered to make restitution of \$14,573.50.

On a charge of aggravated sexual assault of a child, Abelardo Tamez was sentenced to 10 years' probation and fined \$500.

### Permit issued for well co.

A building permit has been issued to Dennis Hicks for construction of a new well service office on North U.S. 385.

The permit was issued on Friday for a new building for Hicks Well Service, at 608 N. 25 Mile Avenue.

Total cost listed on the permit is \$24,000, which includes a 40-foot by 50-foot building and 4,760-square-feet of parking space.

Estimated completion date for the project is April 2, 1995.



### Pork plant pitch draws good crowd

More than 200 persons attended a reception and dinner here Tuesday night as part of the Hereford Economic Development Corporation's bid to locate a pork processing plant in the county.

Those attending were presented with white caps, printed with the words: "PSF...Hereford Wants You." A PSF official said the site selection is expected before Christmas.

## Protection of rights cited by attorneys

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) - Defense attorneys insist they are seeking constitutional guarantees for serial rapist and condemned killer Samuel Hawkins and are not trying merely to delay his execution.

Hawkins, on death row for 17 years, got to within about eight hours of dying early today when the U.S. Supreme Court blocked his scheduled lethal injection. He was to have been executed for the 1977 killing of Abbe Rodgers Hamilton at her home in the Texas Panhandle community of Borger.

In his appeals, Hawkins, who is black, contended his father instructed him when he was growing up that the way to retaliate against white men was to attack white women.

And he contended the jury in his case was not allowed to consider that as mitigating evidence when it came time to sentence him to death.

"When the U.S. Supreme Court says the constitution means that you've got to give juries an opportunity to consider this type of evidence, it means just that," attorney Cliff Harrison said. "I don't think insisting on those constitutional rights applying to everyone is a delaying tactic."

Harrison said the courts may decide Hawkins should get a new trial.

"If they don't want to delay it any longer, then they can agree to a new trial, a constitutionally sound trial," he said. "We're not going to make it easy for them. We will not make it easy."

"I'm not sure I can tell you anything that would be fit to print," Hutchinson County District Attorney

Stephen Cross said. "I'm just sick about it."

The high court, in its ruling, told Texas authorities to put off the execution until it considers his pending appeal. The justices gave no timetable for a decision.

"I don't know what to say," said a disappointed Sandra Rodgers, mother of Abbe Hamilton.

Hawkins also was condemned for killing a 12-year-old Amarillo girl, Rhonda Keys, who was abducted from a school bus stop in 1976 and found dead in a culvert. Her skull had been bashed in with a steel pipe.

Hawkins was dubbed "the traveling rapist" because he was implicated in nearly 40 attacks in Texas, Oklahoma and Colorado.

Herman Clark, 48, a rapist who claimed responsibility for more than 100 attacks, was executed early Tuesday for killing a Houston man during a fight that broke out as he was trying to rape the man's girlfriend.

Hawkins, 51, a flesh trimmer at a meat processing plant, confessed to using a hunting knife to kill Mrs. Hamilton, 19, who was six months pregnant at the time.

Hawkins told police he was looking to rape someone and began checking doors of houses in Borger until he discovered one that was open.

He found Mrs. Hamilton asleep on her bed about 9 a.m. An hour later, she was dead, stabbed more than 20 times and with wounds to her neck so severe she was nearly decapitated.

The Texas attorney general's office believed Clark would be joined by Hawkins and a third man on the death chamber gurney this week.

A Houston man, Raymond Carl Kinnamon, 53, is set to die early Sunday for killing a 41-year-old man during the robbery of a Houston bar.

## Almost 100 offices to be closed in Texas in USDA streamlining

DALLAS (AP) - Texas will shutter almost 100 offices, taking one of the biggest hits in the Agriculture Department's announcement Tuesday that it is closing 1,070 field offices nationwide.

But it will keep 219 offices - far more than any other state.

The news received a mixed reaction in the Lone Star State, which will drop from 317 offices, a loss of 98. Other states losing a proportionally larger number of offices are Tennessee, Virginia and Georgia, which will be hit the hardest, losing 101 of 193 offices.

The plan tendered by Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy is part of a larger streamlining effort that could cut the agency's payroll by 11,000 people and save \$3.6 billion over five years.

The department says farmers will be better served by fewer locations, because service centers for commodity programs, crop insurance, loans and some conservation programs will be put under one roof. A new Consolidated Farm Service Agency will do most of the work of four.

Harold Bob Bennett, executive director of the Farm Service Agency in Texas, said the key is to focus the number of service centers that will be open.

"With (approximately) 220, we're going to be able to continue providing excellent service to our producers, and that's the point," he said. "To me, if we can become more efficient and still provide the service and save \$3.5 billion, by God let's do it."

All regions of the state will be affected, leaving some farmers to drive farther. But ultimately, they should spend much less time in an FSA office, Bennett said.

Not everyone was as enthusiastic about the reorganization, however.

"It's bad news for our agency,"

said Gail Chandler, a spokeswoman for the Natural Resources Conservation Service in Temple.

Because 42 NRCS offices will close or move and share offices with other USDA agencies, some demands may not be met, Ms. Chandler said.

"There's a possibility that we may not be able to, say, get up to someone's property to help them solve an erosion problem because we have 20 requests before that, and it's going to take several weeks to get there," she said.

Steve Pringle, legislative director for the Texas Farm Bureau, an association of farmers and ranchers, said the state fared well in the closures overall, although some will be unhappy.

"I think obviously there was a desire by everyone in the country to bring about more efficient service from the government," Pringle said. "Overall it would appear that these moves can increase the efficiency of USDA services and continue to maintain those services that farmers come to expect."

The offices sprouted up because of laws enacted in the Depression era, when 6.8 million farms operated nationwide. Today, the country has fewer than 2 million farms, fewest since before the Civil War.

Better highways and telecommunications also have made it easier for farmers to get information and reach government offices.

U.S. Rep. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, a member of the House Agriculture Committee, is cautiously optimistic.

Although he voted against the reorganization plan earlier this year, he said, "In an effort to save money where you can't justify keeping an office open, it's not right for me to complain or anyone else."

"We need to do what all we can to reduce costs."

## Movie 'Falcon' goes for \$398,500 at sale

NEW YORK (AP) - It might have been priceless in the classic 1941 movie, but the Maltese falcon drew a cold, hard sum at auction Tuesday: \$398,500.

The lead figurine was bought by Ronald Winston, president of Harry Winston jewelers in New York.

"I thought the sense of intrigue and the search for something valuable fit in very much with our company," Winston said.

Other top sellers at Christie's sale of movie memorabilia included Academy Awards for "Gone With the Wind" and "Casablanca" and a copy of Margaret Mitchell's book "Gone With the Wind" signed by cast members from the movie.

The foot-high, 50-pound falcon, one of two made for the film, came from the estate of William Conrad, an actor, producer and director who worked for Warner Bros. and received it as a token of appreciation from the studio.

In the "The Maltese Falcon," a villainous Sydney Greenstreet tells private eye Sam Spade, played by Humphrey Bogart, that there was no limit, in blood or

money, to the value of the jewel-filled falcon they were seeking.

A Maltese falcon figurine - touted as the genuine movie prop - had been offered for sale by Christie's once before, in June 1993. But it had to be withdrawn when its authenticity was challenged. That bird weighed only 5 pounds and experts said it could have been a lightweight replica made for Bogart to hold in publicity stills.

The other real falcon is owned by a Beverly Hills doctor, Christie's said.

Also sold at the auction was an Oscar statuette given to Victor Fleming for best director for "Gone With The Wind." It went for \$244,500. A best screenplay Oscar given to Howard Koch for "Casablanca" sold for \$184,000.

The "Gone With the Wind" volume sold for \$57,500, and a typed manuscript for the 1968 book "The Making of Star Trek" was sold for \$55,200.

Other than Winston, the buyers of the top five items were anonymous.

All prices include the commission charged by the auction house.

## Run for your health

Running is an excellent way to exercise, most fitness experts would agree. However the nutritional needs of runners may be greater than most people's, particularly when it comes to magnesium levels.

Magnesium is a nutrient that plays a key role in heart and muscle function, energy metabolism and protein synthesis. However magnesium, as well as the vital nutrients, is lost through perspiration during strenuous exercise. In fact, many

athletes have shown a significant decrease in blood levels of magnesium after competition. Studies suggest that the amount of magnesium lost may be significant, particularly if intake of the mineral is already low.

A recent Gallup survey found that of the 39 percent of all adults polled who regularly participate in aerobic exercise, 67 percent are already below the recommended dietary allowance for magnesium based on diet alone.

Getting magnesium through one's diet is not that easy, since many foods high in magnesium are also high in fat and sugar. Dietary sources of magnesium include: chocolate; nuts, dried beans (such as kidney beans and split peas); green, leafy vegetables; whole-grain breads and cereals, sunflower, pumpkin or sesame seeds; popcorn; bananas, milk or yogurt; and shellfish.

Many experts believe alternative sources of magnesium may be necessary for persons with dietary deficiencies of the mineral and those—such as runners and other endurance athletes—who lose it rapidly through regular, heavy perspiration.

"In studies we've done, magnesium supplementation with strength training has been shown to significantly increase muscle strength," says Lorraine Brilla, Ph.D. associate professor, Western Washington University and director, Center for Fitness Evaluation and Adult Fitness Program.

Magnesium supplements are available in several forms. A consensus panel of the American Diabetes Association recommended that people at high risk of a magnesium deficiency take a magnesium chloride supplement, a form of magnesium that's highly soluble and rapidly absorbed by the body.

If you're unsure if your magnesium needs are met, consult a healthcare professional who is knowledgeable in nutrition.

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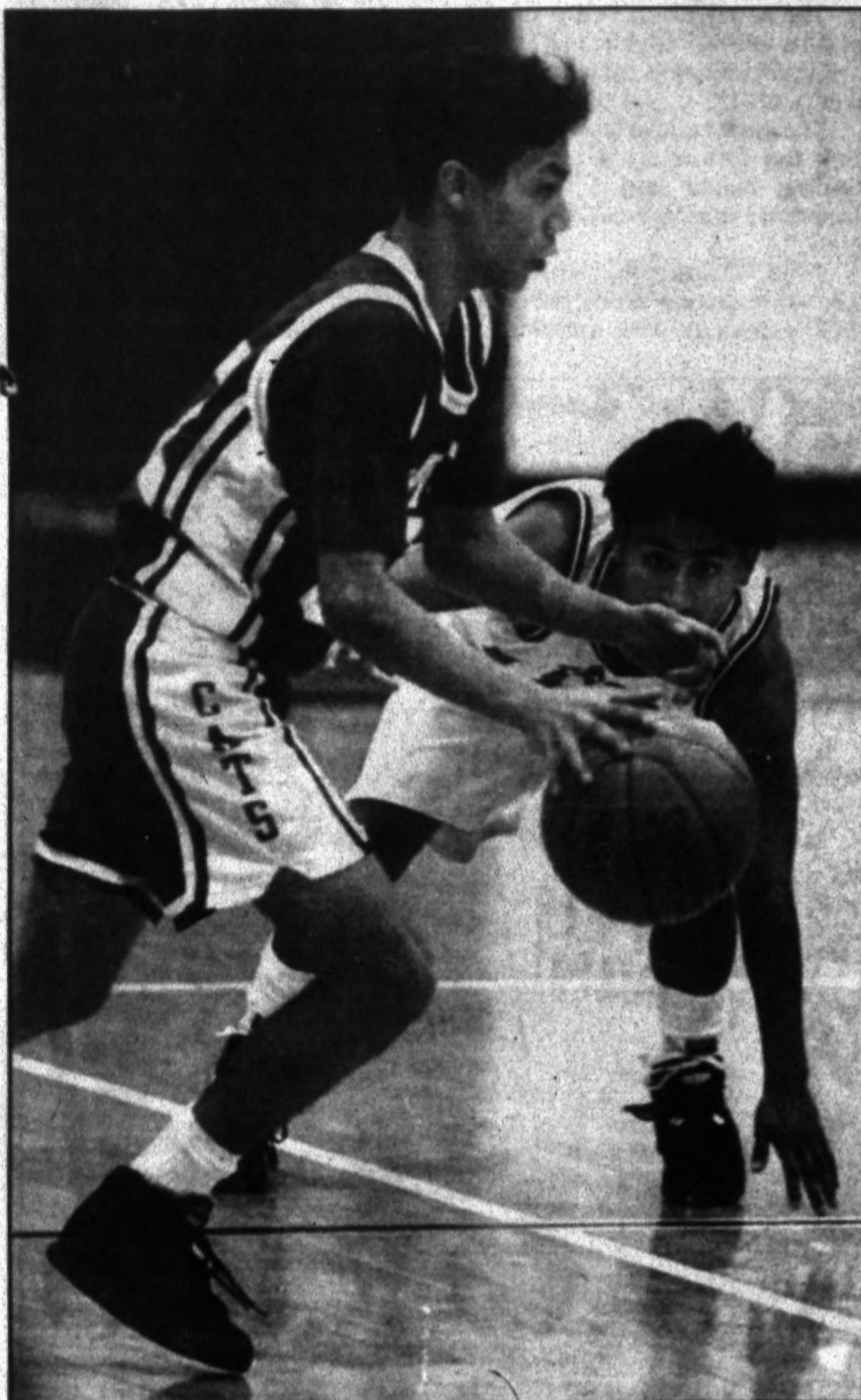

## Whitefaces rout Dimmitt; girls fall by four

Hereford's basketball teams followed up a bad weekend with a couple of fine performances against Dimmitt Tuesday in Whiteface Gym.

The Lady Whitefaces, who lost by 23 points Friday at Littlefield, came within a minute and a half of upsetting the Bobbies before falling 58-54 in the first game. Then the Hereford boys took out the frustrations of two losses in the Denver City Invitational with an 83-53 rout of the Bobcats, who never led in the game.

The Hereford boys improved their record to 4-4, while the girls fell to 6-3.

They played before the largest basketball crowd in Whiteface Gym in some time. Dimmitt brought its share of fans, and the Hereford side was swelled by halftime performances by the Hereford Stars—81 young boys and girls who've been practicing basketball fundamentals since mid-October.

The boys' game was tied at 2-2 until consecutive baskets by Ashley Noland started Hereford on a 10-2 run. The Herd kept piling on the points: a three-pointer by Michael Brown made it 17-6; a three-point play by Todd Dudley made it 25-10. Hereford led 26-14 at the end of the first quarter.

"We were really focused and ready to play," Herd coach Randy Dean said. "These guys responded to the challenge after last weekend's performance."

Hereford kept up the onslaught in the second quarter. Wade Backus hit two three pointers to open the quarter, and Hereford led 33-15. Back-to-back three-point plays by Dimmitt made it 35-24, but that was as close as the Bobcats would get.

The Herd went up 42-25 on a spectacular play that started with a length-of-the-court bullet pass from Noland to Benton Buckley, who hit Isaac Walker knifing through the lane for a layup. Walker was fouled and hit the free throw.

Hereford closed the quarter with three consecutive baskets—the third

another Backus try for a 51-28 halftime lead.

"Our offensive execution was outstanding in the first half," Dean said. "We did a good job of controlling the boards and giving them just one shot. That was a big key to the game."

A third-quarter lull killed the Herd's 100-point pace, although the Herd recovered in plenty of time. Dimmitt started the third quarter with an 11-0 run, as Hereford didn't score in the first six minutes.

"We came out and missed some easy shots, and we started firing a little quickly," Dean said. "That allowed them to creep back in it for a while. We turned it up on defense and shut their run down, then scored some baskets late to get the lead back up."

Walker broke the scoring drought with a put-back, then two straight layups by Buckley and one by Brown let Hereford close the quarter with a 59-39 lead.

The fourth quarter was more rout, as the Herd third-team outscored Dimmitt in the final minutes.

The girls' game was quite different. Dimmitt led for the entire first half: a 7-0 run in the first quarter gave the Bobbies a 15-8 lead, but Hereford closed it to 15-12 by the end of the quarter.

Dimmitt led by as much as 27-18 in the second quarter, but Julie Rampley had a basket and a free throw to lead a 6-0 Hereford run, closing the first half with Dimmitt leading 29-27.

Hereford coach Eddie Fortenberry

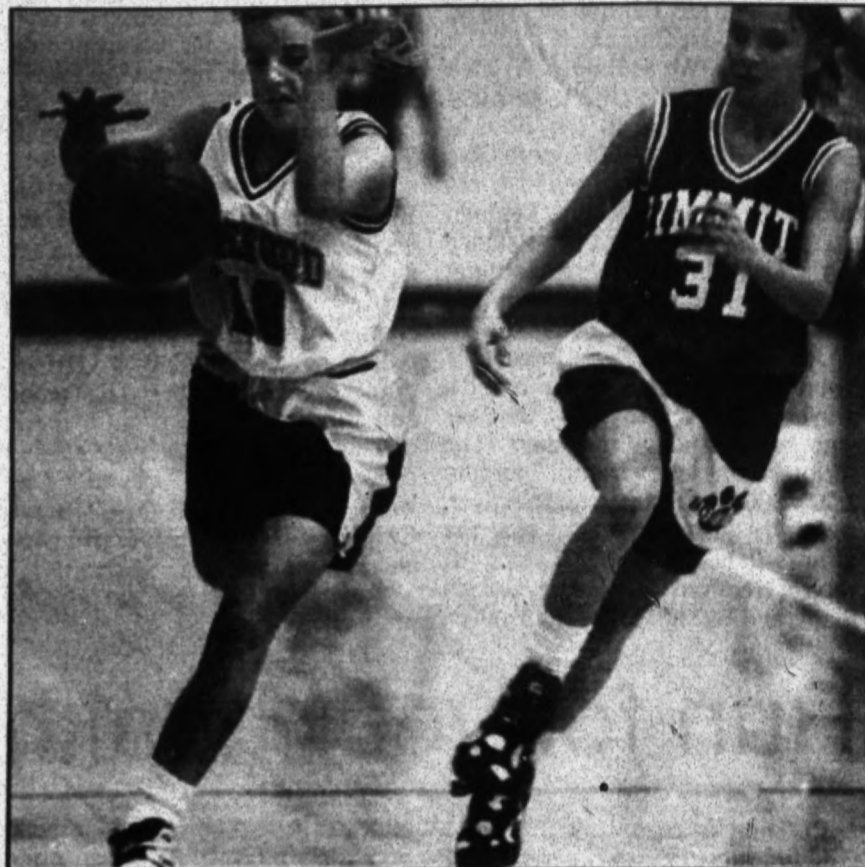

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# Feeding zoo animals more than serving 'bear chow'

VICTORIA, Texas - Rusty is hungry. It's shortly after 8 a.m., and the Texas Zoo's red wolf is pacing back and forth inside his chain-link home, eager to be fed.

But his wait won't be long. Although the zoo won't open to the public for almost two hours, already keepers are working to keep its 100-plus animals fed. The job entails more than just opening a bag of bear chow - or bobcat, raccoon or gator food, for that matter.

The keepers spend roughly six hours a day chopping fruit and vegetables, cutting up fish, weighing out meat, seeds and animal "chows" and combining various quantities of some or all the ingredients according to diet cards kept in a Rolodex.

"Food prep starts first thing in the morning, and it usually takes us all morning," keeper Sandra Hungerford says. The routine is repeated late in the afternoon.

Sherri Hornstein, the zoo's curator of animals, says the animals' regimen was arrived at through research, experimentation and consultation with other zoos. Ingredients range from ordinary canned cat food to commercially prepared "Bird of Prey Diet," and include most everything in between.

Hungerford makes her way to the wolves' cage, bringing each wolf about 10 ounces of meat and a cup of dog chow. Toward closing time, they'll get a second helping.

"Most of our animals get fed in the evening, but some of them get fed twice a day. Our cats get fed twice, our coyotes, wolves, shore birds, they all get fed twice," she says.

The animals' diets vary from season to season. With winter approaching, the black bears now get about three times their daily summer ration of five cups of dog chow, three apples and four carrots each.

"Usually we try to let them put on a little extra weight for winter, especially those who don't have heated quarters," Hornstein says.

The zoo, which has struggled financially in recent years, relies on donations and bargain shopping for a lot of its food. Sam's Club, for example, donates fruits and vegetables that otherwise wouldn't be sold.

"They have to throw it away because it's bruised or is going back," Hungerford says. "We have to go and pick through it and see what we want. But they've saved us a lot of money that way."

Harwell's slaughterhouse donates blood for the zoo's vampire bats, who consume about half a gallon a week.

Although vampire bats' saliva contains an anti-coagulant that enables them to feed in the wild, Hungerford explains that the blood they're served at the zoo contains a mixture of dextrose, sodium citrate and other additives to prevent it from clotting in storage.

"Once it starts going bad, the bats won't eat it."

It's Tuesday afternoon, and one of the zoo's most frequent visitors is walking the grounds with Hornstein, asking about each animal. But Tom Culberson's questions aren't simply idle curiosity. The Victoria veterinarian is there to see which animals need medical attention.

"Sherri does the day-in, day-out monitoring of the animals, I'm just here once a week. So I have to rely on the keepers' observations to know whether there's anything wrong with anybody," says Culberson. "Most of the time, it's just a rounds-type situation, just walking around and seeing what they're like."

On this day, the only animals requiring treatment are a red-eared slider - a kind of turtle - with growth above one of its eyes, and a cattle egret with most of its right wing missing.

The egret, which was brought in earlier in the day, seems generally OK, and Culberson is able to examine the bird with little difficulty. The turtle, however, has drawn its head inside its shell and refused to let the vet see what's wrong, despite, or perhaps because of, Culberson's prodding with a ball point pen.

Treating the zoo's animals has been an educational experience for Culberson, who graduated from Texas A&M University in 1978.

"You can get a real good education in exotics now. Back then, it just wasn't that developed," he says.

Most of what he knows about treating the zoo's animals, he learned while working with Scott McMurray, the zoo's vet until Culberson took over in 1984.

"He learned it the same way - day-in, day-out, hands-on experience," he says. "A lot of the time it's just common sense. You just extrapolate the domestic animal treatment into the exotics."

But working by trial and error can have tragic results, as Culberson and the zoo learned in the mid-1980s, when a gray wolf died after receiving canine distemper vaccine.

"Their system just can't handle it."

The zoo's wolves no longer receive the vaccine, and Culberson stresses the importance of consulting with vets at other zoos, who are more likely to have specialized training.

"When you run across a problem, try to figure out what's going on or call an expert," he says. "A lot of the time, I just have to call people."

Heather Haschke never thought she'd be a zoo keeper. Then, at age 13, her mother told her about the Texas Zoo's student volunteer program, which puts teen-agers to work assisting keepers for two weeks in the summer.

"I always liked animals, and I thought it would be fun to do," Haschke says. "I didn't start out thinking I'd get a job. I started because I wanted to work with animals."

A year after Haschke started at the zoo, she was joined by 14-year-old Stephanie Bagnall, who'd heard about the program from friends who volunteered the previous summer.

Both girls continued volunteering at the zoo on weekends and during school holidays. When the zoo opened a petting corral three years ago, Haschke was hired to tend its sheep, goats and pigs.

About the same time, Bagnall took a part-time job in the gift shop. In August 1993, she was hired full-time as a keeper.

"I knew when I started volunteer-

ing that I wanted to work with animals, but I wanted to be a veterinarian. After my first two or three weeks were up, I knew that I wanted to work with wild animals, not domestics," Bagnall said. "But I didn't think I'd end up working here."

After two years working part-time in the petting corral and gift shop, Haschke left for a year of college, only to return to the zoo in June. "I decided to become a full-time zoo keeper and go to school at night."

The job is anything but glamorous. "But I love it," she says while hosing down the pelicans' moat. "I

wouldn't mind doing this for a while."

Haschke figures she'll spend another year or so at the zoo then go back to college full-time, possibly to study wildlife management.

"I'm not sure if I want to work at a zoo or not. Maybe at a wildlife refuge."

Bagnall, who believes there's a zoo in her future, likes working at the Texas Zoo because keepers aren't assigned to specific parts of the zoo.

"It makes me feel good that I'm able to help wildlife. It's something different. Not everybody does it," Bagnall says.

## Weight-loss industry need to shape-up

WASHINGTON (AP)—Americans spend more than \$33 billion a year to lose weight and yet a third of adults are still too fat, according to scientists who say the weight-loss industry needs to shape up.

The scientists, who have produced new guidelines on safe and effective dieting, are urging the industry to disclose the true effectiveness of everything from diet guidebooks to Jenny Craig programs.

"The current system is chaos," said Dr. Arthur Frank of George Washington University, co-author of the guidelines. "None of these programs gives any information."

The Institute of Medicine, an arm of the National Academy of Sciences, assembled a panel of experts to study obesity. The conclusion: 35 percent of women and 31 percent of men are obese, despite spending over \$33 billion a year on weight-loss products and programs.

The few who complete weight-loss programs lose 10 percent of their body weight, the panel reported.

Even that small amount is healthful, said former Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, who today was launching a "Shape Up America!" campaign that aims to sell Americans on the benefits of even modest losses.

"Eat sensibly. Exercise regularly. Drop a few pounds. Shape up," Koop advises.

The problem is, Americans can't keep the pounds off. The average dieter regains two-thirds of lost weight within one year and almost all within five years, the expert panel reported.

"We have an epidemic of obesity in this country among adults and children," said panel chairwoman Judith Stern of the University of California, Davis. "They need tools for making better decisions about how to lose weight."

The panel called on weight-loss programs to issue comprehensive data about who they serve and what results they achieve so dieters can pick the best program for themselves.

But Frank, who wants such programs to go a step further and be accredited, acknowledged the request is purely voluntary because the weight-loss industry is largely unregulated.

Jenny Craig, one of the largest weight-loss organizations with 820 centers worldwide, labeled the report "a national call to action," but said it would do no good unless every company complied.

Jenny Craig wouldn't say if it would release the type of success data the Institute of Medicine wants. But it said it already carefully screens patients' health to ensure it enrolls them in proper programs, under a doctor's supervision if necessary.

Dieters can choose from do-it-yourself efforts that consist of diet books and support groups, non-clinical programs such as Jenny Craig that use counselors to teach weight loss and nutrition, or clinical programs where licensed doctors may offer drugs or surgery.

Different patients require different care, and currently have little guidance, the panel said. A 26-year-old in good health who just wants to shed 15 pounds could do fine with a do-it-yourself program or a

non-clinical program, Frank said. But a 330-pound person with diabetes and heart disease "has no business going to Jenny Craig," he maintained.

The panel urged that: --Dieters carefully assess their individual needs and pick a program with a matching consumer profile.

--Companies publicize patients' long-term weight loss, improvements in obesity-related co-diseases and improved health practices so dieters can compare results.

--Companies require that lactating women, children and patients with any chronic disease undertake weight loss only under some medical supervision.

--Dieters ask a trusted health-care provider if the program is sound and appropriate. Check the required diet, which should contain enough protein to maintain nitrogen balance and limit the loss of lean body mass. Exercise should gradually progress up to an hour of moderate-intensity activity a day.

--Dieters remember that programs promising results without dieting and exercise won't work.

--Dieters carefully assess their health before and during weight loss. Even healthy people who lose weight too quickly on very low-fat diets run a risk of such problems as gallbladder disease.

Cody Dwane Wimberly, son of Paula F. Robinson of Hereford and Thomas J. Wimberly, is a senior at HHS and has joined the Delayed Entry Program.

Wimberly will report July 20, 1995 to begin basic training at Fort Jackson, S.C. He has committed to four years' service and asked for advanced individual training as a personnel administration specialist.

NEW YORK (AP) - Michael Douglas wants to clarify his former addiction. It was to alcohol - not sex.

The actor said false reports of a sex addiction grew out of his roles in "Basic Instinct" and "Fatal Attraction."

"These characters were sexually driven. The media got this great handle from the film and rode with it. I can't believe people are so titillated by this," Douglas said in the January issue of Vanity Fair.

Douglas said he entered Arizona's Sierra Tucson clinic to deal with the effects of a "cumulative lifestyle" that included excessive drinking.

He was vague on the details. "I went into rehab to save my marriage, but I wound up saving myself," he said.

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## Make-ahead recipe great for holiday entertaining

Holiday entertaining can be hectic, and sometimes it is hard to plan an event because there are so many other things scheduled for the season.

Many hosts and hostesses are planning a relaxed brunch for family or friends instead of a traditional evening party. By doing as much of the preparation as possible ahead of time, it is easy to serve a delicious and elegant meal and still have time for your guests.

Time-saving steps from making cinnamon-roll dough the night before and simply heating before serving can be a snap.

### MAKE-AHEAD CINNAMON ROLLS

- 2/3 cup water
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 package active dry yeast

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons nonfat dry milk powdered
- 1 egg
- 1 1/4-1 3/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, softened
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon
- Sugar Icing
- Candied cherries, optional

Heat water and butter to 120 degrees. Combine 1 1/2 cups flour, yeast, sugar, salt, dry milk, egg and warm water mixture in small mixer bowl. Knead for 3 to 5 minutes. Add 1 1/4 cups flour and continue kneading. If dough is sticky, knead in enough of remaining 1/2 cup flour to form a stiff dough. Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease top. Cover and let rise in a warm place until doubled, about 30 minutes. Punch down. Roll dough into 15 x 10 inch rectangle on lightly floured surface. Spread with butter. Mix sugar and cinnamon; sprinkle over butter. Beginning at 15-inch side, roll up tightly and pinch edges to seal. Cut into 17 pieces, about 3/4-inch each. Place a small oven-proof custard cup inverted in center of 12-inch pizza pan. Lightly oil pan and cup. Place the remaining 11 cinnamon rolls around the outside of the first ring. Cover with plastic wrap and place in refrigerator overnight.

Remove rolls from refrigerator, allow to rise at room temperature until doubled, about 30 minutes. Bake in preheated 375 degree oven for 25-30 minutes. Remove from oven and place on platter. Glaze with Sugar Icing while warm. Garnish with candied cherries.

### SUGAR ICING

- 2 tablespoons light cream or milk
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 3/4 cup powdered sugar

Place cream, vanilla and half the sugar in a small bowl. Mix until sugar is moistened. Add remaining sugar and process until smooth.

"He took me from a boy to a man," the Orlando Magic star raps. "Phil is my father, 'cause my biological didn't bother."

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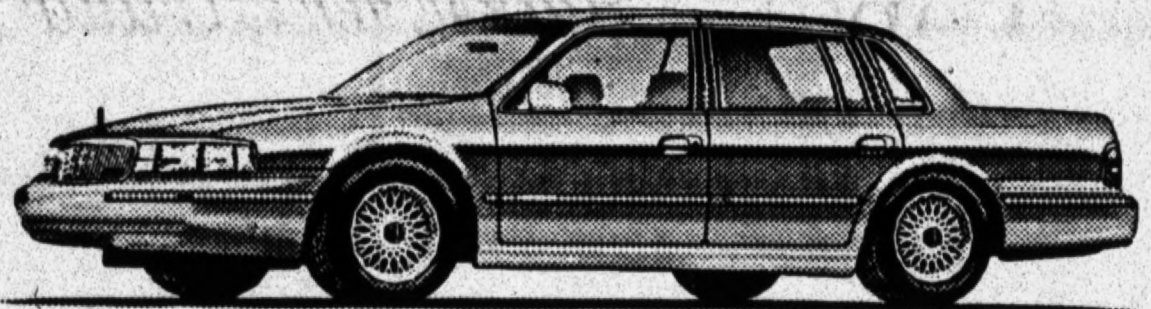
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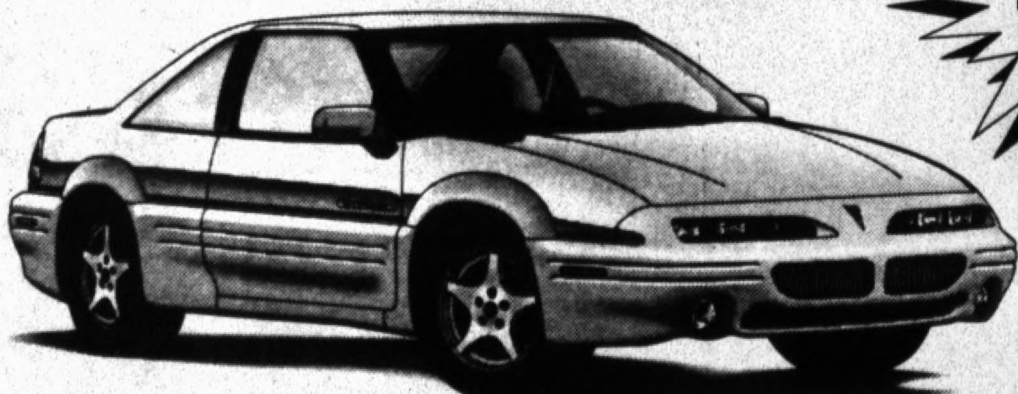
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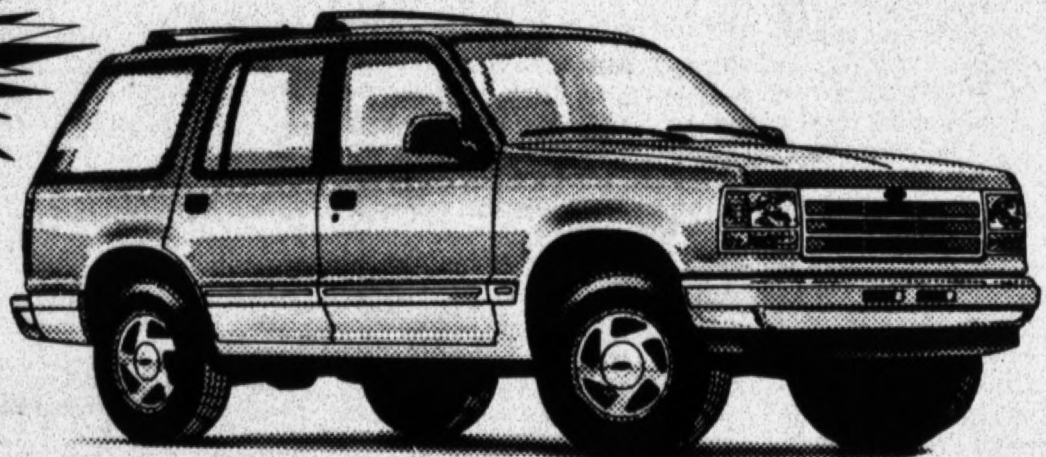


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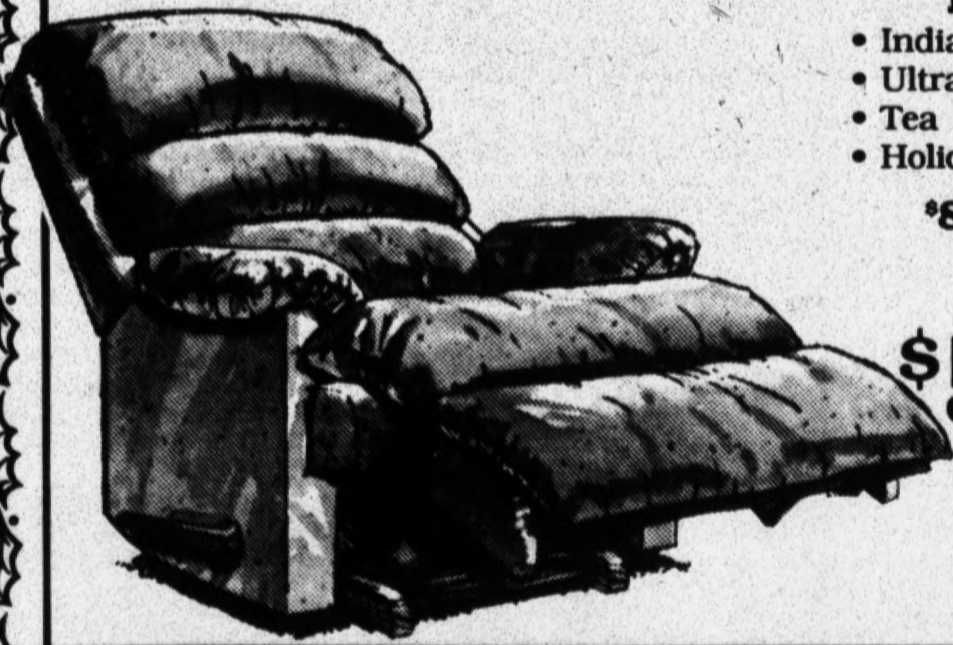
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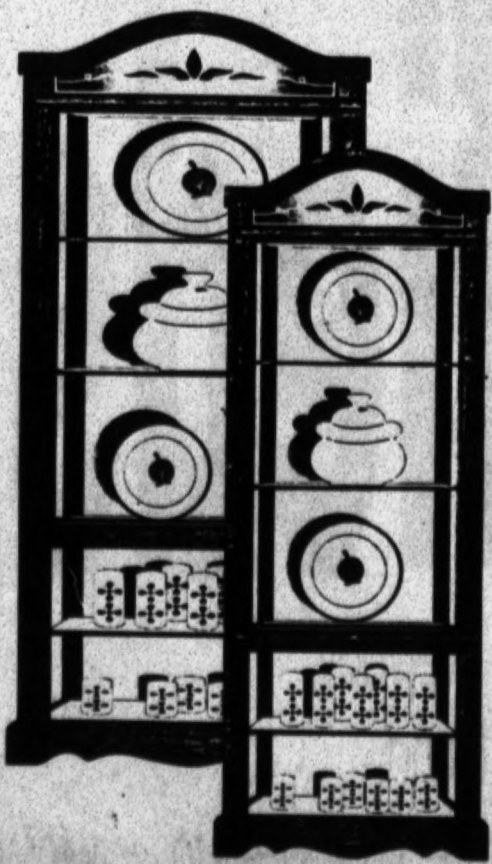
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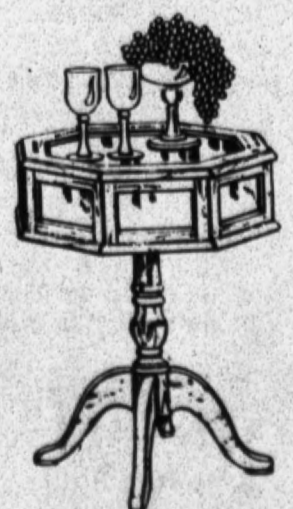

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# High citrus yields reported; areas of state need rain

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — The South Texas citrus crop continues its comeback from the 1989 freeze, and the 1994 crop is providing excellent quality and higher yields, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

Ray Prewett, executive vice president with Texas Citrus Mutual in Weslaco, said the citrus harvest is in full swing for South Texas. Prewett said recent estimates indicate that grapefruit numbers should increase between 20 and 30 percent, and oranges may be looking at an increase of as much as 87 percent. Last year, Texas producers harvested around 6.5 million 40-pound cartons of oranges and grapefruits.

"We're going to be seeing a lot of fruit in Texas this year," he said. "However if we don't get our prices up, things could get difficult for producers."

Prewett explained that Florida's

record crop is putting a lot of pressure on prices.

"The middle of last season we started seeing some severe price pressures so we expected this season to be tough," he said. "But it is turning out to be tougher than we expected."

Prewett said he hopes prices rise because this looks to be the best citrus crop since the freeze of 1989, which devastated the citrus industry in Texas.

Parts of Central Texas are still harvesting peanuts, and producers say this crop may not be as good as last year's.

Dr. George Alston, Extension agronomist in Stephenville, said with over half of the peanut harvest completed, many producers are seeing lower quality and yields.

"This fall's rainy weather didn't benefit peanut farmers," Alston said. "Many lost peanuts because they

were unable to get in the field to harvest.

"One producer, who has lost 500 pounds so far, said he is not alone," he said. "Farmers are losing the cream of their crop because of the weather."

Alston said mild weather has benefited peanut producers.

"If the first freeze had hit in mid-November, like it usually does, farmers would have lost more of their crop to freeze damage," Alston said.

Alston added that he is unable to estimate a yield number until more of the crop is harvested.

For producers in Southwest Texas, rainy weather this season played a part in their flourishing pastures and ranges.

Jose Pena, Extension economist in Uvalde, said the region has reported 11.5 inches of rain over the last three months, almost twice its 6.6 during the same period.

"Most of the area needed it," Pena said. "But some of our crops did suffer, primarily spinach, pecans and peanuts."

In the Panhandle, cotton and sorghum producers have almost completed harvesting, with yields and quality looking good.

Paul Gross, Extension director in Amarillo, said harvesting in the Panhandle should be complete with another week of favorable conditions.

"After the harvests are finished, we need rain," Gross said. "Our wheat pastures are providing good grazing, but they need moisture to improve growth."

Jon Zeidler, meteorologist at the National Weather Service Agricultural Service Center in College Station, said moist Gulf air will keep conditions muggy across most of the state through Thursday.

"The exception to this will be the High Plains, where cool weather will

last through the weekend," Zeidler said.

A cold front will move through Texas on Friday and Saturday, bringing widely scattered showers and cooler temperatures to most locations. High temperature will range from the 50s in the High Plains to the mid-80s in the Lower Rio Grande Valley and South Texas. Low temperature will vary from the 40s in the High Plains to the low 70s in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by district Extension directors:

PANHANDLE: Soil moisture short. Pastures, ranges in good condition. Cotton, sorghum harvests near completion. Wheat pastures need rain. Preparing land for spring planting.

SOUTH PLAINS: Soil moisture short. Pastures, ranges need rain. Sorghum harvest complete. Wheat, small grains progressing; need moisture. Supplemental feeding for livestock continues.

ROLLING PLAINS: Soil moisture

short to adequate. Pastures, ranges improving with moisture. Harvesting cotton, peanuts. Wheat planting near completion. Livestock in fair to good condition.

NORTH TEXAS: Soil moisture surplus to adequate. Pastures, ranges in fair to good condition. Harvesting cotton, soybeans, peanuts, pecans. Planting oats, wheat. Livestock in good condition; supplemental feeding continues.

EAST TEXAS: Soil moisture adequate. Pastures, ranges benefiting from rain. Small grains, ryegrass progressing. Harvesting pecans; yields low. Winter pastures need moisture.

FAR WEST TEXAS: Soil moisture very short to adequate. Pastures, ranges in good condition. Harvesting dryland cotton, pecans. Wheat progressing. Cutting, baling hay. Livestock in fair condition; supplemental feeding continues.

WEST CENTRAL TEXAS: Soil moisture short to surplus. Pastures, ranges in excellent condition. Harvesting pecans; low yields. Wet conditions delaying cotton harvest.
