No recession expected

'Soft landing' best bet for economy in 1995

WASHINGTON (AP)—The U.S. economy is expected to slow down next year but does not appear headed for recession, economists say.

"A 'soft landing' but no recession is still the best bet," said Robert J. Eggert Sr., who conducts a monthly survey of business forecasters for Blue Chip Economic Indicators. The Sedona, Ariz., newsletter was released today.

Soft landing refers to slowing the economy without braking it into a recessionary nose dive—the goal of the Federal Reserve in boosting interest rates six times so far this year.

By slowing economic growth to about 2.5 percent annually, the central bank hopes to keep inflation under control. The gross domestic product, the broadest measure of economic activity, was growing at a brisk 3.9 percent annual rate during

the July-September quarter.

Fed Chairman Alan Greenspan told Congress earlier this week that although prices at the consumer level remain well-behaved, inflationary pressures are beginning to show up in the cost of some raw materials.

Many analysts read into his remarks the possibility the Fed might nudge rates even higher unless price strains ease.

The Blue Chip economists, however, see little inflation ahead.

The consensus of the 53 participants in the survey earlier this month calls for year-over-year inflation of 2.7 percent in 1994 and 3.4 percent in 1995. Consumer prices rose 2.7 percent last year, the smallest gain since a 1.1 percent increase in 1986.

That prediction comes despite a consensus forecast for economic growth of 3.9 percent this year, the survey's highest projection so far this

year and up from 3.8 percent in the November poll.

"More than 80 percent of the 53 economists ... raised their 1994 real GDP forecast," Eggert said. Real GDP is the gross domestic product, the total output of goods and services within the United States, adjusted for inflation.

"Many cited the government's upward revision to the third quarter growth rate, the continued sharp gains in employment and the November rise in disposable personal income," he said.

The government changed its initial growth estimate for the third quarter from a 3.4 percent annual rate to 3.9 percent and said that 350,000 jobs were created in November. Disposable personal income—income after taxes—jumped 1.4 percent.

The consensus forecast sees economic growth decelerating to 2.9 percent in 1995.

Treasure of old Christmas decorations uncovered here

Grandchildren and great-grandchildren of a Hereford woman have a treat in store for Christmas.

Each one will receive a Christmas decoration from a boxful saved by Gladys Miller since she was a young woman.

Some of the decorations, Mrs. Miller is certain, are more than 60 years old. The "newest" probably are 40 years old.

Her daughter, Joy Dones, went on a hunting expedition in Mrs. Miller's home and found a veritable treasure trove of antique decorations.

Among the items are several decorations that can be dated as far back as pre-World War II, observed Dones.

Looking on the bottom of a crude three-inch high Santa Claus, the "Made in Japan" stamp still is readable. And, the same is true for a silver cardboard bell.

Dones found more than 100 decorations, most of them with faded and chipped paint, but unbroken.

Her restoration project was a labor of love for her mother and the family. "I spent a day stripping paint off," she pointed out. Then, she used acrylic paints to put new designs on the glass balls.

Some of the glass balls were readily identifiable as older than others.

"See these in colored glass -- they're older than the clear ones," said Dones.

Miller, by her own admission a "pack rat," kept things that others might have discarded quickly.

Dones found a store of tiny pine cones in two cheese boxes. Gladys Miller and her husband, H.E. Miller, collected the cones in Colorado 45 years ago.

"My husband died the next year and I never got around to using them," observed the 90-year-old Hereford woman.

Dones found something to do with them. She arranged the cones and red ribbon on candleholders to make a memory candleholder for the grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Among Miller's treasures, too, is a collection of miniature pitchers that she accumulated through the years.

Dones estimated that some of the pitchers are 50 to 60 years old, basing her conclusion on "they've been packed away for 40 years."

The pitchers are a reminder for Dones of her childhood when she admired, but didn't touch, them.

A yule log redecorated by Dones features candles in the shape of angels, another reminder of a time past, probably more than 60 years ago.

Shirley sixth-grade classes perform play for 'adventure'

Call it a case of "Victorian England meets Hereford, Texas."

Or perhaps "How to Translate Class Work into Something Your Sixth Graders Will Remember."

Whatever it's called, it has certainly been an adventure for the Shirley Intermediate School sixth grade classes, as they have worked for several weeks to learn, practice, produce and get ready to perform Charles Dickens' classic "A Christmas Carol."

On a recent afternoon, students arrived at the Stanton Special Populations Center auditorium shortly after lunch for their daily play rehearsal.

The only public performance of the play will be at 7 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 15, in the Stanton auditorium. The performance will be open to

the public and admission is two cans of food or one new or good condition used toy, which will be donated to the American Red Cross.

On this day, however, the students were not thinking about the formal performance of their play.

Instead, some were trying to get into their costumes for the dress rehearsal.

Others were flashing spotlights across the stage, showing backup lighting technicians (and friends) how to operate the massive lights mounted in the balcony.

Still others just sat in the seats, trying to get a few extra minutes of talking done before the serious rehearsal began.

On stage, director and teacher Chandra Davis was trying to find a substitute light man — student director and lighting technician Javier Alonso was absent that day and

someone had to operate the on-stage lights.

One by one the 20 costumed actors struggled into the auditorium, looking something like Dickens' depiction of Victorian England, but still acting like sixth graders.

"We work on themes over at our school," Davis said.

The theme for this nine-week term -- Shirley is the only school in town operating on the nine-week quarterly system rather than six six-week grading periods -- is "Adventures."

"There wasn't any more of an adventure than to do a play," she said.

To satisfy academic requirements, sixth grade teachers at Shirley incorporated "A Christmas Carol" into their regular studies.

For example, Davis said, social studies lessons focused on Europe.

State tries to calm TexPool investors

AUSTIN (AP)--State officials are trying to calm investor fears after a "run on the bank" on a Texas government investment fund.

Some \$348 million was withdrawn by investors from the state Treasury-run TexPool Friday after a newspaper said the fund had some of the same risks as the troubled Orange County, Calif., investment fund.

Investors deposited \$42 million in the fund Friday, leaving a net decline for the day of \$306 million, or 8.4 percent of the fund. The pool had total investments of \$3.3 billion after the day's withdrawals.

State Treasurer Martha Whitehead said Friday the withdrawals were caused by anguish over the Orange County bankruptcy and an article in The Wall Street Journal that said TexPool had some of the same risks as the Orange County fund.

However, she said, "TexPool is sound and will remain sound."

TexPool is a short-term investment fund for more than 1,300 governmental entities, such as cities, counties, municipal utility districts and school districts.

"We did not anticipate or believe that our investors would panic, and the events with the Orange County bankruptcy and The Wall Street Journal exacerbated this process," Mrs. Whitehead said.

She said the newspaper article "erred in several respects."

"Orange County issued debt in order to purchase bonds. We do not do that by any stretch of the

imagination." She also said that TexPool's investment strategy is extremely conservative.

Paul Steiger, managing editor of The Wall Street Journal, said: "I'm not sure that I know what the quarrel is with our story."

The newspaper also noted that TexPool had \$75 million of derivative securities.

Derivatives that fell in value when interest rates rose caused Orange County to declare bankruptcy this week. Derivatives constituted 42 percent of Orange County's dissenting holdings--as opposed to 2 percent of TexPool's.

Mrs. Whitehead said TexPool sold its derivatives Friday, although she and Assistant Deputy Treasurer John Bell said they didn't know how much they were sold for or to whom.

She said TexPool's derivatives weren't a problem, but since the Orange County debacle, they have become a buzzword for risky investments.

Bell added, "Derivative is not a problem. Everybody would like to believe that it's a problem. The problem is basically a run on the bank."

Mrs. Whitehead said she hoped that withdrawals would slow down Monday.

She said withdrawals from TexPool had been high since reports of Orange County's bankruptcy but that she had figures only from Friday's withdrawals.

The Ghost of Christmas Past is played by Salina Hastings, while the jovial Ghost of Christmas Present is Tessa Baker.

The unpeaking yet dominating Ghost of Christmas Yet to Come is played by Betty Garcia.

Other students have rolls as background players, including the Crachit family, Old Man Fezzewig and his employees, carolers on the street and others.

Regents vote to admit men to TWU

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP)--Another gender barrier has fallen as the Texas Woman's University regents have voted to admit men to all undergraduate degree programs for the first time in the school's 91-year history.

The regents voted 6-1 on Friday to change the admissions policy to allow men in all its 161 academic programs. The lone dissenting vote was cast by a male regent, Don Reynolds, who called the vote "agonizing."

About 100 angry protesters demonstrated against the proposal before the vote. Some held signs reading, "Support women at TWU. No new policy!" and "It's white male paranoia, stupid!"

TWU had been the larger of the last two state-supported universities in the nation with a predominantly female student body. The other,

Foes celebrate firing of Elders

WASHINGTON (AP)--The foes of Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders' social views are celebrating her firing by President Clinton. But Elders, defiant to the end, said she does not regret saying school children should be taught about masturbation and suggested that her remarks were misinterpreted.

"People have taken a lot of things I've said in a most unusual way," she said Friday in a telephone interview from her home outside Washington.

Incoming House Speaker Newt Gingrich, who has repeatedly assailed Elders' views, called her "a remarkably destructive person" who has long deserved removal from office.

And Rep. Marge Roukema of New Jersey, the most senior Republican woman in the House, said, "Great! What took her so long?" after Clinton demanded and received Elders' resignation.

White House Chief of Staff Leon Panetta said Clinton acted because Elders had ignored repeated warnings from administration officials to moderate her public statements. "This was one too many," he said.

He cited previous Elders statements in which she said the government should consider legalizing drugs, consider "teaching five-year olds to use condoms" and for saying that anti-abortion Catholics have "a love affair" with fetuses.

Her firing stemmed from her remarks Dec. 1 at a World AIDS Day conference in New York, when she was asked whether taboos about the public discussion of masturbation should be lifted.

Elders said: "As per your specific question in regard to masturbation, I think that is something that is a part of human sexuality and it's a part of something that perhaps should be

Elders said on Friday she had intended to explain her belief that masturbation is a natural act that would have to be included in any comprehensive discussion about human sexuality. But she does not believe young people should be taught how to masturbate.

"Heavens, no. That's not what I was trying to say. You can't teach people how to do that, just like you can't teach them how to have sex," she said.

"I don't regret what I said," she told The Associated Press. "I could have said it better."

Elders, who served in Clinton's Cabinet in Arkansas, pointedly refused to characterize her discussion with the president, although her resignation letter said she and Clinton still share a "strong mutual respect for each other."

Elders said in her letter that she planned to return to Arkansas and speak out on social issues.

Sen. Nancy Kassebaum, R-Kan., the incoming head of the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee, called Elders' resignation "necessary and long overdue."

"Throughout her tenure in office, Dr. Elders has engendered needless controversy -- due largely to her tendency to make dramatic statements on issues which she has not fully considered and which are peripheral to the public health mission," Kassebaum said.



Two Panhandle transportation proposals to receive funding

The Texas Transportation Commission has announced that it selected two Panhandle projects to be funded in part by the statewide transportation enhancement program.

The commission authorized \$42.5 million -- or up to 80 percent of the total of the 82 projects statewide -- to fund the work. Project sponsors are responsible for raising the remaining costs.

In this area, the projects chosen were restoration of the Magnolia Gas Station on U.S. 385 in Vega and work on a 13-block segment of Route 66 in Amarillo.

They were among 470 nominations from local and regional groups and are designed to enhance a broad range of transportation-related issues, including bicycle and pedestrian facilities, beautification, historic preservation and water quality protection.

The Vega project calls for restoration of the Magnolia/Conoco Service Station, which is located on the former U.S. 66 in Vega. The building will not be staffed, and thus will not be open to the public. However, items interpreting the history of this early service station will be visible from the windows.

Trees, picnic benches and interpretive signs will be placed near the station as well.

The station is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

Federal funds allocated by the Texas Transportation Commission will be \$44,757, with the remaining \$11,189 to be raised by the Vega Board of City Development, which sponsored the project.

In Amarillo, the funds will be used to rehabilitate and widen existing

pedestrian sidewalks and add trees along a 13-block segment of Route 66.

The federal funds TTC allocated are \$420,800, with the city of Amarillo responsible for raising \$105,200.

The program was created in 1991 when the federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act became law.

V-22 Osprey dodges major Pentagon funding reduction

WASHINGTON (AP) — The North Texas defense establishment dodged a bullet Friday as the Pentagon announced \$7.7 billion in weapons programs cuts and delays that touch only lightly on Texas-built systems.

The chief beneficiary in Texas is the V-22 Osprey, which just four months ago appeared on a possible termination list drawn up by a Defense Department squeezed by tight budgets.

Amid the roster of cuts and delays announced Friday by Defense Secretary William Perry, the Marine Corps' V-22 suffered only slightly. By contrast, the Pentagon signaled its intent to severely cut back the Army's Comanche helicopter and cancel two Navy destroyers and the Tri-Service Standoff Attack Missile.

The V-22, jointly developed by Bell Helicopter Textron in Fort Worth and Boeing's helicopter division in Pennsylvania, will sustain a change in production schedule designed to save \$100 million over six years.

Bell Helicopter Textron officials breathed a sigh of relief that their program — expected to deliver 523 V-22s to the Marine Corps and special forces at a cost of \$30 billion —

survived elimination.

"This is extremely good news," said spokesman Terry Arnold in Fort Worth. "Anytime you are on a list like (the V-22) was and budget realities are what they are you have to do everything possible to make sure your program keeps going."

A second weapons program with significant ties to North Texas — the Air Force's future F-22 fighter — will sustain a reduction in 1996 research and development funding that will result in a two-month delay in the plane's operational debut.

The Pentagon said the delay will save \$200 million over six years.

Initially, a four-year delay had been contemplated, which F-22 backers said would have jeopardized the fighter's future.

"This is going to have only a marginal impact on the program because we do have some existing funds from previous years that will be available," Perry said of the 10 percent funding reduction.

But a Lockheed Aeronautical Systems Co. statement said the funding cut, coupled with a \$110 million reduction in this year's budget, "will obviously have an impact on the program."

GATT opposed for variety of reasons

GATT, the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, should have been presented to Congress as legislation for fair and free trade in the best interests of America. I am consistent in my support on behalf of free trade. However, I opposed this legislation for many fundamental reasons.

This legislation, which would place Congressional approval on GATT, broke faith with promises that the legislation would only regard trade. The manhandling and mishandling of the implementing legislation submitted to Congress added to a climate of public distrust which led to downright hostility.

Most important, I received overwhelming opposition to GATT from my employer—the constituents of the 19th District.

After seven years, the United States had shaped an agreement with 123 countries to drop the tremendously costly trade barriers against U.S. goods. From my ranking position on the House Agriculture and the Small Business subcommittees, I heard testimony from U.S. trade negotiators as well as GATT opponents. More important than just reading through GATT's 22,000 pages, we each studied many different areas of interest to our constituents.

My staff and I thoroughly researched and investigated all of the concerns which were raised through the numerous phone calls, letters and faxes I received.

The American public was not reassured and there were simply too

many unanswered questions to rush to approval of this important matter. The may falsehoods on both sides of this issue had to be fully investigated. For example, Section 102 of GATT specifically states that U.S. law will prevail and that nothing in GATT can be construed to amend any law of the U.S. Yet, concerns remained regarding U.S. sovereignty and whether we would get a fair shake from the World Trade Organization.

Even more deeply disturbing to me were the items of excess baggage legislation which were attached and had nothing to do with GATT. The Clinton Administration manhandled the so-called "fast-track" legislative procedure by including the cancellation of the 4-percent minimum guaranteed interest return on U.S. savings bonds.

Also unrelated to GATT was legislation exclusively giving two large media corporations a discount on government fees because they pioneered the new technology that opened up new broadcast frequencies. Those and other legislative initiatives should have stood alone for separate examination, debate and votes in Congress and not submitted with the fast-track legislation for GATT.

After seven years of preparing to set out on a new trade voyage, we were suddenly rushed along while extra baggage was stowed away on board ship with a lame duck crew from Congress.

My vote was against the rush to set sail before Americans were confident of where we were going.

The Port Arthur News on welfare reform:

... Over many years, successful welfare reform should save money, to be sure. But the more important reason is to discourage the ruinous behavior that welfare rewards.

To begin at the beginning, a single mother and her baby are not a viable economic unit. Most adults cannot both nurture a baby and earn money to supply the adult's and the baby's material needs.

But more than money is at stake. Children reared without fathers are more prone than others to a whole range of ills, including emotional and academic problems, juvenile crime and childbearing out of wedlock. Children of poor, never-married mothers are most at risk of all.

By providing a steady supply of cash, food stamps and sometimes subsidized housing, welfare makes the single-parent family a going concern. It supplies the economic underpinning to a way of life that often damages children and harms society—and that is rapidly growing.

The trend is ominous: The illegitimate birth rate went from 5 percent in 1960 to 30 percent in the latest figures. Most illegitimate babies are white, though the incidence of unmarried childbearing is highest among blacks (68 percent).

A central purpose of welfare reform must be to halt this trend. The widow or divorcee who collects public assistance for six months while she and her children get on their feet is not the issue. For her, the safety

net is working as planned. What must end is government's complicity in the non-formation of families in the first place.

The Houston Post on new George Bush Presidential Library:

Groundbreaking for the new George Bush Presidential Library on the campus of Texas A&M University is good news, indeed. When completed, the complex should not only add to our understanding of Bush's life and presidency but bring in tourists and their accompanying dollars.

There is, however, a question that needs to be answered before going too far with this project: Are we getting the biggest bang for the buck?

Along with the museum, A&M is building the School of Government and Public Service and centers for Presidential Studies and Public Leadership Courses. Federal law dictates that no government monies can be used to build a presidential library, but once they are built, taxpayers pay to run them. So the public has every right to make sure its money is well-spent.

In this case, enough academicians have raised the question of whether this is so. They charge that the Bush academic center will be doing exactly what the LBJ School of Public Affairs at UT-Austin does—emphasizing public policy and domestic affairs.

The LBJ school, 85 miles down the road, has been in business 24 years and has graduated 1,600 students. It has an annual budget of \$9 million, of which \$2.7 million comes directly from the state of Texas. Do we need another school doing the same thing? ...



Remembering World War II

Battle of the Bulge was death throes of Third Reich

EDITOR'S NOTE - It was Adolf Hitler's goal-line stand and he came with a blitz against the Allied onslaught. Germany's World War II counteroffensive at Christmastime in 1944, the Battle of the Bulge, proved horrendously costly to both sides, but the Americans were not to be denied.

In the forest the snow lay deep and silent. From that, they called it "The Ghost Front."

Capt. Henry Reath, a gunner, was looking for his forward observer. He found him ensconced in an armchair in someone's summer cottage looking through a picture window with binoculars at the winter solitude.

Had he been able to look beyond the trees that Dec. 15, 1944, the spotter would have seen the impossible: a mechanized German army somehow risen from the rubble of impending defeat about to launch its last blitzkrieg.

In retrospect, the Battle of the Bulge that struck out of the pre-dawn fog the next day was a death of Adolf Hitler's Thousand-Year Reich. At the time, despite fragmentary warnings, it caught the Allied command totally off guard and portended a disaster only averted by the spontaneous and epic reaction of piecemeal groups of the American civilian-soldier GI.

The thick pine forest of the Ardennes along the German-Belgian-Luxembourg border, foolishly deemed impenetrable by the French, had been the gateway for Hitler's greatest victory, the humiliating blitzkrieg or Lightning War that knocked France out of World War II in 1940.

But by late 1944 the Allies had landed in Normandy, then swept across France to the threshold of Germany with victory in sight. Indeed, the Allied supreme commander, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, had bet five pounds with the British ground commander, Field Marshal Sir Bernard L. Montgomery, that the war in Europe would be over by Christmas.

Lt. Gen. Courtney Hodges, whose 1st Army held part of the thin line in the Ardennes, sent Gen. Omar Bradley, the over-all American field commander, a captured bust of Hitler and promised "to deliver the original in 30 days." Montgomery's intelligence chief, Brig. E.T. Williams, concluded the enemy "cannot stage a major offensive." But ...

Col. Oscar W. Koch at Gen. George S. Patton's 3rd Army headquarters warned that Germany had not yet collapsed. Col. Benjamin Dickson, the 1st Army's G-2 or intelligence officer, predicted an attack in the Ardennes where Britain's supersecret ULTRA code-breaking machine had picked up traces of German activity. Elise Dele, a Belgian woman who had been picked up by the Germans and then escaped, reported intense activity behind the enemy lines. Her report moved slowly, too slowly, through the bureaucracy.

"No goddamn fool would do it," snorted Maj. Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, Eisenhower's chief of staff, at the thought of a German offensive. At the most, Allied G-2s thought there might be a diversionary attack to relieve pressure elsewhere on Hitler's Siegfried Line, the last defense before the Rhine River.

Germany had lost 3.75 million men by late 1944. But 7.5 million were still under arms. They were not all the storm troopers of 1940 - one division was composed of men with digestive troubles who had to have special diets - but, particularly with their backs to the wall, they were motivated. Germany's cities and industry had been pulverized by Allied bombing around the clock, but production had been maintained well into 1944.

Nonetheless, his generals were aghast when Hitler, twitching and shaking from a bomb attempt on his life two months earlier, announced on Sept. 16 that he was planning an attack on the Ardennes to seize Antwerp, planned as the Allies' principal supply port on the Continent.

"If we reach the Meuse River (Operation Autumn Mist's first objective 60 miles away), we should get down on our knees and thank God," said - privately - Field Marshal Gerd

von Rundstedt, the stiff old Prussian Hitler picked for command. "This damn thing doesn't have a leg to stand on," said - privately - Field Marshal Walther Model, field commander for the attack.

They urged a "small solution," an encircling drive to trap the Allied forces around Aachen, the first sizable German city captured by the Americans. Hitler would not have it. The Führer, who some of his generals said lived in "cloud cuckoo land," hoped to hopelessly divide the Anglo-American Allies by attacking the seam between their two armies. Then they might come to their capitalist senses and join Germany in an assault on their natural enemy, the communist Soviet Union.

By hook, crook and remarkable resilience, the Germans gathered a force of 28 divisions, 10 of them mechanized. All communications were to be by land lines to foil Allied eavesdroppers. Luftwaffe planes flew along the front to smother noises of troop movements. Soldiers cooked only with charcoal to avoid telltale smoke.

But patrols of the U.S. 106th Division noticed the enemy opposite them wore new uniforms. Discipline, saluting, seemed much tighter. The men of the 106th, green as the fir trees and in line only a week, heard vehicles moving, dogs barking. A Polish prisoner said an attack was coming. Elise Dele had seen rubber assault boats and bridging equipment. The typical foul Ardennes weather was too poor to allow Allied pilots to take a good look.

Bradley was to admit he took a

"calculated risk" in manning the Ghost Front with only six divisions. It was to have been an 80-mile backwater where bloodied divisions could recuperate and new ones feel their way.

"We gamble everything," the dutiful Rundstedt told his 250,000 men in his final message. Elite SS troops were told to avenge the murders of "our mothers, fathers and children" in the bombing raids. Some soldiers, weary of five years of fighting, thought the offensive a useless sacrifice. More were determined to defend their Fatherland.

Before dawn a furious barrage splintered the silence. German troops clad in white emerged from the ghostly mist as searchlights bounced illumination off the low clouds. Some Americans ran. Others fought back.

Five Americans exited a house with their hands up and a white flag.

A German in Lt. Col. Joachim Peiper's SS battle group killed four with a burp gun and wounded a fifth. A tank ran him over.

Maj. Werner Poetschke, commander of the 1st Panzer Battalion in Peiper's spearhead column, rounded up about 140 captured GIs in a field near Malmedy. He ordered Pvt. Georg Fleps, a Romanian volunteer, to kill a lieutenant. He did. Then someone called: "Machen alle kaput!" (Kill them all.)

Tanks opened up with machine guns. The groans of the wounded "were almost like a lowing." Twenty or so of the POWs, mostly members of a field artillery observation unit, ran to a cafe. The Germans torched it and shot the Americans as they ran out.

Two hours later SS men went from

body to body shooting them in the head. A few, in answer to promised aid, spoke up - and were shot. The Germans let a medic help a wounded

comrade, then killed both. In all, 86 GIs were dead but 43 managed to escape into the woods. Word of the (See BATTLE, Page 10A)

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

Arcaro was one of the leaders in changing the style and was called a star "acey-deucey" rider.


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
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Grieving Seahawks take on 1-12 Oilers

HOUSTON (AP) - The Seattle Seahawks will have two opponents on Sunday: the Houston Oilers and their own emotions.

The Seahawks (5-8) are trying to make the playoffs and also battle through the injury to teammate Mike Frier, who was paralyzed in an auto accident on Dec. 1.

"You really feel the weight of it," safety Eugene Robinson said. "You watch film and see Mike moving and making plays but there is no moving for him now. It's shocking."

The Seahawks tried to put the accident aside last Sunday and it didn't work. They lost to the Indianapolis Colts 31-19.

"We thought the Indianapolis game would be therapeutic because when you're thinking about football, you can't be thinking about the accident," Robinson said.

"It makes you understand how fragile life is. I went home that first day and hugged my wife and kids. It's scary knowing you can go from a healthy person one minute to death or injury the next."

The Seahawks probably couldn't be playing a more sympathetic opponent than the Oilers.

Last December, the Oilers had to grapple with the death of defensive tackle Jeff Alm, who committed suicide after seeing a friend killed when he was thrown from a car driven by Alm.

"It makes you realize this is just a game and we are real people," Oiler defensive tackle Mike Teeter said. "Things can happen to football players too. We're not immune to the things that happen to everyone else."

"That's what we saw with Jeff and that's what the Seattle players are seeing now."

The auto accident was the most tragic in a series of injuries that have slowed Seattle's attempt to reach the playoffs.

Chris Warren, the AFC's leading rusher, suffered cracked ribs in the accident and backup running back Lamar Smith is out with ankle and back injuries he received in the collision.

The Seahawks also have lost starting quarterback Rick Mirer with a broken thumb.

"I felt going into the season we were going to be a lot better than last year and I still feel we are better, although our record doesn't reflect it," Seattle coach Tom Flores said. "You have to be lucky with injuries and hope you are getting healed for the stretch run. We are getting worse, like losing Rick."

The Oilers have had their share of frustrations this season, too. Coach Jack Pardee and assistant head coach Kevin Gilbride were fired on Nov. 14 and replaced with defensive coordinator Jeff Fisher and tight ends coach Dick Coury.

The Oilers have lost nine straight games for a 1-12 record and appear headed for a 1-15 finish, which would break the club record (2-14) for losses in a season.

But Fisher still has hope.

"It's harder to lose 10 games in a row than it is to win 10 games in a row," Fisher said. "At some point, someone is going to make a play to win a football game. I don't see this team going 1-15."

The Oilers defense, ranked No. 11 in the NFL, will get a chance to rattle inexperienced quarterback Dan McGwire, who has completed 18 of 28 passes this season, mostly in the Colts game when he replaced Mirer.

With their final two games against Kansas City and the New York Jets, the Oilers wonder if this is their last hope for victory this season.

"We'll get it this weekend, it's our only chance," safety Bubba McDowell said. "Then we've got Kansas City and the New York Jets so it's our only chance realistically. Kansas City and New York are two teams going after a playoff spot."

Texas trades Canseco to Boston

BOSTON (AP) - Kevin Kennedy doesn't hit or throw. He only manages.

But the new skipper of the Boston Red Sox has already helped the team on the field. He's attracted slugger Jose Canseco to the squad.

"The only reason I considered Boston is because of Kevin," Canseco said Friday after he was reunited with his former manager in a trade between the Red Sox and the Texas Rangers.

Boston got the designated hitter-outfielder in exchange for outfielder Otis Nixon and minor league third baseman Luis Ortiz.

Kennedy, who managed Canseco in Texas before he joined the Red Sox in October, said he plans to use the right-handed power hitter as a designated hitter, although he will be available as an outfielder.

Canseco hit 31 home runs with 90 RBIs in 111 games of the strike-

shortened season. The former AL MVP and Rookie of the Year batted .282 and stole 15 bases.

In June, Canseco showed he is comfortable playing in Fenway Park, especially with its famed "Green Monster" in left field. The 37-foot-high wall sits only 315 feet down the line from home plate.

Canseco blasted four home runs, three doubles and 10 RBIs in a three-game series between the Rangers and the Red Sox.

"I've always thought Boston lacked right-handed power hitters," Canseco, 30, said in a telephone news conference from his home in Miami. He said that at least two of his home runs in that June series would have been outs in other ballparks.

Canseco has had a notable history at Fenway Park. He missed half the 1993 season after injuring his elbow in an ill-fated pitching appearance in Boston.

A few years earlier, the Red Sox fans chanted "Steroids, Steroids" at him. Canseco, playing right field at the time, played to the crowd and became somewhat of a fan favorite.

Canseco was traded by Oakland to Texas on Aug. 31, 1992, for Ruben Sierra, Bobby Witt and Jeff Russell.

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Rangers now look to add pitchers

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Jose Canseco has exchanged his Ranger red for the Green Monster.

But there's a void in the hearts of Texas Rangers' fans. More importantly, there's no change on the Ranger mound.

The Texas Rangers traded the right-handed power hitter to the Boston Red Sox on Friday for centerfielder Otis Nixon and minor league third baseman Luis Ortiz.

But the Rangers' hopes of using the deal to bolster a pitching staff that compiled a 5.45 ERA, the second-worst in the majors, went unfulfilled.

Using Canseco to obtain front-line pitching had been a major off-season objective for Texas. There was speculation that the Rangers wanted the Red Sox to include right-handed reliever Ken Ryan in the package with Nixon.

"The Red Sox just didn't want to give him up at this time," said Rangers general manager Doug Melvin.

Melvin. "They just didn't want to put him in the deal. We looked in different directions. We stayed with the pitching (goal) and tried to pursue it (with other teams)," he said.

Other teams wanted the Rangers to pick up part of Canseco's \$5.1 million contract. That was unacceptable, Melvin said.

That leaves the Rangers into the free-agent market with the \$2 million the Rangers carved from its payroll with the Canseco deal.

"It does free us up, if you look at the financial side of the deal," Melvin said at a Friday evening news conference. "You're dealing \$5.1 million (Canseco's salary) for \$3.1 million (Nixon's)."

Texas was said to be close to signing free-agent starter Kevin Gross.

The Rangers will be losing a fan favorite in Canseco, a former AL MVP and Rookie of the Year who batted .282 with 31 home runs, 90 RBIs and 15 stolen bases in 111 games of the strike-shortened season.

Hill said Rodman would not play against the Houston Rockets Saturday night but probably would play against the Washington Bullets on Monday.

"He's been out for a long time. We're going to get him out there as soon as possible. We want to do it the right way," Hill said.

After practice Friday, Rodman said little about basketball or his clashes with the Spurs management, though he did herald his holiday hairstyle.

"I have a different hair color," Rodman smiled. "Christmas green."

Rodman's attendance at practice ended a week of speculation about when the unpredictable forward would rejoin the Spurs.

On Wednesday, Rodman was suspended without pay for the second time this season after he failed to show up when a 3-week paid leave of absence ended. The leave had followed a three-game suspension at the start of the season because of Rodman's conduct during the preseason.

Spurs general manager Gregg Popovich had said the latest suspension would end when Rodman reappeared and met with team officials.

Rodman arrived at the Incarnate Word College gym about two hours before the team's practice began Friday. He met with Hill and team captains David Robinson, Terry Cummings and Avery Johnson.

"It went all right. I'm living. I'm still walking tall," Rodman said.

Rodman blamed the news media for stirring the controversy surrounding his absence.

"I don't think there's any commotion. Y'all are making the commotion. Y'all make a big deal out of it. It's no big deal. No big deal at all," he said.

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'69 Shootout sticks in players' memories

AUSTIN - Former Texas tight end Randy Peschel still remembers what he was thinking when quarterback James Street called the play that became part of Texas football lore.

Street still can recall what he told his teammates in the huddle after conferring with Texas coach Darrell Royal during the timeout that preceded the play.

And college football fans who were old enough to remember can recount, often in vivid detail, Texas' 15-14 victory over Arkansas in the game that became known as the "Big Shootout."

It has been 25 years since that memorable Texas victory that capped college football's centennial season and vaulted the Longhorns to the national championship.

The '69 Longhorns are in their mid-40s now and graying a bit, but their memories of that magical season remain vivid, crystallized by time and legend.

"In a way it seems as though it never happened," said Royal, who retired from coaching in 1976. "It seems so long ago since I coached. My life has changed so much since then. What holds my attention now is so different than what got me excited when I was coaching."

"But then I remember that '69 season very well. I can remember the details on plays and games. It's still very clear in my mind. Like every championship team, the '69 bunch was a close-knit group. All those personalities gelled and they had a special will to win."

Running from the wishbone offense they unveiled the previous season, the '69 Longhorns finished 11-0 and outscored their opponents 435-119. The roll call of offensive stars besides Street and Peschel included bullish fullback Steve Worster, halfbacks Ted Koy and Jim Bertelsen, tackles Bob McKay and Bobby Wunsch, and split end Cotton Speyer.

Defensively, the Longhorns were led by such standouts as linebacker Glen Halsell, end Bill Atestis, tackle Leo Brooks and halfback Tom Campbell.

Mckay, a consensus All-America offensive tackle, said the national-championship season has become more special with the passage of time.

"I look back at it and think, good God, how could I be that lucky to be at Texas at a time like that?" said McKay, who turns 47 on Dec. 27.

"As you get older, that season gets a lot bigger. It's great knowing that you were the best at what you did at one time."

Street, now 46, said the '69 Longhorns had an aura about them that made them feel invincible. Street, Koy and Halsell were the team captains.

"I get chills talking about it," Street said. "I don't believe in destiny; I believe you make your own way. But for whatever reason, everything fell in place exactly like it should have for us that season. You couldn't have written a better script."

Koy, 46, said he treasures the national championship, but has come

to appreciate the relationships he developed on the team more as the years have gone by.

"I have a little bit different view now than when I was there," Koy said. "As I look back, what I see now is a tremendous camaraderie and fellowship that exists to this day. It was a group of young men who came together and formed a unit that didn't even think it was going to lose."

Mike Campbell, who started at rover on defense, said the '69 season was "a storybook ending for a storybook career." The son of UT defensive coordinator Mike Campbell, Mike and twin brother Tom weren't recruited by Texas but made the team and earned scholarships.

"It's unbelievable how after 25 years some memories are so vivid," said the younger Mike Campbell, who is 46. "There are a multitude of memories of the Arkansas game and the 1969 season that are real strong in my mind. It was just a dream for me."

The defining moment for the '69 Longhorns came on Dec. 6, 1969, a cold, dreary day in Fayetteville, Ark.

Trailing No. 2 Arkansas 14-8, No. 1 Texas faced a fourth-and-three at its 43 with 4:47 left in the game.

As the suspense heightened for a national television audience and an overflow crowd at Razorback Stadium, Royal mulled over his play selection with Street and assistant coach Emory Bellard during a timeout.

Armchair quarterbacks and conventional wisdom said the Longhorns would try to run for the first down. Street and Bellard, who was in the press box communicating with his quarterback and Royal via phone, favored a run.

"We wanted to run the counter-option to the short side of the field," Street said. "I thought I could fall in there for three yards, or pitch the ball and we might even score."

But Royal decided to defy the odds and told Street to run "right 53 year pass." It was a play in which only one receiver, Peschel, would go out for the pass.

"I was thinking about what kind of release I was going to take off the line of scrimmage," Peschel says now. "I didn't think about how crazy the call was. I didn't have time. Looking back, I think I should have been more surprised."

Street was somewhat taken aback by Royal's call but, as usual, exuded confidence in the huddle.

"When I walked back into the huddle, I said, 'Y'all aren't going to believe this play. But it'll work,'" Street said.

With Texas' national-title hopes flickering in the wind, Street rolled out left after faking the option and threw long to Peschel, who was running at an angle toward the left sideline. Two

Arkansas defenders, halfback Jerry Moore and safety Dennis Berner, were covering Peschel closely.

Somehow, somehow, Street completed a 44-yard pass to Peschel, who caught the ball over his left shoulder before getting tackled by Moore and Berner at the 13.

"I can remember very vividly the four hands besides my own two," Peschel said. "The ball missed them by six to eight inches. It couldn't have been thrown any better."

Royal, who turned 70 last July, still can see the flight of the ball and the "six hands" that awaited its arrival.

"It took a perfect throw and a great catch," Royal said.

Peschel's big catch made a conversation that Bill Little, UT's assistant sports information director, had with San Antonio Express-News columnist Dan Cook earlier that day seem prophetic. Little and Cook roamed together in Rogers, Ark., where the Texas team stayed, the night before the game.

"It was raining and it was 3 or 4 in the morning and Dan and I were talking," Little said. "I told him, 'If they have to complete one pass, I'll tell you who they'll go to - Randy Peschel. The coaches say he has the best hands on the team.' It wasn't a premonition or a dream. It was more logic than emotion. It was definitely a hunch, but the hunch was based on logic."

Two plays after Peschel's reception, Bertelsen scored on a 2-yard run to tie the game with 3:58 left and Happy Feller added the extra point that gave Texas a 15-14 lead.

Arkansas staged a gutsy rally of its own, but Tom Campbell sealed the Longhorns' victory by intercepting a Bill Montgomery pass at the UT 22 with 1:13 left.

President Nixon presented Royal and the Longhorns with a plaque in the locker room after the game, proclaiming Texas the national champion. An avid football fan, Nixon watched the Big Shootout with such dignitaries as Billy Graham (who gave the invocation), Henry Kissinger and George Bush, a U.S. Representative at the time.

Penn State, which also finished the regular season 10-0, protested Nixon's decision to name Texas the national champion. But the Nittany Lions opted to play Missouri in the Orange Bowl instead of going to the Cotton Bowl and playing top-ranked Texas.

The euphoria in the Texas camp turned to sorrow three days after the Big Shootout, when starting safety Freddie Steinmark was diagnosed with a malignant tumor on his left femur. On the Friday following the game, Steinmark's left leg was amputated at the hip. But Steinmark was on the sidelines

when Texas solidified its claim to the national crown by rallying for a 21-17 victory over Notre Dame in the Cotton Bowl.

Penn State beat Missouri in the Orange Bowl and finished No. 2 in the final Associated Press poll.

Texas' storybook '69 season actually had its genesis in 1968, when Bellard devised the wishbone offense and persuaded Royal to run it. The '68 Longhorns had an auspicious start, tying Houston and losing to Texas Tech.

But Royal started Street at quarterback against Oklahoma State in the third game of the season and the Longhorns beat the Cowboys 31-3, starting a 30-game winning streak. Texas wouldn't lose again until the 1971 Cotton Bowl.

Suddenly, Beano Cook seemed like a genius.

The Longhorns then dispatched Texas A&M in their traditional Thanksgiving rivalry to set up the showdown for the national championship.

Texas and Arkansas were both 9-0. The Longhorns had won 18 consecutive games, the Razorbacks 15 in a row.

If the seeds for Texas' magical

1969 season were planted in 1968, then Beano Cook, who coordinated NCAA broadcasts for ABC-TV, cultivated it by convincing Royal and Arkansas coach Frank Broyles to move the Texas-Arkansas game from early October to the first Saturday in December. It was the only game scheduled that day.

Texas started the '69 season ranked No. 4 and was No. 2, behind Ohio State, heading into the third Saturday in November. The Longhorns had an open date on Nov. 22, but Ohio State played rival Michigan that day and lost 24-12. Texas moved up to the top spot and Arkansas was No. 2.

Suddenly, Beano Cook seemed like a genius.

The Longhorns then dispatched Texas A&M in their traditional Thanksgiving rivalry to set up the showdown for the national championship.

Texas and Arkansas were both 9-0. The Longhorns had won 18 consecutive games, the Razorbacks 15 in a row.

The rest, as they say, is history.

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Dryland crops compared by producers



Compare corn, sorghum

Area producers, Jim Cavin, left, and Joe Perrin have tried growing dryland corn but neither expects to replace their sorghum operations on dry land with corn.

Producers who are debating whether to plant dryland corn or sorghum crops next year may be interested in experiences of two area producers.

Information provided the National Grain Sorghum Producers by Jim Cavin of Hereford and Joe Perrin of Adrian gives a pretty good picture of the merits of sorghum over corn for dryland planting.

Both farmers planted both grains on dry land this year and learned that sorghum lives up to its reputation as a smart risk management tool under drought conditions. The natural drought tolerance of sorghum made the difference for some growers.

Both Perrin and Cavin concluded that dryland corn may have a place in their operations, but only when the soil profile contains enough moisture.

When subsoil moisture reaches the six-foot level, dryland corn yields have been respectable. Yields decrease sharply when moisture isn't adequate at the start of the season, resulting in an unprofitable crop, the producers said.

Under the same conditions, sorghum can produce more.

To grow dryland corn, seed company agronomists said a subsoil moisture must be five to six feet, a level not often realized on the High Plains.

Even if subsoil moisture is adequate, Cavin and Perrin don't plan to go wholehog in their corn production programs.

"It all depends on the winter," said Perrin. "If we get two feet of snow, they should be enough to fill the profile. I learned this year that you don't want to try dryland corn if you don't have six feet of moisture in place."

Perrin harvested little of his dryland corn because moisture wasn't adequate. Cattle were turned in on most of the acreage.

"Where I had dryland corn and sorghum in the same field, I didn't even pull a machine in the corn," Perrin reported on his experience. "The sorghum cut 2,800 pounds, though. It kind of makes you sick."

His experiences are similar to those Cavin found with dryland corn. His overall dryland corn yielded 1,000 pounds. Under the same growing conditions, he harvested 4,105 pounds of dryland sorghum.

Figuring an average price of \$4.25 per hundredweight for the corn and \$3.75 per hundredweight for the sorghum, the dryland sorghum was worth \$100, or more, per acre more than the dryland corn.

"This is grain sorghum country," said Cavin. "A lot of people say it's even better than wheat. The plus for sorghum is that we know it has more drought tolerance than corn. And, after all, we're in a dryland farming area."

"That's what we've been plagued with the past two years on dryland corn," said Cavin, who planted 150 acres last season. "When we were trying to go through the pollination period, the wind and heat were terrible."

"Corn doesn't have the ability to shut down when it's losing moisture, which sorghum does. I actually had corn in wet dirt burn up," said Cavin.

What makes dryland corn attractive when moisture is adequate, said the producers, is the timing. Because corn can be planted in early April, they have more time to spend with sorghum in June. Then, when it's time for the combines to roll, corn can be harvested before sorghum.

Although Cavin's 90 acres of dryland corn looked good the middle of June this year, overwhelming heat and high winds caused one variety to tassel before July 1. Because the crop was pollinating before silks were present, that field made less than 500 pounds.

"That's what we've been plagued with the past two years on dryland corn," said Cavin, who planted 150 acres last season. "When we were trying to go through the pollination period, the wind and heat were terrible."

"Corn doesn't have the ability to shut down when it's losing moisture, which sorghum does. I actually had corn in wet dirt burn up," said Cavin.

Under ideal conditions, the dryland corn would finish its uptake of moisture by early August, a time when rainfall often comes to boost sorghum, which matures later. These conditions, Perrin and Cavin agreed, aren't always present.

Perrin said out-of-pocket expenses ran about \$35 per acre for the dryland corn, compared with \$22.50 for grain sorghum. Expenses for corn are greater because of the cost of seed, additional cultivation and increased harvest costs.

Even if moisture is adequate to make 3,000-pound dryland corn, the per-acre net return for both crops is virtually the same, making dryland sorghum the more profitable crop on the High Plains almost every year.

'Aging of Agriculture' taking place as more young people leave farms

JAYTON, Texas (AP) — Ray Chisum defied a trend when he bought a used tractor and began raising cotton and grains on some land of his own.

None of his high school classmates stuck around Jayton to try their hand at the farm-and-ranch activity that sustains this tiny town southeast of Lubbock. Chisum, 28, speculates he's the youngest farmer in Kent County.

"Getting started without family and friends would be next to impossible," said Chisum, who took over some of his grandfather's fields and still shares equipment with his father.

"Finances - wisdom, counts for a whole lot," he said. "... If it hadn't been for my granddad and dad, well, I probably wouldn't have even tried."

Figures from the U.S. Census Bureau put the average Texas farmer at 56 years old in 1992. In 1978, that average age was 52.4.

The so-called "aging of agriculture" disturbs those who are witnessing young, rural people reject an occupation they consider too costly and risky.

"It's a huge concern," said Nancy Thompson, staff attorney for the Center for Rural Affairs in Walthill, Neb. "It may be one of the most crucial issues facing agriculture."

County agriculture agents and others say new farmers face start-up costs as high as \$500,000 for land and equipment.

Beginners can't secure much affordable credit, some ag experts say. Commodity prices are iffy.

Government regulations have mounted.

Net farm income, meanwhile, averages \$23,233 a year, according to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

"It's very difficult to get into farming or ranching and make any money off it anymore," said Robert Kennedy, the TDA's deputy assistant commissioner for finance and agribusiness development.

Young people "are going off to Texas Tech, Texas A&M ... and seeing something better in their future than working on the land," Kennedy said. "At some point in the future, you'll see the family farm disappear, I'm afraid."

Little relief arrived with a program the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority set up for farmers and ranchers between the ages of 18 and 39. The Young Farmer Loan Guarantee Program contained \$2.4 million to help beginners buy feed, seed, fertilizer or equipment.

Some 9,000 people inquired about the loan guarantees of up to \$50,000, Kennedy said. Officials expected to grant 60 awards in 1994, its first year.

Only four applied.

On the federal level, the Rural

Economic and Community Development Services - formerly the Farmers Home Administration - provides various types of credit for beginners.

Federal figures in Texas for fiscal year '94 included 203 direct-operating loans worth \$9.6 million and 45 guaranteed-operating loans worth \$4.2 million.

"If you don't have somebody that's giving you a hand, you can't make it," said Phillip Johnson, professor of agriculture economics at Texas Tech University.

To name the best paths into farming, Johnson quoted an adage: Marry it or inherit it.

He predicts agriculture won't become a popular career choice again until it's profitable.

"I see a lot of kids who certainly want to go back or are farming with their grandparents," Johnson said. "They may or may not survive. If you have to borrow a substantial amount for equipment or operating expenses, a crop failure is just disastrous. You can't overcome it."

Ms. Thompson of the rural center in Nebraska said the traditional pool of prospective farmers shrank as fewer kids grew up on farms. Access to credit and access to land present

their biggest obstacles, she said.

"The decline in the number of farmers was not so much people leaving agriculture, but because people weren't getting into agriculture," Ms. Thompson said.

But Kirk Edney, state director of agricultural education for the Texas Education Association, isn't alarmed by the trend.

"There will always be people who enter this industry. I certainly don't anticipate a food shortage," Edney said.

Between the Covers

"My father had left a small collection of books...to which I had access...From that blessed little room came out a glorious host to keep me company. They kept alive my fancy and my hope of something beyond that place and time. (Those stories) did me no harm, for whatever harm was in some of them was not there for me; I knew nothing of it." So wrote Charles Dickens about his first experience with "fanciful" books. (His father was in the poorhouse at the time). The effect of those books on Dickens' writing is "inestimable," according to one biographer. Indeed, the effects of early reading for all of us are inestimable--to our education, our enrichment, and our world-view. (Whoever that is in HJH that is requiring students to read A Christmas Carol--good for you!)

And speaking of Christmas, if you're a fast worker, there's still time to finish up some last minute Christmas crafts. Lots of our old standbys are still available, and this week we're putting out Down Santa Claus Lane -- a Leisure Arts publication full of needlework ideas (cross stitch, crewel???) I don't know the difference!) that mostly feather the "jolly old elf" himself.

A couple of autobiographies will go out this week detailing the lives of entertainers who were immensely popular in their own time, and even yet hold sway over a large number of fans. The titles will tip you off: Happy Trails: Our Life Story is about none other than the King of the Cowboys an the Queen of the West. I read a review

of this book the other day and the reviewer seemed to be displeased that Roy and Dale are unpretentious and "squeaky clean." (Roy gave up beer on hunting trips because it wasn't consistent with his image.) Personally, in light of most of what Hollywood produces, I find a person who is what he says is particularly refreshing. A recent article noted that, due to bad feet, Roy generally wears tennies around the house, but when he drops in at the museum in Victorville CA, he struggles into boots because that's what his public has come to expect. (Gee, I haven't even mentioned Dale!)

The other bio is Take Me Home by John Denver. I'll admit that once I was a big fan (but who wasn't, way back then?) He remains one of the top all-around entertainers I have had the privilege to see in person (WT Fieldhouse in 1977), but when I heard him say in a radio interview a few years later that he mows the grass in the nude and is becoming a god, my fondness for him began to waver.

When, during the middle of the gas crunch, I read that he had dug up copious amounts of the Colorado Rockies that he waxed so poetically about to install an underground gasoline storage receptacle, my disillusionment was complete. (Not to mention that he divorced Annie--whom he had also waxed poetically about). Besides, when I listen to his music now, it seems so...well, SEVENTIES! Of course, those are MY opinions--and I'll bet the book is good, anyway, just to get some information on

someone who was so much of an icon. The Abuse Excuse looks at the recent surge in the "victim" defense--where defendants literally get away with murder because they are "victims" of abusive parents, a violent spouse, ethnic hatred, etc. Lawyer-professor Alan Dershowitz, in this provocative collection of essays, argues that the idea is contrary to the ideas of our constitution. The foundations of our society are individual responsibility and the law, according to Dershowitz, and to be above the law--whatever the reason--is vigilantism. Citing cases as recent as Tonya Harding's and O.J. Simpson's, The Abuse Excuse is an important book for these times.

Continuing the story of Israel's existence which he began in The Hope Herman Wouk has produced The Glory--continuing the story from the aftermath of the Six-Day War through the celebration of 40 years of independence. "Vital, authentic, authoritative, and masterfully told," according to the jacket blurb. "A story for all time."

Don't forget the Family Film this Thursday at 7:00. A Gift Of Love is an adaptation of O. Henry's classic Christmas valentine "The Gifts of the Magi." Starring Marie Osmond and Timothy Bottoms, it is the turn-of-the-century tale of a young New York socialite and her love for one beneath her class. Overcoming the obstacles, they find unique ways to express their total devotion in their Christmas gifts to one another. Admission is free and popcorn is 25 cents.



HJH welcomed two new science teachers to the staff. They are Lucy Caballero, a first year teacher and Nikolyn Williams, who transferred from Bluebonnet.





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

TYPES OF CHOCOLATE

The holiday cooking season brings an array of recipes all calling for a different type of chocolate. Perhaps these definitions will solve the mystery of chocolate cookery and provide ideas for substitutions for various chocolate products.

Real chocolate - a mixture of chocolate liquor plus a high percentage of cocoa butter plus sugar and other ingredients.

Bitter chocolate - contains chocolate liquor and 50% cocoa butter.

Semi-sweet chocolate - contains a mixture of 60% bitter chocolate and 40% sugar; the cocoa butter must be 35% to 50%.

Milk chocolate - contains milk powder and 10% to 15% cocoa butter.

Coating chocolate - contains a high proportion of cocoa butter which gives a gloss to the finished product.

German's chocolate - named for the manufacturer who first added sugar to bitter chocolate for use in cooking. It contains a reduced percentage of cocoa butter and is less successful as a coating chocolate.


White chocolate - not defined as chocolate because even though it contains cocoa butter, it has no chocolate liquor.

Cocoa - the powdered form of unsweetened chocolate from which most cocoa butter has been removed. Cocoa may be used for fudge and other

candies but not for dipping or coating.

Instant cocoa - a beverage mix of pre-cooked cocoa, up to 80% sugar and an emulsifier for quick dissolving. Not suitable for candy making.

"It was a lot of work," agreed Judy Praether, production specialist for the Baylor Line magazine, who served as cookbook production coordinator. "I enjoyed sampling some of the best recipes."

Burchette "had a certain standard in mind that she wanted to achieve," Praether said. "She wanted a balance of different kinds of recipes—old and new, difficult and easy. I'd think we were fine, and she'd come in and say, 'We need more carrot recipes.'"

The project officially kicked off with a call for recipes in the January 1993 edition of the Baylor Line, the official magazine for the university's former students.

Soon, more than 1,000 submissions flooded the alumni association's office.

"We had, I guess, all in all, about 600 people involved in this," Praether said. "That includes testers, contributors, people involved in collecting stories. So it was a group effort."

It was about time to do another cookbook, the editors believe. Baylor published a cookbook in 1979 called "Favorite Flavors." Since then, cooking methods and lifestyles have changed drastically. So much so, that there is not a special section in the current cookbook for those newfangled microwave recipes. People are eating light and spending less time in the kitchen.

"The cookbook industry has been revolutionized in the last 10 years," Praether said. "Community cookbooks are very, very popular. The best ones tell stories, give a slice of life of the small community. They are a nationwide phenomenon."

Therefore, the cookbook needed to be more than a recipe collection, she said. "We also had to tell a story," Praether said. "We wanted to tell what kind of place Baylor is in addition to giving out good recipes. It needed to be good to read and good to cook."

Famous Baylor Bears ranging from Gov. Ann Richards, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and District Judge Bill Logue recall their fondest "food" memories in the pages.

So do less famous grads. One cookie recipe came from an alumna, who sheepishly admitted that her dad

used them as a gentle reminder to write home. He sent the cookies along with enough postage to last an entire year, after she told him she had run out of stamps.

"We worked hard to try to get some of the little food memories included," Praether said. "Cookbook collectors will say 'I read cookbooks in the bath tub,' or 'I keep it by my bed and read it at night.'" Therefore, a successful cookbook must include some reading material other than just the recipes, she explained.

The book makes no guarantee that all the recipes are original. But it says they are all tried and true.

"Each recipe was tested two times," Burchette said. "Sometimes, they were given additional tests if they came back with varied results."

Among Burchette's favorites are the following recipes for Christmas Lemon Pecan Cake and South by Southwest Chicken Salad.

The cake recipe is from Betty Clements Scull, who graduated from Baylor in 1953. The recipe came with a note from Scull, saying she and her father used to make the cake together as a family holiday tradition. They've been making the cake for more than 30 years. Burchette calculates, judging from Scull's graduation year, that the father must be in his late 80s by now.

As for the cake, "It's absolutely wonderful," Burchette said.

LEMON PECAN CAKE
From Betty Clements Scull, Class of '53

1 bottle (1 1/2-oz.) lemon extract
1 qt. pecan halves
1 lb. butter
3 c. sugar
4 c. flour
1 1/2 t. baking powder
6 eggs
1/2 lb. candied red pineapple, cut into bite-size pieces
1/2 lb. candied green pineapple, cut into bite-size pieces

Pour lemon extract over pecan halves in medium bowl; set aside. Grease a

tube cake pan heavily with butter. In a large mixing bowl, cream butter and sugar until fluffy. Sift flour and baking powder together.

To butter-sugar mixture, add eggs one at a time, alternately with sifted flour mixture. Fold in fruit and pecans. Pour into greased cake pan.

Bake at 275 degrees for 2 1/2 to 3 hours or until cake tester comes out clean. Cool and remove carefully from pan. Makes 20 to 24 servings.

Note: Cake is delicious the day it is made, but is even better after 2 or 3 days.

SOUTH-BY-SOUTHWEST CHICKEN SALAD

From the Cookbook Committee
1 carrot, coarsely sliced

1 rib celery

1 lb. chicken tenders or boneless breasts

4 canned jalapenos, seeded and diced

1/3 c. mayonnaise
4 green onions, thinly sliced
1/2 c. sour cream
1 t. ground cumin

Bring 4 cups water to a rolling boil. Add carrot, celery and chicken; cook for approximately 10 minutes or until chicken is done. Remove from heat and let stand for 10 minutes.

Drain liquid and discard vegetables. Cool chicken; shred into bite-size pieces, discarding tendons. Combine with remaining ingredients and adjust seasonings to taste. Makes 2 cups.

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Country post office serves area with more than mail distribution

MARYNEAL, Texas (AP) — Residents of zip code 79535 consider their post office an icon of something fading fast in America.

No one drives to this little stone outpost just to pick up mail.

They chat in the lobby about cattle and crop forecasts around Nolan County. They scan the tidbits tacked up to the public bulletin board.

The building alternately serves as polling place, relay station for volunteer firefighters and source of directions for lost travelers.

Everything about Maryneal — an unincorporated community with no grocery store or gas station — simply comes to a core at the post office.

But the U.S. Postal Service proposes to shut it down and switch to mail delivery in cluster boxes along the highway.

"It would obliterate Maryneal from the map," said resident John Adams Jr. "It's government defeating the purpose of its own rural development committees (to take away) the heart of our community."

Four Texas post offices were closed in 1994, a postal spokeswoman said. Offices currently imperiled include those in Dawn, about 13 miles northeast of

Hereford, and Vera, about 20 miles west of Seymour.

Notices from the postal service point out the dwindling receipts and workload from 78 customers the Maryneal post office serves.

Under the proposed cluster-box system, the postal service says, customers who want to buy stamps or send packages could meet their carrier along the route.

Those who want to do business at a post office could drive 23 miles northeast to Sweetwater.

That suggestion rankles those who view the proposed closing as inconvenient and unfair.

Maryneal residents don't want to be roped into Sweetwater's zip code. And they think they already get slighted by the government.

"There's a tremendous amount of tax money paid out, and the federal government has paid little back in," said rancher Tom Stewman. "People here are not on welfare or food stamps, even though they might be eligible, because they're just independent."

Residents thronged to the post office last week to explain to a visitor how the battle was bigger than a building.

They see themselves preserving a way of life untouched by violent crime, where parents brag about their children's school and where

neighbors treat each other like kinfolk.

"Our rural heritage," said resident Audrea Oatman, "is a way of life people don't understand speeding around the big city."

A sign at the west edge of Maryneal boasts this: "Blink an eye. Miss the town. Come on through, but do slow down, and meet friendly folks."

The post office opened in 1907 and operated amid the bustle of two lumber yards, a bank, cotton gin, drug store, barber shop and hotel.

All that's gone now.

A final determination on Maryneal will be made in Washington. Stan Deweber, post office review coordinator in Jacksboro, didn't know when.

"I hate to see a small town decline and not need a post office," Deweber said. "There are some inconveniences that I agree with when we close it down. But we are trying to provide the services that are needed in the community."

He said the postal service typically reviews alternatives to a post office whenever a postmaster retires, a building lease expires or a building is found to be unsafe.

"If we weren't doing that, we wouldn't be operating our business the way we should."

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

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MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS Don Taylor A LICENSE TO STEAL

When you start a new business you are automatically granted a license to steal. Now hold on just a minute, I'm not suggesting that any business has a right to break any law or take advantage of consumers. The license to steal I'm talking about is legal and doesn't amount to ripping off customers.

Actually, there are two "it's ok to steal" permits issued to every business. Understanding these permits and using them to build your sales is good business. In addition, using these licenses is legal, moral and ethical.

Who granted these rights? Who issued these licenses in the first place? The founding fathers of our country granted the rights and approved the system. They founded our nation as a

democracy, based on the economic rules of capitalism and free enterprise. This system still gives bright men and women a license to steal.

Grand Theft - Ideas

The authorities will not charge you with grand theft or larceny if you steal good ideas or concepts from others. Use some caution in this area. You may not use (steal) copyrighted material without permission. You cannot steal trademarks and service marks or any items covered by patents.

However, no one can protect ideas and concepts. You have a license to steal good ideas and adapt them to your business operation. Concepts can be copied, modified and used at will.

Some of America's greatest success stories borrowed their success concepts from others. Dale Carnegie, the author of "How to Win Friends and Influence People," admitted using his license to steal. I swiped some from Chesterfield. I stole some from Jesus. And I put them in a book. If you don't like their ideas, whose would you use?"

Wal-Mart founder Sam Walton, also used his license liberally. Sol Price, who founded the Price Club warehouse stores in 1976, said this about Mr. Sam: "He is notorious for looking at what everybody else does, taking the best of it, and then making it better."

Henry Ford also stole good ideas. Ford did not invent the assembly line concept as many folks incorrectly believe. It had been used in other industries for many years. He just adapted the concept to making cars, and of course the rest is history.

So if you want to succeed, keep your eyes open for good ideas that you can adapt to your situation. Learn how you can improve products or devise a new method to deliver services. Use your "ideas" license.

Purloining Customers

Yes, your license to steal also gives you the right to purloin customers. However, you do not have the right to take customers by force. Instead, you must steal them by appealing to their main motivations: The need for value and their desire for personal respect.

Today's customers have better information and are less likely to be completely loyal to any business. Therefore, all business owners must stay focused on giving their customers good reasons and distinct benefits for doing business with them.

If you don't offer an advantage - value, service, convenience, variety, quality, ambience, product knowledge, etc. - you make it easy for others to steal your customers. Of course it works both ways. Observe your competitors. Where are they weak? How can you serve their customers more effectively? When you find your competitor's weaknesses you can steal their most valuable asset - their customers.

Writers also have a license to steal. I admit that I stole the idea for this column from a colleague. When I offered to give him credit for the idea he said, "Don't bother, I read it in a book!"






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Question/Answer



Breast cancer rate highest in San Francisco Bay area

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)--White women living in the San Francisco Bay area have the highest rate of breast cancer in the world, say officials who admit they're stumped as to why that's so.

The rate is 50 percent higher than that of most European women and five times higher than for women in Japan, according to statistics compiled by the International Agency for Research on Cancer.

Local researchers said the cause could be anything from diet to exposure to toxic substances. Another theory is that Bay area white women may be more aggressive in having themselves checked for cancer.

"Something is going on that has to do with the environment," said Dr. Robert Hiatt. "It might be diet. It might be medication. It might be reproductive practice. But we don't know for sure."

Hiatt is director of prevention science at the Northern California Cancer Center in Union City, a branch of the California Cancer Registry.

The center took data from the International Agency for Research on Cancer and released it in a journal last spring, but it was only brought to public attention recently by the Breast Cancer Fund, a nonprofit public interest foundation.

Another possible cause for the

high rate, Hiatt said, is that white women in the largely affluent Bay area may be more likely to have themselves screened frequently for cancer, including having more mammograms, clinical exams and self-exams than the average person. In the long term, he said, that is good.

"If we're picking up cancers early," Hiatt said, "we would expect the mortality rate to go down soon."

In the latest two years, data show a slight dip in the death rate, he said.

Hiatt said known risk factors associated with a woman's reproductive life, genetics and diet influence only 25 percent of breast cancer cases. The factors influencing the other three-fourths are still unknown.

An estimated 46,000 American women were expected to die of breast cancer in 1994. In the nine Bay area counties, about 4,500 new cases and 1,000 deaths were expected to be reported this year.

Following Bay Area white women on the international list are Hawaiian women living in Hawaii; blacks living in Atlanta; Bay area black women; women in British Columbia; women in Utah; women in Geneva; women in Denmark; Jewish women in Israel; and women in New Zealand and Scotland.

Growth hormones may be unnecessary

Short children no more likely to be having problems than normal kids

CHICAGO (AP)--Short children are no more likely to be maladjusted than taller kids, so parents who spend thousands of dollars a year on expensive growth hormones may be wasting their money, researchers say.

The findings contradict earlier studies suggesting shorter youngsters are more likely to be shy, anxious or depressed.

About 20,000 U.S. children have taken human growth hormone. Although no statistics are available, doctors say perceived psychological reasons are frequently the only problems cited by parents requesting the treatment, which costs about \$30,000 a year.

Doctors said parents should get the hormone treatment for their children only if it's medically necessary, such as when kidney failure or other conditions lead to a deficiency in the growth hormone.

"The strongest case for treatment should ... not be based on the assumption that if you're short you're

having problems," said study co-author David Sandberg, a professor of pediatric psychiatry at the State University of New York at Buffalo.

The study, published in December's edition of Pediatrics, was financed in part by the Human Growth Foundation, a nonprofit group that backs the use of growth hormone.

The research was based on surveys of 180 boys and 78 girls, ages 8 to 14, who were referred to a program for treatment of height deficiency. Researchers would not disclose the hospital where the program is based.

They found that short boys described themselves as less socially active but did not have more behavior problems than a group of average height.

Older boys who were shorter than expected tended to show slightly more problems, probably because they have been living with their shortness for a longer period of time,

Sandberg said.

Girls, though, were nearly indistinguishable from the normal group and seemed to be better off in some cases. The younger girls 8 to 12 described their own athletic promise and social skills more positively than even normal-size girls.

"Society accepts petite girls more than petite boys," said co-author Susana Campos, an assistant professor at State University of New York at Buffalo.

Parents too often seek treatment for their kids because they think problems exist when they don't, said Dr. Michael Gottschalk, an assistant professor of pediatric endocrinology at Loyola University Medical Center.

But short parents are less likely to seek treatment for their short children than parents of average height, he said.

"I think they provide good role models," Gottschalk said.

Researchers said that unless the treatment is medically necessary, it may do more harm than good.

"Having to go to the endocrine clinics, the daily injections and parental supervision ... are these factors even more stressful?" Campos said.

Activist Jeremy Rifkin, who was below-average height while growing up, said the study shows there's nothing wrong with being short.

"The bottom line is: Diversity is part of what being human is about," said Rifkin, the 5-foot-7 president of the Washington-based Foundation on Economic Trends, a think tank that studies the ethical, social and economic implications of new technologies.

"I was occasionally picked on for being short," he said. "That's a part of growing up. It's a sad turn when parents feel compelled to inject their children with painful shots to conform to some norm."

To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am 50 years old and have started to jump rope. I am 5-foot-6 and 155 pounds. My blood pressure is 138 over 72. I play golf and tennis weekly. In jumping, I have worked up to 500 jumps. Will this hurt my skeletal system? — L.L.

ANSWER: My instinct is to urge caution. However, you sound like a sensible person who has gone about things in the correct way, by which I mean you have probably developed the easy, graceful, low-impact technique of expert jumpers.

I guess the only caveat left is the all-purpose one: "If it hurts, stop doing it."

You are giving your knees quite a workout. It involves much more pressure than jogging does.

Just listen to your body and act accordingly.

1 must say, well-trained rope jumpers performing their skill is something beautiful to behold. Not as I do it, of course — and I do.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My friend says I am lifting weights wrong. I lift about eight times in a row, then rest, then lift another eight times. My friend says I should be pausing a half-minute between each lift. Why?

ANSWER: It beats me. H.W.

Lifting and strength improvement call for doing the sets of lifts — eight, in your case — consecutively. It has to do with exhausting the muscle fibers. Such temporary muscle fatigue is thought to induce greater strength.

I concede that the reasons are not altogether clear, but it has been shown to work.

You should ask your friend to cite his source for his contrary advice. I would be interested in learning if there are new ideas out there, as there almost always are. Meanwhile, I am continuing the old way.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I have been exercising aerobically for the past three years. When exercising, I feel as if I am putting forth substantial effort and am too short of breath to hold a conversation easily. Yet, my heart rate only climbs to 65 percent of the recommended maximum for my age — using the 220 minus your age max formula. This has happened since I switched from stationary cycling to stationary jogging. — P.U.F.

ANSWER: It could be simply that

you are using different muscles for the new exercise, and those muscles have to work overtime until they learn the new demands on them. If so, they — and you — should adjust in time.

Furthermore, you should not get hung up on pulse taking. You can measure the degree of intensity of an exercise from your own perceptions. If you feel the exercise is too strenuous, it is.

For now, cut back to intensities that allow conversation, still the gold standard for good aerobic intensity.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am 90 and have been weight training for several years. My goals are continued muscle and strength growth. I seem not to be making gains of late. Can I expect gains at 90?

ANSWER: You can.

People generally reach a plateau for a couple of reasons: They are not getting enough rest or they are neglecting nutrition. Be sure you are packing your muscles with glycogen. Lean toward high complex-carbohydrate diet, eating lots of pasta, breads and cereals.

Try changing your training regimen — the exercise and its intensity. Alternate weeks of heavy weights with a week or so of lighter ones. Variations jolt bored muscles out of complacency.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am 13 years old and I have a hurting pain in my throat. At first I thought it was just saliva, but it isn't that. It hurts whenever I swallow. I asked my mom if I ever had my tonsils taken out, and she said no. Could this be my tonsils? — K.B.

ANSWER: We are born with tonsils, which unless removed stay with us for life. Tonsils get smaller as we get older, but they are still there, and you can view them at the rear of the throat.

Tonsils behave much the way lymph nodes do. Those are little defense stations throughout the body, trapping and disposing of

germs and other aliens. The tonsils do the same.

You may have tonsillitis, which is any infection or inflammation of your tonsils. That's something you want

to find out. It's not wise to guess about a lingering sore throat, for you may be ignoring a strep throat or some other potentially harmful infection.



Sci-fi special takes a loving look at the future's past

"Press the button, my friend. Send me back into time."

Those hokey, thrilling words come from an old science-fiction television series, one of dozens recalled in *The Museum of Television & Radio Presents: Science Fiction, A Journey Into the Unknown*, a Fox special airing Tuesday, Dec. 13.

Nowadays the button is on the remote control, but the journey still captures the imagination. Over 40 years, the genre has become the home of eye-popping special effects while remaining an acceptable arena for topics of a metaphysical nature, from *The Twilight Zone* and *The Prisoner* to *Alien Nation* and *Babylon 5*.

"A little less analysis and a little more action!"

The two-hour special's principal hosts are Leonard Nimoy and William Shatner, two members of the sci-fi pantheon. Assisting the *Star Trek* veterans with introductions and narration are Dean Cain (*Lois & Clark: The New Adventures of Superman*) and Carrie Fisher (*Star Wars*).

"Engage!"

Segments include clip reels on aliens (*The Invaders*, *Superman*, *The Six Million Dollar Man*, *Mork & Mindy*), robots (*Lost in Space*, *Robocop*), fantasy (*Amazing Stories*), Saturday morning series (*Flash Gordon*, *Fireball XL5*) for children, outer space (the *Star Trek* series), time travel (*The Time Tunnel*, *Quantum Leap*), and more.

The retrospective moves at warp speed, sampling the best of 10 or 12 series in each quarter-hour.

A big part of the fun is watching for uncredited appearances (sometimes measurable in nanoseconds) by former stock players including Cliff Rob-

ertson, Anne Francis and Wayne Rogers — even Shatner and Nimoy.

"We have the technology."

The editing process, which frequently entertains with witty juxtapositions, must have been a labor of love. Even viewers whose interest in the genre is lukewarm will be entertained by the show's charm and variety.

Since host network Fox could supply only an occasional clip — *Alien Nation* or *The X-Files* — only a third-party repository of broadcast history, such as The Museum of Television & Radio, which lends its name to the show's title, could make such a program possible. The museum, located in New York City, should be on every couch potato's list of recommended field trips.

"Any moment now, something is going to happen that will stand your hair on end."

"I'm not just your bartender, I'm your friend."

"Someday soon, we'll all have an automatic man around the house."

Whether for spine-tingling chills, a reassuring and imaginative take on futuristic relations of the future, a peek at how technology might change lives or even an intriguingly crafted morality play, science fiction is one of the most enduring of TV genres.

An entire cable channel is now devoted to the subject, and a new edition of 1963's *The Outer Limits* is due next fall. Such is the continual fascination with what Rod Serling called "... the world of things and ideas," the curiosity to unlock "... the world beyond tomorrow."

"Mission complete. Over and out."

Workplace violence exposed in HBO's *Murder 9 to 5*

Graphic, violent and alarming... In a word, disturbing.

The squeamish should be warned that HBO's *Murder 9 to 5*, debuting Sunday, Dec. 11, as part of the *America Undercover* series, is an unfiltered look at multiple murder in the workplace.

It opens with a chilling homemade videotape, in which Dion Terres, 26, an assembly-line worker documents his preparations and reasons for a *Rambo*-style assault on his former workplace.

Narrator Marlene Sanders, a former CBS and ABC correspondent, explains that Terres never went to the plant. Instead, he went to a McDonald's and killed two strangers. The next image is the grisly remains of Terres' final victim — himself. It isn't a pleasant sight.

It's only a warmup, however, for the aftermath of Richard Farley's rampage at ESL Corp. in Sunnyvale, Calif., that left seven dead and four wounded.

A survivor of the attack, the object of Farley's obsession, explains how his progressively threatening stalking led

her to seek a restraining order against him — which ultimately proved to be useless. Farley speaks from San Quentin Prison, where he sits on death row.

Even more appalling is the story of a postal clerk who survived three shots to her head and back by a co-worker who resented her being promoted over him. After losing a sex discrimination lawsuit, Larry Jasion showed up one day with a .38-caliber handgun and a derringer, killing himself after the vicious attack.

However unpleasant, it is impossible to deny the impact of this issue; the statistics speak for themselves.

Nearly a million violent acts are carried out yearly in the American workplace. The average employee faces a 1-in-4 chance of being attacked, threatened or harassed on the job. Multiple murders are committed at a rate of three per month in the workplace.

Forensic psychiatrist Dr. Park Dietz, president of the Academy of Psychiatry and the Law, offers tips for recognizing and preventing such incidents.

Murder 9 to 5 paints a frightening picture of this problem.
