

Lewis packs his Austin bags

AUSTIN (AP) - When freshman Rep. Gib Lewis first came to the Texas House, the two-year state budget totaled less than \$8 billion, oil money was gushing and the big fights were over which lawmakers took home the most pork.

Two decades later, lawmakers are writing \$60 billion budgets, battling billion-dollar deficits, struggling with courts over schools and prisons, and looking for ways to cut long-entrenched programs.

The Sunday-closing blue law has been repealed, pari-mutuel wagering and lottery are legal, drinking while driving is illegal and high school athletes must pass to play.

Times, and Texas, have changed. "The biggest issue when I first got here was liquor by the drink," Lewis laughed as he looked back on a 22-year career - including an unprecedented five terms as House speaker.

"We'd consider that child's play now. But it was the real critical issue back in those days. That's where the tough vote came."

The Fort Worth Democrat has been speaker longer than anyone in Texas history.

As leader of the House since 1983, Lewis helped write the bills, forge the compromises and, on occasion, cast the crucial vote as the Legislature sought to cope with a population explosion, oil and real estate busts, judges' orders and growing partisanship.

He cites accomplishments that include the sweeping school reforms of House Bill 72, a statewide water plan, a rural health care plan, overhauling workers compensation,

consolidating criminal justice agencies and creating a state "rainy day fund" to cushion future budget shocks.

"I've never been one who blows my own horn. But I go back and see the things I had my fingerprints on," Lewis said.

"I've always tried to play somewhat of a background role. Seventy-five percent of that stuff was created right here in this office, with me and my staff. Then we'd go to a sponsor and we'd push it through and give them support."

He leaves convinced lawmakers are underpaid, under appreciated, overworked.

"I can cuss and discuss and argue. But I'll say that some of the finest people I've ever met are the people I served with. It's amazing we get the quality of people we do with the way we treat them and the way we pay them (\$600 a month)," Lewis said.

A native of Oletha in Limestone County, the 56-year-old Lewis attended Sam Houston State Teachers College and Texas Christian University before joining the Air Force.

After the service, he settled in Fort Worth and started his company, Lewis Label Products Inc., which has grown into a multimillion-dollar enterprise.

In the 1960s, he joined the Junior Chamber of Commerce, which elected him president in 1966. Then he won election to the River Oaks City Council in 1969 and, in 1971, to the House.

During his second term, the avid hunter and sportsman was appointed

chairman of the Natural Resources Committee. He rose quickly through the ranks.

In 1983, he won his first of five terms as speaker, joining the governor and lieutenant governor as one of the three most powerful people in state government.

Lewis says his early days in the Legislature were, indeed, "the good old days."

"Things have gone from a very leisurely pace to a very fast, neck-breaking pace. The issues have become more complicated," he says.

"You had money you could spend. In those days, the argument was who's going to get more than the other guy ... We may have outfoxed ourselves."

Lewis says one of the most troubling aspects in being a lawmaker today is the problem that bedeviled his final days as speaker - court orders.

Federal judges ruled against the state on prisons and mental health.

The Texas Supreme Court three times has overturned school finance laws, a problem that remains for the 1993 Legislature.

School finance "is a moving target," he says. "You finally get a consensus and then you vote on one (plan) - then the courts overturn it. You think you're

doing what should be done. Each time we passed an education bill, I would swear we were home free."

Lewis believes judges have overstepped their bounds as interpreters of law. Their forays into lawmaking rankle.

"Twenty years ago, you would never have dreamed that a district court would be dictating to the Legislature ... Today, if a fellow disagrees with the action of the Legislature, he'll become a plaintiff and file a suit."

"It's sad. The Legislature is the elected body that has various degrees of opinions and philosophies ... and they're there to come together and try to find a compromise."

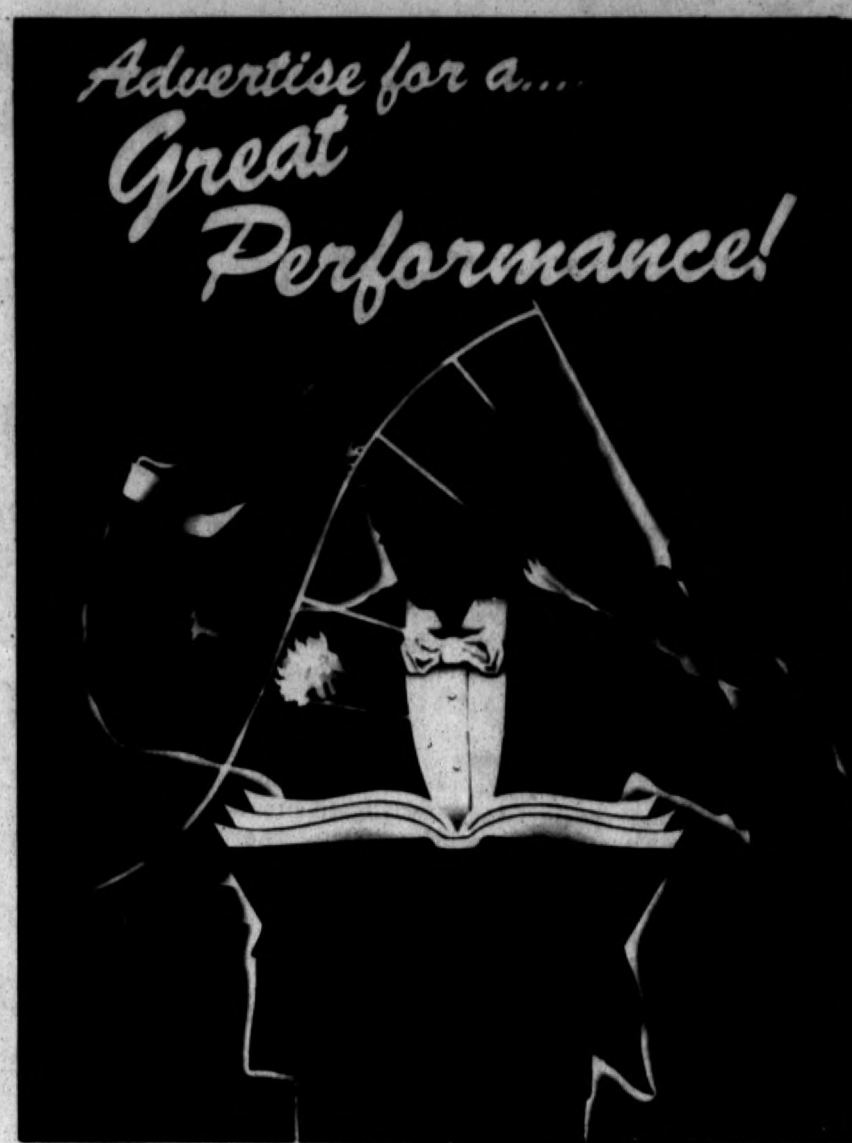
"It's very unfair when you have one person with his viewpoint and philosophy who dictates to that body."

Asked for the accomplishment he's most proud of, Lewis points to the 1984 school-reforming House Bill 72, which included smaller classes and the no-pass, no-play rule.

His traces his interest to problems he had hiring qualified workers for his business.

"The people I was hiring couldn't fill out an application, they couldn't spell, they couldn't compose a sentence. I've got a piece of equipment that I

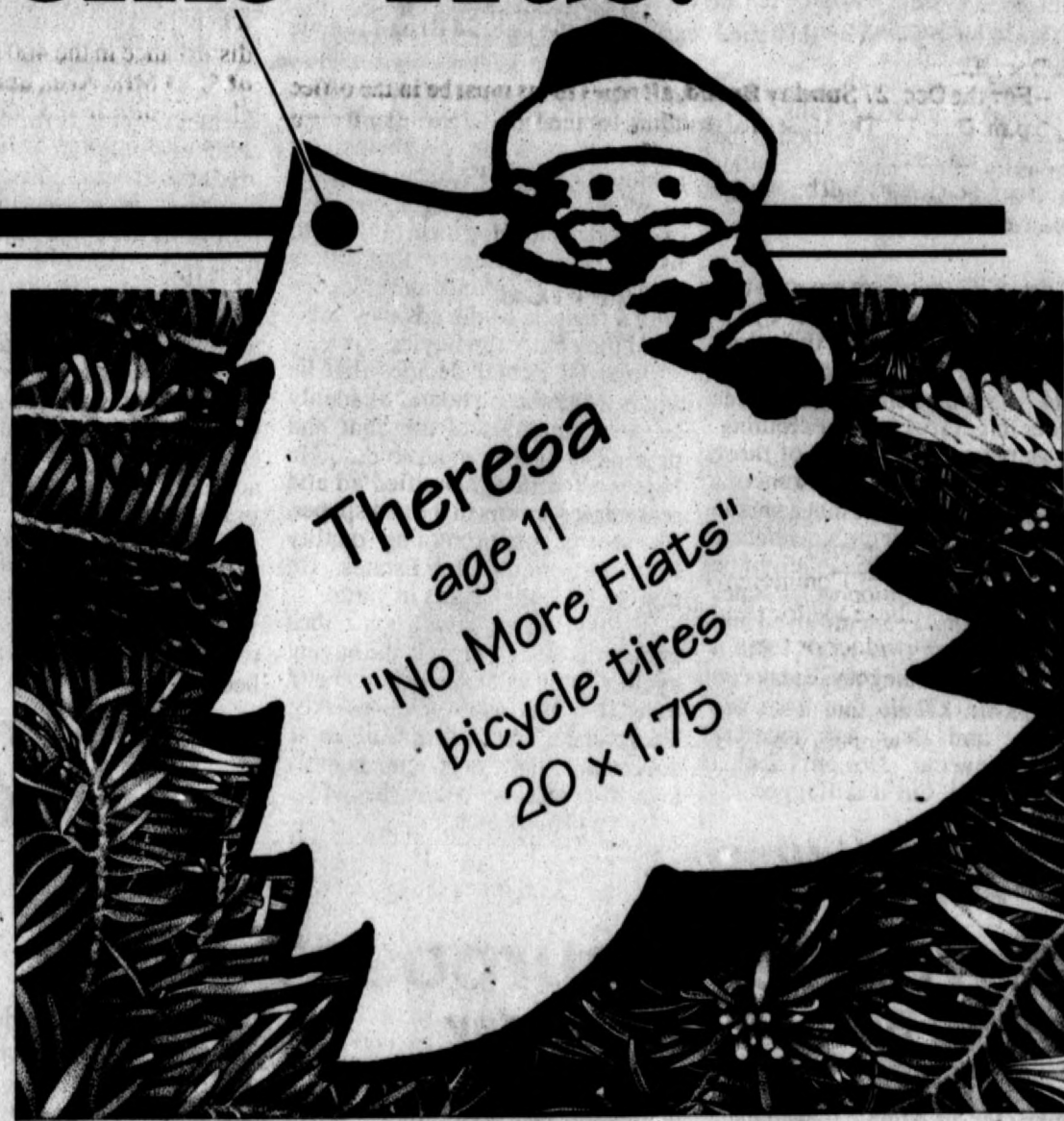
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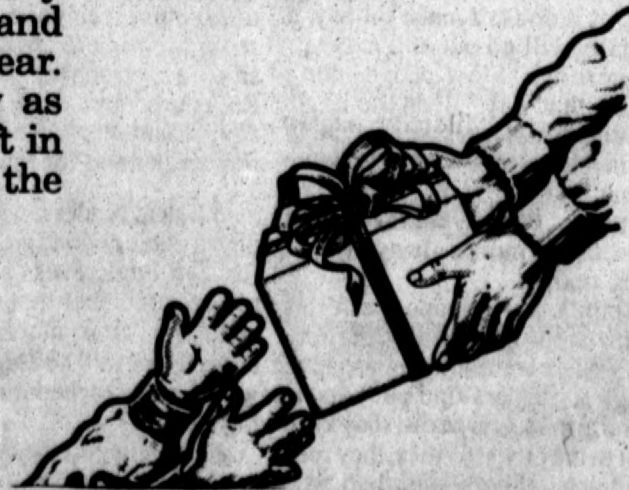

pay over \$1 million for and I've got somebody that really can't compose a sentence applying for that job," he said.

Lewis, whose decision not to seek re-election followed a year in which he was dogged by a misdemeanor ethics charge to which he eventually pleaded no contest, said he is concerned over news coverage of legislators.

"The most disappointing thing for me is to see the press trying to portray legislators in a light other than they really are," he said.

"People, when they run, run to help the community they live in, help the state, try to make it a better place to live. I've only found one or two people in the 22 years that I've been here that ran for the Legislature with an ulterior motive, feathering their pocket or trying to get something out of it."

He notes that Texas' part-time legislators have spent more days in session in recent years than the full-time Congress. That workload, combined with the \$600-a-month salary, hurt many good people, he said.

"It absolutely financially ruined some of our best members. We probably have more divorces and bankruptcies than at any time period in history. I've never seen anybody make a nickel out of being a member of the Legislature. I've seen dozens go broke by being members of the Legislature."

He's also bothered by increasingly partisan debate. Republicans have held more than one-third of House seats since the mid-1980s and in 1993 will hold a similar share of the Senate.

Lewis says that could make the Legislature more like Congress - gridlocked.

"You're going to see more logjams like you're seeing now (on school finance). More partisan battles just for the sake of being partisan," he said.

"All the years I've been speaker, I've tried to avoid that. I'm the only (Democratic) speaker in the United States that appoints committee chairmen that are Republicans.

"We ought to have a system (where) if you're Republican, Democrat, whatever, you still get a free run with your ideas, your legislation. And you're going to be respected for that."

Lewis says he's had offers to become a lobbyist but plans to devote more time to his company. Still, he expects to be around the Capitol "a couple days ... doing a little lobbying" on business issues.

"I enjoy being in the center of making things happen. I'll probably miss that more than anything. And I'm going to miss the people," he said. "As far as the workload and the schedule and the conflicts you have with everybody - I don't think I'll miss that."

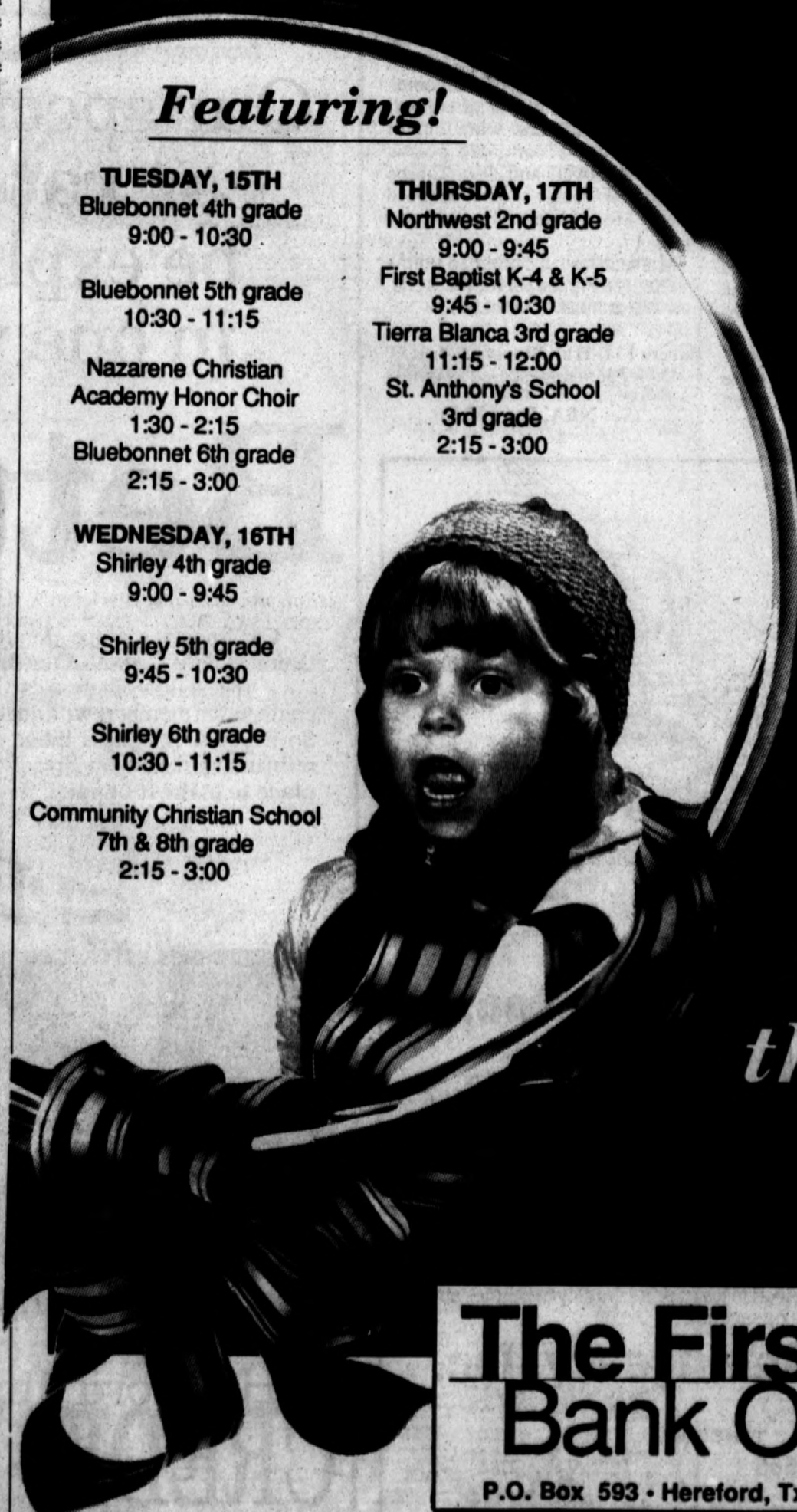

Lady Whitefaces get first win

The Lady Whitefaces got their first win of the season Friday, whipping Lubbock High 43-33 at Whiteface Gymnasium.

Hereford gave head coach Loy Triana his first career victory. It was made sweeter by nine losses to start the season.

"This victory was because of a team effort. They pulled together and

played well," he said. "I'll never forget these girls. This is my first career victory. Hopefully we can go on from here."

The Lady Whitefaces did it with a quick start, outscoring Lubbock High 17-2 in the first quarter. Jill Robinson scored Hereford's first eight points. She was fouled twice on shots under the basket, and she made the shot and the free throw both times.

Kara Sandoval also hit a shot right under the basket, then moved to the perimeter for two straight three-pointers for a 17-2 lead.

Triana took the starters out for much of the second quarter, but Lubbock High was only able to chip four points off Hereford's lead. The score was 22-13 at halftime.

"We started shuffling players in and lost some intensity," Triana said. "Eventually, they'll understand what we mean by pressure-denial defense--everybody will."

Sandoval hit two more three-pointers in the third quarter, helping to hold off Lubbock. One trey swished through with 2 seconds left

to give Hereford a 38-25 lead going into the fourth quarter.

There wasn't much scoring in the fourth quarter. Lubbock High scored the first four points to make it 38-29. Hereford didn't score until 3:48 was left, when Stephanie Wilcox hit an 18-footer. The final three minutes were a foul-fest, but neither team hit many free throws.

Sandoval led all scorers with 19 points. Robinson had 10, and Misty Dudley had nine. Elise Ballard had 14 for the Lady Westerners.

"Kara came out and finally, came into her own as an offensive player," Triana said. "Jamie (Simpson) came in and handled their full court pressure well. When she got into foul trouble, Claudia Ramirez and Brandy Dunn came in and did a good job."

Hereford's next game will be a little tougher. They host Canyon at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday in Whiteface Gym. The boys' team plays at 8 as the second game of a double-header.

The boys were idle Friday. They lost to Memphis Thursday, and a quirky bracket had them waiting until Saturday for their next game.

Phoenix beats Orlando after exploiting Shaq's weakness

Phoenix Suns coach Paul Westphal may have come up with a crunch-time strategy against Shaquille O'Neal that could catch on - foul him and hope for the best.

Westphal, with Phoenix leading 107-105, had his team foul O'Neal twice in the last 6.5 seconds Friday night, and the rookie center's two misses in four tries enabled the Suns to escape Orlando with a 108-107 victory.

"Absolutely we wanted to foul Shaq," Westphal said. "We'd rather have him make two from 15 feet than one from one inch. The worst that can happen to you is he makes both free throws and he ties the game. If you don't foul him, he takes it to the basket. I thought it worked out pretty good."

O'Neal, who had 26 points and 17 rebounds, is hitting just 54.1 percent from the line, prompting Westphal's club to wrap him up like a boxer in a clinch every time he got the ball.

"I blew it," the 7-foot-1 rookie said. "It happens to the best of them. I'll be sure to make the next one."

"I took my three bounces and took my shot and followed through. It just didn't go in. I wasn't scared. I thought I would make all of them."

Magic coach Matt Guokas said O'Neal wasn't supposed to get the ball on Orlando's final two possessions.

"It just happened that way," Guokas said. "I wanted him out there for other situations. Yes, I assumed they would foul him."

Tom Chambers led Phoenix with 27 points.

Orlando's sixth consecutive loss following an 8-3 start dropped the Magic below .500 for the first time this season. The Suns extended their winning streak to six games.

Elsewhere in the NBA, it was Seattle 100, Boston 90; the Los Angeles Clippers 125, Philadelphia 110; Atlanta 112, Denver 107 in overtime; Detroit 107, Cleveland 103; Houston 110, Chicago 96; the Los Angeles Lakers 118, Washington 103; and Indiana 134, Portland 124 in double overtime.

Rockets 110, Bulls 96
Hakeem Olajuwon scored 28 points as Houston snapped Chicago's six-game home winning streak.

The Bulls, who trailed by 15 points in the third quarter, closed to 91-87 on Horace Grant's two free throws with 8:13 left in the game, but the Rockets outscored Chicago 14-3 in the next 4:41, sealing the outcome.

Olajuwon got plenty of support from his teammates, with four of them scoring 17 or more points. Vernon Maxwell and Otis Thorpe scored 19 each, rookie forward Robert Horry had 18 and Kenny Smith 17.

Michael Jordan scored 26 points and Scottie Pippen 22 for the Bulls, now 6-2 at home this season.

The tournaments were to finish up Saturday.

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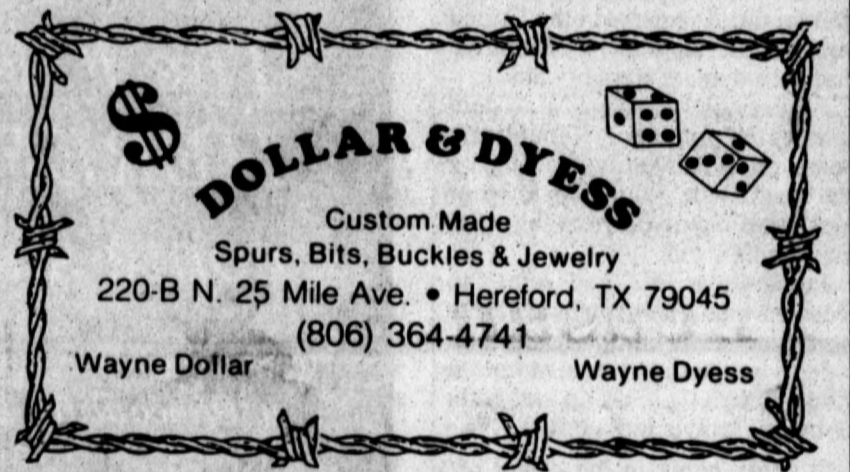
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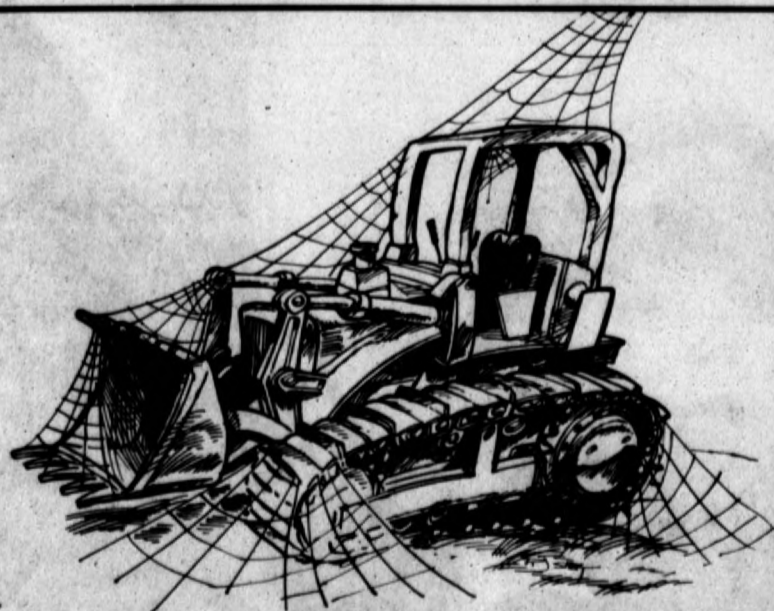
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Cotton Bowl gets bad publicity for picking Irish

DALLAS (AP) - The Cotton Bowl finally got some national attention. The hard way.
Seldom in the Cotton Bowl's 57-year existence has there been so much negative hoopla over the invitation of a guest team.
There was a time when Notre Dame coming to the New Year's Day game to play the Southwest Conference was the biggest of deals. That was 22 years ago when the Fighting Irish decided to come out of bowl hibernation after a 50-year hiatus to play the Texas Longhorns for the national championship.
Notre Dame is coming again, for the sixth time, but it has created some

hard feelings, none of the school's doing.
In fact, Notre Dame is sacrificing \$1 million to play in the Cotton Bowl, the difference between an Orange Bowl and a Cotton Bowl berth.
You've heard that No. 5 Notre Dame was chosen by the Cotton Bowl over No. 3 ranked Florida State to play the unbeaten, untied and No. 4 ranked Texas Aggies, who are 12-0 and one of three unblemished teams in the land.
The Cotton Bowl has been accused of everything from money-grubbing to violating the trust of the rookie bowl coalition which was put into place to make some sense out of the chaotic invitation process which had teams being courted in early

November to make commitments almost before they had played half their schedule.
Notre Dame shines in the national picture like its golden dome trademark on the South Bend campus. It's the most marketable of collegiate football teams.
The Cotton Bowl led by selection chairman Jim "Hoss" Brock and president Robert Smith decided to do the best thing for its survival. It's like drafting "the best athlete" available. In the bowl biz, you do what's best for your pocket book.
CBS dumped the Cotton Bowl not long ago after a 35-year marriage and it had to settle for some old cold taters and a paltry \$2.7 million a year from NBC, the initials some believe

stands for "Notre Dame Broadcasting Co." since it has exclusive rights to all Fighting Irish home games. That was about a \$1.5 million payout for the Cotton Bowl.
Notre Dame has been a ratings hero. Ratings mean bigger advertising bucks.
The Cotton Bowl is dealing with basic math here. They're cutting back everywhere. They killed the parade to save costs. Bean counters have even told Southwest Conference sports information directors who traditionally help out the week of the game that their per diem is no longer available.
All of this is little consolation to A&M fans who now see R.C. Slocum's sophomore sensations in a national championship box canyon. A&M fans had held out the longshot hope (probably a million to one if Las Vegas would be so brash as to post odds) that Miami and Alabama would tie in the Sugar Bowl.
Coupled with a victory over Florida State, A&M fans deducted nobody could deny the Aggies a second national title (they got their first in 1939).

The Aggies will need a trifecta miracle now. Alabama and Miami will have to tie and play poorly doing it, Nebraska will have to whip Florida State (the Seminoles are favored by 10), and the underdog, yes underdog Aggies will have to whip the Fighting Irish.
Oddsmakers have installed Notre Dame as a field goal favorite.
The Cotton Bowl Athletic Association office is difficult to reach these days. There is incoming fax flak, irate callers are demanding an explanation, and bags of mail are jamming the doorways.

Oh yes, Brock was put under a "gag" order by his bosses not to talk about it.
Brock? The original public relations machine told not to talk? What a shame.
The sold-out, much-discussed and cussed Cotton Bowl hasn't had this much hoopla since Darrell Royal beat Ara Parseghian for the national title in 1970.

Alamo Bowl back after bad start

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Nobody could believe what they were seeing that New Year's morning. The day was supposed to mark San Antonio's grand entry into the bowl business.
It seemed perfect. A tourist city with a nice, often-empty stadium. The game was a sellout. Everything was in place.
Everything except a roof.
"You would not have believed it," said Murray Evans, an assistant coach at Hardin-Simmons. "We went out to play the game, and there were about two inches of ice covering the stadium."
Hardin-Simmons beat Denver University 20-0 in a game almost no one remembers. Thus ended the entire cold, hard first life of the Alamo Bowl. Almost 47 years later, it will return to find some things haven't changed.
San Antonio will still be a tourist city with a nice, empty stadium. The organizers of the Alamo Bowl believe their game, set for Dec. 31, 1993 in the Alamodome, will be the perfect

holiday attraction.
They can only hope fate is kinder to San Antonio the second time around.
"The guys all thought they were doing something good," Monk Munoz said. "And it kind of hit them right in the face."
Munoz joined the Elks Club shortly after the game. The Elks sponsored the game, hoping to raise money for their crippled children's hospital. Until the temperature started plunging Dec. 28, 1946, it looked as though the Alamo Bowl would be better than almost anyone hoped.
The Elks were able to line up Hardin-Simmons, one of only three undefeated teams in the nation that year. Back then, Southwest Conference teams avoided the Cowboys, who featured the shifty running of Rudy "Little Doc" Mobley.
He led the nation with 1,262 yards rushing in 1946. Like a lot of his teammates, it was his first year back in college after going off to fight Hitler.

"He'd marched all over Germany, dodged bullets for four years, and then came back in 1946 to break the rushing records he'd set in 1942," Evans said.
The 10-0 Cowboys were favored to beat Denver, which was 5-4-1. The mediocre record didn't seem to bother local fans of the Elks, who ordered 30,000 tickets for 23,000-seat Alamo Stadium.
Advance sales were strong, though the buildup was not without controversy. At one point, Elks football chairman Bill Bloodworth had to deny a rumor that the Denver band would be prevented from participating if it brought its "negro members" to town.
"The Jim Crow law that prevents us from seating negroes with whites may require special seating arrangements," Bloodworth told the press. "But that can be handled."
It was a different world in December of 1946. Unemployment figures for that month showed 9,800 people out of work in San Antonio. A five-bedroom house near Oak Hills Country Club went for \$4,000.
The week of the game, President Harry Truman predicted the federal budget would have a \$202 million surplus. All the Elks wanted was to cover their commitments and give a chunk of change to charity.
Even with the top ticket going for \$4.80, they figured it could be done. The Elks had promised to pay Denver's expenses. Hardin-Simmons was given a \$12,000 guarantee.
"It was good money for us," Evans said. "We were just a small Baptist school. In Abilene, we would lose money every game."
Denver flew into town Dec. 27. A cold front was expected to follow them in. Nobody knew how cold it would be.
Both teams were put up at the Guter Hotel, though Hardin-Simmons had a little trouble getting there. The Cowboys were due to arrive Dec. 28, but ice started forming on roads all over Texas. They waited a day, then 38 players piled into a bus and took their chances.
It was slow going, but they pulled in safely and hoped, like everybody else, that the cold front would blow through by Jan. 1. Instead, everything just got worse.
Snow, sleet, icy roads, temperatures in the 20s. It wouldn't let up. The Elks, (See ALAMO BOWL, Page 10A)

Deficiency payments coming Monday

Monday eligible producers who have complied with the 1992 farm program, will begin receiving 1992 wheat, barley and oat deficiency payments.

Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service prepares deficiency payments when the 5 month (June through October) moving average market price for wheat, barley and oats falls below the target price established for these crops. Target prices established for these crops are wheat \$4.00 per bushel, barley \$2.36 per bushel, and \$1.45 per bushel for oats.

Final payment rates are \$.81 per bushel for wheat, \$.56 per bushel for barley and \$.17 per bushel for oats.

The Deaf Smith County ASCS Office has prepared drafts totaling over \$2.5 million.

U.S. wheat growers harvested 62.4 million acres the year averaging 39.4 bushels per acre--the second highest average on record--to produce more than 2.4 billion bushels of wheat, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's October crop production report. The 1992 wheat crop is 24 percent higher than last year's crop.

129 million bushels of Texas wheat are included in the total 1992 production. To produce the crop, Texas farmers planted 5,900,000 acres of wheat, harvesting 3,800,000 acres and averaged 34.0 bushels per acre.

Approximately 3.2 million wheat base acres were idled to meet the requirements of the 1992 acreage reduction programs. In 1991, Texas farmers harvested 2,800,000 acres and produced an 84 million bushel wheat crop. 1991 wheat yields averaged 30.0 bushels per acre.

The USDA report placed the 1992 oats crop at 295 million bushels, 21 percent more than the 1991 crop. Barley production is estimated at 456 million bushels, 2 percent less than in 1991.

The national average market price for wheat during the first five marketing months of the 1992 marketing season--June through October--was \$3.19 per bushel. Barley averaged \$1.80 per bushel and Oats averaged \$1.28 per bushel.

Urbanczyk on champion team

Greg Urbanczyk of Hereford was a member of the South Plains College livestock judging team that closed out its season with the grand championship at the WTSU Invitational Dec. 5.

The team, competing with 18 other teams, swept the contest, winning first place honors in horse and sheep judging and oral reasons and second-place team honors in beef and swine judging.

In other season wins, the SPC team was third at the American Royal livestock judging contest in Kansas City, and reserve champion team in the sheep division at the North American International livestock judging contest in Louisville, Ky. Urbanczyk was fourth individual in sheep judging.

WELLMAN, Texas (AP) - Cotton farmer Jackie Burris considers himself one of the lucky ones.

Burris, who planted 3,000 acres near Wellman this year, was hit hard by spring storms that drenched much of the South Plains and Panhandle. But he, like many others, went back in and planted again.

Now Burris is reaping his best crop in three years.

"It's like playing Russian roulette," said Burris, 39, his boots sinking in the soft red dirt of one cotton field. "It scares you to death when those clouds keep on a comin'."

Mud early this week kept Burris from stripping the 600 acres still on the stalk on his farm about 50 miles

southwest of Lubbock. The plants were heavy with bolls.

What makes this season different from others, though, were the so-called "ghost acres" that headed off an agricultural disaster.

Thousands of acres of grain sorghum and soybeans were rushed into a shortened growing season when the cotton crop washed out in May.

Those late-planted alternatives did well. And so did the cotton where the farmers replanted.

"It wasn't the catastrophe it could have been," said Jackie Smith, extension economist for the Texas Agriculture Extension Service in Lubbock. "If we had lost the cotton crop in July, we couldn't have come back to anything."

Problems started in mid-May, just when the young stalks were emerging. A series of thunderstorms hit - one dumped 14 inches of rain near Wellman. Then came near-freezing temperatures as June neared.

Shawn Wade, a spokesman for Plains Cotton Growers, said 2.5

million acres of cotton were "up to your boot" when the heavy rains and fungal diseases struck. The bulk of that crop was lost, he said.

Most of the cotton that was replanted now has been harvested in the 25 counties Plains Cotton Growers serves.

Those who took another chance on cotton, planting as late as mid-June, benefited from little insect threat, rains at the right times and a warm September, Wade said. Some have been rewarded with crops producing as much as two bales per acre (last year's per-acre average was under one bale).

Figures are not final yet, but Wade projected 1.4 million acres of cotton survived the season. That compares with 2.9 million cotton acres harvested in 1991.

Those who chose alternative crops were cotton farmers mostly north of Lubbock.

Pesticide training set

AMARILLO-- On Dec. 15, Texas Agricultural Extension Service will provide a videoconference pesticide safety training for agricultural applicators and handlers who work with agricultural pesticides. The program will be held in the auditorium of the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. from 8:30 a.m. until 2 p.m.

Private and licensed commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators who complete the conference training will earn three continuing education units offered through Texas Department of Agriculture.

Don Reeves, Potter County Extension agent, will moderate the program. The videoconference on pesticide safety is being hosted live via satellite by Iowa State University Extension Service.

"Through Texas A&M's participation in a national agriculture education satellite network (AGSAT), we are able to augment our local education programs with additional offerings such as this one from Iowa State," Reeves said.

Registration begins at 8:30 a.m. followed by the 9 a.m. videoconference briefings and demonstrations on pesticide toxicity, protective clothing and gear, mixing and loading chemicals safely, and pesticide emergency situations.

At 1 p.m., participants will review a pesticide situation questionnaire designed by Iowa State and hear presentations on pesticide pathways to surface and ground waters. A wrap-up discussion of state and federal laws and regulations concludes the program around 2 p.m.

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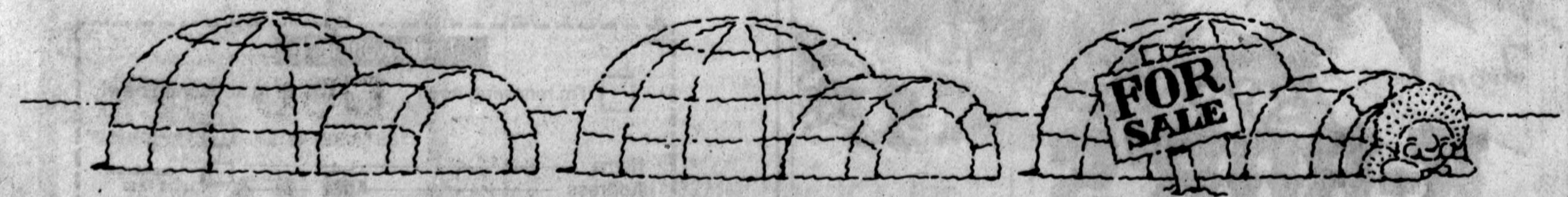
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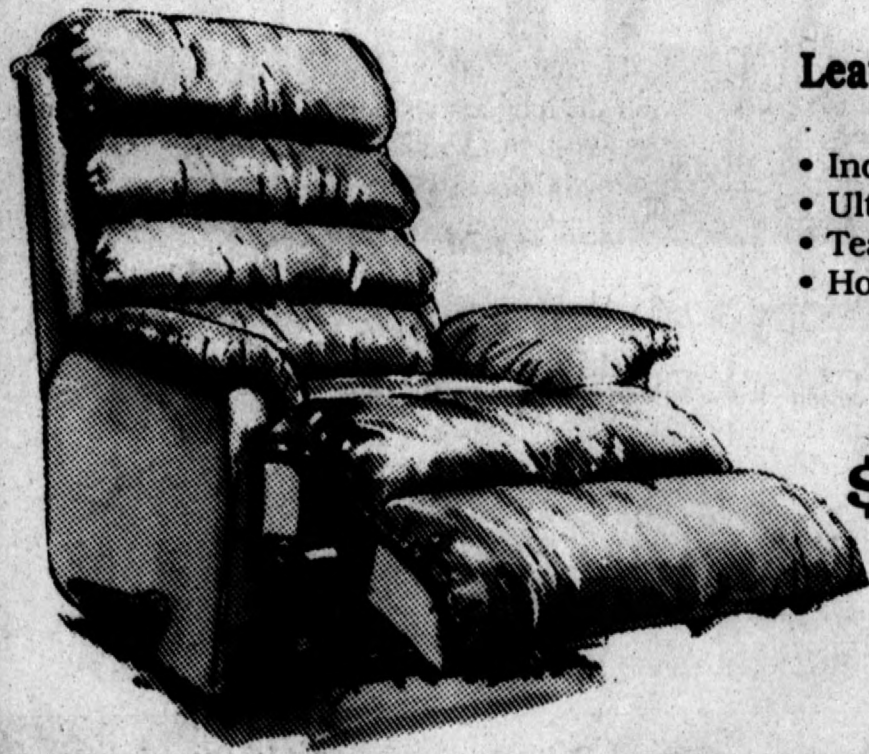
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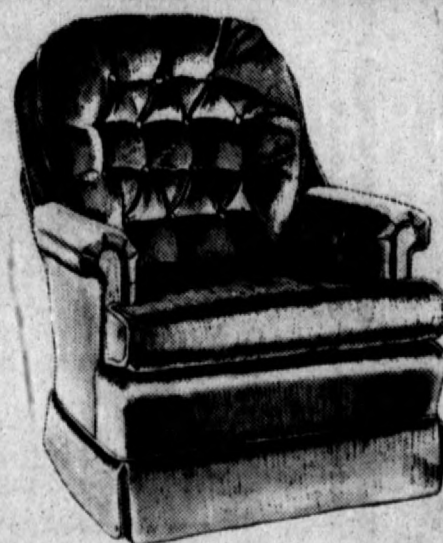

While any food can cause a reaction in a given individual, some foods - wheat, corn, fish, nuts, eggs, milk and shellfish - are more common culprits than others. Yet, it's often the disguised ingredient, such as peanut butter in chili, that catches an allergy sufferer off-guard and brings about a reaction, such as indigestion, skin irritation and in some cases, even death.

The initial symptoms of the allergic reaction include raised rash (hives), wheezing, eczema, and swelling of the lips and face. The symptoms can appear within minutes, or in some cases, not for several days. Usually, these symptoms can be countered with the use of an over-the-counter antihistamine and an ice pack.

When Food Allergies Become Deadly:

Not all allergic reactions can be

treated with an ice pack and antihistamine. If you suffer from anaphylaxis, the potentially life threatening condition that results from a severe allergic reaction, just a bite of the wrong food could lead to an emergency situation for susceptible people.

In addition to the swelling of the lips and face, other symptoms of anaphylaxis include:

- Flushing, swelling of the tissues of the throat, tongue, hands and feet
- Wheezing, shortness of breath, coughing, hoarseness
- Headache
- Nausea, vomiting, abdominal cramps
- Sense of impending doom, loss of consciousness

If not treated immediately, anaphylaxis can be fatal. Such reactions require immediate attention and should be treated as medical emergencies.

Those with known life-threatening allergies should consult a physician about carrying the drug epinephrine, the medication of choice for treating anaphylaxis, in an easy-to-use auto-injector designed to provide on-the-spot emergency treatment. 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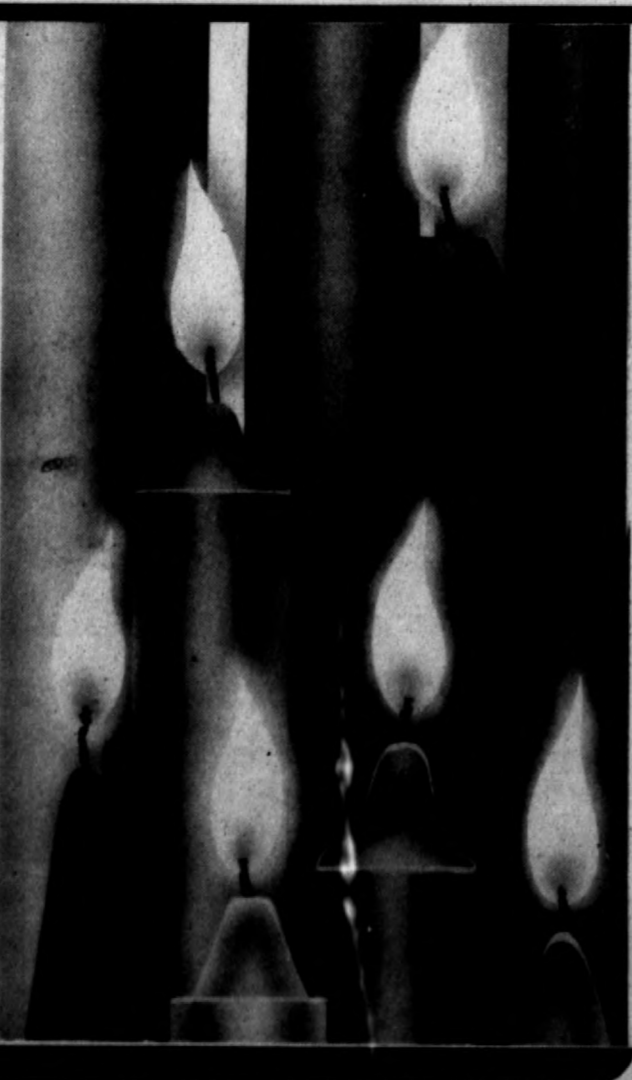

Carey accepted the 1992 Norman Human Rights Award on Tuesday. The award is given each year to recognize "outstanding contributions to the struggle for human rights."

Carey, who created the Cimarron Circuit Opera Company, said he saw the honor as an exchange for how he tried to help some refugees this summer.

While in Austria, he came across a train filled with young people fleeing Bosnia. "I saw those devastated faces and wanted to show what I could do for them," he said.

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Plan ahead to help prevent holiday fires

During the holidays, people will be doing a lot more cooking, partying and decorating--activities that also can increase the risk of fires.

Cooking is the leading cause of U.S. home fires, but the National Fire Protection Association reports that Christmas trees cause more than 500 fires each year, resulting in an average of 16 deaths, 81 injuries and more than \$10 million in direct property damage.

"People can take a number of precautions to help keep their homes safe from fires during this season," said Dr. Susan Quiring, housing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "While planning holiday meals, parties, decorations and other festivities, a few fire safety tips should be added to the list."

Quiring recommends following these fire safety tips to help keep family and friends safe during the holidays:

-Take Care of your Christmas trees. Put fresh Christmas trees in stands that will not tip over. Place the tree away from heat sources and exits, and water it constantly. Buy artificial trees that are labeled fire-retardant.

-Be careful when burning candles. Keep them away from decorations and other combustible materials. Don't leave children alone with burning candles, and always keep candles, matches and lighters out of their reach. Never display lighted candles in windows or near exits, and never use them to decorate Christmas trees.

-Check decorative lights. Purchase only lights labeled as laboratory tested. For outside decorations, use only lights labeled for outdoor use. Don't

overload electrical outlets, and always unplug all lights before leaving home or going to bed. Never put electrical lights on a metal Christmas tree.

-If the fireplace has a fire in it, hang stockings elsewhere.

-Choose holiday gifts wisely. Pass up those that could be highly flammable.

-Make holiday parties safe. Decorate only with flame-retardant or noncombustible materials, and avoid using candles. Provide guests with large, deep ashtrays and check them frequently. After the party, check inside and under upholstery and in trash cans for cigarette butts that may be smoldering.

-Be careful when cooking. Avoid wearing loose clothes that can be ignited by burners. Always turn pot handles in, and never leave the kitchen when something is cooking on the stove. Don't store items on the stove top, which could catch fire. Keep kitchen appliances clean and in good condition, and turn them off when you're finished. Don't overload electrical outlets, and don't use appliances with frayed or cracked wires.

-Leave fireworks to the professionals. Fireworks that burn or explode are dangerous. Nearly 11,200 people suffered fireworks injuries serious enough to require a hospital emergency room visit in 1991. Even sparklers, often thought to be harmless, burn at temperatures of 1,800 degrees. Attend licensed public fireworks displays and look all you want, but don't touch these dangerous devices.

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Between the Covers

If I didn't know Christmas was near any other way, I could tell just by the requests we've received the past couple of weeks. Patrons have been looking for *The Littlest Angel*, *The Night Before Christmas*, and a picture of Scrooge, to name a few. If you haven't been in the library the past few weeks you need to come see our Christmas decor. "Gifts of Christmases Past" is the theme for our display this month, and library employees have included some of their collections. We also have all (or nearly all) our Christmas-related books out for convenient browsing. These include books of crafts, recipes, and decorating ideas, as well as volumes of fiction and non-fiction relating to the holiday.

I guess *The Shepherd* would fall into the "Christmas fiction" category, but to call the seventy-eight page, generously illustrated book a novel is stretching it a bit. Frederick Forsyth bestselling author of *The Deceiver* and *The Day of the Jackal*, has created a story unlike any other he has written. *The Shepherd* is the story of a young RAF fighter pilot on a routine flight from Germany to England on Christmas Eve, 1957. As his thoughts drift to the holiday, he realizes he has lost his compass and radio - a pilot's worst nightmare. Drawing the title from the term used by flyers for a guiding aircraft, the tale is at once suspenseful and inspiring.

There are a few authors who only need to have their names mentioned to have their books in great demand. Stephen King is an obvious example. Last week his latest, *Dolores Claiborne*, did not even appear on the New York Times Bestseller List. This week it is number one. AND the Deaf Smith County Library is right on top of things this week as we put out our copy. There is already a waiting list, so if you like King, get your name on it!

Also on the fiction list is James Michener's huge (what else?) novel of Mexico entitled (surprise!) *Mexico*. This appears to be typical Michener, but I was surprised to learn that he started on this work in 1961, laying it aside for first one project, then another until he lost track of it. Michener recently rediscovered the manuscript, and polished it into this comprehensive novel of a nation with a rich and fascinating history.

From the heavy to the light, with some stops in between - that characterizes our non-fiction spread this week. Ann Rule offers *Everything She Ever Wanted*, subtitled "A True Story of Obsessive Love, Murder, and Betrayal." Seeing themselves as a new "Scarlett and Rhett", Pat and Tom Allanson form what many consider to

be the perfect union...until the bodies start turning up. Increasingly bizarre and suspenseful as the complex story is unraveled.

A few days ago (or weeks...or months...time gets away from me), Paul Harvey, on his program *The Rest of the Story*, told of a golfer who, finding his ball had landed in the (in-bounds) clubhouse, moved some tables, opened a window, and gently lined his shot onto the nearby green. The ruling? Moving the tables and chairs was OK, but opening the window altered an "integral part of the course!" That story, and dozens of others are included in *Golf Is A Good Walk Spoiled*, a collection of strange and fascinating incidents involving decisions on the rules of golf.

I would wager to say that sometime during the holiday season, most men entertain a fleeting thought of a model train - either one they had as a child or the one they're going to put in a special "train room" in their dream home someday. If you are extremely susceptible to visual images, you may want to stay away from *Model Railroads*. I have no idea whether there is any substance to the text or not, because I spent all my time looking at the envy-inspiring pictures.

DON'T FORGET!!! This Thursday is FAMILY FILM NIGHT at the library. *The Trail of Robin Hood* feature Roy Rogers, Trigger, and a host of cowboy stars against some cowboy grins who try to keep trees off the market until after the holiday. The movie, thanks to the Friends of the Library, is FREE, and popcorn is available for a nominal charge. The movie begins with cartoon shorts at 7:00 p.m. in the library basement. See you there!

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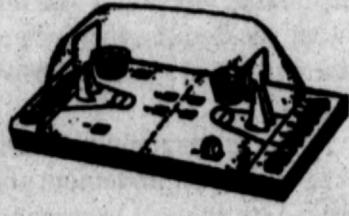

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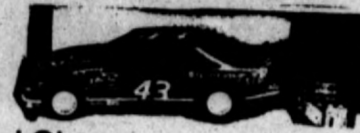

WE NEED TQM, PDQ

(Second of Two Parts)

Last week in part one, we defined Total Quality Management (TQM) as a management strategy aimed at improving every business function. The Japanese describe this process with a single word. Their word is Kaizen, and it means continuous improvement, involving everyone.

For Amarillo Hardware Company (AHC), the Japanese word has become as American as apple pie. This Texas-based hardware wholesaler implemented the Kaizen method of improvement more than 4 years ago, shortly after Joe Wildman became president. As Wildman accepted the corporate reins, the 83-year-old company was facing many new challenges. For example, in the 1960's there were more than 500 hardware wholesalers, today there are fewer than 200.

"As we looked around our industry we saw some of our competitors dropping out of business. We began to ask ourselves why," Wildman said. "We knew if we were going to be successful where others were failing, we would have to improve."

Getting everyone involved

Wildman realized early on that improvement in any business function is dependent on the people involved in that area. With the help of a dedicated and talented management team, Wildman set up processes to measure, monitor and improve quality.

We learned early on that you can't improve anything you can't measure," Wildman said. So company personnel began by establishing benchmarks for quality.

The company posts daily Kaizen projects on erasable boards in the employee lounge. AHC monitors financial progress, quality performance and safety records on the boards. "Every company employee knows where we are every day," Wildman said. "We provide incentives based on how well we're doing. The better we perform, the greater the incentive." Employee incentives include cash bonus drawings, paid time-off and recognition at monthly Quality Committee meetings.

The process works

For Amarillo Hardware Company the process is working. Errors made in filling, packing, and shipping customer orders have been reduced to fewer than 5 per 1,000 order lines. Not bad for a company that inventories more than 30,000 different items and processes more than 1.2 million order lines per year. The goal is to have no errors.

Customers satisfaction, based on telephone surveys, is rising at an all-time high, with a positive approval rate of 97.2 percent. The company views every negative response as an opportunity for follow-up by the appropriate department.

This year, the company has slashed errors in their inventory verification process to one-third of the 1991. This quality control device audits any difference between computer inventory levels and actual shelf quantities.

Safety improvements may be among the most important Kaizen elements the company measures. At the time of this writing the company has gone 482 straight days without a lost time accident. "Whatever we measure, improves," said Wildman. "Especially when we measure the right things, involve our people and find the actual causes of quality failure."

AHC has now expanded its operation to six states where they serve more than 1,600 accounts. Recently, I attended the company's monthly quality meeting. I was impressed with the way the Quality Committee tackled the issues head on. Maybe some day soon the Japanese will travel to Amarillo to learn about hardware distribution systems.

Your survival in the 1990s may depend on adopting a TQM or Kaizen quality improvement philosophy. If you wish to grow and prosper, measuring and improving quality is a valid concept. Even when you're headed down stream, it doesn't hurt to row. As my good friend - Japanese/Texan - Bubba Yahkhamato said, "Kaizen, you'all."

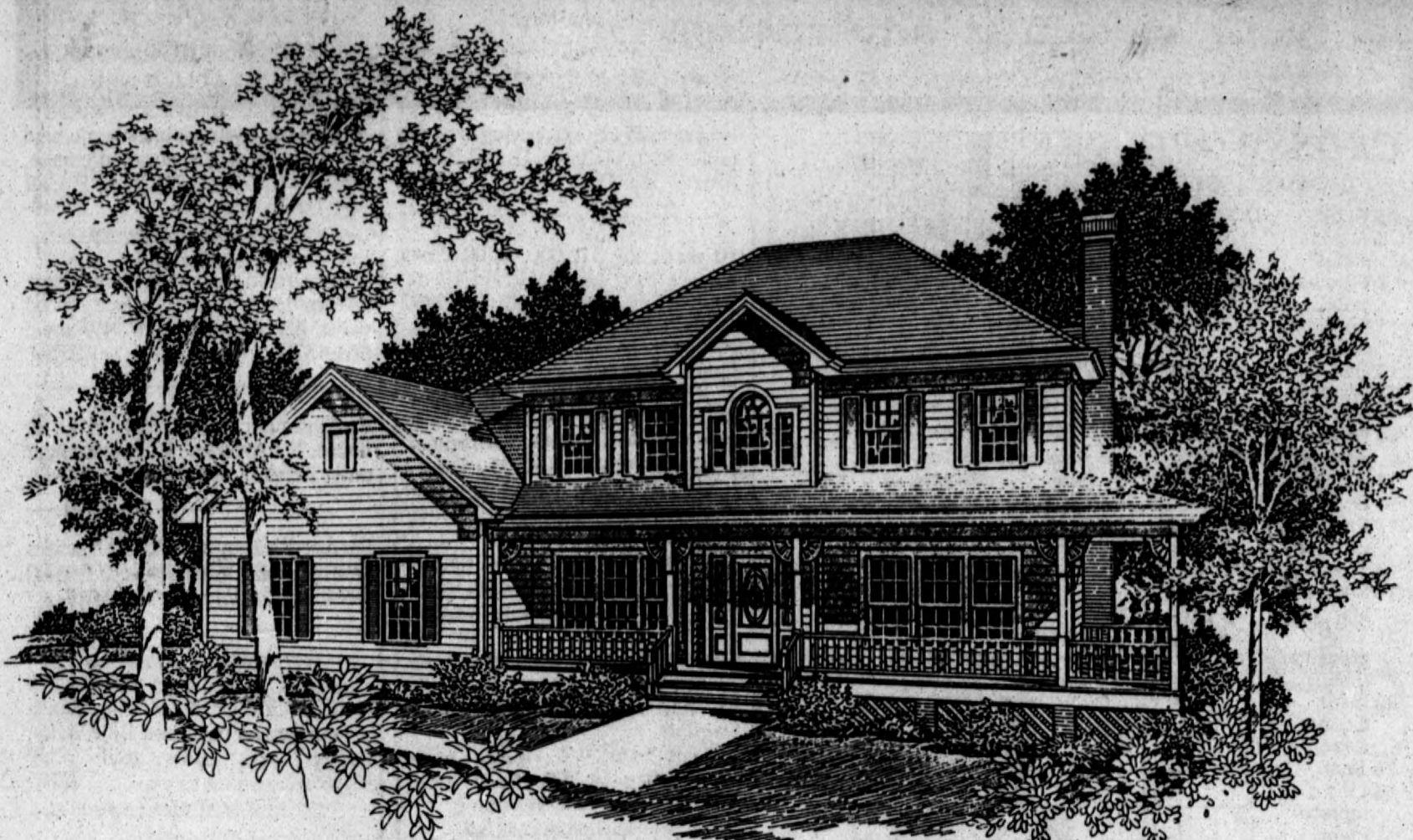

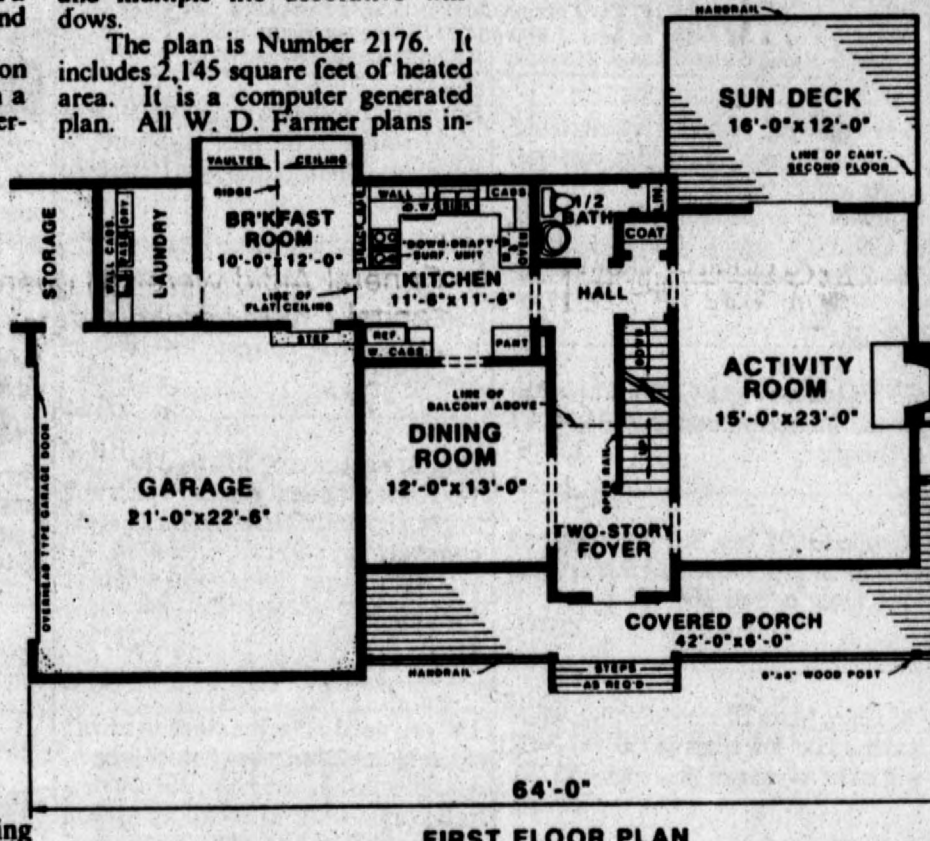
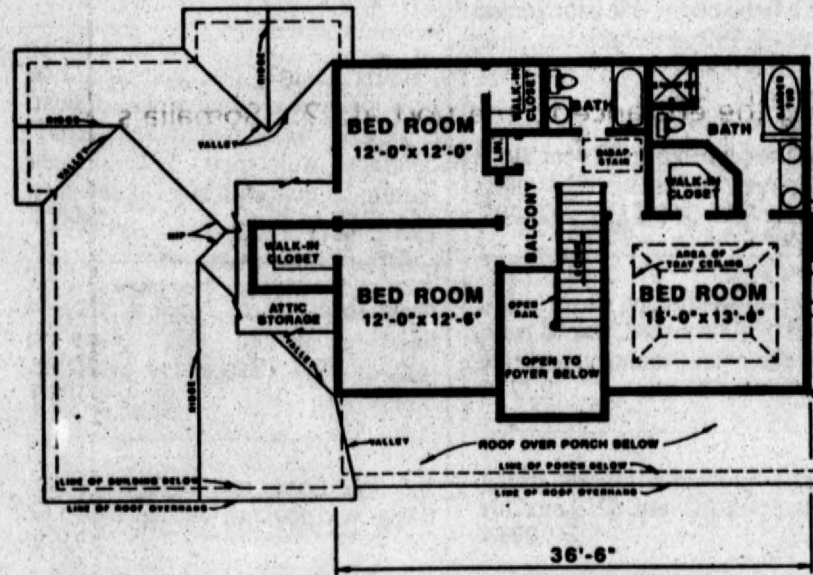
There are three bedrooms on the second floor that spring from a central hall with balcony over-

Q: My Whirlpool gas dryer squeals and squeals when it first starts up and runs for five or 10 minutes. Then the racket goes away and the machine runs like new. I lubricated the drum drive belt and the idler wheel, drum support roller shafts, and I cleaned the rear groove in the drum, all without improvement. Please help.

A. You are on the right track. Set the temperature control to air fluff then unplug the dryer from its power source.

Next, remove the drive belt from the motor by pulling the idler pulley

back toward the motor and slipping the belt off the motor drive pulley. Slowly release the tension on the idler pulley assembly. Remove it from the dryer.

Plug the machine back into its power source and test run the dryer. If you get the squealing noise, it's probably coming from the motor bearings, which are factory lubricated and cannot be oiled. If there is no squeal with the belt off, then it's either the idler pulley assembly, or the two support rollers. If your dryer is old, we suggest you replace all

three parts. You should also give the appliance a good vacuuming inside and check the condition of the belt. This is a good time to replace it if it shows signs of cracking or fraying.

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

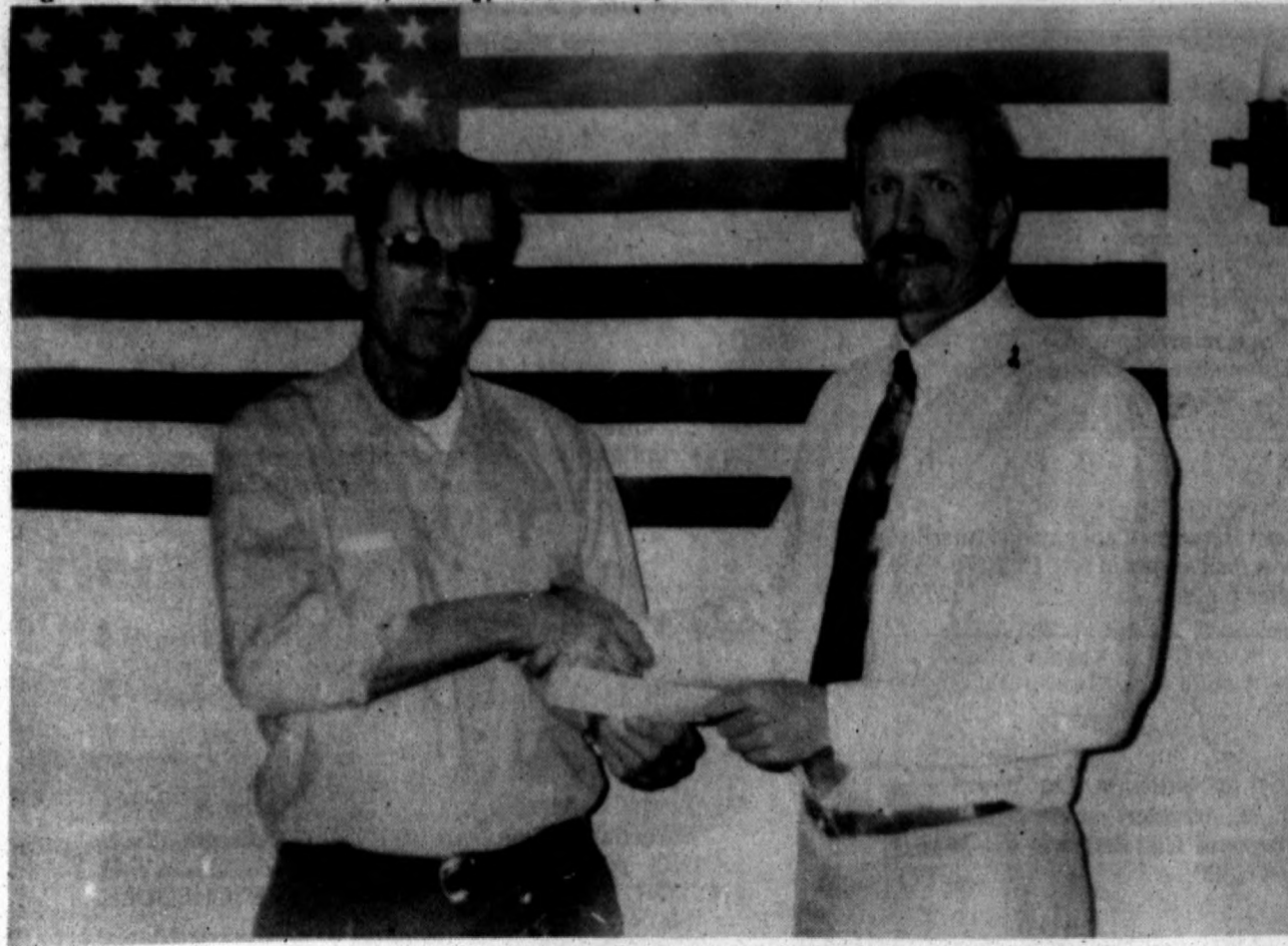

Extension News

Teenagers may also be embarrassed by the reminders of their childhood that surface during the holidays. Having a stocking or a favorite ornament may suddenly become

"babyish." Family traditions may again become important to the teenager in a few years.

How can parents and teens work together to have an enjoyable holiday? It's not too difficult, if parents will acknowledge that their teens are growing up.

Start by discussing some ground rules in advance. When can the teenager plan to date or be with friends? When is the whole family expected to be home? When can friends be invited over or involved in family activities?

Involve your teenager in some of the adult responsibilities for the holidays. Depending upon his or her interests and skills, put the teen in charge of the baking, the gift-wrapping, assembling toys for younger siblings or whatever. They can be a

tremendous help and have a sense of accomplishment, too.

Create some new family traditions or activities that acknowledge the teenager's status as a young adult. Perhaps it's transferring something special that used to be done by a parent to the teenager, such as setting up the Christmas tree or reading the Christmas story.

You may want to let the teen give a holiday party for his or her friends. Or you may wish to encourage his or her participation in a community service activity, such as collecting food for the needy.

You can have a happier holiday season by helping your teenager bridge the gap between wanting the joy of a child's Christmas and wanting to feel like an adult who makes decisions about Christmas.

Stretch family budget

With some planning and thought, stretching the family food budget isn't hard. Paying attention to details can reap big savings.

The United Food and Commercial Workers Union suggests the following:

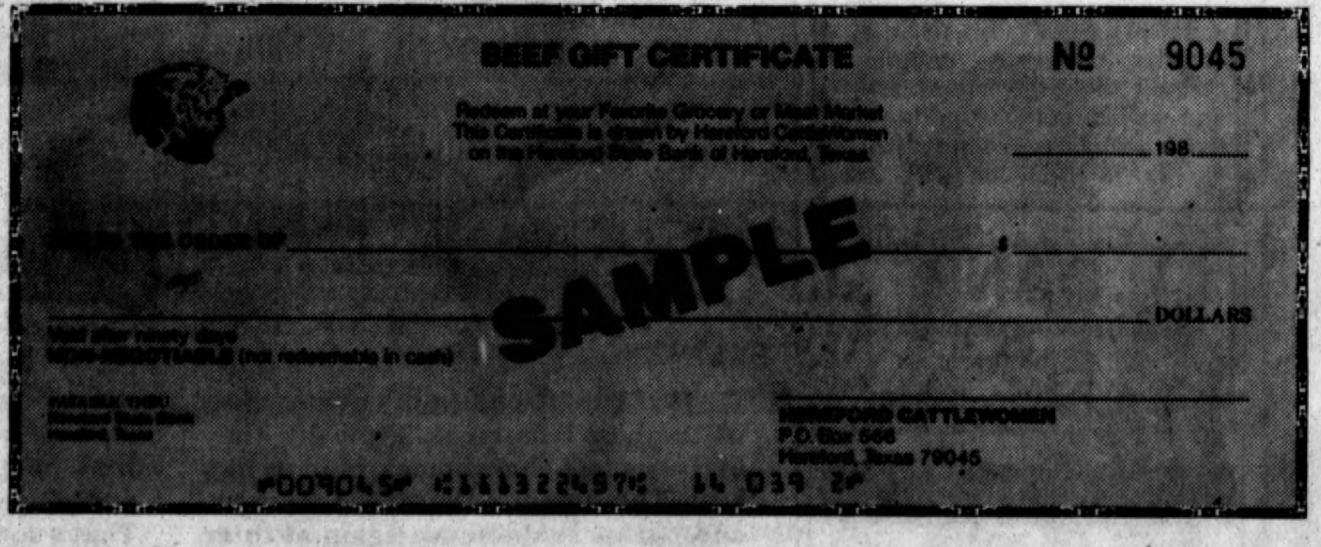

Jaclyn Smith goes sleuthing with Corbin Bernsen's ghost

Smith plays Elizabeth Bentley, an attorney-turned-private investigator who discovers her new office is inhabited by the ghost (Bernsen) of a former tenant, a tough detective slain in the '40s. Together, the unlikely duo finds baffling mystery and unexpected romance.

Romantic whodunit features Anne Francis

Jaclyn Smith knows what being an angel is all about. The longest-tenured of *Charlie's Angels*, Smith went on to star in the miniseries *The Rage of Angels* and its sequel. Now she comes to the aid of a ghost (Corbin Bernsen) whose unsolved murder prevents his celestial ascension in *Love Can Be Murder*, airing Monday, Dec. 14, on NBC. Anne Francis co-stars in this lighthearted whodunit that couples vintage glamour with '90s self-actualization.

Smith plays Elizabeth Bentley, an attorney in her father's prestigious Los Angeles law firm with a lawyer fiance (Cliff DeYoung). Her "perfect" existence should bring her contentment, but while her beau is talking low mortgage rates at their favorite eatery, she imagines she's joining a band of terrorists who shoot up the restaurant. Her psychiatrist suggests that this and similar daydreams stem from her lack of fulfillment, so Elizabeth decides to quit the firm and become a private eye, despite her family's disapproval.

Elizabeth sallies forth nevertheless, renting long-abandoned office space that proves to be filled not only with old furniture and dust, but also with the spirit of detective Nick Peyton (Bernsen), who was slain in 1948 while working on a case.

Telling her he's "stuck between here and the big racetrack in the sky," Nick asks Elizabeth to investigate his murder, but he first must convince her he is more than a figment of her imagination. (A hickey on her neck does the trick.)

The trail takes them to Nick's former lover, dance hall proprietress Maggie O'Brien (Anne Francis). From there the case becomes even more convoluted, in time frames 40 years apart, as the

truth about other murders comes to light. A romance develops between the pair as Elizabeth realizes that Nick's ghost is more of a man than her glib fiance.

As a sleuthing team, Nick and Elizabeth are effective, but not as gifted as one might expect. Besides the credibility factor attached to arguing in public with a person who isn't there, there are no unearthly benefits from the partnership for Elizabeth; Nick can't walk through walls or perform other typical ghost tricks. "I've only been dead since '48. I'm still a pup as ghosts go," he tells her.

In fact, Nick is on the helpless side. She must open doors for him, but in turn Nick teaches her the ropes of gumshoeing, while encouraging her to bring out her hidden self — to howl at the moon and eat barbecued ribs.

A spokeswoman for K-Mart and Max Factor, Smith is an unthreatening presence to women viewers, perfect for romantic mysteries like this one. While comedy is decidedly not her forte, she excels as the professional woman awaiting someone to bring excitement

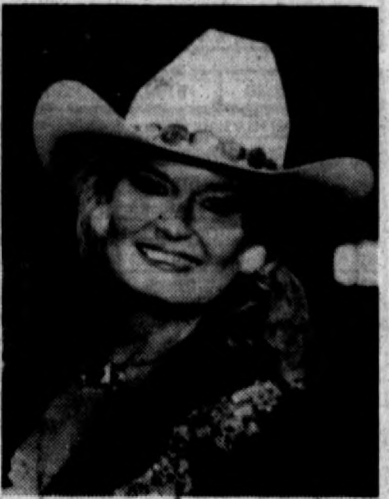

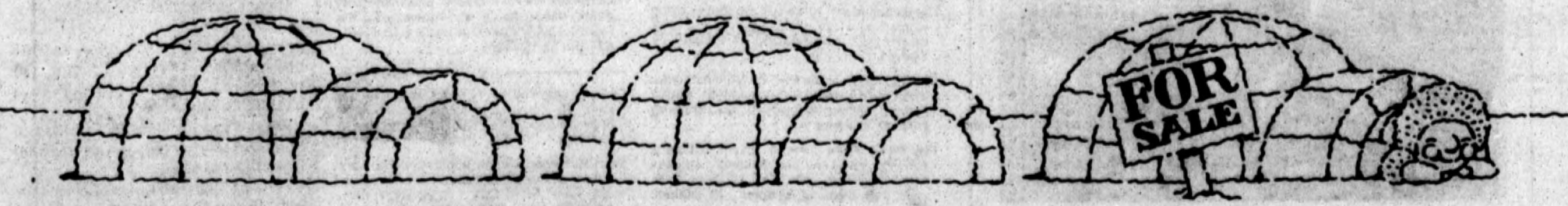

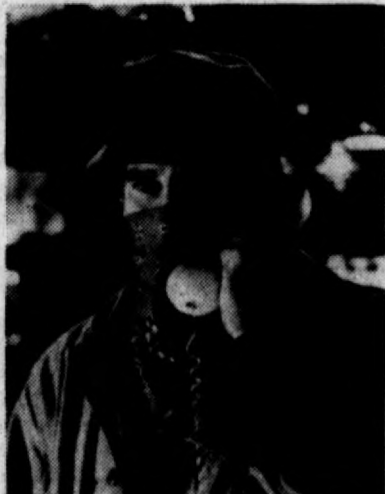

Act Two is a fairy tale Drosselmeier tells Marie about a princess who is cursed with ugliness that can only be overcome by finding a magic nut.

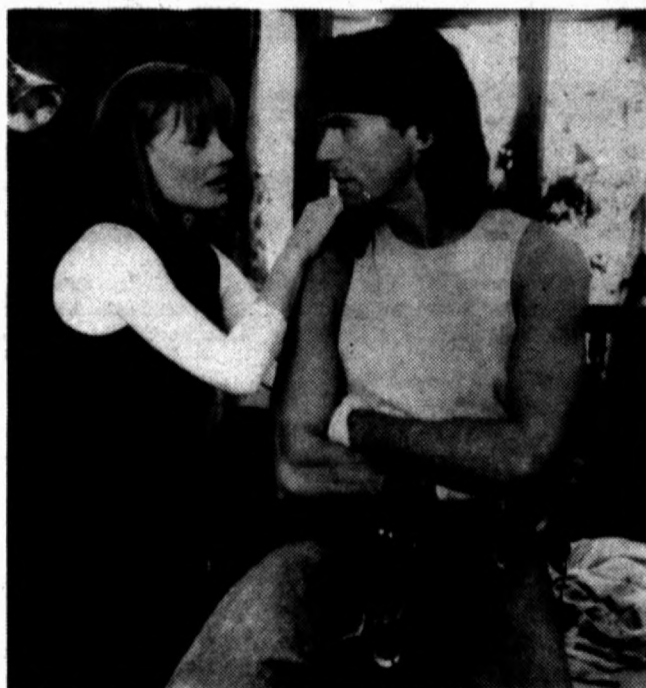

Most of us are familiar with the traditional Christmas classics. Of the three screen versions of Dickens' A Christmas Carol, the 1952 British version with Alastair Sim enjoys a slight edge over the 1984 version with George C. Scott and the 1938 Hollywood version with Reginald Owen. The spirit of Santa Claus has still not found a more endearing embodiment than Edmund Gwenn's 1947 Miracle of 34th Street, and Frank Capra's 1946 It's A Wonderful Life with Jimmy Stewart has lost none of its power to move us over the past decades. If you're a little weary of these old standbys, along with Bing Crosby singing "White Christmas" in the 1942 Holiday Inn, "Turaluralura" in the 1944 Going My Way, and the title song in the 1945 The Bells of St. Mary's, here are a few offbeat suggestions to tap the deeper feelings of the season...

HOLIDAY AFFAIR: (1949/ Black & White) Starring Janet Leigh and Robert Mitchum.

In the background is the Christmas shopping season in New York. In the foreground is a war widow forced to choose between two men - a good provider and a free spirit - for her husband and father to her fatherless son. A warm and friendly film for devotees of romantic melodrama. Not rated. Would be a G. Three Boxes THE HOLLY AND THE IVY: (1953/ British/ Black & White) Starring Ralph Richardson, Margaret Leighton and Denholm Elliott. A beautifully
