



4 elected to chamber director seats

Jeff Carlile, Wes Klett, Jimmy Madrigal and Dennis Printz have been formally elected as new directors for Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, it was announced Tuesday.

Chamber members elected the four nominees by mail balloting which ended last week. The directors will serve three-year terms on the chamber board beginning in January. They will be formally installed at a January board meeting and will be introduced to the general membership at the annual banquet in February.

Carlile is associated with Merrick Pet Foods; Klett is an officer with Anipro; Madrigal is manager of Hereford Parts & Supply, and Printz is ag manager at Holly Sugar.

The four directors whose terms expire are Waldo Baxter, Charles Greenawalt, Diane Hoelscher and Ken McLain. Greenawalt will remain on the board another year to serve as past president.

Co-chairmen John Stagner and Charlie Bell have been busy planning an exciting program of fun activities for the breakfast. There will be plenty of door prizes to give away, and the Bull Chip Award will be presented to a deserving citizen.

School plans energy \$aving\$

A Texas company is gambling several thousand dollars the Hereford public schools can save money on its utilities.

In fact, Energy Education Inc. has agreed to pay for the remainder of the costs of a program if the HISD can't pay for the program through savings on utilities.

Hereford school board agreed to a contract with the firm on Tuesday. The cost over seven years will be \$306,478, but the company says the district will avoid \$891,000 in utility costs, for a net savings of \$584,522. The company is guaranteeing savings of \$164,009 over the first four years of the plan, and will write a check

each year to the HISD if the savings don't match what the company says the schools can save.

Dan Long of Energy Education said the company works with over 100 school districts across North America and concentrates on "changing attitudes and habits." Savings come from things as simple as turning off lights in areas where they aren't needed, or keeping blinds closed on spring days to keep the sun out of classrooms.

"There is no freezing, no sweating, no sitting in the dark," Long promised. "We intend to keep the level of comfort where it is or higher."

The board also agreed to spend \$4,600 for application of recycled asphalt to the Hereford FFA Project Center, east of the Bull Barn. Keith Lindell, who uses a wheelchair, has a harrow project this year, but is not able to care for his animal at times because of mud and water.

In fact, people who are not differently abled have had a hard time dealing with mud, snow and ice at the Project Center recently. Vehicles are usually not able to navigate through the mud; the asphalt of the facility by Griego Dragline should correct the problems.

The board also: --Accepted a bid for \$24,995 from

Nystrom for new classroom maps at five Hereford schools.

--Had the first reading on a policy change on instructional goals and objectives.

--Set the snow make-up day for Good Friday.

--Accepted the retirement resignations of Kenneth Helms, assistant principal at Hereford Junior High; Julia Helms, teacher at Hereford High School; Carol Garrison, former head girls' basketball coach; and a leave of absence from Mary Goodin, a junior high teacher who is having knee surgery.

Applications continue for CSF

Applications for assistance from the 1992 edition of the Christmas Stocking Fund will continue to be accepted at the county Red Cross offices, 224 South Main, through Friday, Dec. 11.

Hours are from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily. Although the Red Cross chapter is not affiliated with CSF, it provides office space and clerical assistance during the sign-up period, in order to protect the anonymity of the CSF committee.

Individuals applying for CSF aid will need to appear in person and bring proof of Deaf Smith County residence, such as a driver's license or a bill receipt showing their local address. Applicants are also asked to bring copies of bills, complete with account numbers, if they are asking

for help with utility or medical bills. CSF requires clear instructions on where payments are to be made if assistance is given on such bills.

Due to the extensive number of applications normally received by the program, and the limited funds available, filing an application does not guarantee that assistance will be received from CSF.



Clinton plan may not help

WASHINGTON (AP) - President-elect Clinton's economic-stimulus program will provide a small boost to the economy next year, enough to make only a tiny dent in the unemployment rate, the nation's top business economists predicted today.

While Clinton has promised to focus like a "laser beam" on the economy once in office, the survey by the National Association of Business Economists found that analysts at some of the country's largest companies held decidedly low-key expectations for what the incoming president will be able to accomplish.

The association said the median expectation of 41 professional forecasters surveyed in late November was that Clinton's program would result in a slight, 0.2 percent increase in economic growth next year when compared with what they would have expected had President Bush won re-election.

While Clinton is still formulating his short-term economic program, he has indicated that two key elements will be investment tax credits for businesses and a boost in spending on roads, bridges and other public works projects of around \$20 billion next year.

In a \$6 trillion economy, such a package would represent only a small dose of fiscal stimulus, analysts said.

But the business economists group said it hoped Clinton would not listen to advisers who are urging him to take a bolder approach in an effort to

get the unemployment rate down quicker.

"Our advice right now is to be cautious," said association President Joseph W. Duncan, the chief statistician at Dun & Bradstreet Corp. "Clinton needs to maintain the confidence of business and the markets."

Duncan said an old-style Democratic public works spending program that would inflate the already huge federal budget deficit would end up causing more harm than good because it would push long-term interest rates higher.

Even with an expected modest stimulus package, the forecasters said

the budget deficit will be \$16 billion higher next year than if Bush had won re-election.

They projected the deficit total at an all-time high of \$340 billion, compared with an imbalance of \$290.2 billion in the fiscal year that ended Sept. 30.

But the added stimulus program will have only a modest impact on the nation's unemployment rate, the business economists said. They predicted the jobless rate would average 7.2 percent during 1993, only slightly below the current 7.4 percent level.

Part of the reason for the expectations of only a modest pickup in growth is a widespread belief that the country's trade performance, which has been one of the few bright spots for the economy, will begin widening this year and deteriorate even further in 1993.

The merchandise trade deficit fell last year to \$65 billion. The economists estimated it would climb to \$83 billion this year and to \$90 billion next year.

On Tuesday, the Bush administration released an even more pessimistic forecast, saying the trade deficit could top \$100 billion next year because of weakness in some of America's major overseas markets.

The economic weakness will continue to have one beneficial side effect, the business economists said: inflation will remain low, with consumer prices expected to rise just 3.4 percent next year.

Lawmakers take quick look at income tax

AUSTIN (AP) - State leaders have looked at a plan that could allow voters to ratify the current "Robin Hood" school funding system, which transfers some local property tax money from wealthier to poorer school districts.

"I'd say it's a last-ditch effort," Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock said Tuesday.

The current school funding system has been ruled unconstitutional by the Texas Supreme Court.

In the system, some local property tax money is redistributed from richer to poorer school districts within counties or groups of counties.

The Supreme Court said the tax violated the state constitution by imposing a statewide property tax, and by levying a property tax without voter approval.

The plan being developed in the House and Senate would allow a local vote on the tax.

However, that vote only would occur if a proposed constitutional amendment favored by Democratic state leaders failed, according to legislative staffers. The proposed amendment would allow statewide redistribution of local property tax money.

The proposed amendment has passed the Senate, but House Republicans have blocked the measure from being presented to Texas voters.

Day care for spies' kids a little different

FORT MEADE, Md. (AP) - To Justin and Matthew, Johnny and Christine, the satellite dishes look like giant ears turned to the sky. The children play in their shadows, oblivious to the antennas' spy mission.

These children are enrolled at a newly opened child care center for employees of the National Security Agency, the globe-spanning eavesdropping network so secret that its acronym is known jokingly as No Such Agency.

The child care facility, the largest in Maryland and one of the biggest in the country, lies just outside NSA's vast fenced compound about 35 miles northeast of Washington.

"My daddy shot a turkey," boasted 4-year-old Matthew (no last names, please).

His daddy is also likely to be a whiz at computer code-breaking, at exotic languages or satellite communications. As part of its mission, the NSA combs the airwaves for words, computer bytes, rocket launch data any communication or signal that might reveal to the United States the secrets of friends and foes alike.

Notwithstanding the surveillance cameras mounted on the surrounding fence, the center tries to give children a normal environment.

"The parents may have unique jobs, but we don't want the kids to feel they're somehow different," said Judith Emmel, an NSA spokeswoman.

"It's no different than if Daddy was a lawyer downtown," she said. "All the kids

know is that Mommy or Daddy are going to the office."

The kids get the same care and learning that the center's Denver-based operating company, Children's World, offers at its other facilities around the country.

Like other in-house day care centers, parents are heavily involved here. Fathers walk over to join their kids for lunch around knee-high tables. Mothers come by to nurse and diaper.

Since it opened in August, 175 children aged 6 weeks to 5 years have enrolled, and the center's remaining 125 slots are expected to fill rapidly.

"We had a great need for this within the agency," said Emmel, adding that parents had been asking for such a facility for 10 years.

"Management feels it's important for morale, productivity and the retention of skilled employees."

The NSA has a heavy investment in its employees - their number is estimated at 25,000, although the exact figure is classified - because of the expensive training and security clearances they must undergo, she said.

It also must offer good working conditions to keep the talented mathematicians, cryptographers and engineers who otherwise might be lured by higher paying jobs in the private sector.

The child development center is in great demand because of the NSA's relatively young

work force, the agency's out-of-the-way location that limits child care options and the employees' often-long commutes to work.

Some employees travel as much as two hours in each direction, said Emmel, and having a child five minutes instead of two hours away provides "great peace of mind."

Most of the children spend eight to nine hours at the facility, which opens at 6 a.m. to provide for the NSA's flexible work schedule. Tuition ranges from \$80 to \$132 a week per child, a cost comparable to other such facilities, center director Judy Smith said.

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State justifies Hope payment

AUSTIN (AP) - The state Republican Party has criticized the use of state money and Gov. Ann Richards' appearance on entertainer Bob Hope's Christmas special being filmed in San Antonio.

Richards' commerce department paid \$150,000 to Hope, officials said Tuesday.

Karen Hughes, executive director of the state GOP, said state money should not have been used when other needs go unmet. She said Richards will "showcase herself."

Richards' office defended her appearance, saying it was non-political and gave the governor a chance to tout Texas. In addition, her office said Hope's producers asked her to be on the show.

"She is the state's premiere pitch person. That's what she is supposed to do," said Richards' press secretary Bill Cryer.

Commerce Department officials defended the expense, saying the program will generate tourist dollars by showing off Texas to an audience of some 14 million viewers.

"It's an excellent value for the state," Commerce Department executive director Cathy Bonner said. "It's going to be incredible coverage for the state and San Antonio."

The San Antonio Convention and Visitors Bureau, and theme parks Sea World of Texas and Fiesta Texas, also paid \$150,000 each for a total of \$600,000 to Hope's production company, state officials said.

Ms. Hughes of the state GOP said that this expense should have been paid for entirely by the private sector because the state is strapped for funds as lawmakers fight over a school financing system.

But Cryer said the money, taken from hotel-motel room taxes, is designed to be spent on this type of economic development deal.

The program, titled "Bob Hope's 4-Star Christmas Fiesta from San Antonio," will be filmed in San Antonio this week.

The hour-long show will feature the San Antonio River Walk, the Alamo, Sea World of Texas, Fiesta Texas, Alamo Dome and military bases. It is scheduled to air Dec. 20.

Richards will be one of the guests, along with Clint Black, Rita Rudner and Les Brown.

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

Super Sophs squeak by Rice in college basketball opener

The first full night of college basketball in the 1992-93 season was almost a dead end for top-ranked Michigan and No. 6 Seton Hall.

Both of the heavily-favored powerhouses walked shakily away from near upsets Tuesday night, with Michigan surviving a scare by Rice 75-71 and Seton Hall finally wriggling away from surprising Rider 87-74.

"We're the No. 1 team in the country and you have to expect these

kind of battles when you're No. 1," said Chris Webber, who led the Wolverines with 20 points and also fronted their second-half rally. "They gave us their best shot in the first half and we gave them ours in the second half."

The Owls held a 31-30 halftime lead and spurred to a 52-46 lead in the second half before the Wolverines came back with a 10-0 burst that carried them to victory in the season opener for both teams.

"We'll get better," Michigan coach Steve Fisher said. "This was just the first game."

For Seton Hall's Pirates, who lost to No. 2 Indiana last week in the final of the preseason NIT Tournament, Jerry Walker was the answer to coach P.J. Carlesimo's prayers.

The senior forward shook off an injury to his right knee and came off the bench to produce five points, three assists and a steal in a 12-2 second-half run that saved the Hall (4-1).

"I thought Jerry played extremely well," Carlesimo said. "He gave us a presence. I think the last 10 or 12 times we got the ball inside, he either scored, got an assist or was fouled every time."

Walker finished with 18 points, five assists and five rebounds.

No. 3 Kansas 76, Georgia 65

The Jayhawks survived an ice-cold second half that had coach Roy Williams shaking his head in embarrassment.

"I think that's the worst half any one of our teams has ever played at

home," he said after Kansas scored just 26 second-half points.

The Jayhawks might have had more of a problem had Georgia not shot 11 of 22 from the free throw line.

Richard Scott led Kansas with 18 points.

No. 4 Duke 110, Canisius 62

Grant Hill scored a career-high 28 points, hitting 12 of 13 shots from the floor, as Duke began its bid for a third straight national title.

Thomas Hill scored 15 of his 22 points for the Blue Devils in the second half, while Bobby Hurley added 17 points and Cherokee Parks 16.

No. 7 North Carolina 119, Old Dominion 82

Donald Williams scored 21 points and Eric Montross added 20 as North Carolina, shooting 86 percent in the second half, rolled to an easy win.

The Tar Heels, playing without injured point guard Derrick Phelps, shot 75.4 percent on 43 of 57 from the floor, including five of eight by Williams.

No. 10 Iowa 100, Mississippi Valley State 69

Acie Earl scored 23 points and blocked six shots and Chris Street added 17 points in Iowa's romp at home.

The Delta Devils hung tough early, trailing 19-14 after Alphonzo Ford's jumper with 12:05 left in the first half. But Iowa went on a 10-4 spurt to open a 29-18 cushion and led 49-28 at halftime.

Ford led all scorers with 39 points.

Lady Raiders fall to Stanford

STANFORD, Calif. (AP) - Texas Tech's Sheryl Swoopes found herself in the second half.

Top-ranked Stanford answered by finding Val Whiting and the Cardinal opened defense of their national championship with a 75-67 win over 15th-ranked Texas Tech on Tuesday night.

Stanford, which nearly blew a 22-point halftime lead, overcame Swoopes' career-high 35-point effort for a 10th straight win dating to last season. Among the wins was a NCAA West regional semifinal victory in Seattle over the Lady Raiders en route to the national title.

"They made quite a run at us," Stanford's Molly Goodenbour said. "They beat us in the second half. But I'm not discouraged about our team. It shows what we have to work on but we have the type of players who will work to improve."

Swoopes, like Whiting a returning Kodak All-America, scored 28 of her points in the second half, when Texas Tech outscored Stanford 50-36.

But Whiting came on strong at the same time. Held to just three points in the first half, Whiting finished with 27 and scored 11 of the Cardinal's last 14 points. Goodenbour had 23 points.

Stanford, which has all five starters back from last season's championship team, took a 39-17 halftime lead with Goodenbour hitting four 3-pointers and Texas Tech going 0-for-7 from 3-point range.

Swoopes went 11 for 11 from the field in the second half to rally Texas Tech. Krista Kirkland hit a 3-pointer to pull Tech to within 70-63 with 2:25 remaining.

But Whiting came back to score on a layup and converted a 3-point play in the final minute to ensure the victory.

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Drabek leaves Pittsburgh to play for Astros

HOUSTON (AP) - Doug Drabek has turned over a new leaf and the Houston Astros have new life.

Drabek, yearning to play closer to home, signed a \$19.5 million, four-year contract with the Astros on Tuesday, with an option that could keep him in an Astros uniform for a fifth season.

"You've got to turn the leaf and make new teammates and new friends," said Drabek, a key member of Pittsburgh's three-time NL Eastern Division titlist. "It really hasn't sunk in yet."

The Astros were barred from the free agent market until new owner Drayton McLane took control of the team in November. That's when general manager Bill Wood went to work on improving the Astros' starting rotation.

He scored big on Tuesday. "We're a better ballclub starting today than we were at the end of the season," manager Art Howe said. "I hope we can continue to improve more during the winter."

It's not that Howe is greedy. He's just eager to make the Astros more competitive in the NL West and Drabek was the free agent plum he sought.

"You see his track record and he's still a young man," Howe said. "He'll do that much for us too in the future and bring us some wins like he did in Pittsburgh."

"It's nice to know we have a workhorse we know will go out there as a proven winner. He can keep that long losing streak from hitting you. If you run him out every fifth day you've got a chance."

The Astros played last season with a player payroll of \$14.8 million, mostly using talent developed from their farm system, keeping close tabs on the budget until the sale was completed.

Now Wood is having fun again. "It's not a lot of fun to pick up the sports page and read about a lot of troubles so this is a happy event," Wood said. "I'm extremely happy inside and looking forward to the future. The next few weeks are going to be exciting."

The Astros may not be finished. They made an offer and then a counter-offer to free agent shortstop Ozzie Smith and they've continued to deal with pitcher Greg Swindell, who also has home ties with the state. Drabek, the 1990 NL Cy Young

Award winner, was born in Victoria, Texas, and played at the University of Houston. He lives in the Houston suburb of The Woodlands.

Drabek will receive a \$1 million signing bonus, \$4 million in each of the next two seasons and \$4.75 million each in 1995 and 1996. The Astros have a \$5 million option for 1997 and must pay a \$1 million buyout if they don't exercise it.

Drabek became the fourth pitcher to average \$5 million in annual salary and the 10th in major league history. He joins Jack Morris of Toronto (\$5,425,000), Roger Clemens of Boston (\$5,380,250) and Dwight Gooden of the New York Mets (\$5.15 million) as pitchers who make \$5 million or more.

Although he didn't know what the offseason would bring, Drabek said he could feel the excitement of the Astros' new direction.

"When the new management took over I could tell from The Woodlands the excitement that was building and the planning for the future," Drabek

said. "When we played the Astros they were a team that never gave up."


Pirates president Mark Sauer said the team concluded during the Thanksgiving holiday period they could not compete for Drabek.

Drabek has won at least 14 games in each of the past five seasons.



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Rangers lose Guzman to Cubs

CHICAGO (AP) - Chicago Cubs general manager Larry Himes got the pitcher he wanted to replace National League Cy Young Award winner Greg Maddux. Still, he isn't sure why he had to.

"I find it hard to understand how Greg could turn down an offer to become the game's highest-paid pitcher," Himes said Tuesday after the Cubs signed pitcher Jose Guzman to a \$14.35 million, four-year contract. "I've got the starter I wanted to replace him with. It's time to get on with other things."

However, Himes said Maddux still could be a Cub. He said the Cubs would offer arbitration to Maddux before Monday's deadline. Maddux would have until Dec. 19 to accept or reject arbitration.

"I don't expect it to work," Himes said.

Guzman was 16-11 for the Texas Rangers last season. Himes said he will get his money's worth if the 29-year-old right-hander does as well next year.

Despite the price tag on Guzman, the Cubs are saving a bundle by giving up Maddux, who turned down a \$27.5, five-year million offer after a 20-11 season and a sparkling 2.18 ERA.

Guzman, who has spent his entire career with the Rangers, had two strong years after missing the 1989 season with a torn rotator cuff and spending 1990 in the minors on injury rehabilitation assignments. He made his major league debut with the Rangers in September 1985.

He went 13-7 with a 3.08 ERA in 1991 and had a 3.66 ERA to go with his 16-11 record last season.

Maddux's agent, Scott Boras, was surprised at the signing.

"I called to let them know we would be finishing our (interview) process with other teams on Thursday, and (Himes) said they had signed Guzman," Boras said. "We felt that if you really want a player, you don't conduct yourself the way they did."

Boras, who met Tuesday with New

York Yankees general manager Gene Michael, said he has several solid offers for Maddux. He has talked with the Chicago White Sox, but Boras said they haven't made an offer.

Guzman's agent, Barry Meister, said the Cubs were among four teams going after the free agent, who made \$1,465,000 last season. Guzman said he received higher offers, including one from the New York Yankees, than he agreed to with the Cubs.

He said he chose Chicago "because it is one team I have always liked." He called the Cubs "a team with a good future, and it can be a great team this year and years to come."

Guzman said that as a ground-ball pitcher, he will benefit from Wrigley

Field's grass playing field that's cut on the long side.

And he said he can improve on his record last year.

"I had seven games that were blown saves," he said. "The Cubs have a good defense, and that's something I didn't have with the Rangers. I think I can win between 15 and 20 games."

Himes said the acquisition of Guzman ends the Cubs' interest in high-priced pitchers. He said that if any additional mound help is sought, it will be relievers.

Guzman gets a \$1.5 million signing bonus, \$3,125,000 in each of the next two seasons and \$3.3 million each in 1995 and 1996. He can make an additional \$350,000 a year in award bonuses.

More people come forth with dirt on Reds' Schott

NEW YORK (AP) - Even as baseball's executive council appointed a committee to investigate Marge Schott, new allegations were made against the Cincinnati Reds owner.

USA Today reported today that a man sitting next to Schott on an airplane heard her referring to Dave Parker as a "million-dollar nigger." It also reported that a former Reds employee claimed Schott had referred to "Jew bastards."

Joe Pfaff, president of a management consulting firm and Butler County Republican finance chairman in Ohio, told USA Today that Schott made racial remarks about Parker during a flight to Cincinnati in December 1987, when Schott was returning from an owners' meeting. Parker was traded from Cincinnati to Oakland on Dec. 8, 1987.

"She was bragging that she'd just traded that 'goddamn nigger,'" Pfaff told the newspaper. "She said, 'We got rid of that trouble-making nigger.'"

Pfaff alleged Schott used the slur 4-5 times during the 1 1/2- to 2-hour flight and said she at least once referred to Parker as a "million-dollar nigger." In a deposition released last month, Schott denied using that phrase.

Keith Stichtenoth, a former employee in the Reds ticket office, told the newspaper he heard Schott refer to "Jew bastards."

Cincinnati jumped to a 14-1 lead, finished the half up 46-15, then cleared its bench and coasted the rest of the way.



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
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

Tom Chambers added 18 points and Jerrod Mustaf 16 in a game the

Suns dominated with defense and rebounding. Chambers had 10 rebounds, while Charles Barkley pulled down 14.

Cavaliers 111, Celtics 101

Brad Daugherty returned from a nine-game layoff and scored 27 points as Cleveland stopped Boston's three-game winning streak.

The visiting Celtics led 57-55 early in the third quarter, but the Cavaliers took control with a 14-2 run.

Hawks 119, Pacers 107

Rookie Adam Keefe had 16 points and 14 rebounds, both season highs, and Dominique Wilkins scored 31 points for Atlanta, his eighth 30-point performance in 13 games.

Keefe, the Hawks' No. 1 pick from Stanford, scored seven points in the first 1:40 of the fourth quarter to spark the Hawks to an 89-79 lead.

Cowboys should be ready

IRVING (AP) - Now it's Cowboys Time.

The healthy Dallas Cowboys embark on their stretch run to the NFL playoffs and a possible homefield advantage with a stop at Denver on Sunday, and they'll have had twice the preparation time of the Broncos.

Dallas' last game was the traditional Thanksgiving Day contest at Texas Stadium, where the Cowboys whipped the New York Giants 30-3.

Denver is coming off a shocking 16-13 overtime loss to the woeful Seattle Seahawks on Monday night.

Come Sunday, the Cowboys (10-2) will have had 10 days' rest to the Broncos' five.

What's more, Dallas is 18-6 in games immediately following the Thanksgiving game (where they are 17-7-1), and own a record of 45-29 in all games played after an appearance on Thanksgiving.

Dallas has traditionally used to extra time to regroup both physically and psychologically for the stretch run.

"The season's a long and grueling one physically," Dallas coach Jimmy Johnson said Tuesday. "But I think it's even more demanding psychologically, not only for players, but for coaches. Having a fresh mind going into the next week, I think it helps."

Denver is 6-0 at Mile High Stadium this year and have won 16 of their last 17 at home. Dallas, on the other hand, has won three straight road games, and the Cowboys can clinch their first outright NFC East crown since 1981 if they beat the Broncos and Minnesota wins at Philadelphia.

Elway is still nursing the sore right shoulder he bruised Nov. 15 against the New York Giants, and his status for Sunday is unknown. He was scheduled to see a shoulder specialist today to determine if he can throw in

practice.

Johnson said the Cowboys will prepare as if Elway will be healthy.

"In my mind, I don't think his status is in question," Johnson said. "We've got to be prepared for the Denver Broncos at their best. ... If he doesn't go, it's a heck of a lot easier for us to prepare for Tommy Maddox that it is to adjust for John Elway."

Denver (7-5) has lost twice under the direction of Maddox, a rookie from UCLA who gave up his last two years of eligibility to turn pro, and slipped into a tie for second place in the AFC West with San Diego, one game behind Kansas City.

Maddox, who quarterbacked Denver in a 24-0 loss to the Raiders in Los Angeles last week in his first pro start, threw his first NFL touchdown pass Monday night. But he was awful after halftime, going just 4 of 14 for eight yards.

"A lot of it was just being a rookie and making rookie mistakes," Denver coach Dan Reeves said.



Victorian Christmas planned

The Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, in Canyon, Texas, is preparing for its 16th Annual Christmas Open House. This year's event is scheduled for Friday, from 7-9 p.m., Saturday, from 7-9 p.m., and Sunday from 2-4 p.m.

A Victorian scene of carolers and horse-drawn sleigh will entice visitors to come inside the Museum and experience the wonders of Christmas. Carriage lanterns light the way into Pioneer Hall, where the elaborately decorated Victorian Christmas Tree, surrounded by poinsettias, is a delight for young and old alike. All of Pioneer Town will be decorated for Christmas. Trained interpreters, dressed in the costume of the times, will be in the shops, school, and rancher's home during the Open House to give narratives describing life during the 1890s and early 1900s.

Musical entertainment is scheduled throughout the three day event. School choirs, chamber music, barbershop quartets and bell choirs make up part of the schedule.

On Thursday, December 1, children from across the Panhandle will come to an Old Fashioned tree Trimming party sponsored by the Museum. Approximately 350 ornaments made by area children will decorate the Panhandle Children's Christmas Tree which will remain for the enjoyment of visitors throughout the holiday season.

In the art gallery, a variety of Christmas artistry will be exhibited. These include the works of Gisella Loeffler, Harold Bugbee and others.

Throughout the Museum, the sights and sounds of the Victorian Era excite and charm the over 5,000 visitors who come to welcome the Christmas season during this annual event.

The Museum extends an invitation to all to attend. In this way, the Museum can express its appreciation to the people of the Panhandle area for their support throughout the year.

Safe ways to microwave during Christmas holidays

The holiday season, with its big family meals and mounds of leftovers, is a perfect time to brush up on the basics of microwave cooking and learn some new tips.

"More than 75 percent of American households use a microwave oven to thaw, cook and reheat food in minutes, even seconds," said Dr. Bethann Witcher-Byers, a nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Microwave cooking retains more nutrients and uses less fat; it also saves time and dish washing."

However, despite the growing popularity of microwave ovens, they are still new enough that many traditional cooks are unaware of good safety practices, she said.

To insure that food is safe from harmful, foodborne bacteria as well as from certain other contaminants, Witcher-Byers urges holiday cooks to observe these tips:

-Do not partially cook a food ahead of time to make microwaving faster.

Cooking ahead is fine, but raw foods should be cooked thoroughly during the first cooking. Partial cooking can be dangerous if the food does not get hot enough to kill the bacteria that may be in raw meat.

-Do not refreeze meat or poultry that has been thawed in a microwave oven.

Foods thawed in the microwave are subject to very low cooking tempera-

tures. Some areas of the food may even begin to cook. If you thaw food in the microwave, cook it all immediately.

-Take care to avoid uneven cooking. Arrange meat and poultry pieces uniformly in a covered dish so steam can help kill bacteria and promote uniform heating. Stir and turn the dish several times. Observe standing time.

-Discard food that was forgotten and left for more than two hours in the microwave after thawing. Subsequent ordinary cooking won't destroy some harmful bacteria that could form.

-Use only the type of dishes that are designed for microwave ovens. Materials in freezer bags, margarine tubs or other plastic containers are approved for storing food, but not for microwave cooking. When heated, chemicals in the containers could migrate into food. Also, do not use recycled paper products in the microwave. They can contain contaminating chemicals or cause fires.

For those who plan to cook a turkey in the microwave, Witcher-Byers suggests checking the owner's manual for the size bird that will fit the oven as well as for the time and power level to use. Using an oven bag ensures the most even cooking.







Apricot Fruit Dip

This treat will be the icing on the cake — literally — for your holiday meals.

1/2 cup	finely chopped dried apricots	1/4 tsp.	ground cinnamon
1 cup	fresh orange juice	2	dashes ground nutmeg
4 ounces	natural (no sugar added) applesauce	1 8-ounce	carton low-fat vanilla yogurt

In a small non-aluminum saucepan over medium-high heat, combine apricots and orange juice. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat to low, stirring frequently. As apricots become tender, mash them with back of wooden spoon. Cook about 20 minutes, or until all juice is absorbed. Remove from heat and stir well.

Add applesauce and spices. Mix well. Place in a bowl, cover and cool. Add yogurt and refrigerate several hours, covered.

Serve as a dip with a variety of fresh fruits such as strawberries, bananas and apple slices.

Note: This is also a great sauce to serve over angel food cake. Makes 16 servings.

Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: I read your column about the woman with leg cramps only at night. I also have that problem. I'm 22 years old. The nurses at the nursing home where I work told me that the cause of leg cramps was a lack of potassium and to eat a banana before going to bed. They said if that didn't work to try some quinine sulfate. I just thought I would let you know I tried the banana before going to bed, and it works.

DEAR READER: I'm glad it worked for you. It is true that a low potassium level can cause muscle cramps. So can a low sodium level. That is why people who sweat a lot during physical activity in hot weather often develop muscle cramps. Your

calcium level is also important.

This brings up the point that individuals who take diuretics for any reason, such as to lower blood pressure or eliminate fluid accumulation, may be susceptible to muscle cramps.

Quinine sulfate and related medicines have long been advocated for leg cramps. Many people claim success with these medications. Control studies have failed to prove this is true. However, these medicines do work to prevent excitability of the heart muscle and should have a similar action in skeletal muscle.
