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## Voters will decide alcohol question Tuesday

Arguments over economic impact, physical differences, the crime rate and others continue to mount as voters get ready to decide a local option Tuesday on alcohol sales.

Absentee voting was heavy through last week, with over 2,300 people voting early in the election.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. at nine places in the county.

Persons marking their ballots "for" will be voting to continue package store sales in almost all of Deaf Smith County. Persons voting against will be electing to end alcohol sales in February.

Package store sales have been legal in all but the three northwesternmost sections of the county since 1984. The county was voted wet in a local-option election in April 1984. That vote was brought about by Art Reinauer's plans to operate a winery just north of the city. The winery later moved to south of Amarillo and is now closed.

Members of Help Eliminate Liquor Problems (HELP) have cited increasing crime in the city as their reason for wanting liquor sales ended here. They claim the crime rate has gone up from around 1,800 in 1983 to over 5,000 in 1992, and are out of whack compared to area towns.

Officials said last week those figures may be a little misleading: older figures didn't include incidents like open doors found on business late at night. Today, all reports are listed, according to Police Chief David Wagner. "You probably need to cut that figure by five percent or 10 percent to get it more in line with those earlier figures," Wagner said. "Still, it's too high."

Also called into question have been figures used by HELP comparing crime in Hereford to incidents in Plainview. The group has claimed in its literature that the crime rate is higher in Hereford than in Plainview.

According to Crimes in Texas, the annual report published each year by the Department of Public Safety, Plainview's crime index is higher than Hereford's. In fact, it's been almost twice as high for several years.

The crime index measures only "major" crimes: actual reports of murder, sexual assault, aggravated assault, theft, burglary, robbery and motor vehicle theft. According to the DPS report:

--In 1988, Hereford's crime index was 1,017; Plainview's was 1,695.

--In 1989, Hereford's crime index dropped to 878; Plainview's was 1,530.

--In 1990, Hereford's crime index fell again,

to 860; in Plainview, it was 1,503.

Officials are having to weigh the difference between not having tax receipts from liquor sales on hand and whether their workload will decrease when alcohol is not available for legal sales in the county.

"We get about \$60,000 from liquor sales, when everything is thrown in," said County Judge Tom Simons. "That is about 1.5 cents on the tax roll, which means 48.5 cents instead of 47 cents."

## Officials anticipate a big turnout Tuesday

With a total of 2,380 early votes cast by the Friday deadline, a large turnout of voters is anticipated for the wet/dry election Tuesday.

County Clerk David Ruland said he expected the vote total to be comparable to the 5,100 recorded in 1984, "if the weather is good on election day."

In the April 1984 election, Deaf Smith County voters approved the sale of alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption by a margin of 218 votes--2,659 for and 2,441 against. That voter decision ended an 83-year period of no legal sale of alcoholic beverages.

Hereford had saloons prior to 1901, but the community went "dry" in 1901 by a margin of 19 votes. The available records don't show the total votes cast.

It was 1956 before another wet/dry election was held. Voters soundly defeated the proposal that year by more than a 2-1 margin--1,930 to 872.

It is difficult to compare the early voting total in this election with that

in 1984. At that time, absentee voting was held and voters applied for an absentee ballot by claiming one of several legal reasons for an early vote.

There were only 428 absentee votes in the 1984 election. Voters could claim one of several reasons for voting early--over age 65, physical disability, religious beliefs (for Saturday elections), or had made plans to be out of town on election day. But there was a large turnout on election day and 58.7 percent of eligible voters cast a ballot.

The absentee voting was dropped and an early voting period was established in recent years. In the November general election in 1992, there were 2,649 votes cast in the early voting period--which represented 47 percent of the total vote.

Ruland reported the county currently has about 8,399 eligible voters. The total was slightly higher in 1984, with 8,688 listed as eligible voters.

## One man's trash means 25¢ a pound to 'hunters'

Henry Matthews doesn't go digging through dumpsters because he has to.

"Oh, me and my wife do okay with our Social Security," Matthews, 72, said Wednesday afternoon. We talked while he rummaged through trash in a bin at Blue Water Gardens, a public housing complex in east Hereford.

"It gives me something to do," Matthews says he isn't much for dominoes or goings-on at the Senior Center.

"I do this, and my wife stays home and stays busy with her quilting," he said. The whole time, he was fishing around through trash with a unique instrument. It appeared to be a couple car antennae soldered together, with one end bent for hooking a stray Coke or Bud can. He pulled out a whooper, two beer cans that were somehow stuck together. He dropped the two of them into the 30-gallon plastic bag he was carrying.

He can fill two of those bags on a good day ("Right after a holiday or on weekends, when everyone's been drinkin'," he said). That will get him about \$4.

What does he spend it on? "Odds and ends. I don't have a whole lot of needs. It keeps me in cigarettes, and it keeps me busy. That's what I like best."

## Research, industry news will highlight TSBGA conference

International trade controversies, the latest research developments and news on the sugar industry will highlight the annual Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association meeting Friday at the Hereford Community Center.

The meeting will begin at 9:30 a.m. On Saturday, at 7 p.m., the annual TSBGA banquet will be held at the Bull Barn. Stan White will be the featured speaker, and the Man of the Year in Agriculture will be named by the Hereford Brand.

Don Steinbreisser of Sidney, Mont., president of the American Sugarbeet Growers Association, will be featured at Friday's meeting. Steinbreisser "has done a good job of representing growers at important policy meetings in Washington," said Bill Cleavinger, president of TSBGA and a past president of ASGA. Also on the agenda Friday is Bob

Atwood, who heads the sales for Holly Sugar Corp. Atwood will discuss the past year's marketing activities in conjunction with the parent company, Imperial Holly, and will touch on events that impact Holly nationwide.

Also planned at Friday's meeting are:

--Reviews by Cleavinger of NAFTA and GATT, and how they will impact sugar producers.

--Alan Lebsack, Imperial Holly controller, on how the company develops grower payment schedules.

--Researchers from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will discuss their latest findings.

Many area businesses plan displays in the Community Center on Friday. Also planned are awards to many leading growers.

## Clinton, Salinas talk about NAFTA, make more plans

AUSTIN (AP) - President-elect Clinton assured Mexican President Carlos Salinas de Gortari on Friday that he will move swiftly to clear up U.S. concerns over jobs and the environment that are obstacles to a sweeping free-trade agreement.

"I look forward to having a strong partnership and a good personal friendship," Clinton told Salinas after 90 minutes of talks, also attended by Vice President Al Gore.

Clinton promised to respect Mexico's sovereignty.

Speaking less than an hour before the deadline passed on an ultimatum for Saddam Hussein to withdraw anti-aircraft missiles from southern

Iraq, Clinton expressed strong support for President Bush's threatened use of military force. "I don't think they had any choice," Clinton said of the Bush administration.

At a news conference, Clinton said he was consulted by the Bush administration. "There is no daylight between our two positions."

The meeting with Salinas marked the incoming president's debut in international diplomacy.

The centerpiece of the U.S.-Mexican agenda is the North American Free Trade Agreement to eliminate trade barriers among the

United States, Mexico and Canada. Clinton supported the agreement during the campaign, but called for side agreements to clean up environmental problems in Mexico and to protect American workers, who fear losing jobs to low-paid Mexican laborers.

Clinton promised to put a single individual in charge of overseeing efforts to address U.S. concerns. He said he would act quickly after his inauguration "so that we could move forward in building a strong relationship between our two countries and in concluding a successful trade negotiation."

"I would like to see this wrapped up in a prompt fashion, but I want these other issues addressed," Clinton said.

"We have established the foundations for a useful relation, positive relations, and respectful as well," said Salinas. "We also have the will to be friends and to respect our principles, mainly that of sovereignty and self-determination."

As Clinton and Salinas answered questions at the news conference, several dozen people demonstrated outside the grounds, shouting opposition to the free-trade agreement.

On the question of Mexican sovereignty, Clinton repeated Bush administration promises not to abduct Mexican citizens, as happened in 1990.

"I believe that when another nation is willing to obey the law and in the absence of information that the government itself has willfully refused to obey the law, that the United States should not be involved in kidnapping," Clinton said.

Salinas said he was interested in reviewing the existing extradition treaty "to make sure that it carries through with the intention that it was established for."

Clinton squeezed in a bit of domestic politics, meeting over lunch at a beer garden with incoming Sen. Bob Krueger and other prominent Texas Democrats. Krueger was appointed by Richards to replace Treasury Secretary-designate Lloyd Bentsen.

To Clinton's call for side agreements on jobs and the environment, Mexico has countered with suggestions that the United States help finance the environmental cleanup.

Mexico also wants an end to abuses of Mexican immigrants in the United States. Tens of thousands are in the United States illegally, and human rights groups complain of beatings, killings and other rights violations.

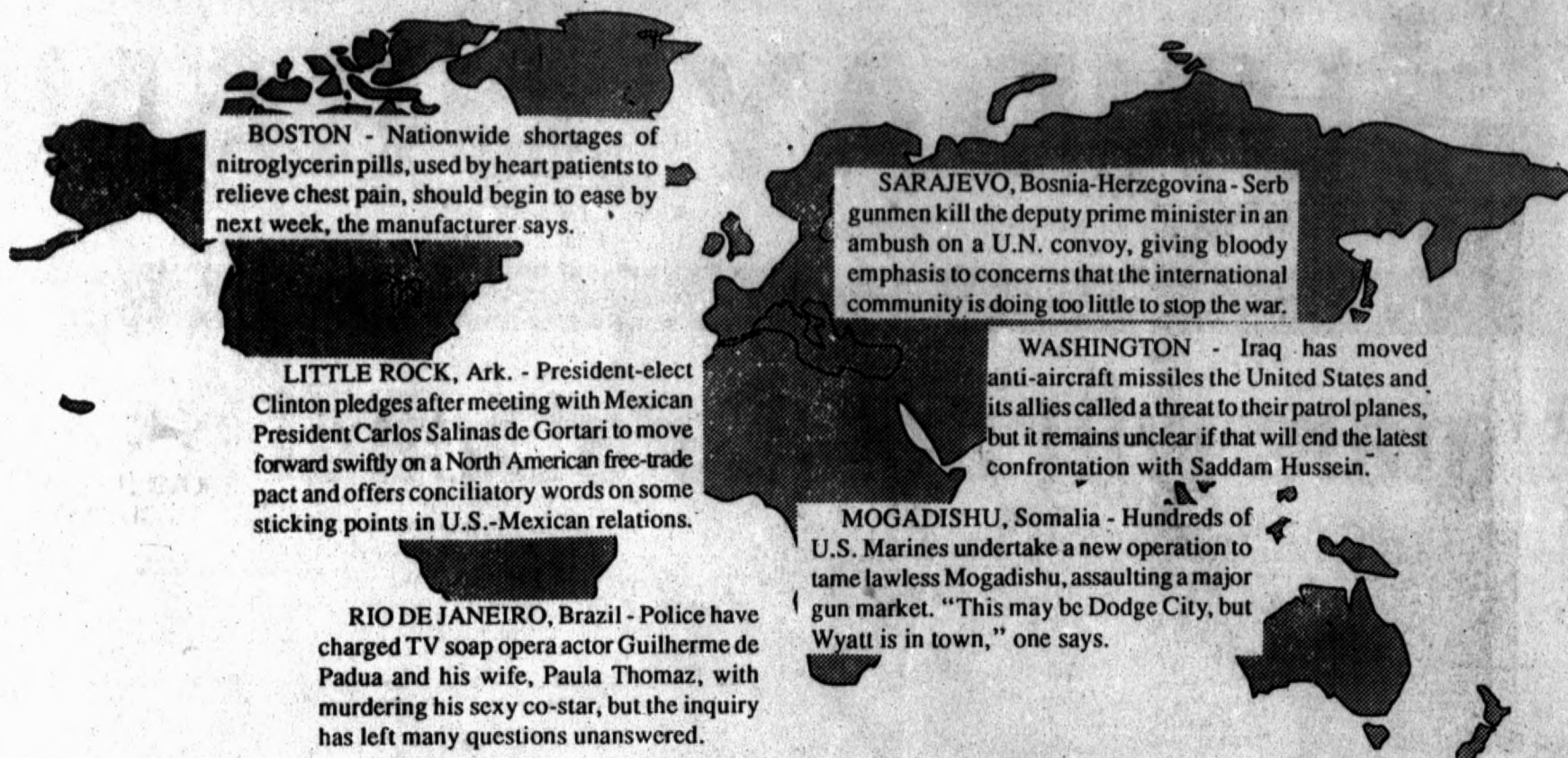
First round Geography Bee will be held on Tuesday. This will include several seventh and eighth graders.

**BOSTON** - Nationwide shortages of nitroglycerin pills, used by heart patients to relieve chest pain, should begin to ease by next week, the manufacturer says.

**LITTLE ROCK, Ark.** - President-elect Clinton pledges after meeting with Mexican President Carlos Salinas de Gortari to move forward swiftly on a North American free-trade pact and offers conciliatory words on some sticking points in U.S.-Mexican relations.

**RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil** - Police have charged TV soap opera actor Guilherme de Padua and his wife, Paula Thomaz, with murdering his sexy co-star, but the inquiry has left many questions unanswered.

**SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina** - Serb gunmen kill the deputy prime minister in an ambush on a U.N. convoy, giving bloody emphasis to concerns that the international community is doing too little to stop the war.

**WASHINGTON** - Iraq has moved anti-aircraft missiles the United States and its allies called a threat to their patrol planes, but it remains unclear if that will end the latest confrontation with Saddam Hussein.

## Hospital happy with occupancy

If the number of people using the hospital are any indication, Deaf Smith General Hospital had a healthy year in 1992, according to Ron Rives, hospital CEO.

"We gauge part of our success by the number of patients who use the hospital," Rives explained. The average daily census for the last fiscal year is 11.6, Rives reported, with October showing 12.1 patients per day and November 14.8.

"When we prepare our budget for the year, we estimated an average daily census of 12, so we've come very close to reaching that target," added Rives. "We're pleased that the confidence in the hospital is growing, and we're working very hard at DSGH to earn the confidence of the community."

In planning the hospital's budget each year, members of the management team base financial projections on an estimate of the average daily census (average number of patients who stay overnight). "We try to be realistic when we set the goals for the year, but we also try to give ourselves a challenge. Reaching the census goal is a very positive sign for the stability and success of the hospital," Rives concluded.

## State facing money problems

**AUSTIN (AP)** - The state needs more money to maintain the current level of services for the next two-year budget period.

Sound familiar? It should. As they have for the past decade, Texas lawmakers will start the regular legislative session facing increasing needs and short of cash.

But this time, state leaders have vowed there will be no tax increase to make up the difference.

Gov. Ann Richards and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock fired a warning shot in August, saying in a letter to state officials: "Agencies should prepare to get by with less money than they are spending today."

"It will be painful," said state Sen. John Montford, D-Lubbock, as he prepared to work on a spending plan as chairman of the Senate Finance Committee.

State Rep. Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, who claims the votes to become the next House speaker, said,

"When you're going to be several billion dollars short for existing services, everyone's going to have to do some re-evaluation of their programs and priorities."

The current two-year budget is about \$60 billion. But about \$5 billion more will be needed for the next two-year fiscal period, which starts Sept. 1, to maintain the current level of services, budget officials said.

The problem is that state revenue is expected to grow only by about \$2 billion during the period.

Mammoth needs in any one of the following areas - education, health and human services, prisons - could easily soak up the revenue growth.

Much of the expected increase in funding is driven by court orders, constitutional requirements and federal mandates, officials say. In addition, the state has embarked on a record prison-building program,

which will require huge appropriations to operate.

"When you're bouncing against federal mandates and court orders, you have a limited amount of discretion. And part of the task that we have before us is to determine where we have as much wiggle room in those areas as possible," said Dale Craymer, who is Gov. Ann Richards' budget and planning director.

Recently, state leaders said an extra \$650 million would go to public education over the next two years, which is less than education officials say is needed to cover a growing number of students.

State higher education officials are seeking a \$768.4 million increase, about six times more than Montford says they'll probably get. "It will be particularly disturbing for higher education," he said.

In health and human services, Texas ranks among the lowest spending states. But federal require-

ments are expanding the eligibility for the state Medicaid program. This will cost another \$2 billion to \$2.5 billion, Craymer said.

"The good news is that Washington does send us some money to help pay the cost of providing those services. The bad news is they don't send us enough," he said.

Operating new prisons and paying for the backlog of state prison inmates in county jails could require another \$1 billion increase in criminal justice spending, Craymer said.

The budget bind has produced calls from some quarters to overhaul the state's tax system. But state officials say there is little impetus to even discuss taxes after Bullock's call for a state personal income tax fell with a resounding thud in 1991.

"I ask only that Texans understand candidly and with open eyes what it means," Bullock said about the dilemma facing lawmakers.

## School finance on front burner

**AUSTIN (AP)** - State lawmakers, whose last effort to produce a school finance plan fell apart amid partisan conflict, will try again this year while facing the specter of a public school shutdown if they fail.

"I would hope it (school finance) would be the first priority and the first thing taken care of," said Rep. Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, who has claimed enough support to become the next House speaker.

Gov. Ann Richards likely will declare school finance an emergency item, said her spokesman, Bill Cryer. That would ease the way for its early consideration.

The Texas Supreme Court has given lawmakers until June 1 to come up with a constitutional plan to equalize funding among rich and poor school districts. Last January's ruling was the court's third scrapping a school funding plan.

The court said the current system - designed to even out funding by shifting local property tax money within single- or multi-county districts - violated the state constitution by imposing a statewide property tax, and by levying a property tax without voter approval.

A state judge has said that should lawmakers miss the deadline, he will

cut off state, and possibly local, education funds. Schools are funded mainly by state aid and local property taxes.

Despite that warning, a partisan stalemate prevented a lame-duck Legislature from producing a plan in a special session called in November.

House Republicans blocked a proposed constitutional amendment, backed by Richards and other Democratic leaders, to authorize statewide redistribution of local property tax money.

A two-thirds vote of the Legislature is required to put a proposed constitutional amendment before

voters. But Republicans number 58 in the 150-member House, and most of them voted against the Democratic proposal.

When new lawmakers take office, Republican strength remains the same in the House and grows in the 31-member Senate from nine to 13, raising the potential for a partisan deadlock there.

"It's one of those deals where you expect the worst and hope for the best," said Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, longtime Senate Education Committee chairman. "So far, the Senate Republicans have shown leadership and responsibility."

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# Lawmakers face old problems in the new legislative session

AUSTIN (AP) - From the budget to school finance, from crime to colleges, the new Legislature that convenes for its 140-day regular session on Tuesday will be dealing with some familiar problems.

And at the root of most is ... money.

Public schools want more. Colleges want more. State agencies want more. But the state government doesn't have it and leaders say no

new taxes.

Gov. Ann Richards and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock last summer warned state officials: "Agencies should prepare to get by with less money than they are spending today."

The two-year budget that expires on Aug. 31 totals about \$60 billion. While state revenues are expected to grow by about \$2 billion during the next two years, budget officials say a total of about \$5 billion more is needed to fund all services at the current levels.

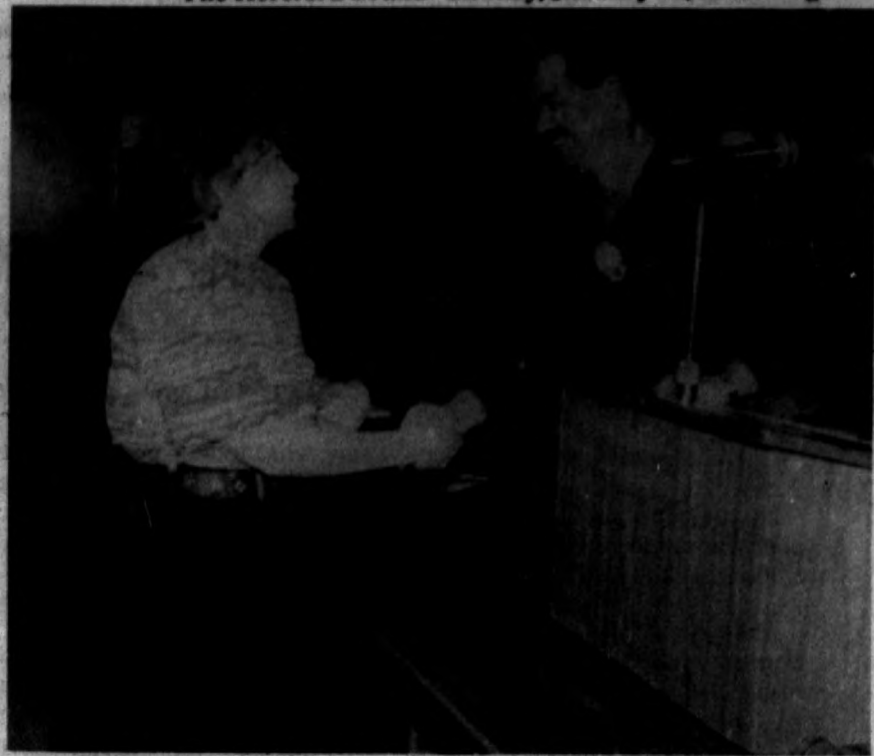
The cost would be several hundred million dollars, much of it going to build and operate regional jails with space for 9,000 inmates.

Money also is short in another area - human services.

The state faces a shortfall of \$2.4 billion from what's required to maintain the current level of services to the needy for the next two-year budget period. And Medicaid rolls are expected to increase by 250,000 over the same period.

If the scenario sounds familiar, it should. Lawmakers have been dealing with budget shortfalls almost every session since the oil and real estate collapses of 1985.

A second old problem is high on the 1993 agenda: school finance.

The Texas Supreme Court three times has struck down the state's school funding system, saying spending needs to be equalized between rich and poor school districts.

But a special session convened in November failed to find a solution, and lawmakers now face a June 1 deadline to act or possibly see schools closed.

Quick action also is necessary if a constitutional amendment is needed as part of the finance solution. Leaders say passage must be completed by late February to make the May 1 ballot.

While the federal court control of prisons under which lawmakers have labored in recent years has ended, crime and punishment is another familiar topic on this year's agenda.

The Texas Punishment Standards Commission has recommended abolishing parole, requiring inmates to serve 80 percent of their sentences and other changes.

While lawmakers say they might be able to find an extra \$150 million, the Higher Education Coordinating Board recommended a \$768.4 million increase, and higher education study committees suggested \$1.675 billion more.

One issue that doesn't have a pricetag is Senate confirmation of some 600 gubernatorial appointments to state boards and commissions.

The 1993 Legislature will have something of a new look, too.

Retirements and election defeats mean more than three dozen new lawmakers will be sworn in. And for the first time this century, Republicans will hold more than one-third of the Senate seats - 13 of 31.

"What no one knows, what I think no one can possibly know, is what effect any of this will have on the crime rate. No one can tell you for certain that we can get rid of alcohol and the crime rate will go down. It may go up. Outlawing sales might help, and it might not. There is absolutely no way to know."

The loss of \$60,000 would hit the county in the middle of its fiscal year, if the election fails. The city would be in a little better shape: it gets about \$30,000 in liquor taxes, sales taxes and property taxes, and Hereford's fiscal year begins in May.

"We would have to make up some revenue somewhere, and we would have to decide whether to maintain services at the same level or cut back if we lose that money," said City Manager Chester Nolen. "The council could decide to make that up through property taxes or service fees. The commission may say to change the service process, to pick up trash just four days a week."

"Right now, we are just planning our budget as if the money is going to be there. We're fortunate because it is early enough in our budget process that if the voters say no, we know what it is going to do to our budget."

"There won't be a large upheaval for us."

Store owners have said it would be a catastrophe for them. If the election fails, they will have about 30 days to sell their inventory, fixtures and anything else. After that, according to Marcy Hughes at The Country Store, the liquor is lost. They can't sell it to other retailers, or even return it to wholesalers.

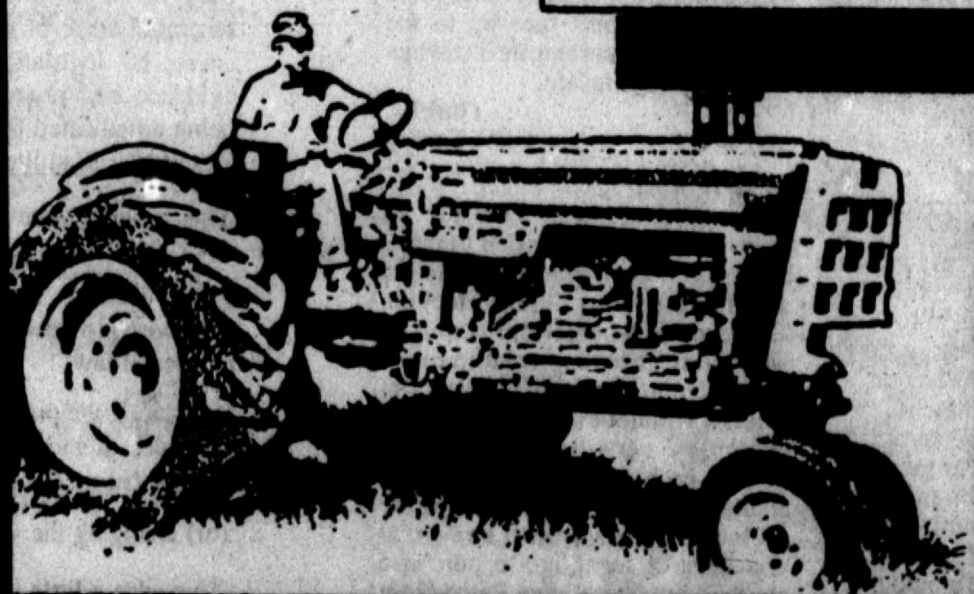
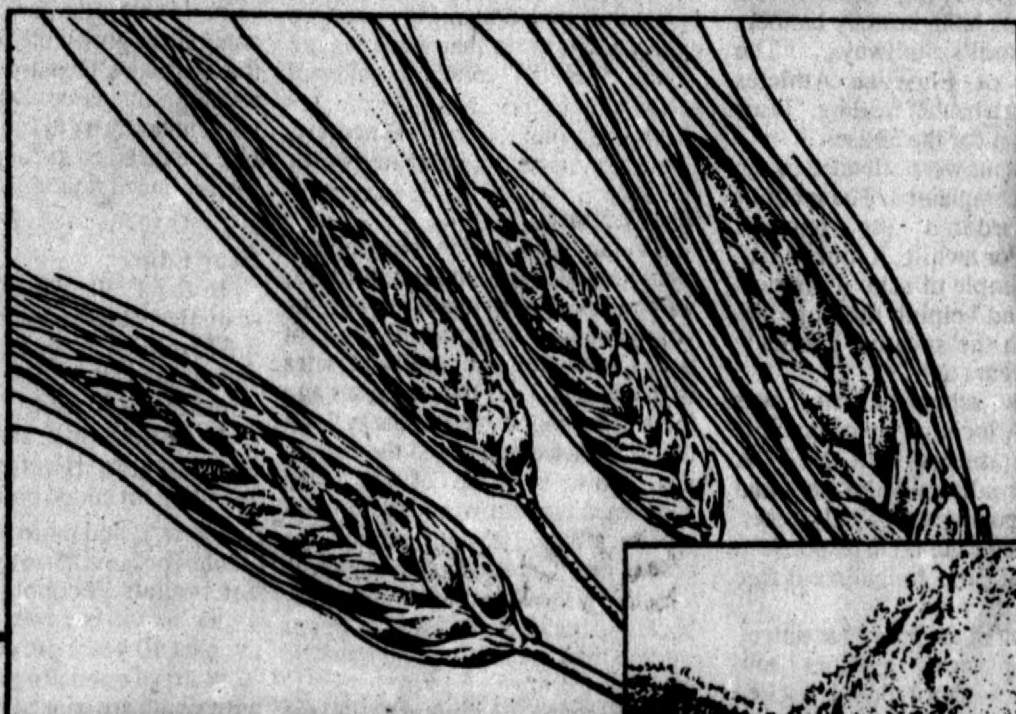

**QUESTIONS & ANSWERS**

Q. When we applied for a mortgage, the lender checked our income debts. What did they mean?

A. The financial institution was trying to determine if you could afford the monthly mortgage payments. Many financial institutions use a guideline of 28/36 ratio of income to debt. For example, 28 percent of your monthly income can be devoted to housing costs and all your other debts should not exceed 36 percent of your income. Using these ratios on an annual income of \$40,000, you would have \$933.34 PITI (principal, interest, taxes and insurance) available each month for your mortgage payment. An \$85,000 mortgage at 10 percent would have a monthly payment of \$745.94 and therefore would be about your upper limit for that particular loan program. Sometimes exceptions can be made if there are sufficient reasons. Depending on the lending institution, the ratios can vary. FHA programs use a higher ratio of 29/41.

This infuriated the captain, so he signaled back: "Dammit, I say change your course south. I am a battleship."

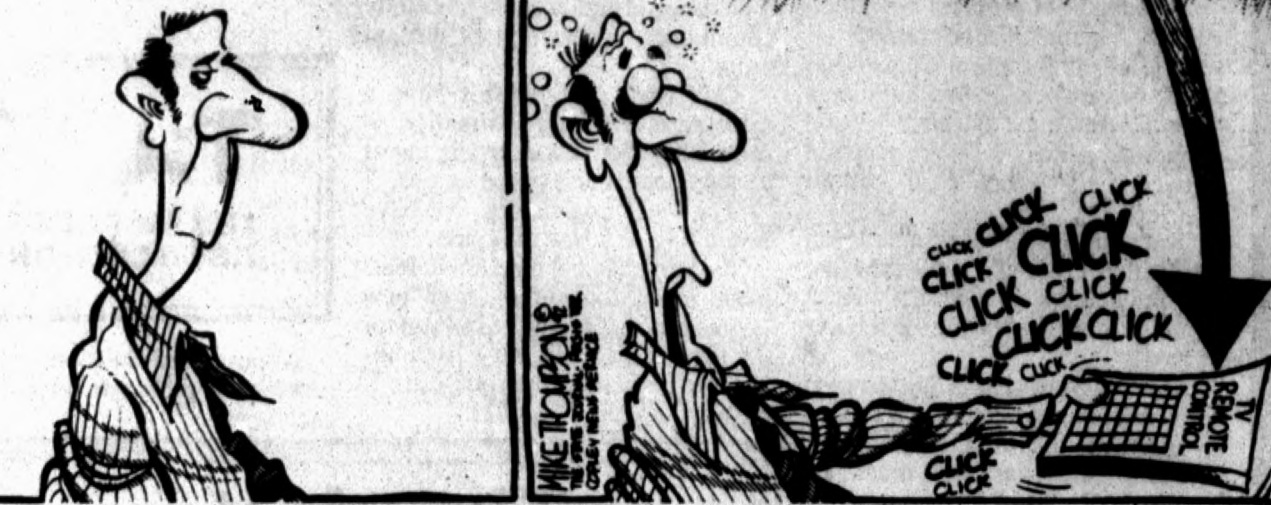
To which the reply came back: "And I say change your course north. I'm a lighthouse."

## Let's outlaw federal holiday for Xmas!

 In between meals on Christmas Day, we got to wondering if those nine berobed figures of the U.S. Supreme Court were at work that day.

How come we outlaw religion from display in schools and other institutions of government, yet allow government employees time off to celebrate Christmas?

For almost 200 years, the Constitution protected religion in this country from government. Then, President Eisenhower appointed Earl Warren as chief justice of the Supreme Court (like later admitted he made a mistake).

So for four decades, the courts have flip-flopped and now the rulings are trying to protect tiny government from big old religion.

If we can't have nativity scenes on courthouse squares, or city hall lawns, prayers in public schools or at graduation ceremonies, how come the federal government grants its employees a holiday at Christmas-time?

Christmas is about the birth of Christ. It's a religious observance. So why is the federal government observing this holiday? How can we maintain separation of church and state if government employees keep homing in on our celebration?

To avoid any semblance of hypocrisy, seems to us that as long as Christmas Day falls on a weekday, the justices of the Supreme Court ought to be working that day along with Congress and all federal employees. The same holds true for Monday following Easter.

The American Civil Liberties Union agrees with us whether they realize it or not.

You probably read about the hullabaloo over the nativity scene postmark in the little town of Nazareth that was banned after action by the Lubbock chapter of the ACLU. In trying the answer the protests against the banning of the use of the postmark, Lubbock ACLU president Ben Newcomb said:

"The ban has to do with the federal government. Everyone should be allowed to celebrate their holidays the way they wish, but the state should have no part in it."

Absolutely...the state should not part in it! So why is government observing Christmas by taking a holiday?

There's a group of people down in Beaumont that might be able to help us correct this situation. Beaumont West Brook HS has a "Deck the Halls" activity, during which student organizations hang holiday banners in the school's hallways. The Fellowship of Christian Athletes chapter hung a banner reading, "Jesus is the Reason for the Season."

Two students were offended by the banner and complained. The school's attorney ordered the banners removed. For awhile, it looked like another example of school districts caving in and helping the Supreme Court finish the spiritual genocide started 40 years ago.

But this school district was different. A local group of lawyers aligned themselves with the FCA club. The coalition of lawyers and students, encouraged by local pastors, threatened legal action in response to the denial of First Amendment free speech rights.

As a result of the prompt action by students, parents, pastors and lawyers, the school board backed down and allowed the banner to be hung once more in the school hallway.

Since a recent survey shows that 75 percent of Americans feel that religious decorations during the Christmas season are appropriate at public schools, perhaps we should enlist the aid of those Beaumont attorneys.

Let's start a movement to outlaw government holidays for religious observances.

Keep all government employees working a regular schedule during the Christmas season and, perhaps, finally we can get the attention of Congress and the Supreme Court.

On Tuesday the voters of Hereford will have the opportunity to show the youth of our community how much we care about them.

By voting against the sale of alcohol we will be showing our children that they are more important than the almighty dollar, that their welfare is more important than the mere convenience of the adults.

As City Health Director of Hereford, I feel compelled to make a short statement in reference to the upcoming wet/dry liquor election. The issue of whether our county is wet or dry is a very volatile topic. Whatever the results of the election, alcohol will not disappear from our county, as everyone knows.

The problem seems to be that alcohol is readily available on the shelves of our stores. I know that you must of legal age to purchase alcohol, but as we have found from past experiences, there have been slip-ups which are inadvertently due to carelessness, etc., but these mistakes do happen.

I feel the issue is a much greater one. Alcohol is the number one drug addiction in the United States and has been for many years, dating back to prohibition years. The sale of alcohol will always be available to those who wish to buy it, no matter what it takes to get it. There will always be a supply and demand for this legal addicting drug. I feel, as responsible adult citizens of this community, we need to set Godly examples for our children and try to curb this terrible addiction that is rampant in our county and around the world.

I know there are people who can control their liquor consumption and do not abuse their wives, children or law enforcement officials. My hat goes off to them but they are few in number. I cannot condone the use of

alcohol when it effects the lives and well being of other individuals, for then it becomes a problem for all of us to face.

I would invite you to check our county jail and see how many young men are incarcerated because of alcohol abuse. Just look in The Brand at the court records and see the number of DWI's that are there weekly.

But may I point out that for everyone that is employed in the sale of liquor, I can name 15 to 20 other people who are adversely affected by alcohol abuse--economic

hardships and loss of life. How can we justify the loss of precious lives and the breakup of the basic home unit with the economic benefits of sales taxes, etc., to our county.

No one ever starts out drinking alcohol to become an alcoholic. It is inherent in some people that they become addicted very easily. If people could control their drinking, it would not be dangerous. Unfortunately this is not the case. Making our county dry again will not make the problem of alcohol abuse disappear. But, it may help save one or two unsuspecting teenagers who get started drinking because of peer pressure and because it is "cool."

## Notes on the Law

Legal research occasionally reveals interesting bits of history. Under the New Mexico State Constitution, Article IV Section 34 provides:

"No act of the legislature shall affect the right or remedy of either party, or change the rules of evidence or procedure, in any pending case."

Did you read that carefully? Why would it be necessary to include a constitutional provision against the legislature changing the rules of evidence in a pending case? Well, according to the New Mexico Supreme Court:

"This provision of the Constitution was inserted for the purpose of curing a well-known method, too often used in the days when New Mexico was under a territorial form of government, to win cases in the courts by legislation which changed the rules of evidence and procedure in cases which were then being adjudicated by the various courts of the state." *Stockard v. Hamilton*, 25 NM 240 (1919).

This practice was not unique to New Mexico. Article 3 Section 55 of the Texas State Constitution contains similar provisions.

"The (Texas) Legislature shall not, except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, pass any local or special law, . . .

Regulating the practice of jurisdiction of, or changing the rules of evidence in any judicial proceeding or inquiry before the courts. . .

(or) changing the venue in civil or criminal cases."

This adds a little twist. In early Texas history, not only does it appear that people might have obtained advantages by getting specific laws passed regarding what evidence might or might not be used in a court, but also by getting laws regarding where a case could be heard. If a special law could be obtained requiring a resident of Texarkana to present his case in El Paso, in the early days of horse and buggy travel, this could have been the equivalent of winning the matter.

"It is (indeed) said that at an early period in many of the states the practice of enacting special and local laws became an efficient means for the easy enactment of laws for the advancement of personal rather than public interests." *Miller v. El Paso County*, 150 SW2d 1000.

As Marshall Rooster Cogburn, John Wayne capriciously used his rifle or pistol to pronounce verdicts on various "criminals" of the old west. Lucky Ned Pepper, for example, was given the option of being "hung" after a fair trial back at Fort Smith or being summarily shot on the spot if he resisted. The civil side of the law in the old west appears to have been just as wild as peoples' rights to a fair trial were subject to the capricious use of "special laws."

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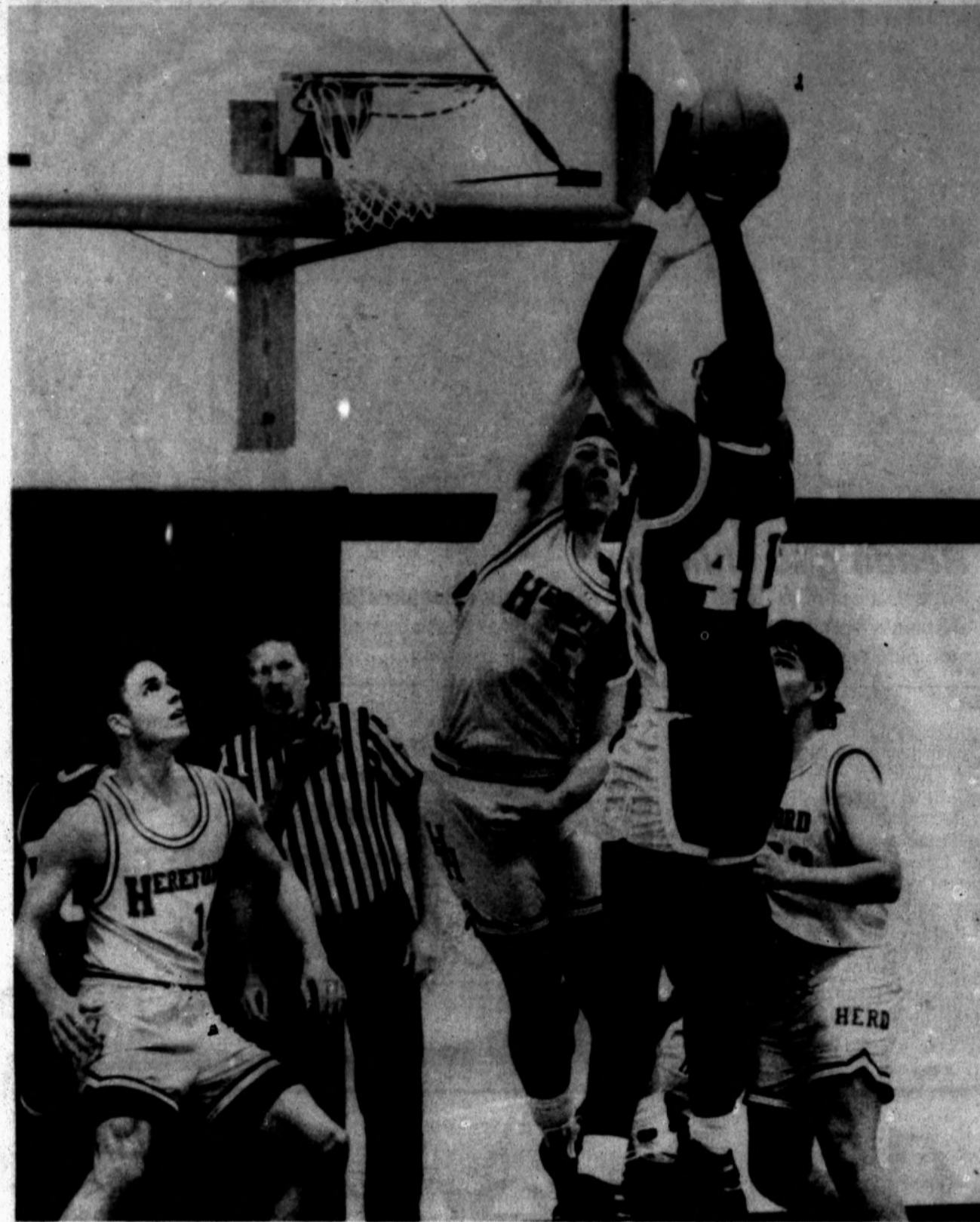

## This Cowboy-Eagle game even bigger than first two

IRVING (AP) - It's time for the Eagles-Cowboys Backyard War III Sunday as the two bitter division rivals who sincerely hate each other meet for the right to advance to the NFC championship game.

The 11:30 a.m. game in sold-out Texas Stadium is the third meeting of the year for these two; the Eagles killed the Cowboys 31-7 in October in Philly, and the Cowboys returned the favor 20-10 in November at home.

The winner plays the survivor of Saturday's game between NFC West champion San Francisco and NFC East wildcard Washington.

"It looks like we may have to win the NFC East twice just to get to the Super Bowl," said Dallas running back Emmitt Smith. "This is going to be fun."

Dallas drew a bye into the divisional playoffs with a 13-3 record, the second best in the league and a club record for most victories in a season.

Philadelphia played an 11-5 wildcard into a 36-20 victory over New Orleans last Sunday, overcoming a 20-7 deficit on the road to do it.

The game abounds in subplots above and beyond the fact the loser goes home.

Philadelphia quarterback Randall Cunningham revisits the sight of his humiliation in November where coach Rick Kotite benched him at halftime.

"The benching didn't help me at all," said Cunningham, who rallied the team to five straight victories to end the season. "It was a setback for me and it was a little embarrassing."

Dallas quarterback Troy Aikman, who beat the Eagles for the first time a November, tests his nerves in his first playoff start.

"Everyone is making it a big deal because I'm starting my first playoff game," Aikman said. "It's just like any other big game. The only difference in this one is that the loser doesn't play any more. The Eagles don't intimidate me."

Then there is the Smith-Andre Waters feud.

Smith has called Eagles safety Waters a "cheap shot artist" and Waters, who hopes to play for the first time since suffering a broken

 SWC basketball teams haven't been successful against the AP top 25 and they haven't impressed the Big Eight basketball coaches, but there have been positive non-conference developments as they prepare to battle each other.

The SWC is 0-7 against ranked teams, and the Big Eight coaches voted 8-0 against any kind of alliance with the SWC. But that hasn't dampened the enthusiasm of Texas A&M's Tony Barone, who is in the second year of a rebuilding program with the Aggies.

"Who anointed the Big Eight coaches spokesmen for the alliance?" Barone asked. "I voted against an alliance with the Big Eight. I don't

want to join the Big Eight either."

The Houston Cougars, who had narrow losses to No. 6 North Carolina and No. 15 UCLA, took the week off after a Monday night victory over California-Irvine to prepare for three games. Houston plays Wyoming on Monday, Texas on Thursday and A&M on Saturday.

Eight SWC games are scheduled for the first full week of intra-league competition. It gets under way Sunday when Texas hosts Southern Methodist.

Barone will take the Aggies into their first SWC game against Rice Tuesday night with a five-game home winning streak on the line, a vast improvement from last year's 6-21 season record.

Rice already has been on a roller coaster ride this season under first year coach Willis Wilson.

The Owls started with a near-upset of then No. 1 ranked Michigan and won the Husky Basketball Classic before swooning to three straight losses.

They got back on track Tuesday by beating the Longhorns 92-87 in Austin, ending a string of 17 straight home victories for Texas. Rice almost let it slip away but Wilson liked his team's mettle.

"The bottom line is we played the defending SWC champions in front of an emotional crowd," Wilson said. "I don't know how long it's been since a Rice team held onto a game in a situation like this."

Texas lost guard B.J. Tyler for an undetermined period of time with a broken foot he received during practice prior to the Tuesday loss.

Tyler's departure added to the injury problems Coach Tom Penders has had to deal with this season. Michael Richardson and Corey Lockridge have missed games with injuries and Gerald Houston plays with a back brace because of muscle spasms.

Texas Tech also is having a memorable beginning. The Red Raiders are off to their best start since 1981-82 when they were 9-2 to start the season.

Will Flemons, last year's SWC player of the year, is averaging 18 points and nine rebounds per game

and Coach James Dickey has received good bench support from a trio of freshmen called "The James Gang."

They are forward Jason Sasser of Dallas, and guards Lenny Hollie of Alamogorda, N.M. and Koy Smith from Hale Center.

The Raiders have won two tournaments, the Coca Cola Classic at Mizzoula, Mont, and the Cowboy Shootout at Casper, Wyo.

Baylor has been surprisingly adept at scoring under first year coach Darrel Johnson. Aundre Branch, who averaged 2.4 points per game last

## Predators provide hunting challenge

**FORT WORTH, Texas (AP)** - The white-tailed deer season is almost over in most of Texas, but hunters who still are yearning for some challenging matchups with wild game don't have to call it quits yet.

In fact, the end of the big-game hunting season traditionally kicks off one of the best times to pursue creatures even more wily than deer - predators such as coyotes, bobcats and foxes.

Many hunters have found that one of the best extensions of the fall and winter seasons is a predator call that sounds like a squealing rabbit or mouse, and they also have found that they can increase their knowledge of wildlife in general by observing predators.

Although the principles of predator calling are simple - taking a stand, producing the cries of an injured rabbit or mouse and watching your surroundings for an approaching predator - there can be some unexpected and exciting experiences, too.

Once had an owl, also a predator, swoop in from behind me and almost take my cap off my head just as I turned. And when using a tree stand to call predators, I have had more

than one excited fox jump into the same tree with me.

Those kind of experiences will teach you to be on your toes at all times. Predators are quick and unpredictable.

Once after taking a picture of a coyote racing to my call in South Texas, I was astonished to see a second coyote in the picture after it was printed. The second coyote was about five feet off the ground. He had almost run into the coyote I was photographing and had leaped to avoid a collision.

Coyotes, bobcats and foxes can be found throughout Texas' many regions from the Piney Woods of East Texas over to the South Texas brush country and on upward through the Hill Country, Cross Timbers and the Panhandle.

Although some areas have higher populations of coyotes than foxes and vice versa, bobcats can be found in virtually all counties.

Hunting predators with a camera is even more challenging than hunting with a firearm. However, there are some laws predator hunters should be aware of before picking up a varmint call and heading to the woods.

Some predators, including foxes and raccoons, are classified as fur-bearing animals, and a trapper's

license is required before they may be hunted, shot or trapped. The trapper's license costs \$15 for residents and \$250 for nonresidents.

Fur-bearing animals such as foxes, raccoons, and ring-tailed cats also may be taken only from Dec. 1 through Jan. 31. They may, however, be hunted with a camera or for observation year-round.

Coyotes and bobcats are classified as nongame animals and may be hunted year-round.

There are many different types of mouth-blown varmint calls on the market, and all will do the trick. There also are several cassette tape player-type callers available, along with an assortment of taped sounds of injured rabbits, birds, mice and other animals preyed on by varmints.

I have used both the electronic and mouth-blown calls, but my personal preference is the tiny metal reed that is the basis of all mouth-blown calls. The reed is inserted between the lips, and the pitch of the call can be increased from a rabbit's cry to that of a tiny mouse's squeak by applying pressure to the reed.

Too, the method can be used hands-free, allowing better control of a camera.

Many hunters have the misconception that predators such as coyotes, bobcats and foxes are nocturnal animals. Although all three do spend much of their time hunting at night, it is not uncommon to see them during the day.

Varmint hunting at night can be productive for the predator caller, but hunting during the day has other advantages. For one, the predator can be seen and photographed under much better conditions. Too, many times more than one animal will answer a predator call, and some are never seen by the night caller.

Predator callers who hunt during the day also have a better chance of

gaining permission to enter a landowner's land than do those who hunt at night.

As a general rule, a coyote will run in fast to a predator call. Bobcats, on the other hand, often simply walk in, while foxes usually trot toward the call, stopping every now and then to check things out. These, however, are only general trends, and a predator caller should stay alert for any type of response.

Of all the predators to call, a coyote is no doubt the most challenging, especially an old coyote. These animals use their senses to the maximum, often circling the sound instead of coming straight in.

As a result, when two hunters are working together, one that is stationed approximately 30 to 40 yards downwind of the caller often will find himself within yards of a circling coyote.

Tower deer blinds, trees and even tripods will work well for calling predators, because they give the hunter better visibility over low brush and trees. The elevated height also keeps some of the hunter's scent high and makes him less likely to be smelled by an incoming animal.

If you still have an urge to hunt even though the deer season is over, pick up your camera and your predator call. The knowledge and skill you will gain by watching the animals, learning where and when they travel certain areas and what they are eating just might help you later on when you are scouting for next year's big buck.

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

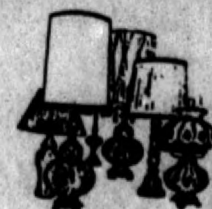

## Profitable choices highlight vegetable conference

HEREFORD--Developing profitable markets for safe, nutritious vegetables will be emphasized in the annual West Texas Vegetable Conference here Jan. 19.

The conference begins at 8:30 a.m. at the Hereford Community Center, 100 Avenue C at Park Avenue. It is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, High Plains Vegetable Growers and Shippers

Council, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Tech University, Deaf Smith County Extension Vegetable Development Committee, Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce and Texas Department of Agriculture.

The program has been approved by TDA for five continuing education units for private, commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators.

Applicators are required to obtain five CEUS of training each year to retain certification. The \$25 registration fee includes lunch.

"The conference goal is to help improve the quality of Texas Vegetables, develop and expand markets and increase family farm profitability," said Dr. Roland E. Roberts, Extension Service vegetable specialist at Lubbock who has

coordinated the conferences since 1971.

"Many more farmers are showing interest in vegetables as alternative crops allowed under the new farm program," Roberts said. "Our growers want to enhance consumer health with the 'Five-A-Day' from Texas program." That is a program which promotes inclusion of nutritious

vegetables in the daily diet, he explained.

As it has for many years, this year's program will also focus on consumer and grower safety. "Speakers will present research-based information which will enhance farm productivity, conserve our natural resources, improve the marketing of the crops and foster safe production of a safe crop," the vegetable specialist said.

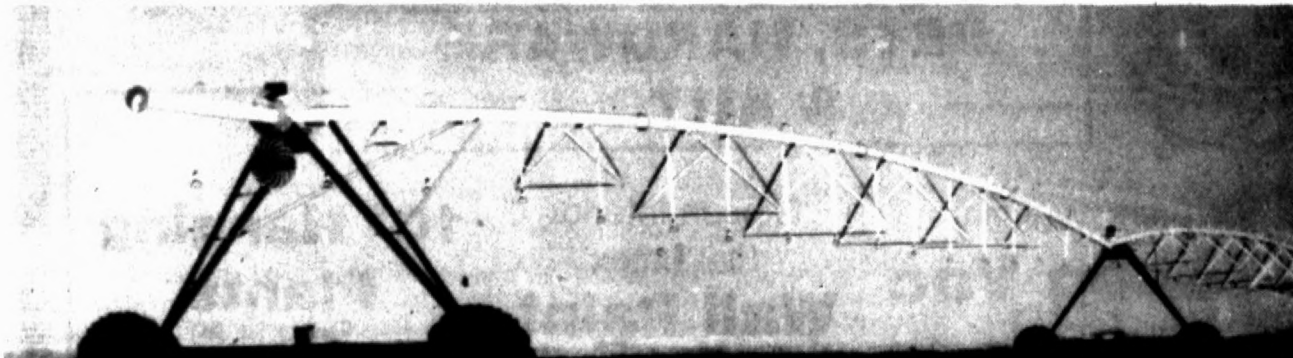

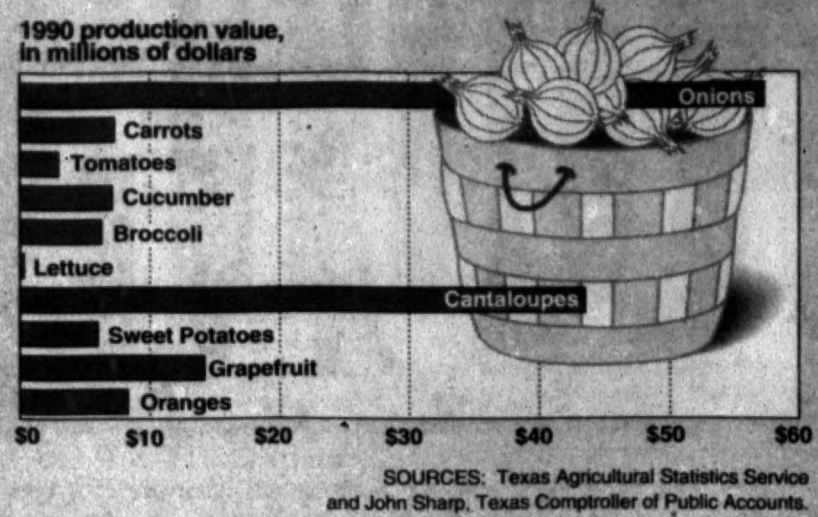

# USDA plans to shut many US field offices

WASHINGTON (AP) - A Texas congressman will hold hearings into the Agriculture Department's plan to streamline field offices nationwide, potentially eliminating as many as 1,242.

Under the reorganization announced Thursday by outgoing Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan, Texas would lose 79 offices - the third highest total behind Georgia and Tennessee.

The proposal appeared to cause little immediate worry among Texas lawmakers, but was greeted with disfavor by the Texas Farm Bureau.

"It's unfortunate that we seem to be trying to balance the budget of the federal government on the backs of agriculture," said Farm Bureau spokesman Steve Pringle.

Madigan said he was giving members of Congress and farm groups a chance to review his proposals before issuing a final list next week.

Rep. Charles Stenholm, chairman of the House agriculture subcommittee that oversees how well USDA operates, said he planned to hold hearings on the plan as soon as next month.

While the proposal is preliminary, the Stamford Democrat said cuts must be made.

"In my estimation this plan or probably something close to it will eventually be implemented, because the bottom line is we either save the money this way or we take it out of something else," he said.

Stenholm's hearings could be held around the country as well as in Washington, an aide said.

The reductions nationwide would come from a list of 7,405 offices of the Soil Conservation Service, the Farmers Home Administration, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and the federal crop insurance program.

The network of offices was created when 20 percent of Americans lived on farms and without modern communications. Today, less than 1

percent of the population lives on farms, Madigan said, and computers as well as better transportation and phone service mean fewer offices are needed.

The plan does not affect nearly 7,000 other USDA offices, including those of the Food and Safety Inspection Service, Food and Nutrition Service, Forest Service and Agricultural Marketing Service.

In Texas, the ASCS would be most heavily hit with 52 office shutdowns. The FmHA would be next, with 15; the SCS with 10; and the crop insurance program with two. The state would be left with 505 field offices, down from 583.

At a news conference Madigan stressed the restructuring "is not about reducing service to farmers."

"It is about being able to improve our services to farmers in a manner that respects the role of the American taxpayer," he said.

Pringle said the consolidation would reduce the level of service offered Texas farmers. "People are going to have to drive greater distances to obtain service from their Department of Agriculture," he said.

Texas ASCS Director Donnie Bowman said farmers wouldn't lose any services.

"The same service that's been put out by ASCS in the past would still be available for (farmers) under the more streamlined plan," Bowman said.

The USDA had no immediate estimate of cost savings or employees affected under the Madigan plan. But the General Accounting Office has said that consolidating the most inefficient offices alone could save \$90 million a year from the department's \$62 billion budget.

Pringle said his organization would await the arrival of the new administration before lobbying against the proposal.

"I don't think it does us a lot of good to raise a lot of hell right now," he said. "I think we need to wait for the new administration and place some faith in our Texas (congressional) delegation."

Progress in developing improved strains of Russet Norkota potatoes will be reported by Dr. Creighton Miller, professor of horticulture at Texas A&M University, College Station, and Doug Smallwood, Experiment Station senior research associate, Lubbock.

The exposure High Plains vegetables received at the Produce Marketing Association meeting will be related by Bill Weeks and Rusty Ingram. Weeks is executive vice president of the Texas Citrus and Vegetable Association, Harlingen; Ingram, of Plainview, is president of the High Plains Vegetable Growers and Shippers Council. A business meeting of the growers and shippers council will precede the lunch.

The afternoon session will open with Dr. Charles Hall, Extension Service economist and horticultural

marketing specialist, College Station, presenting the 1993 outlook for vegetables and potential for new crops. Pat Hale, TDA marketing specialist, Austin, will look at grower self-help marketing efforts.

Levon Harmon, TDA pesticide specialist, Amarillo, will discuss worker protection requirements.

# Flex provisions

WASHINGTON (AP) - Soybeans may be planted on optional flexible acreage under provisions of the 1993 price support and production adjustment programs, Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan has announced.

The secretary is required to prohibit the planting of soybeans on flexible acres if, on Jan. 1, the estimated price of 1993-crop

soybeans is below 105 percent of the 1993 loan rate.

The national average price support loan level of \$5.02 per bushel was announced on Nov. 16 for the 1993 soybean crop. The price of soybeans is projected to be greater than \$5.27 a bushel, he said, which means soybeans may be planted on flexible acres.

# Soil quality study planned by USDA

WASHINGTON (AP) - Agriculture Department scientists say a worldwide network is needed to monitor soil quality and develop broader means of rating it.

"There is nothing currently available that can measure and predict farming's effects on all the key aspects of soil quality - soil productivity, environmental quality, food safety and quality and human health," said James F. Parr of the Agricultural Research Service in Beltsville, Md.

"It's no longer just a question of measuring the traditional physical and

chemical properties to predict crop yields," he said.

Parr and colleagues would like to see a global network developed that would rate soil quality according to a new index or report card.

The proposal was based on reports presented at a recent soil quality conference, said Parr, who oversees ARS soil fertility research.

A new index for rating soil should include plant proteins, vitamins and trace minerals essential to human health, urged Sharon B. Hornick, an ARS soil scientist specializing in human nutrition.

### DEPTH PERCEPTION

How amazing it is that we have two eyes set a distant apart, each with its own set of muscles; yet, when everything is working right, those eyes look at one object in such a way that we can perceive how far it is from us, and how solid. Just seeing height and width would make it difficult for a youngster to pile up blocks, for a seamstress to thread a needle -- or for you to drive a car.

If depth perception is a problem, it's usually that the eye muscles are uncoordinated, or a cataract may be forming to close off the vision in one eye. Your optometrist's through examination can determine what's wrong.

Glasses may be prescribed to align the two eyes. Vision training may be ordered to help coordinate the eye muscles. If a cataract has formed, it should be dealt with promptly. Most often it is removed surgically and a contact lens or implant inserted to replace the lens that had become cloudy.

-Add a fresh coat of bright paint to a wooden bulletin board frame.

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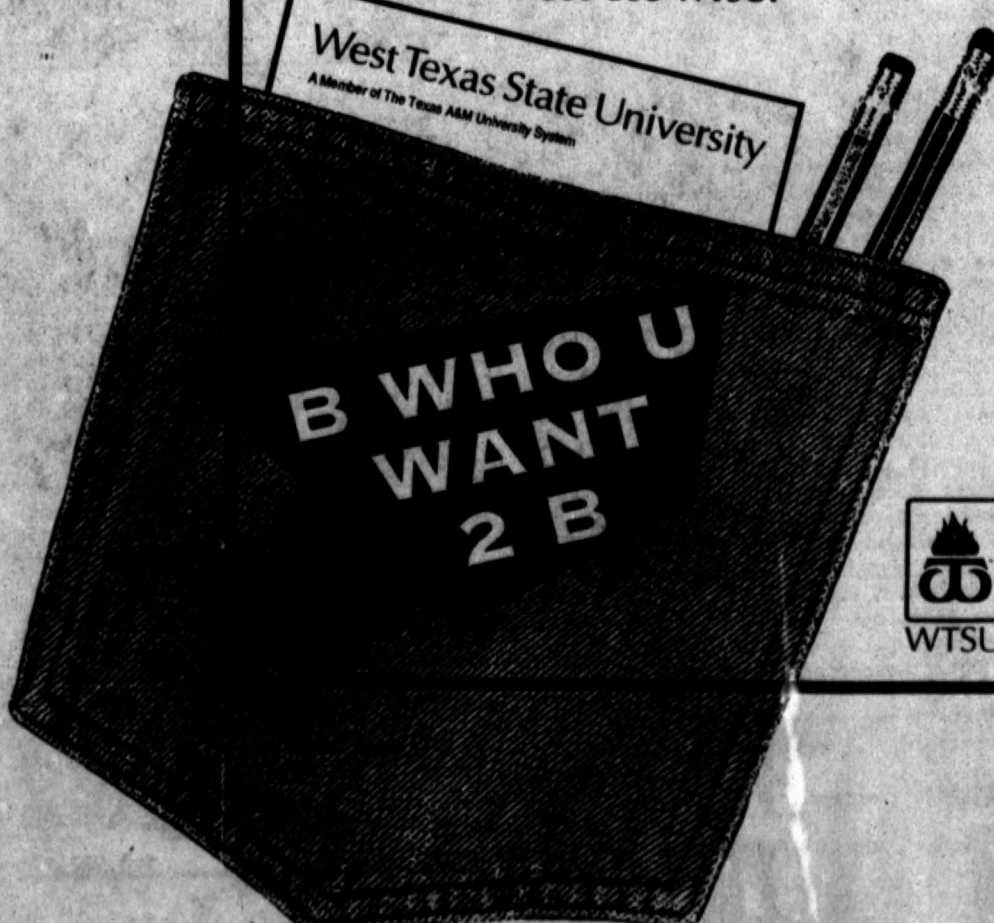

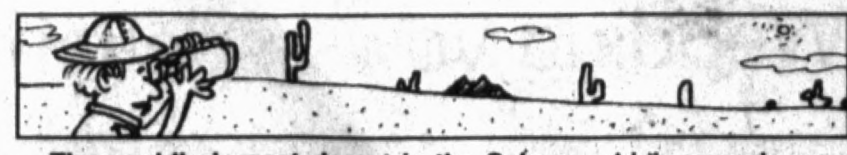

### DREAMS WITH DEADLINES

I've never traveled the highway that connects the United States with Alaska, but I will one day. I've never written a best-selling book, but I will one day. I've never walked on a street of gold, but I will one day. How do I know that I will accomplish these dreams? Because they are more than dreams, they are my goals.

Best selling author, Harvey McKay said that goals are just dreams with deadlines. Most of the people I've met don't have goals, just dreams. Dreams that aren't well defined and have no time frames, are just dreams. Goals not only establish deadlines, they also give us focus. Focus means to have a clear picture of your subject. People who set goals develop sharp, long-term focus in their lives. Do you know what you really want in life? Can you get a

clear picture of it in your mind? Are you willing to make some sacrifices to achieve your dreams? If you can answer yes to those questions, you are on your way to becoming more successful. However, to ensure that your goals are not just dreams, see if they pass the SAM test.

#### The SAM test

The SAM test says that all goals must be specific, achievable and measurable. I have found that if these three characteristics are manifest in your goal executing strategy, you can accomplish what you desire.

Let's examine these three characteristics. Specific means well defined or limited to a certain kind or type. I believe to qualify as specific, you must put your goals in written form. No matter how good your memory is, it is better to have your goals in writing. Examples of specific goals could include: "I will lose 10 pounds by April 1, 1993," or "I will earn one million dollars by Friday."

While both of these examples are specific, only one of them meets the second part of the SAM test. The second element is the A, which stands for achievable. It is reasonable to believe that I could lose 10 pounds in three months. This is certainly achievable.

It is not reasonable to believe that I can earn a million dollars in less than one week. In this case the dream is not impossible, but odds are against the deadline. That does not mean that you shouldn't think big. Goals should make us stretch and reach. Goals should make us venture out of our comfort zones.

The third step in the SAM test is that all goals must be measurable. If for example, I had said I want to lose *some* weight, how would we measure *some*? How much is *some* weight? *Some* is neither specific nor measurable. Losing 10 pounds by April 1st is a goal that

meets all SAM criteria. It is specific, achievable and measurable. **Get plugged in**

You can plug into the power of goal setting by following this simple process. First, set some realistic, achievable goals. Write them down and break them into measurable steps.

Second, concentrate on the benefits of reaching those goals. Promise yourself a special treat or reward for hitting your targets.

Third, continually rub elbows with high achievers. Nothing will increase your ability to get motivated like associating with winners. Listen to them and learn from them.

Fourth, keep believing in yourself. No matter how tough your present situation may be, you are still a worthwhile person who has something to contribute. Whether you're 8 or 80, keep believing in your potential.

Finally, take some time to organize your life. You might make that one of your first goals. Take each letter of the word GOALS and use them to make a final point: Good Organization Always Leads to Success.

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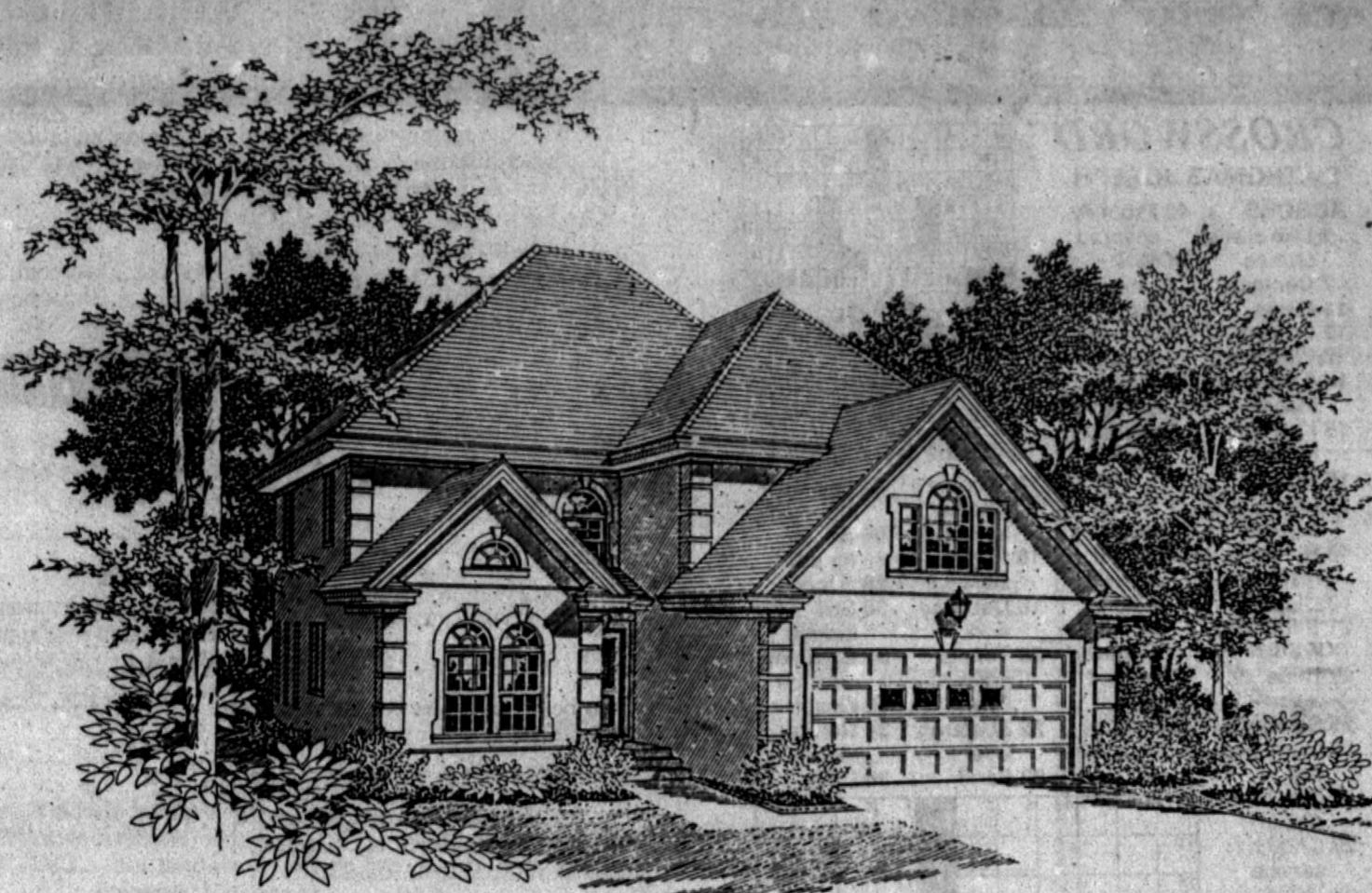

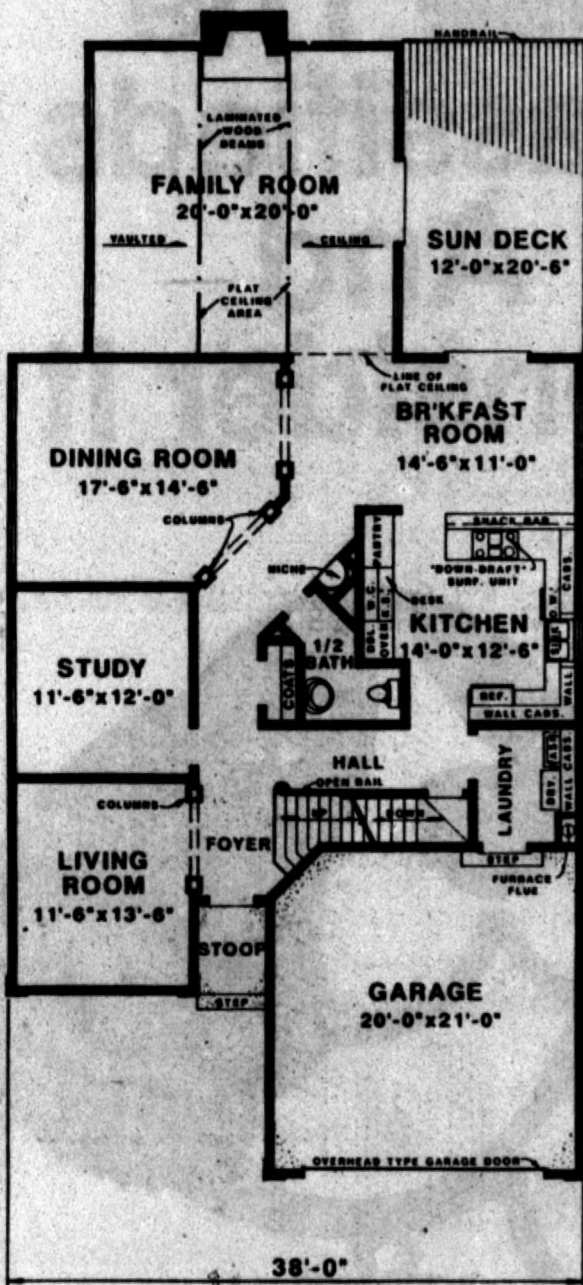

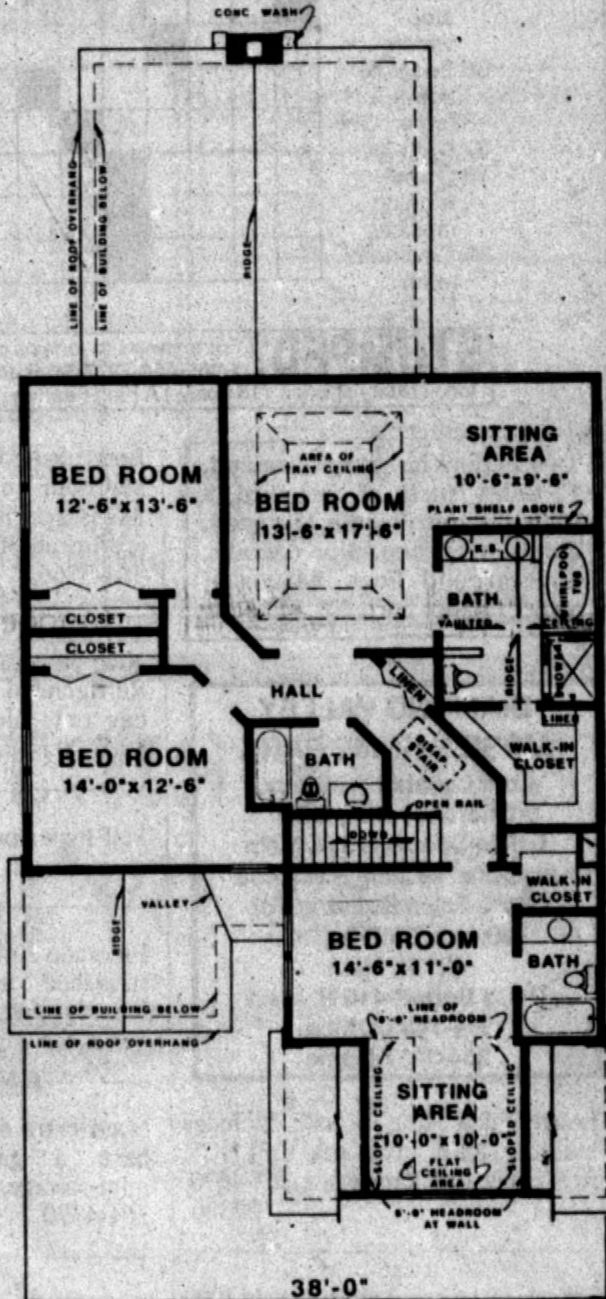
The immense family room and sun deck are about as wide as the entire house, the family room boasting a vaulted ceiling, fireplace and deck access.

Q. I would like to install a strip oak tongue-and-groove floor on top of an above-grade concrete slab. However, I've heard horror stories of costly wood floors buckling from moisture. How can I avoid problems caused by moisture that might accumulate in the area under the slab?

A. A hardwood floor can be installed on a concrete slab at or above grade. The Oak Flooring Institute recommends against below-grade installations.

Moisture is the chief culprit in hardwood floor buckling, so test the slab for dryness. Tape 1 square foot of clear polyethylene sheet to the slab, sealing its edges with plastic tape. If after 24 hours, no clouding or moisture droplets have formed under it, the slab is dry enough to install a wood floor.

To prevent moisture from reaching the underside of the hardwood floor, place a vapor barrier of either

building felt or polyethylene plastic over the slab prior to installation.

Q. The outside of my home is covered with wood-grain aluminum siding. In a few areas, the bottom edges of the siding have developed a white chalklike substance. What is it? Can I prevent it from spreading and how do I remove it?

A. The chalky substance is a layer of dead paint pigments along the bottom edges of the siding. It is not aluminum corrosion. Over time, the siding's paint weathers.

Q. I have a problem with water seeping into my basement after a heavy rainfall. Perforated drain pipes under the basement floor do a good job of relieving hydrostatic pressure below the slab. However, the cavities in the concrete block walls fill with water, which leaks into the basement. Contractors recommend breaking up the floor at the perimeter and installing drain tiles and a sump pump. However, I recently heard about a plastic molding similar to a baseboard radiator cover, that is sealed to the inside of the foundation wall along the floor. Holes are drilled

into the blocks to drain the water from the cavities into the molding which carries it to a sump. Does this really work?

A. There is such a product and it does work. But the ideal way to correct a hydrostatic leakage problem in a concrete block wall is to intercept or divert the water before it reaches the foundation.

However, if you can't lay drainage pipes because the area around the foundation is paved or covered with expensive shrubbery, or is otherwise inaccessible, then you must control the seepage into the basement. You can do this as you describe.

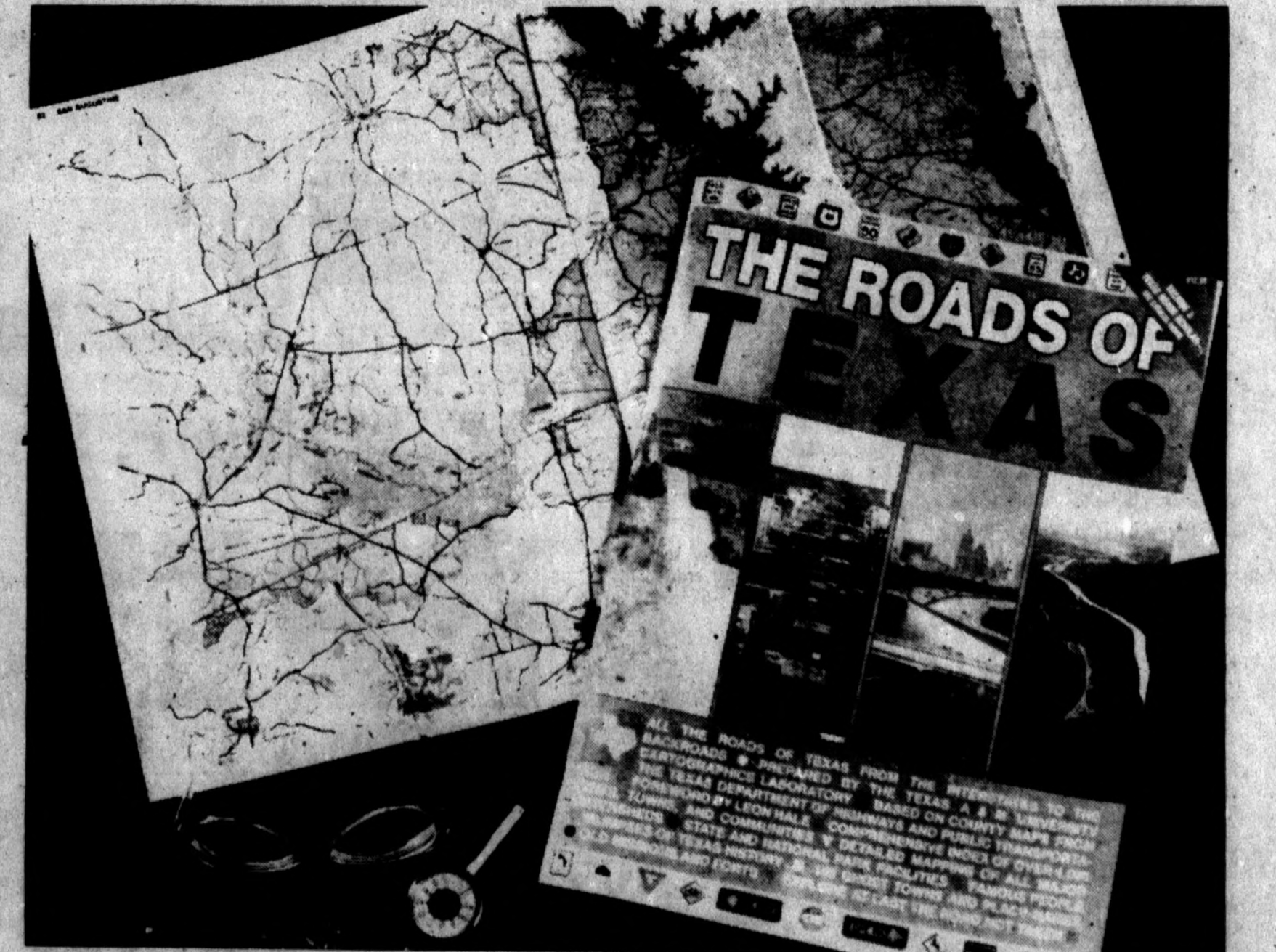

## 'Carol Burnett: A Reunion' offers vintage variety



CBS invites viewers down Memory Lane once more with Sunday's presentation of *The Carol Burnett Show: A Reunion*. Burnett is joined in the two-hour retrospective commemorating the 25th anniversary of her long-running variety show by series regulars Harvey Korman, Tim Conway, Vicki Lawrence and Lyle Waggoner.

Two-hour special  
barely enough 'time together'

Promises, promises. They wouldn't be so hard to keep if only the future were as easy to predict as the past. A case in point is *The Carol Burnett Show: A Reunion*, airing Sunday, Jan. 10 on CBS. At a press conference held last July to announce the forthcoming special, Burnett promised new skits and a guest star, Harry Connick Jr.

"What we are doing with this is not even, I guess, a true retrospective in the sense of just going down Memory Lane and showing clips," Burnett said.

"We have the gang coming back. And we are doing, also, new sketches. We are going to do a new Mama and Eunice (sketch). We are doing a new Mr. Tudball and Mrs. Wiggins, the dumb secretary and the boss, where she's accusing him of sexually harassing her.

"We will probably do a new finale. And we have a guest star, Harry Connick Jr. So it would be hard to show entire sketches (from the past)."

Burnett's plan was clearly more ambitious than she realized. She had 11 seasons of shows to sift through and just two hours of air time.

At the October taping, says co-star Vicki Lawrence, several sketches were taped; however, none of them made it into the final cut of the show.

"It's really hard to gear up for one week," Lawrence says, "and re-create stuff better than what you did over an 11-year period."

Apart from introductions and a little chit-chat between clips, *Carol Burnett* regulars Lawrence, Harvey Korman, Tim Conway and Lyle Waggoner get their only real workout during the reunion's finale.

But that's not to say *The Carol Burnett Show: A Reunion* isn't a success. The special was taped on the same CBS soundstage as the original series and follows much the same format. It opens

with Burnett recalling in song how she felt when the show debuted (gulp) 25 years ago.

Then there's the patented Burnett "Q&A" session, with memorable clips, including the woman who just wanted directions to the ladies' room and the amateur diva who strode up to the stage and asked the orchestra to play "You Made Me Love You" in the key of G."

The middle of the show is given over to reminiscences by Burnett and company, most of which are cleverly tied to even more clips: the Tarzan yell, the curtain-rod gown in the *Gone With the Wind* spoof and a dentist's office scene in which Conway injects himself with Novocaine in three places.

Waggoner announces station breaks so smoothly we forget we haven't heard his voice in 14 years.

The reunion's second hour is not as entertaining as the first. There is a brief reel of clips showing Burnett in duets and production numbers with such musical guests as Lucille Ball, Bing Crosby, Liza Minnelli and Ella Fitzgerald. Burnett also stops to thank the old show's singers, dancers and costume de-

**Palin excels as surrogate traveler**

In the mood for some vicarious travel? A&E invites you to accompany Michael Palin as he goes to the ends of the earth in *Pole to Pole*, an eight-part series beginning Sunday, Jan. 10.

Actor-writer Palin (*Monty Python's Flying Circus, A Fish Called Wanda*) is a veteran globe-trotter. He earned world-class traveler's status when he duplicated the fictional journey of Jules Verne's hero Phileas Fogg in the BBC production *Around the World in 80 Days*, which also aired on A&E.

In *Pole to Pole*, Palin takes a hardy film crew on an arduous and fascinating trek from the North Pole to the South Pole, passing through Europe, Asia Minor and Africa. As in *Around the World*, Palin is forbidden to travel by airplane. Instead, he makes his way by land and sea on most every conveyance from dog sled to camel train. Time is, again, an intimidating factor: While he has more than 80 days to complete the trip (four months, in fact), the crew must race to board the only ship sailing to Antarctica out of Cape Town.

Palin's charming personality proves welcome in any land. His ready wit and humorous observations notwithstanding, Palin's success as a voyager comes from his willingness to participate in the moment, no matter how foreign, be it taking a mud bath at the Black Sea, consulting an African witch doctor or appearing in a Russian filmmaker's documentary about crayfish.

The journey was not without its hardships and near-disasters. Palin faints in a Finnish sauna and cracks a rib while white-water rafting in Africa. He escapes the Russian border hours before the August 1991 coup attempt, and a bandit-repelling armed escort is required on the trail to Nairobi, Kenya. In the sweltering heat of the Sudan, his suitcases melt.

The global perspective emerging from *Pole to Pole* is, overall, an encouraging one. No matter how large his expense account, Palin would have been unable to complete this trip on time without the cooperation of sundry guides, ship captains and warriors. It is comforting to see that across the world individuals are prepared to lend a hand to a stranger in a strange land.

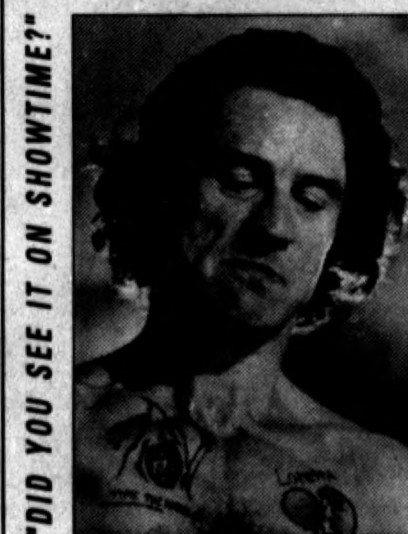

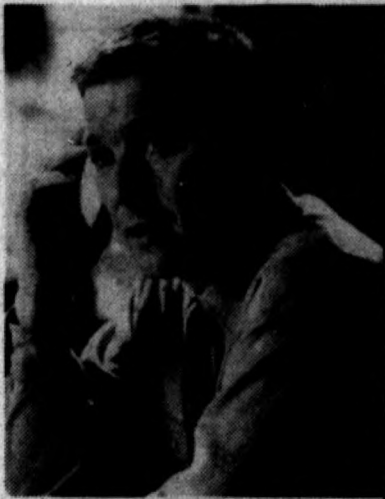

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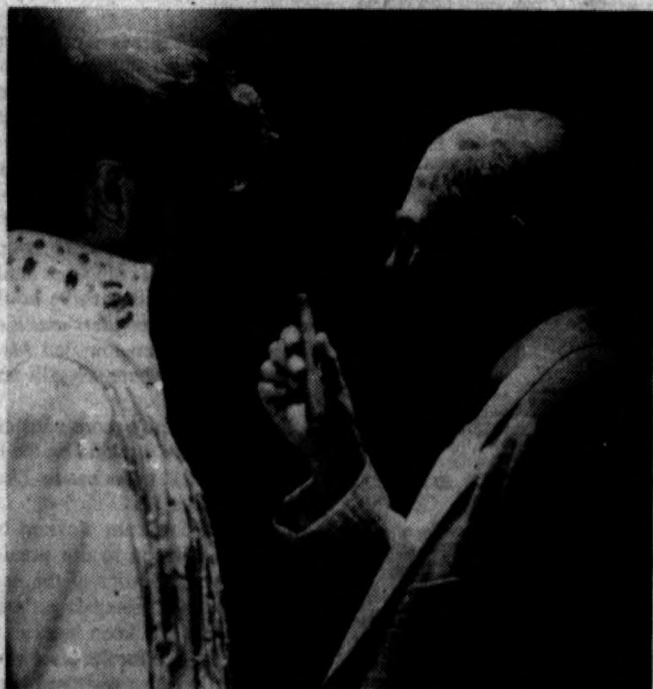

**Steinem adds television to her resume**

For most Americans, the name of Gloria Steinem is synonymous with the founding of contemporary feminism. Steinem has been named one of the "25 Most Influential Women in America" by the *World Almanac* for the past nine years.

Steinem's beliefs were shaped in India, where she studied for two years. In that country's caste system, she found many parallels to gender and race relations in the United States.

Steinem's credits as a writer and journalist are wide-ranging. Already an established author by 1968, she helped found *New York* magazine, where she served as political columnist until 1972. Steinem has written three books (including *Outrageous Acts and Everyday Rebellion*) and co-founded *Ms.* magazine in 1973, where she still serves as a consultant.

One of Steinem's more unusual credits is her stint as a writer on the historic mid-'60s NBC news satire *That Was The Week That Was*.

Last fall, Steinem worked hard to elect Bill Clinton to the presidency. She's also an admirer of the next first lady, whom she describes as "a fine administrator and a keen legal mind ... I think we got two for the price of one."

Steinem has also involved herself in producing topical movies for television. Her first effort to reach the screen is *Better Off Dead*, a drama set to premiere Tuesday, Jan. 12, on Lifetime.

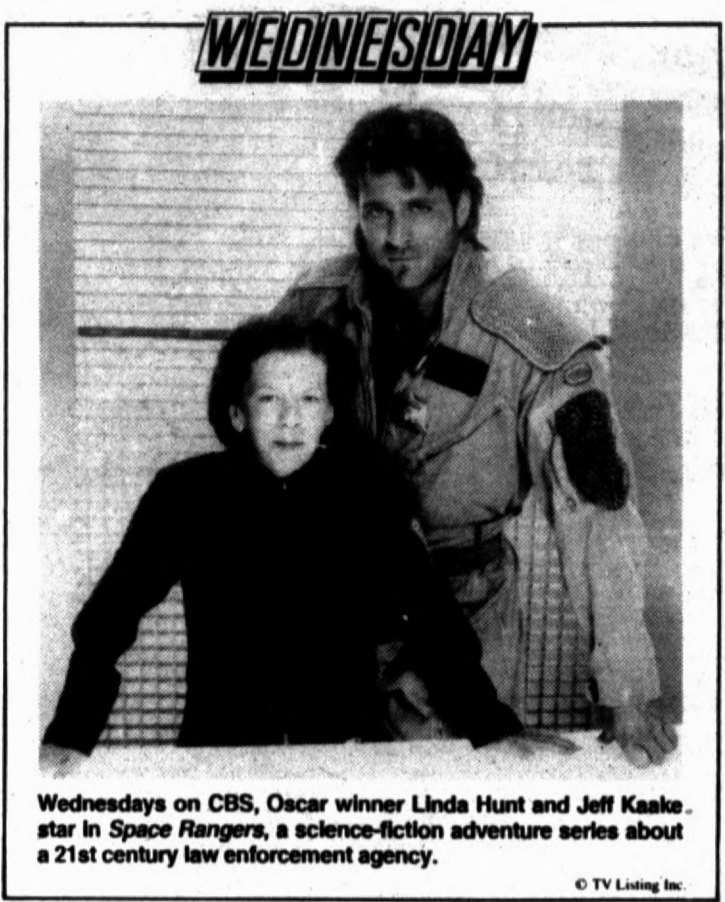

# What's cooking in CNN's 'Wolf' pot

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Burt Wolf was curious about the tea in China. Not the price, but the way they drink it.

So he traveled to Taiwan, where among other things he learned why the Chinese drink tea from a cup with no handle.

Wolf shares such findings in "Burt Wolf - Eating Well," a new PBS show that is more than just cooking and recipes. More than 250 stations televise the show on various days of the week.

"I'm a food reporter," Wolf explains, "and for the last 30 years my job has been to travel around the world and find out why people eat the way they do. In Taiwan I'm served tea in a cup with no handle and I want to know why. The rest of the world drinks tea in a cup with a handle."

"I find that the tongue is one of the most sensitive areas of the body to heat. If you put hot stuff in your mouth you burn your tongue. If you pick up a cup with no handle your fingers instantly tell you if it's too hot. But if you're a sophisticated Westerner you pick up a cup with a handle, sip the too-hot tea and burn your tongue."

While in Taiwan, Wolf also finds out about the history of tea, how to make the perfect cup of tea and what is the relationship between tea and health. From Washington he talks about the bean soup served in the U.S. Senate. He talks about cooking halibut in Norway, lingonberry pancakes from Stockholm and Idaho potatoes from Boise.

Wolf is telling about his show, appropriately enough, over a late breakfast. He occasionally pops into the kitchen to see what the chef is preparing. He picks up a tin of tea and notes it's called Stash.

"The old sea captains who carried the tea kept samples to show the tea merchants," he says. "The best tea was called the captain's stash."

Wolf spends 264 days a year investigating food around the world. He calls his New York apartment the world's most expensive storage container.

He's contributed a daily report to CNN for the past 10 years. His series "What's Cooking" has been syndicated for 12 years. The half-hour PBS

show was first seen last summer on some stations before it began reaching the full PBS lineup.

Each show covers four areas: the history and anthropology of a food, its nutritional and health value, how to prepare the food properly and why a society eats the way it does.

Wolf already has filmed 52 shows in such places as Taiwan, Canada, Paris, Greece, New York, Hawaii, San Francisco, Sweden and Denmark.

In collecting recipes, he says he looks for good food that can be easily prepared and have no more than eight ingredients.

Wolf, who brought his high blood pressure down by diet and exercise, stresses healthful eating.

"Good food is essential to good health," he says, "but I don't think you have to give up any foods. I think there are only wrong amounts. We know what we eat affects our health, so it's foolish not to eat accordingly."

Although Wolf, with his white hair and beard, looks like he was born to wear a chef's uniform, he began his career as a lawyer. He went to work for an investment banking firm in Switzerland.

"The banking group was interested in investing in food companies and asked me to investigate it for them," he says. "I did a lot of research on companies that make cooking utensils. Out of that came a book called 'The Cook's Catalogue.' I edited it and did some of the writing."

"The book (published in 1973) also looked into the history of food. For instance, why some countries serve single-crust pies and why the English serve double-crust pies. In England during the Tudor period they developed a 'surprise' pie in which the surprise was hidden by a top crust."

Wolf came to Los Angeles to promote the book on "The Tonight Show" and it was suggested he had the makings of a television show. Out of that came the syndicated program.

"Later, Ted Turner said he wanted to carry the show on cable," Wolf says. "I talked to some of the station people and they laughed and said, 'CNN? You better get your money first.' Little did

**HBO delivers 'Hamlet' trippingly on the tube**

That schoolchildren will run headlong into William Shakespeare is inevitable. But to be or not to be comfortable with his legacy is a question most often ineptly answered in English class.

*Shakespeare: The Animated Tales*, HBO's version of *Classic Comics*, has ably condensed several of Shakespeare's great works to an entertaining half-hour and is a perfect introduction to his writings. Each of the shows is introduced by actor Robin Williams.

Airing Wednesday, Jan. 13, and throughout the month, the *Tales'* dark *Hamlet* conveys the play's powerful themes through visually arresting animation and fiery vocal readings.

Despite its brevity, *Hamlet* loses none of the unsettling moodiness of the original. The sketchy, dreamlike animation (produced by Moscow's Soyuzmultfilm Studios) illustrates with chilling effectiveness the characters' brushes with madness and the supernatural. Shakespeare's poetic prose has never been easier for children to understand than when Ophelia, insane with grief, sings a haunting tribute to her slain father in the echoing palace halls. It's one of many scenes impressionable minds won't soon forget.

Making short work of Shakespeare is an invitation to disaster, but HBO's vivid, authentic *Hamlet* neatly sidesteps the pitfalls. It works, of course, because the play's still the thing.

**Benchley takes the plunge for ESPN**

Peter Benchley's best-selling novel *Jaws* frightened many out of the water 17 years ago. Now, Benchley goes in search of one of the sea's most mysterious creatures, the giant squid, on the latest installment of ESPN's nature-adventure series, *Expedition Earth*, on Saturday, Jan. 16.

While the giant squid may conjure up images of hapless seamen being snatched from the decks of their boats by long, powerful tentacles able to crush entire ships, the squid actually attempts to avoid light and air, preferring to lurk at depths somewhere between 2,000 and 5,000 feet.

To track the elusive squid, Benchley sets out in the waters of Bermuda with guide Teddy Tucker. Benchley and Tucker put out bait and lower an innovative underwater camera and lighting system 2,500 feet into the Atlantic Ocean by cable, monitoring the action from the boat through an elaborate video system. Back on land, giant-squid expert Dr. Clyde Roper examines a specimen Tucker recently found off the coast of Bermuda.

Later in the show, Benchley joins a team of marine biologists documenting the behavior of the giant octopus off the Pacific coast of British Columbia.

Benchley ends his quest near the Caribbean island of Dominica, studying the bulbous-headed sperm whale, one of the few species large enough to feed on -- of all things -- the giant squid.

## Actor Brand a war hero; Lawrence began as class clown

**Q: Neville Brand died this past year. Could you please run a story and print a picture of him for us? We were great fans.—Betty Johnson, Crown City, Ohio.**

A: Probably best known for his roles in Hollywood crime films, Brand accomplished success in show business that matched his bravery on the battlefields of World War II—heroics which made him the fourth-most-decorated soldier of that conflict. Rather than returning to his hometown of Kewanee, Ill., after his discharge in 1946, Brand chose to study acting in New York and soon landed his first movie role, in 1949's mystery thriller *D.O.A.* His most memorable character was that of Al Capone, whom he played twice: in 1961's *The George Raft Story* and the next year in *The Scarface Mob*. Other roles Brand played include the lead convict in the powerful *Riot in Cell Block 11*; Duke, the POW, in *Stalag 17*; the sympathetic prison guard in *Birdman of Alcatraz*; and Pap, Huck's drunken father, in *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*. Brand also portrayed Reese Bennett, the battle-scarred ex-Union soldier who became a Texas Ranger, in the TV series *Laredo*, which aired from 1965-1967.

**Q: Actor Ronny Cox, of *Deliverance*, *Total Recall* and *Beverly Hills Cop* fame, starred in a '70s TV series about a family. What was the title of the show and the family's name in the series? What other series has he done?—R.A. Nelson, Portland, Ore.**

A: The name of the series, which aired from 1974 to 1975, was *Apple's Way*. In it, Cox played patriarch George Apple. George had moved his suburban Los Angeles family to his ancestral home in Iowa, and the show played off their amusing encounters with the conservative Midwestern townfolk. Vincent Van Patten and Kristy McNichol, who played two of George's children, were on the cover of every teen magazine at the time. Cox starred in a series a decade later titled *Spencer*, which also lasted only a year. This time, he played George Winger, father to Spencer Winger (Chad Lowe). Almost immediately, Lowe quit and was replaced by Ross Harris, and the show was retooled as *Under One Roof*. Not even summer reruns (with Lowe's Spencer thrown in here and there) could save it from being canceled. One might

also remember Cox as the coldhearted Dr. Gideon, whose appearance in the fall of 1987 on *St. Elsewhere* brought an end to everybody's irreverent fun in that program's final year. Finally, Cox starred in Steven Bochco's embarrassingly bad crime show/musical, *Cop Rock*.

**Q: I am a great fan of Martin Lawrence, of the television show *Martin*. My son and I would like some background information on him and an address where we can write to him.—Lisa Moore, Gary, Ind.**

A: A big hit for Fox, *Martin* is a sitcom tour de force for Lawrence, allowing him to play characters other than the title one, such as his imposing mother and his oversexed neighbor, Sheneneh. Lawrence's teachers in Queens, N.Y., and Landover, Md., even went so far as to let the budding comedian entertain the entire class with his routines during free time, and they were the first to suggest comedy as a profession for him. He must have agreed with them; he soon won a starring role in the series *What's Happening Now!!*, and has since had his own HBO *One-Night Stand*. Most recently, *Martin* was featured on HBO's *Russell Simmons' Def Comedy Jam*. His films include *House Party*, *House Party 2* and *Boomerang*. 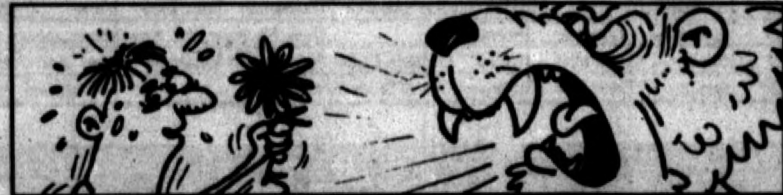

**SCENT OF A WOMAN:** Starring Al Pacino. Brilliant. A full-voitage performance by Al Pacino as Lt. Colonel Frank Slade. Slade, now blind, is a former aide to Lyndon Johnson. It's Thanksgiving weekend in New York, and Slade is in town for a slice of the good life: fine cuisine, beautiful women, chauffeured limousines and a suite at the Waldorf-Astoria. Charlie Simms (Chris O'Donnell) is an earnest young prep student reluctantly along for the ride - and getting the education of a lifetime.

Beyond the supreme technical difficulty of playing a blind man, Pacino's role requires him to command a torrent of emotional levels and nuances of personality. Within each scene, Slade is by turns terrifying, philosophical, even poignant, his passion for life undercut by a self-destructive streak. Frank Slade and Charlie Simms' raucous, reveling, and tragically funny adventure in New York will leave both of them changed forever.

Al Pacino's performance will not easily be erased from your memory. He has the role of his career. His performance is a joy to watch - and to hear. *Scent of a Woman* (we'll leave you the pleasure of discovering the meaning of the title) is one of this year's finest films.
