WHY FARM BUREAUS POINT TO BEEF STEERS: DUTY OF GOVERNMENT

When country people proceed to help themselves by means of a great farm bureau organization, they are forcibly calling government's attention to the things that government itself ought to

"God helps them that helps themselves," is all right, but the time has pretty nearly dawned for government also to help the people, and we will be very much mistaken if farm bureau federation progressiveness does not, before long, stir our Federal congress to more important action than has ever been dreamed of before.

Why should the people of a nation forever be doing things for their government, with little or no return of the compliment?

The Federal Farm loan bureau law was a good beginning, but it doesn't go a hundredth part of the way. Where it assists thousands to establish prosperous homesteads, Congress should enable it to assist millions to satisfy their homing instincts. And not only on the farms, but in our country towns. . .

The government has seen what good roads have done in scattered parts of the nation, bringing isolated farm people and their products close to the town and city for the benefit of the general population. Why should not Congress vastly extend good roads immediately giving work to hundreds of thousands, and paying the cost of it all twenty times over in the increased wealth of the people and of the nation as a whole?

These projects are only a few-a mere beginning of the enterprises government could easily handle. Of course, our ultra-conservative folks might regard them as dreams, as too much to hope for, but that's because they look at things from the viewpoint of the past, which did not expect much more from government than protection, the collection of taxes, politics and the making of laws. But those things are settled facts; progress calls for constantly greater accomplishments and a people's government is not true to democracy unless it progresses,

Cost too much money? Not at all. No man improves his property without increasing its value and without increasing his wealth. It would be so with Uncle Sam. Every dollar he spent on farm, homesteads, country towns, rural roads and country town paving, sewerage, etc., would bring forth another dollar-aye, many dollars-to extend the work elsewhere,

The people of America are the government. Let the people help themselves through their own self-the

thing called government. Anyway, folks, think it over!






