5,000 LBS, MAIZE A very interesting comparison of the orice of turkeys and malze heads was brought to light a few days ago, when turkeys were selling above 35c a pound and maize heads at \$7.50 a ton.


A woman from the country brought in two turkeys, which she sold for \$17.30 cash. That day maize heads were selling around \$7.50 a ton, hence she gat as much for the two turkeys as a farmer would twe gotten for nearly 5,000 pounds of maize heads.

The turekys were raised about the farm, and doubtless were not very much trouble, nor did the feed on which they were raised cost but a few cents. The farmer who raised the maize had to plow the land, plant the seed, cultivate the crop, cut the heads, and bring it to town-all of which is hard work. 
