## FIRE SIREN IS ORDERED FOR SAFETY

CITY COMMISSION HAS DECIDED TO TAKE NO CHANCES

### ABOUT KEY RATE

Lower Rates May be Obtained if Precaution Taken

A timely discussion at Monday's luncheon pertained to the present fire key rate for Hereford and the chances for lowering it. During Cleanup week fires of all business houses and residences are supposed to be examined and repaired where necessary.

Since the organization of Hereford's present efficient fire department, the adoption of a course in fire prevention as a part of the public school course, etc., it has been generally supposed that the key rate would be lowered at once. As a matter of fact all these things go toward a lower key rate eventually, states T. K. Wilson, insurance man, but key rates are based on an accumulated record of years, with a minimum of three years, and if this good work is continued, Hereford will soon enjoy the benefits of reduced rates. If they are neglected an irreparable injury will be done.

Mayor Knight announced Monday that the City Commission had decided to purchase a new electric siren with which to announce fires. This siren, said to be of extraordinary power and penetrating volume, will be located on top of the fire station. An electric switch connection is to be affixed to the telephone exchange board where the operator will merely have to throw the switch to wake up all living things within a radius of two or three miles. Arrangements have been made with the electric light company to supply the power to operate the small motor connected with the siren. The commission took this step after experience has demonstrated that the present fire bell is not effective and many times is not heard at all a few blocks away from the station, especially if the wind is in the wrong direction.

The installation of this siren will add another credit to the fire rate, if maintained. Mr. Wilson says that the official records show a fire loss of \$3,491.50 in 1919, \$14,180.00 in 1920, and \$7,296.00 in 1921. The high figures for 1920, before the organization of the fire department, is what has given the black eye to the prospects for lower key rates, and this must be lived down by steady maintenance of all things which go to the credit side of the ledger over a period of three or more years.

It is believed that a new key rate for Hereford is now in contemplation by the State authorities, and it is hoped to have a substantial reduction when it does come.

## CITY COMMISSION HOLDS CALL MEETING FOR ROUTINE

The City Commission held a called meeting Monday morning and discussed pressing routine matters. Some street grading was authorized, several culverts and crossings will be installed, and authorization for the purchase of an electric siren for the fire department given.

The sanitarium association was organized nearly a year ago with sixty-four charter members. The Carl property was purchased, a cash payment made, the building equipped and furnished, and a steam heating plant installed. The institution has served a splendid purpose since its establishment and the demand for the service it renders is constantly growing. The present board of directors consists of D. F. Ashbrook, Homer Wilkinson and F. H. Oberthier.

An accounting of the financial status of the institution will be made Friday night and policies for the future conduct of the work will be outlined. Every stockholder and all other interested citizens are urged to be present at this important meeting.

# Cleanup Week Begins Monday

### Mayor Knight Calls Upon Citizens to Observe Health, Cleanup, Tree Planting, Next Week

#### TO THE PEOPLE OF HEREFORD

The State Board of Health is making a strenuous effort this Spring to get all the cities and towns in Texas cleaned up and put in a safe and sanitary condition in order to avoid all preventable diseases and sickness. To this end the Governor by proclamation requested every city and town in Texas during a week named by him to conduct the most thorough and extensive clean-up campaign ever undertaken by Texas towns. The cleaning up season is upon us and we cannot afford to suffer by a comparison with any other town great or small.

I, therefore, suggest and request that the week beginning Monday, March 27, 1922, be designated as a general clean-up week in Hereford. A Committee for this purpose has been appointed by the Chamber of Commerce in deference to the request of the Governor, which will organize the town for the campaign.

I request all citizens of the city, men, women and children, to clean up their premises during the week mentioned and to work with the Committee to put the City in the most cleanly and attractive condition it has ever been in.

Our trees have brought us more compliments than any other thing. Visitors, and tourists have admired our trees more than is known to lots of our people. Our trees are a great asset. More trees would be a still larger asset. They would make our town still more attractive to others. I also suggest that more trees should be planted during the week mentioned where there are conveniences for watering them. It is a waste of time and money to set out trees unless they can be cared for. THEY MUST BE WATERED.

Next week, beginning with Monday morning, March 27, and ending Saturday night, April 1, is to be Health, Cleanup and Tree Planting week in Hereford. The dates have been officially set by the Mayor. The city wagons will carry off free, cans and other non-combustible matter, while residents are expected to burn their trash and other refuse and put their premises in presentable and sanitary condition.

This committee is expected to confer with the City Commission, outline a plan of systematic supervision, and then urge the people to observe the week and brighten up the face of Hereford as it has never been brightened up before.

These annual cleanup weeks can be made very effective and do a vast amount of real good, where cooperation is given by all the people. On the other hand it can be made a farce and nothing will be accomplished if the cooperation is lacking. It is up to the home lovers of Hereford to make the week worth while or ineffective.

As to tree planting, the Commission urges that every home owner plant such trees as can be systematically watered, and no more, as trees that are not cared for after planting are more of a liability than an asset.

Mrs. Dixon White Owen, Life President of the Clara Barton Memorial Association, arrived in Hereford on last Thursday and gave two excellent addresses—one at the High School and one to the children of the Central School. Mrs. Owen's talks were very entertaining, as well as instructive, as she has traveled extensively and been on the lecture platform for many years. Mrs. Owen has the distinction of having seen every President inaugurated, beginning with Lincoln up to the present time. Mrs. Owen also sings well, and entertained with her music at the Central School.

Prof. Weeks in his book, The People's School, gives us some facts that are worth thinking about. He says that only about ten percent of the pupils that enter the primary grades graduate from the High School. He says, "We must fight ignorance with the weapons of education. We live in an age of industry, and into this industrial age we must put those factors of education that will best fit our people to meet its demands."

These complicated machines which are extended hands developed to give intellect greater freedom, sometimes kill the intellect. The man is dominated by the machine. Extreme specialization in industry has turned man into a human tool. Specialized labor tends to narrowness. The age of apprenticeship is past. "Few learn the trade" anymore. One-third of one percent of men between fifteen and twenty-four receive instruction bearing upon their occupations.

The man who deals in little scraps of life can never produce anything artistic. By all this process, we are losing humanity, while we are gaining mechanically. Society has created a mighty tool whose use we have not yet mastered and, therefore, bids fair to master us.

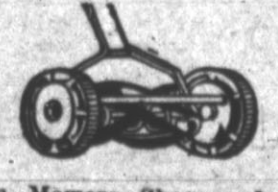
