Mir docking mission delayed by bad weather in Spain, Morocco

Emergency landing strips blocked by rain, clouds, wind

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - Bad weather more than 4,000 miles away forced NASA to call off today's launch of space shuttle Atlantis on a mission to dock with the Russian space station Mir.

The weather at Kennedy Space Center was perfect. But rain, low clouds or high wind at all three shuttle emergency landing strips in Spain and Morocco posed too much of a risk - a rare occurrence.

Launch managers said they would try again Sunday. Slightly better weather was expected overseas, although conditions were expected to worsen in Florida.

NASA has just seven minutes on any given day to send the shuttle on the most fuel-efficient route to Mir. Sunday's liftoff time is 7:30 a.m.

"We're a little disappointed, but we understand how the rules work," commander Kenneth Cameron said before crawling out of the shuttle.

Atlantis contains a Russian-built docking port that the five astronauts will attach to the Mir station to facilitate future shuttle dockings.

This will be the first time a shuttle is used in station construction. It's also the first time a shuttle has been filled with Russian equipment.

"You're going to see a lot of the things that we're going to do to build space station," said Wilbur Trafton, director of NASA's international space station program.

The shuttle-Mir hookups - this is the second of seven planned - also will allow the two space programs to iron out docking and communication problems before they start hauling up pieces of the international space station.

"It's going to pay huge dividends when we start launching space station flights in November of 1997," Trafton said.

A lift-off Sunday would have Atlantis arriving at Mir on Wednesday. The two spacecraft will be linked

in orbit for three days, two days less than the first docking in late June and early July.

Cameron and his crew will spend those three docked days transferring water and other supplies to Mir, including science experiments for a U.S. astronaut who will fly up in March for a five-month stay.

The four U.S. astronauts and one Canadian also have some surprises for Mir's three residents: flowers, candy, mail from home and a collapsible classical guitar.

"There's not much to do" on evenings and weekends aboard Mir, said Atlantis' Canadian crew member, Chris Hadfield. "I know if I was spending six months in space, I would want to have a guitar because I play almost every day just to relax."

The two Russians and one German have been on Mir for two months and have four more months to go. German cosmonaut Thomas Reiter said Friday he was looking forward to Atlantis' arrival.

Texans were reminded Saturday that there is nothing subtle about the state's weather.

A "blue norther" - a powerful blast of gusty, cold wind from Canada and the Plains states - blew through the state Friday night, sending temperatures into a free fall statewide.

In Wichita Falls, temperatures fell 29 degrees in one hour as winds gusted to 59 mph. There, temperatures fell from a Friday afternoon high of 85 to a 4 a.m. Saturday reading of 32, not counting a wind chill just above zero.

Sustained gusty winds of 30 to 40 mph downed trees and power lines in several areas of North Texas on Friday night.

By daybreak, skies had cleared and winds diminished to less than 30 mph, but temperatures had fallen into the 30s with wind chills as low as 6 in Paris.

Elsewhere across the state, overnight temperatures fell into the upper teens in the Panhandle to the mid-70s ahead of the front in South Texas.

Thunderstorms associated with the fast moving cold front erupted in southeast Texas, but skies were clear and winds were gusty elsewhere.

The North Texas outlook calls for clear and cold weather Saturday night with lows from the upper 20s around Tyler to near 40 around Abilene.

Continued clear skies and warmer temperatures are expected Sunday, becoming windy from North-Central Texas eastward. Highs from near 60 around Tyler to the mid-70s around Abilene and Wichita Falls.

West Texas and the Panhandle expect fair skies through the rest of the weekend, with warmer temperatures Sunday. Lows in the 30s. Highs

from the low 70s, except near 80 in the Presidio Valley.

A freeze warning was in effect for the Hill Country Saturday night. Otherwise, clear skies were on tap for South Texas this weekend, with warming temperatures Sunday. Lows upper 20s in the Hill Country and low to mid 30s elsewhere. Highs in the 60s and 70s.

Twin loses fight to keep brother buried in cemetery for veterans

LIBERTY, N.Y. (AP) - Norman Goldberg bent over and brushed fresh snow off a metal marker on his twin brother's grave, then anchored a small American flag in wet sod.

At 61 and razor thin with long legs resembling stilts, he struggled with his cane to stand upright. He looked down for a moment before a chill breeze sent him back to a warm car.

"Bye, Joel," he said as he was driven away.

Joel Goldberg died in October 1993. But his first grave - a flagless, markerless plot in a veterans' cemetery - was not his final resting place.

Veterans wanted his body moved from Sullivan County Veterans Cemetery when they learned he had been dishonorably discharged from

the Army in 1955 after the Korean War.

Norman fought them, saying his brother had successfully appealed, gotten the discharge reversed and should stay buried with other veterans. But the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs had no record of the appeal.

So the body was exhumed and, on May 24, nearly a year and a half after his death, Joel was laid to rest in Liberty Cemetery, about 85 miles north of New York City in the foothills of the Catskill Mountains.

His plot is marked by a small metal plaque engraved with his name and years of birth and death. Norman added the flag this week in honor of Veterans Day.

Swimming party on the Tierra Blanca

This is the photo on a picture postcard printed in the 1930s in Hereford. The popular swimming hole was located in what is now Veterans Park, just west of a concrete bridge entry on the north end of the park. The Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) came to Hereford in the early '30s to work on a state park. The CCC's park work extended from Progressive Road back past the Main Street bridge, and it included the original VFW rock building, as well as the building now serving as the golf pro's shop. The state park land was later deeded back to the city. Mutt Wheeler provided the picture post card. He reported there was lots of camping and fishing along Tierra Blanca in the '30s.

FBI seizes Waco pictures from Nichols' farmhouse

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - Three photos Timothy McVeigh took on a visit to the burned-out Branch Davidian complex near Waco, Texas, have been seized by the FBI, according to a published report.

The Daily Oklahoman, an Oklahoma City newspaper, reported in Saturday's editions that FBI agents recorded seizing three "photographs of Waco" and "David Koresh pamphlets" in a search of the Decker, Mich., farmhouse of McVeigh's friend, James Nichols, on April 22.

The 32-page recorded inventory of the FBI search was among hundreds of pages of records concerning the Oklahoma City federal building bombing unsealed last week in Michigan.

The photos, the newspaper reported, were found in the den in a cardboard envelope addressed to James Nichols from "T. Tuttle, Kingman, AZ." The pamphlets were

nearby.

Tuttle was an alias used by McVeigh, a drifter who frequently stayed in Kingman, Ariz.

Nichols' brother, Terry Nichols, 40, and McVeigh, 27, have been indicted on federal murder and conspiracy charges in the April 19 bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building that killed 169 people.

The indictment alleges that both men plotted the attack, but accuses only McVeigh of driving the truck bomb from Kansas to Oklahoma City and setting off the explosion.

James Nichols was held first as a material witness in the bombing and then charged with having explosives at his farm. Prosecutors later dropped the charges against him.

In a telephone interview with the Oklahoman, James Nichols confirmed the photos were taken by McVeigh.

"He was there visiting, looking

the situation over," James Nichols said. "Like a lot of people, gawking around. He said the FBI scrutinized him so severely. They videotaped him and his car and his license plate."

James Nichols said the FBI also kept a bumper sticker McVeigh sent him that showed Hitler saluting and read: "All those in favor of gun control raise your right hand." McVeigh is known to oppose gun control laws.

Witnesses have told FBI agents McVeigh was extremely angry over the government's handling of the conflict with the religious cult led by David Koresh near Waco.

Northwest School gets grant for playground

Northwest Primary School, trying to earn money for a new playground through recycling, has received a grant toward 10 percent of the price of the equipment.

Farrell M. Smith, president of ExerPlay Inc. of Albuquerque, N.M., which sells equipment for the PlayVenture branch of Landscape Structures, announced Friday that the school has been awarded a \$4,500 grant by Landscape Structures.

Smith made the announcement at a luncheon held by the school for fathers of Northwest students.

The dads -- and their children -- were treated to K-Bob's brisket and sausage before they were shown slides about the school's recycling project and playground dreams.

The overall project is called "Building Sparkler Dreams."

The school plans to build the new playground in four phases, with funds raised through recycling paper, glass, plastic aluminum and other metals.

Last week, a 7-1/2-ton paper recycling bin was placed on a concrete pad in front of the school.

Residents may deposit any type of paper product in that bin.

Other recyclables will be collected in the foyer of the school during school hours, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The public is encouraged to give toward the recycling effort.

As of the end of October, the school had collected 13,948 aluminum cans, 1,814 food cans, 2,598 plastic bottles, 1,151 glass bottles and 3,553 pounds of newspaper.

\$17,000 had been raised toward operation of the center and its various programs.

The next year, the number of trees increased and they were moved out of the middle of the room to a location at one end.

The vendors were dropped in favor of a bazaar featuring goods made by seniors at the center.

For the second and third years, profits held at \$25,000 a year.

"We had a bad snow the third year and still made \$25,000," Mrs. Daniels said.

"Our bazaar, we have it categorized as bake sale, ceramics, dolls."

The dolls were added two years ago.

"We bought the supplies and things from someone who was closing out a business," Mrs. Daniels said. Jolene Bledsoe and Rosalee McGowen took over the porcelain doll operation, teaching classes for members throughout the year.

Also two years ago, the festival added gift baskets to the bazaar.

The brainchild of Virginia Gaines, the baskets -- there are more than 100 available this year -- are filled with a variety of items such as stuffed toys, candy, antiques, collectibles and other things, then sealed in plastic and topped with a bow.

Loretta Kindsfather helped with the baskets at first and now they are done by Clara Reinart, Mrs. Gaines and Mrs. Daniels. The bows were made by Glenda Marcum.

Mrs. Daniels said holding the Festival of Trees at the center is a special challenge, since regular programs there must continue at the same time.

The center has offered a meal program to seniors since 1979, and those meals -- as well as the Meals on Wheels lunches -- continue despite the Festival.

The seniors who enjoy sitting around and playing dominoes or cards in the afternoon are forced to move to a different room while their space is filled with the bazaar, but Mrs. Daniels said they understand the inconvenience, since the Festival goes a long way toward funding center operations.

In addition, the pool is shut down for the four days of the Festival's run.

Through the first five years of its existence, the Festival has boosted center coffers to the tune of about \$153,000.

"I don't know how we would operate without it," Mrs. Daniels said. "We need the funding."

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SPS, Colorado utility begin paperwork on merger

Public Service Co. of Colorado would freeze electric rates for five years and receive bonuses or penalties based on service quality under its merger plan with Southwestern Public Service Co., PSC said Thursday.

The plan was filed with the Colorado Public Utilities Commission, one of the regulatory agencies that must approve Denver-based PSC's merger with the Amarillo-based SPS.

The freeze on electric rates would take effect next fall under the plan. PSC spokesman Mark Stutz said that since PSC is merging with a utility whose primary business is electricity, it expects to be able to deliver electricity more cheaply. And if fuel costs drop, electric rates could fall below the freeze level, he said.

Natural gas rates would not be frozen under the merger plan, but if rates drop, PSC would pass along the savings to customers on a "dollar-for-dollar" basis, PSC said.

Austin a hot place to be for film, TV productions

AUSTIN (AP) - Lights, camera, Austin.

The Texas capital is a hot location for film and television production in a state that is having its biggest year ever as the setting for big-budget Hollywood pictures.

Currently, there are 11 feature films and television projects being made or in pre-production around the state, including two in Austin.

Star sightings encouraged by radio stations are becoming a sport in the capital, and there are a lot to choose from.

Denzel Washington and Meg Ryan are filming "Courage Under Fire," about an investigation into the death of a Persian Gulf War soldier.

Emilio Estevez, Martin Sheen and Kathy Bates also are in Austin making "The War at Home," a film set in 1973 about a Vietnam veteran having trouble adjusting to life after the war.

Beginning in February, John Travolta, William Hurt and Andie MacDowell will be in Austin making "Michael," a romantic comedy directed by Nora Ephron about three tabloid reporters sent to Iowa to investigate claims of an angel descending to earth.

"Texas has a very powerful reputation in the film industry already," said Carol Pirie, assistant director of the Texas Film Commission. "When you look at the film starts in the 50 states, Texas is consistently No. 3. We are right behind California and New York."

"The phone is ringing off the wall with people saying, 'I've got this new project, do you think it would work in Texas?'"

With several productions slated to begin later this month, 1995 already has become the biggest year for film production in Texas.

Last year was the state's previous best, with 42 TV and movie projects being made on budgets totaling \$153.3 million. Counting production for commercials, the total was \$193.3 million.

This year, 46 projects have chosen Texas for filming, with production budgets totaling \$190.8 million.

"Customers of both companies, as well as the companies themselves, will benefit from the combination of Public Service Co. of Colorado and SPS, which are two low-cost utilities that have complementary services areas," said Bill D. Helton, chairman and CEO of SPS. "The combination will result in one of the premier low-cost energy providers of the future."

Helton is the designated chairman and CEO of the new holding company.

SPS and SPS also are proposing a "quality of service plan" that would start next fall. The company would be graded in four areas of customer service: electric system availability, response to odor calls, number of sustained PUC customer complaints, and response time to customer telephone inquiries.

Each year, the company could receive up to \$1 million in bonuses or be penalized for that amount in each of the four areas. The program would last five years, meaning PSC could earn or lose up to \$20 million

based on its customer service, said Stutz.

The utility would not pay itself bonuses for customer service unless its rate of return was 12.5 percent or more, Stutz said. Penalties would be paid customers no matter what the utility's rate of return. PSC is authorized to receive 11 percent, but has not reached that level since the company's last rate case was decided in October 1993.

The 12.5 percent rate of return also would be the threshold at which PSC proposes to share its earnings with customers on a 50-50 basis, Stutz said.

"We believe that this is an equitable plan for both our customers and our shareholders," said Wayne Brunetti, PSC president and chief operating officer.

"Public Service Co. is committed to look for ways to maintain stability in its electric rates, and the plan

submitted provides a means to meet that pledge," Brunetti said.

The Colorado filing proposes regulatory plans that are distinct for each of the proposed operating companies.

SPS proposes that its shareholders and customers would share the non-fuel operation and maintenance expense savings realized during the first five years of the merger. SPS customers also would realize all resulting fuel-cost savings.

This, Helton said, would be because the merged utilities would be able to avoid or defer new capital investments that otherwise would increase future rates.

Besides filing its merger plan with the Colorado PUC, PSC also is filing it in Wyoming. SPS is seeking merger approval from utility commissions in Texas, New Mexico and Kansas.

The two companies are jointly filing a plan with the Federal Energy

Regulatory Commission.

Other federal agencies that will be required to approve the merger include the Federal Trade Commission, the Department of Justice and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, which is overseeing PSC's dismantling of a Colorado nuclear plant that is being converted to a natural gas-fired plant.

Also, the shareholders of both utilities also must approve it. Approval is expected to be completed in the fall of 1996.

PSC provides electric, natural gas and thermal energy to more than 2.8 million residents in Colorado and Wyoming. SPS provides electricity to about 365,000 customers in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas.

"That's the most useless piece of information I've ever heard," said one of the oldtimers.

We've seen presidential elections come and go over the years, with promises of fixing the mess and neither political party living up to their words to return us to fiscal responsibility. The battle of the budget is now ongoing.

Just think how great it would be if the promises to reach a balanced budget in seven years became a reality. Here are some examples offered by U.S. Rep. Larry Combest:

"With the government not borrowing money to meet the federal budget, more funds become available for families. Economists predict that with less demand for cash, banks will lower their interest rates.

A study for the National Association of Realtors found that balancing the federal budget would reduce the average 30-year home mortgage 2.7 percent. For instance, financing a \$77,000 home, a two-percent interest drop from 8 to 6 percent means a \$3,430 savings for families.

"With government on a spending diet, we curb its craving to overspend by cutting the amount of taxes you pay to Washington. Congress' own Joint Economic Committee reports that each time taxes go up a dollar, the government spends \$1.59 more than what it has."

Since motion pictures were invented, there have been scary movies designed to scare the wits out of viewers.

Monster movies, from Frankenstein to Godzilla, make people lay down their money so they can scream.

My parents took very seriously their duties, bringing up their daughters without benefit of such movies. We were not permitted to attend the scary shows.

Somehow, that never bothered me. I got scared while watching "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" on its first sashay in public. I dived under the seat when the wicked stepmother appeared.

My grandmother always said that she worried about having taken me to the show after she saw my reaction to it. I don't think it altered my life, or even gave me nightmares. But, it did convince me that my personality did not react favorably to the scary picture show.

Even some Bible stories, such as Jonah being swallowed by the whale or the three guys thrown into a fiery furnace, were too much for me.

Never did I see Bela Lugosi in a movie. Nor did I attend a showing of a classic, "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde." When the movie-makers began bringing out this kind of picture in living color, I was even more certain that I was not interested.

Call me a coward.

My own bias toward this genre of motion picture certainly affected me with my own children. They weren't allowed to attend the horror shows that were put out during the years they were growing up.

Then, along came a movie that attracted more than average attention. "The Exorcist" was controversial, if nothing else. Some ministers raised against it. Others praised it. There didn't seem to be any middle ground.

But, just to be sure that we didn't have a first-hand review in our home, my daughters were absolutely forbidden to attend the movie. Not

just forbidden, but threatened, on pain of grounding for life, if they even went near the theatre when it was showing.

Being a trusting mother, it never occurred to me that either would deliberately disobey. Everyone gets fooled sometime, huh?

Some months after "The Exorcist" was released, daughter No. 1 left with a carload of friends to attend a movie. The obvious question, "What movie?" apparently didn't get asked.

She came home after the rest of the household was in bed, although I wasn't asleep. Since she often read or studied for a while before turning off her light, I assumed that was the case, when I woke up and realized there was light sleeping under her door.

At some point, I got up and padded into her room, turned off the light (she appeared to be sleeping) and returned to my own bed. As the hours wore on, I awoke again and realized her light was on. Same drill.

The next morning, I casually asked what movie she saw the night before. The answer I got was a grunt and a mumble. Then, I was distracted and never returned to the subject.

During the next few weeks, I noticed that she often went to sleep with her light on, a habit that was new for her.

Only years later would I learn that she had the bejabbers scared out of her at "The Exorcist."

Her excuse was the old peer-pressure routine. "That's what everyone else wanted to see." And, she admitted to some curiosity about a movie that drew so much talk. There was the taste of "forbidden fruit," too. She admitted there were some regrets about her action.

"I'd leave the light on because I'd get scared, and then you'd turn it off," she told me once. "When I thought you were asleep, I'd turn it back on, but you'd come turn it off again."

"I really wished I'd never gone to see that show."



GOP confident despite election split

WASHINGTON (AP) - Next up among the prelude elections: Louisiana, with national Republican leaders so confident of electing a governor there that they've pronounced the state the one people really should watch for signs of next time.

They'd expected to have more to crow about now, but the divided verdicts of the odd-year elections left signs that have to be worrisome as the GOP looks toward the congressional elections next year.

Democrats played a card the Republicans used to advantage in winning congressional control a year ago, trying to make national issues compelling ones in campaigns all the way down to state legislative districts.

In the midterm congressional elections, Republicans had made President Clinton an issue, and they tried again. But this time, Democrats countered with national theme of their own - that the GOP Congress is going too far, that the Republican lawmakers' programs are extreme and so are they.

"We made that a critical part of our debate this fall in states where, frankly, we've been told that we need not bother any longer even bothering to campaign because we didn't have any chance," said Connecticut Sen. Christopher Dodd, the Democratic chairman.

Those states are in the South, all but ceded to the Republicans in the coming presidential campaign, and the arena for the featured tests in the odd-year elections last Tuesday.

The Democrats were in a defensive mode - and they claimed victory in

what was really a divided verdict. Democrat Paul Patton was elected governor of Kentucky, and while it was a narrow win, it came in a state Republicans had thought they might well capture, after 24 years out of power.

Democratic advertising had raised issues far beyond Statehouse powers, and Patton, the lieutenant governor, said the voters who chose him rejected national Republican plans. Kentucky has said no to cuts in Medicare ... no to the "Contract with America" ... no to Newt Gingrich and Bob Dole.

Overslated, it seemed, given his narrow edge, his relatively conservative views, and his threat to break with Clinton next year over tobacco issues. But winners do talk.

Gingrich, a target for Democratic campaigners elsewhere, too, conceded that Kentucky was a disappointment, but called it part of a split decision, with a Republican governor re-elected in Mississippi. But the Republicans also fell short in an intense, expensive effort to win the Virginia Legislature and make it their first in the South. Democrats edged back to control of the Maine House in two special elections. Republicans easily recaptured the New Jersey Legislature.

So the case could be argued either way, and it was.

"Things have gone so bad for the Democrats that they're crowing they're only going to lose half the Democrat governorships up for re-election," said Republican National Chairman Haley Barbour, counting on Louisiana, where the election is Nov. 18.

Gingrich called it the playoff.

It matches Republican Mike Foster, a state senator and a Democrat until he ran for governor, against Rep. Cleo Fields, 32, a black Democratic congressman.

There are two special House elections coming up, in Illinois and California, for seats that were held by Democrats, and a Senate election on Jan. 30 for the seat resigned by Oregon Republican Bob Packwood.

The Democratic theme will be replayed there, and next year - that the GOP program is too extreme and that voters will, or should, want the Republican revolution slowed down.

But the Republicans argue that they will come away from 1996 with more congressional muscle, not less. In that, they are challenging history as well.

Shutdown would hit 800,000 employees

WASHINGTON (AP) - No checks for vets. No parks for larks. No business for bureaucrats. No kidding, things could get dim if President Clinton and Congress don't act soon to avoid a government shutdown.

Hoping to squeeze concessions from Congress, the White House previewed plans Thursday to close many government operations and lay off 800,000 federal employees starting at midnight Monday.

That is when the government would run out of money if the White House and lawmakers don't agree on a stopgap spending bill to cover expenses during their budget wrangling.

Clinton promises to veto a bill working its way through Congress, arguing that it imposes harsh GOP spending priorities. Republicans say voters would blame the president for a shutdown.

What voters would be affected? Start with the 2.1 million government employees scattered around the country.

More than half are considered essential - from air traffic controllers who guide trans-Atlantic flights to NASA technicians who'll guide the shuttle Atlantis. These workers would stay at work but wouldn't get paid until after a spending bill is approved. Veterans would not get paid either, at least not by the Veteran's Administration. Their benefit checks would be held up.

Tourists spending precious money and time in Washington would be barred from monuments and Smithsonian museums. The National Zoo, too, would be closed.

Yellowstone would be blue; the national parks would shut down.

And economists beware. Wall Street, watch out. Americans could temporarily lose track of the state of the nation's economy.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics would have to compute the Consumer Price Index, due out Wednesday, by the end of the day Monday. Other indicators, such as the monthly employment report, would be postponed.

None of the department's 1,500 employees, it seems, is essential.

Anybody who drinks water or breathes air might not want the Environmental Protection Agency to stop enforcing its rules.

"When you shut down government services to the people of this country, it is going to have an impact on those who, frankly, are innocent victims of this political debate," said White House Chief of Staff Leon Panetta.

Though blustery White House aides predicted a shutdown, history indicates that a closure would not be long-term.

The government's last shutdown was over Columbus Day weekend in 1990, affecting mostly tourists shut out of museums and monuments. Other shutdowns have been brief, including a one-day closing Nov. 23, 1981.

And not all services would be affected this time.

Post offices, criminal investigations, border control and inspections, federal prisons, medical care at veterans hospitals and Medicare, among others, would be immune.

Only two of the 13 appropriations bills for fiscal 1996 have been signed into law. Programs covered by those two measures, funding agriculture and military construction, would not be affected.

Social Security recipients would receive their checks, but new claims probably wouldn't be accepted.

A government shutdown would not hinder the mission of space shuttle Atlantis, which is scheduled to be launched Saturday, NASA said. But agency workers not assigned to the mission would be furloughed.

In the end, no taxpayer would be left untouched. Shutting down the government costs money.



Etiquette tips offered to 'newbies' interested in taking to cyberspace

HOUSTON - In cyberspace, just as in the 3-D world, some people think they are better than others. But rather than money, looks or breeding, judgments are often based on more trivial things.

For example, do you "jack-in" via an on-line service or an Internet service provider? There's a wave of snobbery sweeping the Net as more and more computer novices get their first machines with a fast modem that's built in and gleefully get connected. Those who've been on the Internet for a long time - and "long time" is a relative thing as com-

mercial access has only been available for about five years - increasingly resent this flood of "newbies," as they are called.

And heaven help you if you're coming in via America Online or Prodigy, the two major services that cater most to novices. (There's not much animosity toward users of CompuServe, which is considered a much more "techie" operation, and the verdict is still out on Microsoft Network subscribers.)

The general thinking among Internet "old-timers" is that those who rely on Prodigy and particularly America Online are clueless idiots who have not paid their dues - as

though suffering through arcane Unix shells or the agony of setting up direct SLIP or PPP connections is some kind of badge of honor. The veterans complain these newcomers don't honor the unwritten rules known as "netiquette" and thus make life tedious for those in the know.

There are even whole newsgroups on Usenet devoted to bashing on-line service users, such as alt.aol.rejects. Actually, waves of unenlightened newbies are nothing new to the Internet. Back when it was populated primarily by computers at educational, government and research institutions, experienced Internet users dreaded each September, when university freshmen got their first Internet accounts. After a year, of course, those same newbies had earned the right to whine about the freshmen coming in behind them.

There are obvious reasons why some people would choose an on-line service over a direct Internet connection. On-line services go out of their way to make the Internet's various features easy to navigate, some with more success than others. Their software, itself, is easy to set up and get running. And, of course, they offer more than just the Internet, with areas that are unique to each service.

"I bet you're popular this morning," says an oil field roughneck, taking a fresh dozen from the drive-through window, before one more vehicle takes his place.

Outside, customers scurry off with their doughnuts like dogs slinking off with fresh bones - despite the fact the store doesn't offer coffee for dunking.

"No room," Gonzalez explained. "Southern Maid is the standard to judge by," says Eddie Bedrick, 43, a doughnut eater all his life, as he hurries a dozen to his colleagues at work.

And so, apparently, is Hanes' hospitality. "My kids think that lady in there is the best granny in Odessa," said Janeen O'Connell, 41. "They call her Granny."

As a youngster, O'Connell also bought from "Granny, the doughnut woman."

"It's one of those second-generation shops," she said. And after 40 years of making doughnuts, Gonzalez, quite possibly "the doughnut man," concedes he just might know the magic of his trade.

"I think I know how to make doughnuts now, I really do," he says.

However, Hanes admits she's never tried the cherry, banana nut or lemon. "I think they're real pretty, but I've never had a taste for 'em."

Gonzalez first stepped into his shop as an 18-year-old immigrant from Monterrey, Mexico, in 1955, one year after it opened. Two years later, Hanes, from Comanche, joined him.

Year in and year out, thousands upon thousands of pass in front of the drive-up window to ask Hanes for one of 13 varieties of doughnuts in 12 candy colors.

Hanes believes the drive-up window was the first of its kind in Odessa. With its mint green and white motif, the building once housed a gasoline station.

With its vintage "Donut for Every Taste" sign glowing red along the street, the shop is a local landmark.

Twenty-eight years ago Gonzalez, seeing an opportunity, bought the business. He leases, but does not own, the building.

He knew doughnuts. But he also knew how to market them. His secret: a sidewalk sign saying "Hot Donuts Now." Now, the sign is neon and shines from the shop's window.

"I'm going to make some cinnamon rolls now," Gonzalez says. "I want you to close your eyes so you

Strong winds blow Harvesters past Herd

The football game between Hereford and the Harvesters Friday night in Pampa was won before it began.

"This game was decided in large part by the coin flip," Herd coach Danny Haney said. "Whoever had the ball in the first quarter had the advantage."

Pampa won the coin flip, took advantage and ran away with a 53-0 victory. What Pampa took advantage of was the strong wind blowing snow from the north. With the wind at their backs, the Harvesters kept the ball on Hereford's end of the field and outscored Hereford 17-0 in the first quarter.

"Their great defense put us in a bind," Haney said. "We went three-and-out three times. We could not move the ball. They scored 17 points before we could ever get turned around."

Hereford couldn't take advantage of the wind in the second quarter. Pampa even turned the ball over twice in the period, but both times Hereford turned the ball back over on the next play.

"They were able to move the football. We weren't," Haney said. "That's the main difference in the game."

Pampa went on to complete the shutout, staying off the Whitefaces three times inside Pampa's own 20-yard line.

The Harvesters held Hereford to 31 yards rushing and 121 yards passing. Pampa's offense rolled up 287 yards rushing - with four different runners getting more than 50 yards - and 133 yards passing.

"The problems we had were due in large part to the fact that Pampa is a very good football team," Haney said. "In fact, I think they're a total team at this point."

Pampa improved to 5-0 in District 1-4A and 8-1 overall. The Harvesters face Borger (also 5-0 and 8-1) Saturday in Borger for the outright district title.

Hereford fell to 1-3-1 in district and 2-6-1 overall. Friday's game was the most one-sided loss for the Herd since 1962, when Dumas also beat Hereford 53-0.

Hereford hosts Caprock Friday to close the season.

There wasn't much snow falling on the field at Pampa; the strong wind kept the snow going sideways. The wind affected the punters. Hereford's Brian Betzen had kicks of 15 and 17 yards against the wind, affecting field position in the first quarter.

Haney said he didn't think the cold and snow affected the Whitefaces any more than the Harvesters. Herd senior Ronald Torres wouldn't blame the weather.

"The weather shouldn't matter," Torres said. "Rain, snow, sleet,

whatever - it shouldn't matter. I don't think the weather played a factor at all."

Torres survived the cold well enough to catch five passes for 62 yards and intercept two Pampa passes. He even had a 45-yard kickoff return late in the game.

The weather did affect the crowd. One count had 28 fans in the stands on Hereford's side. The Mighty Maroon Band left before halftime. On Pampa's side, there were about 200 fans not with the band.

The Pampa fans that did show up got a treat.

With the wind at his back, Pampa kicker Todd Finney put the opening kickoff deep in the end zone with no return. Hereford went three-and-out. With the wind in his face, Betzen punts 15 yards.

Pampa took over at the Hereford 29-yard line and needed only three plays to score. Joel Ferland - one-half of Pampa's alternating quarterback rotation - hit fullback Ross Watkins for a 21-yard gain. One play later, Derahian Evans ran four yards for the score.

The pattern repeated itself: kickoff for a touchback; three-and-out; punt - although Betzen got off a great under-the circumstances 25-yarder. This time Pampa needed six plays to go 46 yards before Evans ran

for another four-yard TD.

Finney kicked the extra points - in fact he kicked all the extra points, going 6-for-6 regardless of wind direction. He kicked a 27-yard field goal with the wind late in the first quarter for a 17-0 lead.

The field goal was set up when Betzen couldn't get a punt off at all. Two Harvesters came through the line untouched, and Betzen pulled the ball down in what looked like a wise decision. He tried to kick the ball on the run but missed, and Pampa took over at the Hereford seven-yard line.

The Herd defense held, forcing the field goal.

Hereford had to punt again before



Pilot Point knocks off Celina

DALLAS (AP) - Fresh from a milestone victory, Celina had visions of joining other top-ranked teams in the state in holding onto the No. 1 spot from wire to wire.

Leave it to archrival Pilot Point to spoil all the fun.

Kris Sipe made two crucial catches to set up scores as Pilot Point, ranked No. 7 in 2A, knocked off No. 1 Celina 13-9 in a game that had been billed all season as a titanic clash.

It spoiled the jubilation surrounding Celina coach G.A. Moore's 300th victory last week against S&S Consolidated.

A loss earlier in the year had caused Pilot Point to drop in the Associated Press poll, but Friday's date with nearby rival Celina was circled in red ink all season.

More than 4,500 fans braved the gusty winds that punctuated play throughout North Texas. That's more than the combined population of both

towns.

Down 9-0, Sipe made a diving reception to set up a 5-yard touchdown run by David Jones. Later, he pulled in a 36-yard pass from Austin Wighaman at the Celina 1 before Wighaman dove in for the winning touchdown.

Tyler John Tyler, No. 1 in 5A, wasn't scheduled to play Tyler Lee until Saturday.

Three other top-ranked teams won easily Friday. La Marque slammed Columbia 44-0 in 4A, Sealy beat Bellville 28-12 in 3A and Thorndale stormed past Jarrell 51-6 in 1A.

Only three other teams lost. In 2A, Hale Center dropped No. 9 Springlake-Earth 8-7 and Italy downed No. 10 Kerens 27-10. Sterling City defeated 1A's 10th-ranked Robert Lee 24-7.

La Marque kicker Russell Bynum kicked field goals of 23, 19 and 31 yards to set a state record of 31, which ties him for eighth place on the national list.

The Cougars rolled up 487 yards

offense for their second straight shutout of Columbia. La Marque won the season finale between the two 50-0 last season.

Thordale coasted to victory without a huge performance from standout rusher Twone Simmons. He rushed for 93 yards and two touchdowns on 11 carries while teammate Joel Simank caught his 10th TD pass of the season.

Hale Center snapped a 21-game district winning streak by Springlake-Earth on a fourth-quarter two-point conversion. After a Derek McGill touchdown run of 10 yards, tailback Angel Aguirre ran in the game-clinching conversion.

Pitman noted as best 'public course'

John Pitman Municipal Golf Course is "the best public course in the Amarillo area," according to one comment in the southwest edition of "Places to Play" - a supplement of *Golf Digest* magazine.

The recently-published booklet was sent to subscribers of the national golf magazine. The southwest regional edition covered golf courses in Arkansas, Kansas, Louisiana, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas.

Hereford's municipal course drew a 3-star rating in the survey, which ranked the links from 1/2-star up to 5 stars. The magazine had 23,000 subscribers report on 4,000 public and resort courses across the U.S.

Participants were asked for their candid and unvarnished comments about course design and conditioning, golf shop and clubhouse service, pace of play, "and anything that comes to mind at a golf facility."

The comments on the Hereford course: "Good course for a small town...Small greens and hard par 3s...Best course in Amarillo area; distinct nines...Best kept secret in Texas Panhandle...Worth driving to, neat layout, well kept, nice people."

Mayor Bob Josserand was happy to hear about the rating. "The city commission has spent an inordinate amount of time, I think, on golf course discussions. It's great to hear some positive feedback."

Bill Brown, president of Hereford Men's Golf Association, said he was "pleased to see the Hereford course recognized, and I commend the golf pro, course superintendent and staff for their work."

The Pitman course and Hidden Hills Public Golf Course in Pampa were the only Panhandle public courses to get a 3-star rating. Palo

Duro Creek Club in Canyon; Comanche Trails Club in Amarillo, and Ross Rogers East Course received 2 1/2-stars.

Shadow Hills Golf Club in Lubbock drew a 1 1/2-star rating, and Meadowbrook in Lubbock had a 1-star ranking. Pheasant Trails Course in Dumas was not rated, having recently expanded to 18 holes.

The *Golf Digest*'s honor, a 5-Star rating, was awarded to just eight courses across the nation, none in Texas.

Baloting of *Golf Digest* subscribers, 23,000 of them, ended Feb. 1, 1995. Golfers were asked to evaluate only courses in their region, and courses they had played in the last year. The two main criteria were the golf experience and value for the money. Comments were also solicited.

Hereford hoops teams aim for new heights

Entering their third years in Hereford, the Herd basketball coaches have set standards for improvement which will be tough to match in the 1995-96 season.

The season starts Tuesday, when Palo Duro's boys and girls come to Whiteface Gym. The girls play at 6 p.m.; the boys play at 7:45.

Girls' coach Eddie Fortenberry has

taken the Lady Whitefaces from 3-22 the year before he arrived to 11-17 two seasons ago and 18-11 last season. The girls were just a few shots here and there from contending for a playoff spot.

Boys' coach Randy Dean's turnaround of the Herd was even more dramatic. The Whitefaces went from 7-21 before his first season to just 8-22 in his debut. Last season, though, the boys went 22-10 and 9-3

in District 1-4A.

The boys beat powerful Pampa for the first time in memory, then defeated Canyon in a district playoff for the program's first playoff berth since the 1970s. Hereford even won a playoff game over El Paso High before falling in the regional semifinals to Wichita Falls.

It was a run that captivated the City of Hereford. Herd fans hunger for more.

Dean has some rebuilding to do before the Whitefaces can return to the playoffs. The boys' team lost 10 players and 63 percent of its offense to graduation — including Benton Buckley, the HHS record-holder for points in a season.

The cupboard's not bare, though.

The Herd gets back first-team all-district selection Isaac Walker (13 points a game, 6.5 rebounds) and honorable mention recipient Michael High (8.1 ppg, 4.7 rpg).

"Isaac's strong suit is his consistency," Dean said. "This year, we'll look to him for a lot of leadership, because even though he's just a junior, he has two years of varsity experience."

High, at 6-foot-3, was the Herd's center last year.

"Michael came a long ways last year — he developed into one of the better inside players in the area," Dean said. "He's a real good defensive player, and this year we expect him to dominate the boards."

Also set to join the Herd after football season are Todd Dudley and Ronald Torres, both of whom played in all 32 games last season.

"Todd is a very intelligent player. He overcomes things because he understands the game and knows what each person is doing on the floor," Dean said.

"Ronald's biggest asset is his

quickness, and that makes him a very good defensive player. We'll need him to be able to neutralize the other team's point guards with defensive pressure."

The team's biggest loss is the outside shooting provided by Buckley and others. Dean expects Torres to shoot more, and the team will also rely on former junior varsity guards Johnathan Keenan and Cory Schumacher for outside shooting. Both are juniors.

The team's biggest strength may be size: High is 6-3, Dudley is 6-1 and Walker is 6-0, but any District 1-4A coach might say Walker "plays taller than that."

Dean will call up from last year's JV several big players: junior C.J. Kubacak, 6-5; sophomore Bryant McNutt, 6-3; senior Brian Torres, 6-3; and senior Nicholas Tarr, 6-1.

"Our strength this year should be inside players," Dean said. "We've got several players around 6-3, which is not real tall, but they all have good strength."

That depth will allow Walker to move outside some. Dean got a lot of mileage last year out of playing the 6-foot-3 Buckley at guard, creating matchup problems for nearly every defender. He hopes to get the same thing from Walker.

"We're hoping by moving Isaac outside that we'll get matchups that will benefit us," Dean said. "Our thought is if they play him with a big man, his quickness will be an advantage, and if they play him with a smaller player, his inside strength should pay off."

Another team strength will be quickness, Dean said.

"We have real good team quickness, and we think this is going to allow us to become a very good defensive team."

Fortenberry has a much easier

rebuilding task than Dean has: none. The Lady Whitefaces return nine varsity players from last season, five of which have at least two varsity letters.

Topping that list is senior Mindi

Davis, a first-team all-district selection last season. Davis led the Lady Whitefaces in scoring with 10 points per game and in rebounding with 4

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
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

per game. In short, she's a leader.

"Mindi's our quiet leader - she leads by example," Fortenberry said. "Obviously, we're expecting a lot out of her."

"On the other side of the coin - that's a vocal leader, and that's Heather Hodges," he said. "She's a leader on the volleyball court - that's obvious. We want her to step off the volleyball court and do the same thing on the basketball court."

The team may have a slow start because seven of the returning players are busy with volleyball playoffs. That includes Hodges (4.8 points per game), Tamitha Holmes (5.3), Brittnie Binder (7.4), Julie Cole (2.0), Kari Barrett (2.0), Julie Rampley (7.5) and Catie Bezen (6.7).

The volleyball team was to play Cleburne Saturday in Abilene for a trip to the state tournament Nov. 17-18. A volleyball win Saturday would mean Fortenberry would be without seven of his best basketball players for another week.

"It hurts us," Fortenberry said, "but it's a good hurt, because their success has got to carry over to us. Their success gives us confidence."

Besides Mindi Davis, the other returning letterman who'll definitely be on the court is Misti Davis, Mindi's sister. Misti, a sophomore, averaged 4.9 points per game. She was the team's

top three-point threat last season, hitting 24-of-67 for 36 percent.

While the varsity roster might be juggled until the volleyball players join the team, the one addition who'll definitely stay is Crystal Mercer, a senior guard.

Hereford has one three-year letterwinner in Holmes, a senior.

"She's our physical post player," Fortenberry said. "We expect a lot out of her in rebounding and physical post play."

Binder, also a senior, started at point guard the last two years. Last season she led the team with 70 assists and 76 steals.

"She's got attitude," Fortenberry said, stressing that he means these comments as the highest compliments. "She's got that little bit of arrogance you've got to have to be successful. Brittney has all the confidence in the world."

Cole, a senior, led the team at the free throw line, shooting 76 percent.

"She's got the kind of attitude you want out of every kid," Fortenberry said. "She's a hard worker and a great free throw shooter."

Barrett is the lone returning junior. She's a reserve guard, but she stepped in and started at point guard two years ago when Binder missed several games with an injury.

"Kari's biggest plus is adding

depth at guard," Fortenberry said. "She's so versatile. She can play point guard or the wing."

Misti Davis, Bezen and Rampley all played big minutes as freshmen and succeeded despite their youth. Rampley was even named the Freshman of the Year for the area by the Amarillo Globe-News.

"You just can't say enough for what all three did last year in a tough situation," Fortenberry said. "What we asked them to do, and their performance - it's commendable."

Hereford remains in District 1-4A, where Canyon and Randall rule unless some team proves otherwise. The Lady Whitefaces finished fourth, behind Dumas. Fortenberry expects those four to contend again.

"I don't think there's that much difference between No. 1 and No. 4 in this district," he said. "Any one can win the district, and any one can finish fourth."

Hereford came close to beating Randall and Canyon last year but never got over that hump.

"The experience of being that close had to help us," Fortenberry said. "There is a mystique, but they have so much experience of being in those games, it's a big advantage. Youth had a little bit to do with our making mistakes late in close games, but (the Hereford girls) believe they can play with both of them. We're not in awe of them anymore."

Pampa is the defending district

champ of the boys' teams, and while the Harvesters remain the team to beat, Dean believes the district is full of contenders.

"The district will be very balanced and very competitive again, just like last year," he said.

Pampa won the title despite splitting its two games with both Hereford and Canyon. Hereford split with Canyon and Borger, while Canyon also split with Randall, creating the tie for second which was resolved in the district playoff.

Dean said those five teams will be the top contenders.

"Every team has some good players back, and they also have to replace some good players," Dean said. Pampa may be a little ahead,

because the Harvesters return "two of the premiere players in the district in Rayford Young and Coy Laury," Dean said.


Even Caprock, which didn't win many last year, returns all five starters.

The Orlando Magic are winning without their big center. The Indiana Pacers and Charlotte Hornets seem to be missing theirs quite a bit.

Improving to 4-1 without the injured Shaquille O'Neal, the Magic beat Boston 110-94 Friday night behind 30 points from Dennis Scott.

"I think we are starting to jell," Scott said, "and when the big guy plays back, we can really be a good team."

After starting out 3-0 with Rik Smits sidelined by ankle surgery, the Pacers have dropped two straight, including Friday night's 119-95 loss to Sacramento.

Charlotte's hole in the middle is even more glaring. Following the Hornets' trade of center Alonzo Mourning to Miami, they have lost two in a row, with opposing centers having big games in both. After Washington's Gheorghe Muresan got 31 on Wednesday night, Philadelphia's Shawn Bradley had 23 points and a career-high 22 rebounds in the 76ers' 104-90 win Friday night.

"Bradley had a terrific night, probably the best of his career," Hornets coach Allan Bristow said. "It seemed like he was all over the place."

"Right now, we're having trouble putting our offense together."

Rick Fox led Boston with 19 points, Dino Radja had 16 and Dana Barros 15.

Greg Anthony had a career-high 28 points for the Grizzlies.

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
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WWII fliers launch drive to replace windows

Church damaged when squadron blew munitions dump in 1944

FORT WORTH, Texas - Aging survivors of World War II's 383rd Fighter Squadron are on one last mission: raising \$200,000 to replace 700-year-old stained glass church windows they destroyed on a raid to Remy, France, in 1944.

They kicked off their efforts Saturday with ceremonies in Remy, north of Paris, said Roy Blaha, 74, of Homestead, Fla., the squadron's spokesman and friend of the only American lost on that mission, 1st Lt. Houston Lee Braly of Brady.

In the Aug. 2, 1944, raid, four of the squadron's eight P-51 Mustangs destroyed an 18-car German munitions train parked in the Remy yards, Blaha said.

The train exploded and the blast fragmented the windows in the town's 13th-century church, blew the roofs off houses and killed 400 Germans, one Remy citizen and Braly.

The explosion also damaged Blaha's plane, and blew the wings and tail off Braly's Mustang, sending the fuselage sliding past a crossroads, through a wall and into a farmyard about a mile away.

Maria Terese Schoupe ran to the burning wreckage and pulled Braly's body from it; according to his sister, Alice Braly Gibson, a former Fort Worth resident who moved to Houston last year.

"She wrote the family that she and a young boy carried the body to the village cemetery where it was buried with dignity and honor," Gibson said.

"This year, she wrote me again and in the letter, she said, 'After 50 years, I still have memories of your brother's burned body.'

The burial created a crisis between the town's 2,000 residents and the German administration over the flowers the villagers put on Braly's grave.

The Germans removed the flowers and vowed to take hostages if they reappeared. That night, four times as many flowers were taken to the grave, according to village records.

The Germans took no reprisals, and when Remy was liberated by American troops two months later, Braly's grave was still covered with fresh flowers. At its head was a blade from his plane's propeller, polished and bearing his name.

The blade was lost after the war when his body was moved to an American military cemetery. He was finally buried in the family plot in Brady in 1948, Gibson said.

The idea of replacing the windows surfaced after Blaha and other squadron members visited Remy during and after the war, and military historian Stephen L. Lea Vell visited Remy during this year's 50th anniversary celebrations of the end of World War II.

Lea Vell discovered that some of the stained glass windows still needed to be replaced, but that the city had run out of money for the project.

After the squadron's 50th reunion, the old airmen decided to form the nonprofit Windows for Remy Foundation and raise an estimated \$200,000 to replace the windows to

repay Remy in honor of Braly and to honor Lea Vell for his efforts to assemble their unit history.

Besides Blaha and other members of the 383rd attending Saturday's ceremonies in France will be Gibson and Braly's two brothers, Walter E. and Dudley Braly.

The ceremonies will include speeches from the Bralys and a fly-by of Air Force jets from England in the

traditional missing man formation. In addition, the city of Remy will name the crossroads where Braly's P-51 crashed "Rue de Houston Lee Braly" and dedicate a plaque bearing his name on the reconstructed version of the wall that his plane punctured 51 years ago.

Cow creates 'moo-haha' with ninth set of twins

SAN ANTONIO - Lois and Arnold Bredewater are in steer heaven since their cow Bessie delivered her ninth set of twins.

Mom and calves, who made their appearance last weekend at the Bredewater Ranch in Guadalupe County, seemed oblivious to the moo-haha they've caused.

They shied away from reporter and photographer, although Bredewater said the tan, 1,400-pound critter is gentle "except when strangers are around. She'll eat range cubes (vegetarian protein supplements) out of my hand."

After all, Bredewater raised Bessie, a Chianina crossbred beef cow, from a calf.

Bessie's first birth in 1985 was a single. From then on, as Bart Simpson would say, it was Cowabunga!

"When she had two sets of twins, we thought, 'This is neat,'" said Mrs. Bredewater, 62. "And then she

had three. And then she had four. "Pretty soon, people were gambling on it."

According to San Antonio Livestock Exhibition chair professor Bill Turner, about 1 of every 200 births is twins. Once a cow has twins, odds are it will have more.

But when the twins are different genders, the female calf usually is sterile. Eight of Bessie's nine sets have been a heifer and a bull calf, so they were destined from birth for the butcher.

Turner said another problem is the twins' mother often can't make enough milk. In Bessie's case, that has not been a problem. Mrs. Bredewater said as she watched the threesomes cavort in a pen.

"She's a good mama," the smiling rancher's wife said.

Bessie, it seems, is just following in the family tradition. Her owner, a retired Air Force colonel, is an identical twin. And the Bredewater boys married twins.

Bredewater has been raising cattle since his retirement from Randolph Air Force Base in 1969. Except for Bessie, his herd, which once averaged 100 head but now stands at 20, has produced only two other sets of twins.

The rancher has no scrapbook of Bessie's accomplishments, since he never expected the twins streak to

continue.

"Each year I'd thought she's never going to have another set and then sure enough," said the spry, 78-year-old rancher. "If we'd have had any idea, we'd have taken movies."



Hereford resident visits military base named after uncle

In October 1985, the Secretary of the Interior designated Hickam Air

Force Base in Honolulu as a National Historic Landmark, recognizing it as one of the nation's most significant historic resources associated with

World War II in the Pacific.

Hickam Field, as it was originally called, was dedicated May 31, 1935, and named in honor of Lieutenant Colonel Horace Meek Hickam, a distinguished aviation pioneer and uncle of Hereford resident Helen Hickam Watts. He was killed in an aircraft accident Nov. 5, 1934, at Fort Crockett in Galveston.

Mrs. Watts and other family members have recently returned from a trip to Hawaii where they visited Hickam Air Force Base and other points of interest related to World War II.

"It was the experience of a lifetime," said Mrs. Watts. "I felt so honored to be related to a man who was so revered."

Making the trip with Mrs. Watts were her nephew Earl Hickam and his wife Opal of Bloomfield, N.M.; her nieces Pearl Parker of Chama, N.M. and Aileen Netcher of Clovis, N.M.; and her daughter and son-in-law Marge and Jim Ray of Amarillo.

"We all owe a lot to Opal because she worked for several months to make reservations and organize the trip for us," said Mrs. Watts.

The first stop on their tour was the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific. From there they went to Hickam Air Force Base.

Col. Hickam was the younger brother of Mrs. Watts' father.

"I remember him as a young man. My mother, my brother and I lived in Grandpa and Grandma Hickam's home for a number of years when he was still at home."

A large painting of Col. Hickam is on display in wing headquarters along with a commemorative plaque and display of his memorabilia.

Reminders of the attack on Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, can be seen at Hickam Air Force Base today, including the tattered American flag that flew over the base that morning

and bullet-scarred walls of the Pacific Air Forces Headquarters building that have been carefully preserved as a constant reminder to remain ever vigilant.

"Security was tight while we were there," said Mrs. Watts, "and we were not able to visit the Air Force

Headquarters, but we could see the shell-marked walls of the building."

The group also visited the USS Arizona Memorial.

"It was a very quiet place even though there were a lot of people there. Everyone had such a reverent attitude. It's a sad place to view," said

Mrs. Watts.

Other highlights of the tour included a luau, submarine journey, helicopter flight and tour of the Iolani Palace, the official residence of King Kalakaua and Queen Liliuokalani, the last monarchs of Hawaii from 1882-1893.

Holiday foods are among the many pleasures of the season. But for many, this presents a special challenge. During this time of the year people sometimes wonder how they can enjoy the holidays and still manage to maintain a healthful diet.

There's no need to panic. Most foods, even the traditional family favorites, can fit into a healthy eating plan. The secret is moderation and balance.

Dinner invitations away from home could mean eating at a friend's or relative's home or perhaps at a restaurant, a hotel or country club for the company bash. In either case, the meal is already planned and there is no menu choice.

If you're bringing a dish to a friend's or relative's table, make a lowfat version of a family favorite. Once the food is on the table, you will have some healthful choices.

If possible, choose two appetizers instead of an entree or share an entree with a friend.

If second helpings are mandatory with your host or hostess, make your first helping small. That way, if you're enticed to take seconds, at least the total amount of food you eat may equal a normal-sized portion.

Choose skinless white meat of poultry. It has fewer calories and fat than dark meat.

Eating a roll is okay. If it's fresh, you will not miss the butter or margarine.

The excitement and festive atmosphere of holiday parties can really take your attention away from what you are eating.

Here are some effective tips for holding the line at holiday stand-up events:

* Eat small, lower-calorie meals during the day so you can enjoy a special treat later. Eat a healthy snack right before the party. A hungry stomach can sabotage even the strongest willpower.

* When you arrive at the party, don't rush to the food. Greet people you know, get a beverage and settle in first.

* Make only one trip to the buffet and be selective. Choose only the foods you really want to eat.

* Keep portions small. Often, a craving is all you will need to satisfy a craving or your curiosity.

* Skip the fried food, mixed nuts, cocktail sausages and other high fat tid-bits. Eat the crackers, bread, and fresh fruits and vegetables.

* If you want to nibble on cheese, take only one or two pieces.

* Fresh vegetables and fruits are always great low-calorie, lowfat choices. Have a small dollop of dip, just enough to coat the end of a carrot stick, broccoli floret or tip of a strawberry.

* Boiled shrimp or scallops and thin slices of lean roast beef are good choices. Choose cocktail sauce or

lemon and horseradish as a condiment.

It's good to have celebration strategies, but be realistic. Trying to lose weight during holidays may be a self-defeating goal. Striving to maintain your weight, however, is a reasonable expectation. Forget the "all or nothing" mind-set. Depriving yourself of special holiday foods or feeling guilty over a particular food choice is not part of a healthful eating strategy. And, certainly not a part of the holiday spirit.

Remember to have fun. Sharing food is an important way to spread holiday cheer. Enjoying a traditional meal or celebrating with family and friends need not destroy the healthy food habit you have nurtured all year.

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. (AP)--John Wayne Bobbitt apparently can bare all but his pocketbook to pay child support.

Bobbitt, who owes \$33,000 in back payments to Beatrice Williams, plans to make payments by having the producers of his new porno movie pay the mother of his child directly, his lawyer said.

Bobbitt, in family court Monday, was ordered under threat of jail to make a \$5,000 good-faith payment by Nov. 8 to Ms. Williams, with whom he fathered a son in 1992 during a separation from his wife, Lorena. He has never met the child.

Bobbitt and his attorney have said he would have paid Ms. Williams except his money is controlled by his agent. "I'm being ripped off," Bobbitt said.

- Use wide-mouthed jars to hold unused condiments from fast-food restaurants—keeps them from cluttering kitchen drawers.

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
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Between the Covers

Fault-Lines by Anne Rivers Siddons is the headliner for this week's column. Along with being a wife and mother, Merritt Fowler is a natural caretaker. The role of caretaker began when Merritt was a child herself, as she began to care for her beautiful, erratic younger sister, Laura.

Now there is a self-sacrificing physician husband, Pom; and a 16-year-old daughter, Glynn, that she cares for. The extra warm summer becomes even hotter when Merritt's mother-in-law, who suffers from advanced Alzheimer's, comes to live with them.

Merritt and Glynn begin to feel the strain and Merritt knows that something deep inside her is about to crack. Glynn runs away from home, following a bad family quarrel, in search of her Aunt Laura. Merritt goes to California in search of Glynn and decides to stay there until the relationship between sisters, mother and daughter can be restored. The three ladies end up in a borrowed lodge among the redwoods in the Santa Cruz Mountains (earthquake country).

T.C. Bridgewater, an earthquake scientist is in this area monitoring the seismographic activity when the fault line erupts. Each one must now dig deep inside for the strength, determination and courage to survive.

Justice by Faye Kellerman begins with the shocking murder of the local high school prom queen. In this smaller affluent Southern California town, LAPD homicide detective Peter Decker and his brilliant wife Rina Lazarus encounter a different kind of teenager. These kids are rootless, well off and sometimes violent. Everyone in the community identifies a disturbed young man with a mysterious past as the prime suspect, but Decker doesn't agree. Decker's investigation leads to a startling, controversial conclusion which leaves everyone, including the reader, shocked.

Sigmund Brouwer has written another fact-based and science-based thriller, *Double Helix*. It is a suspenseful tale of "contemporary science out of ethical control", where man's lust for immortality leads to the ultimate immortality.

In the "Institute" a stillbirth occurs which leads to an order for a murder. Dr. Josef Van Klees is conducting top secret genetic experiments, involuntary organ donations and other unspeakable horrors. Slater Ellis and Paige Stephens travel from New Mexico to Florida, New York and California in 14 days only to discover the perfect circle of Van Klees' evil. "These people have pull beyond even the president of the United States!"

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (AP) - A gargantuan gorilla smashing trains and airplanes? Now that's imaginative, says Fay Wray.

The 88-year-old star of the original "King Kong" says today's movies just depict gratuitous violence.

"Violence for violence's sake is a travesty," she said as she prepared to be honored at the Virginia Festival of American Film. "It's sensation and not sensitivity."

Ms. Wray described "King Kong" as "magical," noting that it was made in 1933 without today's sophisticated special effects and at a cost of only \$600,000.

"I think it is proof that the imagination can go anywhere and should," said Ms. Wray, who wriggled out of the clutches of the mighty gorilla in the movie.

Eighty films, including several premieres, will be shown at the eighth annual festival that began Thursday and was to run through Sunday.

Anne Perry's new book *Cain His Brother* takes place in London during the reign of Queen Victoria, a time when magnificent mansions and discreetly luxurious clubs thrived while the city's poor suffered and died in hopeless obscurity.

Inspector William Monk knows the city's best and worst. When the charming Genevieve Stonefield comes to ask for his assistance in finding her missing husband Monk can not turn her away. Angus Stonefield is a kind, gentle, loving man of integrity, while his twin brother Caleb was just the opposite.

Genevieve knew that Angus was to meet with his brother and three days later Angus still has not returned home nor has he tried to contact her in any way. The business partners don't know how much longer they can keep going before the creditors learn of the disappearance of Angus.

When word gets out, how will Genevieve support herself and her five children. Monk puts himself into the missing man's shoes and slowly inches toward the truth, a truth that may lead to the destruction of Monk's good name and livelihood.

Here We Go Again: My Life in Television is the autobiography of Betty White. Betty's television career begins with her first appearance in 1949. She began her first show "Life with Elizabeth" in 1952, then the "Mary Tyler Moore Show" in 1968 and on to the "Golden Girls" for which she won her fifth Emmy.

Betty has also made innumerable visits as guest and host on popular game, talk and variety shows. In this book Betty shares wonderful anecdotes about the many famous personalities with whom she has worked; a behind the scenes account of how television has changed; and accounts of her personal life.

Against Type: The Biography of Burt Lancaster by Gary Fishgall is the first comprehensive work on Lancaster. After working as a salesman and circus acrobat Lancaster arrives in Hollywood at the age of 33. While producers only wanted Burt to display his "rippling muscles and handsome face" he insisted on testing himself with more demanding and diverse roles.

Lancaster earned the reputation of being the most arrogant, argumentative actor in the history of Hollywood. He was the first actor to form his own production company. You need only to look at the list of movie titles to realize the diversity and acting skill Lancaster brought to each role.

As the pupils grow smaller, less light enters the eye. It's harder to see at night. Because reaction time slows, a driver may need stronger prescription lenses to compensate for the delay. Developing cataracts may cause vision to cloud.

Your optometrist can help ease the visual problems of aging or help you adjust to them. It's wise to schedule regular examinations, especially if you note any vision loss.

Most of you know by now that I'm an old farm boy from way back. Breakfast is my favorite meal, and I can eat it three times a day.

So when I was in Abilene, TX a few weeks ago, hungry for a good country dinner, I decided to opt for a double Grand Slam breakfast. For those of you who count calories and monitor cholesterol by the milligram, a double Grand Slam is four eggs, four sausage links, four strips of crisp bacon and four pancakes with a cup and a half of syrup. It covers all four basic food groups: Fat, salt, sugar and lard.

The restaurant was busy and the young man who attended my table was perspiring freely. He said his name

was Aaron and he served me efficiently.

During the few minutes it took to fix my order, I watched Aaron closely. He was a stocky young man and I guessed him to be about 20 years of age. I'd also guess that he might be a student at Abilene Christian University which was nearby. In addition, I would speculate that he might be putting himself through school, and perhaps has a family to support.

How could I deduct all that from just watching him work? Well, I believe that what we do says a lot about who we are. Aaron is a serious H.A.M. kind of guy.

Three success keys

I'd be willing to bet that someday Aaron will be successful. I think he'll own his own business or lead a successful firm. I believe he is already discovering some of the key elements for success. I call these the H.A.M. factors: Hustle, Attitude and Motivation.

Aaron was hustling. Tables were filling up quickly, and there was work to be done. He hurried from table to table, delivering food, taking orders and keeping his customers well served. His pace was quick, and he didn't waste many trips.

One of my old bosses said his favorite thing was hustle. I was a mechanic at that time and he said he wanted to hear my ratchet "sing." He wanted me to move the wrench so quickly that you couldn't hear the individual clicks. If he sent us to run after parts, he expected us to run. I found out later that all bosses like hustle. Whether you're a ball player or a baker, hustle will hurry up your success.

The second success factor is attitude. Our attitude is

the state of mind with which we approach any given situation. Our attitude controls our relationships, our happiness and our achievements. However, we control our attitude.

Henry Ford said, "Whether you think you can or think you cannot, you're right. Our success in life is not the problems we face, but how we face them. Our success in business is not what our competitors do, but how we react to them." Zig Ziglar said, "Your attitude determines your altitude."

The third H.A.M. factor is motivation. Webster defines motivation as "reasons or incentives that result in desirable actions." We all would do well to examine our motives from time to time. Why do we want success? Do our reasons justify our actions?

Our motivation must be honest and sincere for our success to result in happiness. When we are motivated by the desire to help others, to improve ourselves, to profit fairly and to provide honest value to others, our success will also bring personal fulfillment and joy. 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

'Outdoor Education Program' means camp to youngsters who attend Irion Co. school

LEAKY, Texas - Kids still have a place where afternoon means canoe time, and bunkhouse pillow fights reign supreme long after the adults declare "lights out."

They still have a place where just-before-bedtime is s'mores time and if you lose your drinking cup, you have to sing in front of all your friends to get it back.

Kids still have camp.

In the past six years, Irion County Elementary School in Mertzon has taken the notion of camp and mixed it with hometown imagination to create a rich, one-of-a-kind educational curriculum.

The school's name for the experience is "Outdoor Education Program." To Mertzon's youngsters, though, the concept is far less sterile than the grown-ups' talk of curriculum and lessons.

To them, it's Camp.

The H.E. Butt Foundation Camping Guide is a modest four-page flier.

It reads, "Continuously flowing springs feed the river and eight waterfront areas with cool, crystal-clear water."

Proper emphasis should go to crystal-clear.

Here along the headwaters of the arguably flawless Frio River, among cactus and evergreens and deciduous giants, 1,900 acres of Hill Country serenity sits shrouded in misty morning and then bathed in afternoon sunshine.

The H.E. Butt family is the same clan behind H-E-B Food Stores. The family foundation acquired the Frio acreage in 1954 and developed it into a camp, originally for the purpose of serving children from families without the money to send them to a traditional camp.

From the start, the foundation emphasized "Christian character development" and shared outdoor learning.

In the 40 years since, the camp, operated through an office in nearby Kerrville, has opened its arms to provide retreat settings for qualified non-profit groups from community, health, church, civic, school and other backgrounds. With very few exceptions, private, non-group camping isn't allowed.

Group reservations are taken roughly a year in advance, and reservations are a must.

The camp isn't so much the relative secret it was 20 years ago, or even 10 years ago. Even just six years back when Mertzon started taking its schoolchildren there, the school had only to call a couple of months in advance to reserve its cabins and its own hiding place in the valley along the river.

Now the school calls a year ahead of time. The camp is getting busier all the time, said Camp Director Gary Cochrane, who, incidentally, considers himself far from the unluckiest fellow in the world. He lives at the camp itself, in a house alongside the cold, clear Frio.

For the first time in six years, Irion County scheduled its 2-1/2-day H.E. Butt Camp stay for October instead of during the last week of school, as

always before.

So many friendships are made at camp it seems a shame to return home only to see the students part for the summer, explained Nancy Surber, a physical education teacher at Irion Elementary and a significant source of energy behind the camp.

Surber is goofy and uniquely loved for it.

"Whole new personalities come out down here," she says, watching as six students in two canoes race each other from the near bank of the river to the far side, a straight-up-and-down canyon wall of rock, embedded with secrets of centuries ago: fossils of the sea that once covered the land.

Every so often a young canoe stops and holds a canoe paddle tightly in hand.

The camper gazes, neck craned, to the top of the stark cliff, barely able to see the top for the height of it all.

This place - this river and winding valley with its springs and mini-waterfalls and canopies of trees.

All summer in a day could happen here.

Before it starts, early the first morning of camp, 65 Irion County fourth- and fifth-graders are still at school, saying good-bye to their parents.

A few parents pass along instructions for medications their kids are supposed to take.

A few teachers joke about needing their pillows on the bus to put over their ears.

The two school buses get rolling toward the Hill Country, packed with anticipation and maybe a few parent-volunteers wondering what they've gotten themselves into this time.

This year, the group leaves on a Tuesday morning, gets to the Foundation Camp at lunchtime, eats brown-bag sandwich lunches and then the experience begins.

They pull into camp, a cluster of crisp weathered-gray cabins around an open-air picnic shelter and a separate, enclosed kitchen.

The bus is met by two Marines.

Nothing like a couple of marines to put some boot in your camp.

For the second straight year, Sgt. Sailor Hasting and Capt. James McGinley, both among the small group of Marines stationed at Goodfellow Air Force Base, have traveled from San Angelo to keep the campers in line, military-style.

"OK!" barks Hasting, easily the harsher of the two. They're somewhat of a good-guy-bad-guy pairing, but even the "bad guy" character is buffered and lovable - in a regimented, military kind of way.

Hasting proceeds to explain to his now heedful audience that when he or Capt. McGinley (a.k.a. Skipper) shout "Eyeballs!" at campers, they will respond with a crisp, clear "Snap!"

Their eyeballs, Hasting says, will be forward and their attention undivided.

"Eyeballs!" he belts out, a practice run.

"Snap!"

The reply is loud and singular, reverberating off the canyon wall.

The seeds of discipline are sown. The Marines have much more to say than just "Eyeballs!" McGinley ends up having to return to San Angelo after the first day of camp, but Sailer is there for the duration.

The Marines hold a self-defense class on the sand volleyball court. Sailor teaches camouflage and survival training under the oaks.

And intermittently, he barks his commanding bark. "Eyeballs!"

"Snap!"

"Hey, Skipper, look," a boy calls to McGinley during a push-up session in the first hour of camp.

The Marine turns to look at the boy, who then snaps his picture with a FunSaver camera. He's now a boy forever enriched by the image of his torturer.

"You old enough to operate that?" the Marine asks, his face stern like his tone of voice.

The boy gets defensive.

"Yeah," he says. "I'm 10."

Six years ago, Ronna Hollaway-Click was teaching science at Mertzon's elementary school. She now teaches in San Angelo.

Jeanette Hobbs was a science teacher who's now a counselor at Irion County.

Nancy Surber taught P.E. as she does now.

Those are the three names most often linked to the beginnings of Irion County Elementary School's camping program.

The first year, Surber says, they started small, holding the camp at one of the teacher's houses, just getting their feet wet, seeing what worked and what didn't.

Then they heard about the H.E. Butt camp, but the school board wouldn't buy it the first year, Surber said.

The next year, the teachers were prepared with a detailed curriculum, explanations about how the students would be supervised, what transportation would be used, how insurance would be covered, how much everything would cost.

The board gave its nod of approval, and the camping program continues to ride on the cumulative successes of its previous years.

The school gets businesses to donate what it needs, from money and food to craft supplies and talent. First National Bank of Mertzon, Shelton Oil and Gas and Tom Thorp Transports Inc. were chief contributors this year, but there were smaller gifts from all over the community.

And then there are the parents, Surber said.

"Most of them take vacation to come here," she said of the parents who, with teachers, provide some 20 pairs of watchful eyes to keep campers from harm - and to cook and serve the meals and quiet the bunkhouses, of course.

"For parents to do that ... what a commitment to their kids' education," Surber marvels.

Fifth-grade teacher Stella Wolfenbarger is sort of the quiet, behind-the-scenes camp coordinator. Her coordinating team members include Surber, Hobbs, Karan Cornett, Ann Moseley, and Nita Fields.

An expanded group of volunteers

teaches programs during camp: fishing, journal writing, gun safety, mohair spinning, outdoor bird calling, deer habitats, pioneer lighting methods, nature art, breadmaking, and the list goes on.

English and ecology. History and science.

Lessons learned under the sun and the stars.

"I don't like to wash dishes in that water. It's got Clorox and it hurts my hands."

Even paradise has complainers. Camp definitely does.

After a breakfast of pancakes, sausage links, milk and juice - coffee, and lots of it, for the adults - the fourth- and fifth-graders systematically trail through the dishwashing line the same as they do after every meal.

On Friday they'll have to go back to school after three days of camp, and camp days are much longer days than school days.

"I think I'm going to be sick Friday," one teacher will say.

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

Educational Programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to all citizens without regard to race, color, age, national origin, sex, or disabilities.

This fall we have several result demonstrations out. These include wheat variety demonstrations of the Jim Cavin, Raymond Schlabs, and Donald Meyer Farms; a wheat fertilizer demonstration using various rates of phosphorus on the Roy Carlson Farm; two Gaucho insecticide seed treatment demonstrations on the Raymond Schlabs and Donald Meyer farms; a bindweed herbicide demonstration on the Johnny Wall farm; and a brush control on rangeland on the Mike Brumley Ranch. These demonstrations should provide us with some good information for producers by next summer.

Pesticide applicators are reminded again that they need to have completed 15 hours of continuing education units by December 31 in order to maintain their pesticide license or certificate. Several

producers have called this last week with questions about the requirements. One question asked several times was, "If I don't get the required units, what will happen to my certificate or license?" The answer is very clear in the requirement is met. In the case of certificate holders, they must then take the license training and exam and pay the \$50 for a new license.

I don't mean to harp on this subject, but at present there is no alternative except to get the required CEU credits if you want to keep your present applicator status. As I stated last week, there is an option for Certified Private Applicators (please note the word certified) in lieu of obtaining the 15 hours. This category of applicator may become a Licensed Private Applicator by taking the necessary training, passing the TDA exam and paying a \$50 fee to obtain this license.

Applicators having questions may contact the Deaf Smith County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at 364-3573. A list of approved CEU courses is also available at the office. Have a good week.



Five bed rooms are on the second floor, two of which share an interconnecting bath, each with a separate powder room. The remaining two bed rooms share a hall bath with the bonus room.



FIRST FLOOR PLAN




SECOND FLOOR PLAN



Hayley-Alison wedding stirs up a *Melrose* ruckus



The union of Hayley Armstrong (Perry King) and Alison Parker (Courtney Thorne-Smith) is causing headaches galore for his daughter, Brooke, and Alison's ex-lover, Billy, on *Melrose Place*. The hip twenty-something soap opera is in its fourth hit season Mondays on Fox.

A May-December marriage is setting off some major repercussions these days on *Melrose Place*, Fox's hit Monday night soap opera.

"Now Alison is Brooke's stepmother," laughs veteran actor Perry King, who plays Brooke's father, tycoon Hayley Armstrong.

Last week's wedding of Hayley and the much-put-upon Alison Parker (Courtney Thorne-Smith) has newlyweds Billy (Andrew Shue) and Brooke Armstrong Campbell (Kristin Davis) seeing red, and with good reason. Brooke broke up Alison's romance with Billy, then blackmailed Amanda Woodward (Heather Locklear) into making her Alison's boss.

"And it goes from there," says King, who has parlayed what amounted to a cameo role into a front-burner story line. "(Hayley and Alison are) off on their honeymoon. And it's very real. They're not doing it just to goad Brooke and Billy, although Brooke and Billy both see it that way. They're furious."

King credits his savvy manager, Neil Konigsberg, for alerting the actor to a role that didn't sound like much at first.

"He saw, in his imagination, the idea of me on *Melrose Place* making it more of a part," King explains. "I think in a show like this, one of the things that gives the actors a lot of pleasure is that the writers write off what they see."

"If you can take something written on paper and really run with it and make it fly, they'll then take that and build off it and give you more to fly with. Marcia Cross (Kimberly) is a good example of this. She's a very good actress who took what they first

gave her and really ran with it. Now she's got to be one of the most interesting characters on the show."

As Konigsberg predicted, Hayley Armstrong began to change from the enigmatic father figure he was in his early scenes.

"He started to evolve into a character who stood by himself, which was a man who has a much shakier financial standing than he implies by the way he lives, and a man who is on a personal edge, a bit desperate perhaps," King says pensively. "From there I think he evolved even further into someone that we see is really very lonely and kind of lost on his own. It's been very interesting watching this guy evolve, trying to feed the evolution."

He doesn't know exactly how long his *Melrose* gig will last, but King is having a ball. Along with the other cast members, he has to avoid slipping from melodrama to overt campiness.

"Everyone working on the show sees that side very much and tries to tread that line," King says. "It's not tempting to not go far enough — it's tempting to go too far. Particularly the people who have been around for a long time have to remind themselves that they owe it to the audience not to go too far. It's a balancing act. Someone will say, 'But in REAL life...' and someone else will say, 'Yeah, but this is *Melrose Place*, it's not real life.'"

Also, the sexual subtext in scenes between Hayley and his willful daughter has some viewers stunned, a development at which King laughs.

"We know it's there," he admits. "We've talked about it a little. Clearly, Hayley and Brooke are a little messed up. It's evident to both of us, so we just kind of let it sit there. The characters clearly are aware of it and don't know what to do about it. It's really funny."





PBS offers TV debut of film about two boys' NBA dreams

William Gates and Arthur Agee shared a dream: to play professional basketball. The story of their struggle to achieve their common goal is the focus of the award-winning documentary film *Hoop Dreams*, which makes its TV premiere Wednesday, Nov. 15, on PBS (check local listings).

Hoop Dreams invites the audience to follow the two talented boys throughout their high-school years as they struggle for the athletic perfection that will reward them with scholarships, a chance to play college ball, and ultimately, a shot at playing in the NBA.

Over the course of five years, filmmakers Steve James, Frederick Marx and Peter Gilbert managed to capture about 250 hours of their lives on film. The result is a poignant look at the obstacles they encountered and the problems they endured.

"People tell me, 'Man, I love that movie ... I love you. You are an inspiration to me,'" says Agee in a press release. "But the movie doesn't just represent mine and William's lives — it represents other people's lives and other families, too."

During their high-school years, Gates and Agee were forced to endure much both on and off the court. One faced a serious knee injury, while the other dealt with his parents' separation.

The emotional drama premiered at the 1994 Sundance Film Festival where it was honored with the Audience Award for best documentary. Since then, it has received worldwide recognition and numerous critics' awards for best documentary of 1994.

A *Hoop Dreams Reunion*, which follows the broadcast, takes a look at where Agee and Gates are now. The special features never-before-seen clips of the NBA hopefuls and interviews with the filmmakers.

Today, Agee and Gates travel around to schools where they share their experiences with a new generation of dreamers.
