President vows to reject budget that has cuts in environmental programs

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton asserted Saturday that proposed Republican cuts in environmental programs are yet another reason to veto a GOP balanced-budget package. "This budget will mean dirtier water, more smog, more illness and a diminished quality of life," he said.

Clinton used his weekly radio address to attack a variety of provisions in the legislation - now before a House-Senate conference committee - that he said would undo decades of bipartisan environmental protection.

"If Congress sends me a budget that guts environmental protection, that protects polluters, not the public, I will veto it," Clinton said.

He has also cited various other reasons for vetoing the measure,

including its \$245 billion tax cut, which he claims would favor mostly the wealthy.

Both the House and the Senate have passed bills to balance the budget in seven years, slash anticipated Medicare spending by \$270 billion and cut education, environmental and other domestic programs.

A House-Senate conference committee will hammer out a compromise that Clinton is expected to veto.

"Under the cover of balancing the budget, the Republican Congress is going after the essential environmental protections that have guaranteed the health and safety of all Americans for a long time now, and I am determined to stop them," Clinton said.

"We don't need more pollution to balance the budget. We don't need dirtier water to close the deficit," Clinton said.

"The pollution lobby knows it could never repeal half our environmental protections, so the Republican budget cuts the resources for environmental enforcement in half. Quite simply, it just pulls the cop from the environmental beat."

Sen. Pete Domenici of New Mexico and Rep. John Kasich of Ohio responded for Republicans, saying that a balanced federal budget was essential to America's economic prosperity.

"And a balanced budget doesn't just mean a better future for our kids - it will put more money in the pockets of working Americans today," Domenici said.

Voting to be held Tuesday Balloting set on 14 amendments

Voters throughout Texas and in Deaf Smith County will go to the polls Tuesday to decide the fate of 14 amendments proposed to the Texas Constitution by the state Legislature.

Polls in Deaf Smith County will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at nine locations.

With no political races on the

ballot, a light turnout of voters is forecast, typical of off-year elections.

Low numbers of early voters in Deaf Smith County would seem to confirm the lack of interest in the election.

During the early voting period that ended at 5 p.m. Friday, only 231

ballots were marked by mid-

afternoon. Deaf Smith County's voter rolls list 9,146 eligible to cast ballots.

Amendment 10 has attracted the most attention prior to the election. If voters pass this amendment, the office of state treasurer will be abolished. Martha Whitehead holds the office now and campaigned two years on a platform calling for abandoning state treasurer.

In recent weeks, Whitehead has traveled the state in support of the proposed amendment.

Tax issues are the subject of seven proposed amendments. Other proposals are related to issuance of bonds for student loans, bond authority for the farm and ranch finance fund, increase in bonds for veterans' housing and reduction of bonds authorized in regard to the superconducting super collider and research facility and investments of money from the Texas growth fund.

One proposed amendment applies to only three Texas counties. Mills, Reagan and Roberts Counties want to abolish the office of constable.

Since adoption of the Texas Constitution in 1876, 338 amendments have been affixed to the document.

Traditions play important role in holiday season for families

Holidays are steeped in traditions. That is part of what makes them special. Yet the traditions tend to change with time.

"It doesn't seem possible that our family get-togethers on holidays sometimes take place at our grandchildren's houses," said Vondell

Grady and Vondell McHargue, who live near Milo Center, have two children, eight grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren.

When they were first married, family holidays were held at the home of their parents or grandparents.

"Then as times changed, we had the holidays at our house as often as we could," said Mrs. McHargue. "It just seemed natural for the kids to bring all our grandchildren here."

Mrs. McHargue would cook for days, preparing traditional favorites - including pecan and pumpkin pies - in quantity.

"Meals were the focal point of the day on Thanksgiving and Christmas. I wanted everyone to have all of their favorite dessert that they could eat," she said.

Going to grandmother's house is often a holiday tradition, even if the trip is not made on the holiday.

"We go to Grandmother's on the Sunday before Christmas, then we have Christmas at our house on the 25th," said one local teenager.

The traditional Thanksgiving and

Christmas meal in most parts of the country is turkey and dressing. This seems to have changed very little with time.

However, how the meal is served has changed through the years.

"Holiday meals were always sit-down affairs when I was younger," said Mrs. McHargue. "There were never enough places at the table for everyone to be seated at once, so the men were always fed first. And while they ate in the dining room, we fed the kids in the kitchen. Then the women ate last and would often sit around the table and visit after the meal."

This tradition has been replaced in many families these days. Even holiday meals are served buffet-style and everyone eats at the same time.

Many Christmas traditions center around decorating for the holiday and especially the Christmas tree.

"I always tried to have a live tree as big as I had room for," Mrs. McHargue said. "But some of the grandchildren have allergies and I had to start using an artificial tree a few years ago."

Decorations can be traditional or follow current trends. For some

families adding a special tree ornament each year is a tradition. Even selecting the time to put up

As we move into the fall and winter, I hope you have more time to focus on your city that you did during the busy summer months. I am going to try over the next few installments of Focus on Your City to give you an overview and a better understanding of what your City Commission is attempting to provide the citizen of Hereford.

First of all, let me again state how much I appreciate working with our City Commission and city staff. I know all of us at times have said, "If we were running the show, this is the way things would be done," or "Why aren't they done that way?" Probably in a great many cases, things are being done as you want them to be done and yet, we don't let you know how we're doing things so you are unaware of how, or what, we're doing.

As you will recall, three years ago, your City Commission said the first order of business is to get additional water for our residents and for our growth. We are working diligently toward that end, and in future, I will try to detail what is being done. Just let me say that we are arriving at the point of providing additional water for our citizens.

The second thing the City Commission said three years ago, I

think, was we want to improve the quality of life for all Hereford residents. As you know, a very decided effort has been made to upgrade our city park, and while we are certainly not to the point we'd like to be, we are making progress.

Let me suggest that if you haven't taken part in our enclosed pool these cool and windy days or evenings, you are really missing a great time. Sandra Kilanowski and her staff are really going the extra mile to provide the programs and training that so many folks have asked for. As I suggested, come and see for yourself and enjoy your swimming facility.

Of course, any city's primary responsibility is to safeguard its citizens through both law enforcement and fire protection. I hope you will agree that compared to other cities our size, there are no better, more concerned or cooperative people in the law enforcement and fire protection areas than right here in Hereford, Texas. We have a great staff and we all owe them many,

many thanks.

Right along with protection is the city's responsibility to handle the refuse from our daily living. We're still looking at what is the most economical method to handle our household waste. We are just in the process of renewing our permit for our wastewater facility. I really want to talk more about these issues in the future.

Another of the major concerns expressed three years ago was the economic expansion of our city. We've come a long way in that area with the passage of the economic development tax, the establishment of the Economic Development Corporation and the cooperation of that board with the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce and all the taxing entities in Deaf Smith County.

Sure, at least from the standpoint of a funded program, economic development is still in its infancy, but I can tell you there are lots of people who are very serious about seeing our city grow and not shrink in numbers. All of us realize that Hereford and Deaf Smith County must grow. We can't just stay "status quo" or we simply wither on the vine.

Also three years ago, your City Commission realized it needed citizen input. We have had some success in getting you, the citizen to express concerns or suggestions; we have had some success in getting you to volunteer for boards, commissions, etc.; we have had great success in working with the various entities in the county to cooperate on projects; but the bottom line is, if we're going to make Hereford the all-American city, the "Garden of Eden," so to speak, for each of us to live in, then we need more and more of your input.

Once again, I am asking that if any of you would like to serve on one of the many boards or commissions, please let us know. If you have an idea of how we can work better together, please let us know. Non of us is perfect by a long shot, but I can assure that each and every member of your City Commission has a great desire to make Hereford a better place to live for all of us.

Battered peso falls amid rumors of military coup

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexico's already battered peso plunged Friday amid unfounded rumors of a military coup and of increased army activity in the rebellion-wracked state of Chiapas.

The currency recovered somewhat to finish 10 centavos lower at 7.365 pesos to the dollar, just shy of the record close of 7.45 March 9.

The Mexican government vehemently denied the coup rumors and the White House also rejected the speculation. One analyst questioned whether the rumors, circulating as far as New York, were planted to destabilize the currency.

The peso dropped as low as 7.67 at midday Friday. That was a whisker below its historic interday trading low of 7.70, set March 9 as Mexico sought emergency steps to confront a December 1994 devaluation.

A spokesman for President Ernesto Zedillo dismissed the rumors as "complete nonsense," especially coming on the heels of several important announcements aimed at helping Mexico out of its 10-month-old crisis.

Nonetheless, the plunging peso signaled Zedillo's inability thus far to restore investor confidence to markets still jittery over the devaluation.

tion that threw more than 1 million people out of jobs, kicking off a recession.

The peso has lost just over half its value against the dollar since last Dec. 21, 40 percent of it in the first months of the devaluation.

It crumbled by another 9.6 percent in October.

Nora Lustig, a Mexico expert and political scientist at the Brookings Institute in Washington D.C., noted that trading was light Friday and the low volume made the peso vulnerable to any negative news.


She added she was concerned about the source of the rumors that swept trading floors Friday morning and wondered whether it was planted to destabilize trading.

"In sum you have a market that is thin so rumors can cause troubles to that market," she said. "Did someone just start the rumors or is this a calculated strategy by someone who wants to purposely introduce instability in the Mexican economy? The latter if it's true, is very worrisome and one cannot rule it out at this point."

Mexico's military maintains a generally low profile. The last coup was in 1920 and the armed forces has traditionally remained subordinate to the Institutional Revolutionary Party, which has governed Mexico since 1929.

In an unusual step, the army issued a statement Wednesday saying it supported Zedillo's recovery efforts.

Tourists to be new 'inmates' at former state penitentiary

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (AP) — The most dangerous weapon they're packing these days at the West Virginia Penitentiary in Moundsville is a 35 mm.

Camera, that is.

Hallways once walked by the state's most hardened criminals are being reopened to tourists, and Moundsville city officials hope the short-timers will give a lift to an economy that was hurt when the prison's less-desirable visitors moved out.

"We feel it's our future," said Phil Remke, chairman of the Moundsville Economic Development Council. "It's going to put the biggest boost in our economy in a long time. I'm getting bus tours calling me like crazy."

Folks who want a peek at the electric chair where 11 men were put to death or the room where a deadly riot erupted in 1986 can pay \$5 for a 45-minute tour of the Civil War-era prison, a fortress with 30-foot blackened sandstone walls.

"There is this mystique of actually seeing where these guys were housed," Remke said. "When you walk through there, you have a feeling of, 'Wow, this is really unbelievable how they stayed.'"

The maximum-security prison about 70 northwest of Morgantown was built in 1866 and ordered closed in 1988 by the state Supreme Court because of its deplorable living conditions. The last inmates were moved to another prison in March.

Officials had grappled for years with what to do with the prison, long one of chief employers in this Ohio River city of 10,700, about 50 miles southwest of Pittsburgh.

Turning it into a tourist attraction seemed like a good idea after 12,000 visitors in two months took weekend tours of the prison before it was sealed in June.

"We always knew there was something there," Remke said. "This is our home and we're not going to let it die on us."

Among the tour highlights will be "Old Sparky," the electric chair; North Hall, where the most dangerous convicts lived; murals painted by inmates; and weapons—guns used by guards, and crude tools confiscated from inmates.

Former guards will tell visitors tales of the prison, which once housed as many as 1,850 men in tiny 5-by-7-foot cells and where 94 were executed between 1899 and 1959.

It was the site of a New Year's

Day uprising in 1986 in which inmates took control of the prison for three days and killed three of their own. In 1992, three inmates tunneled out, burrowing 32 feet from the prison greenhouse. The tunnel was lighted and contained a 14-foot ladder made of pipes.

Public Safety Secretary Gen. Joseph Skaff said the state agreed to let the city use the prison "in whatever way they can to promote their economic viability" provided they take care of liability issues and the utilities.

"We want them to use it," Skaff said. "We'd like for them to put in a mall or Putt-Putt, take it over and make good use of it. That's all part of what we had hoped would happen."

Magazine's 'lost' wallets returned most in Seattle

SEATTLE (AP) - If there's such a thing as a good place to lose your wallet, Reader's Digest says it's Seattle.

The magazine left a trail of 120 "lost" wallets in 12 communities across the nation and kept track of how many were returned with the \$50 cash contents intact. Seattle had the best rate of return, nine in 10.

Despite the large role chance could play in such a small experiment, Mayor Norm Rice was ecstatic.

"Of all the No. 1 rankings that Seattle has received, this is the one that I'm the most proud of," Rice said.

Three small cities were the next best, with a score of eight in 10: Meadville, Pa.; Concord, N.H.; and Cheyenne, Wyo.

Of the two other big cities tested, St. Louis returned seven in 10 and Atlanta trailed with five in 10, according to the magazine's December issue.

Reader's Digest interviewed those who returned wallets. Some cited religion or ethics. Some said they were moved by the baby picture placed in each billfold.

The lone keeper in Seattle picked up a wallet left on a staircase in the downtown Pike Place Market, slipped it into his black fanny pack and was never heard from again.

"If we find that guy with the black fanny pack, we are going to take away his late privileges for an entire month," mayoral spokesman Mark Murray said.

Lottery commission proposes rules to ban selling of jackpots

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas Lotto jackpot winners who want to sell their future prize payments for cash-up front would be out of luck under a rule proposed Friday by the state Lottery Commission.

Commission members voted to publish and seek comment on a rule that would prohibit those who claim jackpots from transferring future prize payments to a third party "in exchange for consideration."

Final adoption of the rule could be considered as soon as 30 days after it's published in the Texas Register.

The proposal - which commission members say follows the "apparent intent" of state law - comes after several private companies approached some jackpot winners and offered to buy out all or part of their 20-year annual payments.

It also would affect winners such as Edgar "Bubba" Groce, a Cleveland, Texas, man who didn't set up a trust or partnership before he began collecting his winnings.

Groce has said he fears that if something happened to him and his wife, his heirs would be forced into bankruptcy because millions of

dollars in estate taxes would be due. The heirs wouldn't have immediate access to the money because the jackpot is paid out over two decades.

Groce has said he wanted commission rules clarified so he could alter his financial plan.

Commission spokesman Steve Levine said while the proposed rule would bar Groce from assigning his prize to someone else, "he still has the option of a variety of other financial measures."

Harriet Miers of Dallas, commission chairwoman, said the lottery agency encourages jackpot winners to seek legal and financial advice before claiming their prizes.

"We advise them that their prizes are not assignable - that their decision at the time they claim their prize is final," she said.

Texas lottery law states, "Except as otherwise provided by this subsection, the right of any person to a prize is not assignable. Payment of a prize may be made to the estate of a deceased prize winner. A prize to which a winner is otherwise entitled may be paid to any other person under an appropriate judicial order."

Companies hoping to buy out jackpot winners have contended the law would allow winners to sell their prizes as long as a judge approves the transaction.

The commission disagreed.

"I believe the Legislature intended to allow a prize to be assigned only as a result of certain types of judicial orders. I do not believe they intended, through a simple court blessing, an

assignment that otherwise is prohibited by the express language of the law," Ms. Miers said.

Allowing jackpot winners to sell their prizes could create problems for them and the state, Ms. Miers added.

She said the Internal Revenue Services is considering the tax implications of such a move, and that the state could face legal demands to pay the same prize more than once.

Couple claims winnings selected by cat, Skipper

AUSTIN (AP) - Skipper the cat could be lounging in the lap of luxury after the lucky feline picked the winning numbers in a recent \$3.7 million Texas Lotto drawing.

Linda McManamon, Skipper's Galveston owner, collected the first installment of her prize Friday. She said Skipper's playtime with a rattle netted the winning numbers for the Oct. 21 drawing.

"Skipper was playing with a rattle that has numbers in it and stopped

playing when it came up with the numbers that turned out to be the winners," Ms. McManamon said when she picked up a \$199,366.52 check at the Texas Lottery Commission.

Ms. McManamon will collect \$186,000 every Oct. 15 for the next 19 years for a total prize of \$3,729,366.52. She said she and her husband would plan a cruise and would treat Skipper to extra tuna treats.

Herd comes back to salvage tie with Canyon

The Hereford Whiteface football team fought back from a two-touchdown deficit to tie Canyon at 28-28, but that's the way Friday's game at Whiteface Stadium ended before a sparse crowd.

The tie officially eliminates both teams from the District 1-4-A playoff race. Hereford moved to 1-2-1 in district, 2-5-1 overall; Canyon is 2-2-1 and 4-4-1. With Randall's 17-6 loss to Caprock Friday, Borger (4-0) and Pampa (4-0) clinched playoff berths; they play Nov. 17, possibly for the outright district title.

The Herd drove to the Canyon nine-yard line in the final minute of Friday's game, but a holding penalty and Canyon's defensive pressure combined to prevent a game-winning touchdown. Then, forced to try a 42-yard field goal, Armando Zambrano missed badly after a low snap.

Hereford had driven 58 yards, but the holding penalty turned a second-down-and-goal situation at the nine-yard line into a second-and-goal at the 18.

Canyon sacked Herd quarterback Todd Dudley for a seven-yard loss on the next play - the ball popped out, but Dudley was ruled down. On third down, Dudley was hit as he threw, and the ball fell incomplete.

"(The penalty) changed the

momentum," Hereford coach Danny Haney said. "We not only gave up the penalty, but we gave up a sack where we had to kick a 40-plus-yard field goal to win it."

Canyon got the ball back, and Eagle quarterback Brent Horton got loose for a 25-yard run to the Canyon 39-yard line. He was sacked on the next play - the last play of the game - by Herd tackle Michael Kriegshauser.

The Herd players were glad to come back from a 28-13 deficit late in the third quarter, but they weren't thrilled with the tie.

"We should have won," said Kriegshauser, a team captain. "We overcame a lot of adversity just to bring it up to a tie. Not that I'm satisfied with a tie. It's like kissing your sister - there's not any way to feel about it."

Hereford failed to stop Canyon's wishbone, as the Eagles rolled up 350 yards rushing, with only 13 yards passing. Quarterback Horton, who played seventh grade football for Hereford Junior High, ran for 138 yards. Halfback Cory Stone rushed for 120 yards and fullback Jared Wright added 71.

"They really weren't hard-nosed, they just used tricks," Kriegshauser said. "Horton does a good job hiding the ball. It sometimes gets you confused, gets you off your

(assignment)."

"They did a few things different with the countersweep," Haney said. "They went outside with (Stone). We lost perimeter support a couple of times that really hurt us where they got first downs."

"We had trouble stopping their quarterback and fullback," Haney continued. "They hurt us on possession downs, and really on first downs. They had lots of second-and-threes, second-and-fours. That puts you in a bind and helps the offense."

On the other side, Canyon failed to stop Hereford's balanced offense.

The Herd had a net rushing total of 168 yards: tailback Marquise Brown ran for 199 yards, but Dudley was sacked or tackled for losses seven times for minus-39 yards.

Dudley hit 13-of-20 passes for 148 yards and a touchdown, though his one interception cost Hereford a chance to score right before halftime.

Ronald Torres, the leading receiver in District 1-4-A, caught five passes for 67 yards.

Brown ran for nine yards, and facemasking penalty move the ball five

more yards to the seven-yard line. Fullback Josh Urbanczyk ran for four yards, then Brown took it in from three yards out. John Marty Galan kicked the extra point.

Canyon answered with an impressive touchdown drive that went 81 yards in 12 plays. Only one play was a pass, when Stone came out of the backfield and went deep and was uncovered; he dropped Horton's pass.

Canyon recovered with the help of a 33-yard run by Wright to the Herd 14-yard line. Wright ran one yard for the score five plays later. Nick Dolle kicked the extra point to tie it up at 7-7 with 1:56 left in the first quarter.

Torres returned the ensuing kickoff 24 yards, and a 15-yard facemask penalty pushed the ball to the Herd 47-yard line. The Herd needed only four plays, including receptions of 13 and 16 yards by Skiles and a twisting, 21-yard touchdown run by Brown. Galan missed the PAT, but Hereford

led 13-7 with 24 seconds left in the first quarter.

Canyon struck quickly again. On the first play of the next possession, Horton ran 75 yards to the Herd six, where Herd cornerback Joseph Artho tackled him after Artho was nearly blocked by an out-of-position referee.

Three plays later, Justin Ziegler scored on a one-yard run, and Dolle's kick gave Canyon the lead at 14-13.

The scoring pace slowed after that. Dolle tried a 55-yard field goal with less than a minute left in the half. At that distance - which is tough for an NFL kicker - Dolle was accurate but the ball fell on the end line.

Hereford took over with less than 30 seconds left in the half, but Dudley-Torres strikes of 14 and 13 yards, plus a pass interference penalty on Canyon, got the ball to the Eagles' 23-

Lady Whitefaces pound EP Parkland, 15-3, 15-5

The Lady Whitefaces volleyball team went through some early playoff jitters, but those didn't show up in the final score.

Despite slow starts in both games, Hereford beat El Paso Parkland 15-3, 15-5 in a second-round playoff match Friday night in Odessa.

Hereford, ranked No. 1 in Class 4A, improved to 26-3. The Herd will play the winner between Sherman and Snyder, probably on Tuesday. Sherman and Snyder were to play Saturday in Cisco.

Parkland, the champions of District 3-4-A, ended the season 25-8.

"We were a little nervous at first and made some nervous errors," Hereford coach Brenda Reeh said. "We sided out with them early in the match, and early in the second game. Once the hitters and blockers settled in, we dominated at the net."

Middle hitter Danielle Cornelius led the Herd with seven kills and four stuff blocks. The two-time all-state selection outplayed Parkland's best player, middle hitter Cindy Austin.

"Danielle absolutely stifled their middle hitter," Reeh said.

Hereford led only 5-3 after seven serving rotations in the first game. The Herd got it going on the eighth rotation, Reeh said, with Heather Hodges serving during a seven-point run for a 12-3 lead. Hodges had two aces during the run.

The second game went much the same way. Hereford scored two points during the first six rotations, then Julie Rampley served during a nine-point run, recording two aces.

"She served tough," Reeh said. "We got quite a few free balls back, and they (Parkland) were setting from behind the 10-foot line. Danielle had a monster block

off pretty much the only good pass they had during that run."

Hereford had only three hitting errors in the match, Reeh said. The Herd's kill percentage was an excellent .426 - meaning that the Lady Whitefaces recorded a kill 43 percent of the times they hit the ball.

Corsicana takes its 500th victory

DALLAS (AP) - The fact that Corsicana scored its 500th-ever victory the same night Celina coach G.A. Moore's earned his 300th career win underscores his achievement.

Moore reached his milestone Friday night at Celina, the top team in Class 3A, beat S&S Consolidated. Playoff-bound Celina now braces for archival No. 7 Pilot Point in Friday's season finale.

Moore has compiled a 300-61-9 mark as in a coaching career that winded through Celina, Pilot Point, Sherman and Bryson before returning to Celina. He has won three state championships - Pilot Point in 1980 and '81, and during his previous Celina stint in 1974.

Only Gordon Wood, with 405 victories, and Ray Atkins, with 324, have won more high school football games in Texas than Moore, the

winningest active coach.

Corsicana, which got a few decades' head start on Moore, did some celebrating of its own Friday. Class 4A's No. 2 team defeated Athens 28-14 for the school's 500th career win.

The Tigers became the 12th in state history to win so many games. Ballinger reached 500 in Week 4.

As so often over the past four years, running back Ketric Sanford paced the way for Corsicana, scoring three touchdowns and gaining 227 yards on the ground, his eighth 200-yard-plus rushing game this season.

In Class 5A, the No. 3 Plano Wildcats suffered a stunning 38-7 defeat at the hands of another ranked 5A team, No. 4 Richardson Lake Highlands.

Marcus Stiggers single-handedly brought down mighty Plano. The quarterback was responsible for five

touchdowns, including a 90-yard kickoff return to erase his team's only deficit of the season.

Stiggers rushed for three scores and passed for another as Lake Highlands solidified itself as a conference power this season.

The state's No. 1 5A team, Tyler John Tyler, was scheduled to play Saturday afternoon against Longview.

Most other top-ranked teams coasted with easy victories. La Marque overpowered Santa Fe 59-0 in 4A and Sealy shut down La Grange 31-0 in 3A. Thorndale, No. 1 in 1A, was the only top-ranked team to yield a point in a 48-15 victory over Granger.

Bangs, which one two games last season, can wrap up its first district title since 1969 with a victory Friday over Hamilton. Meanwhile, Goldthwaite slips to 7-2 and needs to beat Early next week to ensure a playoff berth.

Two other teams ranked in The Associated Press high school poll lost Friday: 4A No. 7 Cedar Hill and Class A No. 6 Robert Lee.

Everman's James Polk found C.K.

Anderson for a TD on a fourth-and-9 pass from the Cedar Hill 22 with 5:15 left to pull out a 14-10 comeback victory.

Robert Lee fell 17-7 to the team directly behind it in the poll, No. 7 Roscoe. The Plowboys managed to make two first-quarter scores hold up, breaking Robert Lee's 33-game undefeated streak. The Steers' deepest second half penetration just made it to Roscoe's 47.

Monday Night upset could revive fizzled Dallas-Philadelphia rivalry

IRVING, Texas (AP) - There's nothing wrong with the Dallas-Philadelphia rivalry that a good old fashioned upset on Monday night wouldn't cure.

The Cowboys have won six consecutive games over the Eagles and some of the fizz has gone out of the series since the days Jimmy Johnson coached Dallas and Buddy Ryan coached Philadelphia.

There hasn't been a wild incident since Eagles' fans threw snowballs with batteries in them at Johnson in Veterans Stadium.

Perhaps new Eagles coach Ray Rhodes, who was the defensive coordinator for the San Francisco 49ers, can get something going. Rhodes doesn't like Dallas and has been an assistant coach for each of the 49ers five Super Bowl winners.

Rhodes was the mastermind behind the San Francisco defense in last January's 38-28 NFC championship game win.

"Anytime you play in prime time I think it juices your whole team up," Rhodes said. "We have a lot of guys that are looking forward to playing prime time football. I think it brings a little extra to the table. I think everybody gets a little bit more excited about a prime time game because your peers see the game."

The game will feature a quarterback who knows a lot about the Cowboys, Rodney Peete. Ironically, Peete led Dallas to a victory over the Eagles in Veterans Stadium last year when he subbed for

an injured Troy Aikman. Peete hit 10 of 17 passes for 172 yards, including a touchdown as Dallas clinched the NFC East division title with a 31-19 win.

Peete, who was signed as a free agent by the Eagles when the Cowboys decided to go with Wade Wilson, said "it would be a fun game to win. I know all those guys. It would be great to go out there and put one over on them."

Peete has won all four games since Rhodes inserted him into the lineup. But he hasn't been faced with an obstacle like the one he has on

Monday night against the two-touchdown favorite Cowboys.

Dallas has tied Kansas City with the best record in the NFL for the first half of the season at 7-1. The Eagles are second in the NFC East with a 5-3 record.

Dallas, which is 25-20 on Monday Night Football, are 43-27 against the Eagles. Philadelphia last defeated Dallas on Oct. 5 in 1992 with a 31-7 win at the Vet on MNF. The Eagles have beaten the Cowboys in three of their last four meetings on Monday night.



Zeier says all right things

CLEVELAND (AP) - Eric Zeier is a walking cliché, a fellow who's either too smart or too friendly to say what's really on his mind.

It's a characteristic that has defused a potentially divisive situation in Cleveland, where the rookie from Georgia has seamlessly moved into the starting quarterback's job previously occupied by Vinny Testaverde.



Agents cause big problems for college sports

TCU, Alabama, Southern California suffering because of illegal agent activity

FORT WORTH, Texas - A college athletic director's biggest worry used to be trying to keep overzealous boosters from illicitly rewarding the school's top football players and sinking the program.

Today, the money's still there, but the source has changed. And TCU, which once turned itself in under the old scenario, is experiencing a close encounter with the latest scourge to hit college athletics: unscrupulous agents who offer financial inducements to professional prospects.

"It is THE No. 1 problem facing intercollegiate athletics, without a doubt," TCU athletic director Frank Windeger said. "It's like a damn cancer. It's all over the place."

NCAA officials and agents estimate that 75 to 90 percent of potential first- and second-round NFL and NBA draftees receive cash or gifts from agents or their representatives before completing their college eligibility.

TCU senior running back Andre Davis has missed the past two games for accepting monetary benefits from former teammate Jimmy Oliver. There are also allegations of involvement with sports agent Jeffrey Newport of Houston. NCAA rules forbid players with eligibility remaining to retain an agent or to receive cash or gifts with repayment based on future earnings potential as a pro athlete.

Powerless to prosecute agents, the NCAA stands by helplessly as college standouts are seduced by agents hoping to cash in when the player turns pro.

Agents and their "runners," who are paid to recruit pro prospects, compete just as fiercely as the players on the field. Cash. Gifts. Cars. Insurance policies. Whatever it takes seems to be the motto.

"For agents and runners, improper inducements are the cost of doing business," said Edward King, attorney for former-runner-turned-NCAA-informant Jesse Martinez. "The schools and players are held hostage by the agents. If a school pursues a case vigorously, they could lose the player; if they don't or the NCAA finds the school to be at fault, the school goes on probation."

"When a player accepts money from an agent, the agent can hold a gun on the player: 'If you ever tell anybody about the money I gave you, I'll turn you in.'"

Agents bank on getting that money back with the player's first pro contract.

This year's NFL first-round draft picks signed for an average of \$1.2 million, including bonuses, and agents normally collect a 4 percent fee on pro contracts. Chicago-based agent Steve Zucker, for instance, made \$750,000 on the \$18 million, seven-year contract he secured for Washington Redskins wide receiver Michael Westbrook, the fourth player selected.

It isn't only first-round picks who are wooed, however. Scouts rate Davis, the Southwest Conference's leading rusher, as a late-round pick or undrafted free agent because of his lack of speed.

Southern California junior running back Shawn Walters from Arlington Lamar, also a marginal NFL prospect, has been suspended since Sept. 28 because of allegations he accepted \$16,000 from agent Robert Troy Caron. Two other Trojans also missed games amid reports they received gifts from Caron.

Nebraska junior running back Lawrence Phillips was reinstated to

the team last week after a six-week suspension he received for physically attacking his girl friend. He told an Omaha radio station that agents called him during his suspension and promised \$100,000 if he would leave school and sign a contract.

In August, Alabama's football program was placed on NCAA probation for the first time because of problems stemming from Antonio Langham signing with an agent while he was eligible.

Zach Thomas is as wary of a ringing telephone as he is of a blind-side crack-back block.

Despite his selection to several pre-season All-American teams, the Texas Tech middle linebacker doesn't believe he'll be a first-round draft pick. But that doesn't keep the people who want to be his agent from calling.

"As soon as I got recognized as an All-American, they started coming after me," he said. "As soon as you answer the phone, they act like they've talked to you about 30 times. They get to talking.... They all say how much money they've made for guys who they represent."

"You get the feeling that they're trying to trap you, telling you how much money they've given to other people."

NCAA president Gene Corrigan said: "Controlling access of agents to players is a tremendously difficult problem. This is an issue that's creating an enormous amount of anguish and worry in our institutions."

In many cases, agents hire runners - liaisons who are trying to get their cut from a future pro contract by connecting agents with student-athletes to make first contact with a potential client. Runners are usually young ex-athletes who blend in on a college campus. They allow an agent to avoid direct contact with a player, and provide an easy conduit to forward cash and gifts to a player.

"They provide cash, they wire money, they provide beepers, cellular telephones, they wire cash, they take 'em out to eat," an NCAA investigator said. "If they provide 'em cars, it's usually older cars that might not draw as much attention as newer cars."

Malcolm McInnis, director of compliance at Tennessee, said using a runner keeps an agent from getting caught.

"As an agent, you don't even have to physically be in the state," he said. "You say be on the look for agents, but what if they never leave their offices in New York or Los Angeles. The runner theoretically could be anybody. He could be doing it today and start tomorrow and then not doing it the next day. They don't wear a sign or wear black hats."

Last season, Texas offensive tackle Blake Brockermeyer of Fort Worth - who made himself eligible for the NFL draft before his senior year - was walking off the practice field when he was approached by a runner who invited Brockermeyer to dinner so he could meet an agent.

"It's like being recruited all over again, but it's more intense," said Kae Brockermeyer, Blake's father, who collected 16 boxes of letters and brochures sent by prospective agents.

"Blake probably didn't have as many problems with the agents because they knew his daddy was an attorney."

Some runners obtain players' class schedules, find out when they lift weights, meet them at their favorite night clubs. Or, they get close to the players' families or friends, or even pay other students to approach the athletes.

"They act like they know so much about you," Thomas said. "This is your address, this is your parents'

address, this is your time in the 40 the last time you ran, this is how much you bench press."

"The thing is, man, is they're not even supposed to be calling us. I don't see how they get our numbers. Mine's not listed. I screen my calls now. I'm trying to just stay away from 'em."

With the NCAA following leads furnished by Martinez, there is a red alert in athletic departments nationwide.

"When you hear something like this, even at other schools, a chill runs down the spine of any administrator," said Chris Plonsky, assistant athletic director at Texas. "It's: 'How in the hell could this happen?' Well, clearly, you're not with the players 24 hours a day."

Texas is one of 22 states with laws dealing with sports agents. But a law on the books doesn't translate to catching crooks. Limited funding prevents a concerted effort to enforce every law.

"This is not a high priority for the states that have these laws," said Ron Maestri, chairman of the NCAA's Sports Liaison Committee. "We talked with some people from the attorney-general's offices in those states, and they're underfunded. It's not like they have a whole department and staff that can track down leads and investigate tips on agents."

Recently, the Texas Legislature toughened the law by granting subpoena power in order to obtain evidence to help enforce the agent law. Texas law requires agents to register with the Secretary of State's office, pay a \$100 annual fee and post a \$100,000 bond if the agent handles

an athlete's finances. A violation is a civil penalty with a fine up to \$25,000.

"What Texas requires is that an athlete-agent must register with our office before he can contact a football or basketball student-athlete who is eligible to compete at a state college or university," said Guy Joyner of the secretary of state's office. "But as with any law enforcement, it comes down to discovering the violation and then gathering proof."

Some college officials say the NFL and NBA players unions have the power to control agents, but seemingly choose to ignore the problem. To represent players, agents must be certified with the players' unions; the NFL association has about 600 registered agents, and the NBA association 315.

However, neither union has punished an agent in this decade for paying a college player.

"The players associations could have a major impact on this," said former Baylor coach Grant Teaff, executive director of the American Football Coaches Association. "They could decertify agents, but they've got legal considerations to deal with, and I've been told they don't want to cross agents that are representing their members. It's a mess."

So individual universities are left to protect their athletes, through education, and, on at least one recent occasion, legal action.

Many try to educate their student-athletes about the agent game; 125 schools have NCAA-approved career counseling panels that advise athletes. And some schools set up workshops where agents meet with students in a supervised setting.

During spring practice, Texas A&M sets aside time for agents to meet with seniors-to-be.

"We try to disseminate information about agents and be a buffer between the agents and the athletes," said John

Thomson, Texas A&M assistant athletic director for student services and chair of the school's career counseling panel.

The family of Texas A&M junior running back Leeland McElroy has told him to refer calls from agents or runners to his older brother, Lee, who is athletic director at Cal State-Sacramento.

"Leeland hasn't been bothered too much by these people because I think the word has gotten through the network," Lee McElroy said. "We're making it clear that anyone who attempts to contact him without going through the appropriate channels, we will prosecute."

Southern Cal didn't hesitate to take legal action. A week after suspending Walters, linebacker Errick Herrin and defensive end Israel Ifeanyi, the school filed suit against Caron, charging that he induced athletes to violate NCAA

regulations. The suit was settled out of court, with Caron paying the school \$50,000.

"We wanted to provide some downside for the agents," USC general counsel Robert Lane said. "Usually, the agents would walk away and leave the university and the athlete with the

downside."

King supports such legal action as a way to throw some of the profit motive back at the problem.

"If Florida State goes on probation over the Foot Locker shopping spree, then I think the school should sue the agents that were involved," said King, who has been consulting with the NCAA on the agent-athlete issue for the past eight years. "I think some lawsuits against some of these agents will get their attention real quick."

Texas lawmakers find information superhighway

Five House members have established pages on World Wide Web

WASHINGTON (AP) - A handful of Texans in Congress are boldly exploring a new frontier: the Internet.

Call it what you will - the information superhighway, cyberspace, the infobahn - the Texans say it's yet another way to stay in touch with their constituents.

House Speaker Newt Gingrich may be the high priest of the Third Wave, futurist Alvin Toffler's term for the age of computers and information, but to date, fewer than 80 of the House's 435 members have dipped their toes in the cybersurf.

Five of Texas' 30 House members are among the Internet pioneers, having set up "home pages" on the Net's World Wide Web.

Click on their home pages and you'll be able to peruse everything from dry speeches, biographies and press releases to facts about the

district and handy information for tourists when visiting the nation's capital. The menu offered by Rep. Joe Barton, R-Ennis, even includes a complete staff directory with a breakdown of each aide's responsibilities.

You'll also learn about some of the members' after-hours interests. For example, the home page for Rep. Ken Bentsen, D-Houston, allows visitors to link to his favorite Internet sites: the Grateful Dead, CNN and the Houston Rockets.

House Majority Leader Dick Armey's home page starts off on a serious note. "The information revolution is giving Americans more access to knowledge and their leaders than ever before," says a letter from the Irving Republican.

But that stiff greeting is quickly offset by a glimpse into some of Armey's passions - everything from fishing and red pickup trucks to some

of his fondest Web links under "Armey's Fun Links."

Click on the "Fun Links" (located next to a caption "All work and no play make Dick a dull boy") and you'll be able to jump to home pages touting the Dallas Cowboys, singers Jerry Jeff Walker and Jimmy Buffett and the Country Music Fan Page.

Lest anyone think Armey is all frivolity, his home page also links to the far more sober-minded "Flat Tax Home Page" - a major political issue for the one-time professor of economics.

Jump to the Flat Tax page and read about the "revolutionary plan to restore freedom and fairness to federal taxation" and "depressing facts about the current tax structure."

Armey's home page is rivaled only by Barton's in computer sophistication and number of photographs showcasing them.

Tap onto Armey's Web site and see a photo of the House Republicans' No. 2 in what appears to be a near-embrace with a wide-mouth bass - though with the grainy resolution of computerized photos, it's hard to tell. Then, there are six Armey "action shots" - Armey with Gingrich, Armey on the House floor, Armey surrounded by reporters, etc.

Barton, who earlier this year served on a task force to make the House more computer-accessible, also places great stock in photos. There's an official Barton portrait, Barton and family, Barton in the Oval Office with President Bush, Barton on the Capitol steps with constituents, Barton and Gingrich.

By contrast, San Antonio Republican Lamar Smith could almost be termed camera-shy. His home page boasts only one official portrait, though it offers six color snapshots of his district, including photos of a field of bluebonnets, San Antonio's Riverwalk and the Alamo.

The final Texas House member on the Internet, Houston Democrat Gene

Green, favors simplicity: several identical graphics of the Lone Star flag.

Barton, for one, believes the Internet is the wave of the future in dealing with constituents.

"I think over time it will become the dominant communications medium," he said in a recent interview. "It's simply a question of getting more and more people wired in and comfortable."

Seventeen percent of adults in the United States and Canada - approximately 37 million people - have access to the Internet at home or work, according to a new study.

Five percent of Barton's mail is coming via the Internet, a fairly sizeable amount considering that his home page went up at the start of October.

For now, Barton's staff is replying to computer e-mail by "snail mail" - the U.S. Postal Service.

"This allows people to get information from all over the country much more easily," said Barton, noting that his role as chairman of a key oversight subcommittee with jurisdiction over the Food and Drug Administration and other agencies may be of interest to people well outside his district.

The state's two senators are lagging behind their more adventurous House counterparts, though GOP Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison does have an e-mail address for constituents who wish to contact her office by computer.

Hutchison press secretary Miss Tessier estimated that the senator's office receives 800 to 1,000 messages on the Internet each week - some 250 to 300 of which originate in Texas. Replies are done by letter, not e-mail.

"It's a growing component of our overall constituent communication service," Ms. Tessier said.

Mrs. Hutchison ventured onto the Internet herself earlier this year, taking

part in a week-long chat with women across the country on the Prodigy on-line service. "We got everything from 'You're doing a great job' to 'How do you feel about domestic violence?' to 'How do you feel about the situation in Bosnia?'" Ms. Tessier said.

Although Republican Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, has yet to make his Senate office computer-accessible, his presidential campaign has a glitzy

home page, full of patriotic flag graphics and red-white-and-blue imagery.

Congress is far from the only government branch making inroads on the Internet. These days, federal agencies of all stripes are getting their own home pages, attracted by the low cost and relative ease of posting information there for the public.

Children who learn unacceptable behavior at home need influence of good role models

DEAR ANN LANDERS: A while back, I read a letter in your column I will never forget. It was about a boy who had entered a pig at the Tyler, Texas, county fair. His pig was too light to qualify so the boy rammed a water hose down its throat and "fattenet" it up until it was 10 pounds heavier. The pig died minutes later.

Now it appears that incident wasn't as bizarre as I thought. At a Denver stock show recently, a 16-year-old entered a black steer that won the blue ribbon and brought in \$37,500 at auction. His victory, however, was short-lived. Within a few days, the winner had to give back the blue ribbon and the \$37,500. The judges discovered that the steer had been fed an illegal steroid-like substance called clenbuterol. The

boy's parents admitted responsibility. Other exhibitors of livestock have, in the past, been caught using cosmetic surgery to trim down a steer's flabby neck, injecting air under the animal's skin with a bicycle pump to give it a smoother look, and gluing on wig hair to fill out an animal's bony legs.

Wait, there's more. Last September, at an Arkansas-Oklahoma state fair, a 16-year-old held the head of a lamb while his pal beat the animal severely so its body would swell and appear more firm to the judges. The officials say the blame lies with parents because they are teaching their kids it is OK to do anything to win. Some grand champion steers have sold for more than \$200,000.

and the money is enticing. One parent whose son's animal was rejected because it had been pumped up with clenbuterol offered this defense: "We have to make sure our kids get through college. Tuition is so darned high we need to make more money, and this is the best way to do it."

Anyone over 18 years of age is



To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My brother was diagnosed with mononucleosis. This diagnosis was later changed to viral encephalitis. Could you please explain the difference between the two illnesses? Symptoms? Transmission? Seriousness? Why the confusion? — D.R.

ANSWER: Yours is an important and timely letter, D.R. It is about this time of year, with schools filled with pupils, that we see a rise in mononucleosis. Also, your encephalitis question goes to the importance of distinguishing between the two illnesses.

Mono is common ailment, featuring sore throat, swollen lymph nodes, fatigue and an enlarged spleen at onset. The patient might complain of splitting headaches and fever, which are symptoms common to both mono and viral encephalitis, a brain infection.

Mono germs spread by way of infected saliva. Viral encephalitis spreads in numerous ways, such as from mosquito bites or by viruses inhabiting the human intestinal tract. The potential for spread from the digestive tract through blood circulation to the brain makes a viral encephalitis infection much more important than a case of mono.

We don't consider mono among the ominous diseases, although its recuperation stage can be problematical in an active youngster.

Despite potential serious complications of viral encephalitis, most patients recover fully.

I hope and trust your brother will be up and bugging you by the time you read this.

4-H News

With stock show season just around the corner, there are several events coming up that 4-H members need to be aware of. There will be many opportunities in the near future to improve your skills in the show ring. Listed below are some of the activities that are scheduled.

Show pig and lamb clinic

On Saturday, November 11, there will be a showmanship clinic held at the Little Bull Barn for lamb and pig showmen. We will cover topics such as selection, feeding, showmanship, grooming, exercising, and show preparation. The pig clinic will be in the morning from 8 a.m. until noon. The lamb clinic will begin at 1 p.m. the same afternoon. Pigs will be available for 4-H members to work with. Lamb feeders are encouraged to bring their own lambs if possible.

Stock Show Sign-up Night

Sign-up night is scheduled from 4 - 8 p.m. on Tuesday, November 14 in the Banquet room of the Community Center. All 4-H members planning to show at the Hereford Young Farmer's Show, Fort Worth, El Paso, San Antonio, Houston, or any other stock shows this year, must attend this important event. You need to bring your social security numbers with you when you come to sign-up.

Livestock Judging meeting

There will be a brief organizational meeting for those interested in judging livestock following the stock

show sign-up meeting. All members interested will need to meet at 8:30 p.m. at the Community Center. We will discuss judging practices and the upcoming stock show contests.

Jackpot Shows

There are several jackpot shows coming up for all species of show animals. These shows greatly improve skills that will benefit you in the show ring. Watch your newsletter for dates and times, or contact the office for more information.

Pig validation! Very Important

Validation is scheduled for November 20 and 21, at the Little Bull Barn. It is mandatory that you bring your show pigs to validation in order to show at any shows this year.

The pigs must be tagged, tattooed, and have their ear notches recorded by the validation committee in order to show at the County Show as well as the Major Livestock Shows. We will begin at 4 p.m. each afternoon and continue until 8 p.m. each evening.

If anyone needs more information about any of these activities, please contact Vance Christie at 364-3573. Also, if you would like more information about showing animals or any of the other 4-H programs, contact the County Extension Office.

Educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to all citizens without regard to race, color, sex, disability, religion, age, or national origin.

This law requires all private applicators to complete fifteen hours of continuing education credit by December 31, 1995 to keep their applicators license or certificate. Included in the 15 hours must be two hours of laws and regulations and one hour of integrated pest management. CEU's can be obtained at any training course that has been certified by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Beginning in January 1990, TDA developed a new category designated as licensed private applicators. These individuals received training from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, were required to pass an examination given by TDA, and required to pay a \$50 fee to qualify for the license.

The other categories of applicators are the commercial and non-commercial. These applicators must have passed a test administered by TDA in a variety of areas and must have five CEU's yearly to maintain license.

There is an option for certified private applicators in lieu of obtaining the 15 hours. This category of applicator may become a licensed private applicator by taking the necessary training and passing the TDA exam. There is a \$50 fee to obtain this license.

Producers with questions concerning the status of their CEU hours should contact the Regional office of the Texas Department of Agriculture in Amarillo at (806) 358-7285.

Applicators needing CEU hours may want to take advantage of a training course offering 5 hours of CEU credit on Friday, November 10

Excellent conditions help in beet harvest

Holly Sugar Inc., one of Hereford's leading agricultural industries, is presently harvesting more than 20,000 acres of sugarbeets.

Dennis Printz, Holly's agricultural manager, said the harvest is looking good.

"It's been an excellent harvest due to the good weather," he said. "But, a little moisture would not hurt us either."

The Holly Sugar plant harvests only what it can process. Currently, they are moving 15,000 tons a day from area fields to the Hereford processing plant. Printz said the company never let beets sit more than two days at a time.

The tonnage is running about average for this time of year.

"We presently are seeing 20 tons per acre," he said. "The sugar content has been very good, however."

The average sugar levels have been about 15 percent which is about .03 percent higher than usual for this stage of harvest.

The factory, which processes about 7,500 tons of sugarbeets per day, has noticed the improved, higher content of sugar this year, he said.

The sugarbeet crop has not had significant problems this year and ground conditions for the harvest have been favorable.

The only problem experienced by producers this year was curly top, which Printz said is a sugarbeet disease caused by the beet leaf-hopper.

"The curly top was not widespread, but it did hurt some producers," he said.

The plant anticipates the harvest to be 30 percent complete by Sunday.

"We will hopefully be finished by Thanksgiving," he said. "It is all looking good. The Dalhart area looks very promising."

Harvest in Artesia began on Oct. 16, and is now complete. The sugarbeets in that area were brought in by train.

Agriculture Briefs

WASHINGTON (AP) - Global warming could cause geographic shifts in agricultural production, but the level of food production in the United States and the world should remain stable, a government report says.

A worldwide warming trend forecast by scientists would increase temperatures in mountainous regions, making more land suitable for farming and forestry, the Agriculture Department study said.

But warmer weather in the tropics and some other areas would reduce moisture in the soil, making some of that land unsuitable for agriculture production, it said.

Overall, the amount of crop land worldwide would see a net increase; however, production would be affected.

Extension Agent's Notes

County Extension Agent - Ag. Time is running out for those agricultural producers that hold Private Pesticide Applicators License and Certificates to complete the continuing education requirements to comply with Texas Pesticide Certification Laws.

This law requires all private applicators to complete fifteen hours of continuing education credit by December 31, 1995 to keep their applicators license or certificate. Included in the 15 hours must be two hours of laws and regulations and one hour of integrated pest management. CEU's can be obtained at any training course that has been certified by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Beginning in January 1990, TDA developed a new category designated as licensed private applicators. These individuals received training from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, were required to pass an examination given by TDA, and required to pay a \$50 fee to qualify for the license.

The other categories of applicators are the commercial and non-commercial. These applicators must have passed a test administered by TDA in a variety of areas and must have five CEU's yearly to maintain license.

There is an option for certified private applicators in lieu of obtaining the 15 hours. This category of applicator may become a licensed private applicator by taking the necessary training and passing the TDA exam. There is a \$50 fee to obtain this license.

Producers with questions concerning the status of their CEU hours should contact the Regional office of the Texas Department of Agriculture in Amarillo at (806) 358-7285.

Applicators needing CEU hours may want to take advantage of a training course offering 5 hours of CEU credit on Friday, November 10

Annual Festival of Trees highlights beginning of Christmas season

An idea begun at last year's Festival of Trees as a tribute to a departed friend, this year takes its place as a continuing feature of the 1995 Festival of Trees.

The sixth annual Festival of Trees will be held Nov. 16-19 in the Hereford Senior Citizens Center, 426 Ranger.

Last year, "Homer's Tree" debuted at the Festival, a wooden Christmas tree mounted to one wall and lit with bright lights to recognize donations.

Homer's Tree was created in tribute to Homer Garrison, a long-

time supporter of the center who had died in December 1993.

People attending the Festival made donations in Garrison's name, and those gifts were acknowledged with lights on the tree.

This year, said director Margie Daniels, Homer's Tree becomes the Memorial Tree and serves as a place for people to honor loved ones through financial donations.

Donors making financial gifts to the center will be recognized with a light on the Memorial Tree, which will again be mounted on one wall of the senior center.

Names of honorees and donors will

be posted next to the tree, Mrs. Daniels said. That list will be updated daily to honor those giving in the names of others.

Donor amounts and their corresponding tree lights are:

- Green light, \$10 to \$99.
- Blue light, \$100 to \$249.
- Red light, \$250 to \$499.
- Gold light, \$500 to \$1,000.

The Memorial Tree was put up last week and donations will accepted through the Festival.

The Festival of Trees -- begun in 1990 to serve as a major fund-raiser for the senior center -- marks the beginning of the holiday season at the center.

The centerpiece of the event is the display of 26 beautifully-decorated artificial Christmas trees.

The trees are sponsored by area companies for \$500 per tree. Some are sponsored by one company, while others have two firms splitting the gift. Another category of tree, the Super Tree, takes a \$1,000 donation.

This year, Stevens Chevrolet-Oldsmobile is sponsoring the only Super Tree of the festival.

The artificial trees are provided by the Senior Center. The regular trees are 6-1/2 to 7 feet tall, while the Super Tree stands 9 feet tall.

Decorations for the trees are provided by individuals, businesses, school groups and service clubs.

"They do it as a service," Mrs. Daniels said. "They furnish their decorations and decorate the trees."

Decorators also determine what theme will be used for their tree.

The trees are auctioned during the first night of the Festival, at the conclusion of the Festival Gala.

This year, the Gala will be from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Thursday, Nov. 16. The auction will start at 8 p.m.

Last year, the auction of trees netted the center \$27,295, with one tree -- a Super Tree sponsored by Stevens Chevrolet-Oldsmobile and decorated by Terry's Floral and Design -- sold for \$2,325 to First United Bank of Dimmitt and Frontier Capital of Dimmitt.

The total last year was a record for the Festival, topping the 1993 figure

of \$20,700 and the \$15,660 raised in the 1992 auction.

In fact, the total from last year's tree auction was more than \$10,000 above what was raised through the entire Festival in 1990, the first year it was held.

Last year, several thousand people turned out for the four-day Festival to look at the trees, vote on which they liked the best and take part in numerous other Festival activities.

This year there will be something for everyone beginning at 8:30 a.m.

on Thursday and concluding at 4 p.m. on Sunday.

Activities include children's programs, a Lionel train exhibit, holiday bazaar and children's



In dry, treeless West Texas, Christmas trees weren't always available, Mrs. Schulte pointed out.

Dorene Rose spent her early life in a part of Texas that had more vegetation so her memories of Christmas are a bit different.

"We had lots of mistletoe," she said, "because of the trees around Stamford, where we lived."

High on the list of most little girls

at holiday time were dolls. According to several Hereford women, Christmas wouldn't have been Christmas if there had been a new doll in their stockings.

While fireworks in this day and age are coupled with Independence Day, years ago fireworks were a part of the Christmas celebration, too.

Mrs. Schulte said there always were firecrackers and other items to be lit on Christmas Day.

Christmas Eve was gift-opening time in the home of Dr. A.T. "Trow" Mims, in East Texas.

"We could count on getting new clothes," he said. "But, on Christmas morning, we'd find candy, fruit, nuts and firecrackers in our stockings."

His family usually went into the wood to find their Christmas tree, said Dr. Mims, now retired from a 40-year medical practice in Hereford.



Holiday dreams come true with help of local Red Cross volunteers

While Christmas to many means family times together, the fresh smell of a Christmas tree, brightly-colored presents and the promise of a hearty Christmas dinner, there are those for whom such a holiday is but a dream.

For those people, the Tri-Counties Chapter of the American Red Cross exists, ready to provide toys, clothing and a helping hand.

But the Red Cross needs a helping hand as well, said executive director Betty Henson.

"Of course, one of the things we always need is volunteers," she said, to help with the varying needs of the Red Cross.

"It's hard to get volunteers to help us" during the holiday season, Mrs. Henson said. Some workers are needed to gather, sort and prepare toys that will be given to needy children who otherwise might receive no Christmas presents this year.

Others are needed to deliver those toys in time for Christmas morning, while still others are needed to take a hand in the business paperwork that normally accumulates during the holidays.

In addition to the need for volunteers, the Red Cross is faced with other challenges as the holiday season begins.

"Right now we could certainly use some small-size children's coats," Mrs. Henson said, in sizes 2 through 10. Also needed is other clothing for emergencies, some other types of needs" that arise.

For homeless people and those who lose houses to disasters, the Red Cross provides "comfort kits."

"We have used up most of our comfort kits," Mrs. Henson said, noting that the Red Cross has need for these non-food items.

She said donations of the items are welcomed, or someone can put together some comfort kits themselves and give the finished items to the Red Cross.

Comfort kits should include the following items, most of which can be small containers of product:

toothbrush, toothpaste, comb, soap, disposable razor, shaving creme, deodorant, lotion and shampoo.

To help meet the physical needs of the needy at this time of year, the Hereford High School FFA will once again sponsor a food drive to replenish the Red Cross food supplies.

This drive, Mrs. Henson said, will begin in a couple of weeks.

In addition to donation of non-perishable food items, the Red Cross can use gifts of toilet tissue, shampoo, detergent, dish soap, toothbrushes and toothpaste.

While many items are needed by the Red Cross, the things that will be in great demand this Christmas are toys and children's items.

Last year, Mrs. Henson said, the Red Cross gave toys to "somewhere between 700 and 800 kids" -- children who otherwise might not have received anything for Christmas.

Families in need of assistance with

Christmas toys may apply for help Nov. 13-17 from 10 a.m. to noon in the Community Center.

Sign-ups and toy deliveries are made in conjunction with the Christmas Stocking Fund to provide maximum advance for volunteer laborers.

Assistance with Christmas gifts for children is for "people who cannot provide Christmas gifts for their children" any other way, Mrs. Henson said.

Donations of toys and other children's items are needed from the community, Mrs. Henson said.

Carefully used toys, as we said last year, as well as coats or sweaters, or any other items that might be used as a gift," Mrs. Henson said.

"At this time of year we're not going to have a lot of time to do repairs" on toys, she said, so items given need to be in good, working order. They also need to be clean, she said, adding that donors might clean washable items with a bleach solution to disinfect them before taking them to the Red Cross.

"We generally have a cutoff age of 12," she said, for toys. However, if a family has several children, the oldest of which is 13 or 14, an exception may be made.

Toy donations need to be made by Dec. 18.

Mrs. Henson said anyone needing information on making donations, giving financial contributions or volunteering their time may stop by the Red Cross office, 224 S. Main, or call 364-3761.

Tips offered on selecting gifts of gold

rules" for purchasing gold.

Know your karats

*Always look for a karat mark when purchasing gold jewelry. It is usually stamped as 10K, 14K, 18K or 24K, but also could be stamped 417, 585, 750 or 999, which are the European equivalents.

*The karat mark indicates the percentage of pure gold in the piece. 24K is 100 percent gold. Gold is often alloyed with other metals, like copper, silver, nickel and zinc, to give it strength and durability. The higher the karatage, the more gold in the piece.

*Different proportions of metals added to pure gold give gold alloys their yellow, rose, green or white coloration. Most gold jewelry contains a mixture of at least two other metals.

Is the price right?

*Generally, the higher the karatage, the higher the price. Price also is affected by the total weight of the piece. So, all else being equal, a larger, heavier piece is likely to be more expensive than a smaller, lighter one.

*Superior design and construction come at a premium and make jewelry both easier to slip on and off and more comfortable to wear.

*Although nearly all gold jewelry today is made with the help of special machines, some handwork is always involved. The more there is, the higher the price will be.

*Ornamental detailing, like engraving or a special finish, will add to the cost.

*High polish: mirrorlike, bright, shiny, highly reflective

*Satin finish: light parallel lines sharply reduce the metal's reflections; soft and lustrous appearance

*Matte: velvetlike finish, without shine but having a soft luster

Christmas Stocking Fund assists families in need at holiday season

The annual Christmas Stocking Fund campaign will get underway soon in Hereford. CSF is a charity intended to help the less fortunate of the community during the Christmas holidays.

Applications for assistance from the 1995 CSF program for needy residents in Hereford and Deaf Smith County will be accepted daily beginning Monday, Nov. 13, and continuing through Friday, Nov. 17, at Hereford Community Center.

Interviews will be conducted from 10 a.m. to noon each day. Those seeking assistance from the holiday charity should apply in person and bring some form of identification in order to verify that they are a resident of Hereford or Deaf Smith County.

If applicants plan to ask for help with utilities or medical expenses, they should bring a receipt that provides the account number. For medical assistance, the name and address of both the doctor and hospital are required.

Filing an application does not guarantee that assistance will be extended, since CSF operates on contributions. With the funds available, the CSF committee attempts to reach the most needy persons first.

CSF serves the community's less fortunate regardless of race, color, age, religion, handicap, or national origin. CSF is not affiliated with any other organization. It is administered by an anonymous committee of volunteers who screen applications and arrange for distribution of food and vouchers.

Assistance from CSF is provided in various forms. This includes food as well as vouchers for clothing, utilities, and medical expenses.

CSF applications start Nov. 13 so that filing and processing of the forms and the distribution of assistance can be completed before Christmas. This allows volunteers to help those in

need and still have time to enjoy the holidays with their families.

The CSF program was started in 1980 when James Witherspoon proposed the project to Brand Publisher Speedy Nieman. Witherspoon noted he and many Hereford

residents had been sending donations to the Amarillo Christmas fund, and he thought it was time to start a local program.

Witherspoon volunteered his Sunday school class to administer the program, and Nieman agreed that The Hereford Brand would handle the fund raising and publicity campaign.

The original group of men gave up administration of the program in 1986, and several interested citizens formed a new CSF committee. Volunteers were enlisted to represent a broad cross-section of the community.

The program drew \$4,800 to help the needy the first year, and a total of approximately \$7,000 to \$8,000 was raised through 1985. The new, larger committee had \$10,571 to work with during its first year in 1986.

Funding for the program continued to rise and the monetary total went over \$20,000 in 1989. Generous residents have given from \$17,258 in '90 to a high of \$21,451 in '93. Last year's contributions amounted to \$18,414.

The Brand serves as the collection agency for cash donations to CSF, and the newspaper periodically publishes a list of contributors, along with a running total of the drive. Contributions traditionally start Thanksgiving week, but they will be accepted anytime after today.

Handmade ornaments offer personal touch

Throughout history, angels have been symbols of peace, protecting people and bearing good news. Perhaps that is the reason they have often been a favorite decoration in homes. Today, items with an angel, cherub and celestial motif are more popular than ever. You see them on ornaments, gift wrap, stationery, jewelry, hatboxes and more.

One simple craft project that is sure to lift your spirits during the holidays is an angel ornament, instructions courtesy of Design Originals.


Start with one 1-inch clear round Christmas tree ball ornament, 6 inches of $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch wide gold ribbon, a 6-inch-by-5-inch piece of white tulle with gold stars, 3 inches of gold Chenille stem, craft glue or a glue gun and glue sticks, and a stapler.

To create the angel's dress, cut a 3-inch-by-6-inch piece of tulle, and fold it into $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch pleats. Gather the material at one end, forming a cone shape, and glue the end together to form the top of the dress.

Then, cut a 2-inch-by-6-inch piece of tulle for the angel's wings. Fold the ends of the piece to the center, gather, making a bow, and staple so it's secure. Glue the wings to the top back of the angel's dress. Glue the clear bulb, which will serve as the angel's head, to the very top of the dress.

To finish, tie the gold ribbon into a bow, and glue onto the top of the dress. Bend the gold Chenille stem into a circle, creating a halo, with $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch ends. Twist the ends together, and use as the stem of the halo. Glue the stem to the back of the head.

Now, attach a small hook or looped ribbon to the back of your angel, and hang as an ornament on your Christmas tree. You can attach your angel to the top of the Christmas Nativity scene or make several and stand them up as decorations.

Recipes

(about 3 cups)
10 ounces mushrooms, sliced thin
(about 3 cups)
2 teaspoons dried sage
2 teaspoons dried thyme
1 teaspoon dried rosemary
1 teaspoon dried marjoram
1/4 cup sweet sherry
2 large eggs, lightly beaten
1 cup chicken or turkey stock or low sodium canned broth
1/2 cup heavy cream
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
8 cups dried bread cubes (French, sourdough, or whole wheat are good choices)
1/4 cup minced fresh parsley leaves

1. Heat butter in large skillet over medium high heat. Add celery and onions; sauté until softened, about 5 minutes. Add mushrooms; sauté until lightly golden and liquid evaporates, about 7 minutes. Add sage, thyme, rosemary and marjoram; sauté to blend flavors, 2 to 3 minutes. Add sherry; cook until reduced by half. Remove pan from heat; cool to room temperature.

2. Whisk eggs, stock, cream, salt, and pepper in large bowl. Add bread cubes, cooled vegetable mixture, and parsley; toss gently to mix.

3. Stuff turkey if desired; do so just before roasting. Turn remaining stuffing into buttered shallow baking dish; bake at 350 degrees, covered with buttered aluminum foil, until knife inserted into center feels warm to the touch, 25 to 40 minutes depending on amount of stuffing. Uncover and bake until top crisps slightly, 5 to 10 minutes.

CORNBREAD-APPLE STUFFING

Makes about 11 cups

8 ounces bacon, fried crisp, dried, and cut crosswise into 1/2-inch pieces, reserving 4 tablespoons drippings (optional)
4 tablespoons butter, plus extra for baking dish and foil
2 medium onions, chopped coarse (about 2 cups)
2 small stalks celery, chopped coarse (about 1 cup)
3 medium-large tart apples (such as Granny Smith), peeled and cut into 1/2-inch chunks (about 3 cups)
3 tablespoons minced fresh thyme
2 tablespoons minced fresh sage
2 large eggs, slightly beaten
1 cup heavy cream, chicken or turkey stock, or low-sodium canned broth
1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
4 cups dried French bread cubes
4 cups crumbled cornbread
1 cup pecans, toasted, and chopped coarse
1/4 cup minced fresh parsley leaves

1. Heat bacon drippings or butter in large skillet over medium-high heat. Add onions and celery; sauté until softened, about 5 minutes. Add apples begin to soften, 5 to 7 minutes longer. Remove pan from heat and cool moisture to room temperature.

2. Whisk eggs, cream or stock, salt, and pepper in large bowl. Add bread cubes, cornbread, cooked bacon, vegetable mixture, pecans, and parsley; toss gently to coat.

3. Bake in accordance with step 3 of Herb and Mushroom Stuffing.

Travel tips offered for winter vacations

It's a traveler's cliché: "Take half as many clothes and twice as much money."

Even better, take less, and more. Think lightweight and footloose.

The ideal would be to take a bar of soap and one change of clothes. If you're visiting any part of the civilized world, you can even skip the soap. Most destinations have drugstores (chemists, pharmacies, apothecaries), often stocking the same brands of soap, shaving cream, cosmetics and other products you're used to at home.

Less than ideal (say, you're concerned about dressing properly for theater or a lunch date), make sure everything in your bag coordinates with everything else. A good centerpiece is a cardigan sweater or a jacket, which can be worn with either of two shirts, which in turn can be worn with your jeans, slacks or skirt. Throw in a pair of dress shoes, a tie or minimal jewelry, and you're ready for most circumstances.

Don't bring T-shirts from home; you're likely to buy souvenir versions to proclaim your travels.

You're probably going to be on your feet outdoors a lot during your vacation, even if your destination is a city. So roomy, well-broken-in sneakers are essential. Hiking shoes also are worth taking along if you plan walking in fields or on trails; they can double as rainboots in most cases, and they're the footwear of choice when you're coping with luggage, train overpasses, airports, and subway stations. You'll also find a waterproof coated nylon jacket - the kind that can be folded up into a small packet - useful for wind, rain, and drops in temperature. Also pack a small folding umbrella.

If you're traveling in pairs or with family, share hairdryers, travel irons and other gadgets.

Try to limit everyone to one bag, the smaller the better. Experienced travelers often go with just their carry-ons.

Even with a carry-on, you'll fare better with a luggage cart, especially

if you're getting around on public transport on the ground.

Women's handbags should be any model offering the extra security of a zipper and/or flap, to discourage pickpockets from reaching passports, credit cards and other valuables. The same goes for shoulder bags or backpacks carried by either sex.

Read up on your destination ahead of time, and limit yourself to one basic travel guide on the road. Better yet, get printed flyers from tourist bureaus and discard them as you move from one stop to the next.

Take one camera you know is in good working order, along with a starter roll of film; buy more film along the way as you need it.

It's almost certain you'll want to shop at your destination. A curiosity is that you'll also want to find out where the post office is, and what its rules are, so you can send purchases home ahead and keep your bag-weight manageable. Theater programs, museum guides and similar souvenirs usually are printed on heavy-grade stock and can overload

your luggage. Pack up your accumulations every few days and send them home at the cheap printed matter rates available in most countries.

Things to leave at home: Fancy clothes, heavy books, full-size cosmetic containers, or extra supplies of anything you can buy on the road and later discard.


Before you leave, make a packing list and enter it into a computer file. When you get back, check it again and eliminate items you found you didn't use. Then save it and print it out when you're ready to travel again.



NBC's *She Fought Alone* deals with serious teen issue

Sexual harassment and rape are alarmingly common problems among teens and young adults today.

And NBC would like to increase people's awareness of this growing plight with *She Fought Alone*, a TV movie debuting Monday, Nov. 6.

Starring Tiffani-Amber Thiessen and Brian Austin Green (both of *Beverly Hills, 90210*), the film follows the story of a teen-ager and her struggle to deal with being raped and the resulting sexual harassment by her classmates afterward.

Thiessen portrays Caitlin Rose, a typical high-school student who just wants to fit in with the "in crowd." After passing a bunch of initiation tests (including a blatant takeoff of the movie *Carrie*), she is welcomed into the group.

Green stars as Ethan, captain of the football team and part of the popular group. Caitlin is instantly attracted to him and goes to all extremes to get him to like her, including sleeping with him.

Ethan's good friend, Jace (David Lipper), is attracted to Caitlin and makes a few passes at her. But when she refuses his advances, Jace becomes enraged and rapes her.

Because of Caitlin's somewhat promiscuous background, no one is really willing to believe her. Instead, the group rallies around Jace, including Ethan.

Classmates begin teasing Caitlin mercilessly, painting graffiti about her on the school walls and writing her telephone number in the boys' bathroom.

Because Jace is an important member of the school football team, the sports-oriented school officials choose to ignore Caitlin's problems.

Caitlin, with the support of her mother, played by Isabella Hofmann (*Homicide: Life on the Street*), presents the school with a citation for failing to stop the abuse.

The movie's premise is an important one: Every five minutes, a rape is reported in the United States, with teens and young adults as the most vulnerable age group, according to a network press release. And that number could be higher since many rapes may go unreported.

She Fought Alone does a fairly good job of confronting the issue of sexual harassment but little is done about the repercussions of rape.

The movie does deal with Caitlin's initial reaction — taking a long shower, missing school the next day and being examined by a doctor. But once this is over, the film turns its attention to the harassment activities of her classmates, and little time is spent on Caitlin's personal recovery.

Not much attention is given to the development of the victim's personality either. Thiessen is unable to define her character's identity in the course of the film, making it hard for viewers to feel sympathetic and easy to feel indifferent toward Caitlin.

Green doesn't have much to work with either, although he effectively conveys Ethan's dire need to escape the small-town life, an important aspect of this teen's character.

Hofmann, on the other hand, does give her character a feasible personality. The mother's own promiscuous past at first makes it hard for her to believe Caitlin's story. But gradually she comes to believe her daughter, and their relationship begins to deepen.

Despite the movie's weaknesses, it does put a serious issue in the spotlight.
