Following heavy rains in this section during the past week, 2.27 inches fell here Friday night to send Tierra Blanca Creek on a mad rampage. As flooded lands over this entire section emptied into the stream, the swirling waters wrought havoc to bridges in the Hereford area.

Two Bridges Out. The first bridge to go out here was the concrete structure which spanned Tierra Blanca at the old highway crossing southwest of town. This bridge washed out Saturday morning. Members of the commissioners' court decided at their meeting Monday that this bridge will not be replaced.

Early Sunday morning the Main Street bridge, which spans the Tierra Blanca just south of town, also went out. Commissioners said that this bridge will be replaced just as soon as a construction crew can be secured.

Approaches to several other bridges were also badly washed, but can be repaired at small cost since the approaches formed the chief damage.

Some persons declared Tierra Blanca was higher last year, while others reported higher waters this year. Part of the Park road was under water as Tierra Blanca spread from its small bed to adjoining lands.

Railroad tracks were under water for a short period between here and Friona, while several railway bridges in New Mexico were reported to have gone out.



BRAND OFFERS \$5 PRIZE IN WHEAT CONTEST FOR COUNTY

Wheat estimates zoomed over the Panhandle following beneficial rains during the past week, and although the crop was not expected to be normal it is now expected to be better than in recent

Through the contest now being sponsored by The Brand, the estimates for Deaf Smith county varied from two million bushels down as low as a quarter of a million bushels.


