





The Greeks at first refused to enter so dangerous an adventure. Cyrus, by promises and eloquence, overcame their

> In the battle of Connan Cyrus his royal brother and the value of the Greek troops was raudity wiving him the advantage when hatred and impetuosity intervened to ruin Cyrus caught sight of the king, his brother, in the midst of his guards and dashed madly against him, hoping to seize the victory at a stroke. Instead he was himself killed. The death of their leader dishearten the native troops of Cyrus and they were defeated. The Greeks at the same time had been victorious against another wing of Artaxerxes' army.

When the event of the day's ign their strength was only 10,000 men, the Greek captains refused and started on the famous "retreat of the 10,000" under Xenophon.
