# JACK RABBIT EXTERMINATION CAMPAIGN BEGINS

GIGANTIC CITY IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM NOW ON INCLUDES PAVING OF SEVERAL ADDITIONAL RESIDENTIAL BLOCKS

Jordan Construction Company Brings Crew Here to Finish Paving Called for Under Bond Issue Two Years Ago. Either Lee or Miles Avenue to Receive New Work, Depending on Property Owners.

Keeping up with the demands of a growing city, a crew of workers of the Jordan Construction Company of Amarillo arrived here this week for the purpose of paving shout six or seven blocks. They will finish the paving begun under a bond lesue of two years ago, which was halted at that time because of inclement weather. This is the first opportunity which the company has had to finish the

The brick paving will be laid in three different places. The short street west from Methers Park to the Borden home will be paved and the block on second street between Sampson and Schley Avenues. The remaining paving will be done on the north end of either Miles or Lee Avenue, depending on the wall of the taxpayers of these two streets.

According to the commissioners the exact amount of paving has not been definitely decided. About \$11,00% of the original bond issue remailin to be spent for this purpose. The amount of paving to be installed depends upon the base which will be used under the brick.

Most of the present paving in Hereford is laid on a concrete base, but a natural base may be used and more paving may be obtain ed. This natural base is said to be proving very satisfactory in other cities, and Canyon recently let a contract for forty blocks of paving on that base.

Grain Company Employee Barely Escapes Serious Injury When Truck and Thousand Load Fall On Him.

Eamon Rogers, Jones & McLean employee, narrowly escaped serious injury Monday morning when truck, loaded with 1000 pounds of meal, being unloaded from a car, fell on him, knocking him unconscious and inflicting minor internal injuries.

With a number of other men, Rogers was unloading a car of meal and was just wheeling out the last truck-load when the accident occurred. In some manner the scaffold over which the truck was being wheeled between the car and the platform, slipped off the car, throwing Rogers to the ground, where the foaded truck fell on him.

According to hospital authorities, Rogers' condition is not considered as serious unless unexpected complications set in.





INCOMBUSTIBLE WALLS AND ROOFS REQUIRED IN FIRE LIMITS: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or association of persons to build, erect, or cause to be built or erected within the INNER FIRE LIMITS of the City of Hereford, as constituted, established and designated by Section 1 of this Ordinance, any building or part of building, or any addition to any

### Survey Shows **Great Increase** In Oil Produced

AUSTIN, Texas, Jan. 25.—Petroleum production in Texas during the month of December amounted to 667,000,000 barrels, according to figures compiled by Bervard Nichols, editor of the Texas Business Review, published by the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas. During the month there was a better sentiment in the petroleum industry but scarcely any improvement was noted "which might bring about an early recovery," according to Mr. Nichols.

"Production for the past year has been greatly in excess of consumption so that stocks in the country have been unwieldy," Mr. Nichols writes. "Moreover, by improving the process of 'cracking' the recovery of masoline per barrel of crude has been materially creased. First it was California that overproduced; then Oklahoma accounted for most of the increase, and in recent months Texas has been largely responsible for the greater flow. However, a declining tendency of the daily average flow in the United States over, the past six weeks alers some en-

#### THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Subject: The Growing Fame of

Scripthre Reading: Mark 3:7-12; 6:53-56.

Golden Text; "The common people heard him gladly." Mark 12:37 Other Readings.

A multitude fed, Mark 8:1-10; A sultitude taught, Matt. 13:1-9; Many Samaritans believe, John 4 :-39-45: The triumphant Jesus, John 12:12-19: The Messiah's glory, Isaiah 60:1-9.

We proceed in this study from consideration of Christianity as Jesus conceived it to the popular conception of it as the people of His day understood it. As we noted in last Sunday's lesson, Christfanity has been described in three phases, in its relation to health, sinners, and law. We shall see in this lesson how much of that conception had been broken through upon the popular mind.

If the personality of Jesus and His mission had been but poorly understood by the masses at the time when in conference with His disciples at Caesarea Philippi, on the eve of His departure for Jerusalem to be crucified, we may easily understand that at the earlier stage of his ministry which this lesson treats; he must have been more largely misunderstood.

On that later occasion, when he has asked His disciples what was the popular conception of Him, the reply was that He was a prophet. It remained for a disciple within the intimate circle of companionship with Him to declare that He was "The Christ, the Son of the Living God."

If we are to read but superficially in this lesson, we shall feel that beyond the attractions of his healing power His fame held but little charm, While it may be true that such was the case with a vast majority of those who followed Him. it must have been true that there were many who felt the charm of His divine personality and the grip rillo recently spent the week-end fall have started back this week. It is not to be thought that with this careful guarding of the meaning of his mission, and the careful defining of his attitude towards the popularity of meself, the true meaning of his ministry should have been so grossly misunderstood as if he had sordidly made use of that popularity for unselfish purposes. But we are not to understand that Jesus sought to shun the ministry to the sufferings of His fellow men. What He did seek at all times to do, was to place that phase of his public ministry in its proper setting. The great lesson from this study, one which must never be obscured in any generation or age, is that Jesus sought and seeks to make His a ministry to the total needs of humanity.




