BE IT RESOLVED BY THE ing given to the editor personally LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

> Section 1. That Section 5 Article 4 of the Constitution the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as fol-

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture: provided that this amendment shall not become effective un-

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the number of sheep and brought them amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor.


