





This calf was purchased April 1929. At this time the calf was three weeks old and it was ecriving one gallon of milk daily. I changed this feeding to six ounds a day and fed it at equal griods three times a day, making the feeding consist of two pounds milk and one-half pound of grain. The grain was whole oats.

This kind of feed was fed for our weeks. On the fifth week I nereased her milk (during the veek) twelve pounds but fed the me amount of grain. The sixth ds for the week. I also startd to change her again to a grain ration consisting of 100 pounds maize, 50 pounds whole oats, 25 pounds of bran and five pounds of cotton seed meal. This ration is a ration of my own. I also increased her grain to two pounds a day. In changing from one kind of feed to another I did it grad-

In the seventh week I commence milk feed to a skim milk feed and in the eighth week I fed my calf 91 pounds of skim milk. changed the feeding periods to twice daily.

Up to this time the calf had gained 49 pounds. On the ninth week I increased her milk feed to 112 pounds of milk for the reck and increased the grain to hree pounds a day. This feed continued during the 10th, 11th and 12th weeks and by this time she was making a wonderful gain of over three pounds a day. During the last four weeks the calf's grain was changed to a ention suggested by Mr. Dunkle.
