# DA: \$2.8 Billion Available To Assist Farmers

WASHINGTON (AP) - Criticism may develop over other items in President Carter's proposed budget for the Agriculture Department, but for now most attention is focused on how it deals with the embargo on grain shipments to the Soviet Union.

Department experts say Carter's abrupt decision to halt grain shipments to the Soviets, announced Jan. 4, caught everybody flat-footed and threw the 1981 budget process "all out of whack."

But Carter's proposal includes "enough money to do about anything" necessary to help protect farmers from

the suspension of grain sales to the Soviets, says Stephen B. Dewhurst, USDA's budget director.

Spending by USDA next fiscal year is expected to be \$20.1 billion, down 15 percent from the current year's projected outlays of \$23.6 billion.

Dewhurst and others say it now looks like it will cost around \$2.8 billion in various efforts to help farmers regroup in the wake of Carter's grain embargo.

About \$2 billion of that will be used in the current fiscal year and the remainder in the 1981 fiscal year, starting Oct. 1. But Dewhurst and others caution that

those figures are only estimates and the final tab could differ appreciably.

Part of the money is being used to buy some of the 17 million metric tons of grain that was destined for the Soviet Union, with the remainder going into higher price supports, farm storage benefits and other programs announced by the administration.

Congress is digging into the grain embargo situation and some farm belt members are calling for even greater help to protect farmers. Sen. Herman Talmadge, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, has urged immsome of their cropland this year, for

And Rep. Paul Findley, R-III., wants Carter and Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland to offer further assurances to other foreign customers that embargoes are not part of a new emerging U.S. policy.

Farm organizations have supported Carter's embargo, ordered in retaliation to the Soviet Union's military move into Afghanistan, but also have been adamant in their opposition to embargoes as a general or recurrent policy.

If it can be said the \$2.8 billion earmarked to help farmers was unavoidable as a result of U.S. foreign policy, another big item in Carter's agriculture budget also might be called unavoidable for a different reason: soaring food costs.

A number of federal programs aimed at improving the nutrition of millions of Americans are involved, including the two major ones - food stamps and school feeding programs.

For example, assuming Congress goes along with USDA requests for supplemental appropriations, this year's government package of food programs is expected to cost taxpayers about \$13.1 billion. up from \$10.5 billion in 1978-79.

Next year, according to the Carter budget, those programs will cost \$14.3 billion and will comprise more than 70 percent of Agriculture's total projected

spending in the coming fiscal year. Food stamp operations alone, computed at around \$9.62 billion, will jump from an estimated \$8.7 billion this year and \$6.82 billion in 1978-79.

Part of the reason for the increases is congressional action in 1978 that liberalized food stamp rules, resulting in (See EMBARGO, Page 2)

# Layoffs Push **Up Jobless Rate**

WASHINGTON (AP) - A large rise in worker layoffs pushed the nation's unemployment rate to an 18-month high of 6.2 percent in January, a signal that a long-expected recession may have arrived, the government reported today.

Adult men bore the brunt of the higher unemployment, as their jobless rate jumped from 4.2 percent to 4.7 percent, the highest since November 1977.

President Carter predicted this week that the economy would enter a mild recession during the first half of 1980, sending unemployment rising to 7.5 percent by the fall.

Today's monthly report, issued by the Labor Department, bolstered that forecast, although government economists cautioned that it was premature to say with certainty that a recession had begun.

The January figures marked the first time that unemployment has hit 6 percent since July 1978, when the rate was 6.2 percent. Unemployment stood at 5.9 percent of the work force in December, and had fluctuated between 5.7 percent and 5.9 percent during the prior 16 months.

The large rise in unemployment among men who were laid off reflected downturns in the auto, steel and housing industries,

which traditionally are the first to feel the effects of a recession. The number of unemployed persons increased by 340,000 in January to 6.4 million. The Labor Department said 260,000 of the jobless had been laid off, as opposed to those who might have returned to the status of job-seekers.

The total employment in January was 97.8 million persons down from the record 97.9 million in December. The number of men with jobs declined by 200,000, while employment among adult women rose by 170,000.

As a result, while the jobless rate for men rose sharply, the rate for women advanced only modestly from 5.7 percent in (See JOBS, Page 2)

The department's Crop Reporting Board said lower prices for corn, eggs, wheat, soybeans, turkeys and cattle contributed most to the decline from the December average.

However, higher prices were reported for broilers, rice and calves, which helped soften the declines for the other commodities.

But the January decline left 0.9 percent above its average in January 1979, officials said.

Meanwhile, prices farmers pay to meet expenses rose 3 percent in January, averaging 14 percent higher than a year

Although the report did not spell it out, the price decline for grain - computed as of midmonth - came in the aftermath of Carter's announcement Jan. 4 of a partial embargo-on the delivery of U.S. grain to the Soviet Union.

Subsequently, the administration announced the government will buy much of

the embargoed wheat and corn, and take other actions to bolster the markets and protect farmers from financial losses due to the suspension.

Also, for two days following Carter's action, trading in grain and some other commodities was suspended on the major markets until the administration put its programs in place.

Some grain prices - notably wheat - have recovered somewhat since the mid-month theoverall farm price index only . figures shown in Thursday's . price report.

For example, USDA reported that as of Jan. 28 wheat prices at the farm averaged \$3.88 a bushel, compared to the midmonth price of \$3.62. Wheat in December averaged \$3.80 a

But corn prices most recently averaged \$2.22 a bushel at the farm, still below the \$2.25 shown as the mid-January farm average. The December average was \$2.38 a bushel.

# Silver Recovered At Local Business

Two Amarillo men will be charged with the theft of approximately \$80,000 in stolen silver, some of which was sold to a suspecting Hereford jeweler.

Bill Kester, owner of Kester's Jewelry of 409 N. Main St., told The Brand that he suspected two partial sets of silver flatware had been stolen when he bought them for \$1,600 from two young men on Jan. 17.

Kester said he stalled the men until after bank-closing time, "but someone at the bank let them in and cashed the check."

Kester said he met with District Attorney Roland Saul the following morning to tell him of the silver purchase.

The purchase resulted in Amarillo police recovering an estimated \$80,000 in silver stolen in at least five burglaries. The two men, ages 17 and 18, will be arraigned in Amarillo sometime today.

Kester said the Amarillo newspaper erroneously reported today that the bulk of the stolen silver was récovered at his jewelry store.

"All I got was two partial sets of flatware. And the story said that the two boys cashed the check at Hereford State Bank. They cashed it at First National Bank," Kester said.

According to Kester, the two men asked him if he wanted to purchase the flatware sets.

"I stalled them around, waited it out and got to eyeballing the clock. When I knew the bank was already closed, I made them an offer, and to my surprise, they took it. For scrap, it was worth more than that (\$1,600)." Kester

"I wrote them a check. knowing the bank was already closed. But, somebody at the hank let them in," he added.

# Stone Testifies as Defense Ends Case

PLAINVIEW, Texas (AP) -A self-professed witch testified he fired a warning shot into the air to frighten away teen-agers on Halloween 1977 after being harassed by carloads of jeering youths cruising by his rural

Loy Dean Stone, 50, is charged with murder in the pickup stopped in the Stones'

driveway near Dimmitt. Defense attorneys rested

their case Thursday after four character witnesses completed testimony. The judge then recessed the trial until today to allow lawyers to prepare their final arguments.

Stone's wife, Louise, 49, also is charged with murder. Her trial date has not yet been set.

Stone testified Thursday he fired a single shot into the air while a pickup filled with teenagers was sitting in his

driveway. Prosecution witnesses previously had said two shots

were fired, one striking the bed of the pickup, the other hitting the side of the cab.

Shotgun pellets killed Miss Casas and injured another passenger in the truck.

The Stones had complained of harassment by carloads of teenagers cruising by their rural home, and on Thursday, Stone testified he and his wife were out in their yard among some

trees on the night of the girl's

Stone said he saw the silhouette of the truck as it pulled into his driveway, but said it was so dark he and his wife "couldn't see each other without speaking."

Stone testified he yelled "yelled 'Get out of there!' and fired into the air" with his shotgun. He said he could not see the cab of the pickup because his vision was blocked

After he fired the warning shot. Stone said? the truck backed out of the driveway and headed toward Dimmitt. He said he was surprised when law officers came to his house later that night.

"I wondered what in the world everyone was doing," said Stone, who spoke calmly during his 21/4 hours on the witness stand. "I asked them what they were looking for and they didn't say."

Stone said he was frightened

because a vehicle had driven by his house earlier that month and fired several shots in his direction. No one was hurt, he

At one point during crossexamination. Castro County District Attorney Jimmy Davis asked Stone if he ever used the term "witch" to describe himself.

"I don't go around carrying a banner." Stone replied. Religion is a very personal

# S-L's, Insurance Agents **Battle** over Certificates

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A fight between savings and loan associations and insurance agents - so severe one observer calls them "the warring parties"-has fallen into the lap of the State Insurance

The board conferred with attorneys for both sides this week and instructed its staff to start work on possible solutions.

Agents complained when saving and loans-mainly large chain associationsbegan requring them to sign "certificates of insurance" as proof that mortgaged homes are insured.

Lending institutions require insurance to protect the value of property used as collateral for a loan.

Some agents read the certificate forms provided by the savings and loans as obligating them - the agents - to keep insurance in force and in amounts that keep pace with inflation.

"They are afraid that if they sign them they are putting themselves in a binding legal situation." said one source.

# Cuban Refugees Hijack

# Ship to United States

MIAMI (AP) - Sixty-seven men, women and children arrived at a Coast Guard station in Miami today after commandeering a leaky, slow-moving barge at gunpoint from a port in Cuba.

The refugees were greeted by reporters and cameramen. Most smiled but said little before being led to a waiting bus operated by the U.S.

Immigration and Naturalization Service. The Cubans, hoping to win political asylum in the United States, commandeered the 100-foot barge early Thursday in the Cuban port of Cardenas, bound its five crewmen and headed for the Florida Keys, authorities said. Six of the refugees

were said to have been armed. The U.S. Coast Guard said its officers boarded the vessel Thursday and took the Fifth of December in tow to Miami.

The refugees, including 10 children. chered the crew of the 40-foot guard patrol boat that met them off Lower Matecumbe Key when they learned they would be taken to Miami.

No injuries were reported in the takeover of the barge, or when the Coast Guard took the vessel in tow.

# Jury Recommends 99

# Years in DPS Shooting

SEGUIN, Texas (AP) - A state jury has recommended a 99-year prison sentence for a Houston man convicted of attempted capital murder in the shooting last Otober of a state trooper. The man's brother is already serving a life sentence for his part in the crime.

Jurors took only 45 minutes Thursday to return a guilty verdict against Clifford Gantz, 34.

Gantz and his 24-year-old brother Clenton Ray Gantz, were convicted in the shooting last Oct. 12 of Department of Public Safety Patrolman Michael Gorrell,

The trooper was wounded four times on Interstate 10 east of here as he struggled with two men he had stopped for a traffic violation. Gorrell is now recuperating from his wounds.

Less than two weeks after the shooting, Clenton Gantz pleaded guilty and was sentenced to the maximum life term in a plea bargaining arrangement.

Testimony in Clifford Gantz' trial showed that Clenton Gantz shot Gorrell three times with a .25-caliber pistol and once with Gorrell's service revolver

during a struggle. Witnesses said the struggle ensued after Gorrell attempted to arrest Clifford

The Labor Department also noted that a separate survey of employment conducted by a different federal agency found that employment during January rose by 300,000 jobs, a finding that contrasts with the Labor Department report. The two surveys occasionally produce different results, but jobless figures are based on the Labor Department survey.

The Carter administration predicted in mid-1979 that a recession was at hand that would send unemployment rising to 6.6 percent by the end of the year. But the recession never arrived and unemployment stayed below 6 percent.

In a revised economic forecast released this week, President Carter said the recession would occur in the first half of 1980, forcing the number of unemployed from 6.1 million to 7.8 million







# Cost of Living To Boost SS

WASHINGTON (AP) — If the \$25,900 or more, the wage base U.S. government were running on automatic pilot, the 1981 budget for Social Security, welfare, pensions and a raft of other income security programs would look virtually no different from what President Carter has proposed.

# **Upset Chances** Slim in Fight

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) -Italy's Lorenzo Zanon rates a very small chance of upsetting champion Larry Holmes in their World Boxing Council heayweight title bout Sunday, but he's done some things to improve the image he had of being a punching bag.

Zanon in 1977 was knocked out by Ken Norton in five rounds and by Jerry Quarry in nine rounds, and then laid off boxing an entire year.





The SEC filed a civil complaint Thursday in U.S. District Court against Textron as a two divisions were aware of result of a two-year investigation of alleged overseas that prohibited the acceptance payoffs by the company.

Textron agreed to a settlement of the complaint without admitting or denying guilt. It agreed to a court order requiring it to disclose any future payments to foreign government officials.

Miller was not named in the SEC suit, but the action refers to "chairmen" of the company. Miller was chairman of Textron from 1974 through 1978, when President Carter appointed him to head the Federal Reserve Board. He became treasury secretary last July.

The SEC initiated its probe in February 1978 of charges presented by a congressional committee that a Textron subsidiary, Bell Helicopter. paid \$2.9 million in unlawful payments to help secure a major contract to sell helicopters to the Iranian government in 1973.

A major portion of the Iranian payments allegedly went to the head of the Iranian Air Force. the late Gen. Mohammad Khatemi, a close associate of - to implement the recomthe now-deposed shah,
