Death and Destruction Follow Wake of First Cyclone Noted On Plains; Crop Damage Heavy from Wind, Hail and Rain.

-R. A. Cassady, 61 years old, was killed and his wife seriously injured Thursday aight at six o'clock when a cyclone destroyed their home located two and a half miles south of Flagg, in Castro county out thirty miles south of Here

Charles Meek, 15-year-old son of Rev. Mr. Meek, Beptiet pastor at Flagg, was badly bruised and renered unconscious when struck by dying timebrs. Recovering consciousness, he dragged Mrs. Cassady from the wreckage into the shelter of a cyclone cellar. Mrs. John Morgan sustained numerous bruises when her home near the Cassady place was destroyed.

According to F. W. Ramsey who lives one and a quarter miles east of the Cassady farm, the cyclone struck near the Cassady residence and after destroying it followed a zig-zag course along a deep draw demolishing the residences, barns and other farm buildings, together with the windmills on the Horace Blouw farm, opposite the Casuady place; on the John Morgan farm, three miles south of Flagg; Jim McAllister farm, two miles further south, and the Rev. Meek farm, seven miles south of Flagg. The roof was blown from the Thad Summers residence; barns and windmills destroyed at the Monroe Bains and Sid Sheffey

Horace Blouw and Grover Ramog were the first arrivals at the dy farm after the dieaster. During May a year ago Mr. Raney sold \$30 worth of dairy from nine cows, four of which are pure-breds. Feeding at the rate of one pound of feed for every three and one-hauf pounds of milk

FINDS SWEET CLOVER A GREAT PASTURE CROP

Olton,-One and three fourths acres of sweet clover is worth more than forty acres of native pasture for grazing alone, not counting the soil improvement qualities of the clover, according to George Bohner who sowed this crop last August for the first time. Planting it as a demonstration in cooperation with D. A. Adam, county agent, Mr. Bohner got a perfect stand and six weeks after sowing grazed two cows on it for forty-five days. They increased steadily in production and when taken off dropped 13 pounds in milk in one day. Turning them into the clover again in February the cows gradually increased in milk flow until by April they had gained 22 pounds in milk production daily. Neoschadpazzar came with a mighty army and pitched his camp before he city. He had come to stay until the city was taken. Forts were built and engines of war brought into place. The army was stretched completely around walls so that the food supply and water supply were cut off completely. Then followed a pered of eighteen months during which the overcrowded city was forced to live on the food and water stored in the city. It was long, hard siege that could end but one way. There was no hope for the doomed city.
