REA Farm Show Set for Monday and Tuesday, Near Texico

Deaf Smith REA Shows Extensive Growth With Total of 418 Miles Of Power Lines Serving Over 750 Members

First Contract Let In May, 1937; Half Million Received

Since the first contract was let May 15, 1937, 193.9 miles of electric power lines have been completed and energized and at the present 224 additional miles of lines are under construction. Briefly, this is the history of the Deaf Smith County Rural Electric Co-operative, Inc.

Nearly half a million dollars have been allotted to this project in four batches. Project A got \$119,000; project B, \$135,000; project C, \$147,000; and an additional \$59,911.45 has been earmarked for installation purposes. Total emoney invested is

Projects A and B which were energized at the same time-Sept. 24, 1938 have 320 members receiving current from its lines. Project C, under construction in Deaf Smith, Castro and Parmer counties, has a prospecta total of 735 members. The last contract was let April 12, 1939.

The Deaf Smith REA is peculiar kind in the United States. Irrigation made it possible for farmers to enjoy electricity here. The heavy use of current by electric irrigation motors assured enough demand to justify the REA in putting in the Co-opera-

Probably half of the 250 wells in this area are now powered by electric motors. Actual tests have shown that 1,800,000 gallons can be pumped at a cost of only \$4.80. That amounts to approximately 1-5000th of a cent per gallon!

Since its inception the slogan of the Deaf Smith REA has been "It Is More Blessed To Give Than To Receive, We Give Service." and the motto is prominently displayed on the wall of its office in Hereford. Behind this siogan are the officers, directors, and employees of the co-





REA Tour Features Good Electric Lighting

Essential To Care of Eyes

Improper electric lighting can be just as hard on the eyes as the kerosene lamps or other inadequate light sources it re-places, as will be demonstrated at the REA Farm Electric Equipment show.

For good sight plenty of light is needed—but it must be properly directed and shaded or diffused. Glare is not only discomforting and a fequent cause of headaches, but is actually harmful to the eyes, according to Miss Katheryn Harris, REA home electrification specialist.~

Package Lighting Sets Nowadays good lighting fix-tures are available at low cost. Sets of fixtures, "lighting packages" containing a complete set of fixtures for the farm home attic to porch are the new idea for the farm. Some of the sets contain approved design reading lamps, central bowls for the living room and dining room bedroom, kitchen and porch fixtures. These package groups are sold in unbroken sets for much less than they can be purchased

separately.
Good indirect lighting requires larger bulbs than direct glaring light. In modern lamps plastic or glass translucent bowl transmits an even glow of light and white-lined shades softly reflect the remaining bril-

But old lighting fixtures need not be thrown out. For a few cents they can be brought up to date. Plastic bowls to fit an old style bridge lamp can be purchased in various sizes at low cost. 





waffle irons, coffee makers, sandwich grills, electric irons, toasters, and the like can be planed for in advance by provision of sufficient plug points or convenient outlets. It is not generally desireable to operate such appliances by plugging them into light sockets.

Special circuits must be wired in for electric ranges, large size radios, refrigerators, or other equipment that either requires a large amount of current or is in constant use.

When people complain that their hot plates heat up slowly, or that their toaster takes an age to tan the bread, the trouble is usually found in the wiring, not in the appliance. Either it was on an overloaded circuit or the wire was too small in the first place.

Plan Switch Location It is also wise to plan the location of switches, particularly at the head of stairways and such treacherous places, before someone proves the need of it by breaking his leg or his neck. Two-way, three-way, or any number of switches may be used to independently control a light fixture. You can turn on the garage light both from the house and at the garage. You can have a light in the hay mow or in the silo which you can turn on or off from above or below. It is not very expensive to put in plenty of switches and outlets in the first place. It is much more costly to add them later.

Secure Proper Size Pump A pump and piping that are large enough for water in the kitchen and perhaps sprinkling the yard may prove ridiculously inadequate when dairy cleaning, stock watering, a bathroom, and laundry are added to the system. A pump that is big enough to take care of all anticipated needs costs only a little more and is worth it a dozen times. And figures collected from thousands of American farms in a recent survey show that after a pressure water system is installed four or five and sometimes ten times as much water is used than before.



A small electric pump, or a hose extension from an extsting pressure water system, is necessary to provide a flow of water through the cooler tubes. From a perforated trough at the top of the cooler a thin film of milk or cream flows over the tubes and is collected in the storage container at the

Stop Bacterial Growth For the electrified farm large capacity refrigerating units offer the best storage facilities for cooled cream. It can be held for long periods at a temperature so low as to prevent almost all bacterial growth and the dairyman is assured a high grade and a bigger check. With rectangular or square containers that fit snugly together without waste space up to 15 gallons of cream can be stored on one shelf of an 8-foot household refrigerator.

To provide proper cleaning of cans, coils, houses, milking machines, and other dairy utensils, various sterilizers are available. The small jet steam ster-ilizers heat up quickly, draw little current, and are sufficient where only two or three cans, and a pail or two are to be steril-

Cabinet sterilizers are needed by the larger operator. In one type the steam is generated within the cabinet by electric heat-er units in a water container at the base of the unit. In others the steam is fed into the cabinet through a pipe, or the water adhering to the utensils after washing provides enough steam when the cabinet is heated. 





ARMERS having high-line elecr tric service can cut their silage costs from 15 to 25 cents per ton by using a portable five-horsepower motor instead of a 15 to 30-horsepower tractor to operate the cutter. Part of that worthwhile saving comes from greatly decreased power costs— the electric motor requiring but approximately one kw.-hr per ton of ensilage cut and elevated and part from the smaller crews needed (two to eight instead of 12 to 20 men). Practically all of the modern silage cutters can be successfully operated

by a five-horsepower electric motor, However, some of the older cutters do not have the proper clearance be-tween the ends of the fan wings and the fan housing to give satisfactory elevation at slow speeds and, as a result, cannot be driven by a motor of such low power. In such cases, and especially if the quantity of slage is large, it generally will pay to replace the old cutter with one of modern de-

Although the power required is influenced by the quality of the fodder, the size of the bundles and method of feeding, the size of the cut and the height of the silo, there are several

which are of equal or greater im-portance. The knives on the cutter should be sharpened twice each day so that each set is used for only half a day's run. They should be set closely but without striking the shear bar which must have a sharp, true edge and which should be reversed or re-placed it rounded by wear.

The speed of operation is extremely important—the higher it is, the greater the power required per ton of en-silage. Therefore, the cutter should be run at the lowest effective speed, that will insure against clogging. The blower pipe should be kept free of dents and must be set so as to form a vertical line from the cutter to the elbow. Sharp angles at the cutter or bends in the pipe greatly reduce the

capacity of the pipe. The motor and cutter frame should be set level and firmly secured. The belt preferably should be of threeply rubber, endless of spliced, should not be crossed if possible to avoid it and should not be allowed to rub on the cutter frame. The motor should pull from the under side leaving the helt slack on top and an idler, it used, always should be against the slack side of the belt.

Observation of the foregoing precautions will do much to insure low power costs as well as trouble-free

> Just because the season is open is not a sign that all, even ardent, sportsmen take the field. It is generally recognized that in many sections of Texas the doves are still nesting when the season opens in September. Therefore, a group of men who are known as the "Knights of the Sixteen-Gauge Guns" who live in Weimar, Texas, are opposed to hunting birds when the feathered tribe has not inished its job of family raising. So, num-erous Weimar hunters are await-ing another date on the Calendar-December 1, when the quail season gets under way.

> Now is the time for land owners to start thinking about feedg quail during the rugged days of winter. With a marked increase in bobwhites being reported from most sections of Texas, it is more necessary than ever to leave food standing for these birds, it is pointed out by the Executive Secretary of the Game Department. A few rows of grain left standing at the field edges, close to natural cover, is the best insurance possible for carrying over the game and insectivorous

Emergency feeding is not nearly as effective as proper preparation against food shortages, the Executive Secretary pointed out. One of the best-plans is that of leaving small grains near the edges of the fields. Hundreds of farmers in Texas are building shelters for quail under the supervision of the Game Department and all indications are that quail are in for a healthy cycle in

Boys in Austin, Texas, are giving a vivid demonstration of giving a vivid demonstration of how birds can assist small and large landowners alike. This group of hustling boys rent ducks to housewives who turn the birds into their gardens. The ducks make a clean sweep of all insects without destroying the plants, and, incidentally, bring their owners 50c per day in rental fees. Texas has a large number of insectivorous birds and it is estimated by biologists that the birdlife of the State.

Electric thick brooders make it unnecessary for a poultryman to crawl out of bed in the middle of a freezing night to stoke his brooder fire or adjust a burner. The REA Farm Equipment Tour will exhibit latest brooders at the Rupert Paul farm on Highway 60, Monday and Tuesday, Nov. 27 and 28.

Thermostatically controlled chick brooders maintain a constant temperature under the hover no matter how cold/it may be outside. They can be used advantageously in an unheated brooder house Recent experiments indicate that hardier chicks result when an electric brooder is used in a cool

Electric chick brooders operate economically and prevent the serious fire hazards inherent in many types of brooder. The hover can be gradually raised and small frames onto larger roosts the chicks brought up from so that teaching them to roost


Two general types of electric brooder are available. In one the heating elements are strung in the open under the hover and warm all the air down to the litter. The other type makes use of a heated rubberized blanket raised just high enough off the floor that the chick can bunch up against it for warmth.

If there is danger of interrupted service a soil heating cable may be buried in sand under the brooder to maintain it at the same temperature as the air under the hoyer. The sand will retain heat for periods of from six to eight hours and protect the chicks until the service is resumed or other heat is provided.
