Mr. Edwards came to Hereford about 1906 and served the city the First State Bank and Trust Co During the same year, on September 13, he was elected president, succeeding W. B. Beach, thus becoming second president of the bank. He held this position until February 18, 1913 when he was elected chairman of the board of directors. Soon afterwards he disposed of his interest in the bank.


