(By Grace I. Neely, Extension Specialist in Food Preservation) Most in evidence of fruits for canning now are the pears. Best canned pears are never tree ripened. Pears will have a less astringent taste and will be finer in texture if harvested when mature but still green and permitted to ripen in a cool, dark, well ventilated room. Once ripened they must be used promptly or discoloration will develope.

Place the pieces of pared fruit immediately into a solution of two tablespoons each of salt and vinegar to one gallon of water to prevent discoloration and loss of vitamin C.

CANNED PEARS

Pare half and core ripe pears. Exhaust in boiling sirup for 4 to 8 minutes according to size and hardness of fruit. Seal immediately and process containers of all sizes 20 minutes in boiling water bath.

CANNED BAKED PEARS The small sweet early pears found in many localities are delicious when baked in the oven just as apples are baked. Remove while hot from baking pan and pack into sterilized containers. Fill to overflowing with boilng medium sirup and seal.

PEAR HONEY Cut ripe late pears into small pleces. Use a little less than half sugar, by weight. Mix and cook the honey until consistency of honey. Seal in hot "sterilized" containers.

PEAR MARMALADE

Peel fresh late pears, quarter and slice lengthwise. Cover with sugar using 3/4 pound sugar to one pound fruit. Seal in hot terilized containers. A good ad-lition when fruit is partially cooked add 1/2 cup of grated pineapple to each pound of fruit.
SUMMER MINCE MEAT



The trial and error method is commonly used by sportsmen and many ideal experiments are thus made available for abservation.

Game managers or biologists of the Department will inspect sites that have been planted with duck foods and judge the value of the many species that are being sold to Texas sportsmen. Because of unwise plantings considerable sums are wasted each year whereas wise plantings would have improved conditions

for ducks. Already biologists of the Department have accumulated considerable information on the use of native plants as duck food plantings. At the completion of this study sportsmen will be able to obtain accurate recommendations for improving their lakes and marshes for waterfowls.

More and more Texas fishermen are making a real sport of gar fishing on light tackle. They are employing the use of a wire noose, which, baited with a minnow, attracts gars and literally lassoes them. Three Nacogdoches sportsmen recently took 76 gar from the Angelina River one afternoon and while exhausted at the end of the day, declared they had more sport than if they had been fishing for bass.

The maximum that can be earned by deferred grazing in any area shall be 75 percent, as compared with 60 percent last year, but supplementary practices as recommended by the county committees must be carried out. The percentage of the allowance which can be earned by this practice depends on the county committee of each county, since th eneed of supplementary practices varies according to the area.

To encourage improvement of small ranches, the 1940 program provides for a minimum rangebuilding allowance equivalent to 10 cents an acre up to 640 acres. In the past the range-building allowance has been computed on the size of the ranching unit and its grazing capacity with the result small ranches with low grazing capacity received such small allowances they were hardly worth working for.
