## **Expected To Reach** Peak Tuesday Or Wednesday

The 1940 wheat harvest got slowly underway this week a wheat started rolling in Tuesday and showed substantial increases each day. Between 10 and 12 cars of wheat \$15,000 bushels) was estimated here.

About 5 cars each was reported from Dawn and Plack. Although the present harvest season was lagging behind that of 1939 by a large margin, farmers and grain dealers expected more and more wheat each day until Tuesday or Wednesday. when the harvest peak will likely be seen Another rainy spell, however could delay combine work over the area. Compared with the present figures the 1939 harvest on June 29 showed a total of 1,432,000 bushels for Hereford, Dawn and Black with Hereford reporting 1,342,000 bushels of grain. Harvest last year got underway about 10 days earl-

ier than this season. Estimates still place the 1940 crop at around one and onehalf million bushels for this territory with some predicting as low as one million bushels and others figuring up into the two million bracket Grain dealers reported exceptionally high tests this season, stating that very few loads of grain had fallen

below a 60-pound test.



Eighteen thought there should be a longer closed season, but eleven voted no. In answer to the question: "Do the sportsmen in your vicinity have the same opinions on these questions," 21 voted yes and 2 no.

His job was that of special ranger and he worked with Ira Aten. At that time cattle rustlers were plagueing the XIT. C. R. Smith who then worked for the XIT, recalls that Mr. Connell was absolutely without fear in dealing with cow thieves. He was first appointed Sheriff of Deaf Smith County and in 1896 was elected as Sheriff and Tax Collector of the then frontier county. He was later elected to the same office for several terms; in his later years he served as Deputy Sheriff of both Deaf Smith and Nueces Counties and at the time of his death was a

During the past few days a number of places in the county have been examined where grasshoppers are numerous and are threatening crops and grassland. These hoppers are beginning to reach the adult stage at which time they acquire their wings and scatter at a very rapid rate.

Fence rows, old wheat stubble, and other weedy places should be examined and if found infested should be poisoned immediately. Poison may be obtained free of charge at the Bull barn in the afternoon. Each person should determine the approximate number of acres to be poisoned so there will be no unused bait left to form a hazard to livestock.

When spread uniformly twenty pers on a given area. This bait should be spread when the temperatures are between 70 and Jimmie Allred Wins 90 degrees F.


