City readying itself for planting trees at brand new Central Park

 Never mind that the soil temperature at six inches is in the neighborhood of 32 degrees.
 Don't even think about the snow that covered the ground during the last week.
 Forget the wind chill temperatures ranging downward to minus-10, or so.
 It's time to think planting trees, and for the City of Hereford, the time has come for some serious work in parks.
 First on the list is the one-acre park at Sixth and Ross, known generally as Central Park. This site was targeted about a year ago for improvements with a grant made through the Texas Forest Service by the Small Business Administration.
 The first step toward implementing provisions of the grant was taken last Monday evening when the Hereford City Commission directed the city manager to seek bids for purchase and planting of 30 trees on the Central Park site.
 The city's share of the project's expense will come from a special fund established in June 1991 to help finance park improvements.
 City water bills include a \$1

assessment that customers may pay, if they choose, to help better their community.
 Since the voluntary assessment was installed, the fund has grown to approximately \$75,500, a nice nest egg for the improvements the city hopes to make.
 Besides the Central Park tree planting, the city has a major project on tap for Dameron Park where a pavilion-stage and rest rooms may be constructed from the park fund.
 The city's engineering firm, McMorries and Associates, Inc., has been engaged to prepare design and engineering for the pavilion.
 The plans should be ready to ask for bids in early summer with construction to begin soon thereafter.
 But, the opening shot for park improvements this year still will be the Central Park site which officials hope will become a source of pride for the community.
 The \$5,200 grant approved in March 1992 specifies 30 trees to be planted. Purpose of the SBA program is to improve small business opportunities. A requirement of the grant is that the project be visible from widely-used roadways. The

Central Park site is visible from 25 Mile Avenue, U.S. 385.
 The successful bidder will provide trees and planting. City workers will dig holes for the trees and install a drip irrigation system to allow for adequate watering of the plants. Altogether the city's contribution in personnel, equipment, materials and cash should add up to an investment amounting to \$12,002, in cash and kind.
 Tentatively, varieties of trees to be planted are bur oak, pecan and Rocky Mountain juniper, said Mike Hatley, assistant city manager, who was responsible for preparing the grant application.
 Working with Hatley and helping with a design for tree planting was Mauri Montgomery, then chairman of the Deaf Smith Chamber of Commerce beautification committee.
 If the selected trees are not available, Hatley said he hopes substitutions will be allowed.
 The grant specifies that the trees be fairly large, about four-inch caliper, balled and burlapped. With that size and with the drip irrigation system, Hatley anticipates that loss of trees will be minimal.

Clinton: No new taxes without spending cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton is trying to fend off the tax-and-spend label with repeated assurances that tax increases in his \$500 billion economic plan will move forward only in tandem with spending cuts.
 The president wound up a two-day trip to Ohio and New York on Friday by assuring townspeople in Hyde Park, N.Y., that "I will not - I will not - support any tax increase without spending cuts."
 "But I think we would also be very foolish to say that we don't need to invest more in our children and in our technology and in our economic future and putting the American people back to work," he insisted.
 Clinton was taking a one-day break from his cross-country sales trip today to pitch his plan straight from the White House in a national radio address. He also was welcoming a crowd of youngsters to the White House for a live 90-minute children's TV special on ABC.
 Sunday, he's back on the road for a two-day trip to California and

Washington to promote his economic plan to West Coast residents.
 In every appearance, Clinton stresses his plan's spending cuts and popular new programs in job training and education.
 But he is coming under increasing criticism from Republicans who complain that almost all the deficit reductions he has proposed for the next two years would come from tax increases rather than spending cuts.
 At a forum in Chillicothe, Ohio, Clinton confronted concerns that Congress will be only too happy to raise taxes but won't go along with deep spending cuts.
 "I have no interest in raising a penny in taxes if we're not going to do the cuts," Clinton said. The audience, packed into a high school gymnasium, responded with applause.
 Presidential adviser Bruce Lindsey said Clinton's itinerary was designed to touch a cross-section of America - the industrial Midwest, small-town America, and high-tech and defense industries on the West Coast.

Clinton is shopping for support from "neutral observers," including backers of independent Ross Perot, Lindsey said.
 Clinton said he was heartened by the messages he got from bystanders who gathered along roadways as he shuttled between airports and appearances.
 He acknowledged that some homemade signs "weren't so favorable, but that's all right. That's what this country is all about."
 Among those he didn't mention: "Hey Slick. Read Our Lips. You Lied," and "We Support More Taxes. Not!"
 Clinton took off on a brief diversion Friday with a discussion of prospects for a national sales tax after he was asked about the issue at the Chillicothe town meeting.
 He said the United States may have to consider a national sales tax, a radical change in the way the government raises money, "not too long into the future." But later, he said he meant in 10 years or so.

New prison provides economic salvation for Panhandle town

 CHILDRESS, Texas (AP) - This West Texas town was drying up faster than tumbledweed in the 1980s.
 The population had dropped from 5,800 to 5,000. Blocks of houses were for sale. Teen-agers graduated from high school and left.
 "There just wasn't anything for the young people to do unless they wanted to be a waitress or gas station attendant," Mayor Pro Tem Bill Haseloff said.
 So city leaders turned to a recession-proof industry: prisons.
 The Texas Department of Criminal Justice in 1990 built the 1,000-bed T.L. Roach Unit, with 255 employees and a \$1.4 million annual payroll.
 And now, 16 months after the prison opened, it can be hard to find parking at stores or an apartment to rent in Childress.
 "We have stopped the hemorrhaging," Haseloff said. "Before, we were like a dying community."
 The economic salvation represented by state prisons has become more and more attractive in Panhandle and South Plains cities, where land is plentiful and agriculture and oil have been hurt.
 But to some, they are salvation of dubious value.
 "Please don't come to me and talk about the economic benefits of prisons," Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock said in a recent speech to newspaper executives in Dallas.
 Bullock said he worries about the impression people making their first visit to Texas will get when they see so many prisons along their drive.
 "One might say to the other, 'Let's get the hell out of here. What's wrong with these people here?'" Bullock said.
 But such worries matter little when local leaders are faced with a dwindling tax base. Stability, good pay and benefits to employees outweigh normal prison stigmas.
 Last year, 63 cities offered the state various incentives to lure a lockup. Few in the winning cities - from Dalhart and Plainview to Brownfield and Colorado City - protested the bids.
 "We need the jobs," Dalhart city

manager Greg Duggan said. "If small towns are not progressing, then they're drying up."
 "West Texas in general is losing population and losing industry," said Lewis Hill, economics chairman at Texas Tech University. "Over the past 50 years, agriculture has become so highly mechanized. The more mechanized it becomes, the fewer people they employ in agriculture. It's killing all these small, county seat towns."
 "When I first went on the board we had communities that wouldn't even accept a prison," said Jerry Hodge of Amarillo, vice chairman of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. "That has changed dramatically since we broke the East Texas corridor."

"It had been the mentality for years that first of all, communities didn't want the prisons. And then it was the philosophy of the prison board to have them concentrated in East Texas," Hodge said.
 With the exception of the prisons clustered near Gatesville in central Texas, the first state prison to open west of Interstate 35 was the 1,000-bed Price Daniel Unit in Snyder in 1989.
 Of the 11 that have opened since then, seven have been west of that line.
 In Abilene, the TDCJ is preparing to build a 2,000-bed facility next to the French Robertson unit that opened just a few weeks ago.

Agriculture department enters state cattle battle

AUSTIN - Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry on Friday announced that the Texas Department of Agriculture has filed a brief with the Texas Supreme Court supporting the F/R Cattle Company, located in Erath County.
 In 1991, the Texas Air Control Board sued the F/R calf-raising operation for odor complaints. The 266th District Court in Erath County found that the odors were naturally produced and therefore F/R was not subject to the Texas Clean Air Act. This decision was later reversed by the Eastland Court of Appeals.
 "The Court of Appeals' decision is unreasonable and should not be allowed to stand," Perry said. "It disregarded long-standing law and can only have damaging effects on the entire agricultural industry in

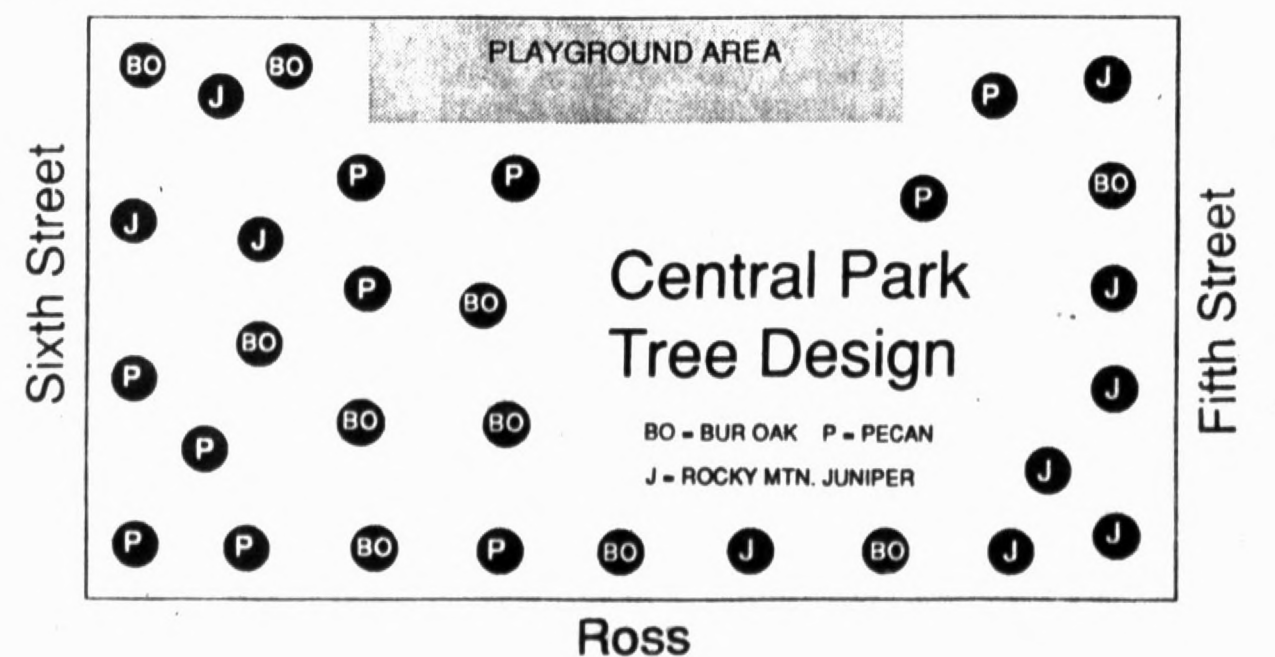
Texas.
 "The dairy industry is vital to the health and welfare of Texas. In fact, Texas is the sixth largest milk-producing state in the United States and Erath, the county involved in the suit, is the 12th largest milk-producing county in the nation."
 "But this is not just a dairy issue. The effects of this court's decision could be far-reaching, resulting in severe economic losses for the entire Texas livestock industry."
 "By filing this 'friend of the court' brief, the department is standing shoulder to shoulder with the Texas agriculture industry to stop an overreaching - and potentially devastating - interpretation of the law."
 The Texas Supreme Court will hear the case on Tuesday.

The noon meeting, said Nena Veazey, executive assistant to superintendent Charles Greenawalt, will be a single-item session. The Texas Association of School Boards will appear before the board to present its findings on a compensation study it did. The regular session will be held at 6:30 p.m. Among the items to be considered by the board will be a request by the Nazarene Christian Academy to extend the district's band program to cover academy sixth graders who will enter Hereford Junior High School in the seventh grade. Parents then have the right to appeal his decision to the school board. In other action, trustees will: issue a formal order for the May 1 school board election; approve bonds for the purchase of two new school buses; and hear a report on a project to reapportion trustee boundaries.

Russian airliner hijacked, lands in Stockholm

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) - A Russian airliner, hijacked by a man who stalked the aisles carrying two hand grenades, landed at Stockholm airport today with 47 people aboard, including the hijacker's wife and child.

The hijacker let 12 more people off the plane in the Swedish capital, but he told authorities the plane would either fly on to New York or everyone else would die. Malin Engstedt, speaking for Swedish civil aviation authorities, said no injuries were reported.

The twin-engine Tupolev-134 plane was commandeered on a flight from Siberia to St. Petersburg.

The hijacker agreed to stopovers in Europe after authorities convinced him the aircraft did not have enough fuel to fly to the United States directly.

The aircraft landed first in Tallinn, Estonia, then Stockholm, and it was believed the hijacker hoped to hopscotch his way to the United States.

Gramm tags Clinton plan as a 'disaster'

HARRISBURG (AP) - U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm of Texas says President Clinton risks his political future with his economic plan.

"The bad news is Bill Clinton's program is going to be a disaster for America, but the good news is he's only going to have one, four-year term," Gramm said.

The senator was the featured speaker at the Pennsylvania Republican Party's Lincoln Day dinner. The \$35-a-ticket event drew more than 600 people Friday night.

Gramm said Clinton promised in October that he would propose \$3 in cuts for every \$1 in new revenue. But by the time the numbers were broken down after Clinton's State of the Union address this week, the cuts were down to 55 cents for every \$1 in new revenue, Gramm said.

Clinton's proposal to increase the amount of Social Security benefits subject to taxes for people above certain incomes unfairly hits those who saved a lifetime for retirement, Gramm said. People may just decide not to save so much and rely more heavily on government for retirement needs, he said.

The senator said Clinton's proposal to put the heaviest tax burden on the top 1 percent of taxpayers will backfire. Seventy percent of that group are small business owners and family farmers who will cut back job investment to pay the added taxes, Gramm said.

"The notion that somehow high income people have escaped taxation because of Ronald Reagan is totally and absolutely false," Gramm said. "The top 1 percent of Americans pay 40 percent more of the income tax burden today than it did in 1980."

Gramm also attacked what he

called "the bigotry against people who work and save and succeed."

He said it "is an absolute outrage in 1993 that politicians can get applause by attacking the people who have helped build America and the people who have invested the capital that have made us the richest and most powerful nation on the face of the earth."

After his speech, Gramm told reporters Clinton should kill the bottom half of his new spending proposals and pay for the other half with cuts in existing programs. That would be the basis for meaningful negotiations with Republicans to cut the deficit, Gramm said.

He also criticized Pennsylvania Sen. Harris Wofford's vote in favor of allowing immigrants with AIDS into the U.S. Gramm said that would add to the nation's health bill at a time when Americans are still going without proper health care.

The enthusiasm remains evident in Childress too. Mashburn Realty Investments' billboard on U.S. 287 proclaims "We welcome you to Childress, TDCJ." The city has honored prison employees with several ice-cream socials on the courthouse lawn.

"Years ago, if someone would have said, 'We want to build a prison on your backyard,' they'd run," Haseloff said. Now, it's a "feather in our cap."

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Clinton eyes exempting certain farm owners from support payments

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Clinton administration wants to exempt certain wealthy farm owners from crop support and other direct

payments - a proposal the Bush administration also made just one year ago. Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy went through some verbal contortions last week over the proposal.

"I don't want to use the phrase 'means testing' for this," he said. "I wouldn't want to do that, because this does not extend to means testing of program payments. It's off-farm income."

Espy must now support an idea he opposed while on the House Agriculture Committee. The same proposal last year died in the House Budget Committee, chaired at the time by Leon Panetta, after a Feb. 14, 1992, letter to him from the chairman of the Agriculture Committee, Rep. Kika de la Garza, D-Texas.

Although the 1992 missive referred to a "means test," that term no longer applies, Espy said.

Panetta now runs the Office of Management and Budget for President Clinton.

OMB this year revived the exemption, which says people who earn \$100,000 or more from non-farming activities should be denied direct farm payments such as price supports. The proposal targets landlords, including doctors, lawyers and business people who own but do not necessarily operate farms.

"This is a different year," Espy said. "This is the year where most Americans believe that the wealthy, which includes farmers, have been the beneficiaries of rather lopsided policies under Reagan and Bush, and I hope that they want to reverse that. And farmers, wealthy farmers, should not be exempt."

OMB estimates a five-year savings of \$470 million by cutting out the payments. The Congressional Budget Office put savings at \$300 million. One category of direct payments,

deficiency payments to make sure farmers receive a government-set target price for corn, other feed grains, cotton, rice and wheat, cost taxpayers \$5.5 billion in 1992 alone.

Despite the small budgetary impact of the reduction, "you've got the camel's nose under the tent as far as means testing," said Rep. Pat Roberts, R-Kan., ranking minority member on the House Agriculture Committee. OMB has proposed means testing for farm programs for years, he added.

Roberts and other farmer advocates, including chairman de la Garza, argue that direct farm payments are not "social welfare" but "supply management programs." Additionally, conservation would suffer because many land management programs are tied to farm payments, they say.

If excluded, landowners would charge cash instead of a share of the crop to tenants, moving the risk and burden to the less affluent, they say. The Department of Agriculture estimates that up to 30 percent of direct payments go to share-rent landlords.

"Had this type of program been an urban or suburban program, it would have been dead ages ago," countered Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y.

Schumer, an urban liberal, teamed with conservative Rep. Dick Armev, R-Texas, in an unsuccessful bid to make means testing part of the 1990 farm bill.

A USDA study in 1990 said 8 percent of farms had more than \$100,000 in sales.

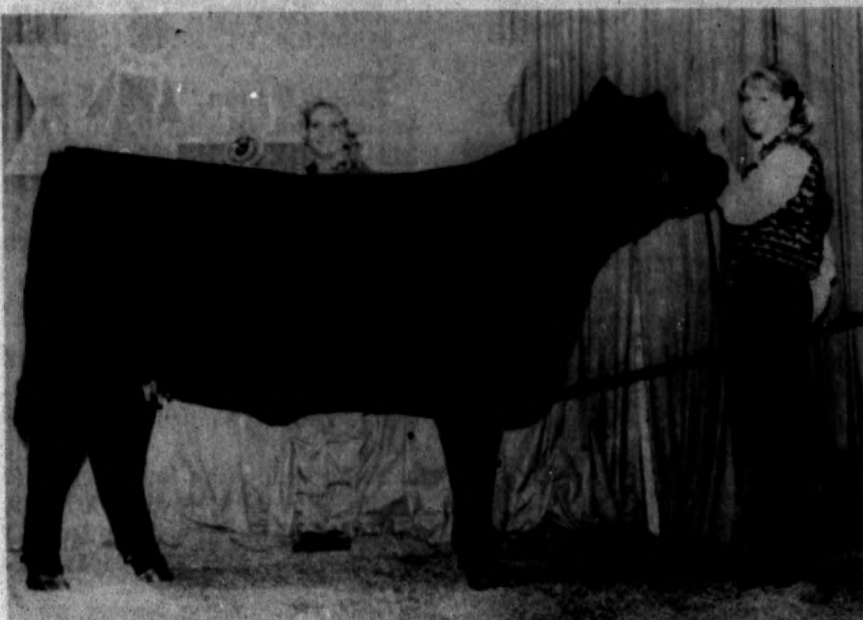

Ag Department seeks to control pests coming from New Zealand

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department is moving to control plant pests that come to U.S. shores on trees imported from New Zealand.

Under an interim rule announced this week, Monterey pine and Douglas fir logs from New Zealand must be treated before and after their arrival here. Importers will have to obtain a permit from USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service and a certificate from the plant protection service of New Zealand.

APHIS will require debarking and fumigations upon arrival. The logs will then be subject to inspection by APHIS officials at the port of entry.

SPC judges earn honors




LEVELLAND - The South Plains College livestock judging team recently captured reserve championship honors at the Southwestern Livestock Show in Fort Worth.

Notes on the Law

Concern for safety in the workplace has led to more and more random drug testing of employees. The procedures to be followed when an employee tests positive may be effected by the decision in Kerr-McGee Chemical Corporation vs. United Steelworkers of America, AFL-CIO, 800 F. Supp. 1405 (US Dist. Miss. 1992).

The suit arose when Kerr-McGee arranged for drug testing of its employees on October 9, 1989 by Emergicare facility workers at the Kerr-McGee plant. Employees Kevin Wells and Gerond Sanders were in the group tested on the 9th at the plant. Employee Robert Robinson was out ill on the 9th and thus was tested the next day at the Emergicare facility. These three employees tested positive for drug use and were discharged by Kerr-McGee immediately thereafter.

The employees claimed they were entitled to "due process," meaning that they were entitled to some procedure for a hearing at which they could explain the circumstances around the positive test results. Kerr McGee did not feel obligated to provide any hearing because the contract with the employees provided:

"3.1 Management prerogatives and the exercise thereof shall be unqualified, shall remain exclusively in the management, and shall include without limitation all matters not covered by this Agreement as well as the following, except to the extent that the following are limited or modified by the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
 (a) The right to hire, lay off, promote, demote, transfer, assign to shifts, adjust work force, maintain discipline and efficiency, and discharge and discipline all employees for just cause . . ."

Another section on "Safety and Health" includes a provision on periodic drug testing. This section states:
 "12.8 In order to maintain a safe work environment all employees shall be subject to periodic drug testing without advance notice. Refusal to submit to such a test shall be just cause for discharge. Should an employee test positive for one or more illegal drugs or controlled substances, he shall be subject to immediate discharge."

Under another provision of the contract, the case was submitted to arbitration. The arbitrator ruled that the return of a positive drug test alone was not a sufficient basis to immediately discharge the employees. The arbitrator's ruling resulted from his interpretation of the language in the contract which provided that "refusal to submit to" a drug test was equivalent to "just cause for discharge," but that a positive result only caused the employee to be "subject to discharge."

The arbitrator reasoned there were certain circumstances that might cause a drug test to be positive even though the employee had not illegally used controlled substances. Thus, the employee became subject to being discharged upon the return of a positive test result, but the actual discharge was conditioned upon the employee not being able to provide a legitimate explanation for the positive test result.

The employees were ordered to be reinstated with backpay. The case may influence the approach that employers should take or may indicate that the contract with an employee should be very specific about the consequences of a positive test result. On the other hand, there appear to be certain limited situations where positive test results may not be based on the illegal use of controlled substances. These situations should also be provided for in the contract, so as to eliminate the costs of litigation and re-instatement with back-pay.

Almost everyone across the nation has heard or seen something about the Rodney King beating. The main reason they know is that a citizen captured the incident—a black man being beat by police officers—on a camcorder.

But what does the general public not know about the case?

The major media have been dishonest and derelict about the Rodney King incident. As such, they are agents provocateurs in the L.A. riots following the police acquittal verdict. For a moment, let's forget about the verdict, and let's focus on the media's deliberate deception," writes Walter Williams, a nationally-syndicated newspaper columnist.

If you haven't read Williams' columns before, you might jump to the conclusion that he's an anglo, right-wing fanatic. But actually, he's an objective black journalist with the facts to back up his opinions. After viewing "The Rodney King Case: What the Jury Saw in California vs. Powell," a two-hour condensation of approximately 150 hours of evidence and testimony, Williams points out facts that have heretofore gone

unnoticed. His observations:

"Did you know that Rodney King, who the media described as simply as a 'black motorist,' was clocked traveling at 115 mph by officer Melanie Singer? Did you know that his two passengers, Bryant Allen and Freddie Helms, who complied with police orders, were handcuffed, later released and not beaten? Did you know that Rodney King, at 6-4 and 240 pounds, knocked officers Theodore Briseno and Lawrence Powell down while resisting arrest?"

"Did you know that the videotape was over three and a half minutes, but the media gave us snippets, concealing portions where King was seen lunging at the cops? Did you know that King was hit with a Taser stun gun...that gives 50,000 volts per hit? Rodney King was hit twice and got up twice, leading the police to believe he was drugged with PCP, which they later found out not to be the case, but his blood alcohol level was 0.19, about twice the legal limit.

"Did you know that the Simi Valley jury didn't have to be 'all white'? According to The Jubilee, there were four blacks in the jury pool, but the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People had contacted all four prior to the trial, which assured their disqualification. Finally, did you know that a black police officer testified on behalf of the defendants?"

"Judge Stanley Weisberg instructed the jury that police officers are permitted to use reasonable force to prevent escape, prevent injury, overcome resistance and arrest a suspect. When that force is no longer necessary, police officers have no authority to continue."

When you know what the jury knew and saw, it sheds a little different light on the issue. No one should condone police brutality. But an intoxicated driver of any race, gender or age, should be removed from a vehicle when he is speeding down the road at 115 mph.

Williams conclude in his column: "We'd like officers to be perfect, but they are human beings. In the quiet and luxury of our homes, it's easy for us to second-guess police officers who have one chance to under-estimate the power and evilness of a crazed criminal. If an officer is physically threatened, what would you have him do?"

"While you're thinking about that, let's ask ourselves how many officers you think should be killed or injured in the course of arresting a suspect? But a more important issue, in the Rodney King incident, is the news media's dereliction and deception."

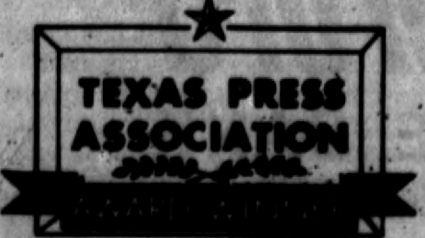

Ghosts of 1961 lurking around 1993 U.S. Senate race

AUSTIN (AP) - They're back. In whispers and shouts, in hallways and doorways, in back rooms and meeting rooms, in Democratic crowds and Republican crowds, it seems everyone in politics is talking about them. They're the ghosts of 1961. And they may be more than a spectre as Texas prepares for another special election of a U.S. senator. "We've got present here the ghost of 1961. It hangs over all of us," Sen. Bob Krueger told Democratic Party leaders recently. "I just hope ... we will not hurt ourselves by not learning the lesson the Democrats learned in 1961," Republican candidate Kay Bailey Hutchison told GOP leaders. That election 31 years ago marked a sea change in Texas politics. In 1960, U.S. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson had run for re-election and also for vice president. Johnson left the Senate to take the nation's No. 2 job. Back in Texas, Gov. Price Daniel named conservative Democrat William Blakley of Dallas as interim senator. A special election was called for April 4, 1961.

A total of 71 candidates paid the \$50 filing fee to run. The crowded field included many of the state's top Democrats: Jim Wright, who would go on to become U.S. House speaker; then-Attorney General Will Wilson; then-state Sen. Henry B. Gonzalez, now a congressman; and Maury Maverick Jr., longtime liberal leader. The far-flung Republicans, meanwhile, looked again to a diminutive Wichita Falls college professor who had garnered a fairly impressive 31 percent of the vote against Johnson the previous November. "My name is Tower, but as you can see, I don't," quipped 5-foot-5 John Goodwin Tower in his stump speeches. He topped the special election with 32 percent of the vote. Blakley was second at 18 percent. A runoff was set. Liberal Democrats were angry with a choice of two conservatives. The rift would prove unbridgeable. As Austin political consultant John Knaggs recounts in his book "Two-Party Texas": "On balmy spring afternoons shortly after the first election, liberals

gathered to ponder their situation under the tall trees of Scholz Beer Garten, their quaint old unofficial headquarters in Austin, virtually in the shadows of the state Capitol. Over pitchers of cold draft beer, they discussed a steaming dilemma with three major facets... The options they saw: vote for Tower to promote a real two-party system, go fishing and vote for neither, or wait for Blakley to moderate. On election day, some liberals voted for Tower, believing he could be knocked off in the next regular election. The outcome was stunning. "If a political Richter Scale had existed on May 27, 1961, it could not have registered the magnitude of the sudden, fierce earthquake that shook the entire state of Texas. Nor could it have measured the aftershock that rumbled across every other state of the old Confederacy," Knaggs writes. "A Republican had been elected to the United States Senate ... The once Democratic Solid South, shaken somewhat by the revolt for Dwight

Eisenhower in the 1950s, had cracked wide open." Texas, where no Republican had held a statewide office since Reconstruction, was on the way to being a two-party state. And the notion that Tower could be beaten proved dead wrong. Sen. Tower went on to win re-election in 1966, 1972 and in 1978, when he faced Krueger. When he retired in 1984, Republican Phil Gramm won the seat and kept it in 1990. Gramm is considered a 1996 presidential prospect. This year, another special election looms. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen's resignation to become Treasury secretary and Krueger's appointment by Gov. Ann Richards have rekindled thoughts of 1961. "Democrats divided, Republicans united. John Tower was there for 24 years and then passed it on to Phil Gramm for eight more," Krueger told the State Democratic Executive Committee as he successfully sought its endorsement. "That's not ancient history ... We

live every day, you live every day, your children live and everyone in the country lives with the consequences of having had a Republican senator when you could have had a Democrat. You got that because we were divided. This time, I'd like to see the Republicans divided," Krueger said. Democratic leaders, from Richards to party Chairman Bob Slagle to the SDEC back Krueger. But two other Democrats - Dallas lawyer Jose Angel Gutierrez and Dallas financier Richard Fisher - have announced and former attorney general Jim Mattox is considering the race. Republicans, meanwhile, have several officeholders seeking the Senate seat - Mrs. Hutchison, the state treasurer; Congressmen Jack Fields of Humble and Joe Barton of Ennis, and Houston businessman Clymer Wright. Barton aggressively sought the endorsement of the State Republican Executive Committee earlier this month. He recalled 1961 and reminded GOP activists that Democrats were rallying.

"You can ... decide to unite the party behind a candidate and have an excellent chance to win in the upcoming special election. Or you decide not to unite and, in all probability, guarantee that a Democrat will win that special election," Barton said. But the SREC voted to remain neutral. GOP Chairman Fred Meyer says his party isn't split but interested in winning with whichever Republican Texans prefer. "Clearly, they are more interested in winning for a Republican than going down the line with one (particular) Republican," he said. Ed Martin, Democratic Party executive director, says Democrats are unified and suggests the Republicans may be divided now. "We're more united than the Republicans. Democrats have been able to learn from our mistakes," he said. "Some of that wedge politics the Republicans used to peel off various interest groups in the past is beginning to come back to haunt them now."

Greenspan endorses economic proposal

WASHINGTON (AP) - Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan endorsed President Clinton's economic program Friday, praising it as a serious effort to attack budget deficits that "threaten the stability of our economic system." Greenspan's prepared comments, handed to reporters before he was to appear before the Senate Banking Committee, represented strong backing for Clinton's program from a key economic policy maker. "The president is to be commended for placing on the table for active debate the issue of our burgeoning structural budget deficit," Greenspan said. "Leaving aside the specific details, it is a serious proposal, its baseline economic assumptions are plausible and it is a detailed program-by-program set of recommendations as distinct from general goals," Greenspan said. He said there would doubtless be debate over the mix of spending cuts and tax increases Clinton has proposed to shrink the deficit by \$325 billion in the next four years. He said he believed getting spending under control was crucial and he hoped Clinton's reform of the nation's health system would contribute significantly toward that. But, he said, most important was to move quickly to cut the deficit, which he said "will increasingly threaten the stability of our economic system if we continue to fail to address it." "How the deficit is reduced is very important, that it be done is crucial," Greenspan told Congress. Greenspan said he could not commit the central bank to specific actions, such as cutting interest rates, because of uncertain economic conditions in coming months. But the central bank "recognizes that it has an important role to play in this regard," he said. That comment, coupled with his strong endorsement of Clinton's efforts, were certain to be viewed as at least an implicit pledge that the Fed would stand ready to provide lower short-term interest rates to offset any adverse impact on the economy from Clinton's massive package of spending cuts and tax increases.

In his prepared testimony Greenspan said, "I can assure you of our shared goal for the American economy - the greatest possible increase in living standards for our citizens over time. "The contributions that monetary policy can make to maximum sustainable economic growth would be complemented by a fiscal policy focused on long-term deficit reduction," he said. The central bank chairman's prepared remarks were delivered to a committee that often has criticized him for moving too slowly to bolster economic growth in the face of the 1990-91 recession. Greenspan defended his past actions while signaling his willingness to cooperate in exchange for deficit reduction. "Recent evidence suggests that our approach to monetary policy in recent years has been appropriate and productive," he said he was not worried about inflation and was prepared to let the economy run full throttle for a time to catch up from the recession. He said last year's 3.25 percent increase in consumer prices, excluding the volatile food and energy sectors, was close to the Federal Reserve's goal of price stability. He said the central bank would still try to contain inflation but said "the economy can grow more rapidly than potential ... for a time, permitting further reductions in the unemployment rate even while inflation is contained." In its semiannual economic projections, the Fed said it expected growth this year in the gross domestic product, the sum of all goods and services produced in the United States, of 3 percent to 3.25 percent. However, it projected only slight improvement in the unemployment rate by the year's final three months between 6.75 percent and 7 percent, compared with 7.1 percent to 7.5 percent, the central bank said. Clinton's plan includes a dose of economic stimulus this year, but after that the budget deficit cuts in his program will tend to restrain the economy, analysts say.

Herd seniors primed for baseball success

With a diamond full of experienced seniors, the Hereford baseball team is primed for a run at the playoffs after a three-year absence. The Herd starts that run when they face Tascosa at 4 p.m. Tuesday at Whiteface Field.

"I think we'll be real competitive this year," coach T.R. Sartor said. "Of course, our goal every year is to make the playoffs, but it's a very realistic goal this year."

Hereford loses only four players from last year's 6-18-2 team, which was fifth at 3-7 in District 1-4A. The Herd returns the leaders in all the offensive statistical categories--including the top five batting averages--as well as the four pitchers with the lowest earned run averages.

If the Herd wins in '93, it'll win with pitching.

"Pitching will be a very strong point for us--we're returning our top three starters from last year--and I think we'll be good defensively," Sartor said.

The top pitcher is senior Sammy Casarez, a second-team all-district selection the past two years. Last year he won four of the Herd's six wins. In 48 2/3 innings he struck out 59 batters, walked 29 and gave up 58 hits. He got better late in the season, having a 2.39 ERA in district play.

Casarez is not a power pitcher. When opposing batters strike out swinging, they often lunge at air, then watch the ball cross the plate. In '92, he pitched all 13 innings of a win over Pampa, then said his arm wasn't really tired.

What makes Casarez good? "No. 1: He's left-handed," Sartor said. "When you've got a left-hander who throws strikes, you can usually get people out. They usually have a lot of movement (on their pitches), and he has a nice curve and a good fork."

And of the 59 runs he allowed in 1992, 31 were unearned, so if the

defense plays well behind him, he can improve on his 4-5 record.

Senior Ruben Ramos is the only other returning pitcher with more than 20 innings. He started several district games and pitched 36 1/3 innings, striking out 29 batters and walking 23. The right-hander picked up a win, three losses and the Herd's only save. He finished with a 6.36 ERA.

Ray Hastings, a junior right-hander, has only one game of varsity experience, but it was quite a game. He hurled a complete-game shutout against Caprock in the next-to-last game of the season. The two-hitter at Caprock's home field knocked the Longhorns out of playoff contention.

The pitchers will need good defense behind them, and they'll need some runs. Sartor believes the Herd will provide the defense and hopes they can get the runs.

"I believe if we can score runs, we're going to be hard to beat," Sartor said, "because the rest of the game we can do real well."

Sartor can fill out the batting order with several capable offensive players, mostly seniors.

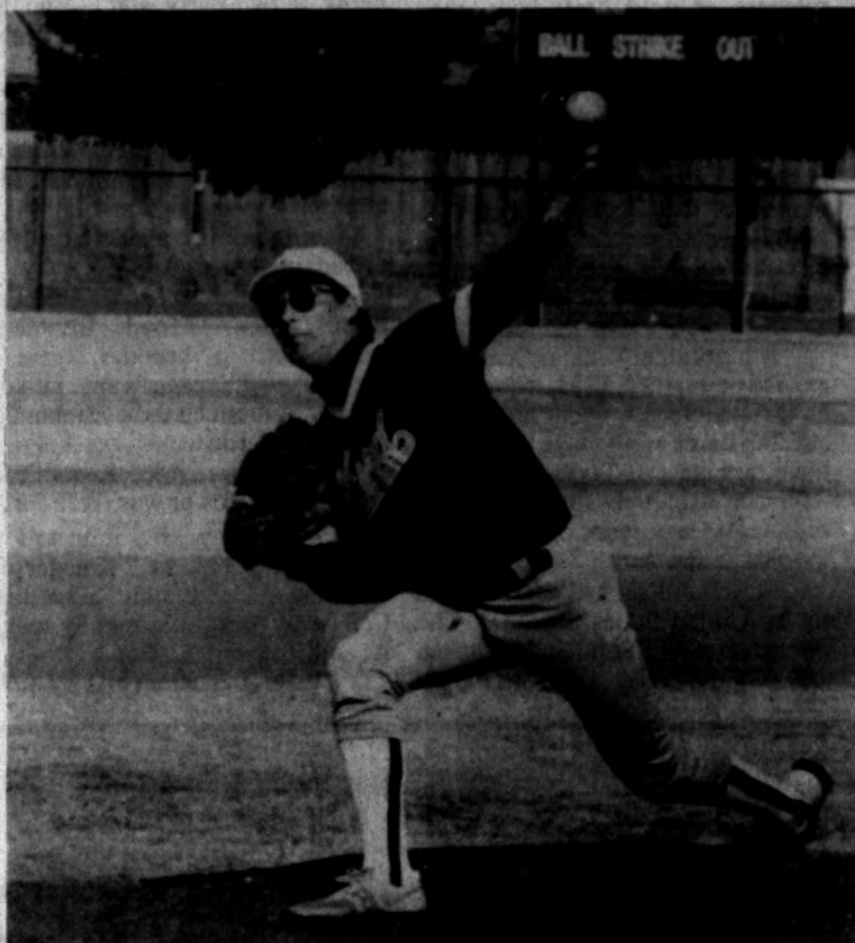
Jake Head was the Herd's only first-team all-district selection after batting .357 in district play. The right fielder hit .367 overall to lead the Herd, and he was second with 15 RBI.

Ramos, who serves as the designated hitter when he's not pitching, led Hereford with 17 RBI and was right behind Head with a .363 average. He had one of Hereford's three home runs in '92.

Shortstop Rene Cano batted .328 (.361 in district) and led the Herd with 16 runs and 15 stolen bases from the leadoff position. He even drove in 10 runs in district play, leading Hereford in district. He had 11 RBI overall.

Tab Hathaway has been a starter at third base for three years. Last year he batted .313 with 10 RBI.

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Difference of one year sends Guzman to Cubs

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - There for the lack of a cellular telephone goes Jose Guzman to the Chicago Cubs.

Guzman packed his bags last week for Mesa, Ariz., and a new start in the National League.

In December, Guzman signed a four-year contract with Chicago for \$14.35 million after the Texas Rangers failed to increase a three-year offer because they couldn't reach owner Rusty Rose, who was on a hunting trip.

The Cubs bagged Guzman, 29, in the prime of his career.

He fidgeted in his chair at the Rangers' annual midwinter banquet recently, where he picked up the Harold McKinney Good Guy Award. Is this ironic or what?

Guzman was discovered at age 11 by former Rangers coach Orlando

Gomez, who signed him six years later, a shy, lanky kid with a skittering fastball who needed his father's permission to play big league baseball.

Guzman grew up with the Rangers, built a home nearby and started a family. He always said he wanted to retire a Ranger. But deep down, he knew that wouldn't happen.

He was like the suitor who, try as he might, just couldn't shake the hunch that the object of his desire would break his heart again.

Guzman reached the majors in 1985. After three solid seasons, he reported to spring training in 1989 with a torn rotator cuff that needed surgery. He missed that entire season, as well as the next.

They said he'd never come back, and certainly not as the power pitcher he once was. Guzman spent his rehabilitation years figuring out ways

to set up batters with slower stuff.

But after a decent spring training in 1991, the Rangers released Guzman. Other teams clamored for him, yet Gomez talked him into signing a minor league contract with the Rangers organization.

He was called up on May 21, 1991, and on June 14 Guzman beat the New York Yankees for his first major league victory since Aug. 28, 1988. Afterwards, he cried.

He led the team that year with 13 victories and five complete games.

Last season, he went 16-11 with a team-high 179 strikeouts and a 3.66 ERA and would have had an even better year had his bullpen not failed him seven times.

He used the banquet to say farewell.

"I want them to know I did what was best for my family," Guzman said. "It never was a money thing.

The only thing I wanted was four years.

"We were talking to nine teams, and everybody was giving me four years. The Rangers were the only ones that wanted to give me three years," he said. "If it was for the money, I would have taken the Yankees at \$17-point-something million."

The Rangers could have signed Guzman at the All-Star break for three years at \$8.1 million plus a club option for a fourth year, but instead offered \$7 million.

After the trading deadline, Guzman's agent, Barry Meister, said Guzman would sign only a four-year contract, but the Rangers' last offer was for three years with an option for a fourth at a guarantee of \$10 million.

With Chicago's offer on the table, Meister told the Rangers they could keep Guzman for four years and \$14

And baseball is a business, just as sure as Jose Guzman is a Chicago Cub.

Rangers president Tom Schieffer, who, upon taking the job, said that while he couldn't promise any pennants, he would guarantee the beer would always be cold and the nachos hot at Arlington Stadium, couldn't reach Rose for authority to make a counteroffer, and Guzman signed with Chicago.

"I couldn't keep waiting," Guzman said. "I didn't want the Cubs to change their minds."

Schieffer was angry that Guzman and Meister never accepted his invitation to meet face-to-face, and he told reporters that the Rangers refused to go four years because of Guzman's past arm problems.

"That hurt a lot," said Guzman, who made 58 straight starts for Texas over the last two seasons. "I never expected him to put me down like that. My arm

Cotton Bowl shouldn't have replaced Brock

DALLAS (AP) - You may have missed the announcement, sparse as it was, but the Cotton Bowl has a new voice box.

Jim "Hoss" Brock, one of the most colorful characters of all the New Year's bowl games, has been silenced.

No, the Cotton Bowl Athletic Association officials didn't put a gun to his head and tell him to shut up. It was more subtle, something like "you can stay on as a consultant for two more years if you say nothing about your demotion."

The popular Brock, who was the Cotton Bowl's high profile man, was replaced as chairman of the CBAA's Team Selection Committee by Jim Ray Smith.

Since Brock has a gag order, we're left to our own guesswork over what may have happened.

More about that later.

"No comment," said Brock, his tonsils nearly breaking at the restraint. "Can't comment."

The Barnum and Bailey of college football with a cork in his mouth! What a brilliant move by the CBAA amateurs.

Here's a bowl that sorely needs goodwill, publicity, an insider in college football circles, and someone with mega media contacts. The CBAA just demoted the one guy who could do it all for them.

It was Brock's courtship of Doug Flutie that brought the Heisman Trophy winner and Boston College to the Cotton Bowl. It was Brock who went out and got Ohio State, who sold

Bo Jackson and Auburn, who almost made South Bend, Ind., a second home to make sure the Cotton Bowl never lost out on Notre Dame.

It was Brock who made sure Troy Aikman and UCLA were showcased as a guest team in the Cotton Bowl.

Reporters and writers who didn't know another bowl official in the world all knew "The Hoss."

He was outgoing, never saw a hand he didn't shake, and never got a telephone call he didn't return. He was quotable and he was available.

The Cotton Bowl in a million years couldn't pay for the free publicity he generated for the New Year's Day game. And the Cotton Bowl needed it, too, particularly during off years by the Southwest Conference which is the bowl's host.

But now we're told Jimmy Ray can do all that. The CBAA figures since the bowl coalition is in place everything is on automatic pilot. Sure everybody knows Jim Ray because he was All-America at Baylor and played for the Cleveland Browns and Dallas Cowboys. But does Jim Ray know everybody he needs to know in the business?

Robert Smith III, president of the CBAA, will serve as the bowl's spokesman.

"The CEO is the legal spokesman for an organization," Smith said. "From time to time, Jim will be doing things. The focus now will be on our volunteers. We have to spread everything beyond just one person. Nothing against Jim but we need to maximize what we need to do."

Brock, 59, deserved more from the CBAA. In the seven paragraph announcement they didn't even thank Brock for his service since 1976.

It was more like "we're moving you to this broom closet and you will still be paid and get three meals a day. March."

No thanks for services rendered.

Numerous reasons are given for Brock's demotion by CBAA insiders, everything from his divorce, to the bowl's financial problems, to bringing in new blood, to jealousy for Brock's high profile lifestyle.

None holds water. A divorce is nobody's business but Brock's. He couldn't be blamed for an IRS crackdown on bowl sponsors and did the best he could to increase television revenues. Brock may be an old horse but he'll ride long and hard. And for jealousy, Brock is Brock. Every bowl in the Southwest needs a funny little guy in a cowboy hat with a cigar jammed in his mouth.

Brock took a lot of heat for the Cotton Bowl's decision to select fifth-ranked Notre Dame instead of third-ranked Florida State for this year's Cotton Bowl but it really wasn't Brock's decision. He didn't have that much power left.

The CBAA long knives waited until after the Cotton Bowl before they slipped Brock the steel.

But anybody in the Cotton Bowl press box New Year's Day knew he was a goner.

For the first time, the uncomfortable Hoss didn't come by after the game to thank everybody for coming. Nobody else did either.

And that tells you a lot about the people who will try to replace the Hoss. These are hard, bottom-line business people.

And you thought the Cotton Bowl was just a game.

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
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Coleman plans to keep Spurs in San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Thanks to a group of local investors, the San Antonio Spurs will be around next year to defend the Alamo - the Alamodome that is.

An investment group spearheaded by golfwear millionaire Bob Coleman on Friday bought the Spurs from owner B.J. "Red" McCombs for \$75 million, ending two years of speculation about a takeover.

Coleman, whose multi-million dollar San Antonio company Texace Corp. is a leading manufacturer of golf hats and visors, vowed to keep the team at home, where it will debut next year in the city-owned posh, new Alamodome.

"It's become apparent to Red and to all of us that we need a broader base of ownership involved to make sure that the Spurs remain competitive and to provide long-term stability for the franchise here in San Antonio," said Coleman, 60, who is expected to become managing general partner of the team upon completion of the sale.

The Spurs, led by David Robinson, are currently one of the hottest teams in the NBA. And Friday's pact could turn into a sweetheart deal for the new owners if first-year head coach John Lucas can translate his regular-season success into a run in the playoffs.

Despite the Spurs' recent rise, McCombs said, "It's a happy day for me."

superstars," said Detroit Pistons' Isiah Thomas, who'll be making his 12th consecutive All-Star game appearance Sunday when he, O'Neal, Johnson and the rest of the Eastern Conference take on the best of the Western Conference in the league's 43rd midseason showcase.

"Larry's the present and the future at his position," said Phoenix Suns' Charles Barkley, who heads the West squad. "And Shaq ... he's an awesome physical specimen."

Thomas, Barkley and Michael Jordan are at least 30 years old.

O'Neal and Johnson both admitted to being a little nervous as their first All-Star game approaches. Both said they were emphasizing fun over pressure to please the masses who voted them into the East's starting lineup.

"The All-Star game is like Disneyland," O'Neal said. "There's a lot of attractions and I'm just one of them."

At 20 years old and in his first year of pro ball, O'Neal is the main attraction.

He's a 7-foot-1, 301-pound package of power and pizzazz who got caught up in some controversy through no fault of his own by being the fan's choice over New York Knicks' Patrick Ewing.

"It's good for the league," Johnson said. "People realize that Magic, Bird and those guys weren't going to be around forever. I think they realize that Michael, Charles and those guys aren't going to be around forever, either. So I think it's good for the league's image to see two young guys starting."

East coach Pat Riley of New York said today's younger players don't seem willing to sacrifice for the good of the team.

"One of the most difficult things to teach players is to do the things they don't want to do in order to achieve what the team wants," Riley said. "Today, it's all about recognition, about making their mark, about taking care of themselves."

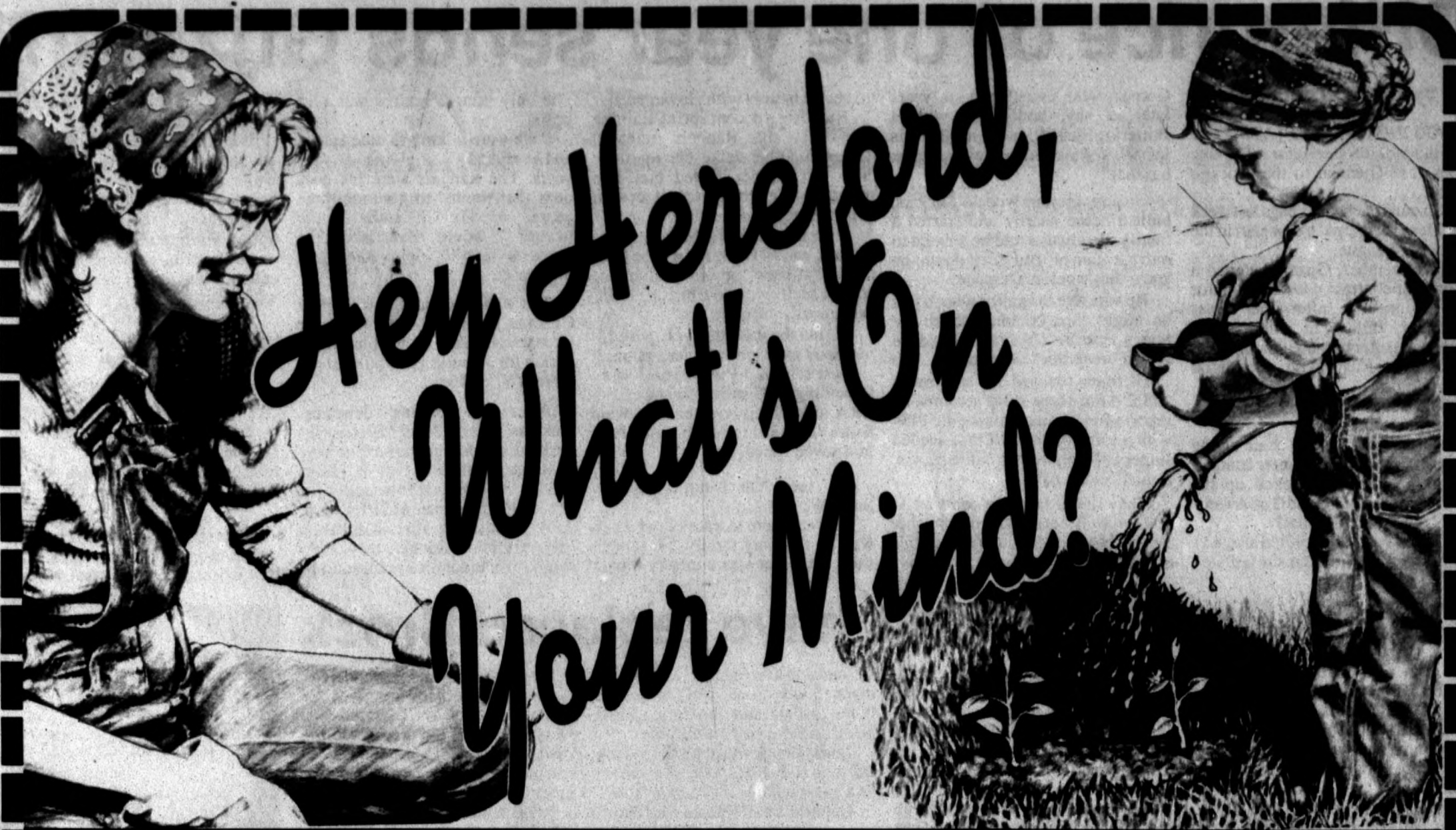
"The marketing, that's what it's all about. And that sometimes gets in the way of a player's development when it comes to the essence of winning."

Is your therapist exploiting you?

"How can I tell if my therapist is exploiting me?" In light of recent stories about therapist/patient sex in the news media and the movies, that question may be troubling many who are undergoing therapy or considering it.

The overwhelming majority of psychiatrists and other licensed mental health professionals practice ethically. Studies indicate that six to seven percent of psychiatrists and other therapists have been sexually involved with a patient during their careers. Even one instance is too many, and the American Psychiatric Association (APA) vigorously investigates ethical complaints against its members, most often suspending or expelling those found guilty.

The APS's Committee on Ethics offers this advice to help you tell if your therapist may be stepping over the ethical line:

In psychotherapy, therapists help patients to explore their deepest needs, desires, feelings and fears. The intimacy and intensity of the trusting relationship they form with their patients—so necessary to a positive outcome—gives rise to the whole range of human emotion, including sexual feelings. Psychiatrists and most other licensed mental health professionals are trained to cope with these feelings, and the vast majority maintain appropriate professional distance. However, as treatment intensifies, the necessary boundaries of therapy may begin to erode with a small minority. You should be wary if your therapist:

- Begins to disclose personal problems or begins to discuss his or her personal life, including sexual experience, in detail;
- Offers to reduce the fee or not to charge for sessions, even when payment is not a hardship;
- Offers to socialize with you outside the office or outside office hours;
- Begins to touch you in seemingly "comforting" ways, such as hugging, putting an arm around you during

therapy, holding your hand or caressing you;

-Begins to regularly extend therapy sessions significantly beyond the normal session-by ten to fifteen minutes or more;

-Suggests a relationship beyond that of therapist and patient—for instance, offers you the opportunity to participate in business deals or solicits stock market advice;

A back pat, a hug, use of a first name or an offer to extend a particularly intense therapy session are not necessarily precludes to impropriety. But if they become part of the pattern that makes you feel uncomfortable, you should confront the therapist with the behavior and ask him or her to stop.

Extension News

Take a visit to a local clothing store or glance through some mail order catalogs and you will see that polka dots are still in fashion. Polka dots are seen in a variety of colors and sizes. Some polka dotted fabrics are washable. Others are dryclean only. Many of the dots are not drycleanable especially on stencil prints. A stencil print has a raised surface design and is made by applying a lacquer to the fabric through a stencil template. The template can be made of cardboard, wood, or metal. Color is applied over the stencil by rollers, brushes, or sponges.

Stencil printed polka dots can be recognized by their glossy, paint-like appearance on the surface of the fabric. They often need a plasticizer to keep them soft and pliable. The plasticizer may be soluble in drycleaning solvent. When the plasticizer dissolves, it causes the dots to stiffen, curl, shrivel, or crack. Stencil printed polka dots are usually used on rayon, acetate, polyester, nylon, or synthetic/cellulose blended fabrics. Occasionally, stencil prints are seen in outerwear garments.


When caring for polka dotted fabrics, follow the care label to avoid permanent damage such as bleeding of the color to your fabric and clothing investments.

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YOUR EYES —

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The macula is the central portion of the retina that is responsible for fine detail. With age, it is not uncommon that the macula begins to deteriorate and patients develop blank spots or distortions in central vision; the spots widen in time, but there is no pain. Some peripheral vision always remains.

It's vital to see an eye doctor as soon as symptoms appear, because one type of age-related macular degeneration can be arrested if treated promptly. Otherwise, there is currently no cure or correction available.

Symptoms to watch out for include:

- The appearance of a gray film in front of the eyes
- A straight line looks wavy, curved or chopped up
- Objects, or part of them, seem magnified or smaller than usual
- When reading a line of letters or words, certain letters drop out the blank spots remain.

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

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Auxiliary to raise funds

A gourmet - a food columnist - enters a restaurant that has a reputation for a varied menu of excellent quality. He has a dilemma - he wants to try so many things, but he is limited by time and capacity. He would like to focus on what he personally enjoys, but to be true to his readers he must at least sample some of those items he deems unpalatable, to determine if they are prepared correctly and served in the proper manner. With hesitancy he makes his choices, samples the wares, and writes his report.

-DO keep eyeglasses in their cases when not being worn.

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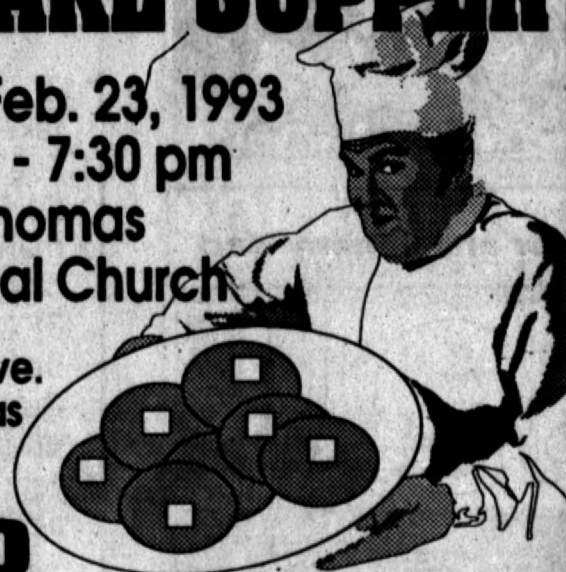

Marketing's Dying Art

Often in workshops and seminars I ask business owners to define the term "marketing." One of the most common answers I get is "selling." While selling is certainly a very important part of marketing, it is only a part.

To define marketing as selling is a little like describing an automobile as an engine. Yes, autos have engines, but there is much more. An engine alone does not make an automobile. However, the engine does provide the power for that automobile.

I believe personal selling provides the "go power" in a marketing program. Selling is a function that is critical to every element of the marketing mix. Many feel that selling is also a dying art.

We all sell

There is an old saying that nothing happens until somebody

sells something. I have seen this proved again and again.

In the early 1970's, I traveled extensively in the state of Michigan. I worked in many of the cities where automobiles rolled off the assembly lines. I can still recall seeing thousands of acres of brand new cars in towns like Flint, Pontiac, Saginaw, Bay City and Detroit. The cars weren't selling and there was a glut of brand new automobiles.

I also remember the boarded up windows of the businesses in those cities. The message is clear to me now: it doesn't matter what you can produce, your business will struggle if you can't sell it. It is equally true for big corporations and for each of us as individuals.

Robert Louis Stevenson said, "Everyone lives by selling something." Stevenson was right. A teacher lives by selling ideas and sound educational principles. A business consultant lives by selling solutions to difficult problems. An automobile dealer lives by selling dependable transportation and status. A welder lives by selling mechanical skills.

Some of you are thinking wait a minute, Don, what about the "dying art" statement. If everyone is selling something, how can selling be a dying art.

Unfortunately, few workers today realize how important selling is to their livelihood. Most do not understand how their only job security comes from a healthy economy. An economy where businesses are selling their products and services at a profit. Even if you work for the government, business profits and taxable wages paid by those businesses generate the salary you receive.

Although it is a common misconception, no one is a "born salesperson." You must develop sales skills in the same manner you

develop other skills - through knowledge and practice.

Some thoughts on selling

In my more than 40 years of selling experience - for the record I started selling my mother on the concept that cookies were good for me when I was 4 years old - I've learned a few good selling basics I'd like to share with you.

- Always tell the truth.
- Sell the benefits - not the features.
- Don't underestimate the value of product knowledge - it is important
- Don't argue with a potential customer - you may win the argument, but you'll lose the sale.
- Put yourself in your customers shoes - even if they don't fit.
- Look for "I'm ready to buy" signals - then ask for the business.
- Don't laugh at your competitor's selling errors - there is a lesson to learn if you're alert.
- The sale isn't over when you get the money - give follow-up service and sell them again.
- Don't bet the farm on customer loyalty - you're only as good as your last sale.
- Don't wait until you're in trouble to start selling - dig the well before you're thirsty.

Questions and Answers

Q: I recently installed an exhaust fan in my bathroom which I vented in the ridge vent. I must be having a condensation problem because I get a lot of water pouring out of the fan duct. How can I correct this?

A: You're right on target. Condensation is occurring in the flexible duct when the warm moist air from the bathroom comes in contact

with the colder air inside the duct. Usually the exhaust fan can move the air out fast enough to prevent condensation, but this is not happening in your case. Try reducing the length of the flexible duct. This will result in a higher temperature of the discharging air which may be enough to eliminate condensation. If this fails, your problem can be solved by insulating the duct.

Mortgage interest is deductible expense

(Fourth in a series)

WASHINGTON (AP) - Nearly three-quarters of taxpayers don't have to worry about finding deductions to itemize when they file their tax returns. They simply take the standard deduction.

More than 40 percent of couples and individuals itemized before the 1986 tax overhaul took away deductions for interest and state and local sales taxes and restricted writeoffs for medical care and most miscellaneous expenses.

As a result, only about 28 percent itemized on returns filed in 1992. In general, don't bother to itemize unless your deductions exceed the standard.

For 1992 earnings, that is \$3,600 for a single person; \$6,000 for a couple filing a joint return; \$3,000 for a married person filing separately, and \$5,250 for a head of household. The figures are higher for those who are blind or past their 65th birthday.

Nevertheless, more than 31 million couples and individuals are expected to itemize on returns filed this year,

and the chief reason is the deduction for interest on a home mortgage.

You may deduct all interest on mortgages taken out before Oct. 14, 1987, so long as they then did not exceed the market value of the home.

Interest on mortgages signed on or after that date is fully deductible if the money was used to buy, build or improve the home. Another condition: The loans, when combined with earlier outstanding mortgages, must have totaled \$1 million or less.

In addition, interest on another \$100,000 of home-equity loans for any purpose is deductible.

Regardless of the date of the loans, you may divide your deductible mortgages between your principal home and a second home.

If you refinanced a pre-Oct. 14, 1987, mortgage to get a lower interest rate and the new loan is no larger than the balance of the old, all the interest on the new mortgage is deductible. But if the refinanced loan is bigger, the \$1 million and \$100,000 limitations apply.

A new rule: A buyer using a seller-financed mortgage must report

the seller's name on Schedule A.

Points - loan-origination fees - paid in 1992 may be deducted in full on your 1992 return only if the loan was used to buy or improve your main home, and if the points were in line with what is customarily charged in your area. The points must be paid directly to the lender and listed specifically on your closing statement.

If those tests are not met, points must be deducted over the life of the loan.

In general, points paid to refinance a mortgage must be deducted gradually over the life of the loan. But in the seven states under jurisdiction of the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals - Arkansas, Missouri, Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska, South Dakota and North Dakota - points may be deducted immediately when a short-term mortgage is refinanced into a long-term loan.

See Publication 936, free from the IRS.

Other itemized deductions, some of which may be limited for higher-income people:

- **MEDICAL.** Deduct unreimbursed expenditures for medical expenses, such as prescriptions, doctors' and dentists' fees, medical insurance premiums including Medicare Part B, eyeglasses, nursing care, hearing aids and transportation - but only those expenses that exceed 7 1/2 percent of your adjusted gross income.

- **TAXES.** Income and real estate taxes paid to a state or local government are fully deductible. So are personal-property taxes on cars and boats if they are based on value rather than weight.

- **INVESTMENT INTEREST.** The deduction is limited to an amount equal to total net investment income.

- **CONTRIBUTIONS.** Donations to recognized charities are deductible, generally up to half your adjusted gross income. If you received a benefit in return, only the part of your contribution over the value of the benefit is deductible. Out-of-pocket expenses of helping a charity are

deductible, but the value of your services is not. If you gave goods worth more than \$500, report those contributions on Form 8283.

- **LOSSES.** Deduct non-business losses caused by fire, theft, storm or other casualties, but not by breakage or misplacing. Subtract the first \$100 of the loss and deduct only the portion of the remainder that exceeds 10 percent of your adjusted gross income. See Form 4684.

- **MOVING.** Some expenses of a job-related move may be deducted if your new job is at least 35 miles farther from your old home than was the old

job. You qualify, for example, if your old job was five miles from home and your new job is at least 40 miles from the old home. See Publication 521.

- **MISCELLANEOUS.** Certain expenses relating to your employment or investments, such as union dues, tools and investment advice, are deductible, but only that part of the total exceeding 2 percent of adjusted gross income. A few miscellaneous expenses may be written off without regard to that limitation, including gambling losses that do not exceed winnings and some work expenses of a handicapped person.

Choosing right nail for job is crucial

There's more to driving a nail than just hammering it in. By selecting the right nail for the job and using effective nailing techniques you can ensure that you'll get a job that lasts and that your fingers will remain intact.

NAIL TYPES

- Common nails are best for constructions, rough carpentry and other heavy-duty jobs because their broad heads won't pull through the wood.

- For extra holding power, use coated nails or nails with spiral shanks or annular rings.

- Finishing nails are used for cabinetry trim and other fine work because their small heads are easy to conceal.

- Many flooring and masonry nails are specially hardened. NOTE: Hardened nails sometimes snap instead of bending when they are struck at an angle. Be sure to wear safety goggles to protect your eyes against flying pieces.

- A wallboard nail is used for installing gypsum wallboard (also called drywall or plasterboard). Its annular rings are designed to prevent it from popping as a house settles.

NAILING TIPS

- For most nailing jobs, use an ordinary 16-ounce claw hammer. Keep it clean - a smudge on the face of the hammer head can be transferred almost indelibly to the work.

- Hold the hammer handle as far from the head as possible without

sacrificing a firm grip. After the nail is started, swing the hammer from your elbow.

- To start a nail, hold it and tap (don't bang) it a few times to drive it just far enough to stand up by itself. Take your fingers away and swing the hammer a little harder - but only a little. Don't use heavy strokes until you have driven the nail about an inch into the wood.

WHEN STARTING A NAIL:

- Hold it between your index and middle finger with your palm up. If you accidentally miss the nailhead, you'll strike the fleshy part of your fingers, which hurts a lot less than hitting your thumb or fingernail.

- If a nail is too small to hold with your fingers, use a bobby pin or a pair of needle-nose pliers to hold it in place. Or push small nails and tacks through a thin piece of cardboard so that your fingers can be kept clear of the hammer.

- Use a magnetized tack hammer for starting tiny brads or tacks.

- When joining two wood pieces of different thicknesses, drive nails through the thin piece into the thick one. Use nails three times as long as the thickness of the thin piece so that two-thirds of their lengths will be securely anchored.

- For greater holding power, drive the nails at angles, slanting them slightly toward or away from one another. For maximum strength, drive a long nail through both pieces and hammer the point over.

TO PREVENT WOOD FROM SPLITTING:

- Stagger nails rather than placing them along the same grain line.

- In hardwood, drill pilot holes slightly smaller than the nails.

- Before driving a nail near the end of a piece, blunt the nail's point with a hammer so that the point will shear through the wood instead of wedging it apart and splitting.

- If you're driving common nails in rough work such as house framing, drive the nails in flush with the surface and don't bother to be careful

about hammer marks.

- If you're using finishing nails for work where appearance counts, stop when the head is just above the surface. Then use a nail set, a tool available in any hardware store, to drive the head below the surface. Fill the hole with putty or wood filler.

- Another way to conceal a nail head is to chisel a shaving parallel to the wood grain, leaving the shaving attached to the surface. Drive in the nails. Then glue the shaving back in place over the nailhead.

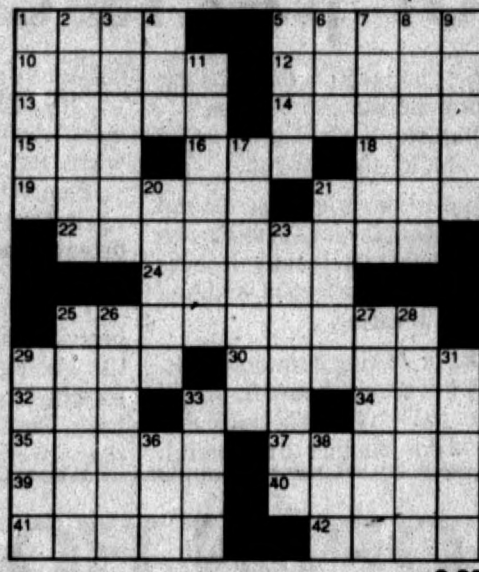

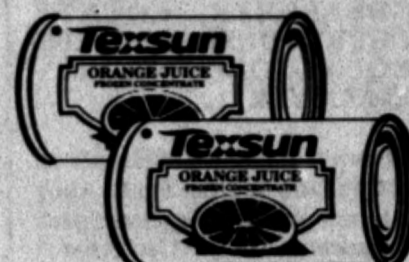

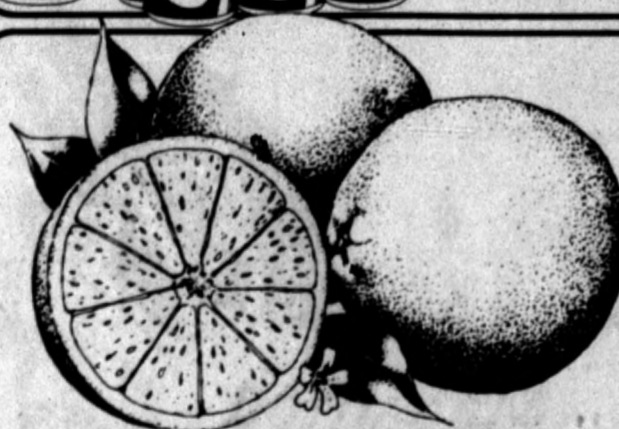

Special retrospective of
'Saturday Night Live' music

NBC's *Saturday Night Live* made a commitment to music with its very first broadcast on Oct. 11, 1975, which featured musical guests Janis Ian and Billy Preston. The performance venue created by SNL had no equal in television; artists could gain unprecedented exposure playing live before an audience of millions. The show has always been democratic in its choice of performers, presenting not only the hottest musical acts of the day (The Rolling Stones, Blondie, The Cars), but also the up-and-coming (Stevie Ray Vaughan, Public Enemy, EMF). Likewise, mainstream artists like Ray Charles, Martha Reeves and Paul Simon were given equal time with fringe acts such as The B-52s, Frank Zappa and Devo.

Sunday, Feb. 21, NBC recalls musical highlights of SNL's 18-year-history in the two-hour special *Wayne & Garth's Saturday Night Live Music A Go-Go*.

As the title suggests, the guides for this journey through the past are public-access TV heroes Wayne Campbell (Mike Myers) and his best bud, Garh Algar (Dana Carvey). Their rallying cry of "Party On!" sets a "most excellent" tone for this collection of melodious memories, including the time Aerosmith dropped by Wayne's basement studio to jam.

Other clips recall Bruce Springsteen's first ever television performance, Madonna's subdued though ratings-grabbing gig from last month, the music with a mission of The Blues Brothers (Dan Aykroyd and John Belushi) and the folk style of frequent guest Paul Simon (who once sang "Still Crazy After All These Years"

dressed in a turkey suit). And there's much more: Eric Clapton, Whitney Houston, Roy Orbison, Pearl Jam and Stevie Wonder.

Knowing that any SNL special must have its quota of laughs, the producers have included moments with Bill Murray as Nick the Lounge Singer and *Weekend Update* contributor "Opera Man" (Adam Sandler). And there are musical impersonations, such as Eddie Murphy as Stevie Wonder and Jan Hooks as Sinead O'Connor.

Over the years, SNL has consistently been television's best barometer of popular music, showcasing the biggest names and the newest trends for the widest audience. From K.C. and the Sunshine Band's SNL appearance during the disco years to Nirvana and Pearl Jam's delivery of grunge rock to America in the '90s, SNL continually proves it knows which way the wind blows.

The foundation of this musical dynasty is in its title: The performances are "live" without retakes or the

Will TV be the same?

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) - What will television offer at the turn of the century?

A combined menu of junk food and three-star meals, said Michael Fuchs of HBO. New opportunities to educate and enlighten, said Jennifer Lawson of PBS. Too many choices, said singer-actor Ruben Blades.

All wrong, said W. Russell Neuman, a Tufts University professor. "It won't even BE television."

Even the word will sound as dated then as "horseless carriage" does now, Neuman predicted at a recent Harvard University conference on the future of television.

It isn't clear what we'll call America's favorite pastime. But, Neuman said, "it will be an entirely new medium." Two-way fiber optics will replace one-way cables, letting former couch potatoes and channel-surfers take a more active role.

"The number of channels becomes completely meaningless in the year 2000 because you've got as many channels as you want," Neuman said. "If you want to watch a particular episode of the 'Mary Tyler Moore Show,' you call it up."

Advertiser-supported programming and the network structures will eventually become "wonderful historical anecdotes," said Neuman, also a research fellow at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Instead, he said, viewers will pay program fees; say, \$2 for a show with ads, \$4 without. "Television will really be in your control," Neuman said.

No one questioned the eventual arrival of some sort of interactive television, a concept that got wide public attention last year with Ross Perot's call for the "electronic town meeting." But not everybody embraced the idea with enthusiasm.

"We run the risk of the technology dehumanizing television, outstripping

the content of television," said Fuchs, chairman and chief executive officer of HBO, which co-sponsored the conference.

The plethora of program choices will be "a wonderful thing," Blades said, but he questioned whether viewers would actually watch everything available - or even understand how to access it.

"I think that we risk becoming the best-informed society that ever died of ignorance," the two-time Grammy Award winner said.

The medium's next stage will reflect its surroundings, Blades said. "The future of television is going to be defined by the type of society we evolve into," he said.

Retired New York Times columnist Tom Wicker took issue with that prediction, saying the relationship between television and its audience already resembles a revolving door more than a mirror.

"I don't think I quite agree that we have the power to shape the instrument as we wish," Wicker said. "Because, you see, that instrument also shapes us. ... As television changes us in ways we don't fully understand, then we feed back into television."

Lawson, an executive vice president at PBS, said the new technology could create "a place where the voices we don't hear are heard - loud, clear, in ways we've never heard before."

But she said those expanded choices must be made available to everyone, including those who can't afford to pay for them.

"As we look out at this new landscape of telecommunication possibilities, we must create a vision of what our non-commercial needs are, what our education needs are, that can be served by that technology, and try to build that into the creation of new systems," she said.

In an earlier discussion, author and sociologist Todd Gitlin noted that, despite a growing supermarket of choices, current television viewers face a curious "video uniformity."

"Alongside, or beneath, whatever 'diversity' is emerging, there is also something of a common style that carries across television in general - from the sitcom to the news, the commercial to the late-night chat, from Arsenio Hall to David Letterman," he said.

And even with the much-lauded technological miracles, don't expect much improvement, Gitlin warned.

"For all the abundance of delivery systems, under foreseeable circumstances, the small screen is unlikely to transform the possibilities of culture for the better," he said.

layering of tracks. While the spontaneity allows for a fresher feel to the music, the live situation has also opened the door for broadcasting nightmares. The biggest controversy arose last year when Sinead O'Connor, who had been provided a 42-piece orchestra by SNL, announced on the day of the show she would sing Bob Marley's "War" a cappella and conclude by holding up a photo of a Bosnian child. As millions of viewers know, the picture turned out to be one of the pope, which she tore to pieces.

The musical stage of SNL has attained sort of a mystical status where anything can happen. The Beatles declined.

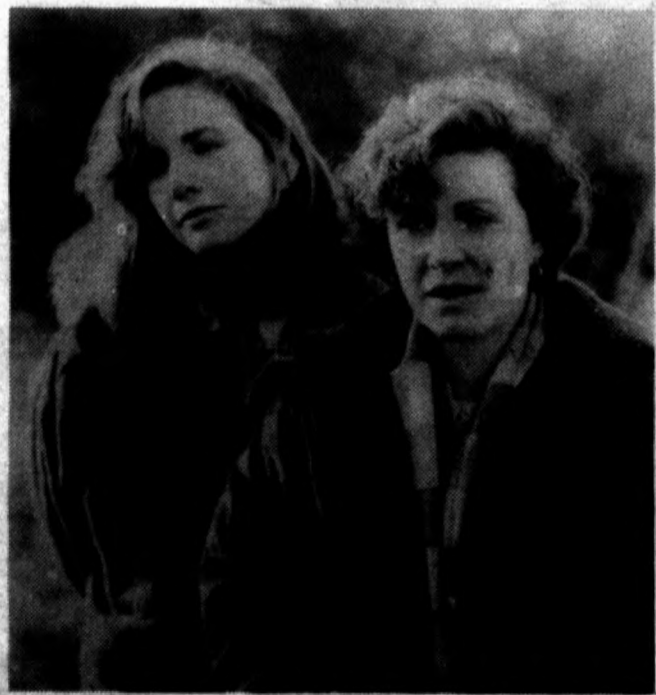

Shari and Lamb Chop aren't just playing around on; Play-Along'

NEW YORK (AP) - At almost six years old going on 40, Lamb Chop is one of TV's most enduring ingenues.

Sweet as mint jelly, she charms each new wave of youngsters, even as adults nurse hopeless crushes that reach back to their preschool years.

No wonder. With fluffy leggings and long lashes, Lamb Chop isn't just a sock puppet but also the embodiment of ageless girliness.

"Really?" says Shari Lewis, amazed as a reporter rhapsodizes about Lamb Chop's mutton-down appeal. "I wish she were here to hear all this."

Instead, the hoof-loose-and-fancy-free Lamb Chop is off playing as Lewis talks up their latest success: "Lamb Chop's Play-Along," a starring vehicle for its leading lamb, but an effort in which Lewis also clearly lends a hand.

"Play-Along" began its weekday run in January 1992 on PBS stations (check local listings). Next week, another season begins, with 35 new

episodes awaiting the show's kiddie constituency.

A new "Play-Along" playmate is BUSTER the Bus, an 8-foot by 6-foot creation that Lewis proudly calls "the biggest puppet to ever hit children's television."

Mostly "Play-Along" will be unchanged from its basic but proven format.

The series features Lewis, decked out in her flouncy overalls, along with two or three adorable youngsters, plus puppet pals including Lamb Chop, Hush Puppy and Charlie Horse.

Each half-hour is filled with jokes, games, songs and tricks. Everything takes place in a grassy backyard underneath a tree.

"Our focus is, don't just sit there - come play with me," says Lewis, who sitting in a Manhattan publicist's office seems adult-like, alright, in her gray pantsuit, but still has the bright shining eyes and slightly fidgety manner of any kid.

This, in someone who has been in

show business for four decades.

"A woman came up to me the other day and said, 'Are you the original Shari Lewis?'"

Yes, and that's no woolly bully.

As a teen-ager in 1952, Lewis and her ventriloquism skills took first prize on Arthur Godfrey's "Talent Scouts" program. In the early '60s, she and her lamb of opportunity starred in a Saturday morning kids' show on NBC. Then Lewis expanded her audience by performing in summer stock and Las Vegas showrooms.

In 1977, she began conducting major symphony orchestras in a family-oriented show she devised. Along the way, she produced a dozen videos and published more than 50 children's books.

Then, a bit more than a year ago, she was back on TV with a new series almost willfully old-fashioned, both in form and content.

Lewis calls her subsequent warm

reception "the result of more responsible parenting. Many baby boomers are not eager for their children to have a steady diet of cartoons."

"If we can provide entertainment for children that's thoroughly innocent, really wholesome, and at the same time stimulating, we'll be providing a real service."

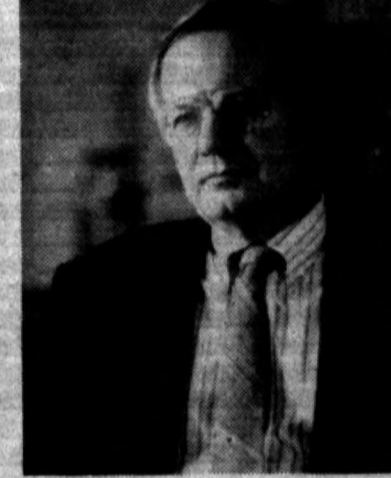

Gilbert brings personal experience to latest role

Melissa Gilbert returns to television Sunday, Feb. 21, in *A Family of Strangers* on CBS. The film is the latest in a growing list of television-movie credits for the actress who has long since outgrown her role as Laura Ingalls in *Little House on the Prairie*.

Her current project is based on the true story of a woman who discovers she was adopted when forced to trace her medical history in order to have life-saving brain surgery.

The story hit close to home for Gilbert, herself an adopted child, who only last year sought out her birth family after putting it off for a number of years.

"What prompted me to start the search was the birth of my son," Gilbert says. "I realized then what it was like to have a genetic link to someone."

After months of searching on her own, Gilbert used a private service to speed up the process. Her birth parents had no idea who she was or what had happened to her.

"It was like, 'Hello, I'm your child, and by the way, you've been watching me on television for the past 20 years ...'" Gilbert says.

"They were quite surprised," she says. "It was a very emotional experience for all of us."

Gilbert's recent experience played a large part in her decision to take the role in *A Family of Strangers*.

"There wasn't a moment that went by on the film when I didn't have some sort of personal connection," she says.

Anti-gay policies to be documented on television

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Allan Berube and Arthur Dong think the highly charged debate over the U.S. military's ban on gays lacks perspective - about 50 years and a world war's worth.

Berube, author of "Coming out Under Fire: The History of Gay Men and Women in World War Two," and Dong, an Academy Award-nominated filmmaker, have teamed up to create a TV documentary based on Berube's book.

They have \$310,000 in funding, including one of the few National Endowment for the Arts grants given in 1992 to a gay-themed project. They have a wealth of material drawn from Berube's 10 years of research. And they have a year of work ahead for a project they would like to see finished now.

"The media doesn't deal with the history of (the ban). It deals with emotions and hysteria, the sensationalism of the issue. What we're trying to do with the film is to bring that history out," Dong said.

Gay soldiers' letters, rare film footage and government documents will be woven together to re-create the era of those caught in the anti-homosexual crusade and those who pursued it, said Dong and Berube.

Estimates put the number of gay men who served in the U.S. armed forces during World War II at between 650,000 and 1.6 million, with a smaller number of lesbian enlistees.

It was an uneven, sometimes surreal course the military and soldiers found themselves navigating. Medical examiners administered a test to try to uncover homosexuals,

asking searchingly, "Do you like girls?"

Gay and lesbian purges were conducted, Berube said, but the voracious wartime demand for troops saw the military keep homosexuals in by trying to reform them, segregate them in certain jobs or just turn a blind eye.

"Effeminate" draftees were viewed skeptically as a potential detriment. But military-sanctioned shows featuring soldiers decked out in drag were popular and high-profile.

The troops themselves generally were tolerant, Berube was told by gay veterans. They recalled taking more heat for being New Yorkers, Southerners, Jews or blacks than being homosexual.

Dong and Berube began work on their film for public television on Jan. 19. That was, ironically, the 50th anniversary of the military's first official anti-gay policy, notes Berube.

"It was a radical departure from the previous policy," said the San Francisco historian. "There had been no procedure to deal with homosexuals."

Instead, it was behavior - acts of sodomy - the military targeted, and a conviction meant imprisonment. Then, says Berube, medicine intervened in 1940 as the United States teetered on the brink of war.

"Psychiatrists were beginning to have much more influence. They said homosexuals were mentally disturbed, not criminal, and therefore shouldn't be punished," he said. "It was kind of a humane gesture. But the military only bought half of the idea, that they were sick."

Instead of prison, gays were punished with dishonorable discharges that stigmatized them. Benefits also were denied.

The total number of men and women discharged as homosexuals between 1941 and the late 1980s approached 100,000, Berube said. The impact is greater than the numbers reflect, he and Dong contend.

"The federal government in the

1950s based their anti-gay policies on the military policies. That's part of the story we're telling," Dong said.

Dong, who received an Oscar nomination for his 1982 film "Sewing Woman," is directing "Coming Out Under Fire." He and Berube, who began fund raising two

years ago, are sharing producing and writing duties.

In addition to \$50,000 from the NEA, the project received a \$250,000 grant from the nonprofit Independent Television Service, created by Congress to fund innovative TV programming. The city of Los Angeles pledged \$10,000.

THE RIGHTEOUS BROTHERS
For nearly three decades, the Righteous Brothers have defined the essence of "blue-eyed soul." Together and as solo artists, Bill Medley and Bobby Hatfield have reached generations of fans with their unmistakable, heartfelt vocal style. From their 1965 chart-topping success with "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling" to 1990's surprise rediscovery of "Unchained Melody," the Righteous Brothers have endured and thrived as legendary talents.

What explains the duo's evergreen appeal? Perhaps it's the raw emotion which Medley and Hatfield convey as singers. There's also the knack they've had for choosing timeless, immaculately crafted songs to record. Whatever the reason, the Righteous Brothers are currently at renewed heights of popularity, reaching legions of new admirers over the airwaves and in concert.

Reunion, their latest Curb Records release, brings the Brothers together again for an album of all newly recorded songs. Such classics as "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling," "(You're My) Soul And Inspiration," included in this impressive collection. "We wanted to re-do these songs and bring the studio recording quality up to '90s standards," says Medley. "Because 'Unchained Melody' kicked up such a storm, we thought this was the perfect time to do it. From my standpoint, this is probably the best album that the Righteous Brothers have ever released."

Reunion appears in the wake of the Righteous Brothers' surprise comeback as Top 40 hitmakers. "Unchained Melody," featured in the film Ghost, became a platinum single in early '91 when the duo's newly recorded version sold over one million copies. The song also earned them a grammy nomination in the category of "Best Pop Performance By A Duo Or Group With Vocal." The re-recorded "Unchained Melody" was included on Unchained Melody--The Best Of The Righteous Brothers (released October '90) as well as on Reunion.

The return of "Unchained Melody" to the charts some 25 years after the Righteous Brothers first recorded the song is nothing short of amazing -- yet, if any pair of singers could pull off such a coup, it's this duo. The stirring, achingly romantic power of their music has truly stood the test of time.

Medley and Hatfield first became "brothers" after both were performing on their own around their home turf in the Los Angeles suburb of Orange County. They sang together one night, and the audience response convinced them to stay together. They quickly developed a stage act which featured the urgent back-and-forth vocal exchanges that went on to become their trademark. Medley's soulful, rich timbre was the perfect compliment for the higher-pitched, gospel-tinged range of Hatfield.

The duo first recorded for the small Moonglow label, releasing a series of singles (including their first hit, "Little Latin Lupe Lu") and their debut album Right Now. But their real rise to prominence began when they started working with producer Phil Spector. 1965 saw the release of "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling," which matched the Righteous Brothers' passionate singing with Spector's famed "wall of Sound" to monumental effect. The song topped the charts and led to further hits, including "Just Once In My Life," "Unchained Melody" and "Ebb Tide."

Switching labels to Verve, the duo enjoyed further chart success with the million-selling "You're My) Soul and Inspiration," as well as "He Will Break Your Heart" and "Go Ahead And Cry." Then, in 1968, Medley and Hatfield parted company and embarked on solo careers. Medley had several hit singles, including "Brown-Eyed Woman."

Medley and Hatfield joined forces again in 1974 and scored another hit with "Rock and Roll Heaven." This reunion proved to be short-lived, however, and the duo split up once more. Yet the Righteous Brothers' legacy proved too vital to leave to the pop history books. The appearance of "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling" on

the soundtrack to the film Top Gun was but one sign of the Brothers' longlasting appeal.

The duo continued to perform together on a semi-regular basis through the '80s, most notably on a 20th Anniversary reunion tour in '82. Medley and Hatfield

also launched The Hop, an Orange Country nightclub featuring performers of the '50s and '60s. As a solo artist, Medley has achieved much success, making his biggest breakthrough with his 1987 Number One single ("I've Had) The Time Of My Life," a duet with

Jennifer Wames from the Dirty Dancing soundtrack album.

When "Unchained Melody" became one of 1990's biggest hits after its inclusion in Ghost, no one was more surprised than Medley and Hatfield. "I feel that the popularity of the song is just a miracle," Hatfield told The Chicago Sun-Times in an interview last year. "I've always loved it, but never expected the public's reaction to it to be quite this feverish and strong."

As they performed together last year, the Brothers found that "Unchained Melody," featuring Hatfield's lead vocal, drew ecstatic response. Combined with the airplay that the original version of the song was receiving, it seemed the perfect time to reunite the Righteous Brothers as a recording act once again. They went into the studio together for the first time since 1974 with medley producing. The sessions, which resulted in the tracks heard on Reunion, show that Medley and Hatfield's powers as singers remain unique and undimmed.

The 1990s have seen a new generation of fans discover the magic of the Righteous Brothers. "Considering how long we've been in the business, this is a real treat," says Medley. "It's a wonderful thing to have happen." With "Unchained Melody" spurring them on, the masters of blue-eyed soul have still more musical history to make in the years to come.

SOMMERSBY: Starring Jodie Foster and Richard Gere.

Gone With The Wind it is not. What it is is a beautifully filmed Civil War epic for lovers of romantic fantasy. Set after the war, *Sommersby* follows a man as he returns home several years after he was presumed dead. He arrives armed with ideas and vigor, and soon brings his town back to prosperity. He also turns his once-bitter marriage into a passionate romance. And soon.... suspicions arise. Is he Jack Sommersby? Who knows? His wife? Maybe. The townsfolk? No one is saying. Yes, the film is a mildly enjoyable romantic drama. But what could have been a great film is merely ok. It is a badly directed movie (albeit magnificently filmed) with no core, no flow, no sense of dramatic tension. *Sommersby*, inspired by *Arret*

Memorable du Parliamen de Toulouse, a 15th-century account of two trials of a French peasant named Martin Guerre, written by magistrate Jean de Croas, was filmed in the George Washington National Forest in Virginia. In the film the fictional town of Vine Hill, Tennessee, looks down on the pristine Jackson River, presenting an unspoiled, stark, but picturesque setting for the post-war saga.

While Gere postures and poses, Foster is brilliant. She rises above the ineffectual direction and the mediocre performance of Gere to figuratively carry the entire story. Oh yes, there is wonderful chemistry between the two, but the heart of the story comes from Foster.

The movie is too long and fails totally in what should have been a classically staged court room

confrontation. Rated **R** for violence and sex. **Three Boxes**

WHERE ANGELS FEAR TO TREAD: (1992/British) Starring Helen Mirren and Helena Bonham Carter.

E. M. Foster's first novel arrives on scene with its characters intact, if not its many layers and intricacies. To the consternation of her stuffy in-laws, a well-born widow, Lilia Herriton (Mirren), runs off to Italy and quickly marries the 21-year-old son of a dentist. Held almost as much to blame as Lilia for this breach of conduct is Caroline Abbot (Carter), Lilia's smart but bland traveling companion, who later stands up against the Herritons in uncharacteristic fashion. The unimaginative direction isn't up to Foster's more elaborate scenes, but the material and the performance often rise above these limitations and, for the E. M. Foster fan, make this video well-worth renting. Rated **PG**. **Three Boxes**

UNLAWFUL ENTRY: (1992) Starring Kurt Russell, Madeleine Stowe, and Ray Liotta.

This column said "wait for the video." Well, here it is. This bump-in-the-night story starts out with the response to a burglary call at the

upscale home of Michael and Karen Stowe (Russell and Stowe) by police officer Pete Davis (Liotta). After the initial investigation, Officer Davis invites himself into the couple's life, with the particular aim of pursuing the attractive Karen. But while Pete's obsession with the Stowes builds tension, neither the characters nor the situation seems real or spontaneous.

However, the film manages ultimately to be more gripping than it is convincing thanks to the story's inevitable movement toward a violent showdown. It's this wonderful melodramatic showdown that makes *Unlawful Entry* a delicious rental. Get a big bowl of popcorn and have a ball. Rated **R** for violence and language. **Three Boxes**
