OUR TRIP TO GALVESTON

UNUSUAL CAMERA EFFECTS IN PICTURE

With the increasing demand for the unusual in motion picture protography, the modern cameraman must be an ingenious inventor as well as a camera technician. This was illustrated in the filming of Cecil B. De Mille's production, "The Godless Girl" during which the photographer, Peverell Marley, was called upon to devise means of obtaining several remarkable came

Marley, who has photographed all of De Mille's recent productions, including "The King of Kings," succeeded in filming two startling scenes. The first represents a riot in a four-story building during which the participants hattle up and down a staircase. To obviate the necessity of a dozen cameras to film various parts of the riot in close action, medium distances and long shot, Marley arranged for a movable cameracarriage, able to be elevated to the top floor or lowered to the first. or to be moved forward or back at

This was accomplished through the use of an overhead tram systhe car hanging from the monorail, being equipped with a power unit which could make an elevator out of the camera-carriage. The controls were operated from the camera-carriage, which carried in addition to Marley and his camera man, Cecil De Mille and the art director, Mitchell Leisen. The footage photographed from this ingenious mechanical arrangement was most striking.

Marley is credited with an even more interesting shot in another part of the same sequence, in which the camera drops from the fourth floor to the first with lightming-like speed giving the theatregoer the sensations of a sickening fall. Marley was strapped on a swing seat with the camera in his lap, with De Mille on another narrow seat above him. The camera was then started and the swing dropped through the well of a stairacse by means of the mechanism with which the over-bend tram car was equipped,


