Mash: 100 lbs bran, 100 lbs shorts, or 200 lbs ground wheat. Grain: 500 lbs of mixed farm grains. 100 lbs finely ground oats, 100 lbs corn or milo meal, 100 lbs meat and bone scrap (50 per cent protein) 21/2 lbs salt.

Each gallon of skim milk per 100 hens per day will take the place of 20 pounds of ment scrap in the above ration. Those having four to five gallons per 100 hens per day may omit the meat scrap When feeding full milk ration in cold weather, take away drinking water. The amount of mash the flock will eat is controlled by the grain fed.





Incorporation At Stake, Says Finally Adopted by Hereford In '06 Huggins

An article carried in last week's Brand, in which the first incorporation of Hereford was taken up and discussed, from facts supplied by G. A. F. Parker, pioneer citizen, created quite a bit of interest as to what transpired here in early days, Mr. Parker again comes forward with information relative to the incorporation move and the causes leading up to final adop-

tion of incorporation. There is one thing which must not be overlooked regarding Hereford at that time: The editor of the Brand emphatically stated that Hereford had a population of about 2,000, and stated he could prove it. Highway Program

"If the highway program of present legislative session," said Judge W. O. Huggins, president of the Texas Good Roads Association

"I would emphasize that the less populous counties have by far the biggest stake in continuing the and highway program," Judge Huggins "The major counties like Harris, Dallas, Tarrant and Bexar have rammed their bond issue thru and completed their major roads.

"The state has passed the halfway mark in its fight for good roads. Out of the entire system of 19,148 miles, 9,865 are hard-surfaced. Naturally, the counties which did not pass early bond sues or those which have not yet voted bonds, are the ones in which the bulk of the highway work is not yet done. They need the roads just as badly as the bigger ones, and will get them soon at the horses and cows in search of present rapid rate of improvement. But if the program is stopped for

highway leader explains. The gasaline tax pays over 40 per cent of the state's entire revenue. It is a special road "toll" derived from road-users for road building. and road upkeep. Half of it, or two cents of the four cent tax, alof fire protection. A bad fire broke ready has been diverted to schools and county bonds, leaving only two cents for actual road work. This is hardly enough, but highway leaders are satisfied with it because of the hard times. It will keep up our present roads and permit enough new construction to match dollars for federal, aid.

But it the legislature, casting about for money for non-earning departments takes away even a half cent more of the gas tax, it will stop all new road building. Judge Huggins says. And if it takes as much as a cent it will leave the state unable to maintain present roads. The people must

see that this is not done. The federal aid story has changed in the past year, also, The one cent federal gasoline tax has this tax, about \$7,500,000 yearly to Washington. It gets back about \$7,000,000-in federal aid. So Texas pays its own federal aid, and will keep on paying it even if it doesn't match dollars and get the money, which then would be spent in other states.

Texas already uses more gas tax money for non-highway purposes than any other state, Judge Huggins says, and yet the highways continue to pay their own way, as well as begin to pay back early bonds issued by the various counties.

Road work is a big employment factor in Texas. Nearly 100 cents of the road dollar in Texas goes to labor, because every material for it. except steel bars, is mined or produced by human hands with-
