COLORADO FIRM SENDS MAN TO SURVEY THIS AREA

The possibility of a sugar beet factory in Hereford demanded wide interest this week when one sugar beet, company sent a representative here Wednesday, and two more companies indicated hat they would send men to inspect the location and possibilities in the near future. Interest in the establishment of a sugar beet factory here was attributed to the rural electrification lines which are to be constructed here, affording development of irrigation facilities.

Knapp Inspects Area.

H. E. Knapp, agricultural agent for the American Crystal Sugar Beet Company of Denver, Colorado, visited Hereford Wednesday and informed H. V. Hennen, Chamber of Commerce, secretary, that tests are to be made in this area. He also made a tour of this territory.

Mr. Knapp said that beet seed used by the company have been bred to certain specifications; he plans to send some of the seed here in the near future in order that beets may be grown from them and tested as to sugar con-

Consider \$750,000 Plant,

Provided the sugar contentproves satisfactory, and sufficient acreage can be secured for sugar beets, he said that his company will consider erecting a \$750,000 plant in Hereford. He left for Amarillo Wednesday afternoon to contact D. L. McDonald, who pr duced sugar beets here in 1912.

Another favorable factor for the growing of sugar beets in this section is the fact that in sunshine and fair weather during fall months will greatly increase

the sugar content of beets. High Sugar Content.

The beets grown here by McDonald in 1912 were reported to have tested from 18 to 20 per cent sugar content, while the average test of beets in the Colorado area is 14 to 16 per cent, according to Mr. Knapp.

While Mr. Knapp was the first to personally appear here in the nterests of a beet sugar factory, two other companies have written here for information and state that they will send representatives here for investigations. Both of these companies have contacted Jack Rose, Commissioner of Precinct 1, and he has al-Deaf Smith Area er of Precinct 1, and he has already forwarded the desired in

formation to them.

Seek New Location.

The U. S. A. Sugar Company quiries and both firms indicate that they will send men here in formation has already been for warded to them.

In case they decide to erect i ies both stated that they would require from 3,000 to 5,000 acres of sugar beet cultivation in this irrigated belt. They estimate that the crop will pay the prod from \$100 to \$150 an acre, d ing upon prices and yields. They likewise will furnish their own

likewise will furnish their own specific seed.

Customary procedure on sugar beet planting includes furnishing of seed to growers, subject to payment when the crop is harvested. Funds are also sometimes advanced on crops that to their harvest by some of the companies.



FARM WOMAN RAISES GOOD LETTUCE IN THIS SECTION

From Northwest Texas, county home demonstration agents are reporting the success of frame gardens. Members of home demonstration clubs and 4-H club girls are finding that the small gardens, protected against extremes of temperature, allow intensive gardening which is more successful than ordinary large gardens.

The 28 frame gardens which were built this year in Ochiltree county are still producing kale, radishes onions and similar vegetables after yielding a rich har-

"My family never enjoyed eating home grown lettuce, but when gathered it from my cold frame it did not have that bitter taste common to much of the open garden lettuce," Mrs. W. S. Anglin held a meeting Wednesday after of the Tahoka club of Lynn county, recently told members of her club. Mrs. Anglin has three fame gardens which have a total area of 900 square feet, and has gathered lettuce, radishes tendergreens, mustard, beans, beets, carrots, cucumbers, okra and onions. From th sale of supplus tomato plants she made enough money to pay for the cost of constructing the frames.

> Frame gardens are popular in Castro county, where the Nazareth 4-H girls' club, with 45 members, has 30 cold frames; the Hart club, with 13 members, 11 frame gardens, and the Jumbo club of nine girls, six frame gardens. In several instances, members of the clubs are sisters and have the frame gardens together.


