## Famous Hereford Steer In \$50,000 Suit In California

"Big Jim", famous Hereford steer which O. G. Hill gave to the late Will Rogers, now figured in a suit for \$50,000 damages filed in the Supreme Court at Los Angeles, Calif., according to dispatches, which appeared along with a picture of the steer in the Los Angeles Examiner. The article read: "The suit was brought by Fred L. Washburn and J. W. 'Tex' Condon, supervisory candidate, present owners of the steer. 'The action was directed against the Moorman Manufacturing Co., which makes and distributes a livestock comb. According to the complaint which was prepared by attorney John J. Craig, the Moorman Co., entered into a tentative agreement to use the name and picture of the steer in their advertising at an agreed sum of \$1,000 a week for one year. The agreement was never formally signed, however, according to the plaintiff. 'Big Jim, who appeared in some of Will Rogers' films was acquired by Condon and Washburn after the actor's death.' ## Timely Rains Aid Row Crops, Bringing Harvest To Halt

### Roosevelt Seen By Hundreds Of Local Residents

### NATION'S CHIEF LAUDS COURAGE OF PEOPLE OF PLAINS AREA

Hundreds of Hereford men, women and children joined a crowd of thousands who, despite falling rain, thronged streets in Amarillo Monday afternoon to pay homage to the President of the United States. President Roosevelt, flashing his famous smile, rode five miles in an open car, waving his hand to the sea of yelling thousands. At Ellwood Park, he stood in the rain bare headed, and addressed a crowd of 5,000 admirers some of whom had been in the park since early morning. The President, in his talk praised the Plains Country and its inhabitants for the manner in which they did things, referring to the "largest bouquet in the world" presented to his wife recently, and to the "largest band in the world" which greeted him upon his arrival in Amarillo. "I am very happy that you are putting your minds on the subject of land and water," he said. "Everywhere you go in the United States you find the problem of land and water use, and the same thing is true within any given state. For instance, here in Marvin Jones' district the problem is, most of the time, to get water to the land to keep the land from blowing away." He contrasted this condition with the washing away of soil in other points of Texas and the world, and expressed an appreciation for the determination and ability of residents of the Plains. ### Marvin Jones Says Nation Faces New Era

### CONGRESSMAN POINTS TO 'HOMESPUN FOLKS' WHO WILL GO FORWARD

Stating that the United States is upon the gateway of a new epoch, Congressman Marvin Jones Wednesday told members of the Lions Club that this country will go forward, and not back, because of the "homespun folks" who populate the nation. "We will retain the same principles, but will change our policies," he said. "The wheelbarrow and the automobile operate on the same principle—but there is a vast difference in their means of power. We will always retain the principle of equality." He pointed to the tariff as one point where the nation had deviated from the principle of equality, but showed where the new administration had equalized this situation with soil conservation payments and crop benefits to producers. "Any doctor will tell you that if the blood flows only one way, the body will become diseased and finally decay," he said. "It has been a policy of the administration to correct that one-way flow." He pointed to the institution of federal bank insurance as a safeguard to the public, to present low interest rates, which have dropped (Continued on Page 7)

### APPROXIMATELY MILLION BUSHELS OF WHEAT IS HARVESTED HERE

With around a million bushels of wheat already harvested in this territory, slow, steady showers Wednesday night and Thursday morning brought harvest to a temporary halt in this area. Rains .63 of inch. The U. S. Weather Bureau station, located at The Brand office in Hereford, recorded .93 of an inch of rain Wednesday night and continued drizzling showers this morning gave indication of more moisture for the area. While the rain halted harvest, it came as a saver to the bumper row crop, which is in prospect for this country.

Most persons had expected the harvest season to be practically over in this area by Saturday, but the rains will delay wheat cutting and, Wednesday found a steady stream of trucks and pickups still pulling into local elevators. Estimates allow around 1,300,000 bushels for this county with from 250,000 to 300,000 bushels still remaining to be harvested. Farmers in the northwest portion of this county and in Eastern New Mexico this week were just getting started good on harvest, because wheat is slightly later in that area than in the south and east parts of this county.

Row Crops Benefit. Parched row crops will benefit greatly from the present showers, which were made to order, because they fell in a slow gentle manner, and have soaked into the soil. Although grain sorghums were suffering in many sections, they (Continued on Page 7)

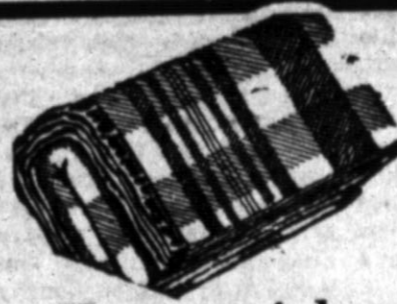

From 6-to-10 percent to 3 1-2 - to percent. Between 1928 to 1932, the national debt increased from 16 billion to 23 billion he said, and the national income fell from 60 billion to 55 billion dollars. From 1933, the national debt increased from 23 billion to 38 billion dollars, and the national income returned from 55 billion to 60 billion dollars. However, he pointed out, 10 billion dollars of increased debt was the form of secured loans which are being repaid, leaving an increased debt of only around 28 billion dollars. "Last session congress appro-

printed less than in the previous session," he said. "We realize that we must balance what we take in with what we spend, and that is our next step."

In addition to the increased national income as compared with the Hoover administration, Jones also pointed to 25 percent more paving in the nation, rural electrification lines, new buildings, and said that none of the increased debt had been taken out of the country.

Congressman Jones also visited friends in Hereford during the day, and renewed acquaintances with many persons before returning to his home in Amarillo.

time Mr. Hill gave the steer to Will Rogers. Following Rogers' death, Mrs. Rogers gave the steer to the Salvation Army, and he was in turn auctioned to his present owners. He is said to be the largest Hereford steer in the world, and has been exhibited at various points over the nation, including the Texas Centennial at Dallas.

The famous steer was calved in Nov., 1930, at the Hill ranch five miles north of Bootleg in this county: Earl Porter, who was then tending the ranch, picked him up out of the first snow and carried him to the ranch house. The steer's mother was a large cow and had previously delivered several calves of exceptional size, one weighing 1800 pounds.

The steer was named Geronimo, and being a November calf got off to a slow start. Mr. Hill fed him out with a bunch of steers in 1932, however, chiefly because he gave indications of being unusually large. Geronimo kept on growing and in 1934, when cattle got cheap and feed high, he weighed 2800 pounds.

Because of his tremendous size Geronimo was a favorite with the entire Hill family. They hated to think of selling him, and it was not practical to keep him. Finally, Mr. Hill who has always been an ardent admirer of Will Rogers, sent the steer to California by Pete Engles as a gift to the famous cowboy-actor. Will Rogers happened to be home when the steer was delivered, and he was so enthused over the animal that he spent the entire evening roping him. He sent Mr. Hill a telegram, which is today one of his most prized possessions and which was worded in typical Will Rogers style. Mr. Hill also has numerous pictures of Will Rogers roping the famous steer and standing with him.

Will Rogers during his lifetime called the steer "Geronimo," the name which he was given here at Hereford, Texas, but when the new owners bought him through the Salvation Army auction, they did not know his name and renamed him, "Big Jim."

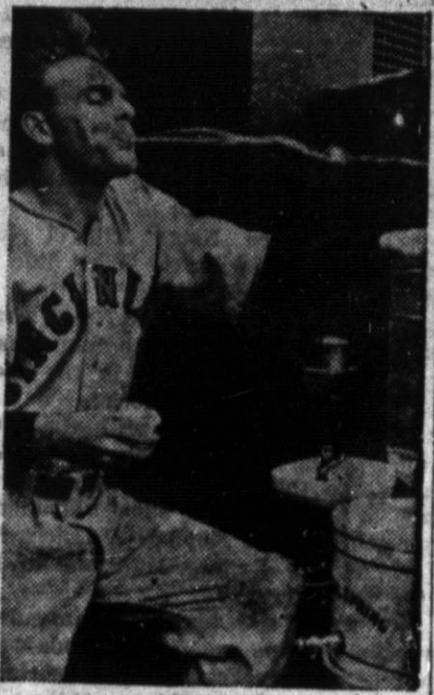

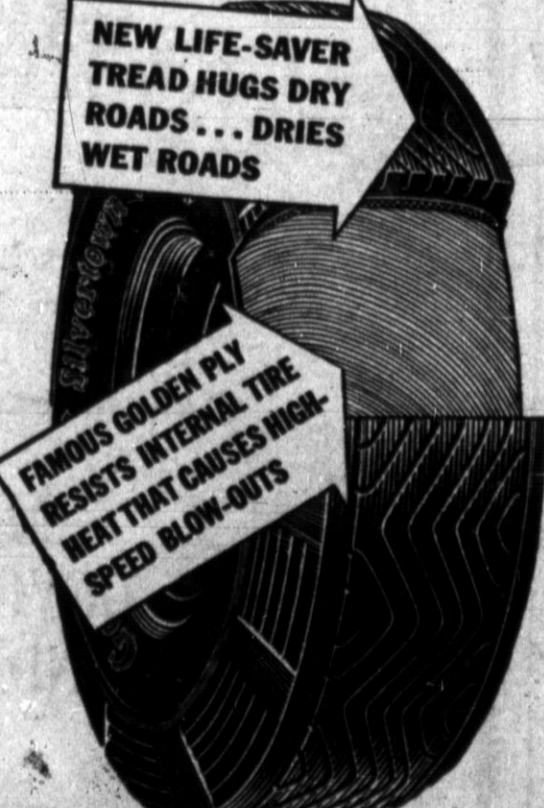
