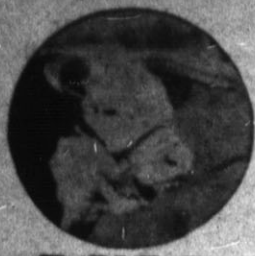

"Is Max Baer any kin to you?" I asked the question of Gaston Baer the other day; without hesitation, he replied:

"Ven he vins, yes. Ven he loses, no." Now that Maxie is in line to fight Joe Louis in a world championship title bout next fall, Gaston will admit a distant relationship, however. The best way Gaston can figure it, they are about second cousins. Both of their grandfathers came from the same town back in the old country. Gaston believes Maxie's baby son has settled the colorful pugilist to a great extent — and he believes Maxie is on the road back. Yes sir, just before the big fight next year, they will about be first cousins, and if Maxie beats Louis, I wouldn't be a bit surprised if Gaston doesn't uncover material proving Maxie is his long-lost brother.

O. T. Williams just called and I went around to the Soil Conservation Office to pick up a real piece of news. Hereford is going to get on the map, folks. At least such is the present indication.

Williams has a three-page telegram from the Denver office of Associated Press, asking for pictures of how the "Dust Bowl" is making a comeback. Do you know that Hereford is the only point in the dust bowl, where farmers are making a comeback? The telegram said that AP will send a photographer here from Denver to cover the stories and to get pictures of how we are doing it. It looks like the worm is beginning to turn. Instead of trying to ruin our country in the eyes of the nation, maybe the magazines and press agencies will give us a break, and print what is justly due this area. What we have right here in Hereford is Real News. AP knows it, and pretty soon a lot of others will also be extolling the merits of the fine, brave men and women who have stuck it out through thick and thin—fighting a battle in which they are now beginning to see signs of victory.

Last fall I wrote a letter to AP in New York urging them to do just what they plan to do now. At that time they were too interested in exploiting the evils of the country. I sure am glad to see them get on the right side of the fence.

Another thing worth consideration is the recognition which is being given the Hereford SCS project. Did you know that hardly a week passes that some Washington official doesn't visit this project and inspect the work which is being done. Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace is deeply interested in our project, and President Roosevelt has asked more than one question about it. It is entirely possible that Wallace may come out here in the next six months—and before two years pass, I wouldn't be a bit surprised if the President of the United States were to make a tour over the project.

That may sound silly to you, and maybe it is—but I know news when I see it, and if it gets the right breaks, this can be the most publicized, most discussed and most talked-of point in the United States for a while. Of course, it might just rock along, but I am saying what might happen. Already Washington has its eye on Hereford, Texas, as an example of what can be done.

The other afternoon I went to Sulphur Park to do some perch fishing, and got to talking with Frank Bosner, who has charge of the park. He told me that W. H. Fuqua brought out W. C. Ribenack from Washington, and that the visitor caught two bass, weighing more than two pounds, a big crappie, and two nice perch. Mr. Ribenack is assistant to Jesse Jones in the REFC. If Frank would learn to not charge

newspaper editors to fish—I would have given him some good publicity. I would have said that Sulphur Park is one of the beauty spots of the Texas coast, and that it is one of the prettiest places I ever saw. I could have given him that it is ideal for camping, and that it abounds with fish. But after all, he does charge me, so I guess it will all have to go unsaid.

Earl Eubanks called up Friday and said, "I have some big news, it's raining." All of the time, I had the rheumatism so bad I could hardly hobble over to the telephone.

There are a lot of jokes about candidates, and too often we are prone to laugh at them. However, running for office is serious with the candidates, and I beseech you to treat them nice. They are nice folks, and they want to serve you. Of course they get paid, but none of them are over-paid, and it sure does cost a lot of money to run for office. In addition to newspaper announcements, candidate cards, traveling expenses, and their time, it costs a lot of money to get your name on the ticket. In Deaf Smith County this year, the following charges were made each candidate to get on the ticket: for county judge, \$40; for sheriff, \$40; for clerk, \$40; for treasurer, \$20; for county attorney, \$15; for the commissioner, \$15; for justice of the peace, \$2.50; for surveyor, \$2.50; for constable, \$2.50. When you get them all together it adds up to \$520.

Look over the political column in The Brand this week, and you will find the names of some mighty fine men running for office. They will probably be around to see you, and for goodness sakes, treat them like you would want to be treated. They deserve your consideration.

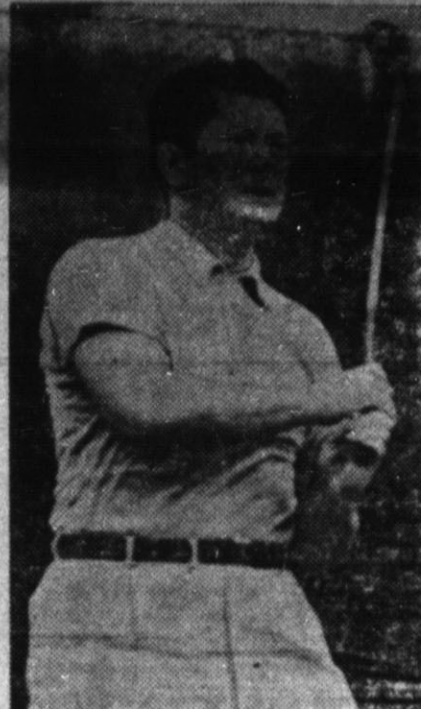

Two things were done in the closing days of the recent session of Congress that are of especial interest to our section of the country.

**Parity Payments**  
Provision was made for parity payment on the major farm commodities. It is estimated that these payments will amount to about 10 cents per bushel on wheat and 2 cents per pound on cotton. These payments will be in addition to the regular soil conservation payments that have heretofore been provided for. I feel that we are particularly fortunate in being able to win this fight.

**Interest Rates**  
The President vetoed the bill which provided for a continuance of the 3 1-2 percent land bank interest rates. The Congress passed the legislation over his veto. It thus becomes a law, notwithstanding the action of the President in vetoing it.

It was my privilege to make the motion and lead the fight by which the measure was passed over the veto of the President. I felt and still feel that these low interest rates should be continued.

These are the lowest farm interest rates that have ever prevailed in this country, and they mean much to the entire Southwest.

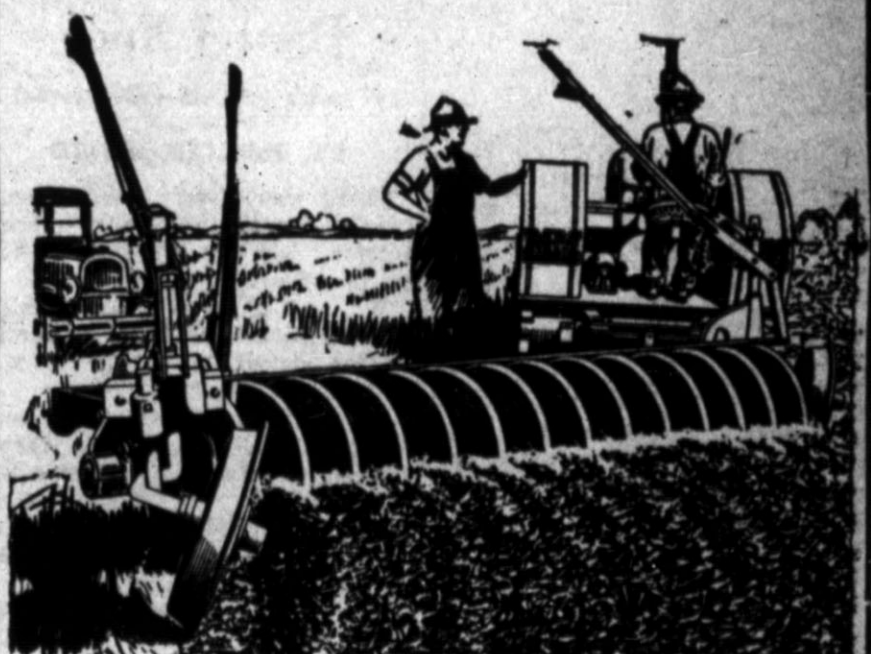

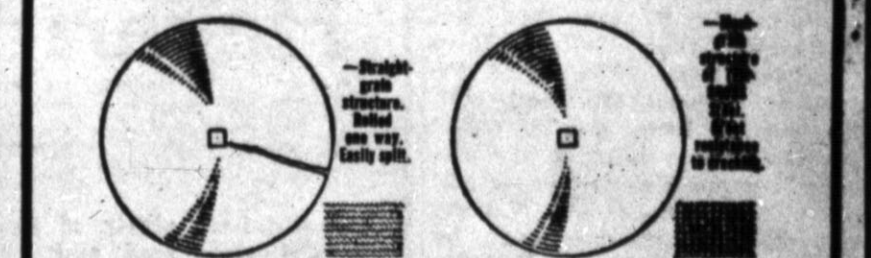
