Largest out-of-state shipments of cattle went to Illinios and Iowa; calves to Illinois and Kansas; swine to California; and sheep to Kansas and Missouri. On a rail car basis, 72,570 cars

of livestock have moved from Texas during the first nine months of 1939 as against 70,504 during the corresponding period last year.
