



Fight Fire With Sand Is A. &M. Advice

With cold weather in prospect, rural families would do well to adopt measures which protect farm houses from fires. The major portion of farm house losses are caused by faulty stove pipes and chimneys or by blazes started on roofs.

M. R. Bentley, agricultural engineer for the A. and M. College Extension Service, suggests inspection and repair of old chimneys on the farm and replacement of faulty stove pipes. Roof fires can be prevented by keeping out of stoves material which is so light that it can be carried out of the chimney be-fore it is wholly burned; chimney screens will catch sparks.

Other hazards include the danger of spontaneous combustion in paper or rags soaked linseed or soybean oil. Piles paper near the stove may be ignited by sparks which fly out unnoticed when the doors see Hollywood, Anthony Meli, 16 are opened. 

Mouth Health Is Child Need

Austin, . Texas—Children brought up according to the three "R's" of mouth health have a very good chance to escape the discomforts and accompanying ill-health that comes from dental disorders, according to the Texas State Department of Health.

This season of the year, when the children are getting adjusted to school routine, is a particularly appropriate time to give special thought to the physical as well as he mental aspects of a child's development. The child who is physically fit makes much better progress in school, than does the boy or girl who is below par. Parents can help to keep their children fit by carefully following the rules of mouth health in bringing up their child-

"The three "R's" of course, are not "Reading, Riting, and 'Rithmetic, but are Right foods, Real cleansing, and Regular office visits, which are as important to mouth health as the old three "R's" are to mental development.

The teeth and other mouth tissues depend for their original structural strength and their continued resistance to illhealth on the quality and quantity of building materials made available in the food one eats. The first set (baby or founda-tion) of teeth obtain their materials from the mother before a child's birth. The permanent set may depend on the diet of both the mother and the child itself. 

Children Fear

College Station,—Protecting a child by teaching him to be afraid of or to avoid certain situations means trouble later. It is much better that the small child understand his environment and how to adapt himself to it.

That's the advice to parents given by Dosca Hale, Extension Service specialist in parent education and child development. Once they are afraid, children cannot be forced to overcome their fears, the specialist says, but they can be forewarned by having dangers explained to them ahead of time.

Adults frequently help children to learn most of the fears they develop as they grow up. In this regard Miss Hale says, "If we threaten Jack with the sheriff or policeman in order to get him to do something we want him to do, we need not be surprised if he develops a fear and a dislike for law instead of thinking. of it as a protection for those who wish to do the right thing.



Sudden onset of symptoms as described should cause the patient and members of the fami-ly to suspect the possibility of pneumonia. Rusty sputum, usually a sign of inflamation in the lungs, naturally gives rise to the question as to the cause of sickness. An abnormal demand for coarse and medium wools which are produced on the mutton type breeds of sheep will tend to increase mutton production at a more rapid pace production at a more rapid pace than would an increase in fine wool. Too, the medium and coarse wool sheep are produced very largely on the farms. Farm Sheep production could receive more encouragement than the range type. A poor balance as well as over production could be the result of war-time demand.
