

Fed cattle numbers way up

Deaf Smith County increased its lead in 1989 as the No. 1 cattlefeeding county in the nation, making Hereford the undisputed Cattle Feeding Capital of the World.

The "Golden Triangle" area of Deaf Smith. Parmer and Castro counties accounted for 40 percent of the fed cattle in the Panhandle, according to capacity of 4.8 million head. The the 1990 Fed Cattle Survey released capacity the previous year was 4.7 Saturday by Southwestern Public million. Service Co.

The survey revealed that Deaf Smith County fed 885,563 head of cattle in 1989, an increase of 138,303 over the previous year. This record total helped set a new mark for the SPS service area.

Parmer County was second in the area with 492,088 head and Castro agricultural and food processing was third with 489,142. That's a total of 1.86 million head of fed cattle for the three counties. Parmer County had an increase of 84,836 head, while Castro's numbers dipped by just 13,956 head.

The survey included the SPS service area, which comprises the Texas Panhandle, three counties in the Oklahoma Panhandle, and Curry County in New Mexico. The service area total was 5,468,350 head of fed cattle in 1989. That represents the highest year on record, edging out the 1987 total of 5.4 million and up over

number of feed lots increased to 117 in the area, four more than in last year's report. That total includes 14 lots of under 5,000 capacity.

Deaf Smith was listed with 13 feed lots of 5,000 or more capacity. Castro has 11 of 5,000 ore more capacity and Parmer has 8. The survey also showed the area had 13 beef packing plants with an annual slaughter

The report is used in economic development efforts and for other purposes by SPS and others.

"Requests for the report come from all parts of the nation, so we hope to stimulate further development in the sector," said Dave Krupnick, SPS ag marketing manager.



City argues over old buildings

Newly-elected Commissioner Emory Brownlow made a few waves at Monday night's city commission meeting.

Brownlow, a former commissioner, was sworn in Monday along with Terry Langhennig, Bud Eades and Irene Cantu. Langehennig and Brownlow placed one-two in the four-man race for two at-large, commission seats. Bud Eades, incumbent from Place 4, won another term with 343 votes and Irene Cantu, incumbent from Place 2, was reelected with 166 votes.

The commission decided to go ahead with condemnation of four properties that were deemed dangerous. If the owners of the properties, located in the 500 block of George Street, at 201 Kibbe, at 340 Avenue G, and at 210 Short, do not either bring the buildings up to code or tear them down within 15 days of

notification, condemnation cases will be filed in 222nd District Court.

Commissioners considered 15 other buildings. They declared as unsafe an old stucco building located on the southeast corner of South Main and New York Streets, an old elevator on the west side of South Schley, and an old shed located east of the city water barn off of New York Street.

When houses were considered for condemnation, however, commissioners had some difficulty deciding exactly what was "unsafe".

The discussion got sticky when City Inspector Marvin Gaddy presented seven houses owned by Mr. and Mrs. N.E. Tyler for condemnation. Commissioners Brownlow and Eades said they had looked at two of the houses on Monday afternoon and told the commission that, from the outside, the houses did not look dangerous. The windows on the houses are boarded up, making entry difficult.

Commissioner Cantu, who lives in the neighborhood where most of the houses in question are located,

Drill tests city's preparations

At 6 p.m. Monday, the first word of a chance for severe weather went out over emergency radios. The National Severe Storms Forecast Center had issued a tornado watch for the area including Hereford and Deaf Smith County.

Never mind that there were two, small, puffy white clouds in the sky. This was part of a drill to determine the readiness of emergency workers and volunteers in case a tornado struck Hereford.

Any time a tornado watch is issued, there's an advanced state of readiness in case everyone must scramble later in the day.

At 6:30 p.m., clouds began building south of Hereford. A dispatcher ordered all firemen to the station.

At 6:35 p.m., fire department units began moving out of the city to monitor the storms.

Fire Marshall Jay Spain was out south of town at Ave. K and Walnut Road. "The cloud looks kind of funny," Spain reported back to the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) at the Hereford Fire Station at 6:51.

Another unit at Sugarland Feed Yard saw the same cloud from a distance, as does a unit on Walnut Road between Main and U.S. Highway 385.

At 6:52, a unit near Southwest Feed Yard sees a wall cloud developing. At 6:53, Spain is almost under the cloud, which is just east of Ave. K, just south of the city. "It has some whirling motion in it. I'm going to watch to see what it's doing," Spain says.

At 6:54, a unit reports a tornado on the ground between South Main and Ave. K, "moving almost due north." Spain tells the dispatcher to sound the tornado warning. At the same time, emergency messages go out on Hereford Cablevision, warning residents of the impending danger.

At 6:56, Deaf Smith General Hospital and the EOC switch on their auxiliary generators so they will have power in case a tornado strikes.

At 6:57, the tornado is about to strike the south side of Hereford. Spain

orders the "take cover" sirens to be sounded. At 6:58, the tornado struck Hereford.

It came up just west of Ave. K, on almost the same path of a funnel cloud in 1971. It struck several houses, overturned a car and hit a bus just south of Deaf Smith General Hospital. There were "victims" (volunteers from Boy Scout Troop 52, the Hereford EMS Explorer Post and others) thrown out of the house and trapped inside. There were kids on the bus who were injured. The Jaws of Life rescue tool had to be used to free

occupants in the overturned car. Emergency vehicles had been taken outside the city so they wouldn't be caught in the storm. The sped back into town to take care of the injured.

Hospital employees rushed to DSGH to see where they could pitch in. Before long, the injured, and dead, were being treated by doctors, emergency medical technicians, nurses and others. They treated everything

from a couple of nicks to broken necks.

By 7:30 p.m., the drill was over.

It was successful, volunteers felt.

They also hoped it never happened in real life.



WASHINGTON - NATO is at a critical phase as it struggles to adapt to change in Europe and tries to make "a partner in security" out of the Soviet Union, the alliance's secretary general says.

WASHINGTON - Congress' top Democrats are debating whether to join President Bush in deficit-reduction talks that the White House says can include discussion of possible tax increases.

WASHINGTON - Terry Anderson, the longest held of the 16 Western hostages, is in good physical condition and helped fellow hostages make makeshift Scrabble and Monopoly games to amuse themselves, according to an account given by former hostage Frank Reed to Anderson's sister, Peggy Say.

WASHINGTON - Federal prosecutors intend to seek additional drug charges against Mayor Marion Barry, according to sources familiar with the probe.

VERACRUZ, Mexico - In the port city where Christianity first entered Mexico, Pope John Paul II defends plans to celebrate the 500th anniversary of Christianity in the New World from critics who say the church came as an agent of conquest, repression and disease.

WEST BERLIN - The World Jewish Congress, meeting in Germany for the first time, travels to the picturesque mansion where the Nazis plotted their "Final Solution" - the extermination of Jews worldwide.

Gonzales going for all the marbles at state meet



Brady track insolvent, seaso 0

BRADY, Texas (AP) - Heart of Texas Racing Inc., operators of the state's only operational pari-mutuel race track, is insolvent and cannot open its 1990 spring racing season, the San Angelo Standard-Times reported today.

Clifford Grubbs, president of HOT Racing Inc., confirmed Monday that the G. Rollie White Downs race track is out of money and cannot open June 2 as planned, the newspaper said.

The track, the first pari-mutuel horse race track to operate in Texas in 52 years, opened Oct. 6, but its initial racing season was marred by

severe financial losses due to construction cost overruns, limited crowds and small betting handles.

The Texas Racing Commission granted G. Rollie White Downs spring and summer race dates starting June 2, subject to the track finding new financing.

"We've told the racing commission by letter that we were not able to raise the funds needed in order to open," Grubbs said.

Grubbs said the stockholders decided in a meeting last week not to try to reopen, but the organization is not declaring bankruptcy.

The track's few remaining what the next step will be. However, disappointment that the track mployees and track manager,

Richard Lerma, have been laid off. "If we could have gotten the \$700,000 loan from the Small Business Administration, we had commitments from local people totalling \$250,000," Grubbs said.

But the Small Business Administration denied the race track loan application because of its policy against lending to gambling entities.

"We had no response outside of Brady for new investors," Grubbs said. "I never got a single call."

Grubbs said that he does not know

he hopes that some new source of funding might be developed so the track can reopen later.

"We haven't given up," he said. It wasn't immediately clear how the action would affect the track's racing license. The racing commission is expected to discuss the Brady track situation when it meets next Monday.

"We are hoping that the license can be put into suspension. Our lawyer was here Friday and he was going to look into that," Grubbs said. Brady city officials expressed

operators were unable to get new financing.

Mayor H.L. "Bud" Gober said he met with several horse trainers who are using facilities at the Brady track and assured them the city would do its best to work with them.

We want to do what we can to keep those people out there. It's a little industry in itself, and they employ people. We want them to stay," Gober said. However, city officials are now

trying to determine how the track's insurance will be affected because Heart of Texas Inc. is no longer in charge. The city owns the track, but the operators were responsible for paying insurance premiums.

Gober and City Manager Jack Caffall hope to meet with Texas Department of Commerce officials to talk about how the decision not to open the track will affect a \$480,000 commerce department loan.

Last year, the department of commerce approved the loan to race track operators from the state capital fund, through which money is available to small industries to create new jobs.

"You can see something in competition after a month," he said. 'If you take the system and mix it with weight training and jumping, in six months you will see something significant."



Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: I have a persistent cough — mostly nonproductive. I have been, checked by an internist (had X-rays) and an ear, nose and throat specialist.


I don't cough when I'm exerting myself - swimming, biking, aerobic folk dancing. The cough is more related to talking, on arising the first thing In the morning (that can be productive) and laughing. It seems like any chuckle ends in a fit of coughing.

I used to be socially outgoing, but this nagging cough is changing things dramatically

I'm 65 and smoked from 1946 to 1950. My husband smoked four packs a day until he died of lung cancer 14 vears ago.

DEAR READER: Sometimes it is difficult to nail down the cause of a chronic cough. You might arrange to see a specialist in pulmonary diseases. You can have significant changes in the lungs that do not show on an X-ray. These are picked up by breathing tests "(pulmonary function studies).

You could have a chronic bronchitis. Even though you smoked for only four years, your husband's heavy




An overlooked cause for a chronic cough is esophageal regurgitation which irritates the esophagus. In these cases, control of esophageal regurgitation may offer real help.





As expected, the NCAA is charging the Tigers with having an agent help them recruit a specific area. The area would presumably be Detroit and could constitute a serious violation since so many of Stewart's finest players have come from there.

The investigation began in February 1989, the same month Stewart, 54, underwent surgery for colon cancer.

School officials said that with their internal probe completed they are confident they can file a response to the NCAA inquiry in time for the August meeting.

Stewart said the NCAA allegations do not include academic fraud or big outlays of cash to recruits.

"I feel there is a significant difference between a program that deliberately tries to unfairly gain a competitive advantage, and a program that inadvertenty commits an infracton," he said.

Missouri was ranked No. 1 in The Associated Press poll for four weeks last season and won the Big Eight championship. Stewart said the investigation came at the worst possible time.

"I held an interview with the NCAA two days before this year's game with Kansas, when they were ranked No. 1," Stewart said. "There was a final round of interviews involving me and my staff two days before the Big Eight Tournament.'

Monroe said the university's internal probe, which cost almost \$300,000, may have come across two other allegations.

Fittipaldi ready to defend Indy crown

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - Emerson Fittipaldi was the reigning Formula One champion when he first visited the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. It was a decade after that before he first raced at Indy, and another five years before he became its first \$1 million winner.

On Saturday, he hopes to achieve another personal first - earning the pole position for the May 27 race.

"It's great to be back as defending champion. The pressure just makes me work harder," said the 43-year-old Brazilian, a two-time F-1 champion who came out of a two-year retirement in 1984 to join the Indy-car circuit. "I have to work harder this year to try to win again. I know it's going to be very difficult."

No driver has won consecutive Indys since Al Unser in 1970 and 1971. Ironically, Fittipaldi this year replaced Unser on the Penske Racing team.

Arie Luyendyk improved his best lap to 222.816, Mario Andretti went to 222.041 and Al Unser Jr. to 220.297. Fittipaldi, who had a fast lap of 222.607 on Sunday, reached 222.211 in that car and 219.888 in his backup car.

Four-time Indy winner A.J. Foyt made his first appearance of the week

Fittipaldi first came to Indianapolis in 1974 to test the McLaren cars but declined to join the Indy circuit because of conflicting Formula One commitments. By the early 1980's, what he called the "politics, the aggravation, the fights" involved in Formula One racing drove him out of the sport.

He retired for two years, then returned in 1984 to race in the United States. He was fifth in his Indy-car debut at Long Beach and has won 11 of 87 starts since then. Last year, driving for Patrick Racing, he won at Indianapolis, Detroit, Portland, Cleveland and Nazareth and finished among the top five in seven other races.

His victory at Indianapolis was worth a record \$1,001,604 - the largest payoff in auto racing history - and he earned a record \$2,166,078 for the season. He left Patrick to join the Penske team and was reunited with Teddy Mayer, a former McLaren manager who now is a director of Penske's British operation and runs Fittipaldi's pit crew.

'It was great to work again with Teddy after so many years. I worked with him in Formula One, and it's great," Fittipaldi said. "I'm very pleased with the way the team is working. I knew Roger (Penske) always had a great organization, but only working together inside the organization I realized it was even
