



TWENTY-ONE YEARS AGO-Gongs sounded along the front line. And then silence. It was the Eleventh Hour, the Eleventh Day, the Eleventh Month and the end of the World War. In cities people were jubilant over the news, and danced in the streets and wept for joy. Along the front line it was different. Just a silence. Tired, haggard faced the men—fighting men—talked quietly to each other and wondered if it was really over. Then the message spread, offically, that shortly before 11 a. m. on that day the Allied battle chiefs had met with those of the German high command and signed the document that meant peace, That was the first Armistice day.
