There was one more baby born in 1938 than in 1939 in Deaf Smith County, a check in the Bureau of Vital Sta-tistics revealed today.

Comparing the number of births during the five-month period, it was noticed that in January 1938, 16 babies were born; in January 1939, 14 were born; February '38, 6; February '39, 7; March '38, 11; March '39, 12; April '38, 8; April '39, 5; May '38, 11; May '39, 13.

The total number of births in 1938 was 52; of this, 31 of the babies were boys, and 21 were girls. The total for 1939 recorded for the first five months was 51, indicating a drop in population of one. Of the 51 born, 35 were boys, and 16 were girls.

#### SOME WHEAT IS EXPECTED HERE BY JUNE 15: PEAK BY JULY 1

Hot, mid-summer weather here since early this week led farmers, grain dealers and business men of this community to a general conclusion that harvest will be more than a full week or more ahead of the usual time with the first wheat scheduled to start coming in around June 15. However, it was the general opinion that harvesting of the 1939 crop will not really begin in earnest before June 20, and the peak of the annual harvest rush was anticipated between June 20 and July 1.

Prospects Are Fair Despite hot weather and the present last-minute drouth, crop prospects were still set above average mark for this area - especially in the territory north and west of Hereford. Several in the communities south and east reported much damage as the wheat started "turning" Xthis week. More moisture was needed in almost every section, but reports from the east and south indicated more serious damage

than other areas. Because grain men and farmers had figured on an early harvest, along with a better yield than last season, preparations for handling the 1939 crop are also far in advance of past years, and the present harvest is expected to be handled more rapidly than any in several years. 

Just at this season the cotton flea hopper is a timely subject It is one of the most destructive and most widely distributed cotton pest in the Southwest, and et is one of the least understood, most difficult to find, and therefore often robs the grower of the early part of his crop before the presence of the pest is recognized. Farmers cannot have a trained entomologist at beck and call, but they can learn for themselves to recognize the presence of the pest and when to apply control measures.

No way has been found by which to forcast with certainty whether flea hoppers will cause damage or when. When they do occur in damaging numbers they may be numerous in one part of the field and absent or scarce a few yards away. They winter in the egg stage and hatch out on weeds. As soon as wings develop they can migrate to cotton, which seems to be their favorite summer host plant. Both the winged or adult, and the nymph, or young, insects suck at the embryo buds and cause them to drop off, thus destroying the early "set" before it reaches the "square" or boll stage.

Look for the adults on the upper surface of the foliage. Look for the nymphs in the terminal buds, by carefully opening the bud cluster with thumb and finger. The nymph if present, will show activity when disturbed. If twenty or thirty hoppers are found to the hundred plants it is time to get busy with dusting sulphur. Examinations should be made in different parts of the field, and at least every week until the crop is safe.

When cotton has six to eight true leaves (not counting the two which first "come up") it normally begins to form fruiting buds, and should set a new bud for every branch. If buds are not "setting" where they should be, or are falling off be fore developing into "squares" it is a pretty safe guess that flea hoppers are responsible, whether the grower can find the insect or

This is the stage (when the cotton has about six true leaves) when the grower must begin to watch his crop for insects, and the date may vary considerably in the same community or even on the same farm if there are





# HEREFORD

By Jimmie Gillentine

Conditions are decidedly on an upward trend. No one seems interested in winning the \$2.50 prize for making the closest estimate as to how much wheat will be handled through, Hereford, Dawn, Summerfield and Black. June 15, the deadline, is drawing near. Last week I estimated 3,-997,545 bushels—and a lot of people are declaring that I am away too high. H. A. Burk was one who says I am too optimistic. However, he turned right around and said he believed the present crop will bring a dollar a bushel. If you want in on this estimating business, you had better something pretty soon.

It sure would be fine if I was the only one to enter, giving me the prize by de-

I may be too high, but I was sort of basing my estimate on the sudden expansion in the elevator business. These grain boys are in the business—and it looks to me like they have been slipping out and counting the number of heads to the stalk or something. If this thing keeps on we can keep most of the nation's surplus right here in Hereford.

However, I can't blame the folks who won't send in their estimates. Even Secretary Wallace is getting cold feet along this line, according to the following editorial which appeared in the Farmer-Stockman last week:

There will be no marketing quotas for wheat this year. Secretary Wallace has made definite announcement to that effect. He estimates the 1939 supply at 974 million bushels which stands below the 1.021-million bushel quota level set up in the AAA Act of 1938.

The supply of 974 million bushels is made up of 704 million bushels as the estimate of the current crop plus a July 1 car-

If the 1938 crop does turn out to be 704 million bushels the crop will add little to the carryover a year hence. Total domestic use, waste and disappearance runs close to 675 million bushels. If in the year ahead we can again export 100 million bushels of wheat as we did in the year past, the carryover on July 1, 1940, will hand around 200 million bushels, which will not be excessive.

If, again, we might force the export of 150 million bushels in the year ahead the price of wheat might be developed up to a decent level once more. It is to the interest of the wheat grower and every citizen of the United States to get wheat back to at least \$1 a bushel. At that
