



The Government needs steno-graphers for National defense. One is prone to think of National defense in terms of soldiers, sailors and marines. But there are many types of de-fense work behind the lines. A large army of civilian personnel is now/on duty as stenographers in the Government service to take the dictation of the thousands of executives and administrative officers, and transcribe it into typewritten, documents. Some of this material is of lasting importance. Some of it will set into motion Government events of historical consequence.

It is setimated that the Government has approximately 85,-000 stenographers, typists and secretaries on the payroll. Many young men and women are responding to the call. Thousands more are needed.

Aside from the present emergency, the opportunities for stenographers in the Government service are favorable. Good stenographers are always in demand.
