

## Lieut. Col. Martin Moses, Known To. Many Local Ranchers, A Jap Prisoner

(Editor's Note: The following news story is reprinted from the Fort Worth Star-Telegram and will be of interest to many people of Hereford who remember Lieut. Col. Martin Moses who was formerly eattle inspector in this territory.
